Too often in the past we have had reports from the various exhibitions, and trade shows up and down the country that have told of disatisfaction. So with an attitude of "Whatever you can do we should be able to improve on, at least", the Mandate CB 81 group asked clubs to hold open nights to inform and educate the public, as well as inviting them to come forward with complaints about interference so we could offer some concrete help. The Box Town Breakers Club offered to sponsor and organise the first we hope of many of these such nights, and what a masterpiece of organisation it

Apart from the obvious Mandate stand, which showed the more responsible side of day to day CBing, there was a variety of organisations such as REACT, and SCREAM, both emergency monitoring organisations. Armed with video films and a mass of information we were treated to an informative time from their reps. The public found that CBing wasn't all to do with rubber ducks and big ten fours, but saw for themselves exactly what it was all about and the equipment needed that was exhibited by a local CB retailer. Breakers unsure about the new frequencies could examine and play with FM rigs that were on show courtesy of Binatone and Lake, and there was ample info. available to get the true facts about the new rigs. The Stockport Radio Society stand allowed a glimpse into the world of legal DXing by their comprehensive showing of QSL cards, and Radio Ham equipment, they were a huge success with quite a number of the older breakers who are at present thinking seriously of joining their ranks. The star novelty turn of the evening was the wheelchair, bed, commode, vibrator, CB mobile station, complete with reading light, TV and rig. It did everything at the touch of a button, bar wash the pots and smack your bottom. The aerial on the back would have looked better with a little modulation light on, but on the night there were many satisfied customers who enjoyed joyriding about in it.

Far from being a novelty was the stand occupied by the Radio Interference Dept. of British Telecom. With occilloscope and filters and an unlimited supply of patience and knowledge, they did more for the cause of CB education than any of the publications issued officially from the Home Office. They certainly proved that the

personal approach is best.

The proof of the pudding was certainly in the eating, and we now know what we always thought was true. If you want to hold a CB event then do it yourself. That way you can be sure that the people who support you are the ones who have the most to offer CB, and you are positive that the public and the breakers who turn up aren't being ripped off. A last message to all the commercial companies who are organising similar events in the near future, our show was free!! We never charged any enterance fee, and we gave the breakers what they

matter of twelve months ago.

Citizen Band Radio has now been rapidely turned into a profit making industry, where the aspect of 'Good Buddys' has been virtually lost altogether, where even at the Eye Balls at one time the shy introduction barrier was broken by saying the introductory words 'eyeball eyeball'. But now I find that some of the eyeballs I have visited in the past months, have been gradually turned into profit making discos, and brown bottle shops, where even so called 'Good Buddys' have been involved in drunken brawls, and generally bucket mouthing in the eyeballs and outside using P.A. equipment. All clubs involved with these undersireables obversely take all steps possible to stamp them out, but within weeks these problems usually occur again.

Quite a turn round from the Citizen Band Radio I was so infatuated with when I

was first introduced.

The overall single item that kept me interested in C.B. was when I joined a relatively new club called O.R.B.I.T. (Organisation of Reliable Breakers in Trust) who decided to break off from the fashion following C.B. and form a club 'eyeball' for C.B.'ers and not disco dancers. And because of the formation of stringent but effective rules, undersirables were immediately refused admission. It is quite easy to do if your club is relatively new and every member is in full agreement.

Most of all this club is a meeting place for C.B. ers and not a place for a breaker to wonder if aggravation, bucket mouthing or the general disrespect of C.B. will occur.

I know I am painting a dark picture on C.B. in general, but as a member of the airwaves for quite a number of months, I am quite disheartened with it, even though the club O.R.B.I.T. are prepared to discuss and try to better the situation, even as far as organising the first C.B. Conference, holiday to Germany where a limited 100% fully booked trip of 50 members took place in October 1981.

I must finally add that after all our efforts and support given for 27 MHz A.M. all the rallies and demonstrations we have partaken, that if the majority of breakers do not stand firm and sway to 27 MHz F.M. a substantial amount of original breakers left and Good Buddys will cease to operate on the airwaves. 
I am writing on behalf of the "99" Club to thank you for your contribution of £50 towards one of our charities.

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
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
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
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
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


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Firstly I suppose I ought to explain the heading. Over the last couple of months we have talked about Dxing and fitting up a homebase, how to do it and what to say. Well, for those who have been following the series we now come to the wonderful world of QSLing. The heading is the motto of the Big Ben DX QSL Club, it simply means that all members and people associated with Big Ben QSL 100%. I will explain what that means later.

Most of you probably realise that QSL means to confirm a QSO with another station. By doing this, one station would send the other an informative card specially made for the purpose, telling the other of weather conditions, signal strength, etc.

A QSL card can be of any design. There are three main types, the serious informative type, not unlike the radio hams, the personally designed card which would depict the breakers AM handle in picture form and station call sign, and of course there are the DX club cards. If of course you cannot afford a great quantity of cards in one go, there is nothing to stop you sending just local post cards.

Assuming you are now ready to QSL I will explain the best way to go about it. Having taken down the co-ordinations of the station you are to QSL with, fill in a card with all the relevant information. Don't forget to sign the card and if possible put in a few extra signed and dated with a message like "all the best from England" or "73's and 55's from our house to yours" or something like that. Don't forget to put on all of them "Please send card and thanks". These other cards will be sent on for you to other stations your new friend abroad QSL's with. Thus increasing your collection, because you should undoubtedly receive cards saying "received your card via....

. " and then the name of the station you sent them to. Add a few local post cards with a small coin selotaped to one of them, request one in return. Good QSL stations will return the same back to you. However it is known that some people do not always return like they say they will. Having said that, the ones that do certainly make up for the ones that don't. When talking to Italian stations never arrange to swap paper money over the air, a good friend of mine did and as £1 was the lowest denomination, promptly sent it off, only to receive a lira, equiv' nothing. If you say you will QSL with another station then make sure you send off your cards within a week, there is nothing like being kept waiting. When sending cards abroad, say U.S.A. or New Zealand or Australia it might be handy to know that if you just fold the leaf of the envelope inside you can still send airmail, but for half price.

QSLing in some countries is done discreetly like Belgium for instance and when sending to Belgium only address the envelope with the P.O. box no. and address, not the station name or personal name. This is because the Belgian Post Office authorities will only return to sender.

There are a few golden rules when QSLing and they should really be kept to, to ensure 100% returns.

- 1. When you agree to QSL do so a week at the latest.
- 2. Always ensure sufficient postage is paid, you wouldn't like to pay for your cards when they arrive I'm sure.
- 3. If you receive by airmail, return the same way.
- 4. Swap cards on a 1-1 basis, in other words if you are sent six cards then return six back.

Another way to swap QSL's is by joining a QSL swap club. This is a sort of handling bureau who will send out your cards for you. A nominal joining fee is required plus 10 to 15 of your own QSL cards. These are for distribution to other members. You will then receive a package consisting of such things as the club stamp,

QSL,YOU QSL

wall certificate and many other things too numerous to mention except you will also receive other QSL cards from other members. If you don't already have one then a DXing call sign will also be allocated to you. There are clubs all over the world interested in maintaining a high standard of QSL relations for their own particular country. I personally run the BIG BEN DX QSL CLUB here in Godalming (see club spot). Another such club well worth mentioning is the English International DX club, run by Lez Carroll and his wife Maureen. The club was formed in 1979 and at the moment of writing boasts quite proudly over 800 members in more than 50 countries. Who says that QSLing is not a big hobby. Anyone interested in joining please contact Lez at 225 Arnold Street, Boldon, Tyne & Wear. A sae would ensure an application form sent to you straight away. When writing please mention B.O.T.S.

Thanks very much for all the letters and QSL cards that are coming in, as promised I will answer them all but an sae would help to speed things up a little.

One letter I received was from a gentleman in Leeds, who asked what was the price of my 120 channel rigs with sideband, well let me just say for the record, I do not deal in rigs - legal or illegal and so I suggest anyone considering buying a rig should contact their local C.B. dealer.

Another from Sgt. Rock, asked would his straight 40 AM/FM and an 18ft di-pole with a linear amplifier help get out to the states. Well I'm sorry but highly unlikely, you see local poundage stateside would tend to make it near impossible to copy stateside without sideband and generous skip conditions. However I am not saying this is impossible as last year in the south we were enjoying QSO with the Irish and French stations AM.

One more this week, and quite important it is too. What about giving addresses over the air whem DXing. Well this is no problem, but it is of course risky. Giving your name and address may present the monitoring buzby a golden opportunity for a bust. So I suggest one of two things:—

1 is to join a local DX club which has access to a PO box, then on the club meeting night you can pick up your mail from the club secretary or whoever. Or

2 if this is not possible then you can rent a PO box yourself by applying to the post office and paying a fee of £25 per annum.

Thanks to those sending in QSL cards I will try to feature them in future articles.

Well there you have it for this month, I hope you are ready to start QSLing now and enjoy a new hobby. For those of you interested I have made up a two page information sheet for those wishing to have tips on DXing and QSLing available free by writing to The Duchess at the address at the bottom. A local post card would be appreciated as she collects these and for this she will send you her personal OSL card.

Believe me QSLing is a great hobby, I know, because of all I exchange. DXing maybe illegal but QSLing is not.

RIG REVIEW...

This months rigs were spotted while at the National Citizens Band Exhibition in September. There were several manufacturers and importers displaying their U.K. F.M. rigs, however only one firm had their rigs actually working so that we could judge the performance for ourselves, that firm was Fidelity Radio Ltd.

Fidelity and the organisers of the exhibition had been granted special licenses by the Home Office so that the rigs could be tested and demonstrated. Two rigs were set up on the Fidelity stand, the basic CB1000 FM and the posher model CB2000 FM. both mobile rigs. A base station model the CB3000 FM was on display but not working, and we were told this would not be available until early 1982. The antenna was fitted to the roof of the exhibition hall. (Rather more than 7 metres high we suspect).

We tried both rigs out and the quality was very impressive, much clearer than any of the A.M. rigs we have heard, and there was no problems in copying the other station which was some distance away in another part of London. Although we could not be given an exact price of the rigs we were told that the CB1000 FM would sell in the shops at around £60 including V.A.T. and the CB2000 FM about £85 inc., compare that with some of the prices for V.A.T. and duty paid A.M. rigs, not bad ch!

Fidelity said they expected to all set for legalisation on the 2nd of November. let's hope they are right. Finally, thanks to McGill and Green Peace for the M6, copies on the way to and from the show.



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ANOTHER FIRST FOR BREAKER ON THE SIDE...

934 MHz C.B. — **WILL IT WORK?**

IT was way back in the summer of 1980 when 934 MHz first appeared on the scene. It was the Governments answer to C.B. or Open Channel as they then preferred to call it.

The discussion document was the first positive step on the long weary road to legal C.B., in it the Government recognised the need for a personal communication service and proposed a frequency band just above 928 MHz as the only system possible in the U.K. without causing severe interference to other services. It is interesting to note that the Government also stated in the document that they were convinced that 27 MHz is not appropriate for the U.K. The publication of the document sparked off a series of protests not only from breakers but also from professional bodies, manufacturers and M.P.s. This eventually persuaded the Home Office to introduce a 27 MHz F.M. system, although many are still not satisfied with this. The Governments original suggestion of just above 928 MHz (in fact 934 MHz) has also been introduced as a secondary system.

Why is it then that 934 MHz was so decisively rejected in favour of a lower frequency band? In this article I will attempt to explain the advantages and disadvantages of 934 MHz, taking into account the various tests carried out at similar frequencies by professional bodies (such as the R.S.G.B.) and manufacturers.

The main disadvantage of 934 MHz compared with lower frequencies (V.H.F. and 27 MHz) is that of range. In open country with few obstructions the ranges obtained with 934 MHz are probably going to be as great if not greater than with 27 MHz, however concrete buildings and structures severely attenuate the 934 MHz signals thus making the range in built up areas less in most cases, especially mobile to mobile, although in tests it has been found that these signals sometimes get into the parts other frequencies cannot reach due to them being reflected off objects and around corners. Another disadvantage is that of cost. The higher up in frequency you go the more difficult and hence more expensive it is to manufacture the parts that make up a C.B. rig. therefore a basic mobile rig for 934 MHz will cost about £200, this price should however reduce as the rigs become more popular and the economics of mass production gets into full swing.

Many fears have been expressed about the safety at these high frequencies when the body is in close proximity to a radiating antenna, although radiation at any frequency with sufficient power could cause injury, even 27 MHz, (why do you think linear amplifiers are called burners?). In view of this the Home Office have stated that 934 MHz hand held rigs shall have an effective radiated power (E.R.P.) of no more than 3 watts, this should remove any possible radiation hazard, you are probably more likely to poke your eye out with the antenna than suffer radiation burns!

So there you have the major reasons for rejecting 934 MHz, but let's take a look at some of the advantages 934 MHz can offer. Probably the major feature on the plus side is the ability to reject interference. Above 30 MHz or so interference from stations in other countries (skip) gradually deminishes, by the time we get to 934 MHz it is

virtually unheard of, therefore this type of interference which can cause severe restrictions of range at 27 MHz, is not a problem, allowing maximum range at all times. Ignition interference as well as interference from factories and domestic appliances is also eliminated at 934 MHz. Antennas can be made very compact because as frequency increases, wavelength and hence antenna length decreases. 934 MHz represents a wavelength of only 32 centimetres compared with 11 metres for 27 MHz. A mobile antenna only 2 feet long could have a gain of 5dB! Small beams are also practical, these being about the size of a small U.H.F. television aerial. The use of beams on rotators is handy for reducing the strength of other stations on the same channel you are on, in favour of the station you are talking to, by rotating the beam in his direction. This would allow more stations to share the same channel and so reduce overcrowding, not that this will be a problem on 934 MHz for some time yet.

It is claimed that 934 MHz will cause practically no interference to television and Hi-Fi, but no tests to confirm this have been carried out to my knowledge by anyone outside of the Home Office. I am sure that interference to Hi-Fi set-ups will not be a problem, but I am not so sure about T.V.I. 934 MHz is very close to the U.H.F. T/V frequencies which go up to 860 MHz, and I fear that the bandwidth of T.V. tuners is sufficiently wide to cause blocking of T.V. signals by 934 MHz transmissions, particularly where the C.B. antenna is mounted in front of a vertically polarised (relay station type) T.V. aerial however we shall see.

To sum up then — Although the range mobile to mobile will usually be less than at 27 MHz, the claims from some quarters of only a few hundred yards on 934 MHz are utter rubbish, a more likely range from car to car would be in the region of 3 miles or so in small towns and 6 to 8 miles in open country, with much greater ranged for base stations. The cost although high at the moment should come down as the system becomes more popular.

It is possible should it be considered feasible that a network of repeater stations could be set up in the future. The use of repeaters or relays at 934 MHz would be ideal and could extend mobile to mobile range to more than 20 miles, however many more channels would have to be allocated for the widespread use of repeaters to be practical. Repeaters are already used on the U.H.F. bands in the U.S.A. and Australia.

So who is going to use 934 MHz at the beginning? Small businesses will most likely find it a much better proposition than 27 MHz, because there are more clear channels with less interference and it is more private (at the moment). With a well positioned base antenna a business should be able to contact it mobiles for a radius of at least 5 miles and at a fraction of the cost of a professional installation. Of course advertising over the air would not be allowed under the terms of the licence.

As there is likely to be less 'trucker talk' and jive talk on this band than on 27 MHz, it would appeal to the many breakers who want to get away from that sort of thing (and there are a lot of them, believe me). In other words 934 MHz will probably be used purely as a service and less as a fun hobby

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
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
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
