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D.A.R.E. (DRUG ABUSE RESISTANCE EDUCATION), the nation's largest drug education and violence avoidance program, honored Motown Record Co. president/CEO Jheryl Busby with its "Future of America Award" at a gala fundraiser in Beverly Hills.

Nearly a thousand people gathered at the Beverly Hilton Hotel for the event, which raised \$1 million for the program and featured a performance by Motown artist Stevie Wonder. The proceeds will help provide workbooks and educational materials needed to begin teaching the newly revised D.A.R.E. core curriculum (which places greater emphasis on reducing youth violence) in schools nationwide this fall.

Other entertainers appearing included Shanice, jazz guitarist Norman Brown, Raven-Symone and Fred Savage. Other notables included LAPD Police Chief Willie Williams, Bruce Jenner, Paul Gonzales, Steve Garvey, Rosie Grier, Tony Curtis, D.A.R.E. executive director Glenn Levant and president Nathan Shapell.

JOE SAMPLE AND DAVID SANBORN will join Al Jarreau when the Playboy Jazz Festival, a coveted entrée on the Southern California jazz menu since 1979, goes on the road to Detroit, Denver, Chicago, Boston, Washington, D.C. and Atlanta during July and August of 1994. At press time, a spokeswoman for the festival could not confirm the opening date, city or venue, noting that details were still being finalized. Playboy Jazz Festival events during each stop on the national tour will feature three headline acts and two to three opening acts during five- to seven-hour concerts.

Five-time Grammy-winner Jarreau, who has just released his latest Warner Bros./Reprise album Tenderness with an accompanying home video (see page 17, will be joined by Sample (also part of the collective Warner family) at each of the six stops and Sanborn, who will release in early June his Elektra Entertainment album Hearsay, at press time was slated for at least three of the tour stops. Sanborn, who has other tour commitments, also performs on tracks from Jarreau's album. The national tour is being produced in conjunction with Patrick Rains & Associates, which is the management for Marcus Miller, who produced Jarreau's album and is a frequent collaborator with Sanborn.

"We expect this summer's tour to be a success in its own right and to lead to additional Playboy Jazz Festival roll-outs not only in other cities in the United States, but overseas as well," comments Richard Rosenzweig, president of Playboy Jazz Festivals.

SOCCER ROCKS THE GLOBE, the official theme album for World Cup USA 1994, is being released by Mercury Records in the U.S.

Daryl Hall and Sounds of Blackness perform the theme single, "Gloryland." Also featured are Jon Bon Jovi, Queen, James, Tears For Fears, The Moody Blues, Santana, Fleetwood Mac, Tina Turner, Gary Glitter, the Scorpions, Kool & The Gang and other artists performing traditional sports anthems commonly heard at soccer and other major sporting events.

The 1994 FIFA World Cup Soccer Championship will be played June 17-July 17 in Boston, Chicago, Dallas, Detroit, Los Angeles, New York/New Jersey, Orlando, San Francisco and Washington. All 52 games will be telecast on ABC-TV or ESPN.

The 150 nominees, invited to submit visual and written materials, will be reviewed by one of five panels, each comprised of three distinguished artists and arts professionals, in the respective discipline they have been proposed in. The names of the 15 panelists will be announced at the completion of the selection process. The board of nominators, to be rotated each year, will remain anonymous.

"I hope the Award will provide the recognition, support and even a bit more confidence for the artists who receive them," said Alpert. "I'd love the Award to be able to open some doors, and, most of all, allow the artists to reach down a little further and find something they haven't discovered yet."

Douglas Trumbull, ShowBiz Expo '94 **Keynote Speaker; 165 Speakers Set For Eight Key Fields And Industry Panel Participation**

DOUGLAS TRUMBULL, Ridefilm Corporation president and CEO and vice-chairman of Imax Corporation, will deliver the keynote address at the 11th Annual Showbiz Expo, one of entertainment's largest and most comprehensive trade shows and conferences. The three-day event is scheduled for June 11-13 at the Los Angeles Convention Center.

Trumbull's address, "Welcome To The Evolution," will "share his vision on the evolution of entertainment as it continues to provide audiences with more powerful forms of out-of-home entertainment in a world of increasingly advanced in-home electronic media," according to an Expo release.

Trumbull is a pioneer in motion picture visual effects, having began his career as part of a team of visual effects supervisors on the now-classic 2001:

A Space Odyssey, and he continues today developing such special venues as Back To The Future-The Ride, which he produced and directed for Universal Studios Florida and Hollywood through his Trumbull Company, Inc. With over 30 years of experience as an artist, inventor, entrepreneur and visionary, he is a recognized authority on the progression of film into higher levels of sophistication.

The 11th Annual Showbiz Expo also announced confirmation of 165 speakers to participate in more than 40 panels during the three-day event. Personages will range from writers, directors, producers and film company heads to various combinations there within.

The Writers Guild of America, west (WGAw) will address the current trend with "Some Like It Hot," a panel featuring screenwriters Julius Epstein, Daniel Taradash and others explaining how to craft sensual scenes that draw the audience into the romance of a screen moment.

Other subjects scheduled to be covered are: "Programming: Who's Buying What in the '90s''; "Making Your Deal as a Producer, Director or Writer"; "Entrepreneurship in the '90s: Business Plans for Independents" and "Film Distribution: How Past Lessons Can Lead Us Into the Future."

The Black Filmmakers Foundation has scheduled "How to Get Your Film Out There: Distribution & Marketing." The Directors Guild of America will spotlight "Directing Your First Feature" and Independent Feature Project/West will present "Ultra Low-Budget Filmmaking."

In the Big Apple promoting his new Forward album and VH-1 TV show which begins airing Friday, May 27, both entitled Buster's Happy Hour, a pompado ured David Johansen (aka Buster Poindexter) met platinum-blonde singer/actress Carol Channing at a recent taping at WNBC's studio. From one N.Y. "DOII" to another, the pop star and the Broadway star spent a happy hour together as guests on Channel 4's "Live At Five" program.

PLEASE PAY ATTENTION...if you don't, soprano saxist Marion Meadows could become a very big name before you know it. RCA/Novus hosted a reception at popular N.Y. restaurant/club B. Smith's last week (13) to celebrate the release of Meadows' newest album, Forbidden Fruit. Meadows is a jazz musician, but he's more than what that may imply to some. The album is an intriguing blend of musical and, sometimes, spiritual influences. Meadows' swirling soprano and tenor sax work bends gently toward the musical setting of each selection—a dance/funk mood prevails on "Back-2-Back," for example. He uses African, Brazilian, straight-ahead jazz and other influences (there is even a Japanese koto on the title track) to form—in this, his third album—a strictly personal and original style. Forbidden Fruit could be Meadows' breakout album.

WORDPERFECT SPONSORS TONY BENNETT: Up to now Tony Bennett's discs have not been floppy. However, the WordPerfect Corp. has announced exclusive sponsorship of Bennett's 40-city concert tour from July through December. The announcement was made at a recent luncheon press briefing at the Main Street Restaurant in New York.

YOUNG JAZZ LION CUB Sergio Salvatore continues to amaze. The 13-year-old jazz piano prodigy's second GRP album, *Tune Up*, has just been released, and it is still difficult to understand the musical maturity and creativity in his delivery. Backed with outstanding musicians including Chick Corea, the Brecker Brothers, Gary Burton and Jay Leonhart, Master Salvatore sails and sallies through a nicely balanced program from the striking title tune to Charlie Parker's "Au Privave" to standards "Autumn Leaves" and "Somewhere Over The Rainbow."

Salvatore's trained classical and instinctively jazz playing was featured at NYC's SupperClub last week (17) in a performance to benefit the Green Chimney's, an organization that supports using animals as educational tools for children.

SHAI: "The Place Where You Belong" (MCA 2949)



PAUL WELLER: Wild Wood (Gol Discs/London 828

Longtime Weller fans certainly won't confuse this new release (or 1992's self-titled album) with any of his work in the '70s and '80s (with The Jam and the underappreciated Style Council). And that's just as well with Paul, who seems to have now found his true calling. mixing together a warm. R&B-flavored brew that recalls, at times. Richie Havens, Eric Clapton and a young Faces-era Rod Stewart. Controlled intensity, delivered with a disarming subtlety...a cut

THE FARM: Hullabaloo (Sire/Reprise 45588)

"Never trust a man whose God is in the skies."...a pretty ballsy way for Britain's The Farm to begin this, their third full-length album. Of course, anyone who has watched this band's progression from U.K. cover darlings to insightful, impassioned rabblerousers knows not to expect kid gloves. A back-to-basics musical approach this time, with less emphasis on studio trickery and more on substantive dissertation. "The Man Who Cried" highlights this solid effort.





WILLY DEVILLE: Backstreets Of Desire (Forward/Rhino 71686)

For years, one of this country's most underrated and underappreciated talents has been singer/guitarist/songwriter Willy DeVille. Whether fronting the tragically neglected Mink DeVille or as a solo artiste (based both in the U.S. and France), Willy has always been a man who put substance and depth ahead of trend and style on the chalkboard. That, of course, explains his lack of commercial success in the U.S., but also explains his compelling craft. Think-

CHEAP TRICK: Budokan II (Epic 53308)

This often-delayed, long-awaited Part 2 from the legendary Trick shows at Tokyo's Budokan Hall in 1978 and '79 is finally seeing the light of day-and not a moment too soon, we say. Meant to piggyback the recent issue of the band's first Warner Bros. album, Budokan II is filled with lots of tasty cuts from the Chicago legends' first three wonderful albums, including "Elo Kiddies," "California Man," "Downed" and "High Roller." Party on, Garth.

HUEY LEWIS & THE NEWS: Four Chords & Several Years Ago (Elektra 61500)

After Elektra picked up the floundering Huey Lewis & The News from Chrysalis, the last thing that the company probably expected (or wanted) was a puffball record such as this. Filled with classic American rock 'n' roll and R&B, the album's songs are given the Huey once-over, stripped of any spirit or energy, left limp and lifeless...not an easy trick, actually, given the quality of material that Lewis & Co. chose to cover. Best to let this one go quietly into the night.



MADDER ROSE: Panic On (Atlantic 82581)

Album #2 from New York's fascinating Madder Rose follows the lead of its Bring It Down release of '92, folding gobs of anxious guitar noise and post-post-punk musical drama into the thickly-layered, angelic vocals of singer Mary Lorson. The end result? An album full of curious contradictions and unsettling dynamic interplay. It's soaring and mellow one moment, snarling and dangerously electric the next. Dive into "Sleep, Forever" and hypnotic "Mad Dog."

ORANGUTANG: Dead Sailor Acid Blues (Imago

While Boston's Orangutang showed some promise with an Imagoissued EP in 1992, the band's subsequent live shows were of the hit-or-miss variety, often unfocused and lacking in the vision thing. Well, it seems they've put all that behind 'em as this, the band's first full-lengther, is rife with character and quite engaging song arrangement. From the reality-slap of "Shiny Like Gold" to the muscular "Sweet Lemon Maureen," an impressive, nicely executed effort.



PICK OF THE WEEK



INDIGO GIRLS: Swamp Ophelia (Epic 47621) Producer: Peter Collins

This fourth studio album, second with whiz producer Peter Collins (Rush) is yet another forward progression for this compelling and challenging folk/rock duo. More substantive than previous efforts, Swamp Ophelia tackles heavy, sometimes controversial subjects with the same smooth, effective style that's marked their work since their 1985 inception. Highlights of this dramatic and powerfully recorded alb include Amy Ray's anthemic "Touch Me Fall," Holocaust novella "This Train' and Emily Salier's touching "Fare Thee Well." Look for a big year, including a successful shed tour, from Indigo Girls in '94.

PATTI AUSTIN: That Secret Place (GRP/MCA 4023). Producer: Lee Ritenour.

Patti Austin has truly earned kudos as a soulful pop stylist, who genre-bends as easily as any vocalist in recent memory. This is not hyperbole. This album demonstrates some of the vocal identities she's capable of manifesting. Take for instance the cover of Thomas Dolby's "Ability To Swing." This had to be what Dolby wanted to accomplish with his pseudo-jazz track. Austin doesn't linger on any idiomatic expression. Other noteworthy entries here include the stenchy cover of Aretha Franklin's "Rock Steady" and the reggae-seasoned "Captivated." A vista of guest stars and Lee Ritenour's production shine.



THA MEXAKINZ: Zig Zag (Mad Sounds/Motown 37463). Producers: Various.

From the house parties and mixed tape experiments of Long Beach (Strong Beach), CA eastside comes Sinful and Intellect, throwing a combination of hard fresh beats ("A Little Sumthin") and R&B evergreens samples (Wilton Felder's "Covert Action" genre-spliced into "Welkum 2 Da Hood") into a smooth mix of freestyle rap. Tracks like "Cok Bak Da Hammal," "Phonkia Melodia" and "Da Method" demonstrate this group's ability to be diverse. Guest producers like exception and the producer of the producers of the producers like exception and the producer of the pro executive producer Morris Taft ("Mo") and Quincy Jones III give an added dimension to the sound.

YOUNG SOLDIERZ: Young Soldierz (Dangerous/Warlock 6704). Producers: Ronnie Phillips & others.

There's nothing gentile about this collection of sex, drug, swillin' '40s and rap to get bank-rolled. But there is a great deal of vivid realism and humor, and the graduates of the Crips and Bloods album Bangin' On Wax (namely Big Wy and Lil' Stretch) tell it like they've lived it with the help of key producer Ronnie Phillips and collaborators Duke-E Fingaz and Battlecat. The production provides some compelling, funky and mournfully soul-inspired music. "If Tomorrow Comes" is the first single, but tracks like "East Side, West Side" and "Flex Back To My Dog House"





VARIOUS ARTISTS: Down To Earth: Acid Jazz Worldwide (Planet Earth 50101). Producer: Various.

Acid jazz has become as diverse a subgenre of music as any. There's mantra groove-like dance, melodious soul set to shifting textures, hip-hop, sample- and beat-driven instrumental and rap grooves, and the best on this collection features fine vocals. This international collection comes correct with a myriad of flavors for the musical palate. DJ Lethal of House of Pain opens and closes this 11-track collection. But Ute of Australia, L.A.'S Mesh of Mind and Brit crews Detour and Workshy bring distinctive flavor to each track.

PICK OF THE WEEK



MAD FLAVA: From Tha Ground Unda (Priority 57199). Producers: Tracy Kendrick, Courtney Branch & Mad Flava.

There's a strong possibility that Mad Flava might benefit from the backlash against so-called gangsta-style rap. This crew comes hardcore, but has tongue planted firmly in cheek. And after almost a year of circling the retail pipeline for release, it's fair to say the wait was worth it. The first single "To Tha Break" is effective, but the group covers a cornucopia of musical styles, while the mike flow alternates between Grand Puba raw to an Arrested Development compendium. Other top tracks include the title track "Feel Tha Flava," "Bump Ya Head" and "Lick A Shot."

GANGSTA RAP: THE VIEW FROM MTV NEWS: After all, MTV has hosted a presidential candidate, who later came back as president for a town hall meeting with the cable net's youthful viewership, and he was the star of a commentary on the net's Enough Is Enough anti-violence campaign launched earlier this year...so why shouldn't there be a "Gangsta Rap: A MTV News Special Report"? The issue has gone from the domiciles of middle America to public hearings in both houses of Congress, and now, debuting Wcdnesday, May 25 from 10:00 p.m. to 10:30 p.m. (ET/PT), hits the airwaves in a program that employs a videlip approach to examine so-called gangsta rap.

The issues that are broached do not successfully examine the depth of the issue. But MTV does strike the proper chords and stridence surrounding the issue. MTV must be lauded for using Bill Stepney, CEO of Stepsun Entertainment and former Def Jam production honcho, as a learned and hip-hop cultural sounding board for the issue. Acts as diverse as Dr. Dre, Snoop Doggy Dogg and Tupac Shakur to the Rev. Calvin Butts, community activist C. Dolores Tucker and Congresswoman Maxine Waters (D-Los Angeles) were among the outspoken public figures.

In four segments over the 30 minutes, the report attempts to address the issue in the context of Shakur's problems, how the music inflames violence and sexism and how so-called gangsta rap might be a function of marketing, sell-through and the bottom line. There is also a cross section of youth who listen to the music—culled from places as disparate as West Philadelphia to Decatur, GA—who give their read on what is called gangsta rap.

Ultimately Stepney has the appropriate last word. He says that the music is "an alarm" and that people should wake up. And like rap group **Trinity** Gardens Cartel says, "Don't Blame It On The Music."

DUCE TORCHA: From the trunk to the Jeep tape deck...that's how you can expect to hear "Twisting Dank," a 12" by rap duo Duce Duce, the collaboration between Compton hardcore chanter Dank and Long Beach hip-hop homie Papa Duke. The duo's album is being produced by street vibe merchants Torcha Chamba Productions, the team of Cozy and Soup. They've been known to be coolin' with Ice Cube, Kam and MC Ren. At press time, no major label had stepped forward to handle distribution of Sip of the Duce and that track was to shoot out straight to mom-and-pop retail and to the jeeps under the Torcha Chamba label. "I'm That Nigga" is to be the first official single from the album. The duo is lookin' for some love at the Diamond Bar Country Club where they will kick it live.

PATRA: "Worker Man" The Remixes (Epic 6114).

These remixes are sonically more pleasing than the first service of the single. These versions better complement Patra's urgent toasting. The Royal Radio Extended Mix and that Phat Insane Mix are better-suited to this female's ribald vocal vibe. Production by C. "Specialist" Dillon and "CD" Kelly is in the pocket.

■ VARIOUS ARTISTS: "The Crooklyn Dodgers" (MCA 2994).

Special Ed, Buckshot and Masta Ace give this soundtrack extract some soul under the direction of A Tribe Called Quest. While Spike Lee's film is being hailed as a kinder, gentler silver screen tome, this record has some jagged edges. It's about growin' up in Brooklyn, with a shank, a ballistic tool and an attitude. Bring your thick skin.

NIKKI KIXX: "What U Do 2 Me" (Street Life/Scotti Bros.).

Nikki kicks the flava on a slow tip. You want to grab a member of the opposite sex and find out what you can do to each other when you hear this lushly produced record. Nikki's mic flow is like a female version of Giovanni Salah. Urgently sexy backing vocals are best on the Soakin' Wet Mix, but the original Radio Mix will grab immediate attention.

Emilio Estefan, Jr.: A Miami Hurricane Of Music

THE CURRENT HURRICANE OF MUSIC and talent gusting out of Miami way is due principally to a unique and exceptional visionary, an individual with a mind's eye so acute and razor-sharp that any micro-element of talent is inescapable...an individual with an enormous appetite for creating, molding and forging careers as if he were a magician...the spinner of gold and platinum threads, weaving in a precise and rudimentary fashion a strong and stable empire on a foundation of music...this quiet storm is none other than Emilio Estefan, Jr.

Born and raised in Santiago, Cuba, Estefan's love of music goes back as early as when he was eight years old. "I already knew that music was going to be my life's vocation," recalls Estefan. "I was so serious that I had convinced my father to buy me a piano and several other instruments. I then formed my first group, called El Conjunto Capetillo."

At the age of 13, Emilio and his family were forced to leave their beloved Cuba, because of the ensuing revolution. They relocated to Spain, where he lived until he was 15. During all of those three years in exile, Estefan continued his education and musical training with goal in full sight and undeterred. Eventually the Estefan family relocated to Miami to be reunited with many of their family and brethren.

Soon after completing his education in 1975, Estefan went to work for the Bacardi Rum company as a marketing director. That same year he started a group consisting of local talent called The Miami Latin Boys. "It wasn't an easy road," says Estefan. "I worked the day job at Bacardi to help my family and performed with the band doing weddings and special gigs. But I was determined to introduce the music [to the U.S.] I experienced as a child in Cuba because I felt a natural tie to my roots. And yet my concept was to put it in a totally different format.'

In fact, if it wasn't for those hard-time gigs, Emilio and his now-famous wife Gloria Estefan would have never met. "I first met Gloria Fajardo at a church function," says Emilio. "She was singing and playing the guitar. I fell in love with her voice immediately. She was introduced to me by the parish priest and friend of the family."

With an innate knack for sensing talent, Emilio offered Gloria the lead spot in his band. But Gloria, who was graduating from the University of Miami having majored in psychology, was going to Europe to pursue a post-graduate degree in linguistics. "You know Gloria can speak French fluently as well," beamed Emilio. Being the consummate professional, Emilio pursued Gloria after her return from Europe. One day, just by coincidence, Emilio and The Miami Latin Boys were gigging at a friend's wedding and as fate would have it, Gloria was an invited guest. Emilio seized the opportunity and invited Gloria to sing a couple of tunes with them. Gloria obliged and the rest is history. "Now, with addition of Gloria, we had to change the name of the group to accommodate the gender," relates Estefan. "So, we came up with 'The Miami Sound Machine' and it stuck with us ever since." It just seems like these stars were destined to meet...a true love story.

But again, their road to success wasn't easy. It wasn't until 1983 that Emilio produced the band's first Top Ten hit, "Conga," which set the tone for his follow-up productions. Emilio's dream was finally taking shape. His concept of Latin/Pop music took the world by storm. In just a few years, Emilio Estefan was not only producer, manager and husband of international superstar Gloria Estefan, but also recipient of numerous awards such as an ACE Award two years running for producing Gloria's Disney special, "Going Home," and Showtime special "Homecoming Concert," a 1987 American Music Award for Best Pop Duo or Group, producer of Grammy-winning albums Mi Tierra and Otro Dia Mas Sin Verte, and two Grammy nominations for Producer of the Year.

In addition, Estefan has produced such artists as Clarence Clemmons (of Bruce Springsteen's E Street Band), Matt Bianco, Jose Luis Rodriguez and Julio Iglesias. He is also responsible for the discovery and success of pop phenom and Grammy champ Jon Secada. And that ain't all! Check this out-just recently, Emilio Estefan was named president of artist & talent development for Sony Music Miami and signed and secured a major distribution deal with Sony Music Enter-

tainment in launching his own label, Crescent Moon Records. Based in Miami and boasting a state-of-the-art recording facility, Emilio will be focusing on the ever-growing local-area talent. Crescent Moon's current inaugural roster has such slammers as the legendary Cuban bassist Israel "Cachao" Lopez, Puerto Rican percussionist and singer Juan "Cheito" Quinones, and Miami's favorite R&B vocalist Lagaylia Frazier.

Want more? As a veteran movie soundtrack producer, Estefan's credits include major flicks like Top Gun, Three Men And A Baby, Made In America, Stakeout and his latest project for Warner Bros., The Specialist, starring Sylvester Stallone and Sharon Stone.

All of this success seems unlikely to have come to someone who is a quiet, behind-the-scenes kind of guy. When asked for his secret recipe on success, Estefan answers, "Never give up, be persistent, be consistent, be organized, always work with people who are good in heart, and above all, you must love what you do.'

When talking to Emilio Estefan, Jr., one notices the inner quality of this man. A staunch family man and a straight shooter, he's also a people person and a great motivator. There's truth in the old adage, "Genius is not what you accomplish but in what you help others accomplish." Estefan possesses that genius quality; he's blessed with the gift of empowering. Everyone I have talked to that have interacted with this man say the same thing: Emilio Estefan is a great role model and makes us all proud to have such a person representing Latinos in the world of music. And one thing is for certain—there will be more great and exciting things coming from the land of the Crescent Moon.

U.K./LONDON CALLING

EC INTERVENE ON ROYALTY SPLIT: For some time now, producers and performers have been seeking an agreement with the record-owned body PPL on the issue of distribution of royalties received by the organisation. Each year, PPL receive royalties in the region of £30 million from TV, radio and broadcast rights. A European Court directive on rental rights awards performers a legal right to an "equitable" share of the royalties. Until now, PPL has collected the money and only made ex-gratia payments of 20% to contracted artists and 12.5% to the musicians union. It was anticipated that the EC directive would be in place by July '94, but due to the complexity of the issue, it is looking highly unlikely this will be settled this side of Christmas. HEATHCLIFF MUSICAL ON BACK BURNER: Cliff Richard, probably one of the U.K.'s longest standing, most successful artists, has decided to postpone his musical Heathcliff. The £5 million production was due to tour the U.K. in November. However, Richard will be celebrating his 35th anniversary as a recording artist and will be replacing the show with a "greatest hits" tour, which will be promoted in the same theatres. The planned Heathcliff album will not be affected by this decision and will be released next summer. Richard was quoted as saying that the reason he decided to delay the production was that he felt it would not be ready in time

STORE WARS: There's nothing quite like "good old High Street competition, to get those retail blood cells moving"...according to the latest reports, Virgin are planning to spend in excess of £10 million on the launch of six new megastores and refurbishments to three of their existing stores, which will result in a chain count of 30 stores across the U.K. HMV, on the other hand, are planning to expand its operation by adding a further 40 stores which will bring their count up to 126.

OUT IN THE COLD: Two of this year's big outdoor festivals have been cancelled. Promoters MCP have cancelled the Chelmsford Event, which was originally scheduled for July, due to the unavailability of "big-name acts." The other main event to be abandoned is the Isle Of Wight Festival, which was to have been the first following a 24-year lapse. Apparently the reason given for this cancellation was that the festival's organiser failed to meet the deadlines set out by the district and county councils.

A REAL DIVISION BELL: The publishers of Pink Floyd are suing Warner Chappell Music International for damages relating to alleged breach of agreements made in 1979 and 1985. A High Court Writ has been issued against Warner Chappell, which calls for an account of money claimed under the agreement. The publishers and lawyers acting on behalf of Pink Floyd have declined to give details of the action.

STONES' RIGHTS VICTORY: The Rolling Stones have won their battle over copyright protection in Germany. The Stones will be the first U.K. act to succeed in this regard and have done so under the new laws laid down last year by the European Court Of Justice. Polydor, owners of the Stones' Decca recordings, have successfully sued the German independent distributor Falcon for copyright infringement. The EC ruled that copyright law in all EU-member states must comply with the non-discrimination provisions of Article 7 of the Treaty of Rome.

ALL ABOARD THE WATERMAN EXPRESS: Pete Waterman, the man behind the highly successful PWL label that produced a string of hits for the likes of Kylie Minogue, Jackson Donavan and Rick Astley, has finally lived

out his lifelong dream of owning a railway. Waterman, who has been buying up rail stock over the years, has signed an agreement with **British Rail** for the "Special Train Unit Assets." Provision has been made in the agreement for **Waterman Railways**' involvement in the management of the Special Train Unit with the object of establishing the business in the private sector from April 1, 1995. Basically this means, in future, if you want to hire a train for a private or corporate function you'll have to go to Pete to get it. (Best wishes, Pete!)

THE GREAT MUSIC EXPERIENCE: Tribute Management, the producers of *The Great Music Experience*, a series of televised musical live events which will take place every year through to the millennium, have announced two major sponsorship deals with Sanyo and Japan Airlines worth several million dollars. The first event takes place on May 22nd at the 8th century Todaiji Buddhist Temple in Nara City, the ancient first capitol of Japan. The audacious multimillion-dollar production will feature major international stars performing with many of Japan's musical heroes. The line-up includes Bob Dylan, Hotei, INXS, Yoshiki, Jon Bon Jovi, Joni Mitchell, Toshinori Kondo, Wayne Shorter and The Chieftains. The event has already been pre-sold for television in more than 35 major countries.

NEW PRODUCT: Chrysalis Records are releasing an album by ex-Mott The Hoople frontman Ian Hunter called Short Back And Sides. The album will consist of 13 tracks never-before-heard and the album has been co-produced by Hunter and ex-Big Audio Dynamite and Clash member Mick Jones...Peter Gabriel is to release a new single, "Love Town," on May 30th. The track is taken from the hit soundtrack album of the film Philadelphia. All royalties will be donated to AIDS charities...On May 23rd, Eddi Reader releases her debut single from Blanco Y Negro, "Patience Of Angels." After eight increasingly successful years as a session vocalist, Reader found critical and commercial success in 1988 with Fairground Attraction and the #1 single "Perfect"...Following on from their current tour of rare U.K. club dates and their recent sold-out show in New York, Everything But The Girl release their new EP entitled Roller Coaster EP on May 23rd. It includes three new songs and one new cover version.

PISTOL JOHNNY IN LIBEL SUIT: It comes as no surprise to me...in fact, it would be quite disappointing if a book written by the real punk rebel, former Sex Pistol Johnny Lydon, were to be published without attracting a libel suit of one kind or another. Well, that's what's happened...Lydon is being sued for defamation by London solicitor Steven Fisher for alleged libel within his book, Rotten: No Irish, No Blacks, No Dogs. Fisher is also claiming damages against Lydon's publisher Hodder & Stroughton and printers Mackays of Chatham. An injunction preventing further publication of the book has also been sought.

U.K. SINGLE CHARTS: The #1 single in the U.K. this week is "Come On You Reds" performed by The Manchester United Football Team (this could only happen in Britain). Stiltskin drop to the #2 spot with "Inside." Teen idols East 17 stand at #3 with "Around The World." The talented Scottish band Wet Wet Come straight in at #4 with "Love Is All Around." CJ Lewis is down one place to #5 with "Sweets For My Sweet." "The Real Thing" by Toni Di Bart is at #6. Crash Test Dummies are holding on at #7 with "Mmm Mmm Mmm," Eternal are at #8 with "Just A Step From Heaven," and following a string of successes, 2 Unlimited have done it again and come straight in at #9 with "The Real Thing" (must be a shortage of original titles right now). At #10 is another high-flyer from The Bad Boys with "More To This World." Seal is back with a hit, "Prayer For The Dying," in at #16, and the very unique and original record from French artists Deep Forest are in at #20 with "Deep Forest."

U.K. ALBUM CHARTS: Deacon Blue's greatest hits album Our Town is still at #1. Crash Test Dummies' album God Shuffled His Feet is locked in at #2. Always And Forever from Eternal is at #3. Parklife from Blur is down to the #7 spot. Just as I predicted, The Pretenders come storming in at #8 with their new album Last Of The Independents. Al Jarreau: Tenderness

AL JARREAU'S VOICE is one helluva musical instrument, but those wonderful sounds which emanate from the man are produced and fueled equally by inner emotions and feelings—soul, if you will. The sounds and the sights of Jarreau come together in this marvelous Warner Reprise Video companion piece to the singer's just-released album Tendemess. It's well worth the watch.

Interspersed between the tunes are snippets of Jarreau revealing Jarreau. "It's one of the essential joys, you know, for me...to find a piece of music that someone wrote in a meaningful way—rarer and rarer these days," he says with rueful laughter. His realization of that makes the enjoyment of what

he does for us all the more appreciated because Jarreau does give us music on a group of wonderful tunes: classics "(Try A Little) Tenderness" and "Summertime"; hard-times tale "We Got By"; Lennon-McCartney's "She's Leaving Home"; and his own and musical director Marcus Miller's "Dinosaur," with the revealing phrase "made me mad when the melodic music died." The video and the music reveal a man who cares—which, indeed, must make him feel sometimes, like he says, a dinosaur.

The wonderful group of hand-picked musicians include Joe Sample on acoustic piano; Eric Gale, electric and acoustic guitars; Paulinho da Costa, percussion; Phillipe Saisse, synthesizers; annd Steve Gadd, drums, in addition to Miller and a special appearance by sax man David Sanborn on "We Got By."

Vid was filmed during a special performance for a select audience on a sound stage which gives the project an intimate, personal ambience. Wonderful piece from producer Mark Rains and director-editor Alan Carter.

ONCE TANIA ROSE VIEWED THE FOOTAGE David Hannan, Russell Kelley and Cathy Bone supplied her with, edited from four years of filming and taping in the waters of Australia's Great Barrier Reef, Coral Sea and Lord Howe Island, where'd the music and the inspiration she's created for it come from? Watching and listening to *Coral Sea Dreaming*, one becomes convinced there's a spiritual inspiration working there, in and out of the water and behind camera and keyboard.

This is a U.S. International Film & Video Festival Gold Camera Award winner for Best Nature Video, and it is gorgeous, other-worldly, in places. A few instances where humans in diving gear appear they seem to be intrusions. Yes, there is a spirituality at work here; an intense relaxing spirituality which pulls you into this other world during the viewing. You don't want to come out of it when it's over.

Coral Sea Dreaming reels off without the intrusion of dialogue. Not one word is spoken. It is simply and majestically Rose's score and the brilliant images and colors of life underwater. The systems utilized: BTS LDK 91 3CCD Video Camera; Canon 6.2mm x 18mm Zoom Lens; and Sony SP Betacam Dockable Recorder have produced incredibly sharp images and brilliant colors. Rose's music soars with the moods and shifting waves and currents of the waters and blends with the images for a total experience.

Of course, it does end and you have to return to the world of reality, stress and inconsiderations known as humanity. Kathy Mattea: Walking Away A Winner

KATHY MATTEA—THE NAME CONJURES up several images: unmistakable vocals, a wholesome appeal, artistic style, a downhome disposition, and a unique flair.

All of which are evident in her latest endeavor, Walking Away A Winner (Mercury), an album that the artist admitted in an interview with Cash Box is the culmination of a great deal of reflection on past success and its accompanied apprehensions. "I'd decided to make a real 'commercial' record," says Mattea. "I thought about what I'd done in the past, and I think that in some ways, when I had my biggest success, I got afraid and kind of went the other direction and made some 'arty' albums for a while. I really thought about it, and thought that I had sort of gotten to this point where I had almost become a victim of my own press. I really just got to thinking about it and thought, 'Ya know, my favorite records were commercial and artistic at the same time.' That was my goal—to find songs that had great lyrics that reached out and met you more than half-way."

Mattea says that she and producer Josh Leo listened to several hundred demos before finding the ten cuts that finally landed on the album. And while Mattea knows what she wants in a song, writing her own songs for her albums is quite another story. "You sit downto write a song and find yourself cleaning out the closets that you've put off for six months," Mattea says jokingly. "I recorded one of my own songs early on, and actually moved to town [Nashville] to be a writer, but I'm not a person who diversifies easily. I tend to focus on one thing, and I feel like that's what I'll do when I stop making records...concentrate on that part of it for a while. [Writing]'s really a love/hate thing, but it's a great feeling when it's done."

Even though Mattea finds it difficult to categorize, she says Walking Away A Winner is the result of many influences: "It's country, it's folk, it's got some blues influence, it's got some bluegrass influence, and this album is sort

of a whole new layer of things for me. It's much more thickly-produced and much more arranged."

It's no wonder her music is so diverse in styles. "Growing up, my mom kept the radio on top-40, and my brothers were die-hard rock 'n' rollers from the Woodstock era," says Mattea. "I had some good friends that played in a garage band. I had a friend whose father had a bluegrass band that I'd go jam with occasionally in high school. I did choral music in school. I did folk music in my church...basically I was a sponge. I just soaked up whatever I could. When I got to college, I met up with a bunch of guys that had been playing music and they turned me on to a whole lot of stuff-the singer/songwriters of the '70s and a lot of the vocal harmony groups. They also turned me on to country and bluegrass and 'newgrass,' which was kind of the edgier-fringe bluegrass that was going on, and that was when I really started getting into country music.'

Her college years at West Virginia University were not only a time when Mattea came to know country music but also a time when, after two years, she decided to pursue a dream and move to Nashville. "I had always been the whizkid of my family," she says, "and I thought, 'I don't want to be behind a desk and crunch numbers by myself for the rest of my life.' I was really struggling with something that would give me a challenge but still give me that [contact with people] that I needed.

'Friends were taking bets on how fast I'd be back.... I had been living in Morgantown for the summer and my friend was leaving in September to go to Nashville, and I had just been fired from my job selling cheese at the mall—I was just a terrible salesperson. I had been in a relationship that was going down the tubes, and I thought, 'Well, what do I have to lose? Things are all going down hill anyway.' I thought hard about it and I called [my parents] up one day and said, 'Thank you very much for everything, but I'm going to quit school and move to Nashville with a boy and write songs.' I did go home for about a month before I moved to Nashville and said, 'Look, I really think 1 need to do this now; everything in my life is telling me now is the time. I know how to do school in my sleep. I can always go back, but this opportunity won't always be there. I want to come home and hear all the reasons why you think I can't do it. I want to hear them because I want to hear what you have to say. I'm going to do it anyway and I'm going to tell you why I think I have to.' What happened was that we really spent that time thinking about it and even though we didn't agree, we respected each other. It really brought me a lot closer with my mom.'

Mattea can remember, even to the exact day—September 2, 1978—when she made her big move to Nashville. In attempting to explain her not-so-sure plans at the time, Mattea recalls, "I sort of came [to Nashville] because I sensed an opportunity...if I could find a niche here, it would be a chance to have a much more interesting life. I hadn't really thought about it that much.

I told everybody I came here as a songwriter, but singing was what I had always wanted to do, but I didn't know what kind of chances I had. I thought, 'I'll come down and see what people say. If they tell me I sort of have something, I'll pursue it. If they tell me I don't, then I'll drop it.' I started taking my tapes around...and playing on writers' night, and actually got some interest from some people. Even back in college, when our band would send tapes away to producers or record companies, a lot of times we would get the form letter back with a handwritten note on it that said, 'By the way...the girl singer-whoever she is-we really think she has potential.' So the same thing would happen when I would take my tapes around. People would say, 'Well, the song's okay, but is that you singing?' That told me that I had something. I had one producer tell me, 'You have something, but you're not good enough yet and you need to work on it. '''

And that's just what she did. She took off a year, found a voice teacher and holed up in her house, practicing







for the next year annd doing demo work whenever she could. "I would do free demos for anybody, just for the experience. I got a lot of studio experience that way, mostly in people's living rooms and basements. At the end of that year, I put together a tape that I thought was pretty good. I started taking it around and got a little bit of jingle work and a little bit of stuff here and there. I happened to look into Combine Music, which at the time was one of the big independent publishers in town. They had a closed-door policy and everybody said, 'Don't even bother going in the door-you'll just go right back out."

But as fate would have it, Mattea, tagging along with a friend who had some business at Combine, happened to be in the right place at the right time. "We walked in and he introduced me as a demo singer," she reveals, "and the guy, without looking up said, 'Well, you know our female demo singer just moved to California last week and you might want to drop off a tape here some time.' I did and they called me for a demo the next week and I worked and made almost my entire living from them for a long time. I was singing on demo tapes for the top writers in town and a lot of the other publishers were looking for a female singer because this woman that had moved away had really been working for a lot of people in town. Word about me started spreading...my voice began to show up on a lot of tapes, and record companies started asking around about who I was, and about that time I put a band together and played at the Bluebird.... Three months after my first gig with the band, I got my first record deal. It was on my 24th birthday, which was June 21, 1983."

Throughout her career, Mattea has had many successes, starting in 1988 when she won the CMA and ACM Single of the Year Award for "Eighteen Wheels & A Dozen Roses" and won the ACM Song of the Year with

the same song. In 1989, she took home the CMA and ACM Award for Top Female Vocalist and again won the ACM Song of the Year award with "Where've You Been." Mattea really racked up in 1990, winning her first Grammy for Best Country Performance/Female. She again won the CMA Female Vocalist of the Year award and Song of the Year for "Where've You Been." Her most recent honor stems from her Christmas album, Good News, which landed her another Grammy for Best Southern Gospel, Country Gospel or Bluegrass Gospel Album.

The last 11 years have also brought their share of difficulties for Mattea, both mentally and physically. "I think a lot of my biggest obstacles come from inside of me," says the singer. "There have been times when I look back and didn't have the courage to accept my success in some ways. There are a lot of ways I've held myself back because of fear-fear of what other people might think, fear of failure, fear of the unknown. I think I've been able to take some risks in some areas, but there are other areas that it took

me a long time to let go and make changes. That's sort of what I've been trying to work on the last couple of years.'

In addition to the psychological stress Mattea has conquered, she faced an equally traumatic physical challenge in 1992 when she underwent throat surgery. "I was very stressed out," she relates. "I was working way too hard and resting way too little. I wasn't able to say 'no,' or didn't think I was able. I'd been kind of hoarse for a long time and kind of let it ride. One night I went up for a high note and it came out like Joe Cocker, and I couldn't talk the next day. I was in London at the time, and when I got back I went to the voice clinic and they put a camera down my throat and took a picture of my vocal chords and there was what looked like a blood blister...what it was was like a weak spot, a blood vessel had swollen up like an aneurysm. Once I got over the initial injury, it was pretty stable and it didn't seem to affect my singing because it was not on the touching edge of my vocal chord.

'So we kept going with it, and about nine or 10 months later, 1 went in for a routine check-up and it hemorrhaged and continued to for about two or three months. The doctor said that it was going to be a major problem, because 'this blood that's on the tissue of your vocal chords will eventually keep them from being able to move, and you won't be able to sing.' He went in with a laser and just cauterized the blood vessels-sealed it shut-and I've been fine ever since. I take a lot better care of myself now.' Mattea is doing about 95 dates a year now, saying "I keep it real manageable and that way I don't burn out and I can still enjoy it ten years down the road."

To get a perspective on where Kathy Mattea is in her life and her career, she offers this: "About a

year ago I woke up and thought, 'I've been struggling because my last album didn't have as much radio play as I hoped.' I woke up and thought, 'God, you have what you've always said you wanted.' I sold a really respectable number of records, which told me that there's a loyal following that will go out and see what I'm into. I have a band, most of whom have been together eight years, some 10 years and the newest guys are like four-and-a-half years. We get along really well and we love playing together. I play nice gigs. I've had the validation that awards give you. I thought, 'I have a great life, I have a great husband, I have great friends and I have a sense of who I am outside the music business.' I realized all this stuff this year and thought, 'I don't need to waste any more energy worrying about this.' So I want to stay in that place where the balance of it is good. I feel inspired, and I have a sense of where my niche is. Beyond that, whatever happens is fine. If I sell 100,000, if I sell 50,000, or if I sell five million...it's really okay.'

She'll walk away a winner.

CMT: COUNTRY MUSIC TELEVISION will be on the road with some of the industry's brightest stars as they kick off their concert tours this year. From May 13-Nov. 17, CMT will tie-in with over 50 country music concerts at 10 major amphitheatres across the country. Each concert will be highlighted by a screening of a five-minute CMT video promoting the country artists who are seen on the network. The concert line-up will include performances by Reba McEntire, Vince Gill, Alan Jackson, Tanya Tucker, Dwight Yoakam, Travis Tritt, Wynonna, Billy Ray Cyrus, Brooks & Dunn, Trisha Yearwood, Joe Diffie, Mary Chapin Carpenter, John Michael Montgomery, Little Texas and Suzy Bogguss.

THE FOURTH ANNUAL CITY OF HOPE Celebrity Softball Challenge & Concert is scheduled for 1 p.m. on June 5 at Nashville's Greer Stadium. The event, sponsored by WSM-FM and WSIX, has grown tremendously in the three years since its inception. Last year's event raised over \$162,000 as a record crowd of 15,000 fans attended the star-studded game and concert. This year's line-up includes nearly 50 artists in attendance. The City of Hope is a non-profit medical and research center in Duarte, California. All proceeds from the event will benefit the WSIX/WSM-FM Spirit of Life Endowment Fund for Middle Tennessee.

This will be the fourth cable network for Gaylord Entertainment, which owns TNN and is majority owner of CMT and CMT Europe.

IN AN APPEARANCE on "Music City Tonight," country superstar Garth Brooks firmly denied claims in a recent *TV Guide* cover story that he was planning to retire. Referring to a quote on the cover that stated, "This is for real," Brooks said, "It made me sick when I saw it, thinking, 'Oh man, for those people that know what we do and have followed us for the past two years, here we go again.' And I didn't want that at all."







S. ALAN TAYLOR: Forever Dance (River North

It looks like River North have got themselves a winner. Taylor, with gritty, seasoned, high-flavored vocals, has produced an album of outstanding stature. All 10 tracks on the album were co-written by Taylor, who on this, his first effort, has compiled a harmonious mixture of ballads and uptempo tunes. Ballads like "I Want To Know Love" and "Black & White" let you know that this guy can really sing from the heart. His first release, "Forever Dance," is a good example of the fast-paced style of songs on the album with "Woman In Black" and "Drunk On Her Love" following in its footsteps. Taylor even throws in a comical one with "There's A Word For That." This is an independent album done in major-label style.



THE NITTY GRITTY DIRT BAND: Acoustic (Liberty 28169)



The Nitty Gritty Dirt Band, formed in the late '60s as sort of bridge between country and rock, produce an outstanding, harmonious 11-track album with Acoustic. The NGDB blend unmistakable harmony on an album that not only stands apart, but stands about a mile away from any country project coming out. There's no honky-tonky depressing ballads, or "in your face" instrumentals—just four guys and their instruments making good music. This one's sure to attract listeners from all musical genres.

LARI WHITE: Wishes (RCA 66395)

White's clear, flavorful vocals shine on this sophomore project. Her first release and the first track on the album, 'That's My Baby," sets the mood for this mostly mellow album-so don't expect to hear too many cuts at your nearest dance club. White combines well-versed ballads and mid-tempo cut like "Wishes" and "Now I Know" with light upbeat tunes like "That's My Baby" and "That's How You Know (When You're In Love)" to yield an album that will no doubt take White to the next level in her career. An added note: White co-wrote eight of the 10 songs found on the album.



PICK OF THE WEEK



KENNY CHESNEY: In My Wildest Dreams (Capricorn)

This is easily one of the best debut albums I've ever had the pleasure of reviewing. Chesney fuses heartfelt, sincere ballads with upbeat, energetic, pure country-style tracks on an album that has "commercial ability" written all over it. Chesney, who started out in the business as a songwriter, co-wrote six songs off the 10-track album. Vocally—it's strong...lyrically—it's strong...and production-wise—it's strong. Songs that stand out are the previously released "Whatever It Takes," the currently released "The Tin Man," a slower one, "Angel Loved The Devil," and three faster ones, "Somebody's Callin'," "High and Dry" and "I Finally Found Somebody." Capricorn should certainly make some waves in the country market with this newcomer because this is a country album.



Claire Lynch Unwraps "Your Presence Is My Favorite Gift"

The Artist

Claire Lynch grew up in a music-loving family and lived in New York until she was 12, when they moved to Alabama. She was the youngest of three girls and fondly recalls sitting at the piano with her two sisters while her parents took them through songs note by note.

It was a couple of years after high school that she became hooked on the all-natural bluegrass music. That was also when she started dating her husband-to-be Larry. Larry was playing in a bluegrass band and before long the band invited Lynch to join. Lynch and the band were devoted full-time to their music and to what originally was called the Hickory Wind band. Because another group had this name, they changed theirs to Front Porch String Band.

Touring, recording, working as a house band for about three years and then back on the road full-time for six years was Lynch's and the band's professional life. Her personal life involved marrying Larry in 1976, and having a son, Kegan, born that same year, and a daughter, Christy Ann, born four years ago.

Lynch and the Front Porch String Band play about 40 dates a year now. That is by her choice because of the family. However, even at home she keeps busy with her music. She is an accomplished songwriter and has had songs recorded by Patty Loveless and Kathy Mattea. She also has a new release, *Second Wind*, coming out in June.

Lynch has a deep faith. She believes that faith is a growing experience: "It goes on and on, it grows deeper, and it grows more exciting." She also recognizes that many people get turned off when one comes across too preachy or churchy, so she is concerned that it sounds *real*, because it is to her.

Hershey Reeves wrote "Your Presence Is My Favorite Gift." Anyone who has ever experienced just sitting on a porch in complete contentment or standing and listening to the sounds of the night can truly relate to this song about feeling the presence of the Lord.
