TEXAS BOY SCOUT WINS PEDIGREED PUPPY; CROSLEY RADIOS WON BY PENNSYLVANIANS Portability of PUP Is Lauded by Actor; "Best Made," He Says

Upon his Boy Scout oath that he tuned in 42 broadcasting stations within one hour on a one-tube regenerative radio receiving set, Otto Glaeses, Jr., of 206 Helena avenue, San Autonio, Texas, won the pedigreed puppy awarded by The Crosley Radio Corporation for the best letter on one-tube reception during the month of September.




