LOUDENBOOMER REPORT



To all IWCDXA Members: It has come to ye scribe's attention recently that reports to our shortwave column have badly deteriorated in quality! Therefore, with the assistance of several "friends", we have drafted a suggested policy guide for your consideration when you report your shortwave loggings to the bulletin.

We are not trying to force these guidelines down anyone's throat, but we only ask that reporters and other clubs give them their sincerest consideration. You now have the opportunity to shape up. If you don't you will never be given another chance. We haff vays of dealing with troublemakers!

First, effective immediately, we are putting into effect a comprehensive and new language abbreviation list. In the past we have persistently stuck to the old, tried and true-blue abbreviations, such as ENGLISH for English, PORTUGESE for Portugese. You will recall that we repeatedly stated that if anyone could show us an accepted, standardized abbreviations list already in existence, we would readily accept it.

Someone has recently informed me that ANARC, whatever that is, has such a list, published and distributed by ASWLC, whatever that is, which is widely used by DXers, whomever they may be. This individual, who shall remain nameless for his own protection -- but he knows who he is! --also will never be given another chance!

Needless to say, we could not accept the so-called ANARC list, as it differed markedly from my own. However, we do recognize some limitations with my own 7 to 10-letter abbreviations, so not wishing to be hard-headedly unreasonable, we have created a new, improved four-letter list of language abbreviations. It is as follows:

The original abbreviation for Assamese, as submitted by our "friend" was omitted by the editor for reasons of good taste. For those with limited understanding and recognition of certain foreign languages, we will accept the following abbreviation -- XXXX --- in lieu of any of the above.

Here are some further guides to reporting. These suggestions, humbly made, are, of course, mandatory!

1. Please use only one side of the paper or the other in reporting. We cannot use those written on neither side.
2. List all items in order of frequency, in either direction. That is, either 9750 kHz or 0579. It makes little difference to us.
3. Mail your reports to arrive by the 1st Monday of the month, three months in advance of publication. This deadline is firm.
4. No carbon copies of reports acceptable. Crayon, however, is ok for our younger members.
5. Exact format used in the bulletin must be followed by reporters. Reports not so submitted will be immediately burned and a burly, unemployed ex-longshoreman will be sent to your house forthwith to punch you out!
6. You must identify your reports with your IWCDXA callsign. If you don't have one, you can easily get one and we'd be delighted to tell you how!

These simple rules will make our club better and better and will, if followed, keep you out of serious trouble!

THE SUPERHET RX

BASIC CONCEPTS OF THE SUPERHETERODYNE RECEIVER

Block diagram theory of single and double conversion superheterodyne receivers

THE SINGLE CONVERSION RECEIVER

What is conversion? Conversion is the process of changing an incoming radio frequency to the intermediate frequency or IF. We can do this using the heterodyne process. You may be familiar with heterodynes, especially in the crowded shortwave broadcast bands of today. These heterodynes are two SWEC carriers beating together to produce a loud audio frequency tone. For an example, if I am listening to Radio RSA on 9585 kHz and BEC comes up on 9580 kHz, I will no doubt hear a 5 kHz tone - this is the difference between the two carriers. It was created because both carriers mix in the receiver (the detector in this case) producing both sum and difference frequency components. The sum component is too high to bother us in this case, but the difference falls into the audio range and becomes that annoying high frequency (in this case 5 kHz) tone we hear.

In the case of the superheterodyne receiver we use this mixing or heterodyne principle to our advantage. One note here is that the mixing we are using is non-linear and will produce sum and difference frequencies derived from the original frequencies. Do not get this confused with audio mixing which is linear and does not produce other frequencies. When using the heterodyne principle we use a local oscillator to mix with the incoming frequency and convert it to the intermediate frequency. An example of this would be if we wished to receive a signal on 5000 kHz, we would tune the local oscillator to 5455 kHz and apply both signals to a mixer (tube, transistor, FET, etc.). The output of this mixer would then be the original frequencies - 5000 kHz and 5455 kHz, and the sum and difference 10455 kHz and 455 kHz. We could then use the 455 kHz signal as our IF.

What is Intermediate Frequency (IF)? IF is just that - an intermediate frequency. Intermediate between the incoming radio frequency (RF) signal and the desired output signal - audio frequency.

Why should we change to the Intermediate Frequency? This is a good question. It is possible to construct a receiver that goes directly from radio frequency to audio. Many of you have done this with a crystal radio set. Another way to do it is known as a TRF or Tuned Radio Frequency receiver. It uses two or three RF amplifiers tuned precisely to the incoming signal and then a detector is used to demodulate the AM signal. The only problem is that this will only work at low frequencies and is very critical in tuning, having to tune each RF amplifier to precisely the right frequency each time we need to tune in a new station. By using an intermediate frequency we only need to tune it once to a fixed frequency. This allows us to take great care in tuning it as it only needs to be done once. We can also use filters, such as mechanical, ceramic, and crystal, which are only capable of operating at one center frequency. We can also choose the value of intermediate frequency that will give us the best operation.

What determines the Intermediate Frequency? Many factors go into the choosing of an intermediate frequency for a particular receiver. The IF determines the bandwidth or

selectivity, the sensitivity, and also the image rejection capabilities of the receiver. Let's talk about each one of these factors individually. The first is bandwidth or selectivity. Selectivity is the ability of the receiver to pick out one station from among many others. This means that the receiver's bandwidth must be narrow enough to pass only one signal and reject nearby signals. We can increase selectivity in many ways. One way is to use several tuned amplifier stages. The more tuned amplifier stages in the IF, the narrower the bandwidth. It is also easier to get a narrow bandwidth when using a low intermediate frequency. In fact the lower the frequency the narrower the bandwidth that can be obtained with a given number of tuned amplifiers. In the IF stages we can also use filters to obtain the desired bandwidth and therefore use a smaller number of IF tuned amplifier stages. The filters also allow us to change the bandwidth by switching in different bandwidth filters. Crystal, ceramic, and mechanical filters are used in IF stages to obtain the desired selectivity.

Sensitivity is the measure of receiver gain, or its ability to pick up a weak signal. It is usually measured in microvolts (μV) at +10 dB S+N/N. This measurement tells us how many microvolts of radio frequency signal, at the antenna terminals, it takes to bring the signal 10 dB above the noise at the speaker output. The sensitivity is determined by the total receiver gain. The majority of gain is to be found in the IF section. This means that the more IF tuned amplifier stages a receiver has, not only is the selectivity improved, but sensitivity as well. This is true up to a point, that point usually being the value of atmospheric noise present. The receiver needn't be more sensitive than the noise that will be present.

Let's take a look at the block diagram of figure 1. This shows a single conversion superheterodyne receiver. The dotted line between the RF amplifier and local oscillator indicate that both of these are tuned by the same knob. So when we tune the local oscillator to its correct frequency we simultaneously tune the RF amplifier to the incoming signal. As an example - the RF amplifier is tuned to the incoming RF signal frequency, let's say 1000 kHz. The local oscillator will then be at 1455 kHz. When these two signals are mixed we will produce sum and difference signals. The difference will be 455 kHz - our intermediate frequency in this case. This 455 kHz signal will contain the same modulating signal as did the original 1000 kHz RF signal. It will then be amplified and filtered from any other signal in the IF stages. After it is amplified sufficiently it is applied to the detector which converts the AM signal into audio. It is then amplified still more in the audio amplifier and then fed to the speaker.

This should give you a good idea of just how the superheterodyne process works. It's the IF stage or stages that determine selectivity, sensitivity, and, oh yes, image rejection.

What is an Image? Let's go back to one of our examples - the incoming RF signal was 1000 kHz and the local oscillator was tuned to 1455 kHz, when mixed the difference was 455 kHz, the intermediate frequency. There is one other signal (besides 1000 kHz) which when mixed with the 1455 kHz local oscillator will result in a difference of 455 kHz. That frequency is 1910 kHz ($1910-1455 = 455$). So if these two signals are present they will both result in a signal being received. If 1000 kHz is the desired signal, then 1910 kHz would be the image frequency.

There are two ways of obtaining good image rejection (reducing the receiver's response to image signals). One is to use a selective RF amplifier. In the mediumwave band the RF amplifiers are selective enough so that an IF of 455 kHz gives adequate frequency separation of the desired signal and the image, and allows the RF amplifier to select one from the other. However at the higher shortwave bands an IF of 455 kHz does not give adequate separation of image and desired signals. This means we must use a higher intermediate frequency to increase the frequency separation of image and desired signal. In this way we give the RF amplifier enough room to filter out the image.

Unfortunately, when we do go to a higher intermediate frequency, our gain and selectivity fall off. If you'll remember, this is what determines the receiver's sensitivity and selectivity. It would seem that to get good image rejection we would have to sacrifice sensitivity and selectivity. To get around this we can go to a double conversion superheterodyne receiver.

What is double conversion? Double conversion is using two different intermediate frequencies. Take for example the block diagram of figure 2. This shows us that a double conversion receiver uses two local oscillators, two mixers, and two different intermediate frequencies.

The first local oscillator is usually variable along with the RF amplifier and will determine the received frequency. The first intermediate frequency is chosen high, such as 5 MHz, to improve image rejection. As an example, if we wanted to receive BBC on 6175 kHz, the local oscillator would be tuned to 11,175 kHz (5 MHz above the incoming signal). The difference between these two signals would then be 5 MHz and this difference

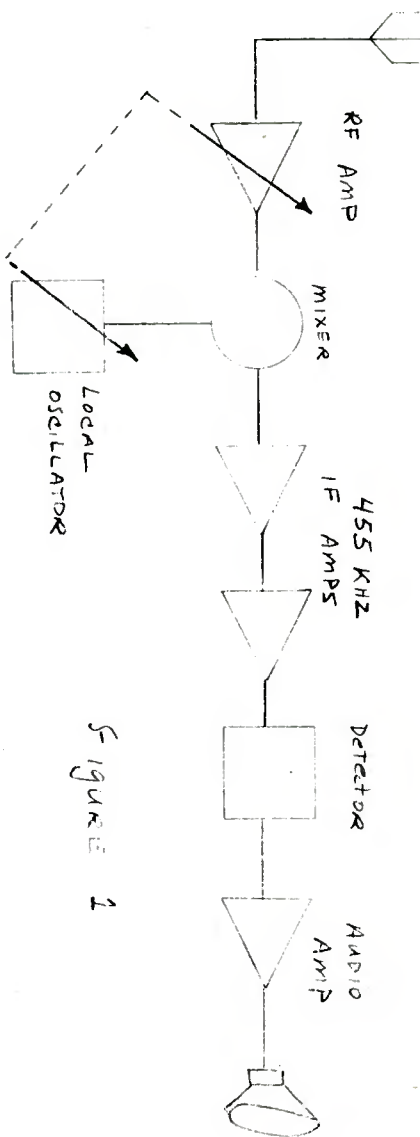

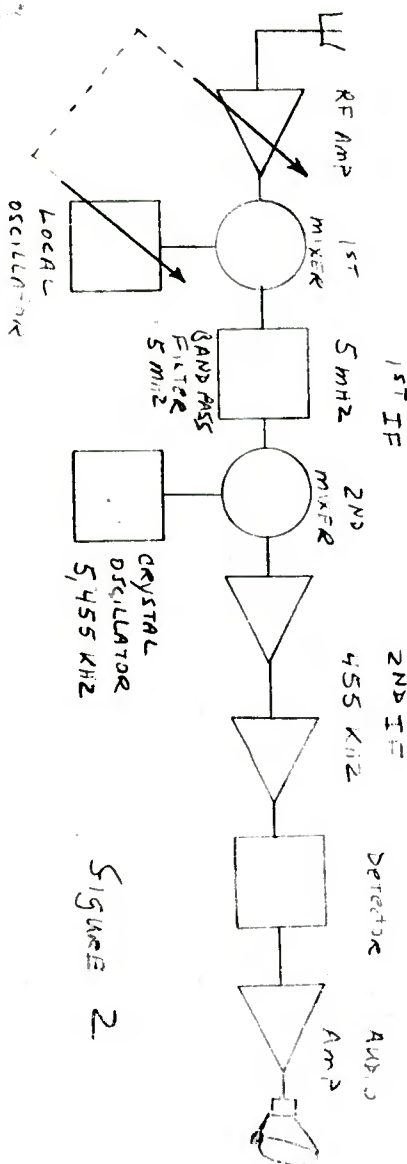

signal would pass through the first IF. Incidentally the image would be at 16175 kHz (16175 - 11175 = 5000 kHz) and would be well outside the passband of the RF amplifier.

The first IF stage is usually only a tuned circuit or crystal filter as most receiver gain takes place in the second IF stage. This 5 MHz IF signal is now passed into the second mixer where it is mixed with a frequency of 5,455 kHz from the crystal controlled second oscillator. The difference of these two frequencies would then be 455 kHz, the second intermediate frequency. In the second IF stage the signal will be amplified, filtered, and finally demodulated at the detector.

What the double conversion receiver has accomplished for us is a high first IF for image rejection, and a low second IF where most of our selectivity and gain are obtained.

MORE ON THE DX-40 PORTABLE

Then I read Jeff Jefferson's report in the July FRENEX about the Radio Shack DX-40 for \$49.95. I went to my local Radio Shack and tried one out and found it every bit as good as Jeff reported. In fact, I used it with the whip antenna only and still got excellent results - at least for the "powerhouses". It's one fault is, as Jeff said, difficult tuning. It does have a "fine tuning" knob which will help bring the harder stations in. I wouldn't recommend it for serious DXing, but it works fine as a set to take away with you or for listening in the back yard.

TAHITI

A VISIT TO RADIO TAHITI

During the cold cruel winter of '77, my wife and I were fortunate enough to take a vacation in French Polynesia. While sightseeing in Papeete, we decided to see if we could find the offices of Radio Tahiti. I wanted to see first hand where all that beautiful island music and those naked girl QSL cards came from.

After some directions from a local tour guide, we found Radio Tahiti on the Rue Dumont D'Urville, among a collection of white government buildings and just behind the very modern and impressive Tahitian assembly building. We entered the station and were greeted by a pretty Tahitian receptionist and several of the French staff gathered around her. They all shook their heads "no" or shrugged when I asked my first big question: "does anyone here speak English?" We were about to leave when the girl motioned us to enter another office. (By the way, many of the Tahitian girls are as beautiful as the travel posters suggest.) One of the D.J.'s was introduced to us, a M. Patrick Covet, who could speak a little English. His D. J. name was "Benjamin". M. Covet gave us a tour of the station, highlighting the radio studio with its three turntables and the miniscule TV studio. There is approximately 5 hours of TV broadcasting each day and M. Covet explained that they receive tapes of American shows (e.g. Mannix) dubbed in French. In two years they expect to have colour transmissions. A somewhat disconcerting sight when visiting Tahiti or nearby Moorea are the numerous TV antennas popping up everywhere.

Perhaps the best part of our visit was a talk with the station manager, M. Michel Satti. With M. Covet as a translator, we attempted a conversation about reception in the U.S. (as I had experienced it), verification policy, and Radio Tahiti in general. M. Satti said that they appreciated reports but regreted that they could not return tapes sent by listeners. I asked about return postage, but this did not get through the translation. He mentioned that they were trying to improve their verification performance and asked if listeners were having any problems getting QSLs. I mentioned that I had not read of any problems recently. At that point M. Satti reached into his desk, presented us with a souvenir QSL and asked (with a smile) if listeners appreciated their new card. In case you haven't got one, it is a multicolored card with a red haired "nудie cutie" on it. We were also given a car sticker and two souvenir pens. I think it is safe to say that all reports should be sent in French, since the staff (except for M. Covet) does not speak English. The 10 minute English newscast at 1900 GMT is prepared by the local English language newspaper staff, and is piped into the larger hotels for the benefit of tourists on the island.

Overall, we had an enjoyable visit and were warmly received. However, if you are thinking of putting R. Tahiti on your Tahitian tour itinerary, I would suggest that you don't. They are obviously not equipped to handle English speaking visitors. And I think we learned a few things about visiting foreign stations from this experience. For instance, make an appointment ahead of time and bring along some useful information about reception

conditions that the engineers might appreciate. It should be a visit where both sides benefit. Either speak the primary language of the station personnel, bring along someone who does, or arrange your visit to coincide with the presence of the English language section. Finally, prepare a list of questions beforehand and, of course, always be very courteous.

Radio Tahiti can be heard most evenings around 0300 on 11825 kHz. Just listen for that island music. For a more factual view of the programming and historical aspects of Radio Tahiti, see Mr. Lloyd Kantor's fine article in the April 1976 issue of FRENDX.

BBC

A VISIT TO BUSH HOUSE

Your editor spent August in Great Britain attending an international geological meeting with field trips. I was able to see a good cross section of Britain and recommend Britain to all potential international travelers. I took along my XCR-30 and was able to do some listening from various locations. I got a good idea what reception conditions are like there.

I have often admonished traveling DXers to visit shortwave radio stations in the countries they travel to. So I could not be accused of being hypocritical, I dropped by Bush House for a talk session with some folks at the External Services. I should mention that I made arrangements about 6 months in advance by letter and a good thing I did too. As it was, the poor guy that got stuck with the Yankee tourist (me) only found out a week in advance.

The staff was somewhat shaken by the recent "think-tank" report on the BBC (see IN-8, Sept FRENDX, p. 23). They were martialing their supporters to fight any implementation of the suggested cuts.

I want to thank Derek Cutner, Reg Kennedy, and Dennis Thompson for providing information and escorting me through the Bush House maze.

Facts about the BBC

The British Broadcasting Corporation is an independent organization responsible for public service broadcasting in and from the United Kingdom. The letters BBC were first used in 1922 when the British Broadcasting Company was formed and when regular daily broadcasts began. In those days the BBC was a commercial organization, but a commercial organization with a difference. It operated under a Licence on conditions which would have prevented it - even if it had wanted to - from turning broadcasting into a money-spinner for shareholders. From the start, it placed the interests of the public above all. The result was that within a few years, Britain had developed a genuine public service broadcasting system, paid for by its audiences through their broadcast receiving licences.

Five years later, in 1927, the company became the British Broadcasting Corporation, a public corporation constituted by Royal Charter, neither a government department nor a commercial concern.

MANAGEMENT

The controllers of the Corporation are its Governors, 12 in number, each of whom is appointed by the Queen in Council for a limited term - normally five years - and who remain in office irrespective of change of Government. No Governor is a representative or delegate of any outside interest, but is left free to guide the BBC according to his best judgement with a clear and undiluted responsibility for the BBC's affairs. The method of appointment by the Queen in Council (meaning the Privy Council) on the recommendation of the Prime Minister inhibits a Prime Minister from packing a Board of Governors entirely with persons of his party, for the Queen is above party strife. Once appointed, the Governor is a "Trustee" of the public interest in broadcasting, responsible to the general public, but accountable to the Crown in Parliament - "public interest" rather than "national interest" because the latter carries overtones which the former does not.

The Governors appoint the Director-general, the chief executive officer of the BBC, and other senior staff and then leave him, with his fellow executives, to implement policy. There is constant dialogue between Governors and Management. The BBC also enjoys the advice of 73 advisory bodies and National Broadcasting Councils for Scotland and Wales.

FINANCE

The BBC's domestic services consist of two national colour television channels, four national radio networks, regional television and radio services and 20 local radio stations. The BBC also provides programmes in English and 38 other languages to listeners outside the United Kingdom.

Some 97 percent of the BBC's income for financing the domestic operations is derived from the sale of licences to householders owning television sets; only one licence is required per household, regardless of the number of receivers. (The present fee is about \$50, a rather stiff tax on people who make only \$5-10 thousand per year.-editors comment) Licences for sound radio only were abolished in 1971. rest of the revenue comes from the profits of BBC Enterprises and BBC Publications and from payments from the Open University for its programmes produced and broadcast by the BBC.

The extra cost to the BBC of operating the External Services is not a charge on the licence revenue. The External Services are financed by annual parliamentary grants-in-aid. Although the Treasury pays the bill, the Government's rights extend only to deciding which languages should be used for broadcasting and the number of hours of each. The editorial control of what is broadcast rests entirely with the BBC.

NEWS

Main sources of news for all the BBC's broadcasting services are the BBC's own foreign correspondents. Their dispatchers are supplemented by reports from the national and international news agencies, the BBC's Monitoring Service and home-based reporters.

The BBC External Services broadcast more than 250 news programmes every day. They are all prepared - initially in English - in a newsroom which, with an editorial staff of well over 100, is the biggest in the BBC and one of the largest in the world. The aim in preparing news bulletins, as in all reports on events, is to give the facts objectively and with the greatest accuracy that careful checking can provide.

MONITORING SERVICE

An important source of international news is the BBC Monitoring Service which reports on the contents of selected broadcasts from foreign radio stations. It provides the BBC itself and government departments with a round-the-clock service which supplements agencies' and correspondents' reports. Through its daily publication, Summary of World Broadcasts, it also supplies on subscription detailed political and economic information to other governments, news agencies, and newspapers, universities, and research institutes. Over 400 news bulletins, commentaries, and press reviews are monitored daily at the Service's headquarters, Caversham Park, some 50 miles from London. Through an exchange with monitoring partners, primarily the CIA, there is regular coverage of 120 countries in some 55 languages at economic cost.

BBC EXTERNAL SERVICES

BBC External Services broadcast to the world in English and 38 other languages for over 100 hours every day. They are financed by annual parliamentary grants-in-aid. The government prescribes the languages which are broadcast and the length of time each is on the air, but the editorial control of what is broadcast rests entirely with the BBC. Programmes are designed to give news, reports of world events, and project a broad picture of Britain's life and thought.

The main programme in English is the BBC World Service, on the air continuously for 24 hours a day and addressed at peak listening times to all parts of the world. It is unique among the world's international broadcasters in providing a comprehensive news and

programme schedule. Direct-listening audiences are greatly augmented with foreign radiostations in about 50 countries supplementing their own output with daily relays of BBC news and other programmes. In addition, many programmes are supplied in recorded form to overseas radio stations.

BBC English by Radio and Television, the largest English-teaching organisation in the world, prepares lessons for broadcast, supported by published courses, cassettes and discs. Some 300 stations in over 100 countries broadcast these and other specially-prepared lessons and English by Television programmes are sold to some 60 countries.

BBC RELAYS

Dennis Thompson of BBC engineering explained the reasoning behind the Antigua/Montserrat relay. It is a joint BBC/DW project with 4 transmitters, 2 each). Its purpose is to provide improved service to the Americas.

Signals transmitted from BBC's Ascension Island relay site in the South Atlantic and beamed toward northern South America and North America pass through the region of the equatorial electrojet. This often gives the signals a fluttery type fade. Transmissions to North and South America from the UK often pass through or near the Auroral zone in the northern polar region. Therefore service to North and Central America and northern South America was not consistent. The BBC attempted to solve this problem by relaying from Sackville, Canada, or via the VoA. However such arrangements always put BBC programs behind Canadian or VoA programs in scheduling for prime time. Such sharing arrangements are obviously unsuitable for 24 hour operations such as the World Service.

It is also desirable to have relay sites arranged so that target areas can be served by one skip paths on low frequencies (49 metre band) in order to provide local quality service to unsophisticated portable radios owned by many residents of tropical areas. Since there are several islands and countries in the Caribbean that could be served by such services in English and many more by Spanish, it was decided to establish a Caribbean relay. It was politically safe and economically feasible to use the two neighboring Leeward islands of Antigua and Montserrat. The venture was conducted jointly with the Voice of Germany (DW) because DW had had similar desires to improve reception in the Americas. The dramatic improvement in BBC reception as a result of this new station has been noted across North America. 49 metre band transmissions to the West Indies have proven to be very popular as indicated by recent response to the broadcast of test cricket matches. Also many stations in Central and South America can now reliably relay BBC Spanish programs. The BBC indicates that they consider the relay site a success.

The BBC is moving its Malaysian relay site to Singapore. The move will result in some reduction in service, particularly to the subcontinent. These areas will be covered by an expansion at the Cyprus relay. There are plans to add shortwave at the Masirah Island site off Oman. This site was damaged by a storm recently (see LN-10, August FRENEX, page 26).

GENERAL IMPRESSIONS

The BBC external service staff I talked to all feel strongly that they are providing a necessary and useful service for Britain and the free world. BBC's editorial policy of impartiality should not be interpreted as neutrality in the east-west ideological battle. However, they desire to keep the credibility that they have developed as an

truthful source of news and information. They value that credibility and want to continue the policy so that they can increase listenership and influence.

I, for one, hope they can inspite of Britain's economic problems and the potential threat of "think-tank" white papers.

The BBC and the Think Tank

You will by now have heard, read or seen that a team set up by the British Government has produced a report on British Representation Overseas. It notes that the BBC has a world-wide reputation for the high quality of its broadcasting and that its External Services can justifiably be claimed to be one of the UK's success stories. Nonetheless the report recommends in addition to reductions in the Diplomatic Service and the near abolition of the British Council, swinging cuts in the External Services of the BBC. These 'options', as the Central Policy Review Staff (the 'Think Tank') calls them, would include a cut of eight hours in the present 24-hour cycle of World Service and the complete abandoning of our listeners in vast regions. Apart from a proposed total close-down of Bush House from 2000 - 0400 GMT the report calls for the ending of twelve language services: French (both for France and for Africa), German (for the Federal Republic), Finnish, Portuguese, Spanish, Italian, Greek, Japanese, Somali, Tamil, Nepali and Burmese, as well as the daily transmission in Maltese. This is one-third of the existing total.

The Report's proposals are only, we stress, proposals and, indeed, we hope they will never be implemented.

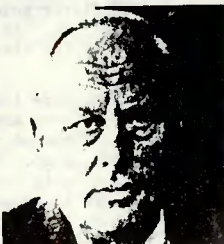
World Service coverage would be radically curtailed:

The proposals include:

- no transmissions to North America, Australia, New Zealand, Western and Southern Europe
- no broadcasting at all between 2000 and 0400 GMT and therefore no service for the large evening audiences in Europe, Middle East, Africa, Western Hemisphere
- no breakfast listening in S.E. Asia, Australia, Indian Subcontinent, USSR East of Moscow, Iran, the Gulf, East Africa

- no special alternative transmissions for South Asia
- some reduction in alternative transmissions for Africa

Moreover, the adjustment of World Service programming to fit within a 16 hour rather than a 24 hour schedule would 'inevitably affect the overall mixture of programme elements. It would be difficult to maintain the present carefully preserved balance between news and information, cultural programmes and entertainment; and some important and popular elements would almost certainly be reduced or lost altogether.

Editor of World Service, Austen Kark, comments: "These proposals - if they were ever to be approved by the British Government - would mean that millions of World Service listeners would lose contact with London and the BBC's tradition of round-the-world and round-the-clock public service broadcasting. It would be a sad day for our listeners, a sad day for the BBC and a sad day for Britain."

The Report has been criticised by the Chairman of the BBC Sir Michael Swann: "If the Report's recommendations are accepted Britain will be seen to have deliberately withdrawn from the dominant role it has played in world broadcasting since 1940. It will have made way for its ideological competitors at a time when External Services' effectiveness is at its highest and the need for their contribution at its greatest. While the BBC welcomes the CPR's emphasis on the need to improve audibility, which it has itself been stressing over many years, it regards the drastic proposed reductions in broadcasting as an inordinate price to pay for a programme of modernisation which has been officially recognised as necessary since 1965."

Reactions to the CPR's proposals came in immediately, the first being

from a World Service listener in Melbourne who teleaxed his protest at 0300 GMT. Many more have come in since. The press in Britain was generally critical:

"(The BBC) ... is an object of respect all over the world. Even the Tankers admit that: 'External broadcasting can justifiably be claimed to be one of the UK's success stories.' Why then seek to limit it?"

"For millions of people across the world the voice of the BBC is the voice of truth ... If the Think Tank's proposals are accepted, Britain will be gagging itself. BBC overseas broadcasts have a bigger world audience than any rival. And, more important, a bigger reputation for truth."

The Managing Director of External Broadcasting, Gerard Mansell, has pointed out that the cuts amount to 40% of the broadcasting output as a whole and yet would only result in a saving of 10% in revenue. He characterises the Report as pessimistic and over-simplified.

"It overlooks the role which continues to be played by the UK in upholding the values of free and open societies and the influence which it is able to exert, through the BBC, in the dialogue between rich and poor, black and white, totalitarian and free. It is through the dissemination of information about our ways, institutions and achievements that people all over the world are able to retain an awareness of and a faith in the validity of democracy and the rule of law as a way of running a society. This is a contribution which Britain is well placed to make towards a saner, more tolerant and more stable world. The CPR's proposals would have the effect of gravely impairing the BBC's ability to make that contribution. The repercussions of such drastic surgery in terms of Britain's image abroad would be immense."

MORE ON THE COLLINS R388/URR

The article in August SWC by James Wilson on the 388 was very interesting. As a long time owner of the 388 and as of earlier this year a R 390A owner, I have a few additions to make. Sensitivity is listed as 1 uV on all bands, but indeed the figure is given in the manual as better than 5 uV except on band 1 where the figure is 15 uV. In practice the sensitivity of my unit was 2.9 uV with no modifications; after addition of mechanical filters and a slightly improved RF stage, the sensitivity jumped slightly to 4 uV. This was due to the insertion loss of the mechanical filter which degrades the S+N/N ratio. Filters for the 500 kHz IF of the R 388 are very rare. It took me almost a year to find a pair. I suggest that those wanting filters look for them in the "Ham Trader Yellow Pages" where they show up a couple times a year.

A word of caution on the R 388. The PTO is perhaps the worst of all the Collins units in terms of long term stability. It is said that there are two kinds of 388 PTO's, already out of alignment and those headed for the same. Those of you that own a 388 probably have noticed the need to rezero the dial every 100 kHz or so. This is caused by aging of the PTO. It is possibly to redo the PTO, but it is a nasty business, involving pulling the unit and taking turns off the adjustment coil. It is possible that the adjustment in the unit has not already been used up. If such is the case try adjustment of the small slug that sticks out through the front of the PTO. Collins sells a special bent and twisted screwdriver that enables you to adjust it without pulling the PTO or removing the front panel.

As for the remarks on selectivity, I don't think very many people will find 6 kHz at 6 dB and 17 kHz at 60 dB to be "adequate". The crystal filter must be brought into play for most receptions, with its attendant narrow nose and wide skirts. A mechanical filter will correct this problem and make the R 388 the equal of the R 390A in my opinion. The phasing notch is the best I have ever used, and has proved extremely useful in tight squeezes.

The RF stage uses the 6AK5, a sharp cutoff tube. An improvement in gain and better strong signal handling capability can be had with the 6BZ6, a semi-remote cutoff tube. No wiring changes are necessary.

Exalted carrier reception can be a big help. The Heathkit Q-multiplier can be retuned to the 500 kHz IF of the R 388 by moving the slug in the inductor. No loss of Q is apparent.

For any hams in the audience, the cathode follower can be converted into an excellent product detector. I have a schematic available for an SASE to 1035 Latham Rd., Decatur, GA, 30033. Also I have a schematic for the mechanical filter adaptor that plugs into the first 455 kHz tube socket. It contains a stage of amplification to replace the pulled tube, a mechanical filter, and a stage of amplification to compensate for the high insertion loss (25 dB) of the filter.

The noise blanker used is ineffective against atmospheric static, sideband slop, and most electrical noise. If you want something that will do the job, I suggest one of the series noise limiters that automatically adjusts itself to the level of the received carrier. Some of the old Hammarlund rigs I have owned used this type circuitry and it is effective for MW and SW DXing. Above 20 MHz use something like the Twin Noise Squelcher.

Some of you might be interested in a comparison of the R 388 and the R 390A. Without mechanical filters there is a most decided advantage to the 390A. With filters in the 388 I will give just a slight edge to the 390A as the front end is a slight bit better and the filters used in it are the best ever made by Collins (a shape factor of 1.8 as compared to the usual 2.5-2.7). In DX terms, you will miss just a little with a stock R 388, and probably nothing with a 388 with added filters (or the 51J4 which has filters).

VoA news release via Jim Halsema, Washington DC

At 0400 GMT on 19 June 1977 the first 24 hours per day service by international satellite was provided to VoA under a contract with AT&T Long Lines, Washington DC. This service interconnects VoA Master Control with the Rhodes and Kavala relay stations. This single program grade (audio 100 Hz to 5000 Hz) circuit is now being used 16½ hours per day to deliver programs for retransmission to VoA listeners.

A check of several U.S. carriers indicates that this particular type of service is the first of its kind. The continuous service by international satellite for broadcast grade audio overseas had, as far as can be determined, never been established before.

AWR-Asia Becomes New Southern Asia Outreach

ADVENTIST World Radio has added a new station, AWR-Asia, to its list of international shortwave stations. For some years now, Seventh-day Adventists have been represented on the international shortwave bands by AWR-Europe, broadcasting from the Deutsche Welle facilities in Sines, Portugal, and Cyclops, Malta.

AWR-Asia has been organized as such only during the past year, after approval was granted by the AWR board at the General Conference for Southern Asia to operate its international shortwave radio outreach as AWR-Asia. However, although the name is new and the concept has been borrowed from AWR-Europe, Adventist radio broadcasting on the international shortwave bands in Southern Asia began in 1950, some 27 years ago.

The first broadcasts were the half-hour Voice of Prophecy, heard from the old Radio Goa. This was only a small station at the time, broadcasting with one kilowatt in the 49-meter band. However, the station grew, and for a while Adventist broadcasts were heard twice each Sunday, on two different outlets for each broadcast. Later in 1950, Radio Ceylon introduced a commercial service, and programs were beamed to Africa, the Middle East, Southern Asia, and Southeast Asia. At the time, Radio Ceylon operated the most powerful shortwave radio station in this part of the world. The station was established by the British Broadcasting Corporation and had many transmitters.

Seventh-day Adventists were quick to seize the opportunity and were the first organization to sign a contract with Radio Ceylon. The first program from this station was

likewise the familiar, half-hour Voice of Prophecy. Quite soon, Adventist programs in Arabic and Farsi were added, as were other programs from Southern Asia.

Your Radio Doctor, which now has a worldwide audience, was begun by Clifford Anderson for use on Radio Ceylon. This program began on June 6, 1953, and Saturday evening at 7:00 P.M. is still—after all these years—its time-honored slot. The mail response to this program is greater than all other AWR-Asia programs combined. A modernized version of Your Radio Doctor, known as Modern Ways to Health, is being developed in the major languages of Southern Asia.

In order to cope with the production of all these new radio programs for Southern Asia, a production studio was installed in 1954. This was subsequently enlarged and is currently producing nine programs a week in seven languages.

For a while, and at different periods, Adventist programs have been broadcast from other shortwave stations in Southern Asia, such as Radio Afghanistan, Radio Nepal, Burma Broadcasting Service, and the Maldives Island Broadcasting Service. However, the many programs from the Sri Lanka Broadcasting Service, Radio Ceylon, have been the main broadcast thrust of the Adventist Church's work in this part of the world. Currently there are 15 programs broadcast each week from SLBC, and an additional broadcast began in the Garo language from Radio Bangladesh in Dacca.

According to the latest available statistics, SLBC has an audience of between 10 and 20 million people. According to the same survey, 50 percent of the shortwave radios in Southern Asia are tuned to SLBC. This is prob-

ably the largest radio audience in the world listening to a single radio station.

Since the organization of the radio outreach in Southern Asia, the mail response has increased significantly and a new group of people is responding. AWR-Asia has now become recognized as an international shortwave station in its own right and is regularly accorded extensive news coverage from other radio stations such as Radio Australia, Radio Nederland, Radio NZ, Radio Sweden, FEBA, Seychelles, HCJB Ecuador, and Deutsche Welle, Germany. AWR-Asia is also accorded regular coverage in the international DX press.

Many of the people who have written in originally for QSL cards in answer to their reception reports have afterward written again, asking for enrollment in a Bible course.

AWR-Asia is cooperating with AWR-Europe in several projects, such as listener response, reception reports, and the DX service programs.

In Southern Asia, where live nearly one fourth of the world's population, AWR-Asia is pledged to do its part in carrying the gospel to everyone.

Predicting magnetic storms

Geomagnetic storms are disturbances of the earth's magnetic field that cause a large number of phenomena from spectacular auroral displays to disturbances of radio communication. Their periodic occurrence has led to attempts to link them to solar phenomena. Now observers at Kitt Peak National Observatory have found that geomagnetic storms can be predicted by watching the appearance of holes in the solar corona (SN: 12/18-25/76, p. 399).

Coronal holes are regions of the sun's corona in which the magnetic-field lines open outward and the density falls off, allowing a larger amount of material than normal to flow out into the solar wind. This produces an increase in the speed and the amount of the solar-wind material, which is mostly charged particles. The increased solar wind passes the earth about seven days after the appearance of the coronal hole, and the increase in charged particles going by causes disturbances of the geomagnetic field. With regular observations of the sun by the Solar Vacuum Telescope at Kitt Peak, observers find they can get a week's warning of the occurrence of geomagnetic storms.

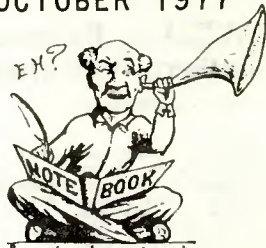

USSR Soviet Radio Plays 'Laundered' Anthem, Moscow (Reuters) -- The Soviet national anthem was sung on Moscow Radio yesterday for the first time in over 20 years. It had been performed without words since 1956, when Nikita Khrushchev denounced dictator Joseph Stalin, who was praised in the original text. The new version, approved by Kremlin leaders last May and published the following month, proved to be highly similar to the old one -- but with all references to Stalin removed, replaced by references to Lenin. The tune was apparently unchanged. (The Star-Ledger, 1/9, via Ed Insinger, NJ) The new words can be heard at Alma Ata's sign-on 0000 on 11950. This choral version replaces the former orchestral rendering. Morning exercises from a Soviet stn on 7200 are heard 0115-0130; this may indicate location in, or beam to, GMT plus 5 zone, e.g. Sverdlovsk. On 7/9, one of the tunes played by the pianist to accompany the exercises was "Mack the Knife." (Richard Wood, NH) Isure it wasn't "Mayak the Knife"? Yuk, yuk. Southern regions of the state of Oman and Masirah Island in particular, were the hardest hit and storm damage was extensive with some loss of life, the destruction of hundreds of homes and severe damage to local agriculture, govt buildings and installations and the BEC station which was closed from the effects of this storm from 0200 GMT on 13/6. Fortunately there was no loss of life amongst the 70 staff at the relay base, the xmtr bldgs escaped relatively lightly and the xmtr equipment suffered only superficial damage. The 700/701 kHz towers are down and the 1410/1412 kHz towers still stand the feeders to both aerial systems are badly damaged. Two rhombic receiving aerials out of three still stand the both are damaged 95% of the power house roof was blown off but the engines appear to be intact under the debris. It was thought that 1410/1412 operations would be back in a few weeks (BEC via DX Digest via DUDXS)

MONTSERRAT The facility here has been off the air for a few weeks due to 'technical difficulties' according to info from the BEC's Technical Services to our Sydney member, Bob Williams. The Montserrat freqs deduced by Robert Jones and Robert Hanner have been proved correct, as those have not been heard since mid-August. (gh) You are probably confusing memories of the old name of the UAR, Al Gumburiya al-Arabiya al-Mutahida. But in that, it's Mutahida that means "United" while Jumhuriya -- a better transcription that Jamahiriyah, means "Republic" (Richard Wood, NH) Fine, but the question remains, why do they use that one Arabic word in the English name of their station? Maybe they aren't sure how to translate it: LN-10 (gh) Mebo II still heard here occasionally on 6205v with poor to very good sigs. Good strength; probably new high-powered xmtr ann'd as recently inaugurated by Gen. Pinochet (Richard E. Wood) Wasn't it on SSB, like when I heard it on 14530 as in Sept LN-2? CAMEROON Caversham has heard on 4750 an experimental station of R. Cameroon at Bertoua, a little town in eastern Cameroon (BBC WRC 14/9) CENTRAL AFRICAN EMPIRE See LN-10

CAMBODIA (Gf Sept LR-D-11938.7) I have not heard Cambodia on 11938 for many moons, just Singapore on 11937. For that matter, 9695 to 0000 has also not been heard; 4908 remains from 1100 to 1500 (Mike Willis, DUDXS) Nevertheless, Democratic Cambodian Radio is still active, daily from around 1200 to 1300v* on 11937 (Isao Ugusa, FEDXR 27/8)

BRAZIL RNB was back 26/8 testing to 0100 on 11780. Audio sounds different; may be new xmtr; next night past 0300 (Walcutt, IL) On as early as 2115 with FT annts that new Amazonian service would begin 1/9 at 4 p.m. Brasilia time, and so it did (gh)

BOLIVIA R. Batallón Colorados, La Paz is on 6185 at 1100-0200, 1 kW (Station via WRTH LA News via TDXN)

AUSTRALIA (Gf Aug LN-6, Oct LN-4) Darwin is certainly not operational, and won't be for a long time! Antennae are not available, and power for xmtrs and associated gear is similarly not connected. Only emergency power sources are available for xmtr tests, which are run occasionally into dummy loads on 6 MHz during the daytime. The underwater power cable to Cox Peninsula was destroyed by shipping. Any suggestion that Darwin is 'on air' is quite wrong; you may take it on my authority, based on a visit to the site by Adrian Peterson and from discussions with Telecomm. Australia here in Melbourne. By the way, I am now working closely with TA on R. Australia's frequency schedule (Bob Padula) They should use 21 MHz to Nam this season at 0100-0300, as even 21455 beamed elsewhere is often better than 15320 (gh)

ALGERIA RTVA is on new 15181, hrd in AR 0800 to 0900 fade (John Mainland, NZ, RA DX 11/9) Obs 0600 past 0900, QRM from USSR 15180; // 6145 (Bob Padula, RA DX 11/9)

CLANDESTINE CRANNY Obs 9/8 show the "Voice of the Free Sahara" pgm of the Polisario Front has been retimed to 2200-2300, in Arabic, Spanish, occasionally French, hrd on 575 kHz only (BECMS) The "Sa" in Polisario does not stand for Sahara, but for Sakia el-Hamra (Richard Wood) I'll be (gh)

R. España Independiente (cf Sept LN-6) continues to BC repeats of non-controversial material on the 20-min xmsns at 1235 and 2005 (not Sun) (BECMS 18/6)

Comores I think it was Chris Martin in NSW who told me the French govt here has set up a MW stn to counter the independence movement; freq unk (Mike Willis, Victoria; direct) 14577(gh)

Botswana There is a strong possibility, not yet verified, that the African National Congress and Pan African Congress pgms may be carried over R. Botswana, folling slow but sure alignment by that country (despite economic dependence on RSA) to these movements. Can this be checked by someone in South Africa? (Mike Willis)

R. Voice of Iran (Sedaye Mellie), known to be via Baku USSR, hrd with very strong sigs on 6025 at 1745-1815--the only Iranian cland left on the air (Victor Goonetilleke, DUDXS 31/7)

V. of Burmese People on 6304 since 2/8 at *1030-1130*, as expected. The timing changes monthly, and this is the expected schedule: 1030-1130 in Oct & Dec 77, Feb 78; 1330-1430 in Sept, Nov, Jan; always on Su/Tu/Th/Fr only. However, in May it was at 1400-1500 (Ugusa FEDX)

V. of the People of Thailand Sakhon Nakhon, ex-provincial-level member of the Communist Party of Thailand told reports that VOPT is located at the junction of China, Vietnam & Laos known as "Sipsong Panna" (Nation Review, Bangkok, 10/8 via BECMS) I thought Sakhon Nakhon was the name of a town, not a commie; "Sipsong" means "12" (gh)

Quân-Đội Nhân-Dân broadcast anti-communist propaganda. It was found in the Dalat region of the Central Highlands (Vietnamese People's Army paper via AFP 10/6 via Chenal via FEDXR)

R. Echo of Hope, Korean-lang, on new 3985, on new 1/9 at *1400-1700* (Satoshi Wakisaka, FEDXR) Also announces old 6748 at 0200-0500, 0900-1200, no more at 1230-1530 (Ugusa, FEDXR)

V. of Liberation Army/Proletarian Battle Division/Station Sparks (Chinese lang black stns) current sked is on 7170 at *1000-1045v*, and on 7522 at *1100-1145v* with 10-14 min xmsns repeated three times. ID changes day by day; irregular; open & close w/International(Ugusa)

Fretilin radio is still active and in Timor, per various radio reports, listed as 3804 kHz. But the stn cannot be heard in Australia. Fretilin forces may control as much as one third of Timor, despite Indonesian claims to the contrary. The Indo govt has just announced a plan to step up the occupation of all Timor, and this may finally put the stn of the air. (Mike Willis, Victoria; direct)

FUTURE PLANS VATICAN (ITALY) VR has installed a new rotatable SW ant at Santa Maria de Galeria. The Telefunken ant covers all freqs 6-26 MHz, and 79m high, it's the highest of its kind in the world. Connected to the new 500 kW xmttr it should improve reception in the FE, Au and SAm. When put into service in Dec. 1977 it will replace 25 separate antennas used today (Ferriere & Nijhof, SGDX 30/8)

UKOGBANI I sent a letter of protest to the British Embassy in Washington about the proposed cutbacks in the BBCWS. Received a reply from R. A. Fyjis-Walker of the Information Department who said they were forwarding all letters to the BBC. Her last sentence was most encouraging. The Embassy has received many letters of concern, and H. M.'s Government will have to consider all these letters received when the Central Policy Review Staff's Berrill Report is debated in the House of Commons this autumn. SINGAPORE/MALAYSIA Work has already commenced on the transfer of the BBC FE relay to Singapore. Day-to-day utilisation of available equipment can only be under local control and is likely to change frequently in order to facilitate this major task (BBC via David Foster, DUDXS 31/7)

PORTUGAL/JAPAN (Cf Sept LN-7) To improve reception, R. Japan is to set up a relay station by renting facilities of R. Trans Europe in Sines (Minkanhos 3/9 via Isao Ugusa, Kobe) See LN-10

PHILIPPINES R. Veritas Overseas is planning to expand greatly. More xmttrs will be required and if finances permit, they will get 3 x 100 kW xmttrs (Victor Goonetilleke, via DUDXS 31/7) PANAMA LN-8

NEW ZEALAND It was announced 3/8 that RNZ is to expand its Maori and Pacific Island Unit and base it in Auckland, to provide news and pgms for both its domestic and external services. There will also be a small section in Wellington (NZDXT Aug)

NETHERLANDS ANTILLES (Cf Sept LN-12) When doing my Ph.D. research on Bonaire ten years ago, the CE of TRW told me they had applied for siting on Curaçao but were referred to Bonaire because antenna towers would interfere with flight patterns to Curaçao's Albert Plesman Luchthaven (Richard Wood) I just talked to a Continental Electronics rep in Dallas. BBC Boasts Avid Listeners Worldwide

LONDON — Every hour when the short-wave bands crackle with the sonorous alert, "this is London," millions of listeners around the world tune to the British Broadcasting Corporation.

During the recent emergency in India, thousands in that media-censored land turned on the BBC's hourly newscasts to find out what was going on.

Similarly, Portuguese Prime Minister Mario Soares says he relied on the BBC's news bulletins and commentary to make sense of what was happening in his country during a particularly chaotic period two years ago.

And in the United States, confidants of Robert S. McNamara, head of the World Bank, say that he is a regular listener of the BBC's overseas service — to see what it has to say about the state of the world.

For the BBC, known jocularly as "the beeb," boasts a regular audience of some 30 million listeners for its English-language news service, and another 40 million in other languages. Those figures can double in times of crisis.

BBC officials estimate that as many as 750,000 Americans regularly switch on the short-wave news broadcasts beamed to North America.

Although, to many, the letters BBC signify television programming at its non-commercial best, far more listeners around the world know the BBC for its straightforward, lucid news broadcasts and analyses. The BBC broadcasts to the world in English and 38 other languages, ranging from Russian and Arabic to Nepali and Maltese, a total of some 700 hours a week.

"We broadcast in English 24 hours a day," said Gerard Mansell, the man-

aging director of BBC external broadcasting. "It is addressed at peak listening times to all parts of the world. We think it is unique among the world's broadcasters in providing a comprehensive news and program schedule.

"Direct-listening audiences are greatly augmented with foreign radio stations in about 50 countries supplementing their own output with daily relays of BBC news and other programs.

"Basically, what we try to do is disseminate accurately, objectively and comprehensively the world news."

Although most foreign listeners swear by the BBC, a recent study compiled by the British government's Central Policy Review Staff, known as the "think tank," recommended that the BBC curtail its overseas services. Specifically, the think tank said that broadcasting in European languages outside Communist Europe should cease — as should the transmissions to North America.

Further, it recommended that the program hours in all languages be reduced by about 40 per cent.

No sooner was the report published, however, than the BBC defenders reacted fast and furiously. Thousands of letters poured in from loyal listeners around the globe supporting the BBC's worldwide news programming.

"Keep the fine programs coming through," wrote Dr. Louis D. Mitchell from Scranton, PA. "It is a service that the world needs desperately."

Alan L. Van Sickle of Kennebunkport, Me., wrote: "In a degenerating world, the BBC stands like a lighthouse of integrity."

Ian P. Leighton of Altadena, Calif., said: "Please do not restrict your broadcasts to the U.S.A. I find your programs to be clear, intelligent and absolutely trustworthy."

From Norway: "Great Britain is the BBC." And from Egypt: "We depend on you."

BANGLADESH The Information Secretary says two 250 kW HF xmts are being installed at Kabirpur, near Dacca (BBCMS 18/8)

AUSTRALIA The State Government intends to fight recommendations in an independent study, on the location of a new R. Australia stn in Western Australia. The Minister for the North West, Mr. O'Neill, said he would continue to press for a permanent stn near Carnarvon. He said he was concerned with proposals in the Waller Report indicating Carnarvon might miss out on the stn. In the report, nearly \$40 million was proposed for a new stn in W.A. at a site somewhere between Shark Bay and Exmouth. (VLW regional news, 2230 12/7 via Robert Jones of Sydney, ADXN, who also learned at a visit to VLW.) Funds have been granted for a 3-year site selection pgn. If the project goes ahead it should be on the air in about five years.

R. Australia, Shepparton, is planning to instal two new 100 kW xmts--Harris Gates units that have been stored in Adelaide for two years, originally intended to be placed at Cox Peninsula with the Carnarvon 100 kW xmt, for the domestic service for the Northern Territory. This latest move suggests the possible abandonment (at least for the present) of that service, as these xmts will carry RA pgs only. It will be some time before higher-powered units (250 kW) as proposed in the Waller Report, can be used at Shepparton, as new antennae will be necessary. The existing curtains can only take a 100-KW load and the four rhombics are limited to 50 kW (Robert Jones, Sept. ADXN)

NETHERLANDS We're all upset about the threat to the BBC, but what is R. Nederland trying to get past us in the name of advancing satellite technology? The more I hear about the programming changes in store as from November, the less I like them. First of all, three-and-a-half hours per week (per transmission) of programs are being dumped just by cutting back from 80 to 50 minutes. That adds up to a lot of programs we've come to enjoy, most of them entertainment. Even the once-sacred DX Juke Box is to be chopped to 15 minutes on alternate weeks, so they can squeeze in a rerun of Dutch-by-Radio. Newscasts are being lengthened despite this, by a few minutes, which combined with shorter programs, means a much higher proportion of news—do we really need this? The Happy Station program, may even be cut not from 80 to 50, but to 30 minutes, with the introduction of Sunday news. Among the other programs which are slated to be dropped completely are Parson's Penthouse, The Sound of Progressive Rock, What's New. Letterbox will somehow be 'incorporated' in His & Hers, a surviving program of dubious merit. The reason for all this is supposedly that there will be available only one satellite circuit to each relay base, so for instance, Bonaire could not have a Spanish and English program going at the same time. 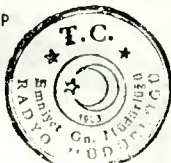

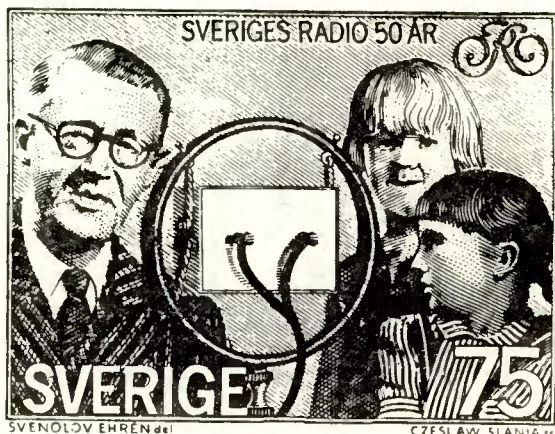

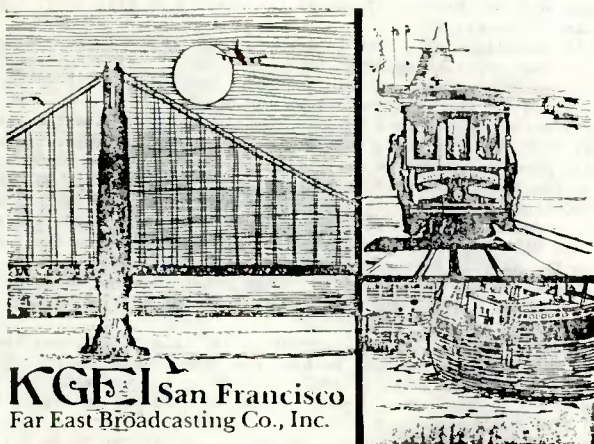

Wednesday px has EG during last 15 minutes. Reports must include at least 15 minutes of announcements made, songs played, or news items read in order to qualify for a QSL. Univ. de Concepcion, 6135, noted at 1045 in SP w/ continuous easy listening LA mx, some poses, IS (repeated notes on horn) at 1100 followed by ID. Started at good level but faded. (Jones, Miss.)
- COLOMBIA** R. Super de Cali has moved to 6130 after a brief appearance on 6055. Noted at 1050 w/ ID, TC and usual Super format. Fair to good. (Jones, Miss.)+++ R. Surcolombiana, 5010, noted at *0850 w/ ID, freqs " . . . desde Neiva, Huila . . .", then anthem and into mx. (Jones, Miss.)

(Jones, Miss.) *** as long as we're on the subject, folks, I'm noting HCJB spuriouse in the 31m band again, often at obnoxiously high levels. Most unfortunate. tba.
- ETHIOPIA** Radio Voice of Revolutionary Ethiopia has retimed EG px to 1500-1600, dropping EG b'cast over Radio Ethiopia during same time slot. RVORE freq is 6015 // 7165. According to Victor Goonetilleke, the anncrs who used to proclaim Christ and his teachings on ETLF now read revolutionary slogans and bulletins from Lt. Col. Mariam, leader of the junta. (Goonetilleke, UADX) *** stranger and stranger . . . with the Ethiopian-Somalian conflict growing every day, RVORE b'casts may move quickly and without warning. This may be why we haven't had any reports on them in Nam yet. tba.

Gabon Franceville, 4830 noted in FR to 2300* w/ overpowering signal, talks and local mx. Closed w/ anthem. (Robinson, DC)

***GUAM KTWR, Agana, noted on 9640 on first day of transmission, 4 Sept, from 1120 w/ reliable mx, frequent IDs and offers of special first day QSL. Also noted at 1110* on 5 September on 9575. ID: "This is the newest voice on your shortwave radio, KTWR, Agana, Guam." Address is KTWR, Trans World Radio, Box CC, Agana, Guam. (Berg, Mass.) +++ also noted in S. Carolina on 9640 in EG from 1100-1130 at poor level. Into mandarin CH at 1130, but covered by R. Australia at 1155. (Senn, SC)

INDONESIA RRI Pekanbaru, 5886, w/ rather yippy Asian song, IN talk by W followed by possible speech by M at 1043. Poor to fair. (McNeil, TDXN) +++ RRI Banda Ache, 3905, a new outlet and transmitter, much stronger than old but still active 4955. Abruptly on at approximately 1220, w/ s/off usually 1459 but sometimes later. Seemingly experimental. (Goonetilleke, UADX)

IRAN VoI (NIRT) noted daily on 15084 in EG. Wanner w/ nx and commentary, and breaks for interesting Iranian mx. Near 2020, Manner gives freq as 9022, w/ no mention of 15084. At 2030, into Persian for Iranian Residents Abroad px. Usually good level. EG px is sked from 2000-2030. (Cress, VA)

SARAWAK RMS, 5005 noted at 1025 w/ AR-like chants M in lang at 1029, mx bridge then more talks by M, possibly nx. (McNeil, TDXN) +++ also noted same time period w/ pips at 1030 and ID sounding like "R. Kuching". Gradual fade out during nx. (ferrell, TDXN)

URUGUAY SODRE, 9515, at 0233 w/ W in EG talk about telecommunications and the Inter-American Bank. Sports at 0244; ID in EG and SP at 0245. Continued w/ opera mx. (Robinson, DC)

VENEZUELA R. Mil Cuarenta, 6010, in SP at 1038 w/ ads, TGS, and ID by W as "R. Mil Cuarenta." This is R. Los Andes, and it uses both IDs. (Jones, Miss.) +++ R. Turismo, 6180, in SP w/ Venez mx and ads at 1008. (Jones, Miss.)

Dedicated to newcomers to the DXing hobby, and to some who have been around for awhile.

- D --- DETERMINATION to fight the QRM, QRN, Ques, hets etc. and hear that DX. DEDICATION to maintaining high standards, of accuracy and honesty in reporting this DX to your club.
- X --- 'XCELLENCE in reporting FACTS and well thought-out conjectures.
- P --- PATIENCE, PERSISTENCE, PLANNING and occasionally some PURE luck
- E --- EVERY EFFORT made to snag that microvolt, with the most EFFICIENT antenna system that your space will allow.
- R --- READ every publication, article and station schedule that you can get your hands on.
- T --- THINK!, before you send that log in as a "definite" if no ID was heard. Consider time, darkness pattern, previous logs in various pubs, language, mentions of cities and countries, who is USUALLY there, why aren't they there now? Are other stations from this country audible on the band now? Is short-skip or long-skip evident on the band? Could it be a major broadcaster beaming TO the country you think you have, in that country's language? If no ID is heard, mention pertinent facts you heard--- "mentions of Quito and Ecuador, gave local time as GMT minus 5 hours, ads for Banco del Ecuador, other Ecuadorians in over Columbians and Venezuelans at this time, etc. Use "tentative" or "unidentified" to save yourself embarrassment later. In SERIOUS DX circles, the most valuable possession a DXer has is NOT his receiver, NOT his antenna- it is his REPUTATION FOR HONESTY & ACCURACY! Further, the honesty and integrity of a club can only be as good as that of the individual reporters. We are all only human, and we all make mistakes occasionally. The idea is to keep them to a minimum.
