## ANARC 78

#### ANARC 1978 - MONTREAL

At about 7:30 AM, the Washington to Montreal train pulled into St. Albans, Vermont, a sleepy little town on the rail line to Canada. The entire train was to board busses that had been hastily obtained by AMTRAK, for the rest of the trip to Montreal and ANARC 1978. But then DXers know how to take that sort of thing, and those of us on-board (includeng Chris Hansen of SPEEDX, Dave Snyder of the Brooklyn DX Club, Wayne Davis of HAP, and several others) had to grin and bear it.

A somewhat unexpected beginning to what would turn out to be a wonderful and educational five days in beautiful Montreal. NASWA was represented at ANARC '78 by yours truly, and Mr. Nick Pappas who assists Bill Oliver with the publishing duties. And NASWA was certainly represented at a level equal to its stature among North American clubs -- the best! We arrived at Le Maison de Radio Canada the morning of Friday 14 July, and without taking time to freshen up, proceeded to lay out the NASWA table in the convention hall. Hats off to Ian McFarland, convention chairman and to Jeff White for the magnificant appearance of the hall -the walls were covered with the seals of all clubs in attendance; there were excellent receiver displays by SCMY and Panasonic as well as a Racal 1772 used by the Canadian Monitoring Station (only \$8,000 for those of our wealthier NASWA members); ringing the room were club displays with publications, free bulletins, and displays sponsored by some major broadcasters such as Radio Sweden, Radio France International, VOA, Radio Finland, and Radio Nederland.

After the ANARC business meeting, all convention attendees (there were over 115) witnessed a specially arranged direct satellite to earth broadcast from the Canadian Communications Satellite (HERMES). Experiments with HERMES, launched in 1976, could determine if all homes could be equipped with their own dish antennas for reception of TV programs relayed from space. Once again, sincere thanks to Ian McParland and Mr. George Davies of the Space Communications Program for this demonstration -- arranged specifically for ANARC!

Friday night marked the first real rest in 24 hours for many of us, and was also a time to get to know one another. This was, perhaps, the best thing about ANARC 1978 -- club differences were hardly noticeable. All joined in the pleasure of meeting their fellow hobbyists and in discussing the latest shortwave topics. ANARC was an opportunity for many of us Eastermers to meet some Westerners, such as Don Johnson of SPEEDX, Dave Browne, ANARC chairman, and Kim Elliot from Minnesota. And I almost forgot to mention Larry Nebron from San Francisco (my real home!).

Saturday was a busy day -- Mr. Denis Casey, Supervisor of the Radio Canada Monitoring Station gave a brief history of the station with slides, as some of us plotted how to get the demonstration RACAL out the back door. The tour of Maison de Radio Canada included television studios, control rooms, and production facilities -- the Maison is the largest facility of its kind in North America!

That afternoon, discussion groups dealt with the following topics: DXers influence on

the proceedings of WARC '79. Shortwave programming and what can be done to improve it -- many were concerned with local news on shortwave in the style of Radio Japan's "Asian news", and with the reductions in the length of programs like Radio Nederland's DX Jukebox. QSLing --QSLs received a curious vote of "no conficence" in that they were becoming "meaningless" according to many present. New QSLing policies were also touched upon.

Also that afternood, Kim Andrew Elliot presented a summary of his NASWA survey. Radio Sweden's Arme Skoog spoke about Radio Sweden and showed some interesting slides of RS facilities. The ANARC Awards Banquet brought a new receiver to Greg Ravenhorst (an RF-2200) in the raffle. Mr. George Davies gave an interesting presentation on the use of HERMES for "telemedicine" in the remote areas of Canada. And perhaps the biggest event of the night came with presentation of the ANARC awards. North American DXer of the Year went to nome other than Ian McFarland for his devotion to the HAP cause and to shortwave listening in general. Hap U.S. Director Wayne Davis, in recognition of this, gave Ian the HAP award, so the DX Digest host ran away with top-honors that evening. But Arne Skog, one of the truely great names in shortwave radio over the years, received the International DX'er of the Year award for his hard work. NASWA's nominees for North American and International DXer of the Year, Pitt McNeil and Isao Ugusa, will have to wait for next year, but deserve a lot of credit.

Saturday soon blew by, and Sunday marked the start of another tiring day, but very satisfying. The first DX TV program, written, produced, and performed by NASWA associate Alfred Thornton of St. John's New Brunswick, came as a pleasant suprise for everyone. Next, CBS' 60 Minuites! There was an excellent talk by Dr. David Meisel of NOAA (National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration) on future predicitions of sunspot levels and their effect on shortwave and mediumwave.

The HAP auction expected all expectations--over \$1,100 was collected for the cause, helped considerably by a \$111.00 bid by a Mr. George Link! The prize was sweetened by a VOA pennant and a VOA pen, donated by Paul Modic, Program Manager for VOA in attendance at the convention. There came however, five other VOA pennants, now in the possession of several happy DKers. By the way, Mr. Link was treated to a personal tour of the Voice of America by Paul Modic, who was very impressed with the enthusiasm for the HAP auction.

Even after all the above, the conventioneers still had enough energy for the International Broadcaster's Forum, at which representatives from Radio Sweden (Arne Skoog), RCI (Ian McFarland), VOA (Paul Modic), and the Spanish National Radio (Ambrosio Wang-an-Po) discussed topics of major interest. Two of the big questions--what about a VOA DX program, and, do the broadcasters really value the information that is published in the various DX club bulletins? The answer to the former, a rather definite "not in the forseeable future." The answer to the latter, a most definite "yes".

The 1978 ANARC Convention was still buzzing when the time came for Dave Browne to bang down the gavel. The weekend had brought a renewal of old friendships and the forging of new ones. But it wasn't over yet. On monday, a special tour of the Radio Canada Monitoring Station gave many who took the ride to Stittsville, Ontario, their first chance to tune on the beautiful RACAL receivers--many a photograph will be tucked away in albums from that visit!

There was much reason to be optimistic after ANARC 1978. Representatives of major broadcasting organizations had shown much interest in the hobby of shortwave listening, notably the VOA's Program Manager, Mr. Paul Modic, who did some suprising "jawboning" with many of us about SWLs and International broadcasting.

And before ending this summary, I should mention Frankie Gittens who came from Trinidad and gave us a glimpse of what DXing is like in that island nation -- apparently it is not very widespread!

Next year's convention? It is not known where it will be at the moment, but there are tentatives -- the University of Minnesota or possibly in Washington, DC, where so much broadcasting policy is determined. Don't miss the next ANARC Convention. 1979 might not be much better than Montreal, but it certainly could equal the excitement and quality of ANARC 1978!



## Guidelines for DXing

#### INTRODUCTION

Periodically there develop controversies over particular loggings which seem propagationally unlikely, or improbable for other reasons. These incidents inevitably bring into question the credibility of the reporters and usually are accompanied by debate over whether editors should screen out such loggings or just publish what they receive.

Editors have the responsibility to edit, to exercise their best judgment in handling items submitted to them. However, the purpose of these guidelines is to minimize erroneous reporting at its source by offering standards of good practice for DXers. It is hoped that these will encourage both newcomers and veteran listeners to practice good DXing habits so they can contribute to the maintenance of high standards in the exchange of DX information.

#### THERE IS NO BLACK MAGIC IN DXING

It is often said of DXing that "anything can happen." And it is true that from time to time, but rarely, what might be called "freak" reception does occur. But all shortwave reception is dependent on natural propagation phenomena; there is no magic involved. What we term freak reception is merely reception caused by such a complex combination of natural factors that we may not be able to explain it in terms of our limited knowledge. Strictly speaking, it is a case of "we can't adequately explain what happens" rather than "anything can happen."

The distinction is important. If we too literally believe that anything can happen, we may too easily be ready to believe -- especially when rare stations are concerned -- that anything will happen.

Freak reception, by our terms, happens so rarely that any given DXer might experience it only once or twice in his hobby career. When an individual repeatedly reports freakish reception, the laws of probability strongly suggest that most of those reports are erroneous. Thus, strange and hard to explain receptions should be subjected to even more careful scrutiny than normal receptions, not merely written off with, "well, anything can happen."

The purpose of these standards is not to discourage the reporting of rare or unusual receptions, but to suggest DX practices which will help the DXer establish the genuinenness of such reception before reporting it.

LOGGINGS SHOULD BE TERMED IDENTIFIED, TENTATIVE, OR PRESUMED IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE DEFINITIONS BELOW

The issue is, at what point is a station identified and how should stations not fully identified be reported.

The process of identifying stations should be viewed as a continuum. At one end is the unidentified station. An example of a completely unidentified station is an open carrier. The absence of any programming clues offers no help in identifying the station.

At the other end of the spectrum is the positively (100% probability) identified station ("This is the Voice of America broadcasting from Greenville, North Carolina." (JAL Note: VoA no longer uses this type ID.)).

Many DX stations fall somewhere in between on the identification spectrum, however. One may hear only part of the ID, and it may be in a poorly understood foreign language or in the midst of heavy static or interference. Or perhaps no ID is heard but certain characteristics of the signal or programming lead to the belief that you are tuned to a particular station.

Generally speaking, the longer one listens to a station -- on one date or many -- the more clues to its identity he will gather and the better the chances of identification. If you can't ID a station, keep listening!

The factors which might contribute to the identification of a station are almost limitless. Among them are quality of signal (such as presence of polar flutter, fade-out, and fade-in times, etc.), time of reception, frequency, and programming. Programming is usually the most important clue.

Knowledge of languages will help. Familiarity with different kinds of indigenous music is a big help in identifying stations. Other factors which could contribute to station identification include similarity of programming to that reported by other listeners, use of known tuning signals, sign-on and sign-off sequences, identification of advertisers and much, much more.

It should be apparent that one's ability to identify a station depends mostly on his ability to interpret what he hears and reach conclusions from it. Thus, DXers with greater experience may find it easier to suggest plausible identifies for unidentified stations than will newcomers to the hobby. A station which is unidentified to a new listener may be identified to a more experienced DXer. The experience factor is critical. One should, over his years in the hobby, build a mental storehouse of information about the stations and countries he may hear on shortwave. Then, when he hears a station whose identity he is seeking, he has a background of knowledge which he can bring to bear on the various items of programming he hears.

No matter how experienced you are, you will not be able to fully identify all signals you hear. A couple of shorthand expressions have developed for describing these cases.

One is "presumed" identification. When a logging is listed as presumed it means the DXer has concluded that, based on all of the clues he has, he is almost certain (9% probability) that it is the named station he has heard. About all that is missing is an actual U; virtually all the other clues as to identity "fit."

The other term is "tentative." A tentative identification means that the DXer has strong reason (80% probability) to believe that he is bearing the named station, but he is not sufficiently certain to call it presumed.

For example, if one hears a Spanish station on a frequency where several latin Americans operate, there is no basis, without more, on which this could properly be termed an identified logging of one station rather than the others. The probability in being right in guessing any one of the listed citations is less than 50%. If the listener identifies the music as definately Feruvian, however, if only one of the known stations is located in Peru, and if other DXers have reported Feru only at this time, one might properly call this a tentative logging of the Peruvian station. In this instance one might be about 80% certain of that identity. If, in addition, part of an identification is heard which seems to match that of the Peruvian and there are mentions of the town in which the Peruvian is located, this could properly be called presumed reception of the Feruvian. Identification certainly would be better than 95%.

Anything short of a tentative is an unidentified. Divers should avoid the temptation to classify loggings as tentative when they are truly unidentified. A legitimate tentative designation is not just the product of a guess, and should not be used merely as an "insurance policy" against embarrassment if a logging reported to a bulletin later proves to have been in error. When there is any doubt in your mind, call the station unidentified. If you must err, err on the side of caution. Even with unidentifieds, however, you might want to indicate which station or stations you think it might be, if you have any ideas.

A word about the propriety of sending reception reports to stations in the presumed or tentative categories. The main purpose in seeking a QSL is to cause the station to verify what the listener himself has already fairly concluded, namely that it is that particular station he has heard. It is <u>not</u> the purpose of a QSL to confirm a mere guess.

Ordinarily it is permissible to seek a verification from a station in the presumed category. The problem is more difficult with tentative loggings. Perhaps the best test is this: If, based on all the circumstances, you are able to fairly conclude that it is a particular station you have heard -- having applied the stringent "have I been guilty of wishful thinking test" -- it is permissible to seek verification. You should spell out to the station that your reception was not positively identified, however. You should tell them that you are not certain it is their station you have heard, but detail those factors which cause you to believe that it is probably them.

#### A STATION LIST SHOULD NEVER BE THE SOLE OR PRINCIPAL FACTOR IN IDENTIFYING A STATION

All DXers use lists of one kind or another: Club bulletins, other hobby publications, World Radio TV Handbook, etc. The issue is not whether to use such lists, but how to use them. Lists provide a useful element of information to a listener who is trying to identify a particular station operating on a particular frequency. They tell him which stations are scheduled to operate on that frequency or have been heard there. Thus, they are helpful mainly in narrowing the list of stations a DXer might be listening to.

To be carefully avoided is a practice called "list logging." List logging is the habit

of concluding and reporting that one has heard a particular station when that conclusion is based mostly on the fact that the station is, according to a list, supposedly operating at the time and place heard. A list logger proceeds on the wrong assumption that because station X is supposed to be operating on a particular frequency at a particular time, and because he heard a station on that frequency at that time, it must be station X he heard.

List logging is mainly the product of the DXer's desire to hear a particular station. He wants to hear station X, so he concludes he has heard it, even though other possibilities are more likely. Wishful thinking has led him to "identify" the station principally by the fact that the station is reported to be operating at the time and place of his logging.

List logging becomes progressively more hazardous as the list being relied upon ages. Thus the annual WRTH will normally be less accurate than a list which updates several times a year (such as the Danish Shortwave Clubs International Tropical Bands Survey), TES may be less accurate than the lists in monthly bulletins and so forth. Furthermore, stations move to new frequencies as well as <u>from</u> old ones. So a station heard on a given frequency may well be something not yet on any list, and even the most up to date listing of stations on a frequency may not indicate all the possibilities.

As stressed previously, it is the other factors in a logging -- language, program content, reception conditions, etc. -- which should provide the basis for a credible identification. That a wanted station is supposed to be operating at the same time and frequency is just one element -- and not a critical one -- in the overall determination of which station is being heard.

#### REPORT THE FREQUENCY OF RECEPTION AS ACCURATELY AS EQUIPMENT AND SKILL PERMIT

A DXer should be familiar enough with his equipment to know how to use it properly and get the most accuracy it can offer. With all but the simplest multi-band portables,  $\pm 3$  kHz accuracy is possible and should be sought. If digital readout is not available, the DXer should develope appropriate frequency graphs, charts, or tables for his receiver so that by interpolation he can establish an accuracy of about  $\pm 3$  kHz. Even greater accuracy, to the nearest kilohertz, should be standard where digital readout is available. Measurements to the nearest kilohertz are not indispensable to proper reporting or to one's development as a serious DXer, however.

It is not necessary to report frequencies to one or more decimal places, e.g. 9710.2, 9710.23, 9710.238 kHz, etc. Generally, such frequency citations give the illusion of a great degree of accuracy which is not warranted in fact. Instability in the receiver or frequency counter is at least as likely an explanation for variations in "measured" frequencies over a period of time as is transmitter instability. If the frequency is measured on appropriate equipment by an experienced operator, it may be of value in determining "frequency offsets", that is deliberate off frequency operation which may be characteristic of particular stations, however. Caution should be used in reporting these to bulletin logging sections as the inexperienced DXer may be misled or become discouraged because his equipment does not permit such accuracy. The obvious exception to the above is where a station is known to broadcast regularly on a decimal or "split" frequency, such as Bouganville on 3322.5 kHz. (Editors note: This paragraph was revised as a result of discussion with the authors at NUvention 5, 12 Aug. It may appear in its original form in other DX publications.)

Of course, the frequency reported should be the one actually heard and not just the listed frequency, if they are not the same.

#### BRIEFLY DESCRIBE THE PROGRAM HEARD BE ACCURATE AND COMPLETE

The more descriptive the account of your logging, the more helpful it will be to others. As a general rule, the rarer the logging, the more complete should be your program description.

The following are appropriate details: Language (if known); program titles (or generic terms such as "local news," "commentary," "request music program," etc.); type of music (generic terms such as "rock," "mid-east chanting," "island music" as a minimum, but ideally more detailed musical descriptions are desirable, e.g. "ganelan," "kronkong," "huayno," "merengue," etc.); sign-on and sign-off practices; actual time announcements; tuning signals; national anthems; sound effects; and products advertised. An important item is the identification text. And whether as part of an ID text or not, besure to give the name or slogan of the station as you heard it if it differs from the name usually used.

#### RECEPTION CONDITIONS SHOULD BE REPORTED ACCURATELY AND IN CLEAR, CONCISE LANGUAGE

Though preferred by some major international broadcasters, SINPO and SIO codes should be avoided when reporting reception of shortwave stations, except where a club requests QGLS

otherwise. Reception should be described in brief, narrative form, e.g. "good reception with het on high side," "poor strength with low modulation." "fair with QRM from BBC, same channel." Note any special characteristics associated with reception: Strength of signal, undermodulation or overmodulation, type, strength, and (if possible) identification of any interfering stations or heterodynes, readability of the signal (the ability to distinguish words, phrases, and sentences), relationship of signal quality to that usually experienced from the station, etc.

The quality of reception should not be overstated. Report things as you hear them. As a general rule, the better the DX, the worse reception you can expect. The following terminology is suggested:

1. "Excellent" -- Outstanding "local" or "armchair" quality reception; VoA, BBC, etc. Stations heard with excellent quality are rarely true DX.

2. "Good" -- The content of the spoken programming, i.e. readability, is understood and the signal is stable. Unlike excellent reception, this signal may suffer from some interference, heterodyne, fading, etc.

3. "Fair" -- Much DX reception will fall into this category. Fair reception is reception that is degraded in quality to the point where readability is substantially reduced. Note that even a strong signal might be reported as fair if interference or other factors greatly reduce intelligibility.

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IT TAKES TWO TO VERIFY -- SOME THOUGHTS ON VERIFICATION POLICIES

Many DXers complain when stations -- especially the harder to hear ones -- do not verify their reception reports. Some DXers reason that since they put in just so much time and effort to send the station a reception report, it is the station's obligation to verify that report. But how often do DXers look at things from the side of the broadcasters? For all stations, domestic and international broadcasters, verifying reception reports in -- in terms of paperwork, time, effort, and money -- a hassle, and often an unrewarding one.

For international broadcasters, reception reports are a way of getting in touch with their listeners. But this does not mean that verifying them is not a hassle, especially in terms of paperwork. Also, with inflation rising, stations cut back on their personnel -- which means that fewer people are there to answer the increasing tide of reception reports. So, why not look at their side of things, and remember them when you are about to write up your next reception report? If you were working at an under-staffed station, what kind of reports would you like to see? Probably ones that are neat in appearance (typewritten, for example), that are concise in their details, that include some sort of comment on the program content, and ones that are friendly -- not just the old gimme-my-QSL type approach. Not only will following these simple outlines make for friendlier relations between the stations and DXers, it will also improve your QSL returns.

Domestic broadcasters in Latin America, Africa, and Asia simply are not aiming for an international audience, and oft-times they don't need or want one. Their broadcasts are strictly for internal consumption, so to speak. In Latin America, most stations on shortwave are commercial broadcasters, whose sole means of livelihood is making money from the sale of commercial spots to local businesses. They are often small operations -- family run stations are common in Latin America. Profits are small for these stations, and money must be spent with care. To these stations, reception reports from DXers in the USA, using fancy receivers and Antennas to hear their stations, are worth little more than the paper they are written on. It may be interesting to some stations to get letters from the EE UU de America, indeed some stations are proud that they have been heard in far-away lands, but reception reports help the station little. DXers in far-away lands are not a loyal, local listemership which can be counted on to patronize local businesses which advertise on the radio station. In fact, verifying reception reports can be seen as a debit when looked at from the station's point of view. They spend their time and money sending out verifications and get nothing more than the esoteric pleasure in knowing that they can be heard in far-away places. DXers should be happy with the returns they get from Latin American stations that are generous enough to verify reports, and not gripe at the stations which haven't answered their reception reports.

Domestic broadcasters in Africa and Asia are in a category different from Latin American broadcasters. They are usually state run radio stations, whose coverage is sometimes local, nost-times national, but almost never international. Like the Latin American stations, reception reports from DXers with fancy receiving equipment are of little more than esoteric value to these broadcasters too. Most of these stations operate in the tropical bands, and according to recent information, CCIR regulations state that stations should not be able to be heard outside the benestic coverage area -- so stations do not really want to be told that they are being heard in far-away lands, way outside their border. Also, most African and Asian states are poor, developing countries which do not have available any large expenditure for staffing their stations or running up postage bills sending out QSLs. In almost all occasions, DXers get verifications out of the generosity of stations and the personnel who work there, not because the station is "obligated" to verify reception reports.

In conclusion, I would like to quote from a prominent DXer who has traveled in Latin America a fair amount. "As a personal opinion, after visiting a cluster of Latin stations, I now believe we are lucky to get <u>any</u> replies at all from most of these, and whatever the percentage of Latin replies to reports, it is probably better than it should be. The people down there -- good people, but very poor -- have enough problems and enough to do than to waste their time writing to Gringos. I can really understand them feeling that way."

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## History

RADIO IN 1907

By Robert Fraser, Cohasset, Mass.

Recently at the Boston Public Library, I came across a small book titled "Wireless Telegraph Stations of the World". Compiled by the U.S. Navy and dated August 1, 1907. It was the WRTH of its day. Its size and thickness, including the hard-bound covers, was about that of a typical FRENDX.

Various chapters covered all the commercial and private radio stations then existing in the world (all nations were listed whether or not they had a radio station), those aboard commercial ships, and the U.S. Navy's shore stations and aboard our warships. Foreign naval radio stations were not mentioned. The listings I have partly included are for American Privately-owned commercial stations and the U.S. Navy's shore stations.

Readers will note that most of the American Commercial stations existing and under construction, were by DeForest while the Navy used German-made equipment. Most of the U.S. Navy radio stations were built adjacent to lighthouses and indeed, five are aboard lightships.

At the start of the 20th Century, long wave meant long distance. But, even by 1907, many of the stations were already using frequencies now in the lower section of the BCB band. The Naval stations were broadband - the receiving capabilities of the Sitka, Alaska, station for instance, covered the present LW and MW bands. The private stations appear to have used only one frequency. One wonders just how stable and selective its transmission was.

The most famous, of course, was Marconi's transatlantic station "CC" at Wellfleet, Cape Cod. Its range is listed as "ultra-potent" as is Reginald Fessenden's transatlantic station "BO\* at nearby Brant Rock.

A bit of history on our seagoing radio stations: In 1898, an experimental radio was aboard the San Francisco Lightship, located halfway between the Golden Gate and the Farrallon Islands. A few years later, the Navy established a radio station on the Farrallons. The islands were farther to see, a more stable platform, and a larger area than the lightship.

Radios were installed aboard the Nantucket Lightship 66 and her relief, the 58, in 1901. Primarily, they were to report ship arrivals to the Port of New York. The lightships worked "SC" at Siasconset, Nantucket Island, some 47 miles northwest, and the report was then cabled to New York City. On December 10, 1905, racked by a severe gale and badly leaking, the Nantucket Lightship 58 radioed for help, America's first wireless distress call. The tender <u>Azalea</u>, at Boston, reached the sinking lightship a few hours later. Too dark for any rescue attempts, the tender stood by the 58 all that night. At dawn the next day, the lightships crew were taken off and the 58 placed in tow. A few hours later, the lightship sank. Her place as Nantucket's relief was then taken by the 76. Oddly, on June 24, 1960, the 78, while relieving the Ambrose Channel Lightship at New York Harbor, was rammed and sunk by a passing vessel, fortunately without loss of life. Neither lightship was salvaged and they remain today in their watery grave. Wouldn't it be nice if someday a diver retrieved the historic radio equipment from the 58.

Information in the book was sketchy at best. But it is most interesting to get a glimpse of radio in its infancy nearly three quarters of a century ago.


SPECIAL NOTE: RADIO SHACK has issued its catalog for the winter season. It lists specifications for the DX-300, to be available in October. The specifications indicate that it may be a very good receiver. It has, addording to the catalog, 3kHz selectivity at -6 dB and 10 at -70 dB, which sounds as good as or better than the Gilfer modified FRC-7000. The DX-300 has a attenuator to stop overload, a three position audio switch to permit audio filtering and a tunable preselector. It is a loop design tuning with LED digital counter display. All for under \$400. We will have to wait to see what test results will show, but it looks like it ought to be a good one. We would like reviews ASAP after the receiver hits the market. Competition is the name of the game, and now suddenly we have lots of receiver choises.

") and in RS, news in Kaz. and in RS, and then usual piano mx for gymnastics (Tony Buhagiar, Ont., 28/7) Cf LN-4, you mean 9780? (gh)

IRAQ Baghdad noted on 18464.05 in Hebrew with ID at 1605 19/7 //9550; must be 3 x 6154.683 which was inaudible; off at 1630 (Andy Sennitt, England, WDXC Mid-Monther)

IRAN (Cf TURKEY, Aug IN-4) That stn we were listening to while visiting the CBC Monitoring Station on 11800, turned out to be the Voice of Iran, in Turkish (Burasi Iran'in Sesi), but they changed that to a 19 and 31mb one 19/7. VOT started using 11800 for their Turkish pgms the day the VOI stopped using it, per my monitoring and Emre Somçağ of the Bosphorus DX Club (Tony Buhagiar, Ont.)

HONDURAS LV de Centroamérica reactivated? Hrd on 5972 at 0355 with many IDs to 0400\* (Ed Rusalík, Ont., DX Ontario) more, LN-13 more HAITI LN-14

HAITI (Cf Aug LN-6) Matthew Brown says he was misquoted that 4VEH was back on SW; but in the meantime, they really have come back! SLBC covered with DX pgm Mon 1115-1130\* on 11835 but then 4VEH in the clear (gh) I don't care what the stn says, I heard 4VEH on approx 11825 12/8 at 1000; a strange anthem, clear ID in SP, religious pgm; bad fading and QRM; f/out around 1034 (Jeffrey D. O'Donnall, PA) 4VEH, which earlier this year sent out letters announcing it was inactive on SW, was hrd in EG to 1400\* 12/8 at excellent strength on 9770 and 11835. So strong it sounded as if SW xmtrs had been overhauled. However, s/off anmt mentioned only 1035 kHz as being in use. Said would return in EG at 2330, and noted then on 9770 13/8 (Richard E. A pleasant surprise for me; first new country heard in quite a while (Pitt McNeil, DC) \*0500 with NA by band, ID in SP, African pop mx with guitar and vocals, time checks and anmts between songs; many clear mentions of Malabo; 0528 more extensive ID and pop mx until 0600 time pips, SP nx; good-to-very good overall, on 6250 5/8 (Richard McVicar, Ont.)

ECUADOR Interesting situation on 4850 with R. Luz y Vida operating on Ondas del Zamora's frequency, first noted 21/6 at 0400 with characteristic Luz & Vida pgm, 3 or 4 folk16rica numbers, then soft-voiced YL w/dedications. At first that Zamora here, but it's a commercial stn. Only noted twice since, between Surinam 0335\* and Cameroon \*0425. Both Luz y Vida and Zamora are located in Loja (Brian Baumgartner, Ont.) I wonder if this could be another case of one stn's xmtr site inadvertently picking up a VHF STL feed from another stn because the VHF frequencies are too close together, and putting it on the air, most likely after the intended station has signed off ? (gh) Sistema de Emisoras Atalaya is back on the air after years off, on 4781, with sub-slogan "Radiodifusion del Ecuador", which could be mistaken for the main ID; still heard 0400-0500 tho bad ute QRM (Pitt McNeil, 31/7) I am deeply concerned right now because we have had to curtail some of our broadcasting services due to lack of funds ... DOMINICAN REPUBLIC chard E. Wood, NH) R. Clarín 11700 is still active; noted 2000-2100 14/8 with sports (Ri-pres. Guzmán took over from Balaguer 16/8. One of his first acts was to sack the generals who had interfered with the election vote counting. I wonder if he did anything to R. Clarin for having supported Balaguer? (gh) (BBCMS 3/8)

CHILE R. Agricultura, Santiago, obs on 9675 instead of 9630. Listed a network of 10 stns CYPRUS CBC hrd 6/8 at 2213-2220 in GK on 9690; fair bit of QRM (McVicar, Ont) More LN-14

CUBA Michael Goodman, 23, a student at the University of Wisconsin, got his Cuban trip by writing the winning essay in a contest sponsored by Havana's SW station, of which he's a regular listener. His topic: the significance of the first world youth festival to be held in the Western Hemisphere. Goodman said he was impressed by "the niceness of the people." (Newsweek, 7/8, p. 41)

COSTA RICA R. Universidad, 6098, all jazz music 23/7 0055-0125. Chased this one since 30/ 6 when 0354\*. All other nights has classical and semi-classical mx; as long as 45 mins be-tween anmts. They have an excellent music library, especially for piano mx (John Tuchsche-CONGO LN-14 rer, WI, Tropical DX Newsletter)

COOK ISLANDS Saw a recent article in the paper, during the indictment of the prime minister, that the biggest item in Cooks' government-controlled press was that a centipede got into the RCI xmtr and put it out for a couple of hours. NOW we know, hi (McNeil, TDXN)

COLOMBIA Remember that new stn about a year back, R. Sonar, Ocana, 4915? It seems to have vanished into oblivion. Is it still on? Most Colombians are reported at least once in a CHINA LN-14 year ... (Richard Stoller, NY) more, LN-14

CHAD N'djamena tentatively the stn on 14240, at 1400 12/7 and 1515 17/7. African-accented FR nx 1400, mentions of N'djamena, and announces next bulletin as 1900, which agrees with WRTVH. This would be 2 x 7120 (Andy Sennitt, England, WDXC Mid-Monther)

CAPE VERDE A Voz de São Vicente, heard almost without QRM at 2323 on 3391 with clear ID and light mx (Gruger, WDXC MM) Another typo, for 3931? (gh)

CANADA RCI 9580 and 15365 instead of carrying BBC WS relay 1645-1715 Sun 13/8, carried RCI in Russian instead; 1645-1700 //Daventry 11935. At 1715 smoothly back to WS relay to usual 1745\* (Richard E. Wood, NH) The BBC via Sackville freqs for S78 are all changed-more, LN-14 9510 at 1100-1330; 11775 & 17840 at (1500)1600-1709(1745) (gh)

CAMEROON R. Bertous again hrd in morns on 4750, regularly at \*0430, better around 0515 because of Lubumbashi het earlier (Pitt McNeil, DC) \*0430 5/8, very poor (McVicar, Ont.)

BRAZIL R. Iguatemi is newest stn, on 3295 , hrd with experimental BC to 1103\*, asking for reports. Addr given is Rua Melvin Jones, 60, Segundo andar, 06000 Osasco, São Paulo (Sílvio Guilherme Unzer, Botucatu, Aug. CANDX) Heard almost every evening from 0000 to fade out around 0100; in even when other Brazilians on 90m are not (Neal A. Perdue, AL) R. Cultura do Pará in Belém, listed as inactive in WRTVH 1978, on 5045, was hrd at 0237 with 2337 TC, EG mx, PT pgm (Richard Varron, NJ, 15/8) more, LN-14

BELGIUM BRT noted on new 15282.5 with news in Dutch 2100 (Richard E. Wood, NH, 14/8) ARGENTINA LN-14

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ANTIGUA BBC, scheduled to use 17845 at 2000-2115 has moved down 5 to 17840. I had written them in May complaining about 17845 sitting right on top of WYFR, which while beaming to Europe was nonetheless putting a strong signal into the American east coast and presumably the Caribbean (the BBC's target area) as well. They assured me they knew what they were doing but moved down a couple of weeks after I got my response. ANGOLA RNA "A" pgm is now heard eves on 4790 and 3375 with no trace of previously used 4820 (BBCMS 27/7) RNA is still on 4820 but reduced power, //new 4790 (Mikki Vcelar, SCDX 8/8) Luanda radio hrd in SP 2100-2130 on 9660 & 7245, but reception too poor to establish whether these BCs are aimed at the Cuban forces in Angola (BBCMS 27/7) Not only to 2130; heard on 7245 in SP at 2210; noted here with fair QSA; free channel (Andrea Lawendel, Italy) Em. Reg. da Cabinda, 5032<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>, again heard at \*0500 29/7, so must be a permanent change from \*0530 (Pitt McNeil, DC) Also hrd 5/8 to f/out at 0600, on 5033 (Richard McVicar, Ontario)

<u>ALBANIA</u> (Cf Aug LN-4) R. Peking ES via R. Tirana were last hrd 15/7 and are presumed to have been discontinued. R. Tirana began relaying R. CLANDESTINE CRANNY Voice of the Voyageur 5850, aired their 'final broad-cast' 20/8 0400 past 0630 (gh) We will be going off the air for a month at the end of August. At the end of Sept if all goes well I will start broadcasting from a new location. Had a chat on the phone with Tom Gavaras. Much to my horror I discovered that Tom was getting a lot of heat about the VOV. People were starting to think he had something to do with the station! Nothing could be further from the truth! I am an 18 year old student with an intense interest in several different fields. I have merged them all together in the VOV. First off the station was supposed to be the Voice of Voyageur -- but when Tom stumbled across the transmission (he was not tipped off) he heard it as the Voice of Voyager, so we went along with it. The Voyageur comes from the fact that I am a student of conservation and our first broadcasts stressed the beauty of the Northland. I think NASWA has treated the VOV most fairly. Me, R.F. Wavelength, and Mr. A.F. Gain do most of the work but we have a few other guys who help out. Our studios are a little better now than when we started. We have nicknamed the old gal, the HT-20, "the fuse" because of her old habit of blowing 30 amp fuses! By the way there has been nothing shoddy about our use of the telco loops--we have been billed for every minute of their use. Some of the bills ran to \$70. It's not the stuff you expect from a 'wild sounding announcer', but here is a poem of my own creation that describes 'My Special World' to help you understand what kind of person is behind that mic! It gives the feeling of this one VOV staff member toward the world he lives in. (R. F. Wavelength, 9/8) Hush,

VOV hrd on 5850 \*0400-0454\* 13/8 GMT. Murphy's law was in full force--everything that could possibly go wrong, did. VOV had numerous rechnical problems, bad mikes, they misplaced the music they were going to play, had trouble getting hold of the NY Telco loop, etc. Signal was very good; however it was 0430 before they had their audio problems ironed out. Announcers called themselves "Disco Jack", "Disco Dan the Telephone Man", "RF Wavelength", and "AF Gain". They said the program was produced by the "Unidentified Broadcasting Corp." and called themselves R. Liberation as well as the VOV. Music played included "Dr. Love" by the rock group KISS and "Rhiannon" by Fleetwood Mac. Gave commercials for Millers Beer, "The official beer of the U.B.C." (Ken George, 8523 Elsa Ave., St. Louis MO 63123)

VOV, 5850 on 6/8, ran 0400-0803\*. Around 0410 there be silent were many mentions of 11955, a test frequency? Nothing heard there (Richard McVicar, Ont.) I think it was 11995, which they were attempting to test on earlier in

I hrd clear ID at 0222 and freq as 7450, tho were on 7445; 0303 whistling into the mike. Nothing was said about Voice of the Viking being the same as WMMR--Midwest Music Radio, but from the same frequency I would suspect this (gh)

Yup, another pirate! 10/8 on 7450 0202-0233, assumed WMMR, but no positive ID hrd. 0202 tune in, carrier, whistling, muffled voices. 0206, bluegrass instrumental mx, low mod. 02 10, young male voice mentioned 'special test broadcast'. 0216, QRMed by a female voice in EG, same intonation as the SP numbers lady, but instead reading groups from the phonetic alphabet, such as "Tango, Sierra, Zulu, Zulu". 0221, YL (XYL?) off, 0223 young male again, saying would be on every Fri nite but unable to understand times. 0230 "Miss You" by the Stones, 0233 gave phone as 215-654-0095 or <u>8</u>54-, couldn't be sure. Tried both, got pre-recorded intercept. Nothing further heard until 0300 recheck varying audio tones and whistling into a mike. At 0311, the EG "phonetics lady" returned (Harry L. Helms, SC)

unID southern California pirate, possibly heard on 6420 at 0511 7/8 with US pop music, sig 32222 with ute QRM and bad QRN, but was solid under all the mess. No anmts hrd (Derek Lowe, AR) Pop mx, no voice anmts on a clean signal, 8/8 at 0510-0602\* on 6418.2, SIO 545 (Steve Miller & Grant Manning, CA, SPEEDXGRAM)

W G O R pirate on 1625 kHz is still at it, hrd 0425 GMT Sat 29/7, with usual phone-in pgm, IDing as in New York City. Good signals on the TRF (Pitt McNeil, DC) Ireland LN-13

Star Radio, or something similar, a pirate in Holland called itself 16/7 at 0945 on 7365, QRA as Postbus 16, Emmercompassum; poor mod and poorer pgmme (Gruger, WDXC Mid-Monther)

Radio CBN, illegal stn in Sydney, Australia had this sked: 14/8 at 1100, 27/8 at 0100, on 26785 and low power FM 105.3 MHz. A transmitter is being constructed for the 90 & 75m bands. Sked from Melbourne is a broadcast 19/8; frequencies unknown, tho possibly similar to the Sydney ones. The QSL address for Sydney is: Radio CBN, 18A Milner Cres., Wollstonecraft NSW 2065 ("Chris Markham", Aug. ADXN)

Voice of the Revolutionary Party for Reunification claims to broadcast from S. Korea, but really they broadcast from N. Korea. Militant music, commentary and talks about the US involvement in S. Korea. The EG pgm is usually by a YL ancr who has a heavy accent, some-times hard to understand. She sounds like the YL hrd frequently on R. Pyongyang. The EG sked is 2230-2300 on 1135 and 4557; 1400-1430 on 1135, 4120, 4557. Frequencies drift some. other times in Korean. The 1400 xmsn has been heard on the West Coast in the fall and win-ter with good signals. 2230 may be possible in the East, but not reported as far as I know. Both VRPR and the next are completely unofficial because in 1972 N & S agreed to stop hostile BCs toward each other. But obviously they both still continue (Bill Harms, WA)

Hui-Mang-e Me-ari, literally, "Echo of Hope", is S. Korea's answer to VRPR. Only in Korean. News, commentary, music, talks by a 'sweet sounding' female. Sked 0200-0500 & 0900-1200 on 6348 and 1400-1700 on 3985. 0900 is hrd thruout the year on the West Coast and the 1400 is audible in the fall and winter in the West. I don't know how well received in East (Harms)

Voice of the Malayan Revolution According to the Malaysian government, the xmtr site of the stn, which began broadcasting 15/11/69, is stated to be in Shenyang, Hunan Province, in PR China. But it was only until end of 1971, and later is obscurely stated as "southern part of China" or "Yunnan Province". From the fact that the broadcast is easily audible in Tokyo and that pronunciation is slightly different from the native speakers, it surely is not in the border of Malaysia & Thailand. Probably it is possible that editorial dept. of a journal "Malayan Bulletin" issued till around 1968 in China, may have changed into the radio station. It should be noted that the contents of programs strongly reflect present views of Chinese government and party, and that the victorious reports of revolutionary battle are only informed after 2 weeks at the earliest. Malaysian govt's view in 10/74 was that this BC had not won the confidence of the Central Committee of the Malayan Communist Party for more than 5 months. But this was resolved, and after 4/75, there were broadcast various statements of the Party and its lower organizations calling on people to listen to VOMR. None of the leaders are mentioned by name but Chen Ping, thus: "Central Committee of the Party led by Comrade Chen Ping". Being a native of Hakka, his name is usually pronounced in Malaysia as "Chin Peng", but in VOMR BCs it is pronounced "Chen Ping" as in Std. Chinese, regardless of Malay, Tamil or English pgm. There are two reasons for this: first, smaller sized reports tend to get lost around my shack. Second, the larger paper simplifies typing and set up operations.



I recently ran across an interesting book described as "A Book for Wireless and Other Listeners" in the card catalogue. There is no publishing date indicated in it, but the first sentence of the FOREWARD says enough: "The development of broadcasting and other forms of musical reproduction has created an entirely new public--one which includes many who feel themselves attracted by fine music, but who freely confess that they 'do not know anything about it'." The book: <u>Music and How to Enjoy It</u>, by J. H. Elliot. I'd like to further share excerpts of Chaffer I with you.

"In these days, thanks to wireless transmission--and, in a smaller degree, to mechanised reproduction--fine music, expensively produced, may be easily and cheaply obtained. On the face of it, this seems to be an excellent condition of affairs; yet it is not without drawbacks. An increase in the number of art galleries would be of little benefit to blind man; nor is the accessibility of vast quantities of music necessarily bound to turn an 'unmusical' person into an enthusiast for all that is the best in the art. On the other hand, it may easily have the activelybad effect of dulling our sensitiveness to musical stimuli.

"There is no paradox in the foregoing paragraph. It contains plain, sober truth. Music is so readily come by in these times that, like everyday commodities...great amounts, duly recieved, are permitted to run to waste. In other words, we hear a great deal of music, but listen to very little. We fail to absorb it, and therefore derive no benefit from it.

"If we are content to employ music as a pleasant background for our reading, conversation, card-playing, eating, or dozing, well and good--we need only to switch on our loud-speakers or put our gramophones into action and contunue our other occupations. But listening to music is an active process which demands our full attention. Unless we concentrate on what we hear-erect a sort of mental sieve which will retain the significance of the sounds--it will, in the old expression, merely come in at one ear and go out at the other, leaving no sediment of meaning or sensation behind it.

"Those of us who developed our love of music in days when it was by no means easy to acquire musical experience had no need to be warned of these things. The value of the few precious hours that we were able to spend in concert halls was patent enough. What we lost--if it can be conceived as a loss--in deapness, quantity, and even perhaps in comfort, we gained in the natural formation of the habit of concentrated listening--a good habit which, once formed, is not easily discarded.

"The great danger of broadcasting and mechanized music generally is that, by its very prodigality, it removes that compulsion to make the most of everything recieved which operated in the old days. Music today is so plentiful that we are tempted to regard it too cheaply. Even those of us who attend good concerts regularly--and all true music lovers do so whenever possible, for no reproduction, however good, is comparable to the real thing--can supplement our experiences by means of radio and gramophone. Music is almost literally 'in the air'. But it is no more easy to extract full enjoyment from it than it was before reproducing instruments were invented... I make no apology for dealing extensively with so elementary a point. Broadcast-

I make no apology for dealing extensively with so elementary a point. Broadcasting and mechanized music, whether musicians like it or not--and many do not--are today playing enormous parts in the musical life of the country. These innovations have of necessity erected a whole set of new values; and it is desirable to deal at once with a pitfall which, as my daily experience plainly informs me, looms large in the path of seekers after musical understanding in a world that is full of music."
