At the risk of repeating myself, I am going to begin this month's CONTACT with yet another letter which addresses itself to the threat posed by the "Electronic Communications Privacy Act of 1985." While I do not wish to try your patience by what may seem like harping on a subject, I do very much want to sound a clear warning against what is, above all, an extremely dangerous piece of legislation. The letter your're about to read comes from <u>Berg-Andersson</u> (WDX2RSG, Woodside, New York) and was very kindly forwarded to me by Bill Oliver. A letter from Mr. Berg-Andersson appeared in last month's CONTACT; his present letter is even more pointed:

I am quite frightened by the legislation known as the "Electronic Communications Privacy Act of 1985" (S.1667/H.R.3378). This has to be the biggest threat to our hobby in quite some time and it seems to have taken the SWL community by surprise.

We must correct that and work to defeat this bill.

It is all well and good to urge NASWA members to write their U.S. Senators and Representitives, but I fear that a few letters to a few Congressmen from Individual radio hobbyists are <u>not</u> going to defeat this dangerous place of legislation. It is going to take a concerted effort of the NASWA membership and, perhaps, the entire ANARC community to defeat this bill.

Therefore, I strongly urge NASWA to take action NOW. I strongly urge you, as NASWA Executive Director, to begin to commit the club to oppose this bill force-

fully. Steps must be taken, and taken soon.

I suggest that a copy of the bill be obtained and then summarized in FRENDX. I also think it would be wise to examine the bill and find out if and how it affects NASWA. Members should write their Congressmen, of course, but they should be encouraged to get friends and relatives to write. This should be put forth as a public interest issue more important than just the potential effect on the hobby -- Congress is more inclined to listen to 'ordinary' folks. This would be a good start at least.

Finally, NASWA should press ANARC to unite to defeat this bill. "Unity

and Friendship" is the key to killing this threat.

Very well said, and thank you. Before leaving this topic ... for the moment, I would make two brief observations. The first has to do with the principle of "the thin edge of the wedge:" if this legislation is passed, it will never again be possible to oppose further legislation of this sort from a position of strength (as derived from precedent). A new precedent will have been set and any powerful private interest group will be free to avail itself of its use, and the freedom of the air waves will be further eroded. Second, the further precedent will have been established that the law shall come to the rescue of purely self-interested corporate concern and immoral marketing strategies. You and I will pay the price for this, in the preclous tender of our freedom.

It is always a very great pleasure to acknowledge thanks expressed for the work of NASWA, FRENDX, and CONTACT. This comes from <u>John E. Beck</u> (Producer, DX PARTY LINE, HCJB, Quito, Ecuador) in a nice note:

I wanted to thank you and the rest of the NASWA membership very much for the material you provide and which we are able to use on the DX PARTY LINE. Assistance

from clubs such as yours really helps to make the DXPL what it is. Thanks!

Coming up on May 19, 1986 will be a special telephone call-in program celebrating the DX PARIY LINE's 25th anniversary. Although full details are still being worked out, we would like to invite NASWA's participation through sending greetings either by letter, tape recording or via telephone.

Thanks again for everything.

In the January issue of FRENDX I passed along an Interesting Idea from Gerry Bishop to the effect that that perhaps we of NASWA could raise a fund with which we could donate a SW transmitter to a country that could use or need it. The following month John Bryant added enthusiastic support for the idea. Well, every idea, no matter how good, needs some ruthless, hard-hearted criticism and analysis befor it emerges (if it does) in its final form. The rôle of Simon Legree has been generously and graciously assumed by Dan Sheedy (Encinitas, California):

Just received my Feb. FRENDX & was reading your column (more precisely, John Bryant's letter) & thought I'd drop my 2¢ worth into the "buy a transmitter for a needy country" idea.

Yeah, it's a nice thought...a sort of permanent DX-pedition operation, but stop & think after the first flush of enthusiasm...which country(les)? The ones named in John Bryant's letter (Tristan, Palau, Christmas Isl., Pitcairn...) all have no need for SW service. Pitcairn, for example, generates its own electricity: would you waste the week's electricity supply so some wide-eyed soul in West Kneecap, PA could listen to the International Service of Radio Pitcairn? the others are small, relatively isolated communities with adequate LOCAL radio on MW. So, trying to convince local government that they "need" SW for better coverage would be an interesting task.

Concerning the 'stipulations' as noted by John Bryant:

(1) 5-year "guarantee" of transmissions...nothing personal, but having had experience repairing ham radio gear, who will do the maintenance? Come to think of it, who provides the antennas and studio? Most non-SW countries seem to be short of funds for frills (like "international Services"). Who pays for the engineers/announcers/staff and so on?

(2) Many countries are languishing in the wee-smal hours when propagation to NA/Eu/Japan is best. It'll take a LOT of dedication to drag the staff outta the sack for special regional broadcasts (I dislike rolling outta bed at 3 AM local to DX & all I have to do is flip on the receiver; not drive to the station, warm up the transmitter, etc.!) Even if it's all on tape, someone has to load the machines & do the transmitter trip.

(3) The only "stipulation" I agree on, but why not work on some of the existing stations that are lackadalsical in their verification policies? (Yes, I know the station is doing us a favor by verifying, & most reports are worthless-at least on regional transmissions--but at least It'll keep some folks out of mischief.)

One last Scrooge-like note [a piteous cry is heard from sgm -- "Oh no... not another one!"]: (admittedly, ethnocentrism raises its fuzzy head) If I were a country, would I appreciate unsolicited offers of "free" transmitters, complete with "stipulations?" Would I care 2 pins whether or not anyone outside the confines of the country heard my undoubtedly high-class cultural programming? Maybe the answers to these questions would end up being: "Why us? Go pick on someone your own size!"

Not to be a spoil-sport, but I thought the "other side" oughta be heard from,

Ah, the bracing, invigorating chill of icy cold water thrown, heartlessly, on a naked, defenceless idea. Still, your points are well taken. What this means is that the notion must be refined. Any ideas?

From dedicated correspondent <u>Erich Schulman</u> (KTN4CA, Oak Ridge, Tennessee) comes the following letter which refers to a number of interesting things:

Part of this letter is in response to your February 1986 edition of CONTACT. First, on choosing equipment, you stated "First you must make a clear assessment of your needs. Second, you should make a survey of the literature, and of owners/users of the equipment..." I feel there is a third important factor as well. Also, you should think about what you are likely to do with the gear a few years later. When I was considering a receiver, I anticipated making tapes off-the-air. I was right: since got the receiver, I have made scores of recordings ranging from MUSICA DEL ECUADOF on HCJB to KCBI's inaugural transmission. I picked the [Yaesu] FRG-7 as it delivers reasonably clean audio (despite the relatively high 50mV output from the record jack)

It is easy to connect to a tape deck, and its volume control does not affect the recording (I'd rather set the levels at the deck). I examined other receivers in the same price class, and found them not to be quite as good with recording. Even now, 4-5/12 years later, I am still satisfied with the FRG-7's performance.

I, too, wanted to find out how much the 1KW SW transmitter would cost. I found the figure of \$250,000. The amount came from the estimate of John Parkell(sp.?),

the owner of HITS 100/WOKI, the 71st most listened-to station in the U.S.

Finally, allow me to quote a part of my contribution appearing on p. 24 of

the September 1984 Review of International Broadcasting:

"I first wrote them (WYFR) on 26 December 1983 to get their 10th anniversary QSL, which I did get -- and more. Ever since then they have been bombarding me with requests for cash. With all they're spending on postage to send out that stuff, it's no wonder they ask for money."

A few weeks ago, Glenn Hauser reported on WORLD OF RADIO that WYFR was abolishing their mailing list, thus ending solicitation. Frankly, I am relieved to know that I no longer have to get begging and pleading form letters which I always donate

to the circular file[...]

A QUARTER OF A MILLION DOLLARS FOR A SW TRANSMITTER?!?!?. Whew! Can this be true? And for a mere 1KW, at that! Can anyone else provide some information? As regards soliciting form-letters -- you are, of course, always free to write to the offending organization and ask them to cease. Still it's their money to spend as they wish. After all, when you send them a reception report, they have no way of knowing just what your interest is in the station and its work. If there is any question, it is up to you to set the record straight.

Well, that's about it for the letters this time around. I may say that the mail has been a trifle thin of late. I have taken the optimistic view that this is due to the fact that everyone is so busy writing reception reports, UPDATE reports, and LOG reports, that there is no time left over for letters to CONTACT. Still, if you find yourself with a few minutes on your hands, do please drop us a letter -- suggest a topic for discussion, air a grievance, or tell us about some wonderful thing that you've heard or read about broadcasting. In any case, my thanks to those who have written -- keep up the good work!

§ § CONTACT NOTES § §

I had planned this month to examine sources of SWBC information that appear more frequently than once a year, but excluding the monthly journals issued by SW clubs. That will have to be put off for a month or two. But I will take the time to mention one possibility that you might want to consider -- The International Listening Guide. This work appears four times a year, timed to coincide with the regular changes in frequency that SW broadcasters make throughout the year: the second week in March, May, September, and November. I have in hand a copy of the November 1985 edition and will describe that to you, although changes in format will make their appearance with the March 1986 edition. Containing 96 pages, the work is divided into two sections. The first section lists broadcasts in English, by time in two-hour blocks. In addition to the frequency listing, there is also schedule information about the occurance of news/commentary/magazine programs on the major international services. Additionally, and this is a very nice touch indeed, there is a listing of any DX/SW programs that are broadcast in the given time-block under consideration. The second section is a listing by frequency (5850 to 26000 kHz) of all SW broadcasters (both International and domestic). Information about times of broadcasts and languages used is presented graphically, in a manner similar to Radio Database International; the principal difference being that ILG identifies languages by abbreviations, while RDI uses graphic symbols to indicate the same thing. The only information that ILG seems not to give is broadcast power. Target areas are indicated. Beginning in March '86 the ILG will be in a larger format, and the March and September editions will contain a TROPICAL BAND survey. A yearty subscription (4 issues) costs US\$12. A sample copy can be had for 7 IRCs. Write to International Listening Guide, Merianstrasse 2, D-3588 Homberg, West Germany. Excellent value for a work that is the result of monitoring and info. from the broadcasters. More next month about this fine work. 73-

SUNDAY

- 0100-0125: "The Jazz Place" (Radio Havana Cuba).

 A half-hour of contemporary jazz, both North American and Latin American. There is little commentary between songs, but sometimes the musicians on a particular piece are mentioned by name. Other than that, it's just good jazz. (6100/6140/9740. Repeated at 0300 and 0500. At 0500, 6090 replaces 6140).
- 0225-0240: "This is South Africa" (Radio RSA).
 Each edition features a single aspect of life in South
 Africa that is covered in some detail. Past features have
 included the seed trade, the Institute for the Study of Man
 in Africa, and the astronomical observatory on a mountain
 near Cape Town. (6010/9615/5980).

MONDAY

- 0015-0030: "Looking Around Spain" (Spanish Foreign Radio).
 Each week this program features a different town in a Spanish province--its landmarks, its history, its culture, etc.-- as well as playing about three folks songs from the region. At least half a dozen editions featured the La Mancha region of Spain, and more recent episodes have been featuring towns in the province of Leon. If you're planning to visit Spain anytime soon, this program will certainly help you decide what to look for once you get there; if you're not planning on going to Spain, this is not all that bad a substitute. (9630/11880. Repeated at 0115 on the same frequencies and at 0515 on 9630/6055).
- 0225-0235: "Ecology" (Radiobras).

 A program devoted to the ecology of Brazil, both the natural and the manufactured. One program, for example, featured a well-known rose farm in a Brazilian state; another interviewed a Brazilian wildlife photographer. The natural features of Brazil, like a famous cave in another Brazilian state, are also described and detailed. (11745) Every other week.

TUESDAY

1315-1320: "Belgian Politics" (BTR).

A program devoted to the ins and outs of Belgian politics in general, and rather more narrowly, Flemish politics in particular. Not only are political issues discussed, but the positions of the various parties and political maneu-

vering are also analyzed. (15590).

0425v-0430v: "Cultural Scene" (Radio Sofia).

A rather good, if short, arts program with some excellent critical commentary. Past editions have featured English works available in Bulgarian translations, an interview with Kiril Popilov (a Bulgarian writer), as well as a review of an exhibit and even a feature on circus artists. I must admit, however, that for the last month or so I've not heard the program. I believe it's being aired slightly after 0430 now (and that conflicts with the Tonight show). (7115).

WEDNESDAY

- 1230-1300: "Books and Publishing" (Radio Australia).

 Each program consists of three interviews, either with authors whose books have just been published or with someone in the publishing houses themselves. All kinds of books are considered: non-fiction, fiction, and children's books. (9580/6060).
- 1335-1350: "One in a Hundred Million" (Radio Japan).

 Each program features an interview with a Japanese man or woman notable for his achievements or his idiosyncracies. One program, for example, featured an interview with a woman who was taking photographs of her native village to preserve it for posterity after it would be flooded by a new dam being built. Another program featured a man who kept an inn in a remote area of Japan and tried to help preserve the wilderness, and still another featured an interview with a man whose works of mosaic art have been displayed in several countries. (5990).

THURSDAY

- 0230-0245: "World Wide Shortwave Spectrum" (VOA).
 Actually this program is a part of Thursday night's edition of "VOA Magazine" rather than an entirely independent entity. As a DX program it seems geared primarily for novice SWLs and has included, besides some rather basic information about shortwave listening, equipment reviews, reviews of the 1986 WRTH, and reviews of the ANARC and EDXC contentions. Also answers listeners questions. (5995/6130/9455/9650/11580/11675).
- 0410-0420: "Events and Developments" (Radio Sofia).

 A program of editorials on recent events in the news, usually three or four per program. The fare is pretty much the same on a daily basis--arms talks, the middle east, etc--but this is one program where the Mehet Ali Adja trial is still kept alive. I hardly hear it mentioned anywhere else anymore. (7115). M-F, except Wednesday.

FRIDAY

245-0300: "The Hobby Kings" (HCJB).

A program for stamp collectors. In addition to reviewing commemorative or thematic issues—like the Food Day Stamps from various countries, the independence anniversary stamps of Botswana, and past issues of stamps from Antartica, etcthere is also usually a special feature that involves someone in the field of stamp collecting. Past interview series have included postmarks, stamp forgeries, and "Cinderella" stamp collecting. Actually quite an interesting program. (9870/6230).

SATURDAY

0230-0300: "DX Party Line" (HCJB).

This is probably one of the best DX programs on the air, aimed at the intermediate or advanced DX-ers. Saturday night's edition includes a station profile (as do the Monday and Wednesday night editions), "Ham Notes" by Duke Alexander, David Sharp's "SPEEDX Report", and Wayne Hynan's "Medium Wave Interlude". Wednesday's edition has a special feature on "Understanding Shortwave", and all three night's feature John Beck's "Tips for Realing Living". (9870/6230) M-W-S.

SATURDAY (continued)

0315-0330: "From Our Own Correspondent" (BBC).
Each edition features three on-the-spot reports from BBC correspondents all over the globe. Past reports have included the oil industry in Norway, PLO attacks in Israel, and the discovery by Egyptologists of the tomb of Maya, the secretary to King Tut. (6175/6120/5975).

As a final note, I would like to thank those people who have written to me with their comments over the past few weeks.—Jerry Wachter of Chicago, Gerald Kercher of Quaker Hill, CT (who suggests, by the way, that the newsreader for RAI may be reading the news in English without actually understanding the language. Certainly a possibility), and Ken MacHarg, the host of "Saludos Amigos" on HCJB. One reason I especially would like to thank these people is that sometimes at home on a weekend afternoon typing up this column to be in Pennsylvania in time for the next edition of FRENDX, I'm sometimes curious as to whether or not I'm merely amusing myself. It's nice to know that the column does get read.



MARCH IN DECEMBER or IN LIKE A LION, OUT LIKE A LAMB

I am sitting here feeling slightly unstuck in time. Due to personal commitments I find myself writing an artical for March 1986 in December 1985. And I don't even have the anticipation of Bock Beer to see me through this project. No anticipation of Spring. But then, sunspots and Haley's comet nowithstanding this (Dec.) is the best of the DX season so I guess I can draw my inspiration from the distant signals pouring out of the radios.


I received a thick envelope from G.B. Communications recently that contained a rather strange spidery looking object. GLENN BCODEY KBEYU is the kind of guy that, apparently, works best under pressure. Whilst providing energency communications during the 1981 eruption of Mount ST. Helens, Glenn came up with a circuit that provides good reception of SSE signals via an R390 receiver without a regular sideband adapter. The Military CV-157/UER Sideband adapter weighs more than the R390 and really consumes vast quantities of electrons.A real power hog. Glenn's little goodie will do the job and it only weighs one oz..(witnessed to by the 22¢ stamp on the envelope it came in) Four connections to the terminal strips on the back of the rig and your in business. The circuit serves to clean up the audio of the "Donald Ducks" to the point that you can understand the communications. Now we must note at this point that any SSB signal is designed for communications and not fidelity. With that in mind you will be hard pressed to find a better deal than the \$29.95 that this unit costs. You will pay in the area of \$50 for a CV-157/URR plus shipping for about 70 pounds on this gut buster. The G.E. Communications module does a reasonable job without the hassle of the military unit. And your spouse, parents, life-mate, etc. will appreciate that fact that the lights don't dim when you turn on your receiver. Glen's SSB adapter comes in a "potted" module to assure protection of the componants. Further, Glenn also assures customer service after the sale, something only a cottage industry like Glenn's can provide in this "modern" world. You can write Glenn about his product at G.E. I am still sorting through some of the stuff sent to previous editor JIL HERKILER. Out of this pile rises a fine design for a selective preamplifier from KURT ENKENHUS. Furt uses this preamp to support his DXing with his ICF-6500% and his NnD-515 but it can be used with most gear.



This Selective Preamplifier connects between the antenna and short wave set. I have found that it significantly improves signal-to-noise in DX reception. It combines an antenna tuner with a three-band preselector having a 0-20 db gain control. The switches S2 and S3 allow either unit to be connected or bypassed.

The antenna tuner is particularly useful in matching long wires. Switch S1 is used to select the tap of inductor L providing maximum signal. Capacitors $C_{\mathbf{A}}$ and $C_{\mathbf{B}}$ are then peaked up.

The preselector signal is tuned with the two-gang condenser, and amplified by a 40673 dual-yate NOSFET. RF gain is controlled by the voltage applied to gate G2. Switch S4 changes bands by connecting additional inductance (L2 or L3) in parallel with L1. The broadcand transformer, T, matches the drain load to the 50 old impedance of the receiver.

The coils are wound on toroidal cores available from Amidon Associates, 12033 Otsego St., No. Hollywood, CA 91607. Wind similar coils as identically as possible. Surplus one— and two-gang variable capacitors are stocked by Fair Radio Sales Co., P.O. Box 1105, Lina, Onio 45802. Note that $C_{\bf A}$ and $C_{\bf G}$ must be insulated from ground. Suitable rotary and toggle switches are sold by Radio Snack. The 40673 HOSFET is carried by Jameco Electronics, 1355 Snoreway Rd., Belmont CA 94002. Once the parts are on nand, the builder can select his own layout (which should not be critical) and cabinet.

The only additional circuit detail Yurt points out is that you will notice that no trimmers are provided for alignment of the coils. Eurt found that trimmers were not neededif the coils are wound as alike as possible for each band, and the wiring layout is kept similar for each of the two tuned circuits which precede the MCSFET RF amplifier.

JERRY BERG reminds us of a good source for cabinets for military surplus receivers such as the R-390A. John J. Leshna, Jr., Inc. P.C. Box 62, E. Lynn, MA 01904 (617) 595-2275 can fix you right up. They welcome phone orders and the folks at Weshna know thier stock well enough to quote the best price over the phone.

One last note in what seems to have become the first annual surplus edition of Technical Topics. Loose lips at a recent party revealed that the armed forces are speeding up the decommissioning of the remaining R-390A's in use. Good news for the semi-broke DXer looking for a great deal on a piece of quality equipment. It is no secret that your humble editor likes this receiver. So you can expect to hear a great deal about it in this column. But please be aware that this column is for all manner of receivers. You can assure that I do not ramble on about the R-390A in future issues by taking the time to jot down a review of your own favorite radio. ATTENTION MONITORS!

I am organizing a cassette-exchange project with shortwave monitors in key reception areas of the world. The purpose of this project is to exchange tages of current reception conditions of shortwave broadcasting stations as heard in Australasia, East Asia, Southwest Europe and southern South America with cassettes containing my results as heard in the Eastern part of North America.

The recordings will be two-minute excerpts of each station heard in the listener's area. One side will consist of broadcasts beamed to the listening area, while the other side contains broadcasts intended for another part of the world that can be audible in the listening area. The 6, 7, 9, 11, 13, 15, 17, 21, rand 26 MHz bands will be covered—no tropical bands, please, as the emphasis will be on the technical quality of international shortwave broadcasting, especially since the low sunspot numbers and increased interference on the lower bands are making shortwave reception difficult.

These recordings, which will be made on 90-minute cassettes, will be exchanged every two months, in order for recordings to be updated at thetstart of the M, J, S, and D schedules, as well as indanuary and July, at the mid-point of the D and J schedules, where many stations will have changed frequencies to avoid interference.

So far, I have only one participant in this project, from Norway. However, a coordinated effort is necessary to determine reception conditions in all six "target areas".

I look forward to hearing from monitors in the above-mentioned areas. If you have enough time to monitor shortwave broadcasts (e.g. most of the day or throughout the weekend), please send your name, address, and description of the receivers and antennas used, to: PROPAGATION PROJECT; 3121 Fairdale Road, Philadelphia, PA.19154, U.S.A. A quick response will ensure me to make my first recordings from Eastern North America at the start of the U86(symmer) broadcasting schedule.

R-70 COMPUTER CONTROL PROGRAM MODIFICATIONS by Tom McElvy and the Old Dominion DX Association

Undoubtedly, David Oliver's Computer Control Program for the ICOM R-70 was a major breakthrough...it provided anyone with a Commodore 64 Computer with all the capabilities of the R71, without that radio's shortcomings.

We have written additional lines for the program, to provide the user with greater flexibility. Below is a copy of the 4 lines to add to the program:

191 IF A*="," THEN F=(VAL(FD#)/1000)-.001:GOTO 460
192 IF A*="." THEN F=(VAL(FD#)/1000)+.001:GOTO 460
193 IF A*="M" THEN F=(VAL(FD#)/1000)+.01:GOTO 460
194 IF A*="M" THEN F=(VAL(FD#)/1000)-.01:GOTO 460

The unusual character in line 193 is a single stroke of the cursor down Key; in line 194 it is cursor right.

What you end up with is this: when the [unshifted] (is depressed, you move the frequency DOWN 1 kHz; when the [unshifted]) is depressed, the radio moves UP 1 kHz. When the cursor down is depressed, the R-70 moves DOWN 10 kHz, and finally, when the cursor right is depressed, the radio moves UP 10 kHz.

The logic is simple...sometimes you may want to shift off center frequency to improve reception, locate interference; the () Keys allow you to do that. If you like to manually scan, or DX on MW as many do, you can step in 10 KHz steps (of course, you could change it to 9 KHz if you desire, to match other band plans).

These modifications have made the already wonderful program even better. Hopefully, we will have more modifications for this control system in the near future, including memory screens similar to those employed for the R-71 program.

The system is colline 24 hours per day at 1-804-851-8030. The BBS operates in the 300 baud, 8 bit, no parity protocol and is accessible to all computers with software emulating that protocol. The system uses the commercially available C-Net software.

I accessed the ODDX BPS last week and had a nice chat with John McColeman the SYSOP. Unfortunately, my modem self destructed while I was on-line, so I didn't get a chance to access the entire board. However, I did extract a promise from John to put together a page or so description of the PPS. Hopefully, it will arrive in time to appear in next month's CC.

IBM PC Compatible Propagation Program

Thought the following might be of interest to your members. I have devloped a propagaion prediction program called MUF.BAS. The program is written in basic for the IBM PC or compatibles. It utilizes the Solar Flux Numbers, that are broadcast by MEV, to generate MUF predictions for a 24 hour period. The predicted frequencies and times are displayed as either a table or a graph, selectable by the use:

The program also features a convenient DX location look-up table which can be customized by the user to suit individual needs. Besides displaying the MIF prediction, the display includes other useful information such as: the date, the latitudes and longitudes for the selected path end points, the beam heading, path length, number of hops and both the Solar Flux and Sunspot Numbers.

The program is easily modified for the user's location to be used as the default for one end of the path. User selection options then are to run the path between his home location and any selection from the lock-up table; or between the user's home and a manually input location; or between 2 manually entered locations.

The program which is being distributed under the Shareware concept (if the program is of value to the user, a \$20 contribution is reqested) consists of 3 files: MUF.BAS the program file, MUF.DOC a nine page detailed documentation file, and PEADME.MUF which instructs the uninitiated on how to print the documentation file. It is currently available on several bulletin boards.

MUF.BAS is an excellent tool for DXer's and SWLer's alike in making efficient use of their operating/listening time and for Contesters in planning contest operating strategy.





For seven or eight years now, I've been working on a idea to automate my short wave receiver. I got the idea from a Radio Prague DX Club suggestion of taping the station you are listening to on one side of a stereo tape and wwv on the other side simultaneously. "What took you so long?", you might ask. Well, lack of money for one thing. Waiting for solid state technology to catch up, for another. I did in have \$200 plus to buy another solid state receiver, just to tune in wwv. The solution came to me when I saw Radio Shack's Timekube and Weatheradio in their catalogue. The following is a description of my set up, which supplements my FRG-7 (Gilfer Modified) receiver.

Equipment List: Proformance stereo cassette deck. Price \$59.95 Realistic SA10 Stereo Amp. Price \$29.95. Realistic Timekube and Weatheradio. Price \$39.95. Archer 9V. Battery Eliminator Price \$4.95. Kisc. jacks and patch cords. Timer.



The first thing to do was to install an earphone jack in the Timekube. I mounted an Archer miniature phone jack under the printed circuit board, near the external antenna. I also installed a CV battery Aliminator, for continuous use.



Cut the red speaker wire and connect as indicated in the schematic above. This hook-up allows the Timekube to be used with internal speaker, earphone, or patched to a tape recorder. The next problem was to match the low impedance output of the Timekube to the high impedance input of the tape detk. I did this by making a matching transformer patch cord, as follows.

This patch cord is essential, as the timekube wont work without it. With very little effort, the proper recording level can be established, and left in that position. The advantage of the SA10 amplifier is that it has separate left and right volume controls. To operate in your absence or while sleeping, simply tune in the receiver to the desired frequency, set tape deck to record, set Timekube to 5,10,or15 for particular time of day, and then set timer to turn on at desired hour.

This QSL letter was received by Marlin Fields. As you can see, DXers sometimes do give information other than how well they heard the transmission.

Evidently our address was given in some of the DIEr publications as a source of confirmation for the Bata station; 2) As a result of the many reception reports we learned that our daily programs were not being played or being played at random times while someone else used our spot! We questioned the station management about these reports, but they assured us that the program was being aired at the correct time. To make a long story short, the DX reception reports showed otherwise, so we cancelled the program on the Bata station. Response from listeners other than DIErs was very poor.

I hope it is not too late to confirm your report of programming on RADIO AFRICA, Radio Nacional de Guinea Equatorial, the city of Bata.

Marlin also reports that HRVC, the Evangelical Voice of Honduras, celebrated its 25th birthday last December. The station did not have a very impressive beginning back in 1960. It used a piece of wire which was stretched between two trees on a mountain overlooking Tegucigalpa. It broadcast only two hours a day, its power being 1000 watts.

Today HVRC is on the air 18 hours a day using a 10,000 watt MW station, a 5,000 watt SW one, and an FM transmitter. Further expansion is being planned. The station is now involved in a \$50.000 fund-raising project to enable it to build a repeater station in San Pedro Sula,

the second largest city in Honduras.

THIRD, ANY LAW STEMMING FROM HR3378 WOULD BE VIRTUALLY UNENFORCE'BLE, EVEN THOUGH IT WOULD MAKE CRIMINALS OF ORDINARY AMERICANS FOR LISTENING TO AIRPLANES, TRAINS AND SHORTWAVE UTILITY STATIONS. MANY OF THESE LISTENERS ARE ELDERLY AND MANY ARE DISABLED. RADIO LISTENING IS ONE WAY FOR THEM TO FIND OUT ABOUT AND ENJOY WHAT IS GOING ON IN THE WORLD.

FINALLY, THE BILL SHIFT THE RESPONSIBILITY AND COST FOR COMMUNICATION SECURITY FROM THE SYSTEM PROVIDER TO THE GENERAL PUBLIC.

WE URGE THAT THE FINAL FORM OF HR3378 PERMIT AMERICANS TO CONTINUE TO LISTEN TO ANY RADIO SIGNALS TO WHICH THEY ARE NOW PERMITTED BY FEDERAL LAW.

WE REQUEST THAT THE ASSOCIATION BE SCHEDULED TO TESTIFY ON HR3378 AT THE COMMITTEE HEARING ON JANUARY 30, 1986 OR A SUBSEQUENT D'TE IF WE CANNOT BE ACCOMODATED ON THAT DATE.

WE STAND READY TO AID YOU AND YOUR STAFF IN REWORKING HR3378 SO THAT IT TRULY REPRESENTS THE INTEREST OF ALL AMERICANS. A MORE DETAILED ANALYSIS OF HR3378 WILL FOLLOW SHORTLY. AS A MATTER OF COURTESY, COPIES OF THIS MAILGRAM HAVE BEEN SENT TO THE STAFFS OF REPRESENTATIVE JACK BROOKS AND CARLOS MOORHEAD.

Swift IDs among extensive nx format, TCs, simply "en América". F sig but must use 7000's attenuator to clear of aplatter.

R Pucallpa probably the unID reportd on 6154.7. I have on low side 6155. Vy hard to sep from het, at 1025 however hrd sev1 IDs into 1031 w/melodic intervals between. Copy hurt by fading--"Buenos Días, Señores Campesinos, LV de Pucallpa, depto de Amazonas". Sev1 ments of Amazonas, and Loreto pronounced here virtually absent the "R", and the et is like in Etna. I once, 2 yrs ago had an incredible sig from the extremely exotic R Loreto on 5050, but was nuts trying to ID it until I realized they didn't even remotely enunciate Loreto as low-RAY-toe, but this is probably variable somewhat on heritage of ancrs.

Yes, certainly is R Norandina, 4460, in best yet 26/1 0405 t/in, relatively free of QRM. Quite rustic Andean mx w/yips & yelps thrown in, at times. R Nordina [sic] ID given at brief 0430, minute more of mx, then NA to 0435*; SIO 333 on what was surely a good PM. Then noted 2 days running at 0400-0435*, solid fair levels; I'd have to upgrade Nordina to a reliable source of DX listening, as their sig seems significantly consident [sic] now and not propagational va-

gary.

R Huancavelica in at fair plus level on good AM 26/1, on 48854 at 1050 t/in, w/some stylized Andean mx, huaynos, an Emmio Morricone melody at 1059, then Pv nx by W to 1105; back to mx, 1115 ID, t/out. M w/nx to 1125 TCs, ID, ad for a producto nacional, huayno to 1130 & Libertad ID. Still in at 1133 t/out but fading, 1142 check poor but still quite a late propagation; can only imagine what it was like 1030-1100 of this at times crowded fq, it was only stn noted. Libertad, relatively speaking, (as opposed to the more basic Andeans) is rather slick w/smooth nx ancr, taped ads & promos, etc. Again

at good level on 5040 at 0910 t/in to 0945 t/out, really fine & creative new sound here, like a mix of Huayno, Jamaican Ska, and even having a C&W pedal guitar backing, all it seemed by one group, quite something!

Fading up strongly on 4840 and for moment at 1040 stronger than Valera, lively Andean mx, yipe. ID is a clear Andahuaylas--1 have not logged this for 5 yrs. & 1've tried; by 1044 buried by Valera. Maw, you never know what is will happen --hey, this is a neat one, at 1050 t/out it is 433+ in USB 31/1.

Took opportunity of this VG AM, 2nd in a row, and by the way the evening betw

30/1 & 31/1 AMs was average -- to check situation on 4950, & Madre de Diós was absent and the much tougher Ucayali was in, at 1052 t/in and used USB to dig out-best yet, but still poor to 2+, but held until 1120, M w/nx 1105-1120, numerous Ucayali IDs, also again Campo mx.

Eek! My cup runneth over, as first Andahuaylas showing on 4840 (only note Valera, at brief check at 1040 4/2) but now a big sig from R Chinchaycocha on 4860. Noted strong carrier here at 1005, but no audio. Came back at 1027 & hrd lively huaynos and then full ID from 1029 to 1033. Obviously a recent reactivation as I haven't noted this at all on 4860, a clear channel in AM, in a very long-time, and note no loggings of it this fall or winter, at least. Hope it stays on. Prop this AM was G, but no way exceptional, so it should be readily available. It's been a good Peruvian winter, for DX, i.e.




