The discussion in last month's CONTACT about the RNI pirates prompted Russ Lay (Lawrencevtle. Georgla) - he edits the GSL column for the ASWLC - to send some interesting matertal about the position of broadcast ptrates in international law:
[...] I took a course in international law, and after hearing and reading press reports about [RNI]. I remembered my old text book having something to say about pirates. After reading the article you'll see that pirates are essentually vulnerable to being "legally" shut down if the offended country sees it to do so. Two questions are ralsed in my mind however. A) This information is readily avallable. I wonder why the RNI guys didn't check this out before blowing $\$ 100.000$ on a Ilve day venture, and B) I wonder why the Brittsh have not moved to shut down the new pirates - Laser588 and Radio Carolline? Seems precedent is certainly on their side. Anyways, hope you enjoy this.
The textbook is by Gerhard von Glahn: Low Among Nattons (Macmillan. 1976). Piracy is defined as the crime of robbery and depredation of any public avenue of communication or travel by persons not holding a commission from an established state (with thanks to the Oxford English Dictlonary). In a chapter entitled "Jurisdiction Over National Air and Outer Space." (pp. 370-372) von Glahn has a section devoted to radio communications. He begins with a history of the varlous conventions that have been convened in order to artive at international agreements about the regulation of the air waves. Then comes the interesting bits:
[...)One of the basic regulations adopted by the Telecommunications Union has been the requirement that all radio stations must be operated in such manner as to avoid interference with the communications services of all contracting governments or agenctes authorized by them. This regulation has been volated on a wholesale basis by the governments of the Soviet bloc states, which have caused to be set up extenstve systems of radio stations purposely designed to interfere with ( am ) broadcasts from western Europe and from the United States.

Around 1958 a new phenomenon in the communications sphere made its appearance and soon involved several aspects of international law - plrate broadcasting.

Prtvately-owned radio stations, located on vessels anchored or salling outside the territortal sea, or established on artificial islands beyond territortal Jurisdictions, began to broadcast to states whose governments did not permit. or controlled rigomusly, the transmission of commercial advertistig.

Under the rules of the Telecommunications Union, such com-
merctal broadcasting from international waters was prohibited, but responsibility for enforcement rested on the country in which the vessel in question was registered.
One of the major fallings of international law has always been enforcement - making the laws has never been a problem: governments just love to make laws. Enforcement, however, would require that all of the signatory parties to a law would have to give up some of thetr autonorny as independent states - thetr sovereignty. Enforcement has almost always, therefore, been the concern of the injured party. Thus it is that when Russia breaks international law by jamming legttomate broadcasts, th is the appropriate government agencles in each country whose broadcasts are janmed that must lodge protests with the Russlan government. The same principle holds true with respect to pirate broadcasters, only in this case, enforcement (even by an inditdual government) is probably going to be a lot more more effective than that undertaken against a sovereign government.

Von Clahn then goes on to cite a number of instances of pirate broadcasters who came afoul of broadcast law - both ctvll and international. Among thern is the interesting case of Radio Veronica
[... Jhaving been so popular in the Netheriands that the Dutch government mittially [...] refused to ratify the 1965 Councll of Europe Treaty [...] fearing that such a step would cost it too many votes'.
[...|On January 20, 1965, the Counctl of Europe opened to strnature the European Agreement for the prevention of Bmadcasts Transmitted from Stations Outside National Territories. Ad in 1967, the Untted Kingdorn enacted the Marine Broadcasting Oflenses Act, making it a criminal offense to assist a plrate station in any manner, after an earller (1964) Territortal Waters Order in Councll. alrned at the stations located on flxed tower sites.
Votes and popularity: I wonder if these sensttive issues are at the bottom or the British Govermment's sceming lack of interest in moving against the ptrates? Perhaps that is too cynical. Then agatn, perhaps not...

By a coincidence. I recetved a copy of ACE - a journal devoted, among many other things. to the activitles of plrates: see the CONTACT BOOKCASE in next month's CONTACT.

In last month's column, we had a letter from John Eckert to the effect that he recetves intemational broadcasts on his bedside clock radio. Commenting on this comes a letter from Andrew Wallace (Lowell, Massachusetts):

Wth regards to Father Eckert's note that he recelves SW broadcasts on his clock radio. I would like to share an experience. Back in 1975. I had built a "crystal" radio (from a design in Popular Mechanics), and I strung up a long-wire for it. Later, I plcked up a Radio Shack "Science Fair" crystal radio ktt at a garage sale, and tried tt out on the long-wire. It worked all right, but for some reason, I pulled the ferrite core out of the coll. The AM stations disappeared. and I began recetving some strange. luttery signal. There was a tune being played over and over...was thls someone practicing the plano, or what? After a while, the tune ended, and a man greeted me with. This is Radio Nederland. from Hilversum." When I ran to my father, who was a Ham, and told him that I had heard Holland on the AM band, he set me straight of course, and lent me an anctent Air Castle radio, which had a shortwave band on it.

Well. I still have that crystal set. and when I tried thls experment recently, I got several stations, all at once! I keep thinking about building a crystal set which will tune the 49 meter band. and it should be possible to make one that is halfway selective.

Now, anybody can hear his blender on a shortwave radjo, but is there anyone out there who can hear Deutsche Welle on his Mixmaster?
No, but I'm almost willing to swear (oops) bet (oops again) bear witness to having heard HCJB on the toaster oven...

This month begins not only the DX season but also the time when DX'ers Forum will begin to present feature articles by some of our hobby's most experienced and respected devotees. This month's article by DX'pert Bill Sharp is appropriate to launch this series. For those of you who don't know Bill, he is regarded in many circles as perhaps North America's foremost expert on DX'ing the Pacific Basin and most notably, Indonesia.

## DXIING THE INDONESIAN RADIO COUNTRIES <br> (UPDATED) <br> A FRENDX EXCLUSIVE

The November 1983 FRENDX printed my original article, which was a review of the Indonesian stations currently being heard from the several radio countries into which the political entity of Indonesia has been divided by the NASWA Country List Committee. Since there have been many changes in the station list and program material in the past four years, Chuck Rippel suggested that an update of the article would be appropriate for DX'ers Forum. Because there are many new members of NASWA who have not seen the 1983 article, we felt that a repetition of the entire article with the necessary changes and additional material would be the most beneficial approach.

The NASWA Country List Committee has split the political entity of Indonesia into seven basic groups of islands and made them separate radio countries for logging purposes. There is an eighth country included as the result of the takeover of Portuguese Timor by Indonesia in 1976. The basic reason for the division into so many radio countries is the vast distance between the hundreds of islands spread out along both sides of the equator. The distance between Banda Aceh in the west to Jayapura in the east is substantially greater than the distance between San Diego, California and Portland Maine.

The Country List has divided Indonesia into five main large islands and two smaller groups of islands with Irian Jaya included in Oceania and the balance a part of Asia. From west to east the individual Radio Countries are as follows:

1. Sumatra
2. Java

3- Kalimantan
4-Sulawesi
5 - Irian Jaya
6 - Bali and Lesser Sunda Islands
7. Maluku Islands

8 - Portuguese Timor (East Timor), really a part of the Lesser Sunda group. It was a separate political entity until incorporated into Indonesia by the 1976 takeover of East Timor by Indonesia from the Portuguese, who historically had an SWBC station located at Dili.

INDONESLAN PROPAGATION CONDITIONS - It is a rare morning when reception conditions from al parts of Indonesia into North America are uniform. Indonesia is divided into three time zones. For most of the year, the only low frequency reception in North America from Indonesia is during the period just before and after dawn at the DXer's location. This corresponds to the period between dusk and the evening sign-off in Indonesia.

The Irian Jaya and Maluku stations have the earliest dusk and therefore the earliest fade-in time in North America. Likewise, they sign-off from two to three hours earlier than stations in Sumatra. The fade-in time for stations in Java and Sumatra tends to be about two hours later than for Irian Jaya stations.

It is not unusual to find that reception conditions from Sumatra are entirely different from other areas of Indonesia due to its location far to the west of the rest of the islands It should also be noted that during the winter months in North America, reception of the morning schedules of stations in Sumatra and Java is possible along the Atlantic coast of North America at dusk. The main problem with reception at that time is that the DXer must fight strong ORM from stations in Africa and Latin America in order to pick up the weak Indonesian signals.

In the four years since the original article was prepared, there has been a definite decline in propagation conditions from Indonesia. Reception of many of the stations that formerly were heard on a regular basis has become very irregular. I have not been able to determine if the stations are now broadcasting on highly irregular schedules, or if the problem is perhaps related to changes in propagation conditions or due to deterioration of transmitting equipment and power supply. Indonesians on 120 meters have become so rare that I can't remember when I last heard one.

Another problem during the low sun spot period has been the appearance of all kinds of powerful utility stations all over the 90 meter band. On many mornings, I have found strong utilities occupying every frequency used by an R. R. I. station on 90 meters. We can only hope that the increasing sun spot count will draw the utilities up to higher frequencies leaving some clear spots for the SWBC stations.

CONSTANT CHANGES - Before presenting a review of the stations currently being received from each of the radio countries in Indonesia a warning is in order. These stations are constantly changing frequencies, going off the air with transmitter problems, or coming back on after repairs. Some of the material in this article will very likely be out of date by the time it appears in print.

Another thing to be aware of when logging Indonesian stations on the low frequency bands is that there are several instances where there are two Indonesian stations using approximately the same frequency at the same time. This may be true now of $3241,3265,3345,3385,3905,3945-3946$, but is probably no longer the case with 3960 . Special care must be taken on these frequencies to identify the station that you have actually heard. Show the logging as tentative if you are not sure of the identity. I have tried to indicate the dominant station in my review.

THE CURRENT SITUATION - The majority of the stations mentioned are Radio Republik Indonesia (R.R.I.) stations, since they are the ones that are most likely to be logged throughout North America. In order to save space, 1 have identified the R.R.I. stations only by their locations. Non-R.R.I. stations are clearly indicated by RPD etc., to prevent confusion.

## SUMATRA

1) Banda Aceh is the most westerly station in Indonesia. It is still using both 3905 and 4955 . I suspect that the power listings of 50 kw . for 3905 and 10 kw . for 4955 are both vastly overstated. 3905 is frequently blocked by Radio New Ireland and 4955 is a rare catch. However east coast DXers should look for 4955 at dusk in the winter months.
2) Medan was formerly one of the better Sumatrans with consistent reception of 4764 variahle up to 4766. That was prior to the arrival of Radio Moscow's Cuban relay station on 4765 . Now you have to be lucky to catch Medan on that frequency. It also uses 3375 with lower power.
3) Pekanbaru still has the highest frequency and should be the best possibility on the East Coast. It has made small shifts in frequency during the past four years between 5886 and 5882 . The past year or so it moved away from 5886 due to interference from Echo of the Masses. It has settled on 5894, at least for the present.
4) Palembang on 4856 used to be one of the old reliables. It is still using this frequency, but overpowering utilities have completely eliminated reception of Palembang.
5) Sibolga has been fairly consistent on approximately 5256. It is reported in Australia on 3241, but this frequency doesn't seem to reach North America very often.
6) Bukittingi remains a rare catch on 4910 . Its best signal is on 3232 during strong Sumatran openings.
7) Jambi provides some good news. It has been back of 4927 for the past two years and has provided some consistent reception as early as 1100 . It is now one of the better Sumatrans.
8) Padang There is no change here. It still has a strong signal at times on 4003 , which remains a very poor utility-plagued frequency. There was a time when it used to share 3960 with Palu, and this could happen again in the future.
9) Tanjung Kerang is still on 3395 where it suffers from severe QRM from a Papuan and Radio Zaracay. On the West Coast, the best time to look for this station is at local dawn when most of the interference has faded out.
10) Tanjung Pinang has become extremely irregular on 3225 . Transmitter problems or power supply problems seem to have resulted in very early sign-off times. Now it is not heard at all for long periods.
11) Bengkulu still is reported on about 3265, but there is still a battle between Bengkulu and Gorontalo on this frequency with utilities also dominating at simes. Currently Gorontalo has drifted up to about 3266, where it still puts in a strong signal during good Indonesian openings. Gorontalo, like many of the other R.R.I. stations, takes the evening off at times. Then it has been possible to hear what I assume was Bengkulu with a weaker signal on 3264 (although I didn't catch an I.D.). Others have reported Bengkulu on this frequency.
12) RPD T2 Labuhanbatu reported in the 1983 list is still at times reported in Australia on a variety of frequencies in the area between 3790 and 3860 but doesn't seem to be making it into North America.

## JAVA

1) Jakarta is most often reported on its International Service frequencies in various languages. Check with WRTH for times and frequencies. The domestic service of R.R.I. Jakarta still is most easily heard on the tropical bands. The best frequency is 4774 . A different program can be heard on 3277 , but with much lower power. This station also uses the 49 m . band frequency of 6045 where QRM from powerful international broadcasters renders reception close to impossible.
2) Bandung is the chief station for Java Barat. It was very irregular on 3204 for a long time and seemed to be having transmitter problems. It has been heard again recently on this frequency, but the signal is still weak and subject to QRM from Radio West Sepik.
3) Jawa Tengah Yogyakarta on 5046 still provides very consistent reception and still bas been heard with a short program in heavily accented English at 1130 UTC.
4) Surakarta once was the strong signal on 60 m . from Java. It used alternate frequencies of 4932 and 4900. For the past year it seems to have dropped 4900 in favor of 4932 . However, something is definitely wrong in Surakarta. For years it had the earliest fade-in of any of the Javan stations and was just booming in at local dawn. During the last six months I haven't heard a thing on 4932 prior to around 1400 . The few times that I have heard Surakarta, it has been around dawn with a fairly clear signal. I have seen nothing to indicate that it has been using an alternate frequency.
5) Semarang, 3935 still can be heard through ham QRM on a good Indonesian morning.
6) Jawa Timur, has Surabaya as the provincial capital. The main R.R.I. station in the province is R.R.I. Surabaya which has settled down on approximately 3976. The signal is not strong, but it can be heard on a good Indonesian opening. The best non-R.R.I. station on the air is still RKIP Surabaya on 4699 , where it has remained relatively free of QRM. This is the best bet for DXers in eastern North America who want to log a non-R.R.I. Indonesian. A more difficult catch is still on the air on 3000. It is RKPD T1 Jawa Timur.
7) The other Jawa Timur stations mentioned in the 1983 article remain extremely rare catches due to low power and heavy utility QRM. They are Maidun on 3286, Malang on 3381. I don't know if Sumenep on Madura Island is still on 3355.
8) A Javan station that was off the air for years and has recently moved to a frequency that does make a logging possible is Bogor now on 3953. It is subject to the usual ham QRM, however. When it returned to the air it was reported on the impossible frequency of 3960 . The move to 3953 has made a logging at local dawn possible but still difficult due to low power.
9) There are low power RPD stations on Java. Reception of these stations the last four years has been so rare that there would be no point in trying to list them here since 1 don't known if they are still on the air.

## KALIMANTAN

This area could still be difficult to $\log$ on the Atlantic Coast since most of the stations are on 80 or 90 meters and subject to heavy QRM.

1) Samarinda still remains a memory. To the best of my knowledge, R.R.I. Samarinda has not been on short wave since the 1983 article appeared. I have not heard it on any of its old frequencies, and I have seen no reports of loggings. If it does return, look for it on its most recent frequency of 3295.
2) Pontianak has been unusually clear for the past six months on 3995. The usual Russian stations have either moved to another frequency or have been off the air. This has allowed the clear reception of Pontianak. This station is still listed and sometimes reported on 3346 . The only Indonesian 1 hear on 3345 or 3346 is R.R.I. Ternate. Pontianak does put in an occasional appearance on about 3447 , but this is very rare, and the power is low.
3) Bandjarmasin on 3250 is an "if only" station. If only that overpowering UTE would leave the frequency, Bandjarmasin would be regular. Sometimes it even comes in through the UTE, but not often.
4) Palangkaraya on 3325 (erroneously listed as 3225 in 1983) still has a lot of competition on 3325, but it does come through at times.
5) The RPD $T 2$ Bulungan listed in 1983 on 2977 unfortunately does not seem to be on the air at the present time. One of the main problem with the RPD stations is that they come and go and don't stay on the air for a very long time.

## SULAWESI

1) Ujung Pandang, 4719 with its 50 kw . transmitter still puts in the strongest Indonesian signal of all of the R.R.I. regionals. It should be the first regional logged in most areas of North America. Even with a high power U.S. Navy utility transmitter located less than 100 miles from my home on 4720 , Ujung Pandang can always be heard reasonably well. The station has a second transmitter on 4753 which is used as an altemate frequency at times. On many of the big Indonesian or Moslim holidays, 4719 and 4753 are heard in parallel.
2) Kendari on 4000 still fades in fairly early and provides fairly consistent reception.
3) Palu, 3960 is getting more difficult to copy. The Chinese regional and other stations in Asia are causing heavy QRM. At least R.R.I. Bogor has moved to 3953, and Padang doesn't seem to be using 3960 as and alternate frequency any more.
4) Gorontalo on nominal 3265 has been heard as high as 3266.4 , but it currently seems to have settled down on 3264.6 It is not providing reception at the strong level of a few years ago. It apparently is having transmitter or power problems. The station is either off the air or on very reduced power frequently. There is a second low power transmitter that drifts around in the area between 3794 and 3805 but is not heard in North America very often.
5) Menado still is heard regularly on 3215 where it seems to escape the ORM most of the time that causes so many problems for the other 90 meter Indonesians. It should be noted that the station now signs off immediately after the end of the 1200 Jatarta news relay, This is usually some time between 1220 and 1230. Love Ambon is not heard at sign-off. Instead some electronic organ music is heard. The alternate 49 meter frequency of 5987.5 has been used a few times in the past usually until around 1000 UTC. At present nothing is heard on this frequency.
6) There has been no sign of RPD T2 POSO on 3524.

## BALI \& LESSER SUNDA ISLANDS

This is still the really difficult area of Indonesia.

1) Denpasar 3945 is now listed in TBS at 5 kw . I still doubt that the station is effectively radiating more than 1 KW . It only appears on the very top Indonesian openings, and even then with only a weak signal. Ternate and Tanjungkarang are both listed as having alternate frequencies here, so when an Indonesian is heard of 3945 , you never know for certain the identity unless an actual I.D. is heard. Denpasar has started sending out a very nice QSL card since my 1983 article.
2) Singaraja 3398 remains a very difficult logging. I haven't noted any recent reports on it, so I can't be certain that it is still on the air.
3) Mataram 3223 is still heard infrequently on goad Indonesian openings.
4) Kupang, 3385 still has to fight its way through Rabaul in order to be heard in North America. The best time to catch Kupang is in locations where the band is still open after Rabaul signs-off.
5) RPD T2 Ngada, Bajawa, Flores Island, 2904.5 has been the best RPD heard at my location for the last two years. This doesn't mean that it is an easy catch. If you think that you are getting top Indonesian reception conditions some morning, tune down to 2904.5 and look for this station.

## EAST TIMOR - PORTUGUESE TIMOR

The only station that I know of here remains R.R.I. Dili. The station seems to have settled down on 3306. It is well to remember, however, that the station has a history of frequent changes of its frequency and that 3120 was an alternate frequency for many years. Reception of Dili has been very poor and infrequent recently.

## MALUKU ISLANDS

In contrast to Lesser Sunda and East Timor, this area should be relatively easy catch in most areas of North America.

1) Ambon has again shifted away from its old 4845 frequency. It is now heard on 4835 with what seems to be a new high power transmitter. In spite of the fact that 4835 is just as poor a frequency as 4845, Ambon now dominates on 4835 in my location in San Francisco. It continues to have an early fade-in at 0900 or earlier, and instead of being completely lost in QRM by 1000 as was normally the case on 4845 , it continues to dominate the frequency until dawn. It should be noted that Ambon does not carry the 1200 UTC Jakarta relay. It has its own musical program at this time. Also on my last check on it, Ambon did not carry the 1300 Jakarta relay either. Ambon has a low power transmitter on 3241 that is only heard during top Indonesian openings.
2) Ternate is another well heard R.R.I. from this area. Even during the poor Indonesian propagation conditions of the past couple of years. Ternate has continued to be heard reasonably well on 3345 . Pontianak is also listed on 3345, but Ternate is the station that will normally be heard there.

## IRIAN JAYA

This is probably the Indonesian "country" that is situated the closest to North America. It has the earliest fade-in time of any of the Indonesians and also the earliest sign-off. Like Portuguese Timor, it was a colonial territory at the end of World War II. It was a part of Netherlands New Guinea, and there were SWBC stations located at Biak and Sorong. In 1963 , pending the turn over of the territory to Indonesia, the United Nations operated an SWBC station at Hollandia (now Jayapura) on 6070. For the past twenty-three or so years, Indonesia has been the colonial master of Irian Jaya and there are several R.R.I. stations now operating there. Constant changes of frequency has been the story of most of these stations as well as transmitter problems. At least two of these stations should be logged in most areas of North America.

1) Jayapura, is the key R.R.I. station for Irian Jaya. Strange as it may seem, it is one of the more difficult loggings at present. The best chance still seems to be the transmitter on 9612 between about 0900 and 1100 . It is virtually impossible to hear the transmitter on about 6071 due to the many other stations on the same frequency. There is a low power transmitter on about 5044 to 5045 that sometimes can be heard.
2) Biak, is one that has been all over the dial. After a long period on 5451 it suddenly moved up to 5500.5 ; then back down to 5451 again. Then it just disappeared until it was finally found on the 49 meter band on split frequency of 5982.5, where it has settled down for the present. Biak is the one R.R.I. station that seems to adhere to a policy of ignoring all reception reports and follow-ups.
3) Sorong was on the move a bit during that last four years too. It spent quite a bit of time on 4871 , but it has been back on its normal 4975 for some time now. It puts in a fairly strong signal, but at times the modulation level is too low and there is QRM from other stations. The appearance of the new Chinese station Voice of the Jinling on 4875 has resulted in severe QRM to Sorong after 1100 UTC.
4) Manokwari, seems to have left the 49 meter frequency of 6188 and can only be heard on 3986 where there is heavy interference from the Korean station on 3985.
5) Serui has been a regular on 4607 where it has fairly clear signals.
6) Fakfak has been putting in a surprisingly clear signal on 4790 that has been aided in San Francisco at least, by poor reception from R. Atlantida.
7) Wamena has had a greatly improved signal the past year. For quite a while it alternated between 4867 and 5043. When Sorong left 4871, Wamena gradually moved up from 4867 until it reached 4871. It is now being heard on 4871 with fair signal strength. It should be noted that Wamena does not relay the 1200 Jakarta news. The station signs off at 1207 to 1210 UTC. This gives DXers east of the west coast of North America an opportunity to hear a Love Ambon sign-off.
8) Other Irian Jaya stations: Merauke is listed for 3905, but I don't know if anyone has beard it on this frequency. Nabire was heard a few times on listed 5055 but now seems to be back on the 49 meter band at approximately 6127. In any event, both of these stations have to be considered extremely rare DX.

Use of Indonesian Station Lists: Because of the many changes in stations and frequencies reported above, one would think that keeping an Indonesian station list is futile. My own experience is that if you are serious about Indonesian DX, you never destroy an old Indonesian list. While the stations tend to move around the dial on a regular basis, a large number of them eventually return to one of their old frequencies. It may be ten years or more before this happens.

Identification of what appears to be a new Indonesian station that has not been reported on a particular frequency by a DXer in North America is extremely difficult. We are usually dealing with a weak signal through a high noise level and possibly QRM from other stations. Identification of such a station from scratch with no clue as to possible identity can be an impossible task. However, if our "new" station happens to be an old favorite that has moved back to one of its old frequencies, as so often happens, an old and out of date frequency list might just supply a needed clue. This will give you an idea of what to listen for during the weak I.D. announcement. Without the clue, the announcement would be just so much hash.

IDENTIFICATION OF INDONESIAN STATIONS - Because of the many changes in frequencies, the use of the same frequency by more than one Indonesian station, and the on again - off again nature of their operation, accurate identification of the station being heard before reporting a definite logging is important. Yes, the Indonesians do broadcast local identifications. The R.R.I. stations tend to ID more often than the RPD stations, and the stronger signals make it easier to ID the R.R.I. stations.

Obviously, there will be no local ID during a Jakarta relay period. The relays are heard on all of the R.R.I. and most of the RPD stations at 1200,1300 and 1500 and last from fifteen to around thirty minutes.

The time to be alert for a local ID is at the end of a local musical program, just before the start of a Jakarta relay. The announcer at the regional station will give the station ID, if he has time, prior to the commencement of the interval signal, tanda tunggu, on the chimes normally described by Indonesian DXers as S.C.I., Song of the Coconut Islands, which should be listed in your reception reports as Rayuan Pulau Kelapa and not Love Ambon.

The other time to be especially alent for a local ID is after a Jakarta relay ends. You will always know when a Jakarta relay or even a regional or local news session is about to end. There is a recorded patriotic song or anthem by a large mixed chorus and orchestra. When the anthem ends, the local announcer will come back on and normally give a complete ID before the local program continues. Local ID's are often heard on the half hour also.

Unfortunately the matter of the "anthem" at the end of the Jakarta relay is now subject to regular changes also. For many years, the "anthem" was sung by a large mixed chorus with a symphony orchestra. For a while the large mixed chorus was dropped, and there was jusi a few bars of the music by the orchestra. Then about a year ago, the large mixed churus was heard again, but there was only a piano accompaniment. The most recent change has dropped the chorus again, and only a few bars of music by the large orchestra is heard. So be prepared for an ID shortly after hearing any of the above.

While it has not been my intention to go into the matter of QSL from the Indonesian stations and writing Indonesian reception reports in this article, probably the best news to be reported at this time is Gerry Dexter's Language Lab in Indonesian. This should be available at Tiare Publications by the time that this article is printed. Obtaining the forms needed to put together a satisfactory reception report in Bahasa Indonesian has always been a problem for DXers. Anyone who has used one of Gerry's Language Labs for Spanish or French reception reports will know what a great help the new book will be in preparing Indonesian reception reports.

LOVE AMBON - There continues to be confusion over Love Ambon and Song of the Coconut Islands (S.C.I.). S C.I. is the interval signal played on what sounds like a carillon. Love Ambon is only played at sign-off. It is a hauntingly beautiful melody on a kroncong in an arrangement that reminds one of the Hawaiian steel guitar. Most of the R.R.I. stations and some of the RPD's use Love Ambon as a sign-off melody as follows: at the end of the day's schedule, the announcer makes a short ID announcement. The Love Ambon melody starts. After a few seconds, the announcer makes his final announcement which includes a complete ID along with the wavelength (gelombang) in use and the station's location. Then Love Ambon continues for possibly a minute unil the power is switched off.

For those who have not yet experienced the joy of DXing the Indonesian stations. I hope that the information included in this article will provide an incentive. Those who desire to increase their Scoreboard Country total will have every reason to concentrate on the Indonesian Radio Countries. Try it, and don't forget to report your loggings to FRENDX.

## Contact Bookshimer

It has been a very real pleasure to see the growth and development of the Radio Database International It has always been a wonderful reference, but the latest edition (1988) is absolutely superb, and a real steal at the $\$ 14.95$ plus $\$ 1.95$ shipping (surface, worldwide) or plus $\$ 9.95$ shipping (alrmall, worldwide). The book - now called Passport to World Band Radio - has a new and glossy, eye-catching cover, and is in three sections (almost 400 pages). First, there is a section of artucles about how to listen to SW - sorry, world band - radio. by experts such as Don Jensen. There are also articles about some broadcasters including one by Ian McFarland about Radio Canada International Second, there is a wonderful series of excellently written thumbnail descriptions of just about every SW radio on the market (these are, in part. based on the RDI White Papers that deke into great and welcome detail about a large number of recetvers, antennas, and general topics see below).

The third section, and the heart of the book, is a listing by frequency of SW broadcasters. This 255 -page compendium of intemational broadcasting is as easy to use, and useful as any reference that I can think of. The graphic format is stmplicty tiself to use, and the information ts easy to assmilate, and - most mportant of all - accurate (as far as my own listening checks have indicated). Also included is a valuable cross-reference to frequencies used by country. In shor. there Is very little that cannot be found out about acturty on world band radio from the Passport to World Band Radio, and it ought to be in your shack/library.

Most SWL retallers stock this book and you can obtain it from them. Altemately. you can write to International Broadcasting Services. Lid., P. O. Box 300, Penn's Park, Pennsylvania 18943. USA. You might also ask for a listing of the most recent RDI White Papers (a list is given in Passport to World Band Radio).

#### Abstract

I1s the season of Hot DX！All us dial twisters are out there happliy tweaking the frequencies．But some of us live in cooler climes and the drafts are rising as the static crashes fall away．The users of solid state equipment are forced to shiver and shake in cold communication monitoring．It is in this season that those who still love the Uacuum Tube stay warm as we dx，warming our hands over the glowing capsules of faint reddish light．

To remind us of this hollow state warmth I turn my column over to ANDREW $G$ ．WALLACE as he comforts our freezing solid state brothers and sisters with a receiver review of one of the truely great communications receivers of all time，THE NATIDNAL HRD－50－1．Take it away Andu！！！


## THE NATIONAL KRD－50－1 <br> by Andrew G．Wallace

To make this review more interesting，I am not going to go into dry specifications．Instead，I will highlight the features of the HRO－ 50－1 that are unusual when compared with its $0 X$ siblings．

In 1951，$\$ 359.00$ F．D．B．Malden，Massachusetts got you a shany new National HRD－50，and For an extra $\$ 10.75$ you could get the matching speaker．Now，this was not small peanuts，but the quality of construction of this set seemed to vouch for its high price．The 50R1 model mounts in a standard 19－Inch rack（like the Collins R390A and others），and the model I have，the SOT1，is a table model．This receiver has an attractive gray finish，rounded corners，controls with very positive＂feel＂，and a comfortable panal layout．I alsolike the S－meter style National used here，with a yellow scale up to 5－9，and a red scale to +40 dB ．

One of the first things you will notice about this receiver is the large＂micrometer＂dial，characteristic of the HRO series．Ihis tuning knob has markings around the circumference，along with five small whondows which allow numbers on a dial underneath to show through．It is geared such that these numbers advance，counting by ten，and when used in conjunction with the markings between the windows，it provides a＂logging scale＂reading from zero to 500.

Io change bands，another old National Feature is utilized．Band coverage is determined by a plug－in cail set which is inserted in the Front panel of the $H R O$ ．I have a set of six coils cavering $4 B 0 \mathrm{kHz}$ to 30 MHz ，and other cail blanks were available to extend coverage down to 50 kHz ．Most coil sets had a band－spread range，which was brought into play by moving four silver－plated springs contacts on the coll set before inserting it into the receiver．Main tuning is shown on the slide－rule dial drum，which has space for eight band scales， corresponding to the coil sets purchased．A knob brings the proper scale into view．If coil set has a band－spread feature，the upper half of the scale shows general coverage and the lower half shows the band－spread（usually for the amateur bands）．

The HRO－50 is not without shortcamings，as it is a sixteen tube direct－conversion superheterodyne．Therefore，you will occasionally find images，especially near the 49 meter band．Also，on some bands， the dial markings are almost impractically too close together．（My brother saved my DX life when he built me a combination signal generator／frequency counter，which read to the $k H z$ and made finding frequencies on the HRO－50 much easier．Sorry，but I don＇t have a schematic！）A plus is that the receiver is stable when warmed up，and the tuning dial is free of backlash．Its sensitivity is also good，and it worked well when I used only a simple indoor antenna．

Accessories were available．A $100 / 1000 \mathrm{kHz}$ crystal calibrator could be mounted inside the cabinet，and switched on at the front panel，as could a narrow－band F．M．adapter．National also offered an sctive audio filter，the Select－ロ－Ject，which interfaced via a connector on the rear pansl．An external speaker could be purchased， in either a rack or a table model to match the receiver．The spacs on the HRD say that the output is＂high fidelity＂thare is a phonograph input）and that eight watts are available．I find I like the sound better with the tone contral turned up a bit．

Decasionally，a decent KRO－50T1 may be found at the Ham flea markets，with saveral coll sets，at perhaps $\$ 100.00$ ．If you are starting a collection of＂boat anchors＂，uhy not include one with style？Seriously，the HRC series is a receiver design that is unique and worthy of attention．I can only think of one NASWA cantributar who listed the HROSO as his main receiver．I started Swling on an anciant Air Castle table radio（anybody ramember the Magic Eye Tube？and so the MRD－SD was my first＂real＂recelver．Perhaps that is why I am Fand of it．Besides，are you willing to bet that your Icom，or Kenwood，or what－have－you will be running well 35 years down the $0 X$ road，as this receiver（and athers like it）is？

Do you know of a new program for a computer (does NOT have to be MS-DOS or C-54 stuff), or a new BBS with SWL related materlals?? Drop me a note or a phone call and lat me know! This is YOUR column, I only edit it! Look forward to hearing from many of you SOON!!

## INFDRMAIIUN, FIEASE . . -

I have had a number of people ask me about the different concepts in software: Shareware, Freeware, Public Damain. Since this is a commonly asked question, especially by the new computer user, I thought I would try to set the record straight!

Public Domain software is just what the name implies. It is software that the author has written and released to the public, without expectations of ANY remuneration. Most often found on BBSs, there are literally thousands of pd programs out there for the choosirg; many of them are excellent, and many of them are real dogs. It is up to YOU to decide what you want!

From all that I have found, shareware and freeware are essentially the same. They are also referred to as user supported software. User Supported software is a means for the computing community to recelve quelity software while directly supporting the software authors. It is based on the following ideas:

1: That the value and utility of software is best assessed by the user on his/her own system Only after using a program can you really determine whether it serves personal applications, needs and tastes.

2: That the creation of Independent personal computer software can and should be supported directly by the computing community.

3: That copying of programs should be encouraged rather than restricted. The ease with which software can be distributed outside the traditional commercial channels reflects the. STRENGTHS, rather than the weakness, of electronic information transfer.

Under the user supported concept, anyone may raquest a copy of a user supported program by sending a blank, formatted disk to the program author together with an addressed postage-paid disk mailer. A copy of the program, elong with the documentation, will be sent by return mail on your disk.

The program carries a notice suggesting registration of the program. Registration is voluntary on your part. It is, after all, YDUR consclaus that you have to llve with!

Regardless of whether you register or not (you should, hint-hint), you are encouraged to copy and distribute the program for the private, non-commercial use of others.

## THE PINE:ANDS BBS: AN OVERVIEW

The PINELANDS BBS, operated by Tom Sundstrom, is a MS-DOS based bulletin board, using the RBBS software package. As part of the SEAdog network, Pinelands communicates regularly with other SWL BBSs around the country, Including the ACE BBS and several FIDO boards. Operating at $300 / 1200 / 2400$ baud, Iom has put together a board that includes an active and interesting message base, as well as a large selection of downloadable program files for Swl/ham enthusiasts.

Taking a moment to glance at the downloads, Tom has included some VERY interesting files. As an example, you have at your disposal PROPPLUS, a SWL-oriented propagation prediction program. Another file will yield a WORLD TIME CLOCK, which will display the time anywhere in the world right on your computer screen! Some of the other files include the SPEEDX Africa column, courtesy of Al Quaglieri, text files of $S W$ jammers that have been identified, logbook programs, GRAYLINE programs, and even files for other computer users, such as files for aBase lIt. One that I found extremely interesting is called UTIL_LOG.ARC. This file is a logging record program that Tom wrote. To use it, you would enter data gathered from Sw bulletins 8 magazines, and it places it ALL into a file, by frequency, that you can scan or search, reports of your logging by day or frequency, plus a master list.

All told, Tom has put together an excellent BBS. Certainly worth the call, you should try the PINELANDS BBS at (609) 859-1910. Access can be gained without any payment or access fees, but it would be very helpful if you could donate either a small sum or upload files to the board. I know from my personal experience of running a BBS that it takes lots of time AND money - I am sure that Tom would appreciate it!

After failing to overcome jam problem, $R N$ had to suspend daily pgrmes sevl months ago. Judge decided to forbid 'any attempt to jam or interfere $\mathrm{w} / \mathrm{stn}$ 's pgmes or $\mathrm{w} / \mathrm{ac}$ tivities related to bcing of its pgmmes'. Certain sectors believe the decision indicates jam of this stn'll stop. In last few years, stn has played important role on nat. 1 scene, mostly as critic of govt actions. However, jammers have not been IDed, and Antelco says it does not have necessary eqp to detect sources of jamming. El Diario reported 27/8: Humberto Rubin, dir of RÑ said court ruling is useless now, merely constituting admission that there was interference. And he added that Antel.co has not renewed the stn's licence "as a punishment for closing down. Therefore, this injunxion is tantamount to baptising a dead person since it came six months after we requested it" (WBI 4/9)

Notes (in no particular orderl: AWR Europe's Sunday $0 x$ show has a pretty oood signal at 08i5, judging from the tapes made. HCJB from 0035 on noted on 9875 (ex-9870). Vatican at 0050 on new 6150 (ex-6030): 6030 is buried by a strong AFRTS signal. North Korea at 1100 on new 6576 (ex-9977): I finally heard the full schedule when band conditions improved in early September. Libya noted at 2100 , an hour earlier than before, on $8 / 29$ but not heard regularly. Pakistan on 15605 fairly decent at $1600+$, and acceptable on 11570 at 1630 but worsens as the afternoon wears on. Portugal here is best at 2030 on 9740 to Europe than any other time. Bye bye China at 1200 UT to NA -- RCI to NA has moved to 11855 Mon-Fri. Greece at 1920 moved to 11645 (ex-9395). RAI, ltaly, at 1935, dropped 11800 and added 7290 . The listing now reflects the correct English-to-Europe prograning Czechoslovakia offers at 18,19 and 22 UT . SCDX 1954 says Greece is on 9420 at 2335, in addition to the frequencies 1 list here, but 1 sure can't hear it. I doubt that KCBI is active on $S W$ despite an announcement a month or two ago that it would on the air Saturdays and Sundays: I sure can thear it here, but I list it just in case it surfaces again. Virtually all of the RRT (Belgium) frequencies will change aqain as of November 1 : the ones listed now are good to October 31. At 2105, Syria has now dropped 9950 and moved to 11650, which offers a betcer signal than 12085 here.
