New, Improved ANARC Computer BBS Now Open!

The new ANARC Computer bulletin-board system went online June 28th, according to system operator Kirk Baxter. The new telephone number is 309-688-0604. Open 24 hours a day, seven days a week, the system supports communications at 300 or 1200 baud, and uses standard transmission parameters ( $8-\mathrm{N}-1$ ). The BBS's mail address is: ANARC BBS, P.O. Box 3436, Peoria, IL 61614.
r In addition to message and file areas maintained by ANARC, there are areas for the ANARC-affiliated clubs, for Radio Netherlands' "Media Network" program, the FidoNet's international SWL and Ham EchoConferences, and for public messages relating to shortwave, VHF and UHF monitoring. Electronic editions of radio publications are also available in the magazine section. The first four ANARC clubs to open message areas in this new electronic showcase are NASWA, SPEEDX, the Association of Clandestine radio Enthusiasts ( $A^{*} C * E$ ) and the Minnesota DX Club (MDXC). Others are expected to join them soon.

Each club has been asked to designate someone to act as their subsystem operator, to work with Kirk Baxter and our new Computer Information Committee Chairman, David Snyder, in adapting the system software to each club's needs, and to oversee their club's message and file areas. Among the subsysops named so far are: Kirk Baxter ( $A * C * E$ ), Dave Hamer (Miami Valley DX Club), Dave Marshall (All-Ohio Scanner Club), Tom McElvy (NASWA), Al Sampson (MDXC), Harold Sellers (ODXA) and John Trautschold (SPEEDX). Subsysops also serve on our Computer Information Committee.

Aside from the areas open to the public, the ANARC BBS can support private (password-entry) message and file areas for use by each club's officers and/or newsletter editors. This will make it possible, for example, for editors to upload their columns to the publisher without the delay imposed by the US Post Service, or relay texts electronically to a club member with a desktop publishing system. It will also enable "round-robin" policy discussions to take place online, streamlining decision-making processes. These are just a few ways we expect the ANARC BBS to improve club operations, while giving the modem-using public more insight into what radio clubs offer.


Greetings, and welcome to CONTACT for August. We in the northeast have been raasting (steaming is, perhaps, a better description) in unimaginably oppressive weather. I wish that I could report to you that, in spite of it all, I spent many happy hours with the R-71, listening to all sorts of fascinating programming from dozens of SW broadcasters. Fat chance. The early morning is usually cool enough to do some listening, and in that regard, I want to pass on a tip: Swiss Radio International on 13685 or 17830 MHz . I listen in at 0830 UTC and reception is usually pretty good.

Well, the masthead is here to stay. After a good deal of work, I think I have arrived at something I can live with. Comments and suggestions will be gladly accepted. Certainly, I hope that you like it, too. It was executed in FreeHand, a graphics program from Aldus Corporation. This month's column was laid out in PageMaker, also an Aldus product.

A major change that I would point out to you is my arrival on the E-Mail scene. You are invited, encouraged even, to forward your letters and thoughts to me via CompuServe or GEnie. I will be interested to see if this has an effect on the quantity of communications I receive for CONTACT.

Now on to something a little different. I throw the following out to you for your consideration and comment. A year or so ago, I gave my father a small SW radio: the Sony ICF-2002. He loves to listen to the radio, and used to listen (many years ago) to SW: he had an old Zenith TransO-ceanic-what a radio that was. In any event, the Sony proved an instant success. He is (as I am) fascinated with gadgets and the 2002 is certainly a gadget extraordinaire. I gave him a large list of frequencies (mostly for the BBC ) which I update periodically. I was interested to see what his reactions would be to SW after so many years.

One of the first things he said to me was: "There's so much popular music! Why? You would think that everybody in the world could get more than enough of it on records, tapes and local radio. Why do SW broadcasters waste their time with it?" Now, my father has a distinct dislike for popular music, one I share to an extent and can understand. But the point of his question was not neerely to express a dislike for popular music, but was an inquiry into why SW broadcasters seem to spend so much time promoting American culture-clearly the principal source of popular music for the world-as opposed to promoting their own cultures.

Think aboutit: it is in fact a little odd. Perhaps $95 \%$ of all popular music is either American, or heavily American-influenced. It is as close to being reasonably universal as just about any form of communication can be. Yet broadcasters use time on SW (both expensive and intended to carry the outlook of the generating country) to reinforce the universality of the popular music (i.e., predominantly American) cultural experience. Why? A good question, or so it seems to me. Any thoughts?

One final note-Last month I told you that the International Listening Guide had not made its appearance. Well, in the meantime it has, and in a somewhat changed format. The work has been split into two seperate parts: the first is a listing-by-frequency that begins at 5 MHz ; the second part is a listing-by-time, and includes information on all broadcasters broadcasting in English, and a detailed listing of programs of interest to SWLs (very useful indeed). A highly recommended publication.

1405-1415 Touring RSA (Radio RSA). Travel impressions of South Africa with the prospective tourist in mind. Past programs have featured country hotels in South Africa, a game reserve, and a ghost town on the southwest Namibian coast. Frequency is 21.690.

2325-2330 Lithuanian By Radio (Radio Vilnius). One of the most intelligently done language programs on shortwave. There is adequate attention to Lithuanian grammar as well as catch phrases in Lithuanian translated into English. I do not know whether a textbook is available for the course, but the program is very well done. Frequencies are: 9.640 // $11.790 / / 15.180 / / 15.455$.

MONDAY
0130-0145 "Short Story (BBC). A good program of short stories sent in by listeners all over the world. Past stories have been about the ghost of a beggar who becomes reincarnated as the next door neighbor of the man who accidentally killed him, an undertaker who commits suicide, and a woman who finds out her married daughter is having an affair. If you wish to try our own luck with the BBC, stories should be around 2,000 words and never previously published Frequencies are: 5.975 // 6.175 // 7.325 // 9.590 .

0345-0350 "Leafing through the Marxist/Leninist Press (Radio Tirana). This program was previously titled, "The Future of the Marxist/Leninist Movement Throughout the World is Growing in Scope and Strength," and I think Radio Tirana is to be commended for shortening it to a more manageable length. By Radio Tirana standards, the program is not bad, reading articles in the communist newspapers of such countries as France, Sweden, Brazil, England, and India, two to three articles per program. Check $7.065 / / 9.760$.

TUESDAY
2045-2100 "Music Program (W.C.S.N.). Each day this program features a different musical group or genre, Mondays' programs usually being reserved for theatrical music. Past programs have featured blues groups, Woody Herman, The Carpenters, etc. Appeal is to all musical tastes. Check 15.390 . Repeated at 2245 on 15.300 and 0045 on 9.850 ) Monday through Friday.

0125-0230 "Youth Magazine (Radio Prague). A series of features with young people in mind. Past programs have featured a legendary giant in the Czech mountains, the Fair of St. Matthow in Prague, and a pop music group. Check 5.930 // 7.345 // 9.740 // 11.990. Repeated at 0325 on the same frequencies.

## WEDNESDAY

0220-0230 Contemporary Brazil (Radiobras). Emphasis of this program is the political processes in Brazil, with the attention usually being given to the current debates in the Brazilian Constitutional Assembly. Frequency is $\mathbf{1 1 . 7 4 5}$.

0240-0255 Sun and Sea (Radio Portugal). Radio Portugal's tourist program which features different areas of interest in Portugal-such as the Extramadura or the Silver Coast- with attention to landmarks of interest, life style, and history of the area. Frequencies are: $6.060 / / 9.635 / / 9.705 / / 9.680$. Mondays and Wednesdays.

THURSDAY

1315-1330 "Arts Review (Radio Finland). Radio Finland's culture oriented program. Past programs bave featured the Nordic Theater Festival, the 500th anwiversary of printed books in Finland, and portraits of Finnish writers and artists. Check $15.400 / / 11.945$. Repeated at 1415 on the same frequencies.

2315-2325 "Letterbox (Radio Vilnius). Unlike "Mailbag" which airs on Sundays, "Letterbox" does not answer listener questions, but merely reads and comments on letters from an international listening audience, though predominantly North American and European. Frequencies are: 9.640 // 11.790 // 15.180 // 15.455.

FRIDAY
0030-0045 "Personal View (BBC). A wonderfully entertaining series of programs in which respected British citizens given their "personal view" on a variety of topics, such as secular humanism, British politics, the position of women in Britain in the 1980s,personal reminiscences of boyhood (or girlhood) memories, and the housing problem in England. Frequencies are: 5.975 // 6.175 // 7.325 // 9.590 .

0235-0250 "Newsline (Radio Netherland's). Radio Netinerlands' current affairs program which takes a more comprehensive look at a number of stories in the news, such as the Russian withdrawal from Afghanistan, the Moscow Summit, US efforts to oust Noriega, etc. Check $6.020 / 6.165 / / 9.590 / / 9.895$. Repeated at 0535 on 6.165 // 9.715. Monday through Friday.

## EATURDAY

2150-2200 "History Club (Radio Sofia). This Program only shows up on the first or second Saturday of the month and is devoted to Bulgarian history and historians. Check 9.700 // $11.720 / / 11.950$. Repeated at 0020 on the same frequencies and at 0320 on 11.750. First of second Saturday of the month.

2340-2400 The Dialogue (Radio Kiev). This is Radio Kiev's listener contact program and is divided into three segments: the first answers listener questions, the second reviews listener comments, and the third answers questions again. Some programs are devoted exclusively to dialogue with Kiev's "sister city", Chicago, such us a telephone link-up between high school students in Kiev und 'Chicago or interviews with two members of Radio Kiev's staff who has spent a week in Chicago on a promotional tour. Frequencies are: 9.640 // 11.790 // 15.180 // 15.455. Repeated at 0210 on the same frequencies.

L've been lookman foreign language reception report guide for a long time, and 1 finally found one. It's the EDXC Reporting Guide, published by the European DX Council, the European counterpart to ANARC. 1 read about the guide in the World DX Club's excellent Contact bulletin, and wrote to Michael Murray, Secretary Geoeral of the EDXC, for a copy. You can obtain one for $\$ 3$ (no foreign personal checks) or 6 IRC's. Besides containing a good overview of reception report writing and QSL'ing, the EDXC guide is one of the few to include German and Italian sample reports and DX vocabularies, as well as French, Spanish, and Portugese. It's' edited by well-known DX'er Anker Peterson, and is worth adding to your bookshelf. You can order it from:

Ever wonder how the WRTH determines a station's QSL policy? A letter from Andy Senaitt, editor of the WRTH, comments on this subject raised in the June DX'ers Fonum arnicle on QSL'ing. Andy writes:
"..With regard to your comments about WRTH data on QSL policies, I would like to clarify our position. The wording of your article implies that the information in WRTH is supplied by the
stations themselves. In fact, although we do ask station about their QSL policy as a matter of course, the information in the WRTH is now updated on an annual basis by DXer Finn Krone, who is something of an expert in this field (my opinion, not his, hi). [Finn Krone just received the ANARC International DX'er of the Year award, so Andy's opinion is shared by a few others -ed.)

The way we do it is to have Finn go through as many $D X$ bulletins as he can get his hands on, and note details of what club members have actually received. Because QSLing is often a slow business, information published in WRTH reflects the general situation over the previous two years. Any station not reported as verifying for more than two years is indicated as a non-verifier. Similarly, if return postage is indicated this is what DXers themselves have indicated in their QSL reports, and does not necessarily mean that the stations insist on it.

Of course, there will be errors and discrepancies. QSLing is not an exact science. But generally, you can take it that if a station is listed in WRTH as a verifier,

someone somewhere bas actually reported receiving a QSL. Where we say "No Rp.", this does not mean that no unswer was received on this question from the sta-tion- it means exactly what it says!

1 hope this clarifies the position of WRTH, and helps to reassure you regarding our sources of information. Of course, your input is very welcome - if you find info in WRTH which consistently conflicts with your own findings, please let us know. But always bear in mind that with staff changes, financial crises etc. alfecting many stutions in a given year, the QSL data in WRTH can at best be regarded as a guide, and not as a definitive source."

Thanks for writing to the Forum Andy. It's always useful to have a better understanding of what goes on behind the scenes. Perhaps Andy can shed some light on the Islamabad / Trarkhe! question discussed in last month's column. As an incidental benefit, we now know how the editor of the WRTH abbreviates "World Radio TV Handbook," which is just as often abbreviated WRTVH as WRTHI

This month I'm pleased to present an interview with not one, not two, but all ihree North American DX Champions. The annual North American DX Championship is sponsored by Numero Uno, an organization of senior DX'ers. The contest is open to all. The rules were published in the January FRENDX, and the contest period was from February 13-22 this year, Contestants DXed for 48 bours of their choice, continuous or not, out of that period. The object was to $\log$ and identify as many stations and countries as possible. The NASWA country list was used. The first station logged from a country was worth 5 points, and each additional station from the same country counted for I point.

This year's top three finishers were James Young of Wrightwood, CA, with 1040 points (including 182 countries!); Don Moore of Athens, OH , with 754 points; and Dr. Harold 'Dr. DX' Cones of Newport News, VA, with 585 points. All three top finishers received trophies, and the top twenty contestants received certificates recognizing their participation.

Since there is not a lot written about contest DX'ing, I thought you might be interested in knowing how the top place finishers approached this challenge. Ifound it fascinating to see that once again the old saw held true about organization, knowlege and experience being more important than ultra-expensive equipment. Although Jim was aided by a mountain-top OTH, Don captured second place with a makeshift 45' antenna, and Harold took third with an indoor antenna. I hope that even more DX'ers will enter the contest next year, after seeing that it doesn't take a mile-long antenna and a super-expensive receiver to finish in the top ranks.

## An Interview with the North American DX Champions

Forum: Congratulations on your achievement gentlemen, the competition was extremely tough und you came out on top. Have you ever entered any other DX competitions or was his your first effort? If you've entered others before, how did you do?

## Young:

NNRC - Amateur Bands Competition - very well (1960's - 1970's)
ISWL - SW Listener's contest - very well (1960's 1970's)
NNRC. SW Contests - 1st and 2nd place (1980's)
Moore: This is actually the first time I've entered a DX contest. I would have entered last year's NADXC, but plans for a weekend DX'pedition during the contest fell through and I ended up skipping it.
Cones: I entered the Rhein-Main (Germany) Radio Club Tropical Band contest in 1987 and came in 5th. I usually don't have the extended time for contesting, so have not been very involved in this aspect of the hobby.

## Forum: How did you prepare for the contest? Whau was your game plan!

Young: Spent 2 months specifically logging as many countries / stations for a 'game plan' during the actual event. Had a 24 hour schedule with frequencies / times every 15 minutes for as many actual ID's (verbal, IS, tallguage) as possible.
Moare: I decided well in advance that although hearing DX stations was important, the key was being sure to log all the easier international broadcusters and their relays as well. At the beginning of January I wem through the WRTH country by country making three station lists: ones I should have no problem hearing; ones I could possibly hear; and ones I would like to hear for the contest, but weren't very likely. The first category actually was the most work, because that was where most of the big broadcasters fell. Hearing stations like Radio Bucharest or Radio Findand isn'I readly difficult, but I hadn't tried to hear them for years and had no idea of which broadcasts and frequencies were the best bets. Using Passport to WBR, the WRTH and the English broadcast schedule in Monitoring Times, I checked out broadcass for these stations until I found one that came in well at my location. It wasn't as hard for the remaining stations. Most of these were tropical band stations, which are only on one or two frequencies anyway. The time of day to hear these is more dependent on propagation than station schedules. Busicully, going in to the contest I had three lists, from most to least probable, of stations to try for, along with the most likely times and frequencies for each station. It sounds like a lot of work, but I only spent about six or seven hours on it. Someone with less knowledge of the tropical bands might need more time.

Cones: I went "schedule shopping" in advance and attempted to lay out 100 quick countries in six time blocks. I then worked within the blocks and tried to stay on schedule. After these blocks were shopped out, 1 used non-listening times to work up new blocks.

Forum: What equipment did you use during the $D X$ Championship? Did you set up anything new just for the
contest? Any special configurations (muliple receivers / tape recorders) or new antennas?

Young: 2 receivers (HQ-180A's), one with a digitul readout ( $x$ cox $x . x$ ). Tape recorder and inverted vee's at $86^{\prime}$ on top of $7500^{\prime}$ mountain at my work. Several stations logged simultaneously, via tape recording.
Moore: I used my Yaesu FRG-7 receiver, hooked up to a simple Radio Shack cassette recorder during the entire contest. About at third of the time I doubled up and used my Sony ICF-7600D too. I would use the frog with headphones, and cunnect an earphone to the Sony. I could then slip the earphone under one earpiece on the headphones. Usually I would use the Sony to $\log$ the international broadcasters and stronger tropical band statiuns, and to check for parallel frequencies; while I used the frog for real DX. It wasn't too hard listening to two receivers at once. For one thing, 1 had the tape recorder in case 1 missed something on the frog. Also I would turn the volume down on a station if it was playing music, so as to give the other station more attention. The only real problem was top of the hour IDs when 1 often had to pay close attention to both stations at once. For antenna I just used a temporary antenna of a 45 foot 16 gauge copper wire strung between my house and a tree.
Cones: Yaesu FRG-7700 with a MFJ- 1040 preselector (serving mainly as a receiver switch) and a Grove Minituner; also brought the Drake R-4B on line for part uf the time. I use a series of tuned dipoles and a homemade tropical band antenna, all mounted in the attic. I ran it all through a tape recorder for backup.

Forum: Now for the contest iself: how many hours did you spend DX'ing? Any trial runs or did you just wing it? (Did someone bring you meals and coffee?!)
Young: 48 hours spent during contest. My trial runs were over 100 hours. I used my microwave oven between 15 minute check points.
Moore: The contest allowed listening in any 48 onehour periods during the nine days. I used 32 periods, but didn't listen the entire hour in all of them. Probably about 27-28 actual listening hours. I would have spent more, but I'm a graduate student and the second weekend I had to do a take-home essay exam which took about twelve hours of my time. Time which otherwise would have been put to DX'ing. 1 didn't do any trial runs. 1 thought about it, but decided my paperwork was sufficient.
Cones: 25 hours, spread over 6 days. My longest chunk of time was 5 hours, my shortest, 1 hour. The key, 1 think, was setting my original 6 time blocks so that 1 could catch the morning Asians, late afternoon Africans, etc., and avoid a lot of duplication.

Forum: Did your actual time on the bands mauch your plans or did you have to adjust as the comest got underway?
Young: After 36 hours of 'game plan,' 1 did re-adjust hour / hour and re-plan contest time down to the last minute.

Moore: Actually I spent more time listening than I planned on. Basically the week before the contest 1 worked my behind off to get ahead in my studies. Thus 1 ended up with more time available than thad dreaned of.


Cones: As it usually goes, I did not have the extended time I wanted at the radio, but 1 did manage to get my aimed-for 6 time blocks covered, plus more. I almost did not enter because of a sudden rush uf nonradio things that came up over the contest period, but, as it wurked out, 1 managed to wiggle enough time.

Forum: Clearly one of the big challenges in a contest like this is to balance the need to hear many stations per hour with the reality that a lor of the smaller stations dun't ID all that often. What techniques were helpful in dealing with this?
Young: I felt different countries had a greater point value, so I concentrated with countries rather than stiations. Much of the time the second receiver was used to monitor for those stations that ID infrequently.
Moore: The two receiver setup was a great help in IDing stations. Also my paperwork gave me an advantage in terms of relay stations, where often there isn't any actual site ID to be heard, but instead parallel frequencies must be checked. Also I speak fluent Spanish and understand some Portuguese -- so l'mable to pick out ID's that might go by people who don't understand those languages.
Cones: Being familiar with the bands was the most help. I am familiar, for example, with the PNG regionals and their usual programming - in their case, I did not need to wait for an ID. The powerhouses ID often and you can pick up a quick $30-35$ countries or so in no time at all with just these biggies. The Latins were the biggest problem and took the most time. My plun then was to go for the powerhouses first, the familiar ones next, then the tougher ones.

Forum: What references were the most useful before and during the consest? Please comment on any of your own records that were helpful.

Moore: Monitoring Times was very helpful for the international broadcasters schedules. For the tropical bands I relied mainly on my own experience. I've got a good memory for trivia, including station names, times, and frequencies; and I spend a lot of time DX'ing the tropical bands. So generally I knew what would be there, what might be there, and what I hoped would be there if 1 crossed my fingers enough. Club bulletins were belpful to check for new stations on the air.

Cones: The RDI was a big help, as well as "Monitoring Times." I maintain a current schedule file, which helped with the major broadcasters. I also made use of my card system which collects current reception information from FRENDX and other SWL publications (see April 1987 FRENDX, "DX'ers Forum"). Daisy the DX dog wis also a great help.

Forwm: How much of what you heard was pre-planned (targeted), vs. band-scanning? How did you decide whether to hang in there on a target that was coming in poorly or drop is and go on to something else?
Young: $95 \%$ was pre-planned. Very little band scanning was necessary, however, several periods I did just band-scan. Never really got any new countries via unplanned techniques such as band-scanning. If I heard a stution 2 weeks before the contest, I stuck it out!

Moore: Over $90 \%$ of what I heard was targeted in my original plans (however I only picked up about $80 \%$ of what was in those plans). I tried to get around the "how long to listen to this station" factor by trying for stations 1 knew would be difficult to hear or don't ID often, around the top of the hour when ID's are more likely. Generally though if it was a station I had heard sometime before and was just relogging for the contest, I limited myself to about twenty minutes. However if I had never heard the station before at all, then I would listen as long as it took to ID (or until I lost it). I believe I spent about an hour on a new Penuvian.
Cunes: I would say that $80 \%$ was pre-planned and $20 \%$ educated band-scanning. I sat on targets for quite a while early on, but as time ran thin, I would move on and keep checking back for better reception.

Forum: Any especially interesting loggings? First-lime stations or countries?
Young: I missed only a few countries that I had under my 'game plan' from the 2 months of trial runs and preplanning of a logging schedule.

Moore: What really amazed me was when I went back through my records and found out that I had logged Bangladesh for the first time since 1 QSL'ed them in 1972. Also it was interesting that three previously wellheard but long inactive Latin American stations decided to reactivate the week of the contest (Radio Bolivar, Ven; R Nacional Espejo, Ecuador; and Radio Nacional Macapa, Brazil). To me though, the real highlight was logging a new Peruvian - Radio Contumaza 4495 - because it was my 100th Peruvian station heard.
Cones: I was pleased with Greenland (which I have not heard since and which was a new country for me), Nepal, 16 of the PNG regionals and Thailand. The con-
test just happened to occur during a super three-week Asian opening for this area which, I think, just goes to show that there is a lot of luck involved in this hobby.

Forum: What didyou think your chances were when you were finished the contest? Were you surprised by the result?

Young: I felt they were excellent! But if you publish my answers (I have no objections either, hi, hi) my chances next year will be much less!

Moort: I felt about 80\% certain I had done well enough to finish in the top twenty and gave myself about a $10 \%$ chance of making the top ten. I did not inarine at all that I would make the top three though. So I was very surprised, almost ecstatic, when 1 found out 1 was second.

Cones: I would have liked to have heard more countries but was pleased enough with what I heard in the time available. I had no idea where I would fall, since this was the first time I had entered this contest and did not know the norm. I felt I had "done good" overall, but was still surprised when I finished in the top three.

Forum: Any advice for nexl year's contestanis, or any other comments?

Young: See all of the above. I realize that not everyone could spend 48 hours, nor were many on top of a 7500' mountain with switchable $90^{\prime}$ high antennas. /ed. note: since NASWA did not organize the contest, the following comments really apply to Numeru Unu/ Thanks so much for the opportunity to participate. The certificate is beautiful, and I wasn't expecting a trophy! I think you have done a great job attracting listeners, quality loggings and the rules were well thought out. My hats off to you guys, 73-DX, Jim Young.

Moore: Remember the contest is supposed to befun. I approached it this year with the desire to place, and did a lot of preparation to reach that goal. Because of that a couple times it started to become a chore. l'm thinking that next year I might just take it easy and wing it with no preparation at all. In the end it comes down to your personal goals for the contest. It's a great feeling to come in near the top of a contest like this. However, if placing is important to you - and it can be great fun - I think advance preparation is a necessity. But if you're just entering the contest to have fun, then forget the preparation and just tune around and see how well you do. A number of DX'ers did not participate because they felt they didn't have the time for the preparation. Not having the time to do the preparation necessary to win shouldn't keep anyone out of the contest. Every year thousands of people run in the Boston Marathon, and most of them don't expect to win. The bottom line is that we should be in the hobby for the fun of $i t$.

Cones: The real key to this contest, and for DX'ing in general, is organization. The better organized your shack, your equipment, and your information, the easier the quest.

Forum: Congrats one more time, and thanks to all you fine gents for a super contribution to DX'ers Forum.

## ANTENNAS

or
a Chain is only as strong as its weakest link
It has always seemed a shame to me that people spend vast amounts of money on expensive receivers and listening accessories, only to neglect the most crucial element of the receiving system: the antenna. I know that this statement is repeated endiessly, but think about it for a moment. You have just bought an R-71A receiver for around $\$ 800$. What do you connect to this sensitive, state of the art receiver? Many people still connect a length of random wire strung from their house to a yonder tree. Some do this because it is quick. Others do it because they are frightened by the apparent voodoo involved in choosing or building the "perfect antenna." They are not helped any by the myriad of wive's tales on the one hand, and overly pedantic reference books on the other. But having a good receiver and a lousy antenna is like running a voA transmitter on a coat hanger. For those of you who don't want to become another Professor Yagi. but simply want a little more insight about antennas, read on...

You have all seen old photographs or drawings of huge antenna towers, frequently atop large buildings, from whach were suspended curtains of wire. Indeed, until relatively recently, it was part of the F.C.C. logo (now replaced by Sesame Street type letters spelling "FCC." This is because in the early days of radio no one, not even the inventor ( 3 ) of radio themselves. had any real idea how the antenna worked. Tesla thought that the earth itself was carrying the radio wave. Marconi thought that the more surface area the antenna had. the more radio energy was released from it. Hence, huge curtains of wire were often suspended from towers to achieve even comparatively meager coverage. It wasn't until the twenties, and people like Professors Yagi and Uda (an antenna design bears Yagi's name today) that the true workings of the antenna were discovered.

The antenna, it was found behaved like a resonant circuit. A good mechanical analogy is an organ pipe. A short pipe resonates at a high frequency: a long pipe resonates at a low frequency. And so it is with antennas. For each frequency there is an ideal length of antenna. Go much above or below that longth and the antenna rapidly loses its ability to radiate energy. What does that have to do with reception? Lots! It was found that if al! things were taken into account, an antenna optimized for transmitting was also optimized for reception. The so called "antenna reciprocity rule" was discovered. The only reason that bigger meant better in the early days is that the wavelengths used were so huge that no matter how large the antenna was it could never approach the ideal size. Fortunately for us, the sizes involved for shortwave frequencies are manageable, if not somewhat cumbersome.

The goal. then, is to make the antenna as close as possible to the ideal length for the frequency desired, and to put it as high as possible. Both of these goals can never be perfectly attained. but like perfection they can be sought after.

## THE BASIC FORMULA

The basic formula for antenna length is derived from the formula for light, After all. in a vacuum radio waves travel at the speed of light.
wavelength $x$ frequency $=$ speed of light
Rearranged. this gives us:

So to find the wavelength of your ideal antenna, simply divide the speed of laght (186,000 males per second) by the desired frequency. Sance the answer comes out in miles, a bit of manipulation yields a more useable formula:

## wavelength (in feet) = 982 / frequency (in MHz)

Note that this gives the electrical length. There are two more man problems to deal with. In anything other than a perfect vacuum radio waves don't travel at. the speed of light. They travel slower. This results in a cycle completing itself in a shorter distance than the ideal. What does this mean? It means that the physical length of an antenna is shorter than the electrical length. This is great, because at means smaller antennas. And if you liked that, you will be pleased to know about the second "problem." Yau do not need a full wavelength antenna to get the desired affect. Depending on the type of antenna you use. you can use a length $1 / 4,1 / 2$, or $5 / 8{ }^{\circ}$ s of the full sized model. often with little or no degradation of performance. For those of us who like the 49 meter tropical band we are not stuck with an antenna 160 feet long, but can use a half or even quarter wavelength antenna of 38 feet.

How do we arrive then at the correct physical length for an antennd at a given frequency? The following are formulas for corrected lengths. based on the velocity of radio waves through average materials:
$936 /$ frequency (in MHz) - length (in feet) of 1 wavelength antenna
585 / frequency (in $M H z$ ) = length (in feet) of $5 / 8$ wavelength antenna
$468 /$ frequency (in MHz ) $=$ length (in feet) of $1 / 2$ wavelength antenna
234 /frequency (in $M H z$ ) - length (in feet) of $1 / 4$ wavelength antenna
From the above formulas, we can see that even a $1 / 4$ wavelength antenna for a popular old - time frequency of 200 KHz would be over 1220 feet -- approaching a quarter of a mile long! No wonder they never built an antenna that failed to work because it was too long.

The shortwave listener would appear to have quite a selection of antenna sizes to choose from. To soree extent. this is true. but some antenna configurations (or "types") work better with a half Wavelength, some with a quarter wavelangth, and some with five-eaghts wavelength. This 13 so true that some antenna types are named for the iraction of a wavelength they represent. We have all heard of "halfwave dipoles" and "quarter-wave verticals." Even such oddities as the multiple Wavelength Beverage antenna is known to denizens of the VLF spectrum.

## PUTTING IT ALL TO WORK

What follows is a summary of the more popular antenna types, along. With the lengths commonly used with each type. I have drawn-in the approximate reception lobes. These represent the relative amounts of R.F. energy received in any given direction. You will quickly see that each antenna has its own best direction(s) of reception. This can be utilized to select the best antenna for the type of signals you desire to receive. For example, many people wish a low angle of reception to capture DX signals, as these most, often arrive at low angles to the earth. Others wish to roceive low angle signals, but at the same time equally well in all directions, to avoid missing signals coming in at a any particular direction. By carefully analyzing each antenna type's pattern, you can pick the best antenna for your needs. Please note that the patterns shown are ideal, and actual antennas may vary somewhat due to many factors.

Figure 1 shows the ever-popular horizontal dipole in its two usual configurations: the half wave and quarter wave. This antenna is good for gain. that is it gives better reception than other types, but at a price -- it is directional. Signals coming in toward the ends of the antenna are degraded. Also, this antenna likes to be high off the ground. The closer at is to the ground the higher an angle of reception it exhibits. Unless you want to hear Mars (the planet, not the net) keep it high.

Figure 2 is a vertical antenna, again showing several variations: the quarter-wave, the half-wave, the five eigths wave, and the ground plane. Note that in the first three versions the earth itgelf functions as part of the antenna. In the ground plane version a sort of umbrella beneath the vertical element takes the place of the earth as the other half of the antenna. The vertical antenna is excellent for omni-directional reception; it receives equally well in all directions of the compass. It does tend to pick up more noise. however, than horizontal antennas like the dipole above. Although the vertical antenna does pick up more noise than the horizontal types, it has the distinct advantage that it can be mounted at or near the ground, and you don't have to worry about picking up a station in one direction at the cost of a station in another direction.

Figure 3 shows unique variations of the horizontal dipole -- the vertical dipole. It, like the horizontal, enjoys gain, but in all horizontal directions. The only drawback is that it must be mounted at a good height, and this is not easy with its long length.

Figure 4 is thrown-in for fun. It is the almost arcane directional loop antenna. It is fantastic for "nulling-out" interfering signals from desired stations, as it picks up best in two rather sharp directions. Because the loop is electrically rather short, it does not have the sensitivity of any of the above antennas. but it takes up much less space than any of the others. too. In many cases. gain is less important than getting rid of the adjacent frequency (or even adjacent location) interference. If so. this is the antenna for you. It is frequently employed by broadcast band DXers to "pick out the rare ones," but is also useful on the shortwaves. It can even knock-out the Russian (or American) Woodpecker

To summarize, there is no perfect antenna. But with a little care you can improve your reception by some judicious research and. as I urged in my first column, experimentation.

Next month we will take a look at antenna deaigns useable for multiple frequencies, as well as some accessories to enhance them.

Light turnout this month. I guess the weather's too hot to stay indoors during these dog days. As in the past, I did not repeat any loggings that were published in the previous month's FRENOX. Please consult the July issue for a more complete update.

It was a total surprise to find messages on Pinelands on July 21 from Bill Cole and Robert Horvitz saying "Congratulations. You have been awarded the 1988 ANARC NA DXer of the Year Award...". It indeed is an honor and it is much appreciated. Thanks to the NASWA administration for the nomination, and to the ANARC club representatives and the ANARC officials!!!

The Pineland RBBS will be offline for one to two weeks commencing mid-August. It is vacation time. I cannot afford to leave it on line and risk damage from thunderstorms travelling through the area.

In early July RBBS Netmail and Echomail was implemented on the Pinelands RBBS. The system is growing very quickly. Participating nodes already include one RBBS in Holland. Messages entered at your local RBBS are mailed each night through the network to other RBBSs. As there are more than 100 topical echos, not all participating RBBSs will carry all echos. On this board, among the two dozen or more echos I have chosen to carry are SHORTWAVE and HAM. The SHORTWAVE echo ties into the echos carried by the other well-known SWL oriented boards: Neverboard, ANARC/ACE, etc. Another door now available is a FLEA market door, similar to the FORSALE download directory described last month. Both can be used to sell, buy, swap or look for equipment. You can enter the MAIL area and FLEA market through the [D]oors command on the MAIN command line.

Another relay has popped up. Noted from mid-July, Beijing announces $15455,15290,15180$, and 11860 at 03 UT to WNA. The Mali frequencies 11715 and 9770 were not mentioned, yet they were heard in parallel when I checked on the 21 st and 27 th . Compared to 15455 and 15180 direct, the audio delay on 11860 -- an excellent signal -- is short, perhaps a half-second. The delays on the Mali frequencies are considerably longer. The usual ENA-to-NA Spanish relay at 05 on 9690 is not being heard. Has this been dropped, or did it move? Jonathan Marks, although he was out of work with a bad case of the flu and a loss of his voice, did leave a note on Pinelands that 11860 is no doubt a new relay from Spain.

I picked up an M-7000 in early July and have been having fun poking around the utility bands. If any NASWA member dabbles in this stuff, I would be interested in any current press schedules... thanks.
