1972 FM ATLAS AVAILABLE...

The publisher of the FM ATLAS has notified us that the new 1972 FM ATLAS and Station Directory is now available. This year, in addition to the atlas itself, it has been expanded to include a station directory which includes information such as formats, coverage radius in miles, etc. There are also special sections on such topics as FM in Mexico, tips on improving reception at home and in the car. We at HQ recommend this log highly; it is truly the FM equivalent to the NRC Domestic Log. It can be ordered for \$2.50 (\$3.00 Canada and Foreign) from Bruce Elving, Publisher, FM ATLAS, Box 24, Adolph, Minn. 55701.

Dec Club Members.

Well. we're finally back from our foray to St. Louis; hopefully we'll be able to shake the remaining bugs out of their computer system from here - which means we can start to straighten out the chaos from our fire... First of all. Randy Kane and the Nelson family would like to express deepest appreciation to the members of the Publishing Committee who'd begun rescuing the Club's vital materials even before the fire was out as well as generally being of great aid. Big George Kelley, Lynne and Cary Pall, Mark Katz, and Ray Moore have done a remarkable job of keeping the Club running smoothly and DX NEWS coming out on time during this very difficult period.

What did the fire do to NRC operations? The area of our new house that we'd set aside and equipped especially for composition of DX NEWS and other club operations was mostly smoke and water damaged. Prompt work by CDP saved the HQ IBM typewriter, etc. Almost all NRC HQ materials, records, and files came through smokey but okay - including all recent incoming mail, all of the data for the Club's computerized mailing system, requests for pending items such as Pattern Books, stationery, and reprints, incoming joins and renewals, etc Also undamaged were the articles and copy queued up for inclusion in DX NEWS and all QSL's and pictures of QSL's supplied by the membership...

Losses to Club materials were almost nil. We lost several hundred overrun copies of DX NEWS destined for that most noble of fates - becoming sample bulletins. The NRC Archives - bound copies of DX NEWS going back to 1939were lost; hopefully with the aid of our members we will be able to reassemble a complete set once again. The other main loss was the over-sized master copy of the last NRC Domestic Log prepared by Randy, Big George, and myself; Russ Edmunds was to use it as the basis for the new Domestic Log but now we'll have to go another route...

The third floor personal losses were heavy indeed... starting will all of Randy's personal belongings. All of the Nelson electronics was totally lost (ever see a melted receiver?): our basic receiving system which took 10 years and almost unlimited MIT laboratory and computer facilities to design and build - the basis for all of our technical articles here in DX NEWS; the prototypes and advanced versions of the FET altazimuth and pattern controlled loops; all of the . mechanical filters and arrays; the direction finding equipment; our highly developed frequency measuring equipment; the SAH and spectrum analysis equipment; the audio processing filter system; the chart recorders used for longterm signal strength recording; tape recorders, etc., etc. With enough money and time that can all be replaced, though. Not so the tape library: recordings of each of the more than 700 foreign stations in 123 countries we've logged on the MW band over the past 10 years... plus all of our QSL's... At least our auroral reception data was saved; by chance it was with me in St. Louis... An article on the protection and insurance of your treasured DX belongings will appear soon here in DX NEWS...

Damage to the house is in the \$30,000 range and reconstuction will not be completed for at least 6 months. In the mean time we'll be staying in a temporary house and the HQ operations previously centralized at 48 Hardy will remain split between Cary's place and ours.... Mail for Randy or myself will continue to reach us at Box 99.



REPORTEDLY IN OPERATION, . .

IRELAND. The new Irish language station at Connemara made its first test transmission on 2/26 on 539 kHz at midday. This one is expected to operate about 2 hours a day until the studios are completed late in the summer when it plans to extend the schedule. The new station in Donegal on 1250 is expected to have begin operations about now; also the Kerry station on 962. These new low powered Irish stations probably will not be heard in North America until next season. (MWN, Editor)

USSR. Radio Moscow is broadcasting on 1423 kHz; no location or power info available. Can you hear this one, Zbigniew? (ARC)

CZECHOSLOVAKIA. Station noted on 704 by EBU.

TURKEY, Istanbul II is now on 966.5; good news for next season if they stay off channel. (EBU)

YEMEN. Sanaa's 10 kw station on 1203 noted by EBU in Finland recently.

ALBANIA. Radio Kukesi on 994 kHz has recently extended its schedule and improved its modulation from very poor to rather poor. (ARC) Never a peep from this one in North America... Editor.

SYRIA. Damascus Radio has changed its local frequency from 963 to 885 kHz.

CYPRUS. Radio Monte Carlo's new relay station on 1232 is on the air 1500-2100 with 20 kW. Reports go to B.P. 128, MONTE CARLO. (ZO; MWN)

BANGLADESH. Dacca is using 690 and 1170 from 0030-0230, 0600-0830, and 1100-1600. Dacca is relayed by Chittagong-870, Rangpur (?)-1050, Rajshahi-1080, and Sylhet-1140. (Radio Australia DX program relayed by Bob Bundy on Truk)

MASARAH ISLAND. Despite its absence from the latest EBU internal report reprinted recently in DX NEWS (exclusive in NRC), Bob Bundy in Truk reports that the high powered but very directional BBC Relay station on 701 kHz is still in operation and being heard in the South Pacific. We remind our readers that the EBU which appears here several times a year is not a tabulation of all stations in the European Zone known to be in operation a la World Radio Handbook. Rather it's an internal working document prepared for the European Broadcasting Union which contains the pooled receptions made at the 7 EBU monitoring stations scattered throughout Europe. The absence of a station from the EBU which we run does not mean that the station has been officially purged from the EBU's European Zone allocation lists; it merely means the station has not been heard at any of the EBU monitoring sites during that period. This

also explains why the EBU list occasionally contains "odd" items such as SRS-725, CBA, etc. (Editor)

PROJECTED OPERATIONS, RUMORS, & GOSSIP...

FRANCE. The present 100 kW operation on 1277 will be upgraded to 300 kW in the near future. (ZO)

ANDORRA. Sud Radio plans to increase power from 600 to 900 kW in October of this year. (MWN)

CANARY ISLANDS, EAJ43, Radio Clube Tenerife on 1412 will soon boost power to 10 kW. (Cimberer DXC)

GREECE. The VOA's new relay site at Kavalla will include a 500 kW MW station; this new Greek VOA station will operate on 791 kHz according to US Government sources. (SCDX; Editor)

CLANDESTINES, BOOTLEGS, AND PIRATES...

INTERNATIONAL WATERS (HOLLAND). Radio Nordsee International is supposedly now operating on 1511 kHz in parallel with its 49 and 31 meter band SW operations. Still unheard in Poland however. (ZO)

SCOTLAND. Radio Free Scotland is heard in the UK on about 1150 kHz. (SCDX)

ISRAEL. Several reports have appeared in the DX press about a new station, Radio Eilat, reportedly "the first commercial station in Israel". Recent info in SCDX from a reporter in Israel indicates that it was a strictly illegal operation which was forced to leave the airas the Israeli equivalent of the FCC was closing in. Reportedly this station operated with moderate power on about 1430 kHz and will return to the air shortly. (Various sources)

SKYWAVE OR GROUNDWAVE RECEPTION?

* Gordon Nelson

The problem of determining experimentally the propagation mode (ground-wave vs. skywave; F layer reflection or E layer reflection, etc.) for a particular reception on the medium wave band is a difficult one. We happened to first begin to work on the problem in connection with deep-null loop design; if you fight your way through the extremely complex mathematics describing how well a particular loop will be able to null a powerful local station you find that the performance of the loop is very dependent upon the nature of the signal wavefront at the antenna - and that in turn depends upon whether the signal has been propagated via groundwave, skywave, or a mixture of both.

As is often the case with practical propagation and antenna problems, there are a number of basic fundamental principles involved (the kind you find in the textbooks) that're easy to talk about - plus some real-world complications that are responsible for the unexpected behavior that keeps the engineering trade in business...

If a medium wave signal is received entirely by groundwave, the signal strength observed at the receiver (say on your S meter) will stay essentially constant on a minute-to-minute and hour-to-hour basis. If the signal is entirely groundwave and your receiver gain stays constant (beware of AC line voltage changes which will change the apparent sensitivity of the receiver and make it seem as if the signal strength has changed) then the strength of the signal will be effected only by the longterm changes in ground properties

associated with major storms, seasonal variations in rainfall, etc. In other words, if the signal arrives entirely by groundwave and your receiver setup stays virtually constant, the strength of the signal received will <u>not</u> show minute -to-minute variations in signal strength... Groundwave propagation depends <u>only</u> upon the properties of the ground between the transmitter and receiver and - short of a dramatic quick climate change such as a tidal wave

During the past few years here at our recording site in Watertown, for example, measurements of the <u>summer</u> signal strength of WCAU-1219 made between 1000 and 1400 local time show only a few db variation on each day; well within experimental error. This is purely groundwave propagation.

or hurricane - the nature of the real ground changes very slowly.

During the winter, however - especially around the Winter solstice in December - WCAU's signal strength will vary over several S units (10 - 20 db) within just a few minutes. This means that we are experiencing skywave propagation in addition to the usual groundwave signal; the short-term variation in signal strength from minute - to - minute is the result of the interference between the skywave and groundwave signals. Skywave signals change in strength from second-to-second or minute-to-minute and the mixture of sky and ground wave signals will vary along with the skywave component...

In 1965 we set up a receiving site on the South side of St. Johns in the American Virgin Islands specifically to study the ratio of ground (sea..?) wave signal strength to skywave signal during the midday hours. Each day we measured the signal strength of several Windward Island Broadcasting Service stations on guaranteed interference-free channels such as 695, 1045, 535 kHz, etc. These measurements were made during the Springtime season when MW propagation was expected to be almost exclusively groundwave (since the skywave absorption on MW frequencies is extremely high). On most days we found that the signal strength of these very weak stations remained constant (within experimental error) over many hours of observation - thus proving that the contribution from skywave propagation was very low indeed...

On several days, however, we found that the signal strength of the low-powered test stations would vary greatly from minute-to-minute and hour-to-hour; the test stations would fade from loud and clear to complete inaudibility within a few minutes or less (during the 1000-1400 hour local time period). The obvious explanation was that there was a significant amount of midday skywave signal during those days with rapid signal fade on the test stations. During the same period the Arecibo, Puerto Rico, radio telescope facility was engaged in routine measurements of the daily variations in overhead skywave absorption during the midday period. Comparison of the Arecibo measurements of midday absorption and our WIBS measurements confirmed that the days during which we observed rapid fades on our test stations corresponded to the days when Arecibo saw minimal skywave absorption.

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Two years ago we duplicated these experiments from the West side of Bermuda - only we monitored US clears such as WCBS, WCAU, etc. Again we found stable signals during the midday hours on the days when the Signal Corps station at Ft. Monmouth, N.J. measured maximum skywave absorption. On one day we experienced very unusual reception around noon local time - rapidly fading signals from the usually stable East Coast clear channel stations and audible signals from normally far-out-of-range stations such as PJB and CBM. And that was the day when the Monmouth sounder measured minimal noontime skywave absorption...

- 1. If the signal strength remains essentially constant over a period of more than 15 or 20 minutes, the signal path is very likely to be dominated entirely by groundwave. MW skywave propagation is characterized by rapid fading and the effect is usually enhanced if there is substantial groundwave also present. The worst possible case of rapid fading due to the destructive interference of groundwave and skywave will be found in the situation where you've got say a 50 kw clear several hundred miles distant. During the day the signal is almost entirely groundwave (moreso in summer than winter) and the signal strength remains relatively constant. Late in the afternoon the skywave absorption begins to fall and the signal begins to experience quick fades as the skywave interferes with the always-present groundwave signal. By dusk, when the groundwave and skywave signal strengths may be equal, fading will be very deep and rapid and the audio may be very distorted due to phase distortion.
- 2. If the station is alone on the channel, you've got stable receiving equipment, and the signal fades on a minute-to-minute basis, then there is at least some skywave present.
- 3. If the direction of the loop null for a station changes from minute-to-minute (or faster!) then there is either at least one other station on the channel (although it may be inaudible) or the dominant station cannot be being received exclusively by groundwave.

Much can be said about maximum possible groundwave (or seawave) reception on MW frequencies in advance. Unlike skywave propagation, dramatic changes in groundwave reception do not take place. Overwater paths without skywave contributions vary only a few db at most. Similiar paths over ground may show several S units variation after dramatic climatic changes such as rain or snowstorms - but a signal which varies in strength from hour-to-hour or day-to-day by 15 or 20 or more decibels cannot be strictly a groundwave path. In the NRC Pattern Book now in preparation we will present a variety of maps and graphs to illustrate the limits and expected variation in groundwave signal paths.

In conclusion: if the signal strength is very stable it 's probably groundwave exclusively. If it fades rapidly it might be due to QRM from another station, an indeterminate amount of skywave signal, or instability/drift in your rx. Sorry, but there is just no quick and easy answer. !



The source of these notes is from previous copy published in M.W.N. some years ago and HEARING ALL CONTINENTS on M.W. is well known. Two things have to be taken in consideration for the very favourable position; (1) Less QRM than from our European locations and (2) Long sea paths are involved and the sea is by far the best conductor. There is another important point to remember and that is the fact of New Zealand being a land of wide open spaces, so consequently there is often space for LONG WIRE antennas, including the Beverage which has been referred to previously. Now we have a CONDITIONS REVIEW.

JANUARY. North America, 50 KW being dominant, heard from about one hour before sunset (21.00 N.Z.T.), sometimes Spain and Portugal from 1500 to 1600 kHz plus Japan above 1200. Around 02.00 N.Z.T. Alaska, then the Fhillipines, South Asia plus stations as far West as Tunisia as dawn approaches.

FEBRUARY. Similar to January but Alaska gets harder to hear.

MARCH. This is a PEAK month - sunset to after dawn the feast is there. Early evening signals from Spain, Portugal, Canada, U.S.A. and Mexico being dominant. Peru is also heard well later in the month dominant over the Canadians. Near midnight China and the U.S.S.R. can be heard. South Asia to about 04.00 N.Z.T. and as dawn approaches the high powered Europeans are heard with Monte Carlo a tremendous signal, sometimes blocking one of the local stations plus some occasional South and Central Africans weak but recognisable.

APRIL. North Americans begin to be absent for about a period of three months and at the end of the month only the higher powered all nighters vying for space with Mexican and Central Americans. Elusive 250 watt Australians plus Pacific Islands are heard. In the early morning Asia and Middle East can be heard and towards dawn the Europeans, now almost at their peak.

MAY. N.A's almost all gone and South America heard from about one hour before sunset till midnight when South Asia is heard. Lower power Europeans no longer audible and higher power ones more difficult.

JUNE and JULY give mostly South America, Australia and South Asia plus occasional Middle East stations.

AUGUST. South Americans fade and high power North Americans return and later in the month Europe starts to be heard, but little is heard in the early hours. before these appear around dawn.

SEPTEMBER. All Continents are again to be heard - North and South America plus Hawaii and Fiji till nearly midnight, followed by Middle East, then North Africa and Europe followed by Central and South Africa, maybe via path over Europe and Asia or via the Indian Ocean and the Tasman Sea.

OCTOBER. South America now rare with North and Central America dominating. Lower power Australians no longer heard and Europe fades out later in the month. leaving only South and Central Asia to be heard.

NOVEMBER and DECEMBER. North Americans provide the evening listening along with the odd Alaskan being heard. Asia quiet after midnight and around dawn Havaii and Pacific Islands are heard.

Australia can be heard all the year round with some stations being heard all day with remarkable clarity.

It is interesting to compare the seasonal peaks in the Northern and Southern hemispheres. In the North the best months DX-wise are usually September to November equivalent to New Zealand from March to May and in N.Z. November and December are "out of season" months, similar to May and June in the U.K.

THE TWO FOOT LOOP ANTENNA


If you're unable to construct the usual 4 loop due to space problems, or if you want a portable loop for DX'ing while travelling, the 2-foot altazimuth amplified loop will satisfy your needs. It is relatively inexpensive to build, and fairly easy as well. The design concept is, of course, similar to most other air-cored box loops, and is pattermed after Gordon Nelson's 4-foot FET altazimuth loop for which plans appeared in these pages a few years ago. Basically, we have reduced the size by about one-half, and compensated as many other factors as necessary to accommodate this size reduction. The result is a loop which will easily fit in an automobile trunk, a loop which will easily mount atop a convenient table or cabinet, or a loop which will even fit into a very large suitcase or moderate-sized trunk when broken down WITHOUT unwinding the main coil.


The 2-foot loop is amplified by two parallel International Crystal BAX-1 broadband RF amplifiers (see discussion in earlier article "Alternative Methods of Amplification for Air Core Loops" also by this author) which are well shielded, and mounted as near to the back of the receiver as possible to prevent undesirable vertical pickup effects. The main or tank coil consists of 19 turns of #16 guage wire, and the link coil consists of 2 turns of either the same or of #18 guage. The feed line is described in the plans later on.


The diagrams following this text will provide all the construction details which should be necessary for one who is familiar with box-loop antennae at all. If the reader is not, he is encouraged to do further research before attempting this project. The parts list will follow the diagrams for construction, and photographs of the finished product from several views will conclude this article.

The loop may be mounted in any of several ways. It can be used with a tripod array as used by this author, which is really a roof-mount antenna support; or it can be affixed to the vertical surface of a cabinet so as to protrude above it; or it can be affixed to a table top. A separate stand can also be made if one is desired. The tripod mounting is achieved by closing off the bottom end of the small section of pipe which provides the rotation mounting, or simply by drilling a small hole through the support dowel just above the point where it is covered by the pipe and running a small nail or metal rod to prevent the dowel from sinking any further into the pipe.










FEEDLINE: Cut plugs off extender leads and pull out fine wire inside. Replace with fine insulated hookup wire. Strip back the insulation on each end and untwist about one inch of shield. Twist the shields together at one end, tape the cables together every 6" or so along their lengths. Cut the far ends so they are even and connect the shields together after stripping back 1" of insulation. Carefully cut off a patch of insulation on each cable a foot from each end and solder the shields together.




1. Capacitor mounting plate, tripod mount, front view.

Last summer I travelled by train through Siberia and Manchuria to Peking where I stayed six weeks. The way back went through Mongolia; that is the shorter one of the two alternatives. The Siberian railroad was met near Lake Baikal. The border stations excluded, the train did not stop for more than half an hour. Therefore, the only possibility to make observations was through the train-window. The train's loudspeaker system was all the time relaying radio-programme, on the Sovjet train to Peking they naturally only had the programme of the best audible Sovjet station, whereas on the Chinese train to Moscow they had Radio Peking's programme all the way to Moscow.

Much attention has been given in the Sovjet Union to the spreading of radio and TV sets. According to WRTH there are 20 million TV sets in the Soviet Union. Even in the remostest areas you could see tall receiving antennas on the roofs of even the smallest cottages. As they live very cramped in the Soviet Union, the roofs of the apartmenthouses were crowded with TV antennas - they do not seem to use community antennas there. The broadcasting antenna was on a central place in several towns and almost without execution it looked just like the Irkutsk mast as shown here. With the exception of the Ural the terrain was very flat all the way to Lake Baikal, and, therefore it did not provide any obstacles for the propagation of radio-waves.

There are not very many DXers who have been able to add Radio Ulan Bator's QSL to their QSL-collection in spite of the fact that it broadcasts on SW with a power of 50kW and on MW with 150kW. It is no wonder, because the stations are situated very unfavourably in relation to the surrounding terrain. The forest of SW antennas is situated on the steppe 20 km south of Ulan Bator in the middle of high mountains. The MW antenna proudly stood in the centre of the town. The whole of Ulan Bator was surrounded by high mountains.

In Peking I had the facilities for DXing but the old RCA's performance, lack of antenna and the number of interfering stations limited effectively the facilities. The MW-band was totally blocked by powerful stations during the daytime. Only Voice of Free Asia, VOA Ban Phachi, could break in. At midnight local time (GMT + 8 hours) the situation was changed totally when the Chinese signed off and only the foreign stations with their Chinese-language programs were left to dominate. The free frequencies left were occupied mostly by the Japanese. of which JOBB Osaka, JOLB Fukuoka, JOOR Osaka and JORF Yokohama were the last named is on 1420 kHz and calls itself "Radio Kanto". At least at that time the Japanese advertised frequently and played as a rule American hits in either Japanese or English. The stations identified in every 15 minutes and, as you know, they pronounce their call letters in English. On 900 kHz I logged AF Vietnam Network, whose news broadcasts sounded very authentic. On 1440 kHz AF Korea Network came in a little bit better than AFVN. These stations use special names in stead of local names. I could not make out of the song-ID, which one of the three AFKN stations it was. To those interested in the Chinese stations I recommend familiarizing to the new revolutionary music because the variety of tunes is very limited and you can easily learn the most common of them thanks to their good rythm and very distinctive molody. The two most common ones are "Sailing the Seas Depends on the Helmsman" and "The East is Red". They are played in choir and brass band arrangements. The identification of the local situations is to my mind extremely difficult. They relay all through the day the program of Radio Peking in a couple of hours sections. These programs include news and readings of Renmin Ribao (Peoples Daily). The local IDs are rare - at least I did not hear one, which naturally doesn't prove anything.

Faraway over there the radio receiver gave me an opportunity to get a glimpse from "home" by listening to the singing of Georg Ots in Radio Tallin or the British Grand Prix report in the BBC. To those interested in China the radio offers a recommendable way of getting information in its original form and maybe a new field for specialization to balance the listening of yankees for instance.

RECEIVER REVIEW:

SONY TR-1300

Ronald F. Schatz

A look into recent issues of DX NEWS will reveal the fact that a lot of DX'ers are travelling, especially abroad, to places where their monitoring activities could offer invaluable information to the DX community. Unfortunately, portable receivers of DX'ing quality are hard to come by, and most multi-band portables are notoriously lacking in selectivity and sensitivity, leaving the travelling DX'er much to be desired in equipment and performance.

But leave it to the Japanese to solve the problem: The Sony Corporation is offering a lot for the money in its two "world-wide multi-band, deluxe, high-powered portables" - the TR-1300 and the TFM-1600/W, with or without FM respectively in reverse. Both receivers offer AM coverage from 530 kHz to 26.1 MHz in five bands, voltage selector for use with any wall socket in the world, tuning ("S") meter, whip antenna, outside antenna terminals, RF stage with two FET's, ceramic filtering, flywheel tuning, and a sensitivity switch (local - DX). The TR-1300 also has a selectivity switch (broad - sharp) which is replaced in the TFM-1600/W with an AFC option switch, keeping selectivity in the "sharp" position. Getting into quality parameters:

Sensitivity: The proverbial l-uV sensitivity common to the best communications receivers is noted. A few years ago I managed to pull in flea-powered Wake Is.-1480 from a distance of 500 miles with a readable signal. The TFM-1600/w will get readable signals from FM stations up to 200 miles distant!

<u>Selectivity:</u> Excellent - for an unmodified portable. Both versions will pick up most splits beyond 1- or 2-kHz separation with no trouble. The same thing applies relatively on FM.

Frequency determination: There is very little play on the tuning dial, so that many who own these receivers scratch or tape on high-resolution band scales before going abroad. By using that and the furrows on the tuning knob it is possible to determine frequencies to the nearest kHz by interpolation, just as the author did on stations in Port-au-Prince.


The dimensions of the two portables are roughly 11" x 9" x 4", and the TFM-1600/W weighs in at 8 pounds. Free-port prices are \$80 for the TFM-1600/W and \$55 for the TR-1300. Expect to pay more outside a free-port shop, of course.

Sony also offers the 7F-78L for \$84 (free-port). This small portable covers LW, MW, FM (87 - 104 MHz), and SW (4.7 - 12 MHz). Just perfect for the DX'er travelling to Europe, hi.

weeks. The N.Y. Times, which had put its WQXR-1560 up for sale announced it now will retain the station. To cut expenses, they plan to axk the FCC for permission to simulcast the c1 format on AM & FM 100%, like WGMS-570 has been allowed to do. A Court of Appeals has denied WAIT's request for reconsideration of an FCC decision denying them fulltime operation on 820. They had sound 10kw N (5kw D) U-2, & said interference to WBAP would be only slight, in a crescent-shaped area from Ky. to S.D., & said this area is already served by two clear channels, & they claimed no one listens to WBAP in this area anyway. According to Broadcasting this marks the end of WAIT's five-year fight to go fulltime. In another action, the FCC denied WGN's request to revoke the CP of KIQX-720 Las Vegas. But KIQX will not be able to begin construction for at least a while, because the holders of the CP are in trouble with the FCC because of alleged logging violations at another station they own, KTYM-1460 Inglewood, Cal. Beginning of construction of KIQX is being held up, pending the outcome of the KTYM hearing. KPMC-1560, WCAR-1130 and WTRY-980 Troy N.Y. have all joined MBS. WTRY is only carryung the ads, not the NXcasts. WCRB-1330 Waltham, Mass. is the new Ae affiliate for Boston. WCRB has been simulcasting its c1 format on AM & FM 100% all along, which it can do, because the city of license is less than 100,000. Recent DX: MM 3/20 showed only the WJDA TEST around 2mm w/ID TT & mx. WJDA was u/WFBR, & both were u/local WAVZ-1300 New Haven which eas on testing on its Day pattern. The WJDA-1300 Quincy, Mass. TEST has been the only one heard recently. I tried unsuccessfully for the ones on 570 1150 & 1430 (on 3/20 & 3/27) for N.M., S.D. & N.D., all states needed. On MM 3/20 I heard WIXY-1260 Cleveland for the first time @ 1:45am. MM 3/27 showed two new Cal. stations for me, KFRK-1530 and KKHI-1550 both in amazingly well around 3am. No sign of KPMC-1560, however. A tip from NRCer Ralph Sperry of Fairfield, Conn. enabled me to hear ZIZ St.Kitts now on 555k, heard 3/27 around 9:45pm w/a pretty weak signal. I've IDed WKFD-1370 as the one u/dominant WAIK L.I. days here w/the LW. One verie, CFCB-570. Thanks to hel Swartz for hosting me several days in March, also I had an enjoyable rap session w/BGK & CDP. 73s.
