RAMADAN, the Moslem month of fasting, prayer, and all-night radio broadcasts, begins SEPTEMBER 28 this year!

Prodded along by the subtle urgings of WOJX, the NJPC in the form of Edmunds, Taylor, Bohac, and Sampson arrived Saturday for a very full day of conferences, discussions, and loading of the some 1,500 pounds of equipment, records, and supplies that were passed on to the new Publication Committee. Following a week of sorting, packing, and cataloging by the BPC, we were in a position to provide the NJPC with a fairly good overview of the present club operation and position. Several hours were spend in highly detailed discussions of the intricacies of finances, project planning, and the operation of mailing system and by about 2 am the last slightly dazed NJPC ers departed into a driving rain storm (hopefully not an omen, hi)... According to our records, all orders for Logs, Pattern Books, reprints, and stationery have been filled; likewise we brought the mailing system up to date by mailing renewal notices effective to October 1st. It's our hope that this'll provide the Jersey guys with a few days of breathing space to get set up before the weekly crunch hits.

GOODBYE FROM THE BOSTON PUBLISHING COMMITTEE...

What can we say? After 162 issues of DX NEWS we find we've produced, addressed and mailed almost 4 million pages of DX NEWS; licked over 140,000 postage stamps; produced and mailed 3 Editions of the Domestic Log in 4 printings, the Latin American Log, and the Pattern Book. Mark Katz has mailed out more than 25,000 pages of reprints and at least 4,000 sample copies have gone out over the past 5 years. Sometimes it was fun... Sometimes it got pretty grim... But the BPC workers hung together through all the trials and tribulations and we've got a whole bookshelf full of DX NEWS that prove it is possible for a loosely structured group of volunteer workers to produce a weekly magazine in their spare time...

The NRC requires two types of workers to function: the section editors and the background workers. The Editors have the significant advantage (and I speak from experience) of having their signed handiwork show in DX NEWS . every issue; the fact that an Editor's efforts show week-after-week is one reason we have never had difficulty in finding Editors. The work of the background HQ workers (which often exceeds the time invested by the Editors) mailing samples, keeping the address system straight, mailing DX NEWS. working with the printer, etc. - frequently goes unnoticed and unappreciated. In our last few lines of BPC space we would like to reintroduce the workers whose background efforts during the past 5 years have kept the NRC rolling along week after week and year after year: Composition and Coordination: Big George Kelley, Rardy Kane, Cary Pall. Our Treasurers: Ray Moore and Tom Holmes. Mailing system coordinators: Randy Kane, Tom Holmes, Chuck Rossier. Reprint manager: Mark Katz. Publication workers: all of the above plus: Bart Cronin, Stan Morss, Phil Sullivan, Geoff Fox, Hal Robie, Greg Carrington, Dan Kahn, Lynne Pall, Frank Waldron, Bill Bailey, Mark Connely, Ruth and Diane Nelson, Harriet Fell, Jackie Rossier, John Pirnat, Grace-Anne Stipe, Hank Slade, John Lombard - with apologies to any we've overlooked. Two individuals deserve special mention: my wife, Ruth Nelson, for tolerating the clutter and disruption of sharing her home with NRC HQ all this time; and our printer, Mike Gerstein, of COPYCOP whose good humor and special efforts have been of inestimable aid to the NRC.

We wish the NJPC the best of luck and will continue to give them the same sort of cooperation they have given us in the past. And now, back to DX'ing...

The NJPC is proud to announce for those of you who were not in attendence at the Boston Convention that the new treasurer for the NJPC will be John Sampson. John has been a member of the NRC for over 15 years, and has recently moved back to North Jersey from the South.

The tentative schedule for Volume #41 calls for our initial issue to be the masthead date of October 15, 1973. Editors now have the entire projected schedule along with their requisite deadlines. Starting at that time, <u>DX News</u> will resume weekly operations through April 1, 1974, with skips for Thanksgiving, Christmas, and in mid-February, where, in the Northeast, at least, we have to work around official holidays for Lincoln's and Washington's Birthdays.

NJPC is also pleased to announce the former IDXD editor Bob "Foxy" Foxworth will be handling reprint orders for us. All orders should be addressed to the NJPC HQ address listed at the bottom of this page, and probably elsewhere in this issue. We will process the orders and send amounts, &c to Foxy, who will fill the orders. Log & Pattern Book orders will be handled thru HQ also.

Speaking of the NRC LG, we must announce that due to an unexpected increase of about 100% in the cost of obtaining government information on U.S. and Canadian changes from the FUC's contractor in suburban Washington (see DDXD in DXN #30), we will be forced to increase the prices of the NRC DOMESTIC LOG by \$1.00. Inasmuch as the accuracy of the log is dependent upon the timely receipt of station data, we hope that you will agree with us that this nominal increase on a still bargain-priced item is necessary.

FOR THE FIRST NJFC ISSUE, we hope to have another LOG UPDATER, and perhaps a special feature or two, and a preliminary "State of the NRC" message from NJFC, wherein we will attempt to let you know where we think we are, hi.

Members of the NJFC will be travelling to Boston late in September to assist in the composition of, and more importantly, learn some of the pitfalls and tricks in the composition of this issue, the last BPC DXN. We will be returning to North Jersey some thousand or so pounds heavier (the weight of the NRC upon our shoulders, so to speak) with logs, PBs, reprints, HQ supplies, membership files, &c, so PLEASE BE PATIENT WITH US DURING THE TRANSITION PERIOD, as we will be busily learning how best to cope with our new roles in life, and trying to discover the most expeditious meens of dealing with the various HQ functions. THERE WILL UNDOUBTEDLY BE DELAYS in ordered materials, membership changes, and most of all correspondence until after the first issue is put to bed, and probably continuing a bit thereafter, so PLEASE BEAR WITH US.

Sked was 2100 to 0050 British Summer Time (4pm to midnight EDT) and broadcast from the ship Mi Amigo. I can't add much else about loggings in England - I left my log there, hi. This marks an end to 21 years of ANing. WPEN-950 discontinued AN back in August, & now s/off nightly @ 1; this was done as an economy move. Let's hope the trend of AN & MSP operation is being reversed. In other radio news, WSUF-1580 Patchogue, L.I. which has been operating on low power since 1/73 returns to the full low on labor Day. Also on that day, WSUF switches to c/w. On 8/29 WCDG-1220 Hamden, Conn. was off for about a half hour beginning @ 4:30pm; WGNY Newburgh, N.Y. was coming in with a fair signal & w/WGNY nulled, WRIB-1220 Providence could be heard weakly w/talk & then c/w @ 4:45pm. Earlier in the Summer, WTHE-1520 Mineola, L.I. was off & I was able to hear another station faintly. I didn't get a positive ID, but from the bearing, I believe it was WCHE Chester, Pa. & NOT WSLT Ocean City N.J. which might be expected because of waterpath. Occasionally during the Summer I have daytime DXed to see what I could hear under locals on groundwave. I discovered it is possible to null WVNJ-629 & hear a station faintly under it that plays rr. I suspect either WMT or WHEN. About the furthest that can be heard on groundwave is WORR-1530 Wanchese, N.C. which can be heard w/wJDM N.J. nulled. In the other direction, WOTW-900 N.H. can be heard u/WFIN Pa. Daytime groundwave DX is interesting & challenging. I rarely if ever see it discussed in DX NEWS. The Yale FB Net will consist of WICC-600, WELI-960 & WQCW-1590. It is still not certain whether WPOP-1410 will take Yale this year. KPMC-1560 has joined CBS. The FCC has begun hearing two applications in this area, one for R. Ridgefield, Inc. which seeks 850, 1kw D-3, & one for Quinnipiac Valley Broadcasting, which seeks 850, 1kw D-3, at Wallingford, Co.m. The FCC is going to grant one or the other, but not both. General Broadcasting, Yorktown Heights, N.Y. which had proposed 850, 250-D has dropped its application. Wayne County Broadcasting, 850, Honesdale, Pa. is still pending. Atlas maps indicate Anchorage stations may be well blocked out during daytime. Rightime DX may be interesting with Japanese and Russian stations good possibilities. RXes joing up will ge the SPR-4 and SM-2 antenna and longwire, and a small Sony AM-FM portable. Also a car radio in my VW bug. I wonder if anyone in NRC has ever DXed from this area & if so what they heard most of the time?

Frankly, I like my DX-150A as far as it goes and given the price of new equipment today I think it's a reasonable tradeoff for quality received. It should be noted that I cannot use my SM-2 with my DX-150A, and I believe this would be true with any loop on any of the DX-150 series. The DX-150A has a ferrite loopstick wired in band A, the standard BCB. As such, any nulls are blunted by the omni pickup (well, almost!) of the loopstick. I've not yet bothered to dig into the DX-150A to remove the loopstick, but it does not appear to be a major job judging by the schematic. Wayman would have to undertake that job if he were to use the DX-150B with a Space Magnet. And as long as he has the RX opened up he ought to add the tape recorder jack to the hot side of the volume control. Couldn't cost more than 30¢. Incidentally, Radio Shack corporate headquarters in Texas can susply service manuals for the DX-150 series; for the DX-150A it was catalog #20-150 @ \$1.20 including postage (they'll invoice you). It's a worthwhile expenditure for the booklet; detailed parts list and component values, easy -to-read schematic, dial cord stringing directions, alignment details, etc. 73.

- 1196 GERMAN FELEHAL REFUELIC-VOA Munich very strong with Breakfast Show in EE O420 9/8. No trace of other carriers but SAH equipment not available. Heard on Mark Connally's R390 in Arlington, Mass. (GFN-Mass) MOROCCO-Agadir very strong and clear with typical AA mx; s/off OCOO with no anthem. Freq measured as 1195.9609 + 0.2 Hz. No SAH at this time, 9/7.
- 1200 VENEZUELA-YVOZ, R. Tiempo, Caracas fair in WOAI mull 9/10 at (GFN-Mass) O620+ with lively SS mx, many ID's, TC's, frequent mention of Caracas. Assumed the OC on the freq to be WOAI, according to DF. (RF-Chio)
- 1358 GERMAN DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC-Berlin assumed the strong TA carrier here on 9/9 at 0330+. Occ mx audible but no ammts. Fair TA opening this date but very noisy. This station not usually heard here. (Ed)
- 1375 St. PIERRE ET MIQUELON-ORTF local like sig 0102 9/7; man and woman alternating in FF; freq measured as 1375.0061 ± 0.4 Hz; characteristic short term freq fluctuations, mostly to the high side. (GPN-Mass) If this was still on at 0102 it is a sked change, formerly s/off 0100.
- 1376 &WAZILAND-Sked of this one is 1600-2200 with 5 kw. Adr is Box 99, Amsterdam, Transvaal, South Africa. Wants reports if you should be lucky enough to hear them. (DSWCI via RJE)
- 1421 GERMAN FEDERAL REPUBLIC-Saar now running 1200 kw. (DSWCI via RJE)
- 1484 DENMARK-Station formerly here has been deleted. (DSWCI via RJI)
- 1546 MALTA-DW relay at Nigret with 20 kw. is testing here ex 1570. (DSWCI via This has also been reported as being the old BEC relay at Deli- RJE) mara Point now being used by the Malta gov't. Some confusion here (Ed.)
- 1570 SOUTH KOREA-HIDA Cheju Island opened here in July with 250 kw. Frogramming is in CC JJ RH and hW. Adr is IFC Box 3939, Seoul and verification is by card. (DSWCI via hJE and Lars Ryden, Japan)

A SHORT CHRONOLOGICAL HISTORY OF RADIO FREE AMERICA

The following is a first attempt to trace the confused history of Garl McIntire's Radio Free America operation from the DX'ers viewpoint. We have drawn upon the following sources in an attempt to untangle the many contradictory and confusing reports in the press about the station: Larry Magne, who's been in daily contact with the McIntire operation, and has spent considerable time at McIntire HQ at Cape May in meetings with McIntire and his staff as a technical consultant; Tom Sundstrom, who's also been in frequent telephone contact with McIntire and staff; the author's own phone conversations with McIntire and staffers; reports in NY Times and Post, Philadelphia Inquirer and Bulletin, Washington Post, and the Christian Beacon.

- *April, 1965. FCC grants license to right-wing fundamentalist Rev. Carl McIntire for WXUR-690 in Media, Pa. and admonishes the owners in advance to observe the "Fairness Doctrine".
- *August, 1966. FCC refuses license renewal for WXUR because of claims of violation of fairness; WXUR continues to operate pending final court actions.
- *June, 1973. With time running out on WXUR and the refusal of the Supreme. Court to hear the case, McIntire announces he will set up an offshore pirate station if the FCC goes through with its plans to close WXUR on July 5th. He says the ship will come on the air within two weeks of the WXUR closing but does not specify AM or FM.
- *July 5, 1973. WXUR goes off the air.

- *July 11. DX NEWS carries an item on McIntire's proposed operation and suggests 1160 as the best channel if they go on MW.
- *August 30. McIntire announces that his ship, a 136 foot wooden-hulled WWII surplus YMS minesweeper, has arrived off Cape May. During its trip from Florida, the ship made a secret docking on August 27th to fit equipment. The Philadelphia Inquirer reports operation is "expected to begin today"; McIntire says the operation will be 24 hours on the MW band but refuses to give the frequency for fear of possible jamming by the FCC. Russ Edmunds and Chas. Clayton in N. J. report hearing an open carrier testing on 640 kHz which they believe is McIntire; they report direction finding consistent with Cape May. This later turns out to have been a local carrier-current college station tuning up for the new school year. The first of several reasonable false alarms.
- *August 31. Tom Sundstrom calls his local newsstation KYW to see if they have more information on the supposedly soon to begin operating RFA; he ends up making a taped interview aired later in the day in which he suggests that the best frequency for McIntire would be 1160 with 1610 as a second choice. Meanwhile Magne, who has been in contact with McIntire, calls the NRC Convention in Boston to ask us to suggest possible channels for RFA. The Convention-goers decide that 1160 kHz is still the best first choice, followed with a channel like 1615 out of the band and as far from WWRL as practical; 820, 640, and 690 are also mentioned. A spokesman for the FCC announces that under no circumstances will the FCC jam Radio Free America. The Coast Guard boards the ship to investigate reports of an "oil leak".

 *September 1. Magne notifies Convention that McIntire plans to test late afternoon early evening; frequency undisclosed but supposedly "in bottom
 - half of band". Nothing heard. *September 2. Magne informs that technical problems prevented the test from being aired: they'll try again today around 1500 hours on 692 kHz; alternate frequencies are 1160 and 1613 kHz.

- *September 3. McIntire announces frequencies to press; main channel to be 692 with alternates of 1160, 1613, and 1500 kHz in that order. The ship is dedicated "Columbus" by McIntire but the transmitter is still not ready.
- *September 4. Sundstrom informs us that he's observed what appeared to be a carrier on 690 during the afternoon; later turns out to be QRM from television set the second false alarm.
- *September 5. Intrigued by the FCC's public statement that McIntire's operation will be the first U.S. off-shore bootlegger, we research down the details of RXKR which operated off Los Angeles in 1933 (special thanks to Stan Morss). McIntire says this precedent may help to support his position in court.
- *September 6. McIntire changes frequencies to 1160 as primary channel with 1613, 692, and 535 kHz as alternates; 692 has been dropped because of the heterodyne problem as pointed out by Sundstrom, Magne, et al. Operation expected shortly.
- *September 7. Magne and author detect carrier on 1159.022 (measured by author) around 2000; Magne checks with RFA engineer who says there have still not been any transmissions. Carrier turns out to be an LA another false alarm.
- *September 12. FIRST ACTUAL TRANSMISSION FROM SHIP. Open carrier comes on 2345; noted by Sundstrom and others in N.J.; transmitter being tuned; frequency reportedly drifting several kHz. About 20 minutes of music played before ship's crew comes in at 0200; no announcements yet. Shielding and grounding problems have caused severe overheating of transmitter and a small fire has been started during this test period.
- *September 14. Defective crystal supposedly replaced; tests, scheduled to resume tonight, postponed after ship loses anchor in storm; ship returns to port to refit anchor.
- *September 16. Second test period begins right at midnight. Carrier goes off and on; transmitter obviously being tuned. Frequency measured by author as 1160.0021 ± 0.4 kHz with excellent stability. Continuous stripchart recordings made by author show RFA about 20 db stronger in Boston than WJJD's peak signal earlier in the evening. Test lasts until about 0500 with music towards the end; no announcements.
- *September 17. McIntire reportedly elated to hear that RFA will probably dominate WJJD in New England. In agreement with McIntire, Magne sets up an impromptu phone network to collect telephone reception reports on the first day of transmission. Since QSL cards have not yet been printed, first day telephone reports will receive a special QSL; regular reports will have to wait until some future date for verification.
- *September 19. REGULAR TRANSMISSIONS BEGIN 12:20 PM on 1160. Some technical problems during initial hour; ship is crusing 12 miles out back and forth between Cape May and Asbury Park. Daytime groundwave carrier just detectable in Boston 1630 for frequency check by author. RFA using longwire dipole antenna; ERP based on field strength in Boston estimated to be 1 2 kw. Signoff about 2200. Telephone reception reports received from as far as Bangor, Maine, and Pittsburgh. Some audio taped by Dave Fischer in Hickory, N. C. Furthest inland penetration seems to have been Youngstown where Boyd reports carrier but no audio. As expected, coverage is best along the Coast with relatively poor inland penetration. Late afternoon McIntire receives irate phone call from WHLW-1170, 5 kw D3 in Lakewood, N. J. (about 90 miles distant), complaining about QRM.
- *September 20. Without consulting technical staff or engineers, McIntire calls press conference and announces he will change channels to avoid interfering with his "neighbor" WHLW. According to the Times, he says he will simply change channels as "there is no dearth of wavelengths, and we do not want to interfere with any other station" (!!! author). He says he will move to 1613, "that's way up at the top of the band; there's nobody up there"; expects to be on

new channel within about a week. McIntire and Magne go over telephoned reception reports; of about 15 reports all but perhaps one are definitely verifiable. Although RFA was heard over a large area, reported signal strengths are relatively low and the results are judged generally disappointing. *September 21. In a call from McIntire's Administrative Assistant we're informed that the FCC has been granted a temporary restraining order by U.S. District Court Judge Mitchell H. Cohen (Camden) barring RFA from operations on 1160 because of complaints of interference from WHLW and KSL (!!! - author). A hearing is set for October 1st to make the order permanent.

*September 23. A McIntire employee calls author requesting signal strength and frequency check for brief test on new channel above 1600 kHz. Tests on this channel scheduled for resumption September 29.

And that's a brief outline of the story to date. There are many fascinating aspects of the RFA story which we haven't even mentioned - legal, historical, political, philosophical, first person and even sub rosa aspects - and much of this will be appearing here in DX NEWS in fu ture issues. Much of the interesting detail has been dug, ferretted, and gleaned by Larry Magne and Tom Sundstrom and we're sure they'll be telling their stories in the near furture. What we've tried to do here is give a chronological overview of the basic events of the period as based on all of the information which has come to us at this time.

Regarding frequencies: many an hour has been spent in the last two months on the frequency problem. It should be obvious to any knowledgeable DX'er that there are just NO frequencies available for a New Jersey operation which will not cause QRM to some other station. The traditional "bootleg band" above 1600 kHz would be pretty good except for WWRL on 1600; by the time a station like RFA goes high enough to avoid WWRL they'll be outside the tuning range of most receivers. 1500 kHz is out due to WTOP; 1200 because of WCAU. The best channel, 1160, is naturally out because of that massive interference to KSL and WHLW, hi. The 1040 area is out because of 1020, 1030. and 1060: 880 rules out 870-890. Another possible - 820 - goes because of QRM to and from WNYC-830; while McIntre might buck the FCC what chance does he have against the City of New York? Hi. The old WXUR channel of 690 is probably all right during the day but CBF and WCBM will really do a job after dark. The presence of WNBC will kill 650; not to mention the signal from WSM. There's a bit better chance for 640 although the Cuban is pretty bad and WSM plus the Regionals like WPRO and WMAL would kill all but local coverage after dark. Out of bandoperations below 540 kHz like 535 are out because of motential QRM to the navigational beacons down there.

Regarding RXKR: practically every press report on RFA from both McIntire and the FCC mentions the fact that RFA is the first station of its kind in the U.S. In a very real sense this is definitely not the case... Readers of DX NEWS probably noticed a reproduction of a QSL from RXKR on page 6 of the July 1st, 1972 issue; this 1933 shipboard operation off the coast of Los Angeles was the predecessor of Radio Free America but neither the FCC or McIntire's lawyers did their homework well enough to dig out the RXKR story... Since it may have some effect on the McIntire-FCC court struggle it bears retelling... It seems that RXKR was a bootleg station operated from a ship of Panamanian registry (that may be important; COLUMBUS is registered in the US) owned and operated by the Panama Broadcasting Company based in Los Angeles. The

ship. the SS CITY OF PANAMA, served as a combination floating speakeasybrothel-bootleg radio station-gambling den which docked in L.A. every day and sailed out beyond the 12 mile limit every night to allow their patrons to forget the Depression for a few hours... RXKR operated on 815 kHz with a smashing (for those days) power of about 5 kw; in those days of unselective receivers they effectively wiped out WFAA, WBAP, WCCO, WHAS, KOA, and KGO according to press reports at the time. They were heard from Hawaii to Nova Scotia but the U.S. Government did not directly intervene with the operation. Since there was no FCC at the time (the "The Communications Act" did not come into effect until mid-summer of 1934), the State Department complained to the government of Panama and demanded that the ship's registration be lifted. Panama said that it would but, being in the midst of one of their perennial revolutions, apparently never got around to it (at this point the record goes dim and it's going to take a visit to the National Archives to get the end of the story). The operation supposedly went broke due to lack of financial backing in the fall of 1933 but the real story is probably much more interesting... For what it's worth, RXKR is indeed a precedent of sorts, although with some important differences from the McIntire operation.

Dear Gordon.

Thank you for your telephoned report concerning reception of an open carrier from 0500-0508 & 0530-0545 GMT on September 16 on 1160 kHz Mv. Thank you, as well, for relaying information on reception of an open carrier for three hours on that same frequency in New Jersey around 0330 GMT September 13.

The information in your report has been checked by Dr. Carl EcIntire and ir. Thomas Meckes. In their opinion, it corresponds exactly with the testing done with the "Radio Free America" transmitter. Yours was the first correct report received by them and they are delighted with your findings.

"Radio Free America" was operating September 13 from a point 3¹ miles off Cape Fay, but due to a broken anchor it has been operating from a point roughly 6 miles off Cape Fay since Friday. September 14.

Eroadcasting is due to commence today at 1400 GT on 1160 kHz (very exactly, as you suggested in your report). "Radio Free America" is operating from a 10 kw RCA transmitter using a fundamental-frequency crystal. The antenna is an inverted-V with two main lobes and a considerable skywave component. The ship is a 150° converted WW II U.S. minesweeper, wooden-hulled.

Your further reports, as well as those of other National Radio Club members, will be welcomed and should be addressed to the above address, c/o:

Dr. Carl McIntire

Reports will likely be verified by a QSI card depicting the ship.
