Two individuals deserve special mention: my wife, Ruth Nelson, for tolerdting the clutter and disruption of sharing her home with NRC HQ all this time; and our printer, Mike Gerstein, of COPYCOP whose good humor and special efforts have been of inestimable aid to the NRC.

Richard Wayman Jr. of Villa Park, Ill asks some questions about the Realistic DX-150B and the worcester SM-2, in the 7/11/73 DX NEWS (re ceived 7/30!) Frankly, I like my DX-150A as far as it goes and given the price of new equipment today I think it's a reasomble tradeoff for quality received. It should be noted that I cannot use my $\mathrm{SM}-2$ with my $\mathrm{DX}-150 \mathrm{~A}$, and I believe this would be true with any loop on any of the $D X-150$ series. The $D X-150 \mathrm{~A}$ has a ferrite loopstick wired in band $A$, the standard $B C B$. As such, any nulls are blunted by the omni pickup (well, aloost: ) of the loopstick. I've not yet bothered to dis into the $D X-1504$ to remove the loopstick, but it does not appear to be a major job judging by the schematic. Wayman would have to undertake that job if he were to use the $D X-150 B$ with a Space Nagnet. And as long as he has the RX opened up he ought to add the tape recorder jack to the hot side of the volume control. Couldn't cost more than $30 \phi$. Incidentally, Radio Shack corporate headquarters in Texas can susply service manuals for the DX- 150 series; for the $D X-150 \mathrm{~A}$ it was catalog while expenditure for the booklet; detailed parts list and component values, easy -to-read schematic, dial cord strinfing directions, alignment details, etc. .73.

## *Gordon P. Nelson

The following is a first attempt to trace the confused history of Carl McIntire's Radio Free America operation from the DX'ers viewpoint. We have drawn upon the following sources in an attempt to untangle the many contradictory and confusing reports in the press about the station: Larry Magne, who's been in daily contact with the McIntire operation, and has spent considerable time at McIntire HQ at Cape May in meetings with McIntire and his staff as a technical consultant; Tom Sundstrom, who's also been in frequent telephone contact with McIntire and staff; the author's own phone conversations with McIntire and staffers; reports in NY Times and Post, Philadelphia Inquirer and Bulletin, Washington Post, and the Christian Beacon.
*April, 1965. FCC grants license to right-wing fundamentalist Rev. Carl McIntire for WXUR-690 in Media, Pa. and admonishes the owners in advance to observe the "Fairness Doctrine".
*August, 1966. FCC refuses license renewal for WXUR because of claims of violation of fairness; WXUR continues to operate pending final court actions.
*June, 1973. With time running out on WXUR and the refusal of the Supreme
Court to hear the case, McIntire announces he will set up an offshore pirate station if the FCC goes through with its plans to close WXUR on July 5th. He says the ship will come on the air within two weeks of the WXUR closing but does not specify AM or FM.
*July 5, 1973. WXUR goes off the air.
*July 11. DX NEWS carries an item on McIntire's proposed operation and suggests 1160 as the best channel if they go on MW.
*August 30. McIntire announces that his ship, a 136 foot wooden-hulled WWII surplus YMS minesweeper, has arrived off Cape May. During its trip from Florida, the ship made a secret docking on August 27th to fit equipment. The Philadelphia Inquirer reports operation is "expected to begin today"; McIntire says the operation will be 24 hours on the MW band but refuses to give the frequency for fear of possible jamming by the FCC. Russ Edmunds and Chas. Clayton in No Jo report hea ring an open carrier testing on 640 kHz which they believe is McIntire; they report direction finding consistent with Cape May. This later turns out to have been a local carrier-current college station tuning up for the new school year. The first of several reasonable false alarms.
*August 31. Tom Sundstrom calls his local news station KYW to see if they have more information on the supposedly soon to begin operating RFA; he ends up making a taped interview aired later in the day in which he suggests that the best frequency for McIntire would be 1160 with 1610 as a second choice. Meanwhile Magne, who has been in contact with McIntire, calls the NRC Convention in Boston to ask us to suggest possible channels for RFA. The Convention-goers decide that 1160 kHz is still the best first choice, followed with a channel like 1615 out of the band and as far from WWRL as practical; 820,640 , and 690 are also mentioned. A spokesman for the FCC announces that under no circumstances will the FCC jam Radio Free America. The Coast Guard boards the ship to investigate reports of an "oil leak". *September 1. Magne notifies Convention that McIntire plans to test late afternoon - early evening; frequency undisclosed but supposedly "in bottom half of band'. Nothing heard.
*September 2. Magne informs that technical problems prevented the test from being aired: they'll try again today around 1500 hours on 692 kHz ; alternate frequencies are 1160 and 1613 kHz .
*September 3. McIntire announces frequencies to press; main channel to be 692 with alternates of 1160,1613 , and 1500 kHz in that order. The ship is dedicated "Columbus" by McIntire but the transmitter is still not ready.
*September 4. Sundstrom informs us that he's observed what appeared to be a carrier on 690 during the afternoon; later turns out to be QRM from television set - the second false alarm.
*September 5. Intrigued by the FCC's public statement that McIntire's operation will be the first U.S. off-shore bootlegger, we research down the details of RXKR which operated off Los Angeles in 1933 (special thanks to Stan Morss). McIntire says this precedent mayhelp to support his position in court.
*September 6. Mcintire changes frequencies to 1160 as primary channel with 1613, 692 , and 535 kHz as alternates; 692 has been dropped because of the heterodyne problem as pointed out by Sundstrom, Magne, et al. Operation expected shortly.
*September 7. Magne and author detect carrier on 1159.022 (measured by author) a round 2000; Magne checks with RFA engineer who says there have still not been any transmissions. Carrier turns out to be an LA - another false alarm.
*September 12. FIRST ACTUAL TRANSMISSION FROM SHIP. Open carrier comes on 2345; noted by Sundstrom and others in No. Jo; transmitter being tuned; frequency reportedly drifiting several kHz . About 20 minutes of music played before ship's crew comes in at 0200; no announcements yet. Shielding and grounding problems have caused severe overheating of transmitter and a small fire has been started during thistest period.
*September 14. Defective crystal supposedly replaced; tests, scheduled to resume tonight, postponed after ship loses anchor in storm; ship returns to port to refit anchor.
*September 16. Second test period begins right at midnight. Carrier goes off and on; transmitter obviously peing tuned. Frequency measured by author as $1160.0021 \pm 0.4 \mathrm{kHz}$ with excellent stability. Continuous stripchart recordings made by author show RFA about 20 db stronger in Boston than WJJD's peak signal earlier in the evening. Test lasts until about 0500 with music towards the end; no announcements.
*September 17. McIntire reportedly elated to hear that RFA will probably dominate WJJD in New England. In agreement with McIntire, Magne sets up an impromptu phone network to collect telephone reception reports on the first day of transmission. Since QSL cards have not yet been printed, first day telephone reports will receive a special QSL; regular reports will have to wait until some future date for verification.
*September 19. REGULAR TRANSMISSIONS BEGIN 12:20 PM on 1160. Some technical problems during initial hour; ship is crusing 12 miles out back and forth between Cape May and Asbury Park. Daytime groundwave carrier just detectable in Boston 1630 for frequency check by author. RFA using longwire dipole antenna; ERP based on field strength in Boston estimated to be $1-2 \mathrm{kw}$. Signoff about 2200. Telephone reception reports received from as far as Bangor, Maine, and Pittsburgh. Some audio taped by Dave Fischer in Hickory, N. C. Furthest inland penetration seems to have been Youngstown where Boyd reports carrier but no audio. As expected, coverage is best along the Coast with relatively poor inland penetration. Late afternoon McIntire receives irate phone call from WHLW-1170, 5 kw D3 in Lakewood, NoJ. (about 90 miles distant), complaining about QRM.
*September 20. Without consulting technical staff or enginecrs, McIntire calls press conference and announces he will change channels to avoid interfering with his "neighbor" WHLW. According to the Times, he says he will simply change channels as "there is no dearth of wavelengths, and we do not want to Interfere with any other station" (!!! - author). He says he will move to 1613 'that's way up at the top of the band; there's nobody up there"; expects to be on
reception reports; of about 15 reports all but perhaps one are definitely verifiable. Although RFA was heard over a large area, reported signal strengths are relatively low and the results a re judged gene rally disappointing. *September 21。 In a call from McIntire's Administrative Assistant we're informed that the FCC has been granted a temporary restraining order by U.S. District Court Judge Mitchell H. Cohen (Camden) barring RFA from operations on 1160 because of complaints of interference from WHLW and KSL (!!! - author). A hearing is set for October lst to make the order permanent.
*September 23. A McIntire employee calls author requesting signal strength and frequency check for brief test on new channel above 1600 kHz . Tests on this chamel scheduled for resumption September 29 .

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And that's a brief outline of the story to date. There are many fascinating aspects of the RFA story which we haven't even mentioned-legal, historical, political, philosophical, first person and even sub rosa aspects - and much of this will be appearing here in DX NEWS in fu ture issues. Much of the interesting detail has been dug, ferretted, and gleaned by Larry Magne and Tom Sundstrom and we're sure they'll be telling their stories in the near furture. What we've tried to do here is give a chronological overview of the basic events of the period as based on all of the information which has come to us at this time.

Regarding frequencies: many an hour has been spent in the last two months on the frequency problem. It should be obvious to any knowledgeable DX'er that there are just NO frequencies available for a New Jersey operation which will not cause $Q R M$ to some other station. The traditional "bootleg band" above 1600 kHz would be pretty good except for WWRL on 1600 ; by the time a station like RFA goes high enough to avoid WWRL they'll be outside the tuning range of most receivers. 1500 kHz is out due to WTOP; 1200 because of WCAU. The best channel, 1160 , is naturally out because of that massive interference to KSL and WHLW, hi. The 1040 area is out because of 1020 , 1030, and 1060; 880 rules out 870-890. Another possible - 820-goes because of QRM to and from WNYC-830; while McIntre might buck the FCC what chance does he have against the City of New York? Hi. The old WXUR channel of 690 is probably all right during the day but CBF and WCBM will really do a job after dark. The presence of WNBC will kill 650; not to mention the signal from WSM. There's a bit better chance for 640 although the Cuban is pretty from WSM. There's a bit better chance for bad and WSM plus the Regionals like WPRO and WMAL would kill all but local coverage after dark. Out of bandoperations below 540 kHz like 535 are out because of potentill QRM to the navigational beacons down there.

Regarding RXKR: practically every press report on RFA from both McIntire and the FCC mentions the fact that RFA is the first station of its kind in the U. S. In a very real sense this is definitely not the case... Readers of DX NEWS probably noticed a reproduction of a QSL from RXKR on page 6 of the July lst, 1972 issue; this 1933 shipboard operation off the coast of Los Angeles was the predecessor of Radio Free America but neither the FCC or McIntire's lawyers did their homework well enough to dig out the RXKR story... Since it may have some effect on the McIntire-FCC court struggle it bears retelling... It seems that RXKR was a bootleg station operated from a ship of Panamanian registry (that may be important; COLUMBUS is registered in the US) owned and operated by the Panama Broadcasting Company based in Los Angeles. The
ship, the SS CITY OF PANAMA, served as a combination floating speakeasy brothel-bootleg radio station-gambling den which docked in $L_{0} A$. every day an sailed out beyond the 12 mile limit every night to allow their patrons to forget the Depression for a few hours... RXKR operated on 815 kHz with a smashing (for those days) power of about 5 kw ; in those days of unselective receivers they effectively wiped out WFAA, WBAP, WCCO, WHAS, KOA, and KGO according to press reports at the time. They were heard from Hawaii to Nova Scotia but the U.S. Government did not directly intervene with the operation. Since the re was no FCC at the time (the "The Communications Act" did not come into effect until mid-summer of 1934), the State Department complained to the government of Panama and demanded that the ship's registration be lifted. Panama said that it would but, being in the midst of one of their perennial revolutions, apparently never got around to it (at this point the record goes dim and it's going to take a visit to the National Archives to get the end of the story). The operation supposedly went broke due to lack of financial backing in the fall of 1933 but the real story is probably much more interesting. . For what it's worth, RXKR is indeed a precedent of sorts, although with some important differences from the McIntire operation.

Dear Gordon,
Thank you for your telephoned report concerning reception of an open carrier from 0500-0508\& $0530-0545 \mathrm{GT}$ on Seotember 16 on 1160 kHz O. Thant you, as well, for relaying information on reception of an open carrier for three hours on that same frequency in New Jersey around 0330 GlvT September 13.

The information in your report has been checked hy Dr. Carl UcIntire and i r. Thomas reckes. In their opinion, it corresponds exactly with the testine done with the "hadio Free America" transmitter, Yours was the first correct report received by them and they are delighted with your findings.
"Radio Free America" was operating September 13 from a point $3 \frac{1}{1}$ riles off Cape ray, but due to a broken anchor it has been operating fror a point rouokly $E$ miles off Cape lay since Friday, September 14.

Eroadcasting is due to commence today at $1400 \mathrm{c}^{2 \mathrm{~m}}$ on $1160 \mathrm{k}: 2$ (very exactly, as you suggested in your report). "Radio Free America" is operating from a 10 kW RCA transmitter using a fundamental-frequency crostal. The antenna is an invertediv with two main lobes and a considerable skrive component. The ship is a 150 converted UW II U.S. minesweeper, wooden-hulled.
