

Checked some Habana frequencies on MW and SW, still a little early to tell Lili if passes them, but nothing unusual. No trace of R. Ariguanabo-1200 midday (but that's not unusual--possibly 1/3 of the time they appear to be off). [Krueger-FL]

Did a little bit of monitoring on the 2010 while losing consciousness last night; Progreso announced as jointly broadcasting with R. Ciudad de la Habana, Rebelde announced joint with R Cadena Habana and R Reloj, but didn't check if all actually parallel. Lots of announcements from the Comite de Defensa Civil and Instituto Nacional de Meteorologia which sounded like they were designed to spread panic (lots of beeps and yelling echo annts). R Mambi 710 had special coverage also. This morning had Reloj usual format running on 640 up to 1100Z, then into open carrier, no sign of Progeso usual sign-on. Reloj made a big deal of the fact that Fidel was personally visiting the affected areas in Habana Vieja at 0500 local time (doesn't he EVER sleep?). (maybe he's a DXer? Jim) (Try BS'er-pls) Cuba, BTW, has already gone off DST, announcing Z-5 TCs on Reloj. This morning I can only hear Rebelde on 1180, no sign of Taino here, so they may have pulled the plug... [Crawford-FL]

640 CUBA R Reloj, OCT 18 1505-1630+ GMT - MW and SW observations as Huracán Lili crosses Cuba as I type this: 640 Reloj audio feed replacing Progreso audio, parallel 880. (Progreso outlets normally heard daytime on 870/890/900 either off or reduced power, i.e unheard). Dallas Radio Stations Struggle To Return after Tower Collapse The Dallas Morning News Knight-Ridder/Tribune Business News

Oct. 15--The collapse of the broadcasting tower in Cedar Hill on Saturday has radio executives struggling between sorrow over the deaths of three men and worry over how to get blacked-out stations back on the air.

And lost amid all that has been the irony of having Dallas' only all-news station, soon to go dark itself after its recently announced sale, taken off the air once and for all by mming to the 94.9 FM frequency.

The initial plan was to keep KEWS broadcasting local news until Oct. 25 and then switch to a syndicated talk format under new call letters. But KEWS is now gone for good.

KYNG should be back on the air at its 105.3 frequency by Wednesday night, said Scott Savage, vice president and general manager of KYNG and KEWS. The plan now is to simulcast KYNG on 105.3 and 94.9 until Oct. 28.

On that date, listeners who tune in to 94.9 will hear syndicated talk shows, including the Don Imus morning show out of New York, Mr. Savage said. Other programs already slated include Tom Leykis, a liberal, politically oriented talk host; and Ferrall on the Bench, a manic sports-talk show dumped not too long ago by KLIF-AM (570).

All of that syndicated talk will move to the 1190 AM frequency once the KEWS sale to Salem is

That leaves a large group of KEWS reporters out of work about two weeks sooner than they expected, all because of a spot-news story they're probably itching to cover.

For now, news staffers are still coming into the office, says operations manager Pete Gardner. They're spending most of their time answering calls from curious listeners who want to know why they're hearing country music instead of news.

In the meantime, engineers are working on a 1 kilowatt signal for 105.3, which will broadcast a continuous message telling listeners where to find KYNG.

As for the other two stations knocked out by the collapse of the tower, KOAI was back on the air as of early Monday evening. Skip Schmidt, vice president and general manager of KOAl and KRBV, said he's not sure yet when KRBV will return.

"We're going to be on the air doing benefits and doing something for the families of those men who died, so we can get them some money," he said.

DX'ing 'smart', with shared tips and requests by NRC members

Beginner's Guide To Starting A Home Electronics Lab

How often have you been interested in assembling one of the many electronic construction projects that have appeared in DX News, only to become frustrated and eventually give up? Having the right tools and an inventory of common components and supplies readily available can sometimes make the difference between successful completion of a project or relegation to the junk box. When you don't have to deal with searching for the right tools or having to make several trips to the store to pick up missing supplies, you'll be able to concentrate on the tasks at hand, and the project will run much more smoothly. This edition of Target DX simply attempts to identify the tools, supplies, and commonly used components that every home electronics lab should have available to tackle most construction projects and repairs. Several reliable sources are also identified, just in case you can't find what you need at the local store. To get started, telephone some of the listed sources to request catalogs. Building up a lab inventory does represent a major investment, but you don't have to do it all in one shot. Like a savings account, a home electronics lab can grow with time. As the basic requirements are filled and experience is gained, you may find the desire to expand the lab with more elaborate and expensive equipment, much to the chagrin of your significant other (or mom & dad).

Basic tools required: Bench lamp, adjustable arm. Bench vise, small table-top type. Hand drill, variable speed. Safety glasses. Screwdrivers (slotted, phillips, torx). Nutdrivers (US & metric). Wire Cutters. Wire Strippers, Adjustable. Pliers (long & needle nose). 25-w Soldering Iron (light & heavy duty tips). Multimeter (ohms, volts, amps/milliamps). Multiple outlet power strip. Variable DC power supply.

Lab Supplies:

Adapters (BNC jack to UHF plug, BNC jack to dual

RG-58 BNC cable assemblies.

RG-58 PL-259 (UHF) cable assemblies.

Alligator Clips (screw or solder terminal).

Electrical tape.

Component News

As long as we're on the topic of radio parts, manufacturers and experimenters may want to take note of the following. The International Electrotechnical Commission (IEC), an international body that develops world standards for quality and safety, has introduced a standard for piezoelectric ceramic filters. IEC 368-2-2 "describes passive bandpass filters operating over the frequency range of a few kilohertz to more than 10 MHz. These are commonly available as separate and independent units. The standard draws attention to some of the fundamental questions which should be considered by the user before placing an order for a filter for a new application. Such a procedure will be the user's insurance against unsatisfactory performance.

"Piezoelectric ceramic filters are at present widely used in communication (in IF amplifiers of communication receivers)...

"Thanks to technological advances in the field of stable piezoelectric ceramic materials, a promising new method has appeared for designing economical, high quality miniature filters using piezoelectric ceramic resonators. The availability of these ceramic resonators with a high coupling factor, a high Q factor, and satisfactory stability now allows for the design of a piezoelectric ceramic filter which can be used as an alternative to both mechanical and conventional LC filters, as well as for new applications." - Bulletin of the International Electrotechnical Commission, No. 159, July/August 1996. 73

'Medi DX' LW/MW World Wide Contest

2nd PERIOD: From 0000 UTC of 05th JANUARY 1997 to 2359 UTC of 18th JANUARY 1997. Sharers are not obliged to participate in both periods, but points will be rise if both of them are monitored.

- 3. FREQUENCIES. It is only permitted to DX from 0 kHz to 3000 kHz. Any BCB or UTILITY Station will be valid on that range. DXing above 3000 kHz is not valid. Each station can be logged only once through both series of the Contest.
- 4. LOGGINGS. All listening must be done from the same shack. Portable operation it is not allowed. At least five different details of each station must be heard to be considered. Long distance DXing has to be recorded in order to be verified for the Organization.
- 5. POINTS. Points will be awarded as following:

A. 1 point for each station reported. B. Distance Multiplier (D): D<500 Km ----> x1 500-1000 Km -----> x2 1000-2500 Km ----> x3 2500-5000 Km -----> x5 5000-8000 Km ----> x7 D>8000 Km ----> x9 C. Station Power Multiplier (P): P<1 Kw ----> x4 1-5 Kw -----> x3 5-50 Kw ----> x2 P>50 Kw -----> x1 D. Frequency Multiplier (F): F<1 MHz ----> x3 1-2 MHz ----> x2 F>2 MHz -----> x1



Total points are calculated as below (multipliers pertain to each station logged):.

Total Points = (Station 1xMultiplier 1)+(Station2xMultiplier2)+...

6. LOG SHEETS. DXers must be send the Official Contest Sheets before the 1st of February, 1997 (envelope date stamp). Official sheets will be addressed to participants when registrations will be processed.
