
DX AND EQUIPMENT TESTS

WRKL-NY-910 went silent 3/18 at 1500 while new owners decide what to do with the station; which has been the principal source of local news in Rockland County. [Having lived there for two years, I can attest to what a great local radio station this one was. - DY| WBNW-MA-1120 is reportedly moving its studios to Wells Avenue in Newton. WKOX-MA-1200 was heard signing off as early as 2300 recently; has "J-Light" leasing ended? WMSA-NY-1340 will not be signing off at 2200 (2000 on Sunday) much longer; will go 24h NSP when Tim Martz takes over the station. WSRO-MA-1470 is indeed operating from its new single tower in Hudson, having lost its old site just off Route 85, and the word on the signal is "miserable." The more interesting DX quickly follows. By two hours after sunset, domestic QRM gets worse and the foreign DX becomes less exciting. The secret is to work that magic sunset-1 hour

to sunset+2 hours window. Use a cardioid or end-fire directional antenna. And, above all, DX from a coastal site whenever possible."

STATION NEWS

ISRAEL/CLANDESTINE: From Newstide (www.newstide.com): Voice of Peace returns on Saturday by Mike Brand (MAR 15): The Voice of Peace, the offshore pirate radio station that broadcast for more than 20 years, promoting peace and discussion between Jew and Arab is to return next weekend.

The station closed down and scuttled its ship in 1993, when its founder Abie Nathan considered that the Peace Process was proceeding well enough that the station was no longer required. Now that the Israeli Government has decided to licence pirate stations that broadcast for more than 5 years, and with an increased level of political tension, Abie and his family have decided that the time is right for the VOP to return. We quote below from the VOP press release (but have amended the dates to reflect the current schedule): "The New Voice of Peace announces that on Sunday 20th March our broadcasts will restart. In addition to normal radio broadcasts; you can also listen to the New Voice of Peace on the Internet at the following sites: - www.thevoiceof peace.co.il, www.voiceofpeace.co.il, www.voiceofpeace.org, www.vop.co.il. It is our intention to sail on the "New Peace Ship " from Jaffa Harbor on Saturday 20th March at 17.00, and position ourselves off the Israeli coast. Our broadcasts will be received in all parts of Israel, and also in "New Palestine" and in the Middle Eastern countries. Since Israel is at the crossroads between Asia, Europe, and Africa, the content of our broadcasts will be on the lines of Radio Free Europe and N.P.R - National Public Radio. We will broadcast in English, Hebrew and Arabic. Most of our broadcasts will be presented by children, as they are our represent the next generations, and they will have to live with the decisions we make today. We believe that their voices need to be heard over every other voice. The decision of the Supreme Court last Wednesday which legalizes pirate radio stations has to include the Voice of Peace; that was the first station to start broadcasting. Therefore we are demanding special attention in the issuing of licenses to those concerned". It is understood that the station will transmit on 1540Khz

AM, and 108 FM. [Posted on Medium Wave Circle website] GERMANY: At the end of March a new 500 kW Telefunkenbrand transmitter for Deutschlandradio Berlin on 177 kHz will inaugurated at the Zehlendorf site north from Berlin (usually listed as Oranienburg, a town some 15 km west from the Zehlendorf village). Currently they operate still the ancient transmitter installation from 1956, a combination of three 250 kW PA stages, each using four SRW-357 tubes. The new commercial "Power-Radio Mecklenburg-Vorpommern" originally intended to start broadcasting at May 4th, but these date was postponed by a half year, also due to technical difficulties: A first attempt to reactivate the old 20 kW transmitter at Rostock-Stadtweide after years of silence resulted in a complete failure, looks like they have to replace it by a new one. "Power-Radio" will broadcast from



Rostock and Neubrandenburg-Helpterberg on 558 kHz with 20 kW each, from Wöbbelin (usually listed as Schwerin, although the facilities are situated some 25 km south from these town) on 999 kHz with 20 kW too and from Putbus (Rügen island) on 531 kHz (no longer 729 kHz, as originally announced) with 10 kW. [Kai Ludwig (Germany) via DX Window in Medium Wave Circle e-mail]

NETHERLANDS: Update on 1999 WRTH. This is the present situation: 675 Radio Ten Gold, Lopik 120 kW; 828 Arrow Classic Rock, Heinenoord 20 kW; 1224 Q-Radio, Trintelhaven, Ijselmeer 40 kW; 1395 Business Radio (ex Talk Radio), Mastwijk, Lopik 120 kW. Licenses issues for: 1035 Hoppa Radio, Echt and Utrecht, 1485 Hindoestaanse Omroep, Den Haag, 1485 Visie Marketing and Media, Tuilburg, 1557 Max FM, Amsterdam, 1584 Gooiland Radio, Utrecht, 1602 Q-Radio, Leewarden. [Wolfgang Bueschel in Medium Wave News, MAR 99] Wian Stienstra from the Netherlands thinks the above small private stations will not be on the air dur to financial reasons. Perhaps one or two stations will come on the air later this year. [BE via MV EKO in Medium Wave News MAR 99]

NORWAY: NRK 1314 was recently noted as off the air. Here is an update: "They are back but on reduced power. There are 2 electrical power cables running along the bottom of the sea out to the island of Kvitsoy. First one of the cables failed, then, incredibly, within 10 days the other one failed as



well. This left the entire island without electricity. A couple of days later emergency power generators were providing electricity, but everyone on the island were urged to use as little of it as possible. The power cables at the sea bottom are owned by Norkring (responsible for the NRK transmitters) and they are currently in public disagreement with a local utility company on who should pay the bill to either repair the cables or install new cables. A return to the normal supply of electricity is not expected until the beginning of April at the earliest." [Jan Alvestad-SWEDEN in hard-core-dx] (I think this may affect some shortwave broadcasts as well - Jim)

TURKEY: AFN Incirlik is on 1593 kHz with local and satellite programming, 24 hours per day. Announces "1590" as the frequency, reason unclear. Not listed in 99 WRTH, but still active. [Gerry Bishop-FL] (Gerry doesn't say, but it sounds like this is a first-hand report from one of his travels. Probably so 10 kHz American-types won't be baffled by digits in unusual places, or because some have American vehicles with 10 kHz read-out only? - Jim)

MEXICO ROAD REPORT

I've just returned from a trip to the Guasave area of Sinaloa state. Although I did not do extensive listening for calls, slogans, etc., the following are a few notes I made of stations in Sinaloa, Sonora, and Baja California Sur. My reference was the 5th edition of the IRCA Mexican log: All Mexican so I won't repeat country:

- 650 Hermosillo is on this frequency. Nothing on 1340 so probably XEVSS.
- 710 Empalme, Son. XEPS call and slogan correct.
- 740 Los Mochis, Sin. XEHS is here with Los Mochis ID and slogan R. Siete Cuarenta (R. 7-40) sung between most songs. Also heard R. Sistema Noreste. No community of Cancun noted anywhere near Los Mochis.
- 760 Heard city ID of Cd. Obregon, Son and slogan "La Rancherita".
- 760 Nogales is stereo with a strong mixing on 540 and 1520 in the Nogales area.
- 790 La Paz, BCS, not heard at less than 100-miles on all-water path.
- 830 Guaymas, Son. not on. XEDR still on 1490.
- 930 Santa Rosalia, BCS, not heard at 80-miles over water. 1320 was blockbuster.
- 950 Hermosillo, Son. Doubt if 10-kw. Very poor signal at 80-miles compared with other stations in same city.
- 1030 Los Mochis, Sin. There was an earlier question whether this was in Culiacan.
- 1040 Guaymas, Son. On the air. Nothing on 1560.
- 1080 XEDY announced ID as both Cd. Morelos, BCN, and San Luis Rio Colorado, Sonora, and "R. Gallo." Neighboring cities near Yuma, AZ.
- 1080 La Paz, BCS, is on. Nothing on 1380.
- 1100 Navajoa, Son, is on fulltime. City list shows on 1110.
- 1200 Hermosillo, Son. Not on.
- 1290 XEAP, Cd. Obregon, Son. Slogan and calls are correct.
- 1310 La Paz, BCS, not heard less than 100-miles over water.
- 1320 XESY Magdalena de Kino, Son., not on.
- 1450 Noted in Los Mochis, Sin. Doubt if there is a 1450 in El Fuerte, Sin, 45-miles away. Los Mochis was clear in San Blas, Sin.
- 1490 Guasave, Sin. not on.
- 1510 XEK1, Navajoa, Sin., noted in city list is not on.

1580 XEDM, Hermosillo, Son. Tower is alongside MEX 15 a few miles north of the city. Sign on the building notes 50-kw but signal is very poor 50-miles north, west, and south compared with the 1540 station. No fence around tower base.

1600 Nogales, Son, on city list is not on. The Tucson 1600 has a fair signal in the northern Nogales, AZ, suburbs.

Also it was interesting to note in Los Mochis, Sin, just west of MEX 15 between the two city exits is a hill with 45 towers on it, including large lit towers with TV, FM, or cellular arrays. Smaller ones for whatever else is there. There is an AM tower at the base of the hill just off MEX 15. No fence around it, either. I could not determine which station(s) may use it.

This is an update of the original list which appeared in January 1994. It's a list of African stations, either on MW or a parallel SW outlet, which are known to have verified reception reports in the past year. DX FILES: WCC By Mark Connelly

The old WCC tower in South Chatham was recently demolished. WCC, owned by RCA and later MCl, operated good old Morse code for ship-to-shore service on 436 kHz and sometimes on the former distress channel of 500 kHz just below the AM broadcast band. This station, running big power out of the middle of a salt marsh, had a killer signal all over the northeastern US and adjacent Canada. It was frequently logged in Europe. I heard it well in Ireland back in 1977. I wonder where all the WCC equipment is going to go. Likely there were some excellent receivers and transmitters on the premises, as well as test equipment, tools, and parts. I'd rather see DXers and hams recycle it than have it all get buried or incinerated somewhere. Was intrigued by the article on FIBS in V66, #23. We were there for a couple of days in January on the tail end of a trip to Chile and Antarctica (actually left the Falklands the day before the referenced issue of Penguin News came out). The 550 outlet was loud and clear from several hundred miles west of the Islands (I use a YB400 for such listening) and did seem to be relaying stuff of interest to the British forces (according to the people in the know, the Fls have 2500 residents, 2000 of whom live in Stanley. Competing for listeners

The Wabash Valley has more radio stations than most markets its size. That's great for listeners, but it creates some unique problems for local stations

Lipping through the radio dial in the Wabash Valley is like flipping through a small slice

Of the top 10 formats in the country, the Wabash WTHC, a relative newcomer to the radio business. For a market this size, that can make the competition for listeners and advertisers extremely tight, observers say.

"I don't know of any one market anywhere that is covered as well as this one. Even when you include the entire metro area, the size is relatively small to accommodate the number of stations," said Bob Smiley, dean of the master's of business administration program at Indiana State Univer-

ccording to Arbitron, which tracks radio Astation ratings, the Terre Haute market (population 173,100) is the 186th largest of 267 markets across the nation. It is preceded by Yakima, Wash., and followed by Santa Barbara, Calif.

"I would term this as a market that is extremely deceptive at first. We serve the Wabash Valley, not just Terre Haute," said Dan Hester, owner of

"I've never understood why the FCC gave so many building permits in this area," said Smiley. "It's just amazing to me. But having all these stations here makes it an extremely competitive mar-

Smiley said the Terre Haute market has the potential to be more competitive than some larger markets in metropolitan areas, when the number of stations is compared to the number of residents and amount of advertising available.

"There are a lot of radio stations, probably more " M Street Journal, a trade publication, lists the so in physical numbers than most markets this size per capita," explained Michael Longest, an account executive with Williams Randall Marketing Communications, a Terre Haute ad agency.

> Longest said this has its advantages and its disadvantages. It is good in the fact that it gives listeners a lot of options, but it also fragments the audience, which makes it difficult for advertisers.

their needs. He added that each retailer has a different set of demographics it is looking for, but like television, listeners 18 to 49 are the most attractive. Local programming directors and station owners say there is a definite fight for each listener.

"Every radio station is competition. Every listener they have, I want," said Jim Stone, programming director at WZZQ.

Joe Tenerelli, associate professor of communications at ISU said while the Wabash Valley's radio market is tight across the board, it is significantly tighter in the country and adult contemporary formats.

Tenerelli noted that when new stations arrive on the Valley's dial, they don't always bring new formats. Observers say it's much easier to launch a new station with a format that's already been proven in the market than it would be to start a station with an untried format, such as alternative, because advertisers aren't necessarily willing to are loyal, and the next largest portion are the scanrisk money on a startup.

Barry Kent, programming director of WTHI-FM said his station possibly more than some of the others is painfully aware of the competition.

"My No. 1 goal is to not become complacent with having the highest ratings," he said. "When you are at the top, everybody is out to get you. happy where they are, no one wins. When the market is competitive, that's when the listeners win, and frankly, it just makes for good radio."

They were nationally known for having one of the largest shares of a market, but we saw that country had changed and the market had not changed to add the new music."

ach station has their own way of wooing Listeners, whether it's the type of music, the personalities or promotions. When those things don't draw the numbers the station wants, it can change its format.

"What we were before August was a rhythmmusic," said WMGI's O'Brien. "Now, we have an outlook of a more mainstream Top 40 station, and it serves us well. We're playing more adult music; but we've still got a teen focus."

Listeners are broken into three categories: P1, P2 and P3. P1 listeners are the loyal listeners. P2 listeners are those who listen to several different stations, and P3 listeners are people who jump all over the dial.

O'Brien said when a station doesn't have to share a format, it tends to have more loyal listeners. For instance, 50 percent of WMGI's listeners ners, which the Top 40 station shares with country and rock stations.

A Thile stations always compete for each other's loyal listeners, the real competition lies in the quest to attract the scanners and the jumpers and make them loyal listeners.

"You like to get everyone that you can, but not That makes a market competitive. If people are so much so that you are going to go away from what you do best and what you know," Stone said. Historical Dictionary of American Radio Edited by Donald G. Godfrey and Frederic A. Leigh ISBN 0-313-29636-7 Greenwood Press Reviewed by Richard A. D'Angelo

Published by Greenwood Press in 1998, the Historical Dictionary of American Radio is a 520 page hardbound book about the radio medium. Readers will find entries on almost every subject related to the topic of radio in this alphabetical listing of terms. The authors recognize the limitations with obvious omissions in the technical and personality aspects of radio, which are left to other publications where the topics can be addressed in an expanded format. Nevertheless, this reference work sets out to cover a lot of ground on the topic of radio.

The publication is primarily designed for an interdisciplinary audience in college, university, institutional, and public library settings. It presumes no prior knowledge of radio so each definition stands on its own. The book is designed to help those doing research in the field of radio communications. In that regard, it provides an excellent quick-ready reference to a wide variety of topics. The authors developed a list of potential topics and solicited contributors from various professional disciplines association with the broadcasting field.

The editors of this book are scholars in their own right. Mr. Godfrey is a professor in the Walter Cronkite School of Journalism and Telecommunications at Arizona State University. His teaching and professional interests are news, corporate communications, programming, and history. Mr. Leigh is an associate director of the Walter Cronkite School of Journalism and Telecommunications at Arizona State University. His research interests include radio history, programming, and management.

The format of this publication consists of subject entries followed by a clear definition or identification of the subject. If needed, a general narrative follows, which provides an expanded definition related to the historical background and precedents. Following the narrative are often several references important for securing additional information on the topic. The contributing author's name is at the end of each topic. Background information about the various contributing authors is provided in the "About the Contributors" section in the back of the book. A number of high-caliber folks contributed to the development of this work.

The book opens with a brief history of radio from its earliest days through programming development and into the 1990's. The editors then provide a radio chronology, which begins with Samuel Morse's application for the first patent on a telegraph system and concludes with the Federal Communications Commission ('FCC') approval of satellite radio systems in 1997. The main section, an alphabetical listing and definition of various radio-related terms, is next and covers 430 pages. A selected bibliography, an extensive index and the previously mentioned section describing the contributing authors follow this.


Naturally, the most interesting portions of the dictionary for NRC members is the extensive coverage of early AM radio activities. It primarily addresses radio from an AM and FM perspective, while dabbling a little in the shortwave radio spectrum. It is a very good reference work for those with a


