## DX'ing at San Cristubal and Las Salinas

This was another tour trip organized by the Museo de Historia y Geografía, this time to some caves located in San Cristóbal, which all the people in the bus visited in order to see what was in there (I did not enter; I spent my time DX 'ing for 90 minutes while they were inside). The place outside was the most agreeable one, with a good shadow under the trees, a clear sky, nice breeze, and wonderful, so I had time to DX all alone with no other noise heard all around, just the TRF.

As the place around was in forest into the country and some mountains around, stations from abroad were not easy to be heard, quite the contrary at Las Salinas, where it is a wide [lace and in a small peninsula pushing into the sea and some low mountains far in the north. Stations from Venezuela were easily heard by turning the TRF. No Colombian was heard this time; I don't know why as I usually hear them at other occasions in this place. So here is what I heard at both places. SC means San Cristóbal, and LS is Las Salinas. The number between parenthesis is the power which I heard them: 5 is a local, 2 is very weak
San Cristóbal is about 25 kms . West of Santo Domingo, and Las Salinas is about 66 kms . southwest of Santo Domingo.

DX'ing 'smart', with shared tips and requests by NRC members

We'll begin this time with the last portion of the discussion on longwires and grounding antennas. Joseph Dube: I do understand that DRILLING through rock in the mountains would be a tremendous feat of engineering, but the nature of lightning is such that it travels from ground up to the cloud (or visa versa depending on the school of thought you follow). It has to go some where hopefully not through your radio gear. As far as the length of the wire to the ground goes, making it to GOOD ground to begin with and using a good conductor to get it there, the distance away shouldn't really ground to begin with and using a good conductor to get it there, the distance and a grounding to a cold water pipe in this day and age is probably not the matter. Grounding to a cold water pipe in this day and age is probably not a good idea. Most or the houses built since the advent of PVC pipe have resulted in no real connection to anything other that
the copper pipe connected to the house plumbing. Many of the older houses do have galvanized plumbing out to the street but some of the local water companies use a plastic water meter. Oops there goes the ground connection again!! You just have to be as careful selecting a ground source as you do selecting an antenna, In the past I have run ground wires to metal well casings a considerable distance away from my operating position, with no ill effects from the connecting wire's length. In fact that arrangement was the best ground for my gear that I ever had. I really don't think there is much of a difference if the applications are for $R F$ (as I use it for) or just receiving. A good ground helps the receiver dispose of a certain amount of noise build up-static, line noise, etc. If all you have is just the third wire on the electric service, that's all you have! I suppose the next best thing would be to disconnect everythingelectric service, that's all you have! I suppose the next bese. Here I go again just using up the reflectors space with a few thoughts after nearly 40 years of experimenting with this stuff. Thanks for putting up with ranting and raving!!!

Fred Vobbe: "Someday I'd love to talk to you about my theory of NOT grounding outside antennas during lightning storms." This is true. Grounding an antenna is actually providing a better path for the charge, especially in areas of poor conductivity. What I do is float the antenna, (unground), but ground the antenna feedline at the antenna, and then at the shack end. Never lost anything in almost a strike a year in the neighborhood. (knocking on wood). Another trick is to make a loop, about 18 " round, four turns, in the coax. The stroke of lightning is going to look for a path of least resistance, and that 4 turn coil will appear as a choke. It does not seem to bother the HF transmissions though. This by no means protects $100 \%$. As I tell some of the new kids at the station that buy computers and fancy $\$ 150$ protecprotects $100 \%$. As I tell some of the new kids at the station that buy computers and fancy $\$ 150$ protec-
tion blocks, if it jumps a mile across the sky, don't think it won't jump a foot or more in your home. The best protection is to minimize the damage through loosing the connections to equipment, computers, power and telephone lines.

Joseph Dube: Exactly my feelings Fred. Like I said a the end of my long drawn out dissertation The only true way to protect your gear is to disconnect everything and head for the hills!!!!!!

Randy Stewart <jrs555tomail.smsu.edu>: "here in the Missouri Ozarks although only 100 miles away I hit rocks down 1 foot no matter where I try so it is very difficult." Ain't that the truth! Up here on the Springfield plateau it's the same story, solid rock no more than 6 " to a foot below the surface... it sucks, frankly. The only grounding solution around here is to lay more than one ground rod HORIZONTALLY (/ /t the ground in other words)... and I just don't have the gumption (or the spousal permisTALLY (// to the ground in other words)... and I just don to dig up my whole damn yard. So I've never bothered with ground rods.

Thomas Giella: "Someday I'd love to talk to you about my theory of NOT grounding outside antennas during lightning storms." Leaving an antenna ungrounded (floating) is a BAD idea. You have to understand the mechanics/physics of a lightning strike event. A floating antenna allows a static electricity charge to build up. This static electricity charge buildup attracts a downward moving step leader charge. When the step leader make contact with the charge buildup on the floating antenna, BLAMMO a return stroke with upwards of $100,000,000$ volts and $1,000,000 \mathrm{amps}$ at $50,000,000 \mathrm{deg} \mathrm{C}$. If the antenna is grounded, even if it's only to say a radial or 4 foot ground rod, this DC ground WILL continually drain the static buildup charge on

the antenna, reducing the chance of a lightning strike. Of course lightning has a habit of doing what it wants, including regularly striking any particular location and regularly striking the LOWEST object around!!!. Whether an antenna is grounded or ungrounded, if it gets hit the charge will
 go wherever it wants. Unhooking everything is a good idea but I've still lost equipment that was just sitting there with no conductive path into it. The tremendous voltage and current of a lightning strike creates an electromagnetic pulse (EMP) just like a nuclear detonation. This EMP conductively couples to our precious microchips and ZAP it's off to the radio store for a new rig. The best protection for an antenna/tower is grounding and a spline ball (porcupine) a device which increases the efficiency of draining static electric charges off of your antenna/tower. I'm quoting from lightning research findings of NASA, Florida Power Corporation and the University of Florida lightning research center.

Bob Ulm [bobulm@im3.com](mailto:bobulm@im3.com): The key benefit I've found from grounding my stuff at home has been that it's helped to reduce tvi and bci on FM The only time I've taken a lightning hit in 30 years as a ham, 26 of them with a tower at least fifty feet tall came in through the powerlines and not the antenna. The first 21 years were without ground of any kind on the inside stuff and an 8 foot ground rod at the tower and nothing else.

Paul Smith: "Another trick is to make a loop, about 18" round, four turns, in the coax. The stroke of lightning is going to look for a path of least resistance, and that 4 turn coil will appear as a choke. It does not seem to bother the HF transmissions though." Every AM broadcast station I've ever seen, has this trick from the ATU to the tower. I've done it with my cable TV, and all outside antennas, with a gas discharge device ahead of the loop providing a much better path to ground than into the building. We do this at the shop where we have to be up all the time.

Perry Crabill: I believe that all antennas should be grounded when not in use. I connect my 100 random wire to ground through an NE-2 neon bulb so I can see it flash when distant lightning strokes occur. It will also glow when a charged cloud passes overhead, even if no lightning occurs. It will also glow at times during a windy snowstorm from precipitation static. I learned about this the hard way, when I was listening to WSM-650 with a one-transistor preamp, and the snow static popped the FET. At one time I was the electrical protection engineer for an AT\&T subsidiary, C\&P Telephone, in the Washington, DC area, and learned that grounding was always the preferred technique for protection against static and minimizing the damage from induced surges from lightning and power system faults.

Russ Edmunds: "Another trick is to make a loop, about 18" round, four turns, in the coax. The stroke of lightning is going to look for a path of least resistance, and that 4 turn coil will appear as a choke. It does not seem to bother the HF transmissions though." How about VHF??? would they be similarly unimpaired?

Paul Smith: "I believe that all antennas should be grounded when not in use." There will always be a diversity of opinion on grounding antennas when not in use or during thunderstorms. I can sure see grounding them during P-static situations. But thunderstorms are a different matter. No matter how good of a ground you have, there will always be some minute amount of impedance that can force the lightning to find alternate paths to ground. This may be through your rig, house ground, phone protector, electric service ground. Even if $99.99 \%$ of the charge goes to your good ground. What's left can wreak havoc. Since I took a direct strike years ago, I have floated my antennas and have not been hit since. As those of us that live in Florida know, Normal afternoon seabreeze front thunderstorms in Florida produce so much lightning that if the same storm were in Michigan or Ohio, the Skywarn nets would be active, and folks would be headed for the storm shelter. And this is every afternoon here in the summer time.

Fred Vobbe: "The only true way to protect your gear is to disconnect everything and head for the hills!!!!!!" We don't have the number of storms like you folks have in FL/Tampa area, but we have some pretty mean stuff come through at times, and really take a toll. lf not the lightning, the high winds usually roast us from time to time

Fred Vobbe: "I've done it with my cable TV, and all outside antennas, with a gas discharge device ahead of the loop providing a much better path to... and all outside antennas, with a gas discharge device
Are using a Polyphasor or another device?
Fred Vobbe: "How about VHF??? would they be similarly unimpaired?" Russ, You have to be a little careful that you don't get the coil to a point where it's resonant on VHF frequencies. What I did on my installation of a V2000 on the top of my tower is to come down the tower to the base in 9913, just before I enter the shack I hit a grounding block, then make (3) turns of Belden E34972 (see footnote) around an $18^{\prime \prime}$ form. Then I go in the shop. If you work out the math on the coil of wire, the point where it will resemble a choke or not band pass will be in the $125-380 \mathrm{kHz}$ range, so it's not going to bother anything from 28 MHz and up. To a lightning stroke, the transition between the heavy cable to the small cable, the ground block at that junction, and the resistance of the coil of small coax, provides a pretty bigbrick wall anything coming in the shack. Again, if it's going to jump a mile across the sky, anything can happen. But I'm using a calculated risk here in making the whole force of the strike less likely to get in
the house. Footnote: If you are not familiar with E34972, it's a double shielded RG-58 with silver center conductor usually used in couplings between duplexers and cavity filters. RG-59 can be used, it's just a little more lossy.

Paul Smith, W4KNX: I use Polyphasor devices. Have had very good luck with them. Got turned on to them by a friend who's an engineer for GTE Mobilnet Cellular. They use their equip on all their cell towers.

John R. Tudenham: I have heard that lightning usually doesn't make right angle bends. So if your coax makes a 900 bend at the bottom of the tower, will that protect if somewhat?
Fred Vobbe: You have to be careful of tight bends at VHF/UHF frequencies. If it's a tight enough bend, you'll cause some additional losses and also impedance problems by distortion of the cable jacket. I could make it as tight as $6^{\prime \prime}$ around, but then I start to get close to making a coil for 10 -meters and 6 -meters.

And we also have more on the operation of stations'.
Russ Edmunds: I am not at all certain that this problem is restricted to cities. I know that when I DX'ed (as did a number of others, I might add) in a direct line to the Northern NJ antenna far, for many of the NYC stations, there were similar problems. That extra $30+$ miles meant little by comparison to an earlier QTH less than 10 miles from them. I think that there can be problems with strong signals anywhere, and that while it would appear that the situation in Phoenix is extreme, and perhaps results from illegal operation, I would be inclined to dispute the suggestion that what Ragnar is hearing could be a result of propagation effects - these are his locals we're talking about. If I were local to the station that started all of this discussion, I imagine that I'd be able to be pretty sure of what they were doing as well. I'm not, and so I can't say that. If I were sure, then maybe I'd be inclined to send a few friendly notes to a few of the stations they would be expected to protect, suggesting what I believed to be the case and kindly asking them if they'd noticed it or had other complaints. Of course, I might also be inclined to send them anonymously so as to not jeopardize the hobby. The other stations might get better results either from the offenders or from the FCC than I would by myself, and they'd have a much better reason to do so. Am I/are we really harmed by stations disregarding the provisions of their licenses? Perhaps not, but our society today is rampant with examples of people sitting by and ignoring blatant disregard for the law in a multitude of contexts, which is just what some of these guys are counting on. But I still think that there are better and more effective ways to deal with it than the original suggestion. The FCC is probably more likely to deal with these situation if proper complaints, properly documented, from legitimately injured parties are brought than they ever are likely to deal constructively with the big-money issues like ownership and advertising abuses.

Fred Vobbe: If anything, we'll find out if the FCC does anything at all to correct the problem, or if they blow Ragnar off. One of my biggest pet peeves about my Congressman and the FCC is that they are like sheep. Someone can be murdered in front of them, and they stand there and stare with a blank look on their face. No reaction, no calls back, no return letter, nada. Ragnar, it will be interesting to know if something is done. Please report back if there are changes.

Russ Edmunds: Somehow, Fred, that sounds like a description of a substantial number of Americans, so I guess we shouldn't be surprised that the people elected to represent us and/or their appointees behave that way. The notion that the people we elected to office were any better than the run of the mill citizenry died a long time ago.

William Loyd Van Horn [katamount@colleges.com](mailto:katamount@colleges.com): While this has nothing to do with night power it does have to deal with stations being stupid and the FCC ignoring it. We have a local station, WCVP600 that runs 1 KW daytime, they are supposed to sign off at sunset. They slop all over the band (560630 is a waste, and so is 1200 with their harmonic). Their tower is about 10 miles from our home, but they are overpowering. They run past sunset, sometimes till around 11:00. Calls to the owner get a "so what" response and a similar response has been met by the FCC. Several complaints have been filed with the FCC and have netted no results AT ALL. A similar problem has been met with our local power company. There is a faulty electric pole near our house that is causing HEAVY interference on most of the band during the daytime. Repeated calls by dad and several others have netted zilch. It is just a shame that most people consider things like this a non-issue. There is little that one person can do about things like this. Just a shame.

Patrick Martin: I hear what you are saying. Apparently living in the NW part of Oregon I have been lucky getting rid of QRN from powerlines. The power co here has been very helpful. Other places are different
Perry Crabill [pcrabill@visuallink.com](mailto:pcrabill@visuallink.com): How about night antenna pat terns? if some stations aren't observing night power restrictions, I wonder if there are also some who don't shift to their night patterns at sunset. I've been trying to DX on 1550 kHz at night, after nulling near-local WMRE;

Paul Smith, W4KNX [sunray2@gte.net](mailto:sunray2@gte.net): In the last few weeks, I've noticed numerous posts complaining about wide "slop" on AM stations. As a technical person with quite a bit of knowledge of AM antennas and broadcast transmitters, I find it hard to believe that so many stations have signals as wide as a barn door. All type accepted equipment has bandpass filters in them to keep the signal within the allotted bandwidth. I would find it hard to believe that stations are intentionally bypassing this stuff. My guess, is that the subject receivers are being subjected to overload from strong adjacent signals, and that receiver selectivity is more than likely the culprit. Just my $\$ 0.02$ worth

Kuss Edmunds: The practice of intentionally overmodulating the signal to make it 'sound louder' or 'sound fuller' was common with rock stations in the 1960's and 1970's, when the FCC actually did something in the enforcement arena. I have little doubt that the practice is more prevalent today. This seems particularly likely given the 'let them stop me' attitude prevalent today, not just in the broadcast industry. Where we have stations 'forgetting' to throw the pattern and/or power switches when they're supposed to, staying on later than their supposed to, etc., exceeding their allotted bandwidth should hardly be a surprise in an age when the FCC devotes most of its energies to playing politics and cozying up to the biggest and richest of the entities it is supposed to regulate!

Ron Gitschier [gitchzoo@bellsouth.net](mailto:gitchzoo@bellsouth.net): Here, here...The station I've been associated with decided _not_ to go AM stereo (to my disappointment) with its music programming when the entire station's equipment, short of the antenna tuner and tower was totally replaced with new. The rationale was
 basically that we would lose about $10 \%$ of the modulation. The modulation is driven to just before the limit of the law, very strong... with no splatter or harmonics. It's very clean. As to the second part of the above quote, I have heard in different circles that 1560 in greater Miami gets away with ( 44 or 50 kw ) NDA day power due to the present White House administration doesn't want to offend the strong Democratic vote in Metro Dade (FL) and vicinity when this station tries to project the signal to a potential $\begin{array}{ll}\text { KEWI } & \begin{array}{l}\text { Metro Dade (FL) and vicinity when this station tries to project the signal to a potential } \\ \text { audience in Cuba. Doug Smith: Intentional overmodulation is quite rare (at least on AM). It results in VERY severe distortion, severe enough that nobody would listen to the signal. (when it does happen, it does result in severely exceeding the allotted bandwidth though) Basically, when you try to modulate more than $100 \%$ in the negative direction, your transmitter will attempt to radiate negative power. This is physically impossible. Instead, nasty things happen to the modulation envelope and radiated spectrum. In my personal experience, spurious emissions and use of excessive bandwidth are relatively rare offenses. Failure to switch to night facilities is MUCH, MUCH more common. There's an economic reason for this: failure to switch to night facilities actually increases revenues/profits. (even if you get caught, the fines are unlikely to exceed the added revenue...) Spurious emissions \& excessive bandwidth waste power that could be transmitted on the frequency that people are actually listening to.

And also the conclusion of the discussion on radio listenership which began in No. 13.
Russ Edmunds: "Radio will have a future ONLY if it learns to offer what tapes $\mathcal{E} C D s$ can't. That being timely information-both about the community and about the music." These comments, I think, overestimate the intelligence, sophistication, discrimination and attention span of the average listener. Remember, we are as far from an average listener as one can get. As someone else here pointed out, the average listener listens to music they like, push the button or scan as soon as there's a commercial, other talk, news, or music they don't like. As to the ads, I'm really atypical - probably because my college degree is in broadcast communications - unless an ad is either sufficiently awful or sufficiently good or creative to cause me to notice it, I almost always ignore them totally, and I never believe any of the claims

Paul W. Smith, W4KNX: I have to agree that either really good ads or really bad ads stick out Although I'm talking TV here, I would have to give best ad to Publix Supermarkets for their Thanks giving Pilgrim ads and Christmas dinner on a boat, or who stole the dinner ads as all time good ads Some of the worst ads I've ever seen stick with me. In Orlando there was a used car salesman named Art Grindle who always closed his ads with a huge close-up of him saying "I want to sell you a car". He later became a politician (natural progression, huh?). Then Tom Stimus in Bradenton Fl , who used to always bang on the hood of a car. And the latest in terrible ads is one in Tampa for a company that sells kitchen cabinets and tile floors and other home stuff and ends each ad with 3 guys laughing terribly and crossing their arms like a bunch of apes. In Detroit years ago, I remember Mr. Belvidere, a home improvement company, and Irv Nussbaum who sold carpet. (New York Carpet World). I think every city in the US has someone who does the worst ads, (usually used car ads) that everyone remem-
ers. It's amazing that most of these ads were done without any scripts, any professional actors or anything, usually one take, including screwups, but are always remembered because they are so bad.

Doug Smith: "As someone else here pointed out, the average listener listens to music they like, push the button or scan as soon as there's a commercial, other talk, news, or music they don't like." Yes, because they know there's nothing to look forward to but a few minutes of inane talk, poorly-done news, or the same music they can get on another station. Will they stick around if they believe the DJ will actually say something worthwhile? I would tend to think so, but have sure been proven wrong before! "As to the ads, I'm really atypical...unless an ad is either sufficiently awful or sufficiently good or creative to cause me to notice it, I almost always ignore them totally, and I never betieve any of the claims." Y know, the number of simply "bad* ads on radio and TV has skyrocketed... We (the TV station I work for) accept things you never saw on TV 10 years ago. If they pay the bills, they get on the air... "Lose weight without dieting". "Talk to our gifted psychics". "CREDIT, CREDIT, CREDIT!". Not to mention the issue advertising. (if there's money behind your side of the issue, it gets airtime. If there's no money behind it, tough...) I suspect the best advertising works subconsciously. You don't consciously pay attention, but the advertiser's name sticks in your head, and next time you need the product/service, it pops back out. (and sometimes backfires.. for example, the tune " $800-325-3535$ " - aired all the time about 10 years ago -is stuck in my head, but I can't for the life of me remember whose phone number that is!)
Blake Lawrence: I copied this article to my General Manager (KKSF/San Francisco, owned by AMFM) and his response was interesting. He points out that the decline in listenership has been an ongoing issue that began even before the addition of more spots per hour. Most of the major ownership groups (AMFM, Infinity, Clear Channel) have increased their spot loads on all their stations at pretty much the same time, raising $\$ \$$ to pay for the buying spree they've all been on. It would be interesting if we could track stations and groups that haven't added units (or perhaps have, but to a lesser extent...Bonneville comes to mind) to see if their listenership has declined at or near the same rate.
Patrick Martin [mwdxer@webtv.net](mailto:mwdxer@webtv.net): Another group owner is Entercom. I hear they have not added to their spot load either.
Russ Edmunds: Good ads tend to be creative and usually unique, regardless of the medium. As you pointed out, anybody can do a bad ad, and many folks sure do!
Russ Edmunds: "It would be interesting if we could track stations and groups that haven't added units (or perhaps have, but to a lesser extent) to see if their listenership has declined at or near the same rate." I'd be pretty certain it would be either universal, or, at minimum, common to most all of the group-owned out-oftown and/or satellite-fed stations.

Bob Smolarek: "In Detroit years ago, I remember Mr. Belvidere, a home improvement company," Was that the inspiration for the TV show!! "I think every city in the US has someone who does the worst ads, (usually used car ads) that everyone remembers." In New York it was this ad for JGE, back in 1972. You had this guy saying JGE is only open to union members and their families. Then a voice comes on and says "Hey Jerry, what's the story". At the end Jerry says "That's The Story" and lifts his hands and arms and his shirt goes up and you see his fat belly. Are you the Paul W. Smith that was on WWDB 96.5 and then went to Detroit?

Russ Edmunds: Yeah! I remember that awful thing. When I first moved to Philadelphia, the classic was a men's clothing store, I think the name was Krass Brothers (and the ad was crass). The guy had an obnoxious voice, and screamed. And then there was one where the female announcer started off "This is the boss's wife..." I can't remember if that is also Krass Brothers or not. Ugh!

Paul Smith: "Are you the Paul W. Smith that was on WWDB 96.5 and then went to Detroit?" Nope, I'm not the morning drive personality on WJR 760 in Detroit, although Plymouth Michigan is my original hometown, my only on air time in the Detroit area was Weekend and fill in jock on WAAM 1600 Ann Arbor back in the late 60's while I was going to college. (Basically a glorified board op). Played the WAAM sweet sixteen survey. Talk about a tight playlist. That's probably why I cant stand the music of that era because I heard it so much. Switched to country to clear my head <grin>. Course you know what you get when you play a country record backwards don't you? You get your dog back, your wife back, your pickup truck back, and you don't run out of beer. <groan> I've met my namesake in Detroit. Guess he does quite well there. He has the time slot of the late J.P. McCarthy.
Fred Vobbe: We did an ad at WLIO where there are six monks, all in brown robes with hoods, heads bowed reading books. A very good looking model in a bikini walks by in front of them, but the monks don't even look up from their books. She turns, looks at them, shrugs, and walks off. Then the words come up on the screen " 6 monks and no interest at Warehouse Carpet Outlet". <grin>

Others present news. At night some of them present baseball games, mostly during the U.S. season and in the winter with Dominican baseball. No power is given as nobody at the stations wish to mention it, even if I ask for it, as if were something illegal.


## RADIO YOUTH

## By Andy Ooms

Sometimes I wonder why I subscribe to about a dozen radio-related magazines, listen to a lot of short wave, and have more than an average interest in station formats, AM distance reception, broadcasting history, station history, and pre-solid state receivers. It is not because my career has been radiorelated, or that I am technically skilled or knowledgeable in electronics theory. Although I am interested in antique radio collecting, I don't describe myself as a collector. Yet I have a lot of interest in radio and would much prefer a world without television than one without radio.
This description of the radio memories of my youth may explain at least part of my fascination with the medium. Until I graduated from high school in 1956, I lived in the relative isolation of a farming community on the prairie and had never lived in a city of any size or had any access to television. I grew up in the ' 40 's and ' 50 's in a town of less than 500 people in South Dakota. As late as 1956, only 2 or 3 TV sets existed in my hometown of Corsica, and towers about 100 feet tall were required for sporadic snowy reception from Sioux City, Iowa or Omaha, Nebraska. So for as long as I lived there radio was an exotic link to a far off rest-of-the-world, and my inquisitive mind could hardly get too much of it.

How isolated were we in Corsica? It was, and is, a great town to grow up in, but not because it was in the mainstream of national cultural trends (not even then necessarily a bad thing). It had no traffic signals, of course; but that was not particularly unique in small town America. I never used a dial telephone while living there; we told Central which number we wanted her to connect us to. And when I got to a city in Michigan to attend college at the age of 17, I heard of the National Football League, the National Basketball Association, and the National Hockey League for the first time. I don't believe that any of my 21 co-grads of the Class of ' 56 knew of those professional sports leagues either

We knew a lot about major league baseball however, even though the nearest team then was 700 miles distant, primarily because of Mutual's Game of the Day broadcast every summer day to those areas of the country not near any major league team, secondarily because of pictures of players like Stan Musial and Bob Feller on Wheaties boxes. Also, our high school classes were suspended each year while we all gathered in study hall to listen to each World Series game played on a school day, as they were then scheduled for afternoons. In 1955, the Philadelphia Athletics moved to Kansas City, and some of their games were carried on a South Dakota station, but they never caught on as a local team for that area.
More on sports-for a short time in the ' 50 's, CBS broadcast a Saturday afternoon radio program, College Football Roundup. It carried about 10 minutes of live action from each of several high-profile schools of that era. In addition to current powerhouses like Notre Dame, Texas, Oklahoma, and Michigan, teams like Navy and Harvard were included. Almost the only other sportscasts were state high school basketball tournaments, state Junior league baseball tournaments, minor league pro baseball (Northern League teams Aberdeen Pheasants and Sioux Falls Canaries) and some University of South Dakota and South Dakota State football and basketball games. These were, and are, Division II teams then having limited fan interest in a farm community with few college graduates. Not that any of us knew of the NCAA or its divisional status rules. South Dakota even today is the only state without a least one Division I team in any sport. North Dakota has one Division I team (hockey) and Alaska is blessed with two Division I teams, also hockey.
Last on sports-broadcasts of the Indianapolis 500 and heavyweight boxing, particularly if Joe Lewis was involved, were enjoyed by my father and me.
Although my sisters educated me that small people were not talking and making music in our Zenith console (probably after having given me the idea), I nevertheless obviously found the signals themselves to be fascinating. My mother discouraged radio listening to some extent, (at least the amount I was eager to do) on the basis that it could be a waste of time, that someone my age was not likely to sort quality programming from the more abundant type of programming, and that active mental and physical skills were more valuable than passive habits. On the same grounds, she greatly encouraged non-fiction reading instead of fiction. She also believed that radio programs with a lot of action or emotion could lead to nightmares, fear of the dark, restlessness, or other symptoms of anxiety in children. The term "hyperactivity" was not much in use then, but that is the syndrome she described. She did introduce me to programs she deemed worthwhile (actually they would be classified as worth while by almost anyone): the Texaco-sponsored Metropolitan Opera on Saturdays (still presented by Texaco on NPR), and on Monday evenings, The Cities Service Band of America, conducted by Pau Lavalle, The Telephone Hour, The Railroad Hour and The Voice of Firestone. Yes, even at an early age, I detected a programming trend there.

My father worked in his general store all day six days a week and usually had a radio he was inclined to read without radio when he was home, although we all listened to Fibber MoGee and Molly on Tuesday, and I listened with him to Drew Pearson and Walter Winchell on Sunday. Fibber and Molly have ever since been my favorite type of comedy. And why do I still remember they were sponsored by Johnson's Wax, Pearson by Adams Hats, and Winchell by Jergens Lotion?

On Sundays, our family also listened regularly to The Back to Cod Hour, frequently to The Lutheran Hour and The Hour of Decision (with Billy Graham), and the music portion of The Old-fashioned Revival Hour. I don't know about the last one, but the other three are still being broadcast 50 or more years later with pretty much the same format now as then. The Back to God Hour has yet to make its first request for contributions on the air, making it unusual, if not unique, in the history of religious broadcasting. The Hour of Decision still has Rev. Graham preaching, George Beverly Shea singing, and Cliff Barrows announcing
Although I didn't listen regularly, there was also a Presbyterian Hour, a Methodist Hour, a Catholic Hour, and a Jewish Hour on network radio as I recall from newspaper listings.
Due to my mother's rules, I was not allowed to listen to afternoon programming aimed at elementary school students. Naturally, I was keenly interested in those programs, and would find out the next day what had happened the afternoon before from those who did listen, or listen at other homes when I was allowed to visit, and would try to be as knowledgeable about the programs as those who listened regularly. Examples of after-school or early evening programs I remember: The Lone Ranger (Cheerios); Jack Armstrong, the All American Boy (Wheaties); Sky King (Peter Pan peanut butter, or was it Skippy?) Straight Arrow (Nabisco Shredded Wheat); Wild Bill Hickok (Kelloggs Sugar Corn Pops); Terry and the Pirates; and Sergeant Preston of the Yukon (Quaker Puffed Wheat). Another trend is exposed cereal serial sponsorship

Do you remember when there were four major networks (ABC, CBS, MBS, NBC) and they were identified in oratorical tones, pronounced in full: "This is the Columbia Broadcasting System," almost never "this is CBS?" Those were the days of primarily full service stations-a variety of recorded music

 (live music frequently at major stations), network comedy, drama quiz, and commentary programs, news, weather, and community announcements. Narrowcasting as practiced today with one type of music for a demographically defined market was unknown. Newscasts were not every hour, but when they were broadcast, about 4 times daily they ran for 15 or 30 minutes. Another statement once familiar but unheard today: "And now we bring you an interlude of recorded music for your listening pleasure." This was used to fill-in programming gaps, and to cover local or network technical difficulties. Full time news, sports, talk stations? Not until a few New York, Chicago, Los Angeles stations initiated that format in a daring move in the 1960's.Kids listened to adventure programs until about high school age, then segued toward stations that played popular music, switching stations during the day as most stations varied their programming Very little broadcasting was directed at the teen-age market, probably because teen income was prac tically non-existent, at that time (except for the essentials: cars, gas, tires). Some experimenters, as 1 did scanned the dial trying for distant signals, or unique or obscure programming, from several states program content being more interesting that audio quality. Adults were considered to be the basic market, and $95 \%$ of them in my area had their radio needs met by 3 stations: WNAX, KSOO, and KORN.

WNAX, Yankton, SD had a booming signal (when I became more knowledgeable about details, I was amazed to find that it was only 5000 watts; it sounded like 50,000 to me living about 75 miles away). It covered major portions of 5 large states, and I heard its signal hundreds of miles from my home, when traveling various directions. Proud of its power, it always gave separate weather reports for each of the 5 states covered. Like many stations of that time, it was owned by a plant nursery-seed company. It was the only signal we could get any time of the day, night, or year in Corsica, except during severe thunderstorms in the summer. And like most stations, it signed off at midnight. It was popular for its farm news, regional livestock market and grain price reports, accurate weather report ing, local news, ABC (CBS after 1950) nighttime programming, and a long string of soap operas daily interspersed with Arthur Godfrey Time, in the morning, extensive farm market news at noon, and Your Neighbor Lady in mid-afternoon with recipes and neighborly chat. I was astounded in October 1998 to find out from the Internet that Your Neighbor Lady, Wynn Speece, is still actively broadcasting 42 years after I moved away from the sound of her voice. I didn't really listen to her, as 1 was not her intended audience, but she was respected a lot, and many is the time I heard her voice throughout my youth in various homes, and passing car radios. She is approaching 60 years on the air.

WNAX is an old station, having obtained its call letters before stations beginning with W were reserved for east of the Mississippi locations, and therefore has always been the only South Dakota station not beginning with K . Because of its far-flung signal, its commercials were for national prod-
ucts. Its non-network sponsors (like most major farm-country stations) were fencing materials, pesticides, herbicides, rat poisons, farm equipment, livestock medications and feed, and seed corn.

Do you remember when big city stations had their own instrumental and vocal musicians? WNAX had several, including the Tunecrackers who would attempt to play songs suggested by listeners, and the WNAX Bohemian Band, which played polkas and waltzes at various locations live, some nights for fifteen minutes after the 6 p.m. news, and for about 4 hours, along with guest or regular country musicians, on the live weekly broadcasts of the WNAX Saturday Night Barn Dance.

KSOO, Sioux Falls, SD was listened to because Sioux Falls was the major city in the state (about 100 miles away and traveled to frequently for shopping), and it had good news and farm markets programming. Its sponsors tended to be farm products or Sioux Falls retailers. It was not network-affiliated for some time and signed off at sunset so its influence was limited compared to WNAX.

KORN, Mitchell, SD, a 250 watt Mutual affiliate 40 miles away, was big in our town. The call letters were appropriate as Mitchell is the home of the world famous one and only Corn Palace. Mitchell's adult amateur baseball team was the Cobs; the junior team was the Kernels; its radio station was, and is, KORN.

The station had news, sports, and weather that covered our area. Being Mutual, it carried Queen for a Day the daily major baseball game in the summer, the after-school adventures of Wild Bill Hickok and Straight Arrow, and later, Bob and Ray. On Sunday, it had the afternoon suspense and adventure programming lineup that included The Green Hornet, and The Shadow. It had primarily local sponsors so its supermarket specials caused some to drive to Mitchell for grocery shopping (not enthusiastically appreciated by our grocer's family). And being Mutual, it had no all-day lineup of soap operas, so it had a lot of local recorded pop music (with, among others, later-to-be-famous on Laugh-In disk jockey, Gary Owens). It had music all afternoon, the prosaically named 1490 Club (it was at 1490 on the dial) and in the morning it broadcast Requestfully Yours, which carried dedications of the latest songs (Irene, Goodnight; On Top of
 Old Smoky; How Much is That Doggie in the Window) from people we might know to other people we might know celebrating birthdays or anniversaries. It was the only station the radio in our store could get due to fluorescent light interference, and since I worked in that store almost full-time after I started high school, it was a large part of my life. Due to its low power, it was not usually listenable after sunset. When the Mutual broadcast of the commentary of Fulton Lewis came on KORN at 6:15 p.m., it was time to start turning off the lights and close up and head home for the night, except on Saturday night which was too busy for radio listening for us anyway.

Regional stations for us included ones in Minneapolis, MN, Sioux City, IA, Omaha, NE, Jamestown Fargo, and Bismarck in North Dakota plus several other smaller city signals in those adjoining states I listened to almost all of them to some degree; few others did as it was a little work to find them, and naturally their signals were relatively weak compared to the South Dakota ones.

Daytime listening really was rather limited compared to that available to people in large cities, due to a scarcity of stations, the distance between towns with stations, and the number of small powered stations, as appropriate for small towns. Although daytime only stations still exist on the medium wave (AM) band, there seemed to be many more of them then, and 1 always found them quaintly interesting. Their end-of-day programs called for creative scheduling as the end of day could come anywhere from about 4:00 to about 8:30 p.m

Nighttime listening was a different matter, of course. WNAX was the only South Dakota station available as the others signed off at sunset, or didn't have enough power to send a clear signal to our town. But at night, we could usually hear good signals from several Chicago stations (more about them coming up) plus WWL, New Orleans; KSL, Salt Lake City; KOB, Albuquerque; KXEL, Waterloo; KVOO, Tulsa; KOMA, Oklahoma City; KOA, Denver; KRLD, Dallas; WOAI, San Antonio; WBAP, Fort Worth; and the exotic to me Mexican stations, XERF, with a Del Rio mailing address, and XELO, across the border from El Paso. The Mexicans were 150,000 watters, 3 times the United States stations' allowable power, so they broadcast in English with a northward directed antenna pattern and I am told could be heard to some extent in all the lower 48 states and some of the Canadian provinces.

Never did I get stations west of Salt Lake City, or east of WLW, Cincinnati; no Detroit, Cleveland, Philadelphia, or New York sounds. Even the other two states sharing part of a border with South Dakota, Wyoming and Montana, were never heard in my far eastern part of the state. And surprisingly, although I caught Mexico about every night I tried, I never got a Canadian station.

My research was exhaustive, if not exhausting. The majority of stations, even if broadcasting at night, signed off at midnight or close to it, and signed on around 6:00 a.m., (remember the Star Spangled Banner and sonorous announcements accompanying it at sign-off and sign-on? remember some stations having a sermonette, prayer, or Scripture reading at the beginning or end of the broadcast day?) so the midnight to dawn stretch was great for clear signals from the few but powerful all night stations.

Most mornings I was awake and listening at 5:00 catching the farm reports and wake-up music from around the middle states, waiting for the rational members of the family and the rest of the town to wake up, (although the farm kids were mostly up and milking by then, unable to understand someone voluntarily getting up that early). Some nights, I was awake an hour or two during the night listening to far-off signals.
When I was 11 or 12, I ran into a White's Radio Log. I immediately memorized the call letters, frequency, power, affiliation, and schedule of all the South Dakota stations. All 15 of them. Some I never did hear due to distance and low power. Only one, WNAX, could be counted on to have a listenable night time signal to my town.
I also developed an interest in network programming and generally tried to keep track of which programs were on each of the four majors, whether or not I could get them locally. Night programming was fairly well known to most people, due to magazine and newspaper references and word of mouth. But I was interested in daytime programming as well. In addition to the huge line-up of soaps on CBS and NBC, including the unique dynastydom of One Man's Family, do you remember Grand Central Station, Oueen for a Day, Arthur Godfrey Time, Art Linkletter's House Party and the Breakfast Club with Don McNeil?

My 11-year-old mind presumed that the number of networks was permanently established, and that 4 was the appropriate number, but one day scanning the dial, I heard a fifth network-Liberty Broadcasting System. I only heard it on one small station in Sioux Falls, and it disappeared after a year or two, but it was a cheerful surprise to me when I first heard it soon after it was born. It shamelessly imitated Mutual with a baseball game of the day, and did so with a teletype game report to an announcer in a studio, but on the theory that two of a good thing is better than one of a good thing, I didn't mind at all. It did exist in the early 1950's, but running across people who remember it is a seldom occurrence. I don't know what programming it had beside baseball; the only other program I ever heard on it was a network disc jockey, in itself a rare occurrence as disc jockey programs were usually local.

NPR did not exist. But we could get good and unique programming from stations owned by the University of South Dakota and Iowa State University.

Who would have dreamed that one day the NBC, CBS, and Mutual networks would all be the same company, as they are today owned by Westwood? (General Electric owns NBC television but sold its radio business to Westwood; Westinghouse bought CBS, changed its name to CBS, and sold its radio properties to Westwood, which has owned Mutual for a long time. The last I heard NBC is used to dentify only a few newscasts per day on a few stations, which newscasts are identical to CBS newscasts except for the NBC or CBS identifiers).

Why some stations carried mostly commercials for national products (Oxydol, Duz, Johnson's Wax) and others usually carried ads for local grocery stores and other businesses intrigued me. Only recently have I figured out that the major factor was strength of signal-a store's management would not want to pay the higher rates a more powerful station can command to advertise its specials and services to an audience 300 miles away.

In the days before demographics and narrowcasting, most stations were full-service, which means that they had a lot more programming variety, and were mostly adult-oriented, except for an hour or two after school. Network and local programming was dominated by religious broadcasts until at least noon on Sunday. To broadcast a secular program too early in the day Sunday was considered sacrilegious. Interestingly even now, some Central American countries (Dominican Republic is one) prohibit rock and roll broadcasting during the week before Easter. Some rock stations there switch to ballads, classical, or religious music; others sign-off for the week.

At about noon on Sundays, stations here switched from religion to news, interview, commentary, and classical music (both CBS and NBC had their own orchestras of excellent caliber and reputation); programs considered to be serious, worthwhile. The Greatest Story Ever Told ran mid-afternoon on ABC later in the day (earlier in the day as time went on); Sunday programming became as secular as weekdays, with comedy, drama, and game programs. Mutual had a fantastic line-up of mystery and adventure shows on Sunday afternoons, like The Shadow, and The Green Hornet

And although they were not of much interest to me, I remember that from 10:30 p.m. till midnight every weekday night, the networks carried live dance bands from various ballrooms and hotels, such as the Cocacabana, the Waldorf Astoria, the Coconut Grove, and other Statlers and Hiltons in large cities. It seems like for years and years Vincent Lopez and his orchestra were on Mutual every night from I don't know where. The other networks had a little more variety, it seems to me. I don't remember ever hearing of Vincent Lopez before or after or in any other context.

About Chicago-my grandmother and many uncles, aunts, and cousins lived there. So we usually
spent one week there each summer, and although I spent most of my time with relatives being royally entertained with visits to museums and zoos, I had time to notice a few details about the Chicago version of big city radio. At night in South Dakota, I could usually get the big ones-WGN, WMAQ, WBBM, and WENR/WLS. I believe that 1 received WJJD occasionally, and maybe WCFL.

But being live in Chicago, I also encountered for the first time ethnic broadcasting ( 1240 on the AM dial probably broadcast 12 languages a week, primarily European), and the unusual concept of a fulldial probably broadcast 12 languages a week, primarian station (WMBI, owned by the Moody Bible Institute). Most religious broadcasts in radio's time Christian station (WMBI, owned by the Moody Bible

1 didn't take the time to listen to radio that much in Chicago, but I read the Tribune schedules and still remember the programming of WIND: instead of 15 minute soaps, it had 15 minute segments of recorded artists all day-a quarter hour each of Frank Sinatra, Bing Crosby, Jo Stafford, Rosemary Clooney and so on, the schedule repeated day after day. I still wonder how many times per week some of those songs were heard, although I know Sinatra probably had enough recordings to go for days without repetition, almost.

Another thing that intrigued me about Chicago radio was that it was there that I ran into my first examples of shared frequencies. WLS and WENR both at 890 on the dial; why 2 sets of call letters? It was many years later before I found out why that occurred. And the aforementioned 1240 on the dial a real mind-blower to me, WSBC, WEDC, and WCRW and all broadcasting foreign languages almost all the time.

On one of my trips to Chicago, my uncle, proprietor of a radio shop, gave me a car trunk-full of working used radios to take back to South Dakota. About then farms were getting wired for 110 vol AC electricity for the first time, so I began a modest used radio business, selling used radios, many of which were used in barns so farmers could hear markets, news, and weather while milking and doing other chores. I paid $\$ 4.00$ per year for a sign in the barber shop advertising my business. I did some minor repairs (replacing tubes, soldering loose connections, exchanging speakers), and by the time I graduated from high school, our basement was pretty full of radios, phonographs, and parts.

I did get a little personal airtime exposure, as the announcer for our church's weekly taped broadcast of The Bread of Life on KORN during my last year or two of high school.

Then I left for college, didn't have time for hobbies due to school and the Army for 7 years, transistors replaced tubes, and my career turned out to be unrelated to electronics, although I worked the control board weekends for WKLW-FM, Grand Rapids, MI for a year or so while a student.

Why haven't 1 mentioned listening to FM? Well, there was not one FM station in South Dakota when I lived there, and I never missed it because, after all, I never got done listening to AM. I saw an FM antenna on my cousin's house in Illinois, but he couldn't satisfactorily explain its purpose to me, especially in a city with about two dozen AM stations.

So, where did I get my extreme interest in radio along with an enjoyment of unsophisticated humor? Well, what can we expect of a lad literally growing up between WOW (Omaha, NE, 590 on the dial) and KORN (Mitchell, SD, 1490 on the dial)?

## Memories of Times Cone By with the NRC

(Publisher's note: César has become a respected author in the Dominican Republic with the publication of two books dealing with the history of Bani, his home town, and the second of a historical figure from Bani.)

1 really enjoyed Target DX by Dave Braun in DX News No. 8, recalling those times gone by, when those guys talked about the ' 60 's and their best listening places. I can say that the best place I have ever had is my home town Bani, where during the ' 50 's I could hear on the 60 - and 49-meter bands shortwave stations from Colombia and Venezuela in the day (I did not have an MW band then, just a oneband Philips radio, from 90 to 30 meter bands) and I really enjoyed it.

Wlth another set then I could hear some U.S. stations as local in the evenings at Bani. They were CKLW-800 from Windsor, Ontario. WOAl-1200, San Antonio, Texas, WLCY-1380 in St. Petersburg, Florida, and WCKY-1530 Cincinnati, Ohio. Radio Belgrano-950 from Buenos Aires, Argentina, was a usual local in the evenings as well as XERF-1570 from Ciudad Acuña, Mexico, and XEW on 940. Yes, you can say that they were powerhouses; yes, they were, but I was not really DX'ing, I was just listening to the best stations heard in the band, apart from the shortwaves.

One night I was surprised to hear a station ID'ing: as "El Heraldo del Chocolate Abuelita" in the 1300 's kHz . 1 did not believe it, but when 1 checked with the WRTH it was true, that was a Mexican station. And stations from Cuba, Venezuela, and Colombia were usual in the evenings. There were persons at Bani who used to listen to soap operas (novelas( from CMQ every night as they were the best on radio at that time. Those were the days when the dial was free from the actual flood of stations we have now, preventing us from listening to faraway stations. Now DX is really difficult.

Then came my contact with Sveriges Radio. I became a collaborator to Radio Sweden and eve started to learn their language, which I stopped. I don't know why.

I used to receive DX RADIO, a magazine printed in Stockholm, all in Swedish. I sent my collaborations and had very good friends there; the best one was Ernst Liliegren, who passed away a long time ago, which I regretted a lot. At that time, during the ' 60 's and ' 70 's, I became for them "their man in Latin America". And many were the articles I wrote for their magazine about stations in my country and shortwave information about Latin America. Only that shortwave right now is almost forgotten due to the arrival of FM and satellites. But at those times we had very good catches in S.W. as when I got Karachi, Pakistan, on a Sunday afternoon.

The article brought back very pleasant memories with the names of John Callarman, Gordon Nelson, and Russ Edmunds. In 1966 I prepared my first list of Dominican radio stations, as I traveled the whole country to do that, and I did not know where to publish it, so somebody (sorry, but I don't remember the name) recommended me to get in touch with John Callarman and the NRC in Boston.

That is how I heard about NRC. They published my list (by mimeograph, as it was then) and I became hooked with the club. Then happened my first visit to Boston and the 1968 Convention where 1 met all those crazy guys like me who spent their time twiddling the dials during the night. One part of the Convention program was to visit a mountain near Boston in the night in order to DX away from the noise of the city. It was dark, as in the car we were going up in had trouble, and we had to continue on foot, but I could not see where to step on as it was terribly dark.

When we arrived at the top they had lights there (sigh) and we started DX'ing. That was before the TRF, and I did not have a portable set so I had to depend on what others were doing with their HQ180's. The only Dominican station I heard was La Voz de las Fuerzas Armadas on 1597 kHz , and 1 told them that the station was on that frequency because the radio receiver of the director of the station could not get it on 1600 as it was out of his receiver, so he asked the engineer to move the frequency a little inside so he could get it in his receiver. Everybody laughed as they heard that.

But nothing important was heard that night, so we had to return with logs empty.
Cordon Nelson had prepared for me a big loop antenna that was used in the Convention, and after that he said that it had been prepared as semi-portable and that I could take it with me to Santo Domingo, and 1 did; he disassembled it for me. I really enjoyed its use with my Lafayette HE-30 and the loop and muny good catches I made with it. I still have it in my radio shack.

1 remember I was received at Kennedy Airport by Bob Foxworth and Ernie Cooper; I slept that night at a friend's house, but Ernie took care of everything, and I travelled with him to Boston, but returned with Russ Edmunds to New York. That was the first and only time I visited Boston due to the courtesy of a friend of mine who lived at Peabody, Mass. I met there a lot of very good friends that 1 haven't forgotten even though 1 don't where they are now.

At that Convention there were some talks of merging NRC and IRCA, but I don't know what happened at the end, as there was no merging at all.

My advantage was that I had learned English at home by reading books and listening to VOA on shortwave because of the speaker's good pronunciation, quite different from the BBC, which I could not understand at the beginning. So I did not had trouble communicating with everybody in the U.S. My second Convention was at New Jersey in 1970, where 1 went with my wife, then to Miami in 1972 with Ronald Schatz, my good old friend.

Oh, those were the good old days then; thank you very much, for reminding me of all that.
