#### **CANADA THIS WEEK**

☐ CBGA-7-1340 Ste. Anne Des Monts, Quebec has applied to the CRTC to move to 101.1 MHz with 49,800 Watts at 381.2 metres. CKDR-800 Dryden, Ontario has applied to move to the FM band at 92.7 MHz with 36,800 Watts at 102.2 metres. And CHUC-1450 Cobourg, Ontario has applied to move to 107.9 MHz with 1,450 Watts at 203 metres. Deane McIntyre adds: "The CHUC application is interesting - I presume that they have given up on moving to 1580. This will be a relief to certain DX'ers in Ontario:-). I wonder if someone else will now ask for 1580?" Other news from the CRTC brings word that Fawcett Broadcasting, which operates CKDR-800 Dryden, Ontario proposes to add the following new AM stations in Ontario: CKDR-1 on 1340 kHz with U1 50/50 at lenace: CKDR-2 on 1400 kHz with U1 50/50 at Sioux Lookout; CKDR-3 on 1450 kHz with U1 40/40 at Hudson; CKDR-4 on 1450 kHz with U1 40/40 at Ear Falls; CKDR-5 on 1340 kHz with U1 250/250

at Red Lake; and CKDR-6 on 1240 kHz with U1 50/50 at Atikokan. The CRTC notes that some of these stations are already operating, but will require special licenses to carry locally-originated programming and local advertising. CKDR-800 is asking to move to FM (see above).

in Joplin. Missouri area, has filed a court ordered bankruptcy. In the Joplin area they own KQYX-
1450, WMBH-1560, KCAR-104.3, KJML-105.1, KMOQ-107.1, KBTN-99.7, and KBTN-1420. All sta-
tions except KBTN-AM are located on West 20th Street in Joplin and KBTN-AM in Neosho, Mis-
souri. I thought something was in the wind as their manager resigned a few weeks ago."

#### Dangerfield Returns from Europe Bringing TAs

Ben Dangerfield is back from his European cruise, and says the DX is back too. "The last few days of October and the first three of November have produced many TA signals from all over the band among them Iran-1503 and 1169 (mostly a het) as well as 1395 Albania and 1179 Sweden. Lots of Spanish stations of course and the usual strong 1134 Croatia, 1089 UK and still good, 1314 Norway. LAs have been mainly poor except for low enders. 555 St. Kitts has been OK and for one night, 535 Grenada as well as the low end Cubans. I have been happy with the growing number of TAs an hour or more before sunset and on November 3 counted TA signals on 40 frequencies before sunset. They mostly were gone a few hours later and naturally that would have been when our overnight guest, Ron Gitscher, arrived on his way to New Hampshire. But we had lots to talk about anyway. My radio listening last month during my river cruise in Europe was very interesting and I will try to submit some sort of log. I just want to say that 702 Bratislava is off the air but at least two of the new French stations are on. I heard them on 1350 and 1584."

At 0600, began Mexican national anthem, but programming continued. I set tape to run and, next morning, found better ID, at 0800 TOH, call letters sounded like XENCO or XEMTO, clearly in Matamoros. + NOV 5 0454-0501 - Loud and almost clear atop channel with Spanish version of "It's Impossible," then English love song by female vocalist. at 0501, ID clear: "Escuchas La Radio, Catorce-cincuenta, Matamoros, Valle Hermoso, Reynosa, y Valle de Téjas, XERDO, con mil wats de potencia, estudios y oficinas Sexta y Fuerza Aéreo, Edificio María Rebeca, en Matamoros, Tamaulipas, México, La Radio, 14-50, información, in...udo, música, La Radio, 14-50, los .... todo, una emisora de Grupo Radio Avanzado." This is the former XEVH, transmitter at Valle Hermoso, which in the past three years has been "La Poderosa," "Imperativa" when I heard it while in Brownsville in October 2002, and "Activa 14-50" according to September MPM. I suspect this one was the one I heard on car radio NOV 5 at 1415, and I further suspect, based upon 520 miles between my geographic coordinates and those of the Valle Hermoso transmitter site that "mil wats" is an understatement. Second Mexican graveyarder heard here; the other also on 1450, XECU. [Callarman-TX]

#### International News

THAILAND: 873 R.Thailand Bangkok has been testing DRM digital broadcasting, the first in the region. The 10 kW transmitter provided 3.7 kW power output using 64 QAM modulation and reception conditions were field tested. In the open countryside around Bangkok, signal degradation with distance was markedly less than analog. A similar result was obtained in the relatively less dense areas on the edge of the city. However, in the inner city DRM reception was very poor as was the analog signal. The consensus was that local fillers (or relays) would be needed as well as higher power for the transmitter. More this time on DXers' attempts to build their own antennas or otherwise improve their listening results. This time we'll look at some other more antenna projects.

#### ANTENNA COMPARISONS

John Wilke, Milwaukee, WI < J999w@aol.com>l crawled up from the basement listening post last night and did some antenna comparisons with my box loop that I normally don't use (because it's deaf in the basement). I compared my 3' box loop against a 85' wire that slopes up to the top of a 70 ft oak tree. As has always been stated, vertical antennas are noisy, that's what I found too. Using just the loop on 750khz with WSB nulled, I could hear two different Spanish stations weakly just above the noise. I then turned the loop so WSB was peaked, then phased them down with the wire (MFJ1026). The Spanish stations were inaudible, only band noise was heard. The wire is awesome on the 60 and 90 meter tropical bands, but on MW, it's not the best performer. I had the gut feeling that the wire would outperform the loop because of the height, but that was wrong.

I also hooked up the Palstar MW550P MW tuner that I recently purchased from K3PI to the box loop. With the 12 dB of amplification it provides, plus the 10db pre-amp of my modified Icom R71a. signals are simply screaming in now. I had Mexico City's XEX, 730khz, S9+10db on a particularly normal night. This alleviates my fears that I would miss something while using the loop because it might not be sensitive enough. The box loop has plenty of gain now! Due to the natural resonance of the tuner and that of the loop, when tuned up on 730khz, my super-pest local station on 1290 was a mere S9 with both pre-amps on instead of the needle pegging signal it usually puts in, so I have no fear of images despite the large amount of amplification. This could be a powerful combo... box loop plus Palstar preselector and Lintend on putting it through its paces in the coming months. Tonight, I'll take the loop outside in the yard. I've had better results with it out there in the past and with the pre-amps on it, it should really be a signal-getter.

As I get my EWE's put back up in the yard, I'll make more comparison's against the amplified loop and report my findings.

#### PHASING FOR TA'S

This discussion with a log by Brent Taylor in Doaktown, NB as follows: "1179 UNID, probably Spain/Canary, man talk with pop music but too much WHAM slop to ID language."Neil Kazaross <neilkaz@earthlink.net>From my checking, you're a good 600 miles to the ENE of Rochester. Using a well terminated pennant you should knock down WHAM about 20-25dB at night (perhaps more if lucky). If that's not enough to enable good reception on 1179, allow me to suggest phasing.

If you phase a 100 foot wire on the ground vs. your pennant and aimed in the same general TA direction you should be able to virtually eliminate a station at the distance of WHAM off the back end. 50 feet actually might be long enough. All you want to get from the phase antenna is just slightly more signal from the pest in the pennant's back end null.

Using phasing you should be able to eliminate almost any QRMing US station to your W/SW as well as Canadian big guns like Montreal and Toronto etc and then be able to listen to TA's with little domestic ORM.

-btaylor@nbnet.nb.ca>Hi Neil, That's exactly what I'm doing now. My pennant point is oriented at about 230 degrees to null the East Coast in the direction of New York City, Boston, and Philadelphia, and it works very well at that. And I have a phaser. My deficit right now is in the "other" antenna to phase against.

To this point I have used some of my ham radio wire antennas as substitutes for a second antenna, with only limited results. I do have to get some wire out, although my property line is about 20 feet away in the direction of Europe.

Actually, I even got WHAM knocked down considerably after I first filed the DX tip, but still not enough. Now that I'm back from the last dx-pedition of the season, I can get some work done at home!

Neil Kazaross < neilkaz@earthlink.net>OK Brent, how much property do you have in the direction opposite Europe? All you need is 50 to 100 feet for a mini-BOG running in towards the intended DX

(not possible in your case) or opposite the intended DX (i.e. towards the backend pests).

The idea is that the phase antenna (mini-BOG in this case) has good side nulls (if it is rather straight) so it won't pick much side QRM, but it picks up from both directions along its length well. All you want is a bit more signal from the backend pests on the mini-BOG than on the pennant. Then with the phaser you reduce the mini-BOG signal strength to equal the pennant signal strength for the pest and phase away. As a result, you can drop the typical 20 to 25dB null of the pennant to a good 50 dB down and then you won't worry much about back end QRM anymore unless your pest is a superlocal. It is also useful for phasing stations that might be somewhat to the side of the pennant's cardiod shaped back null.

IMHO, this cardiod antenna vs. // mini-BOG phasing system is the best setup that a DXer would a typical sized lot (100 ft by 100ft or so) can use to DX from one intended general direction. (TA's in your case aided by phasing away back end domestic QRM)

btaylor@nbnet.nb.ca>Thanks for the outline, Neil. I've paced it off many times and looked at what I could do. My lot is actually about 1 acre, with about 300 feet of frontage on the road, and an equivalent amount at the back of the property along a stretch of the river.

The "long" part of my property rectangle is oriented about 330 degrees true, and my house is very close to the eastern edge of the property, and about 1/5 of the way back from the road. There is no room in the front of the house to run a "counter-phase" wire, but there is a way I can angle one in the backyard, although the end of it would pass through/over my main thoroughfare where I need to shunt and park my travel trailer. It's also a common lawn with my neighbor, and we keep that area cooperatively mowed.

I guess the short answer is, it's "doable," with some adjustments and allowances. My neighbor is great and understands the antenna thing. He has even allowed me to string temporary Beverages on his hay fields once the ground freezes in winter. I expect to take advantage of the same hospitality this season.

My ultimate goal is to get a wooden pole installed near the rear of my lot and try to hang a Kaz from it. someday...

If you could put up a couple of cardiod patterned antennas a good 200 feet apart along the line to the TA's...i.e. pennant near your shack and KAZ near the back of your property, you should then be able to phase one vs. the other and again arrive at a great system F/B. Ideally the two antennas would be 1/4 wave apart.

#### NEAR VERTICAL INCIDENCE SKYWAVE (NVIS) ANTENNAS

Les Rayburn, Birmingham, AL <les@highnoonfilm.com>Recently, I've been experimenting with the use of Near Vertical Incidence Skywave (NVIS) antennas for reception on the AM band. For those not familiar with the concept, it's basically a technique of special antennas and/or mounting practices designed to maximize the reception of only high angle skywave signals. More info can be found here: http://www.qsl.net/wb5ude/nvis/

I've used an 80 meter dipole mounted about 10 feet off the ground as an NVIS antenna for both Navy MARS and ARES emergency communications for about two years. It proved it's worth during the recent hurricanes.

In practice, the results are quite dramatic. Switching from my transmit antenna (an inverted L) to the NVIS antenna drops noise levels dramatically. Signals with the "cone" of reception (300 to 400 miles) literally jump out of the noise.

I've started using this antenna both as a "phase" antenna and also stand alone for overnight recordings. So far, most of my efforts have been on the graveyard channels.

As expected, the NVIS antenna drastically reduces the "clutter" on these crowded channels. Stations more distant than 400 miles have their skywave signals reduced, allowing closer stations to come in better. Since there are still hundreds of stations within that distance that I haven't logged yet, I expect my graveyard totals to go up.

It's use as a phase antenna has also been promising. Within a couple of weeks, the mowing season will end here in Alabama, and I'll be able to reinstall my two BOG antennas. Can't wait to try phasing them against the NVIS.

So far, I've only been able to phase against the broadband active whip, but again the results are very interesting. I'll try to quantify the results during the season, and report back, but I suspect I may be getting deeper nulls on locals using the NVIS.

I'd love to see some other members experiment with these antennas and report on their results. Perhaps others have already tried this in the past?

Rick Kunath <k9ao@charter.net>I don't have the room at my present location, but when I was DXing from the Marquette, Michigan area a few years back I had a loop NVIS antenna I used with great success. This antenna was a full-wave loop on 75 meters, and 67 was feet on a side. This sounds pretty large, but the actual antenna was pretty compact. Overall height was about 15 feet. I had a low dipole similar to yours available too, but the loop always outperformed it. I wanted to put up a loop with 135 foot sides, but never had the time. I suspect this one would have been lots better than

the smaller antenna. The loop was fed with open-wire 450-ohm feedline and was matched via a link coupled balanced transmatch I built specially for the job. You'd probably chuckle, but the MW receiving tuner is about 2

feet deep, a foot and a half wide and 8 inches high. It is positively stuffed full of

large high-value high-voltage air-variable caps I scrounged at swap meets and a positively huge BC-610 transmitter coil, but it works great. It did a bang-up job on 160 meters too, but it was built with MW DXing in mind. I have it stashed away and hope to have the room to use it again.

I used a KW Viking Matchbox on 80-10 for TX.

I played with phasing the NVIS loop against a beverage for a while and had good results, the phaser I was using at the time however, wasn't ready for prime time. I'd like to try phasing a NVIS loop against a BOG and see if my previous tests were valid.

#### WA1ION MINI-DXP-5 ANTENNA PHASER

John Wilke, Milwaukee. WI < J999w@aol.com>I finally got around to building one of Mark Connelly's (WA1ION) projects... the "Mini-DXP-5 DXpedition Phasing Unit".

Some of the parts I had on hand... the caps, resistors, and switches, so some substitutions were made there, but the pots and ferrite cores I bought from an online discount electronics store and ordered as specified in the plans. I've got the whole thing in a clear plastic Tupperware container using the time tested method of 'haywire' construction.

The ordered parts arrived on Tuesday. Wednesday I wound the transformers while watching TV. Luckily I had small enough wire to cram enough turns in the little ferrite cores. Thursday I drilled out the holes in the box and mounted the pots and coax connectors as well as started the wiring. Friday afternoon (today) I finished the wiring and hooked it up.

Initially, I had a hard time getting any station to null, so I started to trouble shoot by reversing the 'sense' of one of the transformers... I was then able to get a 20db null on a few stations. After playing with it for a while, I was still frustrated so I disconnected my Palstar MW550P from the line and just ran antennas->phaser->radio and now it's working MUCH better. For example, my local on 1640khz, WKSH, which is S9+20db can be phased down to about S3 leaving a couple stations fading in right now at sunset. Spinning down to 1510khz, local WAUK which runs about the same strength and is in the same direction, is already down to about S7, and with a little tweaking of the controls, can be made to disappear! Below 1200khz, it's not working that well and I suspect it's because of the capacitor choices I made in my substitutions, so I'll try some other values later.

I've already got an MFJ1026 and a homebrew LC phaser, but both are so narrow banded that I have trouble nulling the whole signal, usually forcing me to listen to one sideband and phasing that one sideband. With this broadbanded phaser, I'm listening in AM mode and the whole signal just disap-

Current test setup is the Palstar R30, Mini-DXP-5 phasing an EWE vs. a random wire. More testing to follow including a few audio clips.

Why might we be so happy? We stumbled on Inner Mongolia on 1458, Guam on 801, Vietnam on 783, and lots of other stuff. Overall, we were pretty lucky. By all rights the first night should not have had good high latitude paths but things were actually pretty good. Go figure.

Clams - the secret to DX success? On the same evening Mark Connelly and other DXers enjoyed Cape Cod clams and tuned an abundance of TAs, our Grayland gang was hauling in Asian TPs and scarfing up a surprise snack of freshly fried Washington-style clams. This past weekend was an official clam digging weekend, as clamming is only allowed on the occasional dates that the state government determines is appropriate (based on clam population and sizes). So, when the state says "Go for it," thousands of clam diggers descend up the beaches including Grayland. Early Saturday night, a group of clammers at the motel knocked on the door of DX Central (room #15) and offered some cooked clam strips in exchange for a peek at our radio equipment! A short Q&A session followed - like usual, they wanted to know what the "\&\*#! heck we were up to. Of course, there were the requisite comments like, "Oh yeah, my brother has a ham rig!" or, "Yep, I used to be into CB years ago... worked skip with some dude in Georgia!"

If it was clams on Saturday night, what brought in the parade of DX late Thursday evening? It must have been the fact that John, Walt and I managed to lock ourselves out of our #14 motel room at 2:00 in the morning. What's left to do but prop up the eyelids in DX Central, hoping the sleep depravation would be worth it? Fortunately it was - many Asian and Pacific signals were logged and the DX lingered until much later than usual for this time of year.

Friday evening was good in its own right for DX, but I just can't think of anything that would be responsible for it. There's an outside chance, though, that a low solar flux number and low "K" and "A" indices \*might\* have had an impact.

Mediumwave highlights for me included another log of V6AJ Kosrae (Micronesia) on 1503; a good "V7AB" ID on *Radio Marshalls*, 1098; a first logging of KTWG *The Cornerstone*, Agana, Guam on 801; and Taiwan's *BCC Information Network* from Tainan on 1539. Because MW was so good I rarely ventured into shortwave, but the most interesting intercepts were the 300-watt RPDT2 Manggarai from Indonesia on 2960, and a good signal from recently reactivated *R. Vanuatu* on 7260.11.

Saturday's "Show and Tell" session was another high point of the DXpedition, and it has become a tradition at Grayland. This was an opportunity for everyone to present the latest DXing gadget they've acquired or talk about a particular technical topic of interest.

Best of all was the experience of sharing the ups and downs with good friends who appreciate our peculiar hobby. Even when DX conditions are poor, there's always talk, laughs, and wisecracks that makes losing sleep so much fun.

Next time at Grayland? I'm bringing my \*own\* clams, thank you.


#### John Bryant

Thursday, October 14 and Friday morning, Oct. 15: Guy Atkins and I arrived at the Grayland site in mid-afternoon and managed to get our traditional three Beverage antennas erected in the fog, just before the arrival of both dusk and most of the other DXers. We all spent a couple of hours connecting equipment, accessories, and arranging our DXing stations. For most of us, it was then off to bed for a few hours. We all planned to get up at 0900 UTC (2 AM local time) to check for stations from the Pacific nations and to celebrate sunset arriving in Japan and the Koreas. Usually most of us return to the warm covers after a half-hour of DXing to catch at least two more hours of shut-eye before dawn enhancement starts. NOT THIS TIME! Those of us who made that 2AM wakeup call were rewarded

by being witnesses to the start of one of the finest DX experiences of our lives. When we tuned in, the dial was already full of fantastic signals. It took me a full hour to work my up the dial just logging the most obvious "usual" big guns. They were almost ALL there! After that first trip up the dial, things really got interesting. In the next six hours we were graced with more DX than we could possibly cover... though try we did! I logged 24 Japanese stations, with only one being a totally new one for me: JOMW-1071, Obihiro, Hokkaido, a small relay station for STV. My own interest for the remainder of the morning was the Middle Kingdom: China. By 1000UT, channels where we normally hear Japanese or just noise sported various Chinese dialects. Of the Chinese, by for the most interesting was on 1215. The programming was formatted very similarly to American popular stations - with commercials, promos, etc. Indeed, at the station ID. It seemed strange to this old Cold warrior to hear the terms "AM" and "FM" interspersed with rapidly spoken Chinese. Thanks to logs of this station in September by Bruce and Chuck - and subsequent translations - we knew this to be the CNR7 network, with the actual station located in Guangdong Province near Canton, Shenzen and Hong Kong. Most of the DX faded out about an hour after sunrise in Grayland. However, a few of the strongest stations were detectable until nearly noon local time! This was particularly shocking, since we are neither that far north nor is it anywhere near mid-winter. For all for of us, it was truly a memorable morning! We were fortunate that the DX was so stimulating, since Walt, Guy and I had managed the nearly impossible... we all managed to lock ourselves out of our shared bedroom, Rm. 14 and would have been laying on the mangy carpet of Rm. 15, DX Central, had the DX not kept us glued to the dials.

Saturday, October 16: Conditions on Saturday morning were in the same general "wonderful"

range, but different DXing targets seemed to present themselves. Although I heard no new stations from Down Under, it was nice to hear several of the Big Guns... Down Under stations are most usually present during our summers, with things switching to East Asia about Equinox. I was very pleased by logging four new Japanese stations during the morning. Three were small Time relay transmitters of Hokkaido Broadcasting Corporation, in-



cluding one that reportedly only runs 100 watts. The fourth new Japanese was the tentative logging of *AFN* Misawa-1575, at the Misawa AFB on the coast at the northern tip of Honshu Island, just opposite Hokkaido. The signal was running over/under *VOA* Thailand with almost continuous USA pop rock very late in the morning. The only other likely source of that programming would be co-channel and largely synchro *AFN* Sasebo, at the US Navy Base in southern Japan. I'm going to send a tentative report to Misawa and say a prayer. Saturday afternoon we held our traditional "Show and Tell" session with discussions of dawn enhancement and the latest in computer/DXing tools being highlights this year. Well known Oregon DXers, Dave Williams and Patrick Martin, joined us for Show and Tell, with Patrick bring along what has to be best collection of New Zealand QSLs ever amassed by an American DXer. Wow!

Sunday morning, October 17: Overall propagation conditions on Sunday morning were not as good as the previous two mornings; levels were down on many of the normal residents of dawn enhancement. However, the ionosphere still delivered some special, in some cases unique, DX on this last morning. My own highlight was listening to parallel Chinese broadcasts that were revealed on 828//1377//1593 after the early weekend sign-off of co-channel *NHK* from Japan. One of these, the station on 828 (likely Bejing News Station) was totally new for me. Unfortunately, Guy and I had to quit before the very last of the DX died and missed some unique catches by Bruce and Chuck... oh well, the wise fisherman always leaves a few fish in the sea for "next time."

At 1640, Nick Hall-Patch found JOUB going into their signoff with ID, so I tuned in to 774 in time to catch the Japanese national anthem and music box closing tune 1645. Good signal, even at 2-1/4 hours past local sunrise! [Atkins] OCT 15 1640 - Amazing S7 signal, then sign off with call ID, anthem and music box. [Hall-Patch] OCT 15 1643 - Sign off procedure. Over two hours past local sunrise, Nick Hall-Patch noted the call sign. I missed that but noted the slow xylophone sign off tune until 1645. There's still an open carrier, but not sure if it's them or someone else. An incredible morning for China, Japan, and Korea! [Salmaniw] OCT 16 0955 - Fair; English lesson about astronomy, said it's unlikely a comet would hit the earth any time soon (that's a relief), 3LO in background. Later at 1418 Italian lessons. + OCT 17 0900 - Strong with time pips and Portuguese program. Local ID 1319:50. [Portzer] OCT 17 1500 - Sign-off, 'JOUB' ID, anthem, and music box tune was heard at very good level. [Atkins]

CHINA Zhonggou Huayan BC, Fuzhou OCT 17 1544 - Mixing with Vietnam at fair level, parallel to 6185 to clinch it. [Hutton] OCT 17 1544 - Chinese phone talk parallel 6185 SW, then

faded under Vietnam. [Portzer]

VIETNAM Thoi Long OCT 17 1540 - The surprise of the morning. Fair level mixing with 783 someone (Chinese?) but easily paralleled to 5925 by Bruce Portzer to nail this one. [Hutton] OCT 17 1550-1553 - Asian music and woman in SE Asian language parallel 5925 SW. [Portzer] 792

NEW ZEALAND R.Sport, Hamilton OCT 16 1030 - Kiwi male announcer with R.Sport ID at 1031. Couldn't locate any parallels, though. [Atkins]

800 ALASKA KINY Juneau OCT 17 0357 - "Super Gold" oldies show, legal ID 0400. [Portzer]

- - GUAM KTWG The Cornerstone, Agana OCT 16 1505 At fair+ level (!) with religious program in US English. Listed as being off earlier but John Bryant mentioned they are now 24 hours. A nice surprise for me and a new station - Guam is a tough catch from Grayland. [Hutton] OCT 16 1510 - Religious/family program in English, with two men discussing dealing with the death of an infant, and finding support through Scripture. Fading signal 1513, but back up at 1517, with references to the death of King David's child and how he dealt with the loss. Still in at 1553 with sermon. Good level during peaks in the signal. Pleased to catch this station in Guam - thanks to Chuck Hutton for tip. [Atkins] OCT 16 1510 - American religious programming at a very strong level before fading into near oblivion. KTWG now 24 hours. Thanks to John Bryant for pointing out the change, and to Chuck Hutton for pointing out the station! [Salmaniw] OCT 16 1513 - US religion, strong at first, then faded, probably much-wanted KTWG. [Portzer]
- NORTH KOREA KCBS Pyongyang OCT 15 1056 Noted in passing at fair level. Korean 819 talk by males. [Bryant] OCT 15 1411 - Very good, parallel 2850, and the MW outlet was better! [Hutton] OCT 17 1122 - Korean talk fair. [Portzer]
- CHINA CNR1 Beijing News Station OCT 17 1503 While monitoring the post 1500UT signoff of Japan's NHK2 network, I noted Chinese programming behind NHK2 on 828, 1377 and 1593. After NHK2 cleared those frequencies, it became apparent that all three were parallel with news in Chinese. At 1510, the CNR1 stations continued in parallel, but presumed Beijing News did not. Moderate level at best, a half-hour after Grayland Sunrise. [Bryant] OCT 17 1506 - After JOBB Osaka's sign-off, a weak Chinese station with male and female announcers was found left on the frequency (parallel 1377), with an even weaker third station playing slow music on a vibraharp or xylophone. I also caught JOBB on OCT 17 during their NHK2 sign-off at 1500, parallel to JOUB 774's sign-off. [Atkins] OCT 15 1346 - Business English lessons; monstrous signal S9+20. [Hall-Patch] OCT 15 1405 - Good English lessons. [Hutton] OCT 16 1305 - Loud parallel 774 etc. [Portzer]
- 846 KIRIBATI R. Kiribati, Tarawa OCT 17 0920 - Presumed with island music peaking at fair level, while Kosrae V6AJ was also in. [Atkins] OCT 17 0925 - Island music fair. [Portzer]
- AUSTRALIA unlD Metro Service OCT 16 1038 Male announcer with play-by-play sports coverage, with another male commentator. Language sounded English, but I'm not positive. Very low level signal. At 1050 recheck, 855 was found parallel to 702 2BL Sydney and 891 5AN Adelaide with more sports coverage. Who is this on 855?. [Atkins]
- CHINA CNR2 synchros OCT 15 1059 Classical Chinese music to TOH, then CNR time pips and into presumed news in Standard Chinese. Fair to poor. [Bryant]
- 855 NORTH KOREA Sangwon OCT 15 1307 - Likely this with Korean talk by man and woman; actually 855.06 accounting for hum often heard on channel. [Hall-Patch] OCT 15 1405 - Very good! They usually are not a powerhouse signal - they've declined over the years it seems.
- JAPAN JOPR Fukui OCT 16 1423 Woman talking parallel 1332 in mix; some splash also poor-fair. [Hall-Patch] OCT 18 1420 - Jumble of stations, none was parallel 1287, one parallel 1332, Chinese talk in there as well. [Portzer]
- JAPAN JOGB NHK2 Kumamoto OCT 15 1205 Two men in Japanese with interview or discussion, parallel to 774. Fair-good level. [Atkins] OCT 15 1339 - English lessons over/ under growl parallel 774. [Hall-Patch] OCT 16 1342 - Fair; language lessons parallel 774. [Portzer] OCT 17 1130 - At poor level in spite of listed 500 kW, a power which ought to make them local-like here. [Hutton]
- RUSSIA Khabarovsk OCT 17 1130 Chimes on half hour, then Russian talk by man. Poorfair. [Hall-Patch]
- unIDs OCT 15 1300 3 & 1 pips on hour, likely Japan but still not much audio, then offfrequency growl started to dominate. [Hall-Patch] OCT 17 1554 - Talk in unID language, then rousing March music strong. Need to replay recording and ID the language. [Portzer]
- ALASKA KBBI Homer OCT 16 1424 Good; NPR news. [Portzer]
- CHINA unID OCT 17 1557 Fair, ID at the top of the hour as "xxxx guangbo dientai" but I can't decipher it. [Hutton]
- 891 JAPAN JOHK NHK1 Sendai OCT 15 1115 - Atypical NHK1 programming heard this morning with the 'Yellow Submarine' standard by the Beatles. + OCT 16 1115 - Japanese World

- Series. Very good level at times. [Bryant] OCT 16 1607 Fair parallel 594 over presumed Thailand. [Portzer]
- THAILAND Bangkok OCT 16 1608 Probably the one with exotic music and talk in SE 891 Asian language. [Portzer]
- 891 THAILAND Nong Khae OCT 16 1612 - Assumed the source of talk in a language I could not recognize, plus music of a different sort. This was fair to good in full sunrise. I only hear this station at sunrise - the rest of the time, it is Korea, Japan or Fiji. [Hutton]
- unID OCT 17 1037 Woman in Chinese weak but dominant on NW wire, don't think it was CKMO. [Portzer]
- JAPAN JOCB NHK2 Nagoya OCT 16 1426 Italian lessons poor in splat parallel 774. [Portzer] OCT 16 1430 - Italian lessons with accordion interlude parallel 774. Poor-fair. [Hall-Patch] OCT 16 1443 - 10 kW, parallel to the NHK2 net, fair level. Next goal on 909: the 5 kW Japanese STV station that is parallel 1440 which is pretty easy DX itself - often on top of 1440 domestics. [Hutton]
- SOUTH KOREA KBS1 Yeoncheon OCT 15 1130 Poor and hard to follow but seemingly parallel 711 which is my reference point for KBS1. Not heard before. + OCT 17 1115 - Fairpoor but IDed by being parallel 711. [Hutton]
- ALASKA KTKN Ketchican OCT 15 1657 Good clean S7 to S9 signal with mentions of Ketchikan and KTKN. Political ad for Jim Elkin. ABC news at TOH, but no local ID. [Salmaniw]
- CHINA Anhui RGD1, Anhui OCT 15 1108 Presume this in standard Chinese, with talk by man and woman. Sounded like a newscast. Only fair level. [Bryant] OCT 15 1227 - Presumed with Chinese language fading in and out; male and female announcers. [Atkins]
- JAPAN unID OCT 16 1551 Pop music parallel 1287, but two stations listed after 1500UT; 936 JOTR Akita more likely nil-poor. [Hall-Patch]
- SOUTH KOREA KBS3 Voice of Love OCT 17 1438 Tentative. Low level talk in possible Korean and soft music, seemingly parallel to 1224. A real jumble barely above threshold on 1224, making paralleling very difficult. [Atkins]
- unID OCT 15 1520 Interesting; US pop music, a bit of teletalk, and more talk in a language that did not seem Chinese or Japanese but I could not get further. No real likely candidates here. [Hutton]
- CHINA CNR1 OCT 15 1520 Man and woman in Chinese parallel 5030 but slightly delayed. [Hall-Patch] OCT 17 1423 - Pop song and Chinese talk parallel 4460, good signal but heavy domestic splatter. [Portzer]
- CHINA CRI Govorit Pekin OCT 15 1341 Russian talk by man and woman parallel 5915. somebody slightly off channel. [Hall-Patch] OCT 15 1357 - China's Foreign Service to Russia is the dominant station on this frequency from Grayland and from my home on the Canadian/US border this season. During the Grayland DX pedition, the signals were sometimes quite good. [Bryant] OCT 17 1119 - Fair in splat parallel 1323. [Portzer]
- SOUTH KOREA HLCA KBS R.Liberty 1, Dangjin OCT 15 1109 Very strong level of female announcers in Korean. Also heard Oct 16 with strong signal at 1115, and Oct 17 at 1231 (with merengue music sung in Korean!). [Atkins] OCT 15 2313 - KBS programming heard throughout the DXpedition. Once or twice to 20 and 30 over S-9. True studio quality. [Bryant]
- CHINA CNR1 stations OCT 16 1432 Fair in splat with dreamy music parallel 6030. Echoey signal, apparently getting two or more outlets. [Portzer] OCT 16 1441 - Fair parallel to 6030. Quite a noticeable echo assumedly from satellite delivery. [Hutton]
- 990 JAPAN JORK NHK1 Kochi OCT 15 1248 - Quick fades in and out, with male talk in Japanese. Noted parallel 594. Mixing with Mexican station. [Atkins]
- unID OCT 17 1137 Chinese type flute music poor. A little later, talk to fair+ level. Mixing with a second station at 1156. All should be interesting - this is not a channel where TPs roll in. [Hutton] OCT 17 1209 - Woman in unID language, possibly Chinese, in bad KOMO splat. [Portzer]
- 1008 JAPAN JONR Osaka OCT 16 1239 - Noted here at good level with Japanese sporting event. I believe that this was the league championship series of Japanese basu baru. [Bryant] OCT 16 1339 - Japanese pop music. [Portzer]
- 1008 NEW ZEALAND Tauranga OCT 16 0951 - Phone talk parallel 1035 fair. [Portzer]
- 1026 CHINA Beijing OCT 17 1427 - String of ads, "Beijing Jinli Guangbo Dientai" ID by woman fair-good, then faded under another Chinese station. [Portzer]
- 1035 NEW ZEALAND 2ZB Wellington OCT 16 0948 - Nice with talk show and ads. [Portzer] OCT 16 1242 - Presume this with typical NewsTalk ZB format at fair level. [Bryant]
- 1035 SOLOMON ISLANDS SIBC Honiara OCT 17 1102 - Weakly audible with relay of BBC WS news in English in parallel to SW 5019.87. Impossible without checking the SW which was at

- very good level. Again audible in parallel at 1125. 945 not heard. [Salmaniw] OCT 17 1107-Poor-fair signal with *BBC* news report from Baghdad, parallel to 5019.9 *BBC* relay. A few minutes earlier I listened to SIBC's local sign-off on shortwave, and there was no sign of 1035 MW then. Thanks Walt Salmaniw for tip. [Atkins]
- 1044 CHINA CRI Changzhou OCT 15 1130 CRI Japanese Service heard here at good level with time tone at half-hour and then female talk in Japanese parallel 7190. Heard also on 16th. [Bryant] OCT 15 1320 Assumed the Chinese at fair level. Mixing with something else that seems to be Korea; two KBS1 outlets at 10 kW each are listed. [Hutton] OCT 17 1000 Man and woman in Japanese parallel 7190 fair. [Portzer]
- SOUTH KOREA HLCD / HLCI KBS1 OCT 15 1318 Heard with female announcer and orchestral music, parallel to 1089 HLCH. After 1320, a Chinese station was heard mixing with the KBS station, then dominated the frequency. Fair-good, but quick fades into the noise. [Atkins] OCT 15 1320 Seemingly parallel 1089. I'm not 100% convinced yet gotta listen to the tapes again. [Hutton]
- JAPAN JOAR Nagoya OCT 15 1141 Japanese talk by man; was still at S6 with woman in Japanese at 1653, over two hours after sunrise. [Hall-Patch] OCT 15 1328 Up and down signal beneath strong Korean jammer. Pop music and announcers in Japanese, and parallel to 1062. Must have been a music countdown program, as announcers mentioned 'today's number one...' and 'number four' in English. Good on peaks. [Atkins]
- SOUTH KOREA Jammer OCT 15 0920 Heard throughout the DXpedition. Often very strong. [Bryant] OCT 15 1131 Dominant, over Japanese talk. [Hall-Patch] OCT 17 1043 Jammer good. [Portzer]
- 1062 **PHILIPPINES** DZEC Manila OCT 15 1126 Heard at fair level with a phone-in program in Tagalog. Heard most of the rest of the morning. [Bryant]
- 1062 **SOUTH KOREA** HLKQ KBS1 Ch'ongju OCT 15 1435 Man in Korean parallel 3930. [Hall-Patch] OCT 16 1118 Definitely noted Korean here, with two or more weak stations mixing beneath. [Atkins]
- 1062 unIDs OCT 15 1125 Tagalog-sounding male announcer; mixing with unID. R&B music station 1128; slowly rising to the top again 1129. Definite Japanese language also on frequency... a real mess here at a low level, peaking to fair. Hoping for DZEC Manila. [Atkins] OCT 16 1558 Fair music and talk as the last of the sunrise rush disappeared. 3 low and 1 high pips on the hour but could not catch the ID. [Hutton]
- 1071 JAPAN JOFK NHK1 Hiroshima OCT 16 1338 After the basu baru coverage, heard a typical weekend entertainment program, featuring a Japanese classical flamenco guitarist. Sometimes this signal was at very good level and sometimes it was over/under co-channel JOWM from Hokkaido. Very pleased as both stations are new to me. [Bryant]
- JAPAN JOWM Obihiro OCT 15 1140 Was trying for JOFK NHK1 Hiroshima and stumbled on yet another repeater station for Sapporo TV, JOWF 1440. Here with pops and talk show at fair level. New station for me. [Bryant] OCT 16 1256 Likely a Japanese baseball game parallel 1440. Lots of splash nil-poor. [Hall-Patch]
- 1089 CHINA unID OCT 15 1322. [Hutton]
- 1089 JAPAN JOHB Sendai OCT 16 1433 Italian lessons parallel 774, mixing with Chinese music station. [Portzer]
- 1089 **SOUTH KOREA** HLCH Chungju OCT 15 1320 Seemingly parallel one of the stations mixing on 1044. I'm not 100% convinced yet gotta listen to the tapes again. [Hutton]
- 1098 CHINA unID OCT 15 1510-1523 Fair in Chinese. Not a clue which. [Hutton]
- JAPAN JOFN HBC Imagane OCT 16 1409 This noted at poor level with entertainment program (pops/talk). Was clearly parallel to HBC key station JOHR Sapporo. Only 100 watts. [Bryant] OCT 16 1553 Up just enough as the last of the sunrise DX disappeared. Got a clear parallel against 1287 to log another new one. [Hutton]
- MARSHALL ISLANDS V7AB R.Marshalls, Majuro OCT 15 0937 Nice island music at tune-in, but frequent fades. Woman in probable Marshallese language 0940, then fading again. Female announcer with 'V7AB' ID at 0944:20. The ID is 11 seconds into this recording: http://www.guyatkins.com/files/R\_Marshalls\_1098\_ID.mp3. Occasional fades to good level. [Atkins] OCT 15 1058 Here as usual with music. Not particularly strong but omnipresent. [Hutton] OCT 16 1013 Faded up to a fair-good level with female talk in Marshallese and island music choruses. [Atkins] OCT 16 1026 Island chanting; fair. [Hall-Patch] OCT 16 1038 Huge signal, island music, woman in local language. [Portzer] OCT 17 0918 Island music choruses and Marshallese announcer. Fair to good, but took a quick dive into the noise at 0920. Back up at 1026 with Black Gospel or R&B vocal music; female announcer 1029, and into soft music. Marshalls must have signed-off during a fade, as it disappeared by

- 1035. [Atkins] OCT 17 0923 Nice ID given by same YL announcer I've heard the past few mornings with a good fade up after an EZL south pacific selection. V7AB clearly heard and then immediately into another selection (same style but a religious hymn). Went past their sked close down of 1030. Heard to at least 1035. Gone shortly thereafter when rechecked. [Salmaniw]
- 1107 JAPAN JOCF Kagoshima OCT 17 1238 Poor-fair level at tune-in, parallel to 1062 (but didn't find 1449 parallel). Japanese talk by male. [Atkins]
- 1107 JAPAN JOMR Kanazawa OCT 16 1433 Ballad parallel 1440; way under another Japanese; poor. [Hall-Patch]
- 1107 uniDs OCT 16 1358 Weak jumble of audios, mix of pips and chimes 1400. [Portzer] OCT 17 1327 Fair to good with jazz music and talk mixing with semi-classical music. Parallel to 1062 which is weird there's a 100 watt repeater of 1107 JOCF on 1062 but I am not going to believe that's what it was. [Hutton]
- AUSTRALIA 4BC *Talkradio*, Brisbane OCT 16 0945 Nice with teletalk and local ads. [Portzer] OCT 16 1120 Male announcer taking phone calls from listeners, discussing family, how long in the country of Australia, etc. Presumed, as 4BC is the usual talk radio 'blowtorch' on 1116, according to Chuck Hutton. Good signal on peaks. [Atkins] OCT 16 1204 Nice sudden fade up with *Radio* 1116 and 4BC ID after weather, and into a light variety show with bantering between a YL and OM. [Salmaniw]
- 1116 JAPAN OCT 16 1337 Classical music and Japanese talk fair-nil, presume RNB. [Portzer]
- CHINA unIDs OCT 17 1421 To good+ level briefly with talk that sounded Chinese but not ID'ed. [Hutton] OCT 17 1509 Two Chinese stations battling, one had echo chamber announcement 1512, then ad(?) using opening from Beethoven's 5th, 0814 had one with Star Wars theme. [Portzer]
- JAPAN JOAD NHK2 Okinawa OCT 16 1326 Likely this stronger NHK2 outlet on 1125 with march music, and male and female announcers with English lessons ('The power outage paralyzed the railway network; I made a mad dash for the train but the door closed in my face!'), parallel 774 Akita. [Atkins] OCT 17 1459 Japanese talk, pips, local ID lost under a blast of CKWX splatter, then national anthem and music box IS. [Portzer]
- JAPAN JOQR Tokyo OCT 15 0930 Heard with typical classical Japanese programming throughout the DXpedition, sometimes at excellent level. [Bryant] OCT 15 1333 Good level with romantic Japanese pop music, female announcer in Japanese. Mixing with possible KBS Liberty 1 station playing orchestral music and male vocals in Korean. JOQR still barreling in with fair-good audio at 1710, 2-1/2+ hours past local sunrise, with Korean in background at 1640. I left a hard drive recorder running on 1133.5 kHz to catch the final disappearance of carrier it didn't drop completely until 12 noon local time, which is 1900 UTC, 4-1/2 hours past sunrise! [Atkins] OCT 15 1633 Japan and S.Korea mixing it up; Japanese woman still there at 1657 with fair strength. [Hall-Patch] OCT 16 1141 Heard again with fair-good audio. [Atkins]
- 1134 SOUTH KOREA KBS Social Education, Kimpo OCT 15 1122 Fair; woman in Korean parallel 972 followed by music; trading places with Japanese talk. [Hall-Patch] OCT 16 1437 Dominant with Korean talk parallel 972, Japan in background. [Portzer] OCT 16 1624 Great reception parallel 972 usually over JOQR Tokyo co-channel with Korean talk, non-stop. This is at 9:30 local, at least two hours after local sunrise! [Salmaniw]
- 1143 TAIWAN BEL3 Baisha OCT 15 1357 Woman talking parallel 738. [Hall-Patch] OCT 17 1016 Poor but parallel 738 and 1593. [Hutton]
- JAPAN JOUB NHK2 Akita / synchros OCT 15 0935 Noted at fair level, parallel 774. [Bryant] OCT 15 1340 English lessons at tune-in: 'Are you sure you've never played golf before?' and 'Your slice is wicked!' Noted parallel to 774. Good level on peaks. [Atkins]
- 1170 SOUTH KOREA HLSR KBS Gimje OCT 15 1146 Parallel 5975 in Russian, woman. [Hall-Patch] OCT 16 1446 Noted in passing with a huge signal. Korean talk by men. [Bryant] OCT 16 1437 Dominant with Korean talk parallel 972 and 1134, way atop domestics. Loud 1542 with rap music(!) parallel 972, only slightly weaker than locals KXRO and KWOK, stronger than local KBKW. [Portzer]
- JAPAN JOOR Osaka OCT 15 0933 Heard at good level with Japanese popular tunes and talk. [Bryant] OCT 15 1157 Japanese talk by woman, music interlude parallel 1287. [Hall-Patch] OCT 16 1014 Male and female announcers in Japanese, replacing Vanuatu on the frequency. Fair level. [Atkins]
- 1179 VANUATU R. Vanuatu OCT 16 1002 Very tough copy of man with speech or political talk, parallel to 7260. Into island music with chorus 1005. Weak, and barely identifiable through the shortwave parallel. At 1012, presumed JOOR Osaka was starting to fade up on the fre-

quency. [Atkins]

- 1188 **RUSSIA** FEBC Khabarovsk OCT 15 1349 While trying to ID a Chinese language station on 1188, another station rose up with 'A Mighty Fortress is Our God' hymn, followed by another hymn. Presumed, but FEBC is the usual occupant of 1188 with Christian programming. No announcer heard before the inevitable fade. [Atkins]
- 1188 **SOUTH KORE**A Seoul OCT 17 1367 *FEBC* probably the one with Chinese religious program in KEX splatter. [Portzer]
- JAPAN JOWL Ashikawa / JOYF Mito OCT 15 1145 Noted here all three mornings of DXpedition, sometimes at good level. Repeater for 1440 JOWF. [Bryant] OCT 15 1150 Japanese talk parallel 1440, fair to good; noted many other times as well. [Hall-Patch] OCT 16 1237 Two stations in Japanese, pop music on top, talk in background parallel 1440. [Portzer] OCT 16 1622 Fair to good reception with Japanese talk, in parallel to JOWF 1440. Great signal for 3 kW! [Salmaniw]
- 1205.98 CHINA Yanbian RGD OCT 15 1218 Likely this with Korean talk by man; often at good level. [Hall-Patch] OCT 16 1146 Presumed, with Korean talk at 1146. This has been noted off-frequency before. Fair level on peaks. + OCT 17 1217 A strong level of Korean language. [Atkins]
- 1206 CHINA CNR Korean Service, Yanji OCT 15 0938 Noted here throughout the DXpedition, usually at moderate level. Korean language only. [Bryant] OCT 17 1141 Korean talk strong. Strong with folk melody 1305. [Portzer]
- CHINA CNR7 Guangdong Province OCT 15 1157 This station serves the New Economic Zone of Shenzen, as well as Canton, Hongkong and Macao and is a very 'with-it' western-style station with commercials, etc. The long ID at 1200 UTC contained quite a few English words, including 'AM' an 'FM' along with 'WWW' etc. Heard sporadically throughout DXpedition, sometimes at moderate levels. [Bryant] OCT 15 1210 Probably this with definite commercial sound; mentions of 'Coca Cola' and 'radio' by male and female announcers in Chinese; Chinese pop music. Not CNR2, as SW parallels were not parallel 1215. Tuned back to 1215 at 1255, and heard mentions of 'Guangdong' region at 1259:26, and a deepvoiced, pitch-lowered 'Enjoy the radio...' announcement or promo by male in English. Fair at tune-in, but very good by 1255. [Atkins] OCT 15 1210 Commercial Chinese pop music, sounders etc; "Voice of Old China" sounds more like "new commercial Asia". [Hall-Patch] OCT 16 1140 Strong; pop music, man and woman in Chinese. [Portzer]
- 1224 JAPAN JOJK Kanazawa OCT 16 1425 Man talking Japanese parallel 594 nil-fair. [Hall-Patch]
- 1242 JAPAN JOLF Tokyo OCT 15 1220 Noted in passing with Japanese pops show at good level. Heard all three mornings of DXpedition. [Bryant]
- 1251 CHINA unID OCT 15 1255 Woman talking in standard Chinese continuously until 1259, then one minute of open air followed by 4+1 CNR time pips. Was unable to find a SW parallel. Qinghai? [Bryant] OCT 17 1045 Chinese talk, fair 1100 with man and woman talking, pips in background possibly from another station, then talk using Mexican Hat Dance as background(!). Woman spoke across ToH 1200 (pips in background), then traditional Chinese music, a second Chinese station in background. [Portzer]
- 1251 **RUSSIA** *Voice of Russia*, Ussuriysk OCT 15 1241 Tentatively this with Chinese talk by man, but no parallel 6145; 7305 had Chinese but was not parallel 1251. No ID at 1500. Noted many other times, but no success with parallels. [Hall-Patch]
- 1278 JAPAN JOFR Fukuoka OCT 15 1222 Noted in passing with Japanese pops show. Fair to poor level. [Bryant] OCT 16 1439 Fair-good parallel 1287. [Portzer]
- JAPAN JOHR HBC Sapporo OCT 15 0940 Noted here throughout the DXpedition. Sometimes at spectacular levels. The usual informal Japanese talk and pop tunes. [Bryant] OCT 15 1134 Japanese talk by woman; by 1136 there was an Internet address given by man as part of an ad? [Hall-Patch] OCT 15 1408 Male and female talk, parallel to 1368. Excellent signal. Still in with fair-good audio at 1650. [Atkins]
- 1296 JAPAN JOTK NHK1 Matsue OCT 16 1519 Phone talk parallel 594 fair-good. [Portzer]
- 1305 SOUTH KOREA HLSV Uijin OCT 15 0949 Good at times in Korean throughout the morning. [Bryant] OCT 16 1620 Audible most of the night, still there parallel 3930. [Portzer] OCT 16 1638 Briefly fair with Korean talk by a man parallel 3930; poor-fair. [Hall-Patch] OCT 17 1234 Teletalk parallel 3930. [Portzer]
- 1322.9 CHINA CRI Govorit Pekin OCT 15 1356 China's FS in Russian noted here all three mornings of DXpedition. Was on channel on OCT 16 and 17. Was parallel to 963 kHz. [Bryant] OCT 15 1407 Woman in Russian parallel 963. [Hall-Patch]
- 1323 CHINA CRI OCT 16 1556 Strong ending Russian program, then Chinese music over loud

- growl. + OCT 17 1111 Loud in Russian over unID talk. [Portzer]
- AUSTRALIA unID OCT 16 0938 Oldies music and ad in Aussie English. Probably unneeded 4BU. [Portzer]
- 1332 JAPAN JOSF Nagoya OCT 15 1105 Hoping for Philippines here, but language turned out to be Japanese. Most likely JOSF at 50 kW, as the other Japanese on frequency is only 0.1 kW. Fair-good at peaks. Still hanging in with poor-fair audio at 1651. [Atkins] OCT 15 1106 Noted in passing with a pop music show. Good throughout the night. [Bryant] OCT 16 1234 Good with ads and *Tokai Radio* 1D. [Portzer]
- CHINA CNR1 Unknown Location OCT 15 1450 Heard here with general Chinese talk programming. Parallel 5030, but with a distinct satellite delay. Generally fair level only. At top of hour, there were clear mentions of 'WWW dot' followed by a URL in standard Chinese and 'e-mail' also followed by an address in standard Chinese. That sure sounded strangely satisfying to this old Cold Warrior. [Bryant] OCT 15 1514 Woman in Chinese parallel 5030, then man, over/under splash. [Hall-Patch] OCT 16 1506 Poor in splat parallel 6030. [Portzer]
- JAPAN NHK1 OCT 16 1233 Fair parallel 594. At 1455 piano music parallel 594 over/under unID talk. At 1555 two stations still audible, woman parallel 594 NHK, ads parallel 1287. [Portzer]
- 1377 CHINA CNR1 OCT 15 1310 Heard here at good level swamping the NHK2 signal. Man talking continuously. Parallel to 5040. Heard also late on 17th. Refer to 1593 parallel 828 log. [Bryant] OCT 15 1323 Parallel 6030 two men in Chinese slightly delayed from 6030. [Hall-Patch]
- 1377 JAPAN NHK2 synchros OCT 16 1249 Heard here intermittently throughout the DXpedition. Sometimes at very good levels. [Bryant] OCT 16 1402 - English news parallel 1386 fair. [Portzer]
- 1386 JAPAN NHK2 synchros OCT 16 1232 Japanese talk good. [Portzer] OCT 16 1238 Female announcer speaking in Japanese, parallel to 747, 774, and 828. Good level. One of four possible 10 kW NHK2 stations on 1386. At 1641 retune, I caught the music box sign-off music for NHK2 stations at a fair level. [Atkins] OCT 16 1250 Heard here intermittently throughout the DXpedition. Sometimes at very good levels. [Bryant] OCT 16 1640 Sign-off with anothem and music box, pretty poor in splash, but amazing so late; several 10 kW to choose from. [Hall-Patch] OCT 16 1640 Four 10 kW stations to choose from with their sign-off procedures. Unfortunately, the initial speech portion was in the mud, then faded up nicely for the music box ending. [Salmaniw]
- 1386 **TAIWAN** BED87 Hsinchu OCT 15 1430 Musical interlude then more English lessons parallel 1539; mixing with *NHK*2. [Hall-Patch]
- 1395 CHINA unID OCT 15 1150 Seemingly Chinese, a good China morning. 5 low and 1 high pips on the hour, nut I was not able to pull an ID as the signal was poor and the slop was not. [Hutton]
- JAPAN JOQL HBC Kushiro OCT 16 1348 Fair in a mix, parallel 1287 making for an easy ID. [Hutton] OCT 16 1400 This noted at good level with multiple IDs as 'HBC' at TOH. Was clearly parallel to HBC key station JOHR, Sapporo. [Bryant]
- JAPAN JOIF Fukuoka OCT 15 1235 Heard here at poor level with Japanese discussion by ladies. [Bryant] OCT 15 1336 Man and woman in Japanese parallel 1197 which was excellent (Allnight Nippon program). [Hall-Patch] OCT 16 1243 Tentative, with Japanese sports (baseball?), possibly parallel a very weak Japanese station on 1485. Also possibly parallel the NHK1 baseball game on 594. Poor level. [Atkins] OCT 16 1501 Woman and man in Japanese parallel 1440; nil-fair. [Hall-Patch]
- 1413 unID OCT 16 0958 Fair-poor unusual female vocal, sounded middle eastern, possibly the Aussie SBS station. [Portzer]
- JAPAN JORF Yokohama OCT 15 1012 Heard with Japanese talk here at fair level underneath an unlD off-channel signal on 1422.1 kHz. [Bryant] OCT 16 1400 Japanese talk by man leading to a single tone on hour, can't dig out an ID; poor-good. [Hall-Patch]
- JAPAN JOWF STV Sapporo OCT 15 1148 Japanese talk by man and woman; dominant. [Hall-Patch] OCT 16 1231 Japanese talk dominant. Way atop frequency at 1330 with STV Radio ID. Still dominant 1602. [Portzer] OCT 16 1257 Noted here with Japanese sporting event (basu baru?) at good level. This formerly exotic logging was pretty much available at will throughout the DXpedition. [Bryant]
- 1449 JAPAN JOQM HBC Abashiri OCT 16 1407 This noted at fair level with pops and talk program similar to 'All-Night Nippon.' Was clearly parallel to HBC key station JOHR Sapporo. [Bryant] OCT 16 1412 Poor but I just punched 1287 into VFO B and voila, a parallel for an easy ID. [Hutton]
- 1458 CHINA Inner Mongolia Nei Menggu OCT 17 1412 Mongolian talk parallel 4785 fair. Very

- good at 1527 recheck, stronger than 4785 SW! [Portzer] OCT 17 1414 Fair; pleasantly on top and quite easily parallel 4785 for a surprise log. Thanks to Bruce Portzer for checking the SW parallel after noting an unid language here. [Hutton] OCT 17 1452 Noted here with mixed programming of music and talk at fair level parallel 4785 kHz. [Bryant]
- 1475 MALAYSIA RTM Kota Kinabalu OCT 16 1236 Just a beefy carrier; at 1301, noted singing and woman in Tagalog. [Hall-Patch] OCT 16 1301 This propaganda station in Tagalog noted here in audio only briefly at fair to good level. Remains off-channel. [Bryant]
- 1494 CHINA unID OCT 15 1253 Woman in seeming Chinese but without hearing the standard "guangbo dientai" ID I am lost and helpless. [Hutton]
- JAPAN JOTL HBC Nayoro OCT 16 1442 Fair in KWOK splat parallel 1350 and 1287, then faded under someone with Eagles song. [Portzer]
- unIDs OCT 15 1243 Mix of two stations, one seemed Japanese and the other I can not be sure about. A tough channel that rarely yields audio at Grayland. + OCT 16 1418 Two in a weak mix, one of which may have been parallel 1287 but was just too weak to even imagine being sure. [Hutton]
- MICRONESIA V6AJ Kosrae OCT 17 0913 Fair signal of island music at 0913; male announcer in island language 0926. Island choral music at 1040 retune, but unfortunately the signal faded for good before the 1100 sign-off time. Last August at Grayland I was able to catch a V6AJ callsign at 1100 sign-off. [Atkins] OCT 17 0917 Good music for a while. [Hutton] OCT 17 0921 Loud with chorale island music. [Portzer] OCT 17 1022 Woman in unID language after island music nil-fair. [Hall-Patch] OCT 17 1044 Sudden fade up to good levels with islands music. Very enjoyable early Sunday listening. Weak Korean or Japanese co-channel just audible, but V6AJ dominates nicely. No luck on the other Micronesian on 1449 yet. Faded away by 1050. [Salmaniw]
- 1503 JAPAN NHK2 synchros OCT 15 0955 These were the usual, but not only, dominant throughout the DXpedition. Usually at fair level. Parallel 774, etc. [Bryant]
- JAPAN JOUK Akita OCT 16 1355 Fast talking Japanese man parallel 594 nil-good. [Hall-Patch]
- 1521 JAPAN NHK2 synchros OCT 15 1455 Woman in Japanese, followed by stringed music parallel 774. [Hall-Patch] OCT 16 1326 Classical music fair in splatter parallel 774 and 1152. [Portzer] OCT 16 1328 Lively light opera music poor-fair. [Hall-Patch] OCT 16 1330 Fair-poor the big guy on 774. [Hutton]
- 1530 CHINA unID OCT 16 1537 Way under KFBK but clearly Chinese. [Hutton]
- unID OCT 16 1545 Woman talking Japanese, under somewhat phased KFBK poor-fair. [Hall-Patch]
- 1539 TAIWAN BED78 BCC Information Network, Tainan OCT 15 1420 English lessons, with discussion and comments on the subject of mortgages and home buying, by man and woman announcers. Into Chinese language 1424 and music in the background. 'Worship Jesus Now' hymn 1426. Noted parallel frequencies of 1062, 1386 and 1467 with discussion about computers in schools and education by two men in English. Warnings about emails and spam 1438. Good level when not in a deep fade. [Atkins] OCT 15 1420 English lessons on buying a house, interspersed with Chinese. [Hall-Patch] OCT 15 1444 An English discussion program (not the NHK2 style language lesson) and I seem to recall that Taiwan is known to carry English. [Hutton]
- 1548 AUSTRÁLIA 4QD Emerald OCT 16 1302 ABC Hourly News heard here at fair level only. [Bryant]
- AUSTRALIA 2SM Taree OCT 16 1004 One of only a few DUs and it was in only because WYFR Taiwan was not in yet. Had 2SM's country music show. [Hutton]
- TAIWAN WYFR Family Radio, Kouhu OCT 15 1015 Noted here at moderate levels throughout the night, with Chinese Christian programming. [Bryant] OCT 16 1512 Slow English religious discussion, not able to find parallel. 6280 was English but not this. + OCT 17 1339 Seemed to be a Chinese broadcast, with vocal music, but not parallel WYFR Mandarin broadcasts on SW 7250. [Hall-Patch] OCT 17 1528 Probably the one with religion in American English. [Portzer]
- SOUTH KOREA HLAZ Cheju OCT 15 1016 Heard at studio quality S-9+30 during peak times and always at an excellent level. Christian FEBC programming in various Asian langs. [Bryant] OCT 15 1239 Excellent signal with presumed sermon in Japanese. Background audience sounds, etc. Beautiful Chinese language signal at 1500 retune, listenable in wide bandwidth S-AM mode. [Atkins] OCT 15 1422 Excellent as usual and just for fun I was messing around with the wide filters (6 kHz) in the Drake. Didn't matter there still was no interference and the signal was still awesome. [Hutton] OCT 15 1636 Back after its pattern

- change at 1630, fair signal, vocal music. [Hall-Patch] OCT 17 1225 Quite loud 35db/S9, in Japanese. [Portzer]
- 1575 **JAPAN** AFN Misawa / Sasebo OCT 15 1440 - AFN stations (three at 1 kW each) apparently the source of English with ads for Microsoft products (Word 2003, etc). [Hutton] OCT 16 1504 - Almost certainly this 800 watter with English pop records and English PSAs, over/under VOA Thailand. This one at northern tip of Honshu most likely rather than 200 watter at Sasebo Navy Base in southern Japan. First time for me to hear the network that was my lifeline when we lived near Tokyo 25 years ago. [Bryant] OCT 16 1530 - Heavy rock music, very strong at times, over/under VOA Bangkok's News in Special English. VOA dominated 1532-1535, then the music station began to strengthen again to challenge Thailand. [Atkins] OCT 16 1532 - Rock music over VOA, possibly AFN synchros in Japan; fair. [Hall-Patch] OCT 16 1537 - Great clash between VOA Thailand (at 1000 kW) with news in special English and AFN Japan with three stations listed at 250, 600 and 1000 watts. The latter (presumed) had nonstop rock music, occasionally coming up to very decent levels. At 1540 there was some talk, but not at a level that I could be certain of the contents. I thought that I had heard an AFN ID at 1530. Will need to check the MD. At 1542 there was definitely English noted under VOA. [Salmaniw] OCT 17 1107 - Tentative; R&B music atop frequency. [Portzer]
- THAILAND VOA Ayutthaya OCT 15 1017 Heard throughout the DXpedition, often at good to excellent level, with usual VOA Asian programming. News in Special English was particularly interesting... and how do you explain the US presidential race, anyway? [Bryant] OCT 15 1242 Noted this regular in passing, with powerful signal in possible Vietnamese. At 1505 retune, noted news in special English by male announcer. On Oct 17, VOA 'News Now' in English was heard at a good level at 1202, and at 1400 with 'VOA' ID and mentions of UN Secretary General Kofi Anan in Vietnamese or other language. [Atkins] OCT 16 1599 "Welcome to Voice of America Special English," good-fair. [Hall-Patch] OCT 16 1501 VOA News Now in English good over another station in American English (probably AFN). [Portzer] OCT 17 1200 Strong reception with VOA News Now program. [Salmaniw]
- 1584 PALAU OCT 15 1430 Aassumed with fair pop music. Songs almost always lead right into the next song and the songs are a mix of US R&B, reggae standards, an Oriental pop song, and ? [Hutton]
- 1584 CHINA unlD OCT 15 1432 Sometimes rising up out of the growl on the channel. + OCT 16 1557 Chinese-ish classical music, pips and ID at top of the hour but 1 can't make it out. [Hutton] OCT 17 1105 Chinese talk fair atop channel. [Portzer]
- 1584 JAPAN NHK1 synchros OCT 16 1429 Big handful of 100 watt stations nicely parallel 594 1429 10/16. If only I could get a local ID. [Hutton]
- 1584.02 unID OCT 15 1505 Possible Palau with pop music. [Hall-Patch]
- CHINA CNR1 Heilongjiang? OCT 15 1315 Heard swamping usual dominant NHK2 synchros with Chinese talk. Parallel 5040. [Bryant] OCT 15 1324 Parallel 6030 with two men in Chinese, slightly delayed from 6030. [Hall-Patch] OCT 15 1540 Chinese opera music heard here, and parallel to 6030. Fair to good signal level. [Atkins] OCT 16 1208 Chinese talk over Japan. [Portzer] OCT 17 1420 Dreamy, Chinese orchestral music on vibra harp parallel to 1134, 5030 and 6030, in place of the possible Russian language station heard on 1593 earlier in the evening. Fair level, but reception made tougher by unID Japanese station on the frequency. [Atkins] OCT 17 1420 This surfaced from the 1593 furball, clearly parallel 5060 and 6030. Later, after NHK2 sign-off at 1500, this noted parallel CNR1 1377 and, until 1510, parallel 828 (probable Beijing News Station). All at fair level only. [Bryant]
- JAPAN NHK2 synchros OCT 16 1251 Heard here intermittently throughout the DXpedition. Sometimes at very good levels. [Bryant] OCT 16 1319 Weather, local ID I think for JOQB (need to replay minidisc). [Portzer]
- 1593 RUSSIA Russkoe Radio, Angarsk OCT 17 1317 Three signals were present on 1593: the NHK2 synchros, CNRI and what sounded clearly Russian which dominated for several minutes 1315-1320. The only relevant PAL listing is Angarsk. Tentative this at fair level. [Bryant] OCT 17 1320 Very tentative, with possible Russian language beneath NHK2 Japanese (JOTB/ JOQB). The Russian male speaker occasionally challenged the Japanese station for strongest on the frequency, but mostly it lurked in the background. [Atkins]
- 1593 TAIWAN Tocheng OCT 17 1016 Poor but parallel 738 and 1143, only 1 kW! [Hutton]
- 1602 JAPAN NHK2 synchros OCT 15 1404 Woman in English news parallel 774. [Hall-Patch] OCT 16 1229 - Japanese talk parallel 1593. [Portzer]
- 1611 AUSTRALIA Radio 2 OCT 16 1014 Pop music, "Radio 2" ID fair-poor. [Portzer]
- 1611 unID OCT 16 1128 Light pop music, poor in murk; no ID across the hour. Carriers also noted 1629, 1665, 1683.3, and 1701.1 kHz. [Hall-Patch]

On 10/16 WTTL was running an open carrier only so WISE was easily logged as a result of that. Aside from the 2 locals, the AM band is entirely open here including the 6 graveyard channels at night. In just 14 days and nights of DXing here, I've already grabbed 107 domestics including 18 X-banders! All of this was achieved without any external antennas or other extras. My favorite logging so far was "daytimer" KYMN-1080 which I caught during a sunset skip session on 10/17. Actually, a large portion of my 107 loggings were caught during the twilight-sunset period when most stations were probably still on their day facilities. On TV, NTSC Ch. 2-6 (VHF low band) is entirely open here which will come in very handy for the spring/summer E-Skip season. Here is my hand-printed report (my son has my computer at college right now). I am a semi-retired radio and television engineer. I presently do engineering work with the TV ministry at my church. I had a great career with GA Public TV & Radio. A few years ago, a friend of mine told me about the NRC and I have been a member for about a year now. I just never knew that the NRC was in existence! 
