This will, in effect, cancel the STA and make their 3.8 kW night STA power their licensed power since the STA will go away. They will no longer be licensed for 5000/5000, but using 5000/3800 watts as an STA, they will become licensed as 5000/3800. In actuality, it won't change a thing from present practice, but only make the STA the licensed facility with slightly higher day power. Unfortunately, there is no on-line reference for

NORTH OF THE 49th

Deane McIntyre reports: "The CRTC has approved a new AM station for Vancouver: In this decision, the Commission approves the application by 1.T. Productions Ltd. for a broadcasting licence to operate a new ethnic AM radio station at Vancouver at 1200 kHz. The applicant proposed a service that will be directed predominantly to Vancouver's South Asian communities. The applicant made a commitment to provide programming directed to a minimum of 11 different ethnic groups in 17 different languages in each broadcast week. All of the station's programming would be devoted to ethnic programming, and 95% of this would be in third languages. A minimum of 73% of all programming would be in the Hindustani and Punjabi languages. The applicant's proposal indicates that approximately 93% of the service would be directed to underserved groups in the Vancouver market, namely its South Asian communities, and that a further 1% would target other underserved ethnic groups. For the purpose of this calculation regarding the amount of programming that 1.T. would devote to underserved ethnic groups, the Commission has considered to be "underserved", ethnic groups that, according to the data contained in the CRTC Broadcasting Policy Monitoring Report 2004, currently receive five hours or less of programming per week from existing Vancouver ethnic radio stations. The Commission accordingly approves the application by I.T. Productions Ltd. for a broadcasting licence to operate a commercial AM (ethnic) radio programming undertaking at Vancouver, at 1200 kHz, with a transmitter power of 25,000 watts. From the Industry Canada database, it appears that this station will operate with the same parameters day and night 25 kW into two 79 degree towers spaced 90 degrees, the second tower oriented at a bearing of 323 degrees relative to the first (reference) tower. The power ratio is 1:0.9 for the two towers, the phase difference being -96 degrees for the second relative to the reference tower. I am sure that someone on the list can compute the pattern based on this data:). The coordinates are 49 09 55 N, 123 02 28 W. OK, I had a look at the application on the CRTC website, It appears that the main lobe is broadly directed to the NW, with nulls to the SE to protect WOAI. On another note the CBC has applied to the CRTC for drop-in FM stations in Edmonton, Alberta to rebroadcast CHFA-680 and CBX-740, and in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan to rebroadcast CBK-540, noting problems due to QRM to the AM signals in the core of these cities. These are just drop-in relay stations; the AM stations will remain on the air in all cases." In other matters: The CRTC has denied an application by the owners of CHOR-1450 Summerland, British Columbia to replace this AM station with an FM facility on 95.3 MHz with 250 Watts. The commission was concerned the FM station would

provide more coverage than the AM. Hummmm . . . ; the move of CJMD-1240 Chibougamau Quebec to FM (93.5 MHz, 19.8kW) has been approved by the CRTC. CFED-1340 Chapais, Quebec will also go silent, as Chapais will also be served by the new FM transmitter. So two more Graveyarders bite the dust. The new station will provide the same format currently offered by CJMD. The local programming will continue to focus on the region's activities. **And**, the CRTC has cancelled the license of CFPS-1490 Port Elgin, Ontario as the new FM station serving the Port Elgin area, CFPS-FM has begun broadcasting. **Also** . . . The following four Canadian AM stations have applied to the CRTC to move from AM to FM:

CFCY-630 Charlottetown, PE has applied for 95.1 MHz, 73.3 kW

CHTN-720 Charlottetown, PE has applied for 100.3 kHz, 33 kW

CKWA-1210 Slave Lake, AB has applied for 92.7 MHz. 5.7 kW

CKEC-1320 New Glasgow, NS has applied for 94.1 MHz, 51.88 kW

Note that in the case of the CFCY and CKEC applications, other parties have applied for new FM stations to use the same frequencies. If the CFCY and CHTN applications are approved, Prince Edward Island will have exactly zero AM stations left, not counting the two 20 watt TIS stations CBPP-1490 and CBPP1-1280 in Prince Edward Island National Park (assuming that they are still in operation). Time to log PEI if you have not done so!

A LITTLE BIT OF MEXICAN NEWS THIS MONTH

□ XERF-1570 Ciudad Acuna, Coahuila has recently installed a new 100,000 Watt transmitter. Although not up to the 50s and 60s power level of two-and-one-half times that power, it is a significant increase over what it had been churning out the past 15-20 years. So if you've noticed XERF sounding a little better lately, that's the reason.

WHGT-1590 Chambersburg, Pennsylvania is still, and will likely stay, off forever as the studio and transmitter building along with their four towers are gone. It is speculated that the owner will turn the license in. WGRP-940 Greenville, Pennsylvania returned on August 1, although with a very low power. They are simulcasting WLOA-1470 Farrell, Pennsylvania, carrying programming formally on WEXC-FM 107.1, and calling themselves "Wexie 107 Goodtime Oldies" even though WEXC is not carrying that programming. WBTE-990 Windsor, North Carolina is back on, as is WCBG-1380 Waynesboro, Pennsylvania from a newly constructed tower, as they simulcast the 92.1 FM station from nearby Mercersburg. This Just In: The new owner of WSMN-1590 Nashua, New Hampshire was shooting for a return-to-the-air date of August 15, but legal matters including FCC approval may stand in the way. When WSMN does return to the air, it will simulcast with WSNH-900 until they change to a news/information format with live drive-time call-in shows later this fall. Let's wish them the best to bring this AM station back!

□ Patrick Griffith of Westminster, Colorado says: "I visited the transmitter site for KHNC and the new 30 kw daytime site for KRCN. I can verify that KRCN is now on the air from the new daytime site. I have placed some photos of these sites on my N0NNK web page (http://community.webtv.net/N0NNK/ or http://community.webtv.net/AM-DXer/). I also stopped by the FN / 400 NDB site today and there are some photos of it on my web site as well. Within 1/4 mile of the site FN's harmonic was blasting in loud and clear at the 800 position on my AM car radio. Patrick also sends word that "... If everything stays on schedule work on the towers for the new 810 night site for KLDC (to be co-located with KLZ) is supposed to start ... [the week of 7/25)]. 

When is east not really east, west not really west? Often the path of a radio wave from transmitter

to receiver is not what it seems. For example, a signal from the west may actually begin in a northeast direction and arrive from the northwest due to the curvature of the Earth. A Great Circle map centered on your receiver location can help to visualize the actual shortest signal path. Create your own Great Circle map using free software downloadable from the Paul Burton AA6Z website, AZMap: An Azimuthal-Equidistance Map Generator. Distances in the following logs are calculated using free Great Circle software from the Delphi for Fun website. It estimates the surface distance between two points defined by their latitude and longitude, calculating distance using formulas for a perfect sphere and for the slightly "squished" or ellipsoid shape of the Earth which can result in as much as 40 miles difference. I'm using the ellipsoid calculations here. Links are on ¡BAMLog!

Shared techniques for the new and experienced DX'er

Hello - I'm Greg Harris and I've been a BCB DX'er since 1970. I started at age 12 when I was in the car with my dad and heard WBAP in Texas on 820 Khz where WAIT in Chicago had been during the day. I can't describe how thrilled I was. This was coming over the air all the way from Texas! At home I discovered there were many stations I could hear.

A visit to a local drugstore/whatnot shop's magazine rack yielded a copy of a defunct radio hobbyist magazine, and I discovered the mysteries of writing reception reports and receiving QSL cards for them. My first was from WLW. At age 17 I enlisted in the US Navy as a radio striker. Now 20 plusyears later I'm back home.

I well remember the myriad of questions I had when new to the hobby. My aim is to hopefully answer some of those questions. NRC has a wealth of experienced members, and I hope for their input

Before any listening can begin I have to have a receiver to do it with. What kind of receiver? Which is best? I will not presume to say which is the "best receiver" for AM DX'ing; ask 20 DX'ers and we'll get 20 different answers. One of the appealing things about broadcast band DX'ing is that it need not cost a king's ransom. In all likelihood you already have an AM receiver of some sort that will get you started. Some people have gotten excellent results from receivers found in the attic after being there for decades. A note of caution: If you try one of these have the power cord checked; also, check your capacitors. The receivers in AM/FM Cassette players CAN work but are mostly non-sensitive and not very selective.

In summary: Just about ANY receiver that covers the AM broadcast band can receive distant stations (I had a friend who had copied the VOA station in the Ryukyu Islands on one of the Panasonic "ball radios" then popular). There are plenty of receivers that are serious DX inhalers and suggestions about these may be obtained from experienced friends or on the AM forum or in DX News. At first, use what you have and spend time at the dials.



Dredged memories of DX'ing, DX'ers, and the National Radio Club

Many of today's 600-plus members of the National Radio Club have been involved, as I have, in all five interrelated aspects of this hard-to-explain hobby we share.

In March, 2006, I will celebrate the 50th anniversary of my joining the National Radio Club, and possessing a trivia-filled memory and a strong proclivity to ramble on about all the flotsam and jetsam that fills this old gray head of mine, the suggestion that I write a column dredging some of these memories opened a floodgate that begins with this issue of DX News.

One of the programs I most enjoyed about the time I started DX'ing was "The Hawthorne Thing," conducted on the ABC Pacific Network by a zany DJ named Jim Hawthorne, back in the 1948-49 radio year. I fought QRM from CJIB in Vernon, B.C., and KVAI in Amarillo, Texas, to listen to Hawthorne from 10:30 to 11 p.m. Monday through Saturday in Corvallis, Ore., on the old KTKC-940, Visalia, Calif. It thrilled me, 50 years later, to discover that Hawthorne, my early hero, was writing a memory column for the now defunct Radio Digest webzine. He called the process by which he conjured up those wonderful stories of radio in the '40's "Memory Dredging," and I have selected that label as the title for these efforts of mine.

The focus of Hawthorne's column was the people who made all that wonderful radio history; and the people who have played roles in the National Radio Club (as well as other organizations and publications that have made the "hobby of our lives") will be the focus of this new column.

In a stroke of good timing, one of today's top DX'ers, Mark Connelly, has submitted an outstanding story of how he got started in the DX'ing hobby, which leads us to what I hope can become another, closely-related, feature in these pages ... similar stories from currently active DX'ers.

It was fitting, I suppose, that of the eight people who joined me in Irving, Texas, this summer for the Worldwide FM-TV DX Association's convention, my relationship with four of them dates from between 15 and 46 years. I first met Ernie Wesolowski at NRC's Omaha Convention in 1959; Frank Merrill at his teen-age home in Milan, Mich., on my way to the NRC Buffalo convention in 1964; John Zondlo at the International Radio Club of America convention in Columbus, Ohio, in 1975; and Paul Swearingen at the NRC convention — again in Omaha — in 1991.

From the very beginning of my association with the National Radio Club, it was the people who welcomed me into the NRC back in March of 1956 that made this club one of the most important and satisfying parts of my life.

Program listening, back in the days of the great network comedies starring Jack Benny and Fred Allen, quiz shows like "Truth or Consequences" and "The \$64 Question," mysteries like "The Shadow" and "Mr. and Mrs. North," and musical remotes such as the big bands at the Roosevelt Hotel in New Orleans on WWL-870 and western swing from the Pier at Santa Monica on the KVFD-1020, coupled with the appearance at our house of an old White's Radio Log, segued me first into DX'ing and then into a career in broadcasting.

That career in broadcasting started at KCOV-1240 in Corvallis in 1955. I had been a DX'er since 1947, though I didn't know the term until I discovered shortwave broadcast DX'ing via Ken Boord's International Shortwave Column in Radio & Television News in 1950. I had joined the Newark News Radio Club and the Universal Radio DX Club for their SWBC coverage in 1955, but I didn't discover the NRC until, at KCOV, I received a reception report from Roy H. Millar of Issaquah, Wash.

I confirmed Roy's report, noting that I had been on the fringes of the hobby for a while. He recruited me for 1) the NRC and 2) to do a DX Special from KCOV, and that launched me into the next often fascinating and sometimes frustrating 50 years of my life.

Several NRC'ers who reported reception of KCOV followed up my verification letter with correspondence welcoming me into the club. Jim Critchett, Raleigh Biss and Albert Lehr in California and Buddy Giles in Oklahoma City stand out in my memory. Lehr, nearly 50 years later, scanned a copy of the verification letter I'd written him and sent it to me for my memory files!

Editor Ernie Cooper's "Musings of the Members" section, in which NRC'ers would report their DX and other related activities in narrative form, appealed to the gregarious half of my nature, and I felt at home among the many like-minded souls who shared my interest in radio.

During the spring of 1956, I had noted that prospective employers would ask me about my draft status, so I thought it would be wise to volunteer for the draft and get my military obligation behind me. Less than three months after the KCOV DX test, I was on my way to basic training at Fort Ord, Calif., and then to the Army Information School at Fort Slocum, N.Y. Fort Slocum was on an island just off New Rochelle, one island over from the WCBS transmitter, and an easy run via commuter rail and subway to 438 E. 21st St., the Brooklyn home of the legendary Ernie Cooper. Ernie was the first NRC member I met in person, and Bernie Duffy of Staten Island was the second.

After AIS, I was assigned to the 87th Infantry Regiment, 10th Division Public Information Office in Aschaffenburg, Germany, from where I shared my DX observations with club members both through Ernie Cooper's column and International DX Digest, edited at the time by Fred Van Voorhees. Two other club members, in the service at the time, contributed to both columns, Pete Taylor, a Coast Guard officer stationed in Hawaii but often DX'ing at sea in the South Pacific, and Jack Hathaway, an Air Force sergeant on embassy duty in Tegucigalpa, Honduras.

Ironically, I was to cross paths with both gentlemen in important ways. Hathaway's last assignment before his retirement from the Air Force was at Amarillo Air Force Base in the Texas Panhandle, where I was to wind up after my two-year hitch was completed. My father had moved from Oregon State to become Dean of the School of Business at West Texas State just south of Amarillo and that's where I went in 1958.

Hathaway was three credit hours away from his M.B.A., I introduced him to my father, and they arranged for a three-hour course to enable Jack to complete his graduate studies. In the '70s, Hathaway was in the registrar's office at the University of Illinois while I was at WMIX in Mt. Vernon, a few miles south on I-57, and we traded visits when I broadcast basketball games and Jack's stepson played on a Champaign team that competed against the Mt. Vernon Rams.

In 1966, after I'd left the Panhandle for a news job at KILT-610 in Houston, Taylor surprised me with a job offer to help put on a news- and information-oriented station in Cambridge, Mass. The three years I spent at tiny WCAS-740, a 250-watt daytimer that concentrated on intense news coverage of five Boston suburbs, was the most satisfying job in the 25 years I spent as a broadcaster. Would you believe information gathered by one of my \$2.25/hour minimum wage part-time reporters at WCAS would form the foundation for a Pulitzer Prize in 1971 for the Boston Globe? And would you further believe that WCAS, now WJIB, today is owned and operated by a former NRC member?

Back to 1958! I was so imbued with the spirit of the NRC that I took my mustering out pay from the Army and financed a Greyhound bus tour from the Panhandle to the Pacific Northwest and back, with the avowed purpose of visiting some of the DX'ers whose correspondence had boosted my spirits while I was in Germany. I enjoyed the hospitality offered by Norm Maguire in Albuquerque (who had verified so many Japanese BCB stations a broadcast executive from Tokyo made it a point to visit Norm when the exec came to America on business); young Bus Boatman in Scottsdale, Ariz. (whom I'd met earlier that summer in Stillwater, Okla., before his parents moved farther west); Raleigh Biss in Palm Springs, Calif., (who had just completed wiring a hi-fi installation at the home of opera singer Lily Pons and her husband, orchestra leader Andre Kostelanetz); Jim Critchett in San Diego, Calif. (where I met the DX'ing cat, Jackson Moran); Hank Wilkinson, Karl Raymond, John Alexander and Ted Vasilopolous in the Los Angeles area; Bill Flynn in Pittsburg, Calif. (notably an SWBC DX'er but an NRC member at the time); and, of course, Roy Millar in Issaquah, Washington.

Back in 2003, I had written a memorial tribute to Roy that was picked up from the NRC list and published on the web in Glenn Hauser's "DX'er's Notebook." In it, I wrote of Roy's recruiting me into the club, my purchasing for him a gorgeous Grundig-Majestic table model radio while I was in Germany, and his supplying me with taped DX-erpts of outstanding foreign reception (such as Estonia, as heard in Washignton state) in the '60s when I was doing a five-minute BCB tape for ErroI Urbelis' DX show on the old WNYW. Roy's son, Kevin, found that article on the web, e-mailed me, and informed me that the nearly 50-year-old radio was still in use by Roy's survivors.

As the NRC heads toward its 75th anniversary in 2008, there seems to be little romance or fascination with radio programming in this cookie-cutter, automated, non-personality era; DX-ing is constricted by a high noise floor and 24-hours-a-day, seven-days-a-week operations by nearly every station in North America; and my broadcasting career ended in 1981 when I switched to print journalism.

But there's still the National Radio Club itself and the diversified people that make it run, plus the dredgible memories that this old Krumudgeon can expound upon that I hope will bring as much enjoyment to the reader as they bring to the writer. It's the stations that the DX is built around, but it's the people who make the club.

As we used to write at the end of an unfinished newspaper story:

"More to kum"

Sea Gain: The Numbers Don't Lie by Mark Connelly, WA1ION

My article "Web Site for U. S. Station Signal Strengths - A Valuable Resource", dated 23 JUN 2005, described groundwave signal strength charts available at "http://www.v-soft.com/ZipSignal/ zip answer.asp". In that article I evaluated a few stations to see how much distance was required to reduce the strength of a given non-directional station to a particular level. This analysis gave some results that seemed quite in step with what I've noticed when I've done my own signal strength observations from a number of inland and coastal sites in the New England states.

The distance required for a given amount of path loss turns out to be about 5 to 10 times greater over a salt-water route as compared to across flat to slightly hilly land of fairly low conductivity.

WJDA-1300 (Quincy, Massachusetts: 1 kW) has approximately the same signal strength at Bar Harbor, Maine (distance 203 miles / 327 km over water) as it has in the Pinehurst section of Billerica, Massachusetts (distance 23 miles / 37 km over land). This represents a ratio of sea distance to land distance of 8.8. This is fairly typical for that part of the dial. Ratios of over 10 are possible, especially if you're dealing with the 1300-1700 kHz range and making the over-water strength measurements right at the shoreline instead of using the average value for a given coastal town (which may include inland areas). On the lower end of the dial, ratios are more like 5 to 7, but are still significant. If a shoreline is backed by mountains (as in the Pacific Northwest) instead of relatively flat land, the over water versus over land ratio could be much more extreme, perhaps something like 20 above 1300 kHz.

The next phase of research was to see what the signal strength difference (in dB) is for two nearlyidentical length paths, one over seawater and one over land. From the formula Pmult = 10^(dB/10), one can compute the amount of power that would be needed to produce the same signal strength on the land route as can be produced with the station's normal power on the sea route. The "Pmult" power multiplier, e.g. 100 for a 20 dB strength difference, times the power, e.g. 1 kW, shows (in this case) that the station would have to run 100 kW to have the same signal strength over land that it has on the same distance over water with just 1 kW. A 30 dB difference gives Pmult=1000, meaning that a megawatt would be required to get the same signal over a given amount of land that a kilowatt gets across the same expanse of sea! This may seem beyond belief, but the tabulations below (from ZipSignal data) show that 20 dB is a rather ordinary difference to find here in the New England area. 30 dB is certainly not out of reach on the upper end of the dial, especially if signal strength data for the coastal site is based on beach, rather than town-center, results. As stated earlier, a West Coast or Hawaiian location involving a mountainous rocky coastline could give even more extreme values. The overwater signal strength of a 1 kW station may not be replicable over the same land distance at ANY power level of which present transmitter technology is capable.

Some conclusions: The kind of differences seen in these groundwave measurements correlate quite well with differences seen in some kinds of foreign medium wave DX at night. Some of the low-angle

skip is as severely reduced by an overland path as groundwave is. Long-term measurements of European, African, Middle Eastern, and South American DX signals taken at Rockport, MA and Rowley, MA on the coast north of Boston show differences of anywhere from 10 to 40 dB better than the same stations heard in inland suburbs when using the same set-up: Drake R8A receiver, active whip on car roof. High-band longer-haul Africans and Brazilians heard during auroral activity, especially at sunset or earlier, show the greatest difference: often S-9 at the shore and usually less than S-3 (if even noticeable at all!) inland. Six S-units is conventionally 36 dB. That's a mind-boggling power multiplier of 3981. This tells me that a 250 watt Brazilian "graveyarder" heard at the shore would have to be packing close to a megawatt to hit the same S-meter reading somewhere inland maybe only an hour's drive away. Surprising though this might sound to some, I find this entirely believable based on experience. When the signal path is nearly parallel to the shore, you can jump from a lengthy mostly over water route to a mostly over land one in a fairly short distance driving inland at a right angle to the coast. This is the situation where the biggest signal changes occur. One classic example of this is the exceptionally quick drop-off in signal strengths of the Atlantic City, NJ area stations (1020, 1160, 1340, 1400, 1450, 1490) when driving a very short distance up Route 134 in Dennis, Cape Cod, MA from Lower County Road (near southward-facing beaches) northward to Route 6. These signals "drop like a rock", maybe 30 dB, over the course of a 10 minute drive, even though the change in actual geographic distance is infinitesimal.

It is hoped that those in other areas such as Oregon/Washington will try using ZipSignal in conjunction with their own measurements to see how these findings relate to their areas, both in terms of groundwaves and low-angle long-haul foreign DX.
