HEAR AND THAR

Returning to the air: WJYK-980 Chase City, Virginia with a religious format, KAXX-1020 Eagle River, Alaska // KLEF-98.1 with a classical format, KLVP-1040 Tigard, Oregon with Regional Mexican, KBFL-1060 Springfield, Missouri // KBFL-FM 99.9 MHz Buffalo, Missouri with a MoYL format and WAMS-1260 Newark, Delaware with a MoYL format.

Reported as silent: KLVP-1040 Tigard, Oregon; WSTL-1220 Providence, Rhode Island.

Last issue we reported that the FCC had scheduled to include IBOC usage in their July 13th meeting. It seems the item was pulled from the agenda at the last minute. No word when the subject will be revisited. So, it seems, the nighttime radio waves will remain a bit clearer, at least for the near future.

The National Association of Broadcasters (NAB) is endorsing and pushing a proposal to supplement deficiencies in the coverage of AM signals by adding FM translators. The NAB cites "interference generated by power lines, computers, traffic signals sensors, electric motors, fluorescent lighting, RF from cable TV lines, and certain kinds of medical equipment often disrupt the strength and clarity of AM radio signals. In particular, power utility poles made of metal, which are rapidly replacing wooden poles, can radiate AM signals, creating distortion and nulling a station's signal in parts of the intended coverage area." Underground sensors that trigger traffic signals have also become a problem. The 50,000 watt signal of WSM(AM), Nashville, Tenn., is wiped out at the busiest intersection in the entire State of Tennessee, located in Murfreesboro, because of interference from an underground traffic sensor, states the trade group. Several NAB members with AM stations report coverage area losses of 80% to 95% at night when they must protect clear channels. This will become worse starting in 2007, when Daylight Saving Time will begin three weeks earlier in March of that year. Consequently, many AM stations, and particularly daytime-only services, will completely lose an entire hour of early morning drive-time programming or be forced to operate at very low power during that vitally important hour," states the NAB in its petition. Granting the petition "would be consistent with FCC precedent in favor of improving AM radio service," the association said.

Celebrating its 75th birthday this month is WDEV-550 Waterbury, Vermont.

WNYC-820 New York is preparing to move from the city's Municipal Building, where it's been since 1924, to a former printing plant where it will have 12-foot ceilings and 71,900 square feet of space. Reports indicate the number of studios and recording booths will double to 31, and the station also plans to build a street-level studio for concerts and public forums.

A group of radio history enthusiasts sponsored several events in celebration of the 100th anniversary of electrical engineer **Reginald A. Fessenden**'s broadcast from a 420-foot tower located in Brant Rock, Massachusetts, in 1906. The events took place the weekend of August 4-6 at The Village of Brant Rock in Marshfield, Massachusetts. If there was anyone, who reads *DX News*, in attendance, we'd like to hear about your experience.

AM Switch Antenna Codes

I received a question in the form of a muse on the DX Audio Service asking what is the meaning of all the letter-number designations when reporting stations' facilities. All of these combinations appear in the NRC's AM Radio Log, but not everyone has a Log. So, we're happy to answer the query with the following:

The letters D, U, and sometimes but rarely an N, an L, or ST, when paired with a number designates the station's operating hours and its antenna pattern status. A 'D' means Daytime. An 'N' means nighttime. An 'L' means limited time, of which there are only a couple of those left. An 'ST' means Shared Time, meaning two or more separate facilities in the same city on the same frequency share time during the broadcast day. The 1240 frequency in Decorah, Iowa is one of only a couple of these situations left in the U.S. And finally, the one we hear probably 99% of the time nowadays is the letter 'U', which stands for Unlimited time operation.

The numbers that follow the letter designate one of 25 different combinations of a station's antenna pattern. Now, I might add that these letter/number combinations are a National Radio Club invention, we'll call it, but have been widely accepted and used in the DX community. The FCC has it's own set of identifiers, but they don't cover all the combinations like we do.

Let's first look at stations that broadcast during the daytime only. That group of stations is getting smaller in number all the time, but there still are quite a few.

Since they are Daytimers, their letter is a 'D'. If the station is non-directional, their number is '1', so we end up with D1. If they use a directional pattern, their number is '3' and we end up with D3. But, wait! What happened to '2'? We didn't forget it, and will get to that later.

The time right after sunrise in the morning and before sunset in the evening is a very critical time for Medium Wave signals. The ionosphere is in transition in the morning can't decide whether to bounce that radio wave back to earth as it has been doing all night, or to absorb it as it's properties allow when the sun hits it. The same thing happens in the afternoon, only in reverse. The mix of unpredictable skywave with the groundwave signals of a station means that interference to other stations is possible. This is of particular concern when the stations involved cover wide areas, where it may be daylight in one segment and approaching dark in another. So the FCC has established two periods during this skywave/groundwave mix time. In the morning it's from local sunrise to two hours after local sunrise and in the afternoon from two hours before local sunset to local sunset. This is where the term 'Critical Hours', or as we abbreviate it CH, comes into play in our discussions. Most Unlimited Time stations operate with more power during the day than at night, so even though they are authorized to operate at their daytime power they may cause interference to other stations on the same frequency during these transition periods. Not all stations have to worry about critical hours. Generally, it's only stations which are doing some kind of upgrade in power, or a new station being authorized, where the FCC may apply a Critical Hours authorization. Some Daytimers also have CH authorizations.

Twenty or 25 years ago, all stations were authorized to operate with powers in steps which were nice and even, like 250, 500, 1000, 5000, 10000, 25000, and 50000 Watts. And there were hundreds and hundreds of stations that were Daytimers. So let's say a Daytime station with 500 Watts wants to raise its power, but the next step is 1000 Watts. If they were to increase to 1000 Watts, chances are they would cause interference to another station. That's why they have only 500 Watts in the first place. But ... if they could raise their power to, say, 742 Watts without interfering, that would give them a better local signal. So, through the years, the FCC has relaxed the rules and made it possible to have a power level of almost any quantity, as long as the equipment is set up in such a way to keep it stabile. Older transmitters were factory-built to be 1000 Watts, or 5000 Watts or whatever. But newer transmitters are capable of maintaining power between those old steps at about any level needed.

So now, stations can be authorized power levels which just barely fall short of interfering with others during normal daylight hours. But . . . what happens during Critical Hours?

The fact hasn't changed that at 500 Watts everybody was happy. Now during Critical Hours, our 742 Watt station may cause interference to one or more stations. The FCC says that our station must use the original daytime level of 500 Watts during Critical hours. So, our example can sign on with 500 Watts, at Local Sunrise plus two hours can increase it to 742 Watts, then at Local Sunset minus two hours they must kick it back to 500 Watts. If a Daytimer is non-directional, remember they are designated 'D1' even if they have a CH power. But, if a Daytimer is non-directional, but utilizes a directional pattern during the Critical Hours, guess what? Drum roll, please. 'D2'! If a Daytimer is normally directional, 'D3', but uses a separate pattern during CH operation, that's 'D4'! There's one more category for Daytimers: 'D5'. That's when a daytime station is directional during daytime hours, but non-directional during CH operation. In reality, there aren't many D5 operations, but they do exist so we must keep track of them.

Let's look at some other examples: Most of the formerly-designated I-A clear channel stations, such as WABC- 770 in New York, WGN-720 in Chicago, KMOX-1120 in St. Louis, and KFI-640 in Los Angeles are 50 kW day and night non-directional. We designate them as being U (for Unlimited Time) and 1 (for non-directional), and of course, their powers are all 50,000 Watts day and night. So they are U1 50000/50000.

Now, say a station is non-directional during the day and directional at night. Since they broadcast day and night, their letter is 'U' and their number is '2' meaning directional nights only. If a station is directional all hours using the same power and pattern, their designation is 'U3'. Different patterns day and night with the same power? Or same pattern but different power levels day and night? They're both 'U4'.

We've covered the basic group of five daytime-only and four unlimited-time designations. It's when we get into the unlimited-time stations with Critical Hour operations that things get crazy. Unlimited time operation with three different patterns, daytime, critical hours, and nights? That's 'U7'. Directional days and Critical Hours, and nondirectional nights? That's 'U13'. Unlimited time with the same pattern day and night but a different pattern during CH operation? 'U17'. Well you get the idea. There is a station in Indiana on 1080 which has applied to operate with one pattern and power level between local sunset and 6 PM local time, and another pattern and power level at local sunset in Dallas when WTIC in Hartford and KRLD in Dallas switch to their nighttime patterns and protect each other. I'm not sure how we'll handle that one, if approved. Maybe with 'U13 point 5'?

PSRA/PSSA Authorizations

Let's press on to two other categories of operation, namely Pre-Sunrise and Post-Sunset. These are commonly referred to as PSRA and PSSA, meaning "Pre-Sunrise Authority" and "Post-Sunset Authority".

Now some history. We all know, medium-wave signals travel greater distances during non-daylight hours.

Older, established stations that had been on for years were protected from interference, both day and night. In other words, new stations could be licensed, but were authorized as daytime-only, and would have to protect the coverage areas of the older stations.

In the northern states during the winter months, some stations only operated 7 or 8 hours a day. Many of these stations complained that they were at a disadvantage when it came to being able to program during the very lucrative drive-time hours, and weren't able to be there during the critical early morning hours when they were needed. So they, with the help of their lobbying group, the Daytime Broadcasters Association, got the FCC to relax the rules allowing daytime stations to sign on at 6 AM and/or remain on until 6 PM local time. Naturally, in the summer months here in North America, those two periods of time are usually blessed with sunshine, so Pre-Sunrise and Post-Sunset usually is a factor only in the dark of winter.

Okay, so now these Daytimers get to sign on before sunrise and stay on after sunset. But that means they will most likely cause interference to Fulltime stations that had been operating during those hours of semi-darkness for several years. So the FCC said to these stations, "you can come on at 6 AM and/ or stay on until 6 PM, but at a lower power level before local sunrise and after local sunset". The FCC's rules are very clear when specifying the amount of power permissible during these periods, but inter-estingly the calculations must only consider the co-channel stations, not the adjacent-channel operations. Neither PSRA nor PSSA can exceed 500 Watts.

Initially, when the PSRA and PSSA authorizations were announced, the FCC said that power must be increased and reduced at different levels, determined by the amount of daylight. As an example, say a station's daytime power was 500 Watts and local Sunrise was 7:45. At 6 AM they could sign on with 18 Watts, boost it to 229 Watts at 7 AM, and come up to full power at 7:45. That caused a lot of problems as a variable adjustment would have to be employed. Remember, this was in the vicinity of 25 to 30 years ago, when technology isn't what we think of today, and computers were just being introduced to the broadcast community. Unfortunately, the FCC is very stingy when it comes to posting the PSRA and PSSA power levels, so we are at a disadvantage when we attempt to report that information. We have been successful in obtaining a few, but most remain unknown. I'm not sure if this step-up/step-down procedure is even still in force.

I've done a bit of investigative work on the FCC Web site and have come up with a few interesting examples of stations with pre-sunrise and post-sunset authorizations. Some of these go back several years, so the call letters may have changed.

Months not mentioned are not applicable as Sunrise occurs before 6:00 AM. Powers are given in Watts

Since it is not specified, we can assume that one power is designated for the entire PSRA period, as opposed to the PSSA example shown later.

This is my first report from the new location, loacted south of York PA and just above the MD/PA line. Last year, I approached the Times Shamrock group in Scranton about an opening with their radio division. I accepted a CE position with WZBA 100.7, licensed to Westminster, studios in Hunt Valley, transmitter in Owings Mill (at the Maryland Public Televisions site). Best part of this job, it involves ONE station, not the dozens as I was doing in the contract field.
