25 years ago ... from the February 22, 1982 DXN: The Louisville Publishing Committee warned that HQ could not remain indefinitely in Louisville, pointing out that Gary Atkins' job might require that he move to Macon, GA.


10 years ago: ... from the March 3, 1997 DXN: A news article reported that KRSN-1490 Los Alamos, NM, was silent. The station had been created as "KRS" during the Manhattan Project, which created the first atomic bomb, and was not a broadcast station but rather radiated through the town's power grid.

# Alternative Format Officially On WHAT/Philadelphia WHAT-A Becomes First Station To Broadcast Alt Music In HD Radio via Brock Whaley

MARCONI BROADCASTING'S WHAT-A/PHILADELPHIA is now broadcasting "SKIN RADIO, a mixture of Alternative, Hip-Hop, and local bands in HD RADIO on AM 1340 and online at www.skinradio.com.

MARCONI flipped the station to the new music format (NET NEWS 1/19) developed by KELLY MUSIC RESEARCH on JANUARY 19th after acquiring the station from INNER CITY BROADCASTING. The station is currently automated with prerecorded voice tracks on promos and "song tags" announcing title and artist after every song played.

WHAT-A is the first radio station in the country to broadcast the Alternative music format in HD RADIO on the AM band. Traditional analog radios will still be able to receive the station's analog simulcast.

To help educate the market about HD RADIO, the station will welcome listeners to visit the studios for live demonstrations of the improved audio quality. WHAT-A will also be demonstrating the new audio technology at locations around PHILADELPHIA. Currently, the FCC allows AM stations to broadcast in HD from sunrise to sunset. The FCC plans to permit HD broadcasts 24 hours a day soon.

According to station owner and GM TOM KELLY, "Listeners are very impressed with the audio quality of AM on HD RADIO. And we are proud to put PHILADELPHIA in the spotlight with this revolutionary new technology on 'SKIN RADIO.' The young adult Alternative music audience in PHILADELPHIA has been starving for this music and now they have a reason to buy HD RADIO receivers."

# ANSWER TO VAST WESTLAND TRIVIA QUESTION

Believe it or not, the first twenty-nine men to serve as President (or, in our quirky way of counting them, the first 30 Presidents) were all born in what is now the Eastern Time Zone. It was not until Herbert Hoover, born in West Branch IA, took office in 1929, that the **Vast Westland** could claim its first native-born President. That's only four years before the NRC was formed! Andrew Jackson of Nashville TN was the first President to come out of the **Vast Westland**, but he was born in South Carolina. Abraham Lincoln, Illinois' favorite son, came very close to the native-born title. Lincoln was born in what is now Larue County KY, a county whose western border defines the Eastern-Central time zone split.

Only eight of the 42 U.S. Presidents were born in the **Vast Westland**: Hoover, Harry S. Truman (MO), Dwight D. Eisenhower (TX), Lyndon B. Johnson (TX), Richard M. Nixon (CA), Gerald R. Ford (NE), Ronald Reagan (IL) and Bill Clinton (AR). Eight out of the last 13-- a good recovery following a dismal start!

# PLANNING AN NRC CONVENTION

More than one person has recently asked what it takes to host such an event. Several years ago, we published a complete set of directions, and it may be that just giving the basics will help you decide if YOU would like to be a leader and host an NRC Convention.

In January, the DX Audio Service asked its members what makes a good convention, so we have re-written the "instructions" to include some of those thoughtful ideas. The main thrust is to plan events on the Saturday of the chosen weekend so some members can leave the hotel to take part in a worthwhile event (or events) in the community, while others can stay at the hotel to relax and chat with other dxers.

Here are the steps we recommend in planning a convention:

The most critical matter is to find a hotel with affordable room rates and with a meeting room that will accommodate 30 to 40 people. Sometimes the room rate can be balanced against a hotel policy of allowing a few extra people to stay in the room at no or little extra cost.

A restaurant should be located either in the hotel or virtually next door. In a few cases, we have had a cafeteria or fast-food eatery plus a really nice restaurant within an easy walk of our hotel.

Selecting dates for the convention has been a recent issue. We know that the weekend just before Labor Day works for many members, but no one has come up with an alternate date along with an offer to be the host.


For an outside tour, local points of interest have proven popular. A local radio station or transmitter site has often been a draw for our members. We observed how attendees in Kulpsville found nearby Pennsylvania-Dutch events of interest, and Akron offered several automotive museums. In fact, a tour planned for a local radio transmitter site didn't happen because of other city events in Akron.

Publicity, program pamphlets, ID badges, and other up-front costs can be handled with a little advanced thinking. Hosts are not expected to stand any expense for the convention. The NRC Board is committed to helping a host with the details to do everything possible to make the annual event memorable.

Did you notice? Nowhere did we specify any geographic limits for the convention! For most of our many years, the annual meeting has been held in the east and midwest. But it isn't written that we must stay in that little circle – after all, Topeka? Aurora? Dallas?

Omaha? We had some fantastic conventions in those cities. How about YOURS?

Hi fellow DXers. Time for me to MUSE again as I haven't written in several years. I retired October 2005 after 46 years as a journeyman welder and 2 years serving
