DX Time Machine From the pages of DX News

50 years ago ... from the August 15, 1959 issue of *DX News:* Hank Wilkinson, N. Hollywood, CA reported that veries from Radio Sakhalin-973, KLKA-970, KLKB-818, JODP (1 kW), BED-22-660 Taiwan, plus several from China, made the last DX season "quite wonderful".

25 years ago ... from the August 20, 1984 DXN: Brian Vernon, DX'ing in northern England on 5-29, reported Laser-558 being QRM'ed by Ireland-567.

10 years ago ... from the August 16, 1999 DXN: Ron Musco, Poquonock, CT received a reception report from Horton H. Heath, who confirmed reception of LO03 (Radio Swan) on October 15, 1997, at 12:30 am, noting that the station "... was installed near Swan Island many years ago to be used as a homing beacon by the numerous aircraft sent by C. M. Stanbury III in his attempts to prove that Radio Swan was not located there. About ten years ago this beacon broke loose in a hurricane and has been drifting slowly up the Atlantic Coast of the United States ever since. As far as we can determine, at the time of your reception LO03 had drifted up the Hudson River and various creeks and streams and was located at the Municipal Sewage Treatment Plant in Mount Kisco, NY."

From the "lost " pages: December 6, 1958 ... Dan K. Phillips, Clinton, TN reported that DX presently was "pretty good", as he'd been averaging two new stations every day and added that he had been getting mostly Mississippi stations.



Breaking news all over the Internet involves two Pan-American DX targets: Mexico and Venezuela. It looks like Mexico will be following the trend in Canada to move from AM to FM. Meanwhile in Venezuela, President Chávez wants to move closer to Cuban-style socialism by revoking commercial broadcast licenses and nationalizing the airwaves, this after the well publicized fiasco with Radio Caracas Televisión last year. Will frequencies be cleared in time for deep Latin American auroral DX by the predicted 2011-12 peak in solar activity? But wait, there's more! This just in: Future plans for the KBC network in Kenya don't include mediumwave due to the high cost of transmitter operation, thus one more country could soon become extinct on the AM dial. As always, stay tuned!

Grayland DXpedition Report

July 12-14, 2009

John Bryant: Winradio 313e, E100 Slider + Wellbrook Phased Array

I finally made my long-delayed first trip to the renowned Grayland DX site for the mornings of July 12, 13 and 14. Mid-July is about the mid-point of our traditional Summertime Down-Under Season and I hoped to do some ferrite bar antenna testing, try out the new DSP ULR and add to my Trans-Pacific Stations Heard count in Ultralighting. I did not hope for much premium DU DX because the NW DXers had been reporting what appeared to me to be a below average DU Season from their home QTHs. As far as I know, no one had yet tested the waters directly at the Pacific shore, though, so I was hopeful. In the actuality, I was happily surprised with the number of DXable DU and TP signals present on all three mornings, though I had the distinct impression that the signal levels were rather weaker than usual. I would have been unable to ID more than half of the signals (many at just above mumble level) were it not for having gained considerable experience with parallels and specific program content over the years. Station identifications heard were rare; signals were just too weak even on the Winradio 313e and present for too short a time to catch many pure IDs. That being said, the DX was much more numerous and interesting than I anticipated.

With local dawn about 1225 UTC (5:25 a.m.), I was at the dials on Sunday morning at 1015 (3:15 a.m.). Below 900 kHz, the band was *full* of DU/TP carriers and between 900 and 1400 kHz, 50% of the channels contained a decent carrier. There were maybe 10 threshold audios present and the strongest signal that I've ever heard from 738 Radio Tahiti. Things did not really start showing in audio until about 1120 and then for the next 75 minutes, I had the best New Zealand opening that I've had in years. Well over a dozen Kiwi's were present in moderate level audio. Most of the usual suspects were logged, but there were also a number of second and third tier stations present. The propagation was definitely very southerly. I bagged three completely new Kiwi stations and six that were new Ultralight loggings. In the early part of dawn enhancement, I found one Japanese signal (1134) and a couple of Aussies. Late post-dawn, about 1245, the propagation changed, there was a 15 minute burst of fairly strong Aussie audio and I garnered 6 of the biggest Guns before the band closed completely. Sunday morning was *excellent*, though the levels did seem to be below average.

Monday morning was very different from the previous morning. It was mostly Aussie all morning,

after a surprise early showing of all of the biggest Japanese Guns. As predicted by Nick Hall-Patch, Japan opened early in dawn enhancement, going away soon after 1200 (dawn at the transmitters, I believe) leaving a band full of Big Gun and a few second tier Aussies, along with the odd major Kiwi. I added one new all-time Aussie and four more new Ultralight loggings. It was a good but not great morning, with the Big JJs being a pleasant surprise. Again, for the most part, the levels seemed down, though the post-dawn Aussies came up rather well.

Tuesday morning finally brought what I had expected from the modest home-location DX reports: a modest DU morning with a very few Kiwi's and mostly Big Gun Aussies. Nevertheless, I was able to log three new Ultralight Aussie loggings and two Kiwi's. One of the high points of the DX pedition

was logging my sole brand new Aussie, 927 Sports, 2UZ from Melbourne.

Although I complained about the weak signals, this DXpedition brought me five totally new stations, four in New Zealand and the Aussie. After somewhere around 60 DXpeditions to Grayland over 20 years, it has been a while since I've added so many stations. I also added fifteen new Ultralight-logged stations, bringing my TA station count to 151. Since I've only heard about TP 250 stations in 20 years of DXing, I suspect that I'll have a very difficult time getting my Ultralight count up to 200. It won't be for lack of trying, I assure you.

Gary DeBock was able to join me at the Grayland motel Saturday evening and Sunday AM and will be reporting his loggings and antenna testing results separately. (Man, you should see those big passive PVC loops!) Both of us will be reporting our somewhat disappointing test results with the Tecsun PL-300WT/Grundig G8 separately in the near future. It was great to get to know Gary face-to-face better and we both really enjoyed having Guy Atkins drive down from Puyallup to join us for Sunday lunch. All in all, it was an excellent DXpedition.

Shared tips and information from NRC members, both new and old

Welcome to the DX Tool Box Column number 7. Greetings once again from the Heart of the Continent.

This month we have a question from a reader:

I use a KIWA loop antenna. I've always heard that portable loop antennas should be kept "a considerable distance away" from "large metal objects" in order to avoid having their reception loops and nulls becoming skewed. To me, this begs two questions, to wit: 1-What constitutes a "large metal object"? An 18-wheeler? A car? A refrigerator? An HQ-180? A can of pork & beans...? 2-What constitutes a "considerable distance"? The length of a football field? Ten feet? Six inches? This may sound like a couple of frivolous questions, but they have been dogging me for some time, as I attempt to situate my KIWA at an optimum length from everything else metal in my DX shack. I hope you can shed some light on the answers in an upcoming edition of your DX Tool Box column! Guy Kudlemyer Thurston, Oregon

Guy has good questions. I have 2 BCB loops in my radio room a four foot box loop and an older ferrite Quantum Loop. The coaxial lead from my box loop was to be no more than 6 feet according to the original designer of the loop I based my unit on. This would allow it to tilt and swivel but still keep the coax short. So maybe we should say not more than 6 feet away and for smaller loops such as the Quantum Loop 3 feet as their turn and tilt radius is smaller. This limits where in the radio room I can place the loops. As for outdoor loops such as the ones Wellbrook sell well they want them mounted about 6 meters or 20 feet away from buildings. Now all my radios have metal cabinets so the loops are never far (3-6 feet) from them and I have no problems with nulls or directionality with the loops. I would have to say in this case the radio is not a large metal object so perhaps your refrigerator would be classed as a large metal object. I would avoid large appliances not only for the metal content but also the electrical or electronics they hold. My radio room is basically metal free of large objects but they are close by in the utility room (washer, drier, fridge, freezer, and furnace). There seems to be no real problem with them. but then I have never been in a place with the loop free of everything metal. I can tell you that a metal sided trailer is no fun. I had to be near a window to get a good signal so your 18 wheeler would be a pain to DX next to.

The best bet is to try the KIWA loop in a few places in the radio room. You will have to find the "sweet spot" for it to work best. There may be other things in and around the radio room that could affect the loop's performance. I know of one DX'er who had a large buzz on his ferrite loop from the readout on his ICOM ICR-71A but my ICOM ICR-70 did not have the same effect on the loop. He had to have it at least 3 feet away to null the buzz. I hope this was of some help, Guy.

Bits and Bites from the NRC listserv:

Subject: [NRC-AM] discussions from 27 JUN 2009 Cape Cod DX get-together On 27 June, several DX'ers gathered on Cape Cod, first at Marc DeLorenzo's in South Dennis for antenna-raising activities and then at the Yarmouth QTH of Chris Black (N1CP) for barbecue. It was not surprising that there was quite a bit of interesting discussion, seeing that possibly a majority of New England's active MW DX'ers was in attendance, along with Neil Kazaross (now in IL, but formerly living at coastal sites in RI, ME, and MA). Some of the topics were: Broadband maintenance of a desired directional pattern -With Perseus and other software-defined radios (SDR's) having wideband capture / playback, DX'ers want antenna systems which maintain nulls which are consistent across the 530-1710 kHz range (and possibly greater) and which cover enough angular spread to keep "pest stations" from popping in and out of null as the skip angle shifts vertically and, in some cases, horizontally. Reactive (inductive and/ or capacitive) elements being added to a Beverage or Flag (/ Kaz, etc.) termination were considered something which could provide deeper nulls but over narrower frequency ranges than resistive-only termination. The idea of a metallic plate as a Beverage termination, as recently noted by Dallas Lankford, was discussed. Also mentioned was the "Kaz termination", used on some of the Newfie DX'peditions, typically consisting of 3 or more wires in the 30 - 50 m (100 - 164 ft.) range fanned out beyond the termination resistor at the far end of the Beverage. The inadequacies of grounding at the Grayland, WA DXpedition site became obvious to Bruce Conti when he visited out there a couple of years ago. A lot of DX was being left on the table because domestics weren't being nulled well enough by the rather-short poorly-terminated Beverages. In retrospect, it's likely that the far-end grounding could be assisted by the Lankford metal-plate scheme or by the Kaz-type fan of termination wires. Still

to be solved was the grounding at the 9:1 transformer on the receiver end of the antenna. You could have both windings of the transformer connected to "receiver ground" (mains AC or car DC ground) but such an approach often leads to high noise levels from computers, etc. The better plan is always to have a decent earth ground at the high-impedance winding, a ground which is isolated from the receiver common. At Grayland, Bruce's suggestion of using Bentonite-bearing cat litter, did improve the earth ground to the transformer some. Getting good front-to-back (and noise reduction) with soil that's quite sandy is still a problematic matter. It is not much of a stretch to see that many of the same issues would be in play in Cape Cod's sandy pinelands and dunes. "To the rescue" have come groundindependent antennas (broadband loops - both unterminated / figure-of-eight or terminated / cardioid) operated singly, or even better, as phased arrays of two or more. Neil and I agreed that Dallas Lankford's Quad Delta Flag Array (QDFA "http://perseus-sdr.blogspot.com/2009/04/grayland-qdfadallas-lankfords.html") is going to be too complicated and space-hungry for use by most East Coast DX'ers whether at home or on DX'peditions, but a two element array of Flags or Deltas (DDFA: Dual Delta Flag Array) would be implement able by some with noticeable improvement in quality of DX. Arrays of two Beverages-on-Ground (BOG's) have been used quite a bit by Neil Kazaross. One set-up, that recommended by W8JI ("http://www.w8ji.com"), is two parallel wires of the same length with a spacing of about 2 m and a stagger of about 40 m (one wire starts farther from the receiver than the other). The other situation is two different-length parallel wires (e.g. 200 m and 140 m) starting at the same distance from the receiver. The feeling was that a broader phase-null bandwidth could be maintained by use of staggered equal-length parallel wires. Dissimilar length wires are easier for car-DXpedition "quickie" set-up but require more phaser tweaking as the high-band and low-band null solutions vary more because of the differing gain curves of the two antennas (the shorter wire being more deficient at lower frequencies). I mentioned BOG tests that I had run at the Rowley (MA) salt-marsh. The antennas were not competitive with phased active whips (spacing 50 m). Wires on the ground do not work well on very high conductivity soil. It's better to use arrays of verticals, Flags, or Wellbrookstyle loops there. It was noted that Wellbrook is now offering an array of two in-line K9AY (cardioid) antennas to complement their two in-line figure-of-eight loop array. I mentioned that a two-element 60 m spaced broadband loop array tested at East Harwich, MA back around 2000 had good noise-rejection (better than two active whips in a house-based setting) but it seemed to let in more high-angle skip from stations in NY, NJ, PA, ON, etc. The verticals, both at the sandy-soil site in East Harwich and at the salt-marsh site in Rowley, had less high-angle pick-up and null "jumpiness" than two similarlyspaced figure-of-eight type broadband loops. Neil said that "off the side" rejection provided by ba two-loop system (or BOG's) is more of a critical concern in the Midwest whereas at New England coastal sites, it's all about front-to-back performance with stations in the 230 to 300 degree bearing range those which need to be suppressed. Several car DX set-ups were discussed. I showed the "rooftop Micro-SuperLoop" ("http://home.comcast.net/~dx_lab/pictures/micro_superloop.htm") to Neil. The square 2 m by 2 m form of the antenna gives low-angle front-to-back of only about 15 dB, higher angle skip rejection (e.g. 1080 WTIC, 1130 WBBR) more like 20 dB. If the system was reconfigured to be a rectangle of 4 m horizontal by 2 m vertical, better front-to-back should result. This would be impractically large for a rooftop mount and anything much smaller (e.g. 2 m by 1 m) would be gain-challenged. Craig Healy (NG1U) demo'ed his loop versus whip car set-up. This is similar to what I had used on Granite Pier outings before the Micro-SuperLoop. He has the advantage of a fiberglass roof so his broadband loop (ferrite-based rather than my air-core one) could remain "indoors" allowing easy repositioning. As with the system I'd used. The tricky part is having the gain of the loop and the whip track closely enough that a cardioid null set up by the phasing of the two will remain reasonably deep over at least a 190 kHz span for SDR-IQ captures and not-excessively-finicky band-cruising during live DX. It might be possible to have a closely-gain-tracked loop-versus-whip set-up produce a usable cardioid pattern over as much as half the medium wave band without major readjustment. This would make the system usable with Perseus captures of at least 400 kHz and maybe even 800 with a given phaser setting. Car set-ups at the annual Boston Area DX'ers "DX Clams" outing to Granite Pier (Rockport, MA) are always interesting. This year's event is planned for 30 July. Receivers are always a hot topic. This year SDR's, Ultralights, and "normal" communications receivers all got some attention. Filtering is important: the filters of the Perseus and SDR-IQ were judged to be better than those in many conventional radios. My closest "old-school" receiver to Perseus filter sharpness comparison would be the R-390A: the state-of-the-art DX machine of the JFK era. It's truly amazing the kind of DX capability available today. Now you can easily hike into the woods with more DX power in a small backpack (containing a net book PC running a Perseus or SDR-IQ, plus an Ultralight just for fun) than could be placed on a large bench top in the '60s when many of us got started in the hobby. Propagation topics included Bruce Conti's 747 Japan receptions. Best reception was on the east-west SuperLoop nulling west / peaking east. The incoming Japan signal was possibly coming in during dawn tilting that made the point of signal origin appear to be directly overhead. The rejection of domestic splatter

(e.g. 740 CFZM and 750 WSB) was useful. The Japan signal arriving from somewhere between the due north horizon and straight overhead was not reduced much by the westerly cardioid null. Receptions only lasted about 15 minutes. This is similar to dawn-enhancement of 1359 Spain, a station with a high-angle antenna that has a mediocre signal except for about a half hour around dawn there when it comes up to huge level, one of the strongest of all TA's. The high-angle takeoff hitting a tilted ionospheric layer sends the signal parallel to and well above the earth for a substantial distance, eliminating several lousy earth bounces. Low auroral activity no doubt contributed to Bruce's Japan logs as well as the Faroes and Greenland receptions last winter on Cape Cod. Bruce did a good Popular Communications write-up on these logs in conjunction with a look at online aurora-plotting sites. Some of the "DX geezers" among us talked about great DX of the past that is not likely to be replicated now that many stations have gone dark and now that IBOC and home-electronics interference trashes up the band. Neil made us drool recalling Namibia on 594 and 747 heard from Ogunquit, ME in the '80s. Former blaster signals such as 764/765 Senegal and 725 Suriname were recalled. Craig mentioned a long quest for 640 KFI past carefully-nulled local 630 WPRO and how on one night he was rewarded. The early '80s Montauk Point DXpedition was possibly the "biggest thing before Newfie" here on the East Coast. Neil teamed up with George Hakiel and Matt Stutterheim to ride an aurora that was full of Latin American rocket fuel. Stations were logged that have not been heard in North America since, except perhaps from Cappahayden, Newfoundland. The awesome '70s-era African medium wave logs of Nova Scotia's Mike Dunn (VE1TK) were also recalled. Another topic was "spectrum recording '60s style". The major "spook agencies" used videotapes to record basebands possibly up to 2 MHz wide. Desired frequency ranges were down converted to land in the baseband IF range. Gordon Nelson knew about this stuff, so his April Fools commentaries on the "Monday morning recorder" were not totally a joke. And now 40 years later we have the Perseus. DX'ers of the past and the inevitable "where are they now" questions came up. Names on the list included Brian Vernon, George Hakiel, Bill Bailey, Matt Stutterheim, and Al Merriman. We're not sure who has just bailed out of the hobby and who may be deceased. I guess the mark of an outstanding DX'er is when people at a backyard barbecue on Cape Cod in 2009 still mention your name when the last time your name appeared in DX News was something like 1990 or earlier. I hope some of the above is of general interest and wasn't too boring and long-winded. Mark Connelly, WA1ION - Billerica, MA, USA


