


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

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RADIO Formats Glossary

Adult Contemporary (AC):

Top 40 for baby boomers. A.k.a. adult rock or lite rock. Similar to CHR (see below) format. Includes artists like Elton John, Gloria Estefan, Chicago.

Adult Standards/Big Band:

Mixes non-rock oldies, easy listening, nostalgia and big band music from the '40s through '70s. For example, Tommy Dorsey, The Andrews Sisters, Frank Sinatra, Barbra Streisand, Anne Murray.

Album Oriented Rock (AOR):

Format emphasizes lengthy sets of rock music rather than DJ personality. Some stations stick to mainstream artists (Rolling Stones. Tom Petty, Aerosmith), while others include alternative acts (Big Audio Dynamite, Sugarcubes, Depeche Mode).

Black Adult Contemporary:

New hybrid format blends current urban contemporary hits with R&B/soul oldies from the '60s-'80s.

Classic Rock:

AOR spinoff for rock fans over 18. Familiar songs from the '60s-'80s by core bands like the Stones, the Who, Led Zeppelin, Genesis and Pink Floyd.

Contemporary Hit Radio (CHR):

Top 40 under a new name. Aimed at teens and young adults. Includes cross-section of music from AOR and urban formats. Everything from Paula Abdul to Bon Jovi.

Easy Listening:

A.k.a. easy contemporary. Once known as beautiful music, the kind played in elevators and offices.

New Adult Contemporary:

Combines new age, light jazz and adult contemporary music. Emphasis on contemporary jazz fusion instrumentals by Larry Carlton, Montreaux, Jean Luc Ponty. Some vocals by Basia, Al Jarreau, Anita Baker.

Nostalgia:

Big band and other non-rock oldies from the '40s-'50s. Also variety programs from radio's Golden Age (Jack Benny, Green Hornet).

Rock and pop hits, golden oldies, from the late '50s to early '70s.

Talk:

Mostly nonmusical, personality-oriented stations that air calls from listeners. Formats range from serious to silly to full-service (news, weather, traffic, sports).

Urban Contemporary:

Top 40 geared for younger black listeners. CHR format plays crossover urban/dance artists like Janet Jackson, Bobby Brown.

RADIOChicago has received many letters and calls from readers querying the mysteries of radio frequencies, signals and the difference between AM and FM radio. Writer Dan Kening has succinctly put the mystery to rest:

Whole books can - and have - been written about how radio waves travel. A few relatively simple principles help explain why a listener in location X isn't able to pick up a radio station transmitting from location Y. Or, why you can pick up that station in location Y at night but not during the daytime.

Radio station signals are measured in watts, with most commercial AM stations in Chicago ranging from 1,000 to 50,000 watts and FM stations from 4,000 to 33,000 watts. There are differences, though, between how AM and FM radio waves travel.

During the daytime, AM radio signals are broadcast via "ground waves," which travel along the Earth's surface. At night AM signals travel up into the ionosphere via "sky waves" which are reflected back down to Earth. That reflection process allows AM signals to travel up to 1,000 miles at night, which is why many radio stations reduce their power after dark.

FM radio waves are shorter than AM waves and travel via "line of sight." With line of sight, the higher the broadcast antenna the further the signal will travel. That's why many Chicago FM stations have their antennas atop either the Hancock Building or Sears Tower. FM radio waves also travel shorter distances compared with AM, with most FM stations' signals being audible from 40-80 miles away.

Another major factor that might prevent you from hearing a particular stationespecially on the AM band-is the directional pattern of the station's antenna configuration. That means that all 5,000watt signals are not created equally.

Unlike the circular waves which travel equally in all directions when you toss a pebble into a pond, the signal pattern of most radio stations is more like an irregular blob, with bulges in certain directions. That's because the Federal Communications Commission requires stations to radiate lower power levels in certain directions so that 50,000-watt WGN-AM using the 720 frequency won't interfere with 10,000-watt WGCR in Pisgah Forest, North Carolina-one of 12 other stations which share the same frequency.

And to further complicate things, some radios are more sensitive than others. Car radios, for example, are often more sensitive than home radios. If you've ever

picked up a station in Miami in your car at night, you've witnessed this phenomenon in action.

If all these variables have you thoroughly confused by now, don't worry: that's why radio broadcasting is considered an art rather than a science.





AM/FM

Country cousin to urban giants finds recipe for success serving booming Western Suburbs.

Just because WKKD's studios in Aurora resemble a quaint country kitchen doesn't mean the station sounds like the radio equivalent of Hee-Haw. On the contrary, they've got a quarter million populace to serve and they do it with Michigan Avenue style.

urora is "only 40 miles as the crow flies" from Chicago, as my grandfather would have put it. But as the car drives, it takes an hour and a-half to get to Aurora's WKKD studios in morning traffic.

Despite my tardy arrival, WKKD-FM's morning man Dave Beckman eagerly greets me with a warm handshake as he steps out from behind the studio's oak-appointed control board. Beckman, who also serves as program director for both WKKD stations (AM 1580 and FM 95.9), then leads me into a studio that resembles the kitchens of the white clapboard farmhouses I passed on the way to the station.

I marvel over the studio's country appearance and Beckman beams. "Isn't it warm? Tom Churchill, our engineer, did the cabinetry. This'll sound hokey to the boys downtown, but we wanted something that reflected the warmth of the station but gave us room to put in state-of-the-art equipment." Rolling his chair over a beige Congoleum floor. Dave proudly explains the technical function of all the gadgetry located where the dishwasher, oven, sink and microwave would be in a "real kitchen."

It's the perfect setting for a morning deejay. Beckman checks in with his listeners in the Aurora-Naperville area at 5 a.m. every morning and whips up a mix of "K-lite" (light music), conversation, local interviews and contests from his broadcast-kitchen-inthe-cornfield until he signs off at 9 a.m.

His shift now over, we retire to his paneled office, which he says is the largest at WKKD. Here Dave Beckman puts on his program director's hat for the rest of his work day.

Beckman wears his dual duty hats well. Surprisingly well, for someone with a short radio career who's only 27. "I try to keep my youth a secret," he admits. "The average age of our FM audience is 41," he confides. "The idea of 40-yearolds relating to a 27-year-old isn't widely accepted, but I think I pull it off real well. At public appearances, people always say, 'Gosh, I thought you were older!''

tion like 'KKD.' People in the Aurora area who regularly partake of the "K-lite" music diet do know who Dave Beckman is, and listener response surveys indicate that they greatly appreciate the mature way in which WKKD presents local information.

"There are 200,000 plus in this market, and it's growing every day," explains Chuck Filippi, WKKD-FM's general manager. "There's only one daily newspaper and that doesn't come out until afternoon, so we have a very important function here. Our weather can be the opposite of yours in Chicago... we have championship teams (high school and college) that never get covered by big city media... I've been here 25 years, and I know we have our fingers on the pulse of the market!"

Without Arbitron numbers to guide its progress, WKKD-AM/FM has stayed alive with the same call letters for 30 years. But, it has been a continual fight. Filippi grimaces when I assume he's encouraged by the recent western suburban building boom.

"It's not as rosy as one might think. Despite what the government says, we're in a recession. While there is a retail boom and city coffers are expanding, this type of growth is wrong for an independent station like 'KKD. Our market is becoming overridden by chain stores who knock out the small businessmen who've bought ads with us for 25 years. The chains take out ads in the Tribune or on the big-city stations where they list all their 'Chicagoland locations.' Then, they take the profits and send them out-of-town to build the CEO's mansion, or whatever."

Has Filippi ever approached the local managers of these vora-

cious chains for advertising? "It's not that easy. The local managers don't have any decision-making powers in that arena. The only thing these big chains put back into the community are a few minimum-wage jobs," he laments.

As a result of losing local advertisers, Filippi believes many suburban stations are "losing touch" with the local community.

"That seems to be the new mentality of [suburban] stations. You hear it everywhere — 'Skokie-Chicago,' 'Joliet-Chicago,' etc. They ignore their suburban communities. It's not going to work in the long run for them. They've got the power (wattage), sure, but there is a wall of radio stations coming at them from Chicago. It's a tough ball game. I'm glad I'm not in it."

Dave Beckman sides with his boss and maintains that sticking with a strictly local angle is not living in a field of dreams. "We're not hokey-finokey. What we do is comparable to anything in Chicago, light music-wise, and our added edge is that we concentrate on Aurora-oriented issues."

As news director for both WKKD's AM and FM, Jeff Blanton and his staff hit Aurora's streets daily to cover local news. "He doesn't just 'rip and read'," notes Beckman. "He's here at 4:30 a.m., making the calls, getting the sound bits, just like anybody downtown."

While both WKKD AM and FM share the services of program director Beckman and news director Blanton, the formats are different.

The 250 watt AM band reaches only the Aurora-Batavia-St. Charles area and features an oldies format. This "Puregold"

programming originates from the Satellite Music Network in Texas. Like most small stations which subscribe to satellite feed programming, there are no in-house deejays at 'KKD-AM. However, local news, sports and weather are done live. The small station is heavy on local sports coverage for both college and high school events, and includes Sportswatch 1580, a two-hour, sports-talk, call-in show.

On the 3,000 watt FM-band, K-lite's suburban coverage is more widespread. FM 95.9 targets Fox Valley area listeners in over a dozen western 'burbs. Mellow-voiced live deejays play easy listening hits. Local highlights include audience participation contests, listener requests, sports, weather, news and business updates for the Western Suburbs.

"We understand the community, but we don't insult it by sounding like we're coming out of a cornfield," Beckman

No, they don't sound like it, but... are they ever tempted to pull up stakes, fearing a big-business tornado?

"No...despite my complaints, this is stability," says Filippi. "I went through the recession of '73, then again in '80. So, this is my third recession here. The chain stores are starting to kill each other now...how can they help it? They're all within six blocks of each other. We're seeing a slow but steady development of local entrepreneurs again. They don't have the money to advertise in the Trib, but they don't want that anyway. That's not their market. They want us.

"No, really we're fine," he emphasizes. "We'll weather this. I know not to step into the pit."

So, for now, Filippi and Beckman are happy in their studiokitchen. When they look out its windows, they see that the corn is ripening. When the crops are in, they may be able to add a trash compactor or a convection oven, just like downtown. \Diamond

FLASHBACKS

The people behind the voices from Chicago radio's past—where are they now? Flashbacks takes a look back at the careers of nostalgic radio stars and what they're up to now. Let us know your favorite radio personalities from the past and we'll try to track them down.

LES TREMAYNE

Once voted one of the three most famous voices in America (along with President Franklin D. Roosevelt and Bing Crosby), Les Tremayne was one of the busiest leading men on Chicago's bustling network radio circuit of the 1930s. The Londonborn actor first hit our airwaves in 1930, and just three years later he was featured in weekly series such as *The Romance of Helen Trent, Grand Hotel, Betty And Bob, Fu Manchu* and *Jack Armstrong, the All-American Boy,* where he took over for Hollywood-bound Don Ameche.

"He and his brother Jim, who played Jack Armstrong, sounded too much alike," says Tremayne. "So they had to get rid of one of them, and Jim being the star of that show, they had to get rid of Don." Tremayne also starred on the popular *The First Nighter.* "It was neck-and-neck with things like *Lux Radio Theatre* for years—at about one-tenth the budget, I might add," he says.

"I had several of my own starring radio shows for years, and I stayed on there until 1943, when I decided I ought to branch out and go either to Hollywood or New York," he says. After eight years in New York that included an 18-month run on Broadway in *Detective Story*, Tremayne journeyed west to Hollywood.

"I did about 40 pictures," he says, "and it's strange — none of them seemed to have meant anything until I did *War of the Worlds.*" The 1953 Martian invasion film endures as a science-fiction classic.

A longtime actor on ABC-TV's top-rated soap opera *General Hospital* (until his recent retirement from the tube), Tremayne remains active in radio drama in his hometown of Los Angeles. "I love radio, and Chicago was very kind to me in the very beginning," he says. "They didn't give me anything I didn't work for, but it was a good place to start. Chicago was the hub of radio for a long time."



From hockey to horse races, WBBM-AM's many sports shows have gained a large loyal audience thanks to the versatile talents of staffers Eanet, Brown and Davis. Popular weekend morning show Sportsline, for example, has held its own on WBBM (AM 780) for six years, a rarity in radio sports show history.

here's a mandate dating back not to Edward R. Murrow, but to Brent Musberger, in that old converted ice rink at 630 N. McClurg Court in Chicago.

The marching orders carried on through three generations of sports anchors at all-news WBBM-Radio: Play it straight and go for the scoops, but have fun while you're at it.

Rich King knows all about the legacy. He has spanned the generations dating back to Musberger, who was hired as the all-news format's first sports anchor in 1968. King is still there in a part-time role - even while he works as a sports reporter at WBBM-TV (Channel 2) - with full-timers Dave Eanet, Brian Davis and Eric Brown, and weekend anchor Chris Boden.

"I think they're carrying on the tradition real well," King says of the trio of anchor/reporters who succeeded him, Tom Shaer and Ron Gleason three years ago. "The importance of what we did is we tried to break stories and tried to be informational.'

Sports Director Eanet, Davis and Brown indeed traffic in the much-awaited sports information during their regular reports at 15 and 45 minutes past the hour. But they hardly can sit back, kick up their feet, and savor a job well done. That's because WBBM's sports coverage does not stop

A combination of live call-in shows and event coverage extends the reach of not only the sports department, but the entire all-news format as well.

The popular Sportsline show, in its sixth year, is a mainstay at 10 a.m. Saturdays and Sundays. Rich King continues to host the issue-oriented Saturday segment while

Dave Eanet hosts the Sunday segment.

"Fortunately, the show has a pretty loyal audience," says Eanet. "It's the perfect time to do a sports talk show. I can't tell you how many people say, 'I was getting the papers . . . driving the kids to swim class . . . while they listen to the show. And having Rich involved is very much an asset to the station."

"I put myself into the show," says King. "I try to get guests on the show rather than make it a soapbox for Rich King, My main joy is getting information. I enjoy radio; that's why I keep my hand in it."

Sportsline has run the gamut of issues on weekend mornings. King devoted many hours to a close examination of the White Sox stadium controversy when it heated up to white-hot levels in the spring of 1988. Top sports executives often guest on the show. Athletes call in from their homes or the locker rooms. And football fans get their fill of information on autumn Sundays.

"What these shows do is give the radio station a vehicle to go beyond the headlinestyle format," says Davis. "But it's also really nice for us to get feedback from the listeners, which is hard to do in the conventional all-news format."

When the Blackhawks hit the ice starting in October, WBBM is there for every home and away game, and has been for six years. Pat Foley and Dale Tallon provide the play-by-play during the game and Brian Davis and Eric Brown co-host the postgame show with former Hawk goaltender Darren Pang. Fans listen to interviews with players and call in to discuss the game.

Eanet and Bears superstar Neal Anderson co-host a call-in show from Ditka's at 7 p.m. Mondays during the NFL season. From

May to October WBBM airs live broadcasts of the featured race at Arlington Park every Saturday and start-to-finish line coverage of the Chicago Marathon each fall.

Eanet and Davis also are heard on WBBM — on their official CBS off-day. The pair teams up for play-by-play and color on Northwestern football broadcasts, produced by the PIA sports syndicates and fed to the CBS-owned station, on autumn Saturdays.

"We get stretched pretty thin, but everyone in town has that," says sports director Eanet, the busiest of them all. "All the things we do are with essentially three and one-half people, but we're able to juggle things."

66 t's also really nice for us to get feedback from the listeners, which is hard to do in the conventional all-news format," says Davis.

"There's no typical work week for us," says Davis. "In the football season, Dave and I find ourselves working seven days a week. Eric's working six and sometimes seven. But we like what we do."

At WBBM, you are first and foremost a reporter.

"I think what we do is absolutely in keeping with the tradition this radio station has built up over the years - breaking stories," says Davis. "The thing that WBBM has always done is what I'm best at - straight-ahead journalism. My strong suit is going after a story. It's an edge you don't want to lose. It's what we're all trained to do."

But a sports voice on McClurg Court also has to be versatile, with the ability to work on Sportsline or the hockey call-in shows, handle play-by-play or the hosting

of remote events, and interact conversationally with the news anchors.

"There's no question, a great deal of variety is always a challenge," says Brown.

The on-air talent also bring a variety of backgrounds to the station.

Washington, D.C. native Eanet started at the station in 1975, working for \$2.50 an hour answering the NewsTip hotline while a college student at Northwestern. He worked his way up to a writer-producer and later a reporter's job under then sports director Brad Palmer. Eanet departed in 1983 for WRC-Radio in Washington. As sports director there he covered the Redskins' second straight trip to the Super Bowl, baseball playoffs and the World Series. A year later (after the station was sold). he landed a sports anchor/producer job at WGN-just in time for the Bears' Super Bowl season in 1985. He returned to WBBM in 1988 and as sports director masterminds the station's sports coverage.

Davis, another Northwestern alum, began his love affair with sports at age 14 when he was a sports columnist for a small New Jersey paper. As a student at Northwestern's Medill School of Journalism, Davis held various part-time jobs at Newsradio 78. He graduated in 1977 and ten years later, after stints in Wisconsin and at various Chicago stations (WGN, WCFL), Davis returned to WBBM in 1988.

Along the way, Davis has covered the Chicago Bears and Chicago White Sox training camps, the Western Open and the American and National League play-offs. The young broadcaster has reaped several team awards: AP Spot News Award, UP Spot News Award and the prestigious Peter Lisagor Award.

Davis takes the most pride, however, in a 1984 story which won AP's Investigative Reporting Award — a story about a Chicago

fireman who was drunk when he fell to his death, "I'm proud we avoided sensationalism," Davis says. "It was a tough story to tell, and I know I made enemies - but the bottom line is that the fire department's alcoholism treatment office was standing room only after the story ran. You couldn't ask for better results!"

Brown grew up listening to the Bob Elson and Milo Hamilton team on White Sox broadcasts on the old WCFL-AM, "I also listened to Brad Palmer on WBBM with a great deal of regularity," he says. "I liked the way he used to go through that scoreboard on weekend afternoons.'

Now Brown brings a unique angle to co-hosting the hockey call-in programs with former Hawks goalie Darren Pang. His play-by-play experience on University of Wisconsin hockey telecasts on WISC-TV iced his interest in the sport.

ffhis gives the radio station a chance to go beyond the headlinestyle format," says Davis.

"There aren't many black sportscasters who do hockey," he says. "I followed guys who are now in the NHL, like Chris Chellios at Wisconsin and Brett Hull at Minnesota-Duluth."

But he still is not finished with his period of adjustment from TV.

"Even though I had done live events at WISC, this is a rude awakening for me," says Brown. "TV is so structured. Four or five minutes in TV moves pretty fast because people are looking at the video. One thing about radio, you must be conversational. I'm still adjusting to that."

Eanet and crew may have to do some adjusting to the sometimes-punishing schedule. But put a microphone in front of them, and they perk up.

"I like to think that we have the most variety in terms of what our guys get asked to do," he says. "Being versatile is great. On Saturday, I could do a football game in lowa City, then fly back to do the marathon on Sunday. It's a bit wearing on you, but you enjoy the variety."

The best part of broadcasting is a live event where you're winging it."

The LEGEND of the SIGN

What do WVON, WSDM, Chess Records, Muddy Waters, Bo Diddley, Chuck Berry, Bill Cosby, the Smothers Brothers, Linda Ellerbee, Yvonne Daniels, Danae Alexander, Penny Lane and the sign on the Building at 320 E. 21st Street have in common?



On South Lake Shore Drive, just north of McCormick Place, sits a huge sign advertising WVON 1450 AM and WSDM 97.9 FM. The once illuminated sign is a free promotion for the station that now uses the same call letters on the 1450 frequency. WSDM, on the other hand, has been nothing but a fond memory in Chicago radio history for nearly 20 years.

The sign at 320 East 21st Street isn't the only reminder of the groundbreaking WSDM days in Chicago. The jazz station that used the slogan "smack dab in the middle" also called itself "the station with the girls." They were called "den pals" and some of the "girls" who worked there are now women of legendary status in Chicago broadcasting. The list is impressive: Channel 9's Merri Dee, Channel 32's Wanda Wells, national news anchor Linda Ellerbee and local radio veterans Gwen St. John (Johnson) and Barbara Stannick

WSDM's most popular announcers can still be heard on the radio today. Penny Lane is one of the top voiceover artists in town. Danae Alexander and Yvonne Daniels are both on WNUA (FM 95.5). All three women concur that they had no idea of WSDM's impact on the face of Chicago radio until years later. And in separate interviews, they all volunteered the opinion that WSDM was years ahead of its time.

"I've learned only recently that we had a huge audience. We just didn't know about it," Alexander says. "When I first came to WNUA, another lifetime later," she laughs, "it completely threw me off. I hadn't been in radio for five years and didn't expect anyone to remember me. Every once in a while I'd get a call saying 'Weren't you at WLS-FM or [W]DAl?' But mostly it was 'Weren't you at 'SDM?' That blew me away."

Penny Lane runs her own advertising agency with her husband. She says often when they make presentations to clients, producers and writers, they would question her to see if she was indeed the same Penny Lane on WSDM. "It's absolutely astounding. They would want to sit and talk about the station. It's been 20 years. These are people from all over the place — from kids who were in high school to people who are now well into their 60s. Now I know the impact. I didn't know it then, but we were way ahead of the times."

"I don't think any of us really knew it was [ahead of it's time] then," Yvonne Daniels contributes. "Everywhere I have worked

people have talked about WSDM. But as soon as I got back to something close to jazz [WNUA], I couldn't believe just how many people remembered WSDM."

Daniels produced a recent letter from a WNUA listener to emphasize her point. The listener made references to his college days listening to WSDM. He even pointed out special features during Daniels' shift. He remembered so well because he still listens to air checks he made from WSDM. All Alexander, Daniels and Lane had to go on was their memories. None of them knew anything about why there's still a sign standing in their honor.

WSDM was owned by the legendary Chess brothers. Leonard and Phil Chess also owned Chess Records, WVON and WNOV-AM in Milwaukee. The AM stations played R&B, including many Chess artists. WSDM served a useful purpose in promoting the Chess Records mid-60s jazz stable. Phil's son, Terry, was WSDM's general manager and the program director was Burt Burdeen, now a broadcasting instructor.

At first, Burdeen programmed all the music on tape and hired "den pals" to do recorded drop-ins. They all had pseudonyms and used exotic, foreign-sounding voices. Gwen Johnson was Nice 'N' Easy. Also on the staff were Dawn, Copper, Hush Puppy and before

using Danae (her real name) Alexander was dubbed Curious.

"It was the whole sex thing, real sexist. It was done purposely," Alexander says. "Things were said like, 'The best way to a man's heart is not always his stomach,'" she mocks in a French accent.

When Burdeen wanted real conversationalists with real names between his jazz music, he set out on a talent search.

"They had a contest," Lane remembers. "You had to write a letter on why you wanted a week on-the-air. That kind of shows

you the state of radio back then compared to what it is now. It would be hard for anybody to get a job that way now." But that is exactly how Penny Lane got started in radio at WSDM.

Yvonne Daniels became WSDM's staple at night during this transition. She was already well known for her jazz program with Sid McCoy on WCFL and because her father was pop singer Billy Daniels. "Leonard thought that the novelty had worn off and that he had to get serious. That was when he hired me. He practically told me, 'You could write your own ticket. You have to come here and authenticate us.' I took the 7 [P.M.] to 11 slot and they gave me total freedom," says Daniels.

WSDM is remembered fondly, not only for the "den pals" and their jazz, but for comedy too. Steve Martin, George Carlin and Gabe Kaplan were featured on WSDM long before they became stars. When comedian Pat Paulsen ran for President in '68, WSDM was probably the only station that regularly aired his platforms. Exclusive improvisations were also done by Bill Cosby, Mort Sahl and the Smothers Brothers. "We were one of the first stations to have famous entertainers record cut-ins," Lane boasts.

Daniels left in the early 70s to go to ABC Radio's WLS (AM 890). Alexander left for ABC too, but she stayed on the FM band. Ironically she became a star with disco, the music that helped kill WSDM. Penny Lane went to WFYR (FM 103.5) for two years before going into the advertising game.

WSDM meant a lot to these women, but none of them know why, after 20 years, their biggest ad is still in place. The sign may pique the curiosity of those too young to remember WSDM. But it serves as a jazzy monument for all those who do.

When Leonard Chess died, his brother sold the record company to a subsidiary of the Gulf & Western Corporation and the broadcasting interest to (Harlem) Globetrotter Communication Inc.

They changed the call letters to WGCl and moved the AM frequency to 1390 and the FM signal to 107.5 before selling it to Gannett Communications. By that time, the "den pals" were long gone.

Frank Hrascinski doesn't remember much about WSDM, but he probably knows more about that sign than anyone in the city. For close to 30 years, Hrascinski has been the Building Superintendent at the Chess Building at 320 East 21st Street. This building is not to be confused with the Chess Building at 2120 South Michigan that was just made a national landmark, but should perhaps be considered for that honor; it was once the home of the largest recording studio in the world.

Hrascinski can tell you what was going on on all eight floors when Chess owned the building. He can take you into the bowels of the building and show you valuable pictures. There are photos of some of the 600 employees that once worked there, and pictures of Hrascinski and "the old man" (Leonard Chess).


He remembers the day they erected the neon sign to advertise the two radio stations. According to Hrascinski, the sign cost between \$30,000 and \$40,000, weighs close to 50 tons and is tied to the main pillars of the building. The current owners, CEN Properties, pay the annual licensing fee to the city because of an ordinance containing a grandfather clause. If they take it down, it cannot be put back up. But as long as they pay the yearly fee, they can still lease the sign out. In 20 years there have been no takers. There have been five owners since the Chess Brothers sold the building: GRT Corporation, The Mansfield, Central National Bank, Exchange National Bank and CEN. None have been able to erase the memory of the Chess brothers, whose name still adorns the front in huge silver letters, or the legend of the station smack dab in the middle. \diamondsuit

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Chicago Style

For WLS' Ray Hanania, it's the only game in town

Every Sunday evening, when Chicago Sun-Times city hall reporter Ray Hanania hosts his Confrontation show on WLS (AM 890), Chicago politicians listen. How did a political columnist from the southwest side come to be feared and respected by our town's elected officials? Long before Sneed and O'Malley, Hanania was busy keeping politicos on their toes.

"It all started in September 1979 when Jane Byrne threatened to beat me up and her husband, Jay McMullen threatened to punch me in the nose because of some item I wrote in my column in the Southtown Economist," recalls Hanania.

Channel 2's Walter Jacobson did two commentaries defending Hanania and Chicago Magazine ran its story. This caught the attention of WLUP (FM 97.9), "The news director at the time called me and said, 'Ray, let's exploit this attention that you're getting and do a radio show'," says Hanania.

Thus was launched the multimedia career of a Chicago political reporter. "One day Jane Byrne started attacking me and voila, I'm on the radio," he says with a snicker.

Today the former southwest side columnist is the Chicago Sun-Times' city hall reporter and the host of his own WLS (AM 890) talk show, Confrontation, which airs Sundays from 6-7 p.m. He is a frequent guest on Ch. 11's Weekend Review and Ch. 5's City Desk. He also appears on other radio shows: WMAQ-AM's The Reporters. WGN-AM's Dateline 720 and WBBM-AM's At Issue. And he writes a monthly column on city hall issues for Commerce Magazine.

But back in '79, when Jane Byrne was mayor, Hanania was a relatively unknown journalist who wrote a political gossip column called "The Grapevine" for the Southtown Economist newspaper chain. Before that he studied Chicago politics at the University of Illinois' Circle Campus. under the wing of the late Milt Rakove, author of Don't Make No Waves, Don't Back No Losers.

So just what did the fledgling reporter do to incur the mayor's wrath to the point where she'd repeatedly single him out at press conferences with snide remarks?

"Well it was one stupid little complicated item I ran," Hanania admits. "It seems that when Jane and Jay first wed, he went looking for a job with County Clerk Morgan Finley. And Finley was gonna hire him, but Mayor Mike Bilandic supposedly found out and told him not to. That was the story Jane was telling everyone when she was campaigning for mayor, but Bilandic always denied it. So when Jane became mayor, the first thing she did was try to get someone to run against Finley for Clerk of the Circuit Court. And I ran that in my column," the reporter notes.

As a result, "Jay called me on the phone and started swearing and said if I ever quoted him again, he'd come over to the press room and punch me in the nose. So I quoted him threatening to hit me in my

next column. And Jane refused to talk to me for two months after that and went into a snit and refused to talk to any media for a while."

Hanania was lauded by his press peers and in January 1980, he hit the airwaves on WLUP-FM with his show, Confrontation. The pretaped, half-hour political interview show aired Sundays at 6 a.m. His first guest was Jane Byrne.

"Jane Byrne is just what the city's journalists need. Since Daley got elected, it's been boring around here."

"I was really nervous because I'd never done radio before. But she was very funny and very nice. The irony is that we'd had our ups and downs, but she'd always do my radio show. She's a big believer in the importance of radio interviews. So was Harold Washington and even Eugene Sawyer. They'd do my shows. But not Mayor Daley. He's afraid to do radio interviews. And it's ironic he won't do my shows. because Byrne always accused me of being Daley's spokesman at city hall because we're both southwest siders. And now that he's incumbent, Daley says I'm a flack for the minority community.'

Such is the life of a city hall reporter. "To me, politics is the only sport in town. My show is like a sports talk show, only we talk politics." Hanania says that since his WLS show started in April 1990, "all of the city and county elected officials' listen to the program or guest on it. So do political reporters and editors from the *Chicago* Tribune, the Sun-Times and the TV news.

Hanania's chosen topics range from international concerns such as apartheid to local issues such as the city budget. The host says he tries to squeeze in as many calls from listeners as possible. Hanania likes to engage callers by playing devil's

advocate. "That way, I can present each political side or each side of the issue. I always take the underdog side or argue the side that's absent. Even though I'm an Arab-American, if there were Arabs on the show beating up on Israel, I'd probably end up defending Israel."

Hanania, who is of Palestinian descent, spent two weeks in Jordan and the West Bank last fall, visiting relatives and gathering human interest observations for a series of articles that ran in the Sun-Times. While he was gone, WLS' Roe Conn hosted Confrontation, and Hanania called the show from Jordan to act as a guest, answering questions about the Middle East from callers.

"The scariest part about being over there was that in the West Bank, everybody's front windows are riddled with bullet holes. People don't bother replacing their windows anymore because it's too costly and they just get shot out again."

For Hanania, the newspaper part of his career is serious business. "But radio is a lot different. It's fun and more relaxed. In radio you can present a story in a casual way, then work your way up, depending on what the listeners want to talk about. In print you have to focus on only one thing and skip the interesting details."

Hanania says it was Steve Dahl who gave him his biggest break in radio. "When I was first doing my morning show at WLUP-FM in 1980, he invited me to do commentaries from city hall about Jane Byrne. For example, I did a thing about her daughter Kathy being at a party that the police raided and so she hid in the shower stall. But Steve didn't like it when I'd do serious things like the budget."

Hanania only did Dahl and Meier's show for about eight months, but to this day people still remember it. Even though he took his Confrontation show to WBBM-FM for two years and in 1988 went back to WLUP-AM for two years (before he was courted away by WLS), it was his gig with Dahl that radio fans recall the best. "Ten years later they come up to me and say they remember me on Steve & Garry's show. It's unbelievable."

A decade also has passed since his Jane Byrne battle. Now that she is running for mayor once again, how does Hanania feel about it?

'Jane Byrne is just what the city's journalists need," he says, enthusiastically. "Since Daley got elected it's been boring around here. Jane always provided excitement and she always gets headlines. She's good for the press. Whether or not she's good for the city is for the voters to decide."



Radio's Midnight RAMBLER



Since 1958, the name Mike Rapchak has been synonymous with late night in Chicago radio. Refusing to bow to the latest trends, Rapchak has lasted in radio longer than many formats and even some stations. At WGN (AM 720) since 1979, the popular DJ has earned fans across the country.

Go ahead. Call him "Mr. Rapchak." Then stand clear as he shakes his head and growls, "Mike! Everybody says Mike! Please make it Mike, okay?!"

Testy? Nah, not Mike Rapchak. He's too busy playing classic jazz and big band music each Saturday night at 11:30 p.m.-5 a.m. over WGN (AM 720).

But you never know about this Mike Rapchak. He might spin a Nelson Riddle side or hold a trivia contest (Could you identify Jack Benny's Maxwell?), and then shift gears into a serious analysis of Johnny Mercer lyrics with mystery writer Robert B. Parker, a Rapchak fan passing through town to plug one of his Spenser

"My listeners are hip," says Rapchak. "They understand the difference between Vic Damone and Engelbert Humperdinck, how one interprets a lyric while the other just sings words. And believe me, I hear from them! Since 1979 I've received letters from listeners in 37 states."

For Mike Rapchak, WGN is a far cry from WSOY in downstate Decatur, where he began his career some 42 years ago. He explains, "After the war I attended Columbia College on the G.I. Bill and was referred to Bernie Johnson at WSOY. Johnson listened to my audition and said, 'You stink! You're horrible! But I need an announcer. Look pal, I have to see one more guy today and if he's worse than you, you're hired."

After three months with WSOY, Rapchak moved on to stints at WIMS in Michigan City and WWCA in Gary, where a personality conflict landed him "back on the pick and shovel gang," out of radio and working day labor jobs.

"I enjoyed WWCA," Rapchak recalls, "and probably had the best time of my career there with guys like (the late) Frank Reynolds, the old ABC network anchor. I remember Revnolds used to say, 'Rapchak! You better go back to Lever Brothers because you'll never make it in radio!"

But instead of the Lever Brothers loading dock, he opted for a job at WAIT in Chicago and soon found himself broadcasting from the station's Elmhurst transmitter with John Coughlin and Daddy-O Daylie. Says Rapchak, "The WAIT job lasted five months and I was on the street again. I filled in part-time at WAAF, but what I really wanted was that all-night jazz show at WCFL."

WCFL... The Voice of Labor.

In 1958 Mike Rapchak finagled an audition at WCFL through his friend Oscar Marienthal, owner of the old London House restaurant.

"Marty Hogan was program director at WCFL," Rapchak remembers. "He told me to choose my music carefully and prepare a 30-minute audition. I played a little Les Brown and he said, 'Stop! You've got the job!"

Through the late 1950s and early 1960s, Rapchak held down midnights at WCFL, bantering with legendary radio wildman Dan Sorkin and building a rabid following as an authoratative voice on jazz and big band music. Former Chicago broadcasting personality and Columbia College instructor Al Parker remembers Rapchak at the peak of his WCFL popularity.

"You have to understand that radio was very different in 1960," Parker says. "FM didn't really exist. There were no ratings. We had maybe 25 stations in Chicago, and set formats were rare. You'd have country music, talk shows, and brokered programming all on the same station. Consequently, Mike Rapchak and Dick Buckley, guys who really knew the music, added their contributions to the mix and drew impressive audiences. When you thought jazz in Chicago, you thought Mike Rapchak."

And WCFL is where Mike Rapchak stayed until 1965, when the station, in an effort to expand its listenership, shifted to a rock'n'roll format.

"I couldn't stomach the change," Rapchak says. "They fired just about everyone and brought in a gang of pirates, a bunch of bandits and thugs from Cleveland. So one evening I quit on the air. I tore up the rock playlist and said to my listeners, 'You folks know what I stand for and I won't play this garbage!"

Bill Lee, then president of the Chicago Federation of Labor (owners of WCFL), personally appealed to Rapchak to reconsider, but his mind was made up. No rock 'n' roll!

"After WCFL I went to FM-100, and then Channel 7, where I worked as a booth announcer," he says. "And in 1976 the folks at WCFL called again. They were dropping the rock format and wanted Mike Rapchak. On my first night back I keved the mike, as if nothing had happened, and said, '... as I was saying before I was so rudely interrupted.' You'd be surprised at how many people got the joke."

Rapchak joined WGN in 1979 when WCFL changed hands and went to a Christian music format. Since then he's built a cadre of loyal fans who instantly recognize the Neal Hefti tune "Girl Talk" as his regular theme. But what about the cryptic sign-off: "Good night, Chicago. Good night, Texas."

My high school sweetheart was a gal called Texas," he explains. "We both married other people, had families, and then didn't see each other again until our high school reunion in 1980. When she passed away I just added her to my sign-off. It's my way of remembering her...and my audience seems to understand.

Go ahead. Cue up "Girl Talk" and listen carefully as this old smoothie slips out into the night.

Album Oriented Rock Radio



AOR power trio serves baby boomers best of old and new music



In his "The Boys of Summer" hit from a few years ago, Don Henley sings about seeing a Deadhead sticker on a Cadillac. That mental image neatly sums up the great strides album-oriented rock (AOR) radio has made since its genesis as "underground" radio a little over 20 years ago.

"The thing about this music is that it's not just music –it's our whole lives. It's the Vietnam War years and the psychedelic years," says WCKG's Mitch Michaels.

Originating on the West Coast in the late '60s, "underground" FM radio was the broadcast voice of the counterculture, with a freewheeling style that encompassed everything from Janis Joplin and Jimi Hendrix to Ravi Shankar and Leonard Cohen. In the mid-'70s the format was more commonly known as "progressive," and had lost many of its counterculture trappings, with artists like Led Zeppelin, the Eagles, the Who, Genesis, Journey and Pink Floyd among its core artists.

By the early '80s, when former Radio & Records editor Mike Harrison coined the term "album-oriented rock," AOR radio was being programmed and marketed as sophisticatedly as any other radio format. While many of the core artists from the '60s and '70s remained, they were augmented by newer acts like the Police, Talking Heads, R.E.M., the Pretenders and the Cure.

Today the 25 to 44-year-old listeners who make up the bulk of the AOR audience have become a strong lure for advertisers hawking import cars and beers, cellular phones, computer equipment and airline tickets. In short, the AOR audience has become disposable income heaven.

In the last few ratings periods, Chicago's three primary AOR outlets—WCKG (FM 105.9), WLUP (FM 97.9) and WXRT (FM 93.1)—have all showed major gains, with both WCKG and WLUP-FM ranking within Chicago radio's Top 5 and WXRT generally between 10 and 15. Clearly, album rock radio is a major force in Chicago.

WCKG morning man Mitch Michaels is one of Chicago AOR radio's best-known personalities. In the nearly 20 years he's been behind the mike in Chicago, Michaels has worked at virtually every station that ever tried the format: WGLD, WDAI, WXRT, WKQX and WLUP-FM. He says that album

rock music is deeply ingrained in the lives of baby-boomers.

"The thing about this music is that it's not just music—it's our whole lives," he says. "It's the Vietnam War years and the psychedelic years. No matter how old we get, that music is always going to be there for us and have meaning."

In fact, "Classic Rock" WCKG is built upon that very premise. Eschewing new music, the station tightly focuses on the major songs by the major rock artists of the '60s, '70s and '80s. That Classic Rock formula—generally credited to radio consultant Fred Jacobs—has been very successful for WCKG over the last couple of years, just as it has been for scores of other stations around the country.

"Some people seem to be astonished that Classic Rock has lasted this long," says program director Dan Michaels of WCKG, which switched to the format in 1985. "But if you think about it it's not so strange—it's the music that everybody likes."

Indeed WCKG's steady diet of familiar songs like Bob Seger's "Night Moves," the Who's "Won't Get Fooled Again," Led Zeppelin's "Stairway to Heaven' and the Steve Miller Band's "Rock'n Me" attracts masses of listeners.

"For what they do, WCKG is one of the best Classic Rock stations in the country," admits WLUP-FM station manager Greg Solk, whose station plays many of the same "classic" records. "They're very consistent and operate very lean and mean from a programming standpoint. When you turn them on you know what you're going to get."

Of course, the Classic Rock approach has more than its share of detractors as well. Not everyone wants to hear a relatively short playlist of frequently-repeated songs.

"WCKG doesn't threaten us, because the mindset of the Classic Rock listener is almost the direct opposite of the WXRT listener," says Norm Winer, program director of WXRT—the city's oldest AOR outlet. "We purposely challenge people and attempt to surprise them with our music selection."

While WCKG sticks to the classics, WLUP-FM is perhaps best-described as "Personality-Oriented AOR." Starting with

the WLUP (AM 100) simulcast of Jonathon Brandmeier's morning drive show, the FM "Loop" follows up with such well-known local personalities as Bob Stroud, John Fisher and Bobby Skafish.

In fact, the addition of former WXRT jock Skafish in afternoon drive seven years ago coincided with the station's transition from its previous incarnation as a hard rock/heavy metal station into the adult rock station it is today. WLUP-FM's Solk says he's content with the Loop's musical approach midway between WCKG and

'We can't sound like WXRT because they've been here a long time and we'll never out-'XRT 'XRT," he admits. "We can't sound like WCKG because they've spent millions of dollars in marketing over the last five years to cement themselves as the Classic Rock station. So we are left in between which is perfect for us. We'll play Warren Zevon's 'Werewolves of London' which WCKG plays just about every day and we'll play the new R.E.M. record just like WXRT will."

That approach has made the FM Loop the most consistently successful over the last five years of the city's three AOR outlets. WLUP plays about 60 percent "Classic" records — including most of the titles played by WCKG—and 40 percent new music, though the station's playlist for current titles is, according to Solk, about half of what WXRT's is. WLUP-FM's new music also tends to be more conservative than WXRT's, going mostly with tried-andtrue artists like Paul McCartney, Bad Company, ZZ Top, Neil Young, Styx and AC/DC.

Solk admits that having the wildly successful, comedy-oriented Brandmeier show simulcast on the FM in the morning is a mixed blessing. "On the one hand Brandmeier is a tremendous asset to the radio station," he says. "Then there's the other thinking that having him on in morning drive opposite two AOR music stations is a detriment to the FM as a music station. Fortunately the positives far outweigh the negatives.'

While WXRT features sharp wits like Johnny Mars and Frank E. Lee as well as regular comedy breaks throughout the day, almost any 93.1 FM listener will tell you that the station's chief appeal is its music selection. From major artists like INXS, the Cure. Paul Simon and Los Lobos to up-and-comers like Jane's Addiction, the Pixies, David Baerwald, Sonic Youth and the Soup Dragons, WXRT has a longstanding reputation as one of the country's most eclectic AOR stations, with a deep playlist.

'Our station was conceived as a place for people who love music, especially new music," says Winer of WXRT, which debuted as a part-time AOR station in 1972. "Of course we augment the new music with some great stuff from the last 25 to 30 years. We want to be an alternative to the other stations where you'll already be familiar with every song they play."

WXRT's longevity can be a double-edged sword, though. About 18 months ago the station jettisoned its longstanding "Chicago's Finest Rock" slogan and diamond logo for "93XRT Radio Chicago," as well as a more eye-catching logo. The station also instituted a high-profile television advertising campaign urging radio listeners to "move someplace cooler." "think for yourself" and "change the things you can."

"We've been around since 1972 and one of the perceptions we wanted to avoid is that we never change," explains Winer. "In fact, we've made a lot of changes over the years, though many of them have been subtle.'

One fairly recent phenomenon that affects all three AOR stations is the fact that listeners over age 35 have by and large abandoned listening to the radio at night. Competing for the baby boomer's attention at night are such things as spending "quality time" with their burgeoning families, dining out, and renting videos.

If the over-35s are tuning out after 7 p.m., a logical move is to increase listenership at night by the 18-34 segment of the audience. WXRT's "XRT After 8" programming is designed to do just that, by playing rock music with a bit more of an edge and reducing the number of commercials in the evening. WLUP-FM plays harder-edged music by groups like Aerosmith and AC/DC at night for the same reason.

"It's a complete turnaround from the late '70s and early '80s, when the nighttime was our highest rated part of the day," says WLUP's Solk. "Now it's totally reversed with morning drive number one, middays second, evening drive third and evenings last."

In general, the future of AOR radio necessitates a balancing act: to be successful, stations must keep the aging babyboomers listening while acquiring younger listeners as well.

To many people's surprise, WCKG has managed to score well with the under-24s. that is, those too young to have heard most of the music the station plays when they were current songs.

"We get calls all the time from high school kids who are going to record stores to buy Beatles, Rolling Stones or Doors albums," says Michaels.

While WCKG, WLUP-FM and WXRT have differing programming philosophies, one thing that all three of their programmers agree on is how lucky the Chicago radio market is to have three distinct AOR stations.

'Chicago is very lucky to have such a wide selection of choices available on the radio," says WCKG's Michaels.

WXRT's Winer agrees. "In some cities people of our generation are forced to listen to cassettes and CDs because there's no station for them to listen to," he says. "People in Chicago have three very different album rock stations, at least one of which has to satisfy them. We're really very lucky here."

FLASHBACKS

RUTH DUSKIN FELDMAN

At the tender age of seven, little Ruth Duskin was a nationwide radio sensation. As one of the "Ouiz Kids" during the 1940s. she and her pint-sized fellow scholars answered impossibly obscure questions and traded guips with the likes of Jack Benny, Bob Hope and Fred Allen.

The Quiz Kids debuted on the NBC Blue Network in June of 1940, and Ruth debuted on the weekly program in November of the following year, with quizmaster Joe Kelly putting the children through their amazing paces. "In terms of my own expertise, there was Shakespeare, the Bible, opera, literature, and then I got interested in chemistry when I was about nine," says Feldman.

Although normally airing from Chicago, The Quiz Kids frequently broadcast from different locales across the country, initially to raise money for war bonds. But Feldman managed to cope with the pressures of being a child celebrity.

"My parents made special efforts to make sure that I didn't get what they called a swelled head in those days," she says. "It was something we did once a week, and the rest of the week, we were just regular school kids like everybody else."

At 16, Feldman "graduated" from the show after 147 appearances, including a few on NBC-TV's 1950 version. "I was definitely ready," she says. "Many of us, by the time we got to our high school years, really found it kind of a mixed blessing being a Quiz Kid, because socially it made you a little bit of a misfit." She married at 19 while attending Northwestern University, where she made Phi Beta Kappa, and later taught junior high school before becoming a freelance writer.

In 1982, Feldman wrote the book Whatever Happened to the Quiz Kids?, tracing the lives of her former colleagues. To celebrate the show's 50th anniversary recently. Chuck Schaden reunited Feldman with a few other ex-Quiz Kids on his WNIB (FM 97.1) nostalgia program.

WLUP'S UNIQUE BASKETBALL VOICE

Johnny "Red" Kerr has worn many hats throughout his long career—NBA player, coach, radio and TV sportscaster, restaurateur. But one thing that has remained constant is his undying love for the Bulls.

Please excuse Johnny "Red" Kerr for a surfeit of "yeahhhs!," "whooos" and other sounds brewing forth from his pipes during peak moments of a Chicago Bulls broadcast on WLUP (AM 1000).

It's simply impossible for this veteran color announcer to contain his enthusiasm for the home team. Red Kerr is, after all, a proud papa exulting over his child's achievements. As the team's very first coach, the Bulls are his baby, nurtured through a perilous infancy, guided through

a troubled adolescence and now allowed the freedom to bloom into glorious adulthood and hopefully onto becoming this year's NBA champs.

Bulls fans couldn't care less about Kerr's lack of journalistic objectivity on the air. The towering redhead gives listeners what they want, from a very unique perspective.

'I'm hired to do the games in Chicago,' says the 6-foot-9 native South Sider whose distinctive red hair has survived his sixth decade on earth. "My main audience is

not throughout the country. I react like a Chicago Bulls fan. That's the audience that's listening to me.

"When you're doing radio, you're right on top of the action. On TV, the pace is slower. When doing color on radio, you're right into the game. There are exciting plays and you're up talking about them, reacting to them.

"I like to do it the way I'd like to hear it at home. Don't try to get people knowledgebound. They come home from work, they want to relax in the evening. Many color guys try to explain everything," Kerr opines.

If Michael Jordan is the Son and Holy Spirit combined on the Bulls, then Red Kerr must be the Father. In this, the NBA franchise's 25th season, Kerr should be first in line for honors - for good reason. Early on, he believed in the viability of the team as its first coach in 1966. And he would love to be seated behind the mike to describe the Bulls playing for the title in the NBA championship series—if that is meant to be this year.

Currently, Kerr announces Bulls games for WLUP-AM, which simulcasts on cable TV's SportsChannel. He and partner Jim Durham also work about 20 Bulls games per season for WGN-TV.

Despite these many outlets, Kerr may lose his opportunity to act as sports anchor for any future Bulls championship games after this season.

Starting in Fall of 1991, WMAO (AM 670) will have the radio broadcast rights for Bulls games. The NBC-owned station snatched the Bulls games from WLUP-AM in a \$20 million dollar package involving the White Sox. Both teams are headed by managing partner Jerry Reinsdorf.

There is no assurance that Kerr and longtime play-by-play partner Jim Durham will be working at WMAO next season. So Kerr has his mind on the last game of this season. And his radio gig at 'LUP may be his only chance to announce a possible Bulls championship game.

If the Bulls make it to the finals, TV coverage would be taken over by the NBC network. "You can't bump the network people for yourself," Kerr says. So the papa Bull is hoping he'll be working on Chicago radio in the event of his team's title victory.

You can bet that Kerr wouldn't miss a Bulls championship for the world. He and Durham have described Bulls games since 1985, watching the team progress from the NBA nether world to its current status as a choice pick for this year's title.

The team and the city are his longtime loves. Back in the mid-'70s, Kerr proved his devotion by working Bulls games for free. Phil Nolan, then general manager of Bulls outlet WIND-AM, hired Kerr at \$35 per game to do a halftime show, Kerr's Corner.

Kerr recalls: "I used to sit by Jim [Durham] during the game action. He'd ask a question or two of me. Then he asked the engineer to rig me up with a mike. So I ended up doing color for no extra money."

"He did the color just because he liked it," Durham notes.

What Kerr liked most was the fact that Chicago finally had its own basketball team. During the team's first season, he used to carry around a pocketful of nickels and dimes to call Chicago newspapers after Bulls road games to provide the hometown with details. Back then, no newspaper staffed the Bulls' away games.

"Ben Bentley [then public relations director] and I gave them quotes and the box score," recalls Kerr. "I'd be out every night with Bentley promoting the team. I probably did more PR work than coaching work that season."

It was a radically different environment for the Bulls - and the NBA. Chicago did not wait with open arms for the Bulls. Pro basketball franchises had repeatedly failed in town dating back to the 1940s.

"There were a lot of floundering franchises then," he says. "The [Wilt] Chamberlain and [Bill] Russell era held up the East Coast teams."

The Bulls, operating on a shoestring, could not afford the rent at Chicago Stadium, so they played at the decrepit International Amphitheatre on the South Side. Years later, Bentley admitted he was ordered to inflate the crowd count, often by more than 1,000 a game.

Kerr was motivated to help the franchise succeed after his 12-year career as an NBA center wound down, a tenure that featured a then-record 844 consecutive games played.

"I was born and raised here," he emphasizes. "I wanted to live in this town. I wanted to see the game succeed here. I played high school ball here fat Tilden Tech] and played at the state university [Illinois].

Kerr took a group of castoffs from other teams, predicted they would make the NBA playoffs and set a record for most victories by an expansion franchise (33). He earned NBA Coach of the Year for the Bulls' first season in 1966-67 for his efforts, but departed one year later to avoid a "bloodbath mess" in the front office.

He resurfaced as Phoenix Suns coach when that franchise began in 1968, then got his start in broadcasting as a color announcer, teaming with Hot Rod Hundley on Suns games. "It was as refreshing as a head-on collision," laughs Kerr. He did more color work for the Virginia Squires of the old American Basketball Association before returning to Chicago as Bulls' business manager.

Kerr's stature as an all-time Bull is dutifully recorded on the cover of the team's 1990-91 media guide. He and Dick Motta. his successor as coach, are depicted with a fictional all-time team of Jordan, Bob Love, Jerry Sloan, Chet Walker and Artis Gilmore.

"But the fans have long regarded Kerr as an original," says Durham.

"The audience goes nuts along with him when Jordan makes one of his great moves," he notes. "Chicago fans are emotional fans. They get caught up with their teams."


The fans are likely to get even more caught up in the Bulls' expected title drive. They already are hooked on Jordan.

Kerr has witnessed most of the record 14.016 points that Jordan scored going into this season. He believes there has never been a gate attraction like Jordan.

"Chamberlain was the biggest name of his time," says Kerr, "People came to see him work in close to the basket the first time, but they may not have come back the second, third and fourth time the way they do with Michael."

Kerr believes the Bulls' acquisition of veterans Dennis Hopson and Cliff Levingston will help Jordan realize his title dream. "Before, when Michael sat down, everything would go to hell in a handbag,' says Kerr.

Nowadays, the big readhead is counting the weeks until he can hopefully broadcast the moment the Bulls ascend to NBA heaven.

From Shadow Traffic reporter to madcap Robert Murphy sidekick, Beth Kaye has enjoyed great serendipity throughout her radio career. Today a mellower, more mature Kaye enjoys doing mornings at one of the city's top adult contemporary stations. eth Kave is the first to admit that she has made a very nice career out of being in the right place at the right time.

"I've been real fortunate that way," admits Kaye, who rode the wild surf of "cross-talk" radio in the early '80s, going from Shadow Traffic gal to on-air personality on the Murphy in the Morning show on WKOX (FM 101.1).

Today, as sidekick to Peter Dean in the AM drivetime slot on WTMX (FM 101.9), Kaye is coasting on the mellower waters of "adult contemporary." And if numbers are any indication, serendipity has struck again.

Kave's is the warm, feminine voice playing against the burly baritones of Dean and Nick Candella on the 5:30 to 9 a.m. program. The troika plays adult contemporary music and engages in the typical on-air wisecracking and giveaways. But the tempo is much more laid back than on Murphy's show or many of the other morning zoos, says Kaye.

It's a formula that seems to be working. Over the past several years, as WTMX worked at fine-tuning its demographic focus from a shrinking teenaged audience to a bulging baby boomer one, its ratings have gone from "mediocre" to Top 10. The station's morning ratings shot from the 11th spot in Spring 1989 to sixth only a year later.

And Kaye, lucky again, has gone along for the ride.

But for Kaye, doing her thing on The New Mix 102 is not just luck, but a matter of choice. She believes that the station's

Then, in 1988, former Murphy alumnus Pete Stacker was hired to replace WTMX morning man "Doc" Duncan. Stacker, looking for a sidekick of his own, remembered Kaye and tapped her for his new AM program. "To this day, I don't know how he got my phone number," she says.

Radio was never her first love, and Kaye had a lot of second thoughts about going back. But Stacker's offer came at a good time, and since she enjoys being an on-air personality and all the perks that go with it, Kaye decided to get back behind the microphone.

When Stacker left a year later to pursue a growing national TV voiceover career, Peter Dean, who had been on the WTMX staff in a variety of capacities for at least 10 years, was shifted to the pilot's seat on morning drivetime. Kaye retained her seat as co-pilot, and the rest is history.

Even though the New Mix management doesn't want to tamper with a good thing, Kaye notes that in the future, the show may even adopt some of the old tried-and-true gonzo radio techniques, like remotes from a portable phone, just like in the good old days with Murphy.

But Kave is far from sentimental about her tumultuous six-vear stint with Murphy, whom she began working with on O101 in 1981. when the bearded loud-mouth from Charlotte, N.C. was hired to replace the departing Bob DelGiornio.

burgeoning ratings reflect a new conservatism on the part of the listening audience, which is aging, raising children, and more concerned about what they hear on the air.

"It's the only station I'd work at in this town; [it's] a place that meets with my personal views," says Kaye, now 36 and herself the mother of a 31/2-year-old boy.

In fact, Kaye insists that she would rather change markets — or leave radio altogether — than work in a format that isn't a good fit with her own personality. After all, she's already had to do it once, when Q101 management (and a floundering rapport with Robert Murphy) broke up a radio partnership that had lasted almost six vears.

Kave was three months into a three-year contract with O101 as Murphy's AM sidekick in 1987 when station management told her out of the blue that things weren't working out. Kaye believes that the strain between her and Murphy had become evident on the air — and that the firing was nudged along by a well-placed word from Murphy himself.

After getting the boot from Q101, Kaye decided to take a break from radio. Inspired by her sociologist father, she started Crossroads, a retreat home in Geneva for women going through crises. At the time, her son Rob was an infant, and she was able to devote herself full-time to the project.

her arrest, she recalls. Kaye and sportscaster Pat Benkowski (now the host of a cable TV sports program) were sent out on the street by Murphy with a portable phone and a cardboard box. Their mission: to collect edibles from people on the street to bring to Chicago Bear William "Refrigerator" Perry during his first Ditkamandated diet.

"We'd collect anything—like Certs or gum covered with lint or hair from the bottom of somebody's purse," laughs Kaye. Then she and Benkowski took the box and drove up to the Fridge's home in Mundelein to present him with the goodies.

Although the Fridge family was on vacation, the incident almost ended in disaster when an unamused cop started to arrest Kaye and Benkowski for trespassing. Only a lot of smooth talking on the part of Murphy persuaded him to let them go, she says.

Murphy's straightiacket humor was fun for awhile, but changes in Kave's personal life — marriage, divorce, and other landmarks made her reassess her reasons for being there. And the person that she is today feels much more comfortable behind the mike at WTMX.

"I loved the fact that Murphy's was a hot show and he was a hot talent, but he didn't want to change, and I was changing a lot," she recalls. "But we were pals, and we had a real good time for a long time."

Pied Piper of Chicago Radio

The perpetually youthful 60-year-old has entertained and informed listeners on WGN (AM 720) for over two decades. As a critic, Leonard's wildly eclectic tastes in movies, music and the arts keep him and his audience on the cutting edge of culture.


Roy Leonard is the Pied Piper of Chicago radio. His sweet, soothing pipes have been comforting WGN listeners for 22 years -remarkable in a business where 22 months in one place is considered a stable gig.

On any given day, you may hear Leonard playing tunes performed by anyone from Madonna to Peggy Lee to Lyle Lovett. He might interview Bill Murray, John Cleese, Quincy Jones or a "bug buster," who tells frantic WGN callers how to rid their plants of the six-legged creatures. In addition, Leonard regularly offers reviews of the latest plays and movies on his eclectic program, heard 9:30 to 11:55 a.m. Tuesdays through Fridays and 7 a.m. to noon Saturdays.

"He is eternally young," says Nina Newhouser, Leonard's producer for four and one-half years, until 1989. "He's in perpetual

In fact, the 60-year-old Leonard all but flies around his WGN office. He jumps up from behind his desk to answer the phone ringing at his current producer Andy Perez's desk, then back to his own desk and his own phone - which can barely be found amidst the mountainous piles of compact discs, books and press kits. It's surprising he can sit in one place long enough to do his show.

Newhouser, age 30, tells how she introduced Leonard to a tune called "Smooth Operator," by a new (at the time) jazz artist named Sade. "Roy didn't hesitate," she says. "He's not afraid to play new artists or experiment."

"I hate nostalgia," says Leonard. "If someone was popular 20, 30 or 40 years ago, I don't care. My gosh, I played Ray Coniff and Percy Faith when I started here. Thank goodness times have changed. I'm the only 60-year-old Dead Head around. Hey, I enjoy rock concerts."

This from the charming, grey-haired host of Channel 9's wholesome Family Classics? It's hard to imagine Leonard, a man so nice that his co-workers dubbed him "Sugar Roy," attending a Grateful Dead concert or listening to an M.C. Hammer rap record.

"Sure, I listen to rap," says Leonard, his voice just as animated in person as it is on the air. "It's taken me a long time to get into it. But by listening, I think I'm beginning to understand. Though, I'm not sure if I like it."

According to Newhouser, Leonard has the kind of open mind and curiosity usually reserved for the so-called younger generation.

"The 'Sugar Roy' thing probably began as a compliment," explains Newhouser. "He's so incredibly enthusiastic, people might think it's an act. It's not. He genuinely loves his job, just loves life."

Leonard may be living proof that nice guys don't necessarily have to finish last. "C'mon, I'm not that nice," insists Leonard. "I'll concede to decent, honorable and polite. Well, I suppose I'm no Morton Downey Jr. You know, if you get terribly controversial and hostile, your chances of longevity will lessen with the amount of controversy you create."

"Roy's thing isn't talking about emotional issues like abortion or the death penalty on the air," says Newhouser. "But he's not sweet and wholesome. He does swear, he doesn't like Reagan, and about subjects he feels comfortable, he loves debating. He just does it with class."

Leonard continues, "I'm nice to my guests because I just don't have people on I don't like. I think it was Tom Jones who was making a comeback and dying to be interviewed a couple of years back. But I remembered when he was hot and I wanted to do the interview, he refused. This time, it was my turn to say, 'No way man.' I felt kind of good about that."

Gloria Vanderbilt is also on the roster of celebs who will never appear on Leonard's show. "We had her on to talk about a needlepoint book, or some such thing. The minute I asked a question about her, I could practically see the hair stand up on the back of her neck." At the commercial break, she bolted - his only guest to ever walk out.

But for the most part, celebs love appearing with the amiable Leonard. On her most recent book tour, Shirley MacLaine specifically requested to hit Chicago to do The Oprah Winfrey Show and The Roy Leonard Show.

"I know the big thing is to put MacLaine down," says Leonard. "To me, she's fascinating. I have a peripheral interest in the occult. How can you not be curious. So, I'm being honest when I tell her I'm interested in her strange behavior."

Leonard tosses out names like the late Pearl Bailey, Burt Reynolds, Mel Brooks, singer Roger Whittaker and Brian Dennehy among his favorites. But you get the feeling that if you ask the same question tomorrow, he'd come up with an altogether different list.

"I like people," he says. "I'm baffled by interviewers who just aren't enjoying themselves."

It's not surprising that Leonard's approach is the antithesis of the in-vogue confrontational interview style. In fact, he'll go out of his way to make his guests feel "at home."

Knowing actor Timothy Dalton was more eager to talk about his theater work than playing James Bond, Leonard dug up an old playbill he had stashed away from Stratford-on-Avon in England. In it was Dalton's photo, playing in Romeo and Juliet. Just as Dalton arrived for the interview, Leonard pulled out the playbill and asked Dalton to sign it. "Later, the publicist told me how pleased Dalton was," Leonard recalls.

And Leonard does his homework. If an actor or director is to appear, Leonard has seen the movie. And if an author appears, Leonard has read the book. "Lots of workaholics spend most of their time talking about how they sacrifice because they're workaholics," says Newhouser. "Roy never complains. But only producers who are workaholics can work for him. He expects his producers to work just as hard. It's not always easy.'

By his own admission, Leonard adds, "I didn't grow up on the other side of the tracks. I grew up on them. Anything I've got, I've worked very, very hard for. Things have never been easy for me."

But he'd never talk about his childhood on the air - or for that matter only rarely off the air. "My old man took off when I was very young; I grew up in foster homes. I didn't meet him until I was in my 20s. Hey, it's over, and it wasn't a horrible Dickens story or anything.'

Leonard was a drama major at Emerson College in Boston where he began working at the school radio station. After two years, he dropped out of school to accept a job at a Salem, Mass. station.

After two and one-half years at Armed Forces Radio and several stints at stations around Boston, he landed at WHDH-Radio and TV in Boston. He was a TV news anchor and reporter. He later joined a cross-town competitor to host a radio version of The Today Show in the early morning hours and managed to anchor the 6 p.m. TV news as well.

Then Curt Gowdey (longtime NBC sportscaster) told Leonard about an opening at WGN. After a brief trial period of filling in for vacationing Wally Phillips, he was hired.

Today, as a dean of Chicago radio, "Sugar Roy" isn't so sweet on the current state of the market. "It's a bore; there's too much crap on the air," he says. "I thought WMAQ (AM 670) would be a big bust, but now I think they'll give WBBM (AM 780) a run for their money. 'BBM sounds old and stuffy, and I can't stand that old-time radio."

Leonard's favorites are Steve Dahl and Garry Meier. "They're the most creative around," he says. "But when Steve starts talking about bodily functions, I switch over to WXRT (FM 93.1)." He also cites Jonathon Brandmeier and Kevin Matthews at WLUP. "I wish I could direct their shows. They're talented people who don't know when to stop."

Leonard himself hasn't slid by all these years without criticism. According to a Magid Research Poll several years back, his audience perceived Leonard as a radio snob.

"Sure, I thought about it," he says candidly. "You have to, if you want to succeed. Sure I like Shakespeare, reading books, and good food and wine-and I make no apologies for that-but now I make a point of saying, 'I pick up after my dog too.' I'm just a guy."

But not many guys see several movies and a play or two each week, and travel to the Big Apple every other month to catch a couple of Broadway shows. Over the past couple of years, the Pied Piper of radio led listener trips to London and the Soviet Union, broadcasting live back to Chicago by satellite. "I have this dream to eventually broadcast live from every major city in the world,"

Typically, Leonard is looking to the future. And retirement isn't a part of the plan. "Hey, I told my wife and my friends, 'If I ever begin to sound my age, give me a swift boot in the rear - and I'll hang it up.' I can't think of anything worse than overstaying my welcome and sounding stale. That's no way to go out. But I have too much to do, to worry about any of that."
