
And Debbie Reynolds will add a new little Karl to her family. Debbie's expecting in July.

A. Nick is very happy doing films. His next will be Hell is for Heroes. He would consider a television series if one were offered to him that he felt was really good.


Q. In recent pictures of Elizabeth Taylor, I notice that she still has a scar on her throat. I thought she had plastic surgery to remove it.



Errol Flynn, William Talman, Charlie Chaplin and Robert Mitchum have set the examples. Can the young stars ignore them?



★ Seventeen-year-old Betty Hansen was a pretty little thing in 1942 when she attended a Hollywood party. Errol Flynn saw her and thought she looked a bit tired so he took her upstairs for a nap. Miss Hansen found he had other things on his mind.

Miss Peggy Lee Satterlee was only 16 when she encountered the great swashbuckler and discovered that he had a passion for young girls.

Both Peggy and Betty brought charges against Errol for statutory rape more than 20 years ago. Beverly Aadland, among others, did not.

But Errol Flynn was only one of the men in an era when vice ran rampant in Hollywood.

Comedian Roscoe "Fatty" Arbuckle was notorious for his wild parties. For many years it was whispered that he was a man for young starlets to avoid. Beautiful Virginia Rappe didn't hear that advice. Or maybe she just didn't heed it. Whatever the case, she died from sexual manhandling and Fatty, though he excaped legal punishment, was publicly disgraced.

Charlie Chaplin was named in a paternity suit by an eighteen-year-old girl. The testimony was so "interesting" that newspapers were unable to publish the details.

In all fairness to Hollywood and to the stars in question, paternity suits were, to many avoricious young

girls, a quick way to make money and get their names in the papers.

But, even taking into account the fact that many paternity suits were trumped-up affairs, there is still no denying that Hollywood, in its heyday, was a hot-bed of immorality of all kinds.

Even as recently as five or six years ago the names that figured in headlines were those of Robert Mitchum jailed on a marijuana charge, Johnathon Winters, Lawrence Tierny, the late Diana Barrymore, all charged with drunkeness.

This is Hollywood's past.

The atmosphere has changed in recent years. Hollywood is now an established city and the brawling days of its youth are gone. For with time, a community settles down into patterns of more normal living.

But the heritage of Hollywood remains. The stories of its lusty past are told as if they happened only yesterday. And it is into this atmosphere that the teenage stars of today are thrust.

Today's teen stars, most of them at any rate, have in their favor one important thing: a strong religious family upbringing and a definite sense of right and wrong.

Annette is devoted to her family and wouldn't dream of leaving home until she married. Because of her religious feelings, marriage is a sac-

rament to her and it must last forever.

But at one time there was criticism of even Annette. Whenever Bobby Rydell, Paul Anka or Fabian came into town, Annette would rush to the plane to welcome them home. Innocent as this gesture of friendship was, she soon became aware that the photographers who eagerly snapped her picture in the embrace of Fabian, Bobby or Paul, were contributing to the kind of reputation she didn't want. She stopped welcoming friends home in public.

Tuesday Weld has stirred up quite a bit of controversy in her few short years on the Hollywood scene. People spoke of her as a throwback to the thirties when anything went for a kick. Tuesday's early teen years were on the wild side. But even she seems to have settled down to work on a blossoming career and a love affair that looks like the real thing. Tuesday is sticking to Gary Lockwood and has found satisfaction in being able to love one man. It's a hopeful ending for a girl whom Hollywood thought would run wild in the tradition of its early years.

For the young male stars, sticking to the straight and narrow is not as easy a task. Temptation is constantly in their path.

Frankie, Fabe, Paul and Bobby are almost constantly on the road. They become lonely and long for family

and friends. In that state, any human contact is acceptable and the boys find no dearth of young girls who would like to know them better.

But there is real danger in an amoral kind of life.

Fidelity is an essential ingredient for marriage. These boys have been taught that by their families and their church. They believe it too. But these lessons, learned early in life, can be torn down by loose living.

For the most part, however, to-day's teens have withstood the temptations of Hollywood admirably. They know how ruinious self-indulgence can be. They have seen that straying from the straight and narrow can mean broken homes and fatherless children. Hollywood's teens have reason to be proud of themselves.

Seemingly, they are not trapped at all. Perhaps they can even establish a new morality.

George's notions on relations with the opposite sex are well known. "I once hit a woman on the head," he stated proudly. "I did it because she deserved it. Because she was trying to see how far she could push me—how far she could go in taking over the masculine role in our relationship.

"Well, I guess I showed her just how far she could go. Because after I hit her she turned into

the softest, sweetest, most feminine creature in the world.

"I think women always test men. And you know, the funny part is that if they win—if the man gives in to them and lets them have their way—they'll begin to hate him.





"THE MAN THAT I MARRY WILL HAVE TO BE..."

★ "It's not that I have a picture of the ideal man in my mind. I know that if a girl keeps waiting for her Prince Charming to come along on a white charger, she never finds anyone who can measure up. That's how old maids are born.

"But since most girls do want to get married, I think it's only sensible to know what is most important to you in a man.

"The man I marry will have to be religious. His beliefs will have to be as important to him as mine are to me. Without that, I don't think we would be able to communicate with each other.

"He will also have to love children because one of my dreams is to have an enormous family. I think there might be some conflict if the man I

married wasn't particularly fond of the patter of little feet.

"I would want him to be kind and gentle; I would want him to think that I was the most beautiful and fascinating woman on the face of the earth. And I would want him to have a zest for life and an enthusiasm for fun. I wouldn't mind if he were an actor or in some way involved in show business—but it wouldn't be necessary to me.

"That's the man I want. A kind, gentle man with a deep faith in God, a sense of humor (because I tell a lot of jokes) and a love for children. What he looks like and what he does for a living won't be important—as long as we love and respect each other."

But somewhere, in every man who feels he's not going to make it, there is a great deal of anger and hostility. Maybe that's why I took up sky-diving. It's a dangerous sport and I very nearly got killed a few times —but it was a release for all my aggression.



Classically simple in cut, the hair is one all-over length to give it body. If your facial contours resemble Dina's, give this one a try. It's easy to care for at home. Just make sure the cutting is done by a professional hair-dresser and watch carefully to see how she sets it and combs it out.

Dinah Shore's a living doll. And her hairstyle reflects the young, bubbling personality she projects. Dinah's hairdo is definitely an informal one but that's our gal! Although on the round side, Dinah's face can carry the medium-short fluffy cut she prefers. The actual cut is graduated; shorter on top and longer at the ears. The natural look is in and Dinah's always been its advocate. No teasing for her. She washes and sets her hair at home twice a week. Big rollers, a jar of setting lotion, half an hour under the dryer and Dinah's ready to go.

We recommend this hairdo for women of any age who want to look younger than their years. It's suitable for almost any facial type. We caution you only on one point: your hair must have a natural curl and lots of body. Fine, straight hair will fall flat.





Natalie Wood has been wearing a "flip." And it looks great. For young girls and women, long hair can be very flattering. It adapts to a variety of styles and enables you to change your personality from chic and sophisticated to innocent and wide-eyed.

Cut in one over-all length, the hair should fall slightly above the shoulder line. Large rollers are used in the set but most important is the combing out. Remember, not too much teasing. The over-teased high beehive look is definitely out!

Pick-a-hairdo





For Connie Francis, finding a good and flattering hair style that needed little attention, had been a problem for a long time. She finally came up with this flipped page boy. It does wonders for her face, softening a hard jaw line. The wispy short bangs narrow a high forehead and call attention to her large brown eyes. The style is set in the usual way with large rollers and just enough teasing to add a little height on top. The length of the hair, a little shorter in the front, comes just to the nape of the neck.

Marguerita Sierra fell in love with the short "poodle cut" a few years ago and decided to stick with it. It calls for very short hair, 1½ to 2" from the scalp. Marguerita finds this "do" easier to set with pin curls than with rollers. She cautions only that the pin curls must be large and loose—not tight by any means. She teases slightly before combing out. You'll find this style ideal for you if your face tends to be round.

Ann-Margret has set out single-handed to revive the old Veronica Lake hair style of the forties.

This hairdo may look as though it needs no care but with this length, utmost precautions must be taken to avoid splitting ends. Ann-Margret has weekly hot oil treatments and shampoos twice weekly. Her hair is one all-over length and after washing, she rolls up the ends on large curlers to her shoulders. We recommend this style only to those who have a great deal of patience and a great deal of youth.





The classic page-boy with a difference is Annette's favorite "do." The difference being that the hair on top is cut short to keep it bouffant and fluffy without much teasing. Annette is one of those few lucky girls whose face is classically oval in shape and whose hair is both thick and curly. This means she can wear any hairstyle with ease.

Longer than usual, and falling below her shoulder line, the hair is cut shorter towards the front. It is set with large rollers and, except for the top, requires no teasing.

Connie Stevens is another long hair addict. But Connie's face is square. And, as any professional hairdresser will tell you, hair toward the face tends to broaden it.

Connie, while she cannot be convinced to shear her long locks, does cut the top and sides into a short "do", leaving herself a pony tail of back hair only. Curly and fluffy on top and at the sides, Connie minimizes a broad jaw by having all the width above her ears. If you, too, cannot bear to part with long hair—and the shape of your face is similar to Connie's, take a tip. You can have the best of both worlds.





The careless, rumpled look that Ziva Rodann sports in this particular hairdo, is both flattering and easy to care for. Even if you are one of the thousands of unfortunate women whose lifeless tresses are the bane of their lives, this style holds out hope. Cut very short, no longer than 2" from the scalp all around, a setting with large rollers after each washing will hold this hairdo all week. Use a setting lotion and, in order to achieve the careless effect, turn every third roller in a different direction.

Dorothy Provine has hair trouble. Her almost platinum locks are baby fine and silky soft. Think it sounds romantic? If you're a girl who has hair like that, you know it's far from being as nice as it sounds. Dot finds the best way to deal with the problem is let it grow. "It's easier to care for," she says, "because on days when it really looks awful, you can just put it up."


