What's New in TV?

Thirty-three shows—that's what! And each is hoping it will turn out to be the winner of the new season. Last year, thirty-six new shows made their debuts on the air. At the end of the season only one-third had survived. The others, together with the hopes and dreams of their stars, and the millions invested by studios and networks went down the drain—some after but a few weeks on the air. This year might bring the same amount of casualties. The thirty-three that will debut are but a small percentage of the shows filmed in pilot form and never bought—which means that only the best of the best will survive. There may be thirty-three new shows, but more than thirty of the stars of these shows have been on our pages before. Most swore they would never do another series again—but all were lured back by the money and the hope that lightning will strike them in the same way it did David Janssen who became a super-star on his second try. The Janssen-Fugitive image is so strong that many of the story lines will imitate it. There's a hero searching for his identity; another searching for fulfillment, still another searching for the best way to spend the last six months of his life. If imitation is the sincerest form of flattery, then "Bewitched," "Man From U.N.C.L.E.," "Gomer Pyle," "Bonanza," "Peyton Place," should be flattered indeed, since many of the new shows—with only slight variations—are following those familiar formats. You'll find out more about the new shows and their players on pages 4-20, so you can join in the game of "is it a hit or a miss?" Most of the new shows are in color with NBC devoting 90% of its schedule to tint, CBS, 50% and ABC close to that. So, for the 5,000,000 color set owners there will be something new indeed. All color shows, old and new, are indicated by an * next to its title.

We've included all the stars and network shows but if a favorite of yours—a Sid Caesar, an E.G. Marshall, a Jim Franciscus is missing—don't blame us. They are gone because their shows are gone—except perhaps as reruns in some key cities. We hope to have them back on our pages soon. And we've arranged a program guide opposite the index on page 72 so you can find out about any star of the show you are watching in seconds. We suggest you keep WHO'S WHO next to your TV set all season. It's the most complete television magazine in the world and the only one of its kind. Hope you like it.

JULIE ANDREWS who has the special of the year on N.B.C., became an instant screen star after her "super-cali-fragil-istic-expi-ali-docious" portrayal of "Mary Poppins," and won an Oscar to boot. Julie was, as the whole world must know, the original *My Fair Lady*, but Hollywood passed Julie up for eight years, gave her role to Audrey Hepburn. But she should worry now. "The Americanization of Emily" and "The Sound of Music" secures her position as a super-star. Born in Wilton-on-the-Thames, England, Julie started singing when she was 10, was a favorite of British theater-goers before she first came to New York for *The Boy Friend*. Wed to Tony Walton, she has a two-year-old daughter named Emma Kate. See her next in James Michner's "Hawaii."

SPECIAL SEASON !!!!!!!

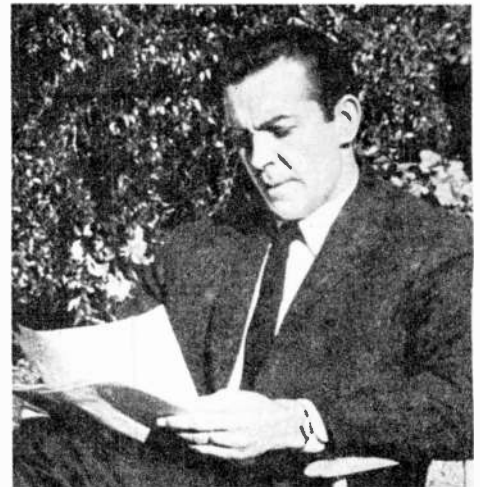
□ If regular programming next season is routine and imitative, the networks have enough specials lined up to keep TV viewing on an exciting and satisfying level.

On tap at CBS are: "The Ages of Man," in which John Gielgud re-enacts Shakespeare's observations on Youth, Manhood and Old Age; "The Andy Griffith Special," a music-comedy delight, reuniting Andy with Don Knotts and Jim Nabors; "The Strolling Twenties," an hour long variety show evoking the tempo, feeling and spirit of Harlem in the 1920's, starring Sidney Poitier, Sammy Davis, Diahann Carroll and host Harry Belafonte; four "New York Philharmonic Young People's Concerts," "A Carol Channing Special," showcasing the star of "Hello Dolly;" a "Tribute To Laurel and Hardy," by an all-star cast; a repeat of "Cinderella," and a repeat of "My Name is Barbra;" together with a new Barbra Streisand special.

The big news at NBC is "The Julie Andrews Special," co-starring Julie and special guest Gene Kelly in a delightful hour of songs and dances. Also at NBC, is "The James Bond Special," with clips from the Sean Connery hit movies. Mary Martin, Danny Thomas, Perry Como and Jack Benny will be popping up with specials as will "The Bell Telephone Hour" and "Hallmark Hall of Fame."

ABC is keeping pace with "Hercules," "The Teenage Revolution," "Jimmy Durante Meets The Lively Arts," four "Sagas of Western Man," nine "American Sportsman," "Mrs. Johnson's Beautification Program," "Alice in Wonderland," "The Dinah Shore Specials," "Sammy Davis Special," "This Proud Land," narrated by Robert Preston, and "A Tour Of Paris," with Rex Harrison and Rachel Roberts. Almost all the specials will be in color.

SEAN CONNERY, the James Bond hero of "Goldfinger," "Dr. No" "To Russia, With Love" and "Thunderball" will be seen in scenes from these flicks on NBC's "James Bond Special." Sean jumped from a walk-on to leads in major films and TV. Born in Edinburgh, Scotland, on August 25, 1930, he quit school at 13 and became a jack-of-all-trades, working as a ball player, van driver. He went from the London company of South Pacific to 1955 film debut in *No Road Back*. Wed to Diane Cilento, he has two kids.



DINAH SHORE has a B.S. degree in sociology from Vanderbilt U., an extracurricular degree in sociability and charm that's kept her a favorite female vocalist. Francis Rose Shore of Winchester, Tenn., chose "Dinah" for her first theme song. The nickname stuck, and is now legal. Her first real limelight was on the "Chamber Music Society of Lower Basin Street" show. Eddie Cantor helped make her a Hollywood singing star. She's got big brown eyes, two children and a contract to appear on a series of ABC specials.

PERRY COMO originally planned to become a barber, took up warbling instead and managed to make a name for himself as a top TV and recording star. Born in Canonsburg, Pa., (May 18) he got his first singing job with Freddy Carlone's band, subsequently signed up with Ted Weems and traveled to Hollywood. A natural for movie musicals, he made his screen debut in "Something For the Boys," went on to star in his own radio and TV shows. Known for his relaxed way of singing, Perry's wed, the father of three and grandfather of one. Between his TV specials he hopes to find time for golfing.



BARBRA STREISAND is only 23, but she's already being billed as one of the greatest female singers of all time. Born April 24, 1942 in the Williamsburg section of Brooklyn, N.Y., Barbra set her heart on a show biz career at an early age, got her first real break after winning an amateur contest at a Greenwich Village night club. After several singing engagements at clubs like the Bon Sair and The Blue Angel, she won a small role in B'way's "I Can Get it For You Wholesale," and finally the lead in "Funny Girl." Her acclaimed "My Name is Barbra" special will be repeated in October and a new one—in color—is set for the Spring.

NEW ON CBS



PETER FALK, who plays O'Brien, was born Sept. 16, 1927 in New York City, didn't decide to become an actor until he was 28 years old. His first jobs were small roles on TV shows and off-Broadway plays, the movie "Murder, Inc.," was his vehicle to stardom. Now an Emmy winner and two time Oscar nominee, he has recently been seen on the screen in "The Great Race" and "It's a Mad, Mad, Mad World." In 1960 Pete married dress designer Alyce Mayo.

ELAINE STRITCH, who plays Miss G., was born in Detroit, Mich., and received most of her education in a convent school. She studied drama in New York, did a few seasons of summer stock before making her B'way debut in the musical, "Angel in the Wings." A fine dramatic actress too, Elaine is now a veteran of all forms of show business.

JOANNA BARNES, who plays Katie, is an authentic debutante—turned actress. Born Nov. 15, 1934 in Boston, Mass., she grew up in high society, became interested in acting while attending Smith College. She made her professional debut in "The Garment Jungle," has been seen frequently on movie and TV screens. Married to actor Lawrence Dabkin.



□ CBS offers this year, as in the past, a season of diversified viewing—everything from science fiction to good old musical variety shows. Since this seems to be the year to emphasize the wild and wooly West, they have also lined up two new cowboy thrillers as well as a couple of situation comedies and one popular detective story.

"The Loner" is a half-hour Western adventure series about a former Union cavalry officer who heads West in the post-Civil War period in search of personal fulfillment and challenge. Lloyd Bridges will be seen in the title role.

"The Wild, Wild West" is the other Western offering which stars Robert Conrad as a government undercover agent whose business takes him to the Western frontier in the post-Civil War days. Not unlike a James Bond character, he headquarters in a plush train, beautifully furnished with pool table, bar, private arsenal and myriad devices designed to do in his adversaries—such as explosive cue balls and smoke bomb pellets.

"Lost in Space" is a science-adventure series about a family hopelessly marooned on an unknown planet as a result of their space craft crash landing. Guy Williams and June Lockhart are husband and wife.

"Hogan's Heroes" is a comedy (yes, comedy!) series dealing with the madcap adventures of allied prisoners in a German prisoner-of-war camp during World War II. Although the Germans think they are running one of the war's tightest and most efficient prison camps, Colonel Hogan (played by Bob Crane) is actually using the facilities as the central European nerve center for sending allied soldiers back to their stations.

"The Trials of O'Brien" stars Peter Falk as a charming, flamboyant lawyer who spends as much time getting himself into trouble as getting his clients out of it.

"The Smothers Brothers Show" has the popular comedy-folk singing team in a show about a junior executive whose serene bachelor life is constantly disrupted by his bumbling roommate.

"Green Acres" is a situation comedy about a successful lawyer (Eddie Albert) who has always cherished a secret dream of being a farmer. When his uncle dies, leaving him a dilapidated farm, he sees a chance to make his dream come true.

"The Steve Lawrence Show," an hour-long musical variety series starring (who else?) Steve Lawrence, and "The CBS Thursday Night Movies" round out the network's new line-up.



the wild west

ROBERT CONRAD, who plays James T. West, hails from Chicago, where he was born Conrad Robert Falk on March 1, 1935. He began his career as a singer but later decided acting was more his cup of tea. Warner Brothers provided his first big break by giving him a long term contract and handing him a co-starring role in the "Hawaiian Eye" TV series. A fan of flamenco music, Bob has also been seen in movies like "Hotel Madrid" and "Young Dillinger."



the loner

LLOYD BRIDGES, who plays William Colton, hails from San Leandro, Calif. Born on Jan. 15, he originally planned to be a lawyer, met up with the acting bug while studying at U.C.L.A. After a brief stint with an off-Broadway company in New York, he was spotted by a movie scout, sent back to Calif., where he's been working ever since. This is his third TV series. He was formerly the star of "Sea Hunt" and "The Lloyd Bridges Show."

ROSS MARTIN, who plays Artemus Gordon, was born March 22 in Grodek, Poland, but came to the U.S. with his family when he was only a few days old. He grew up in New York City where he took part in amateur contests, later worked in vaudeville and radio. As his career zoomed, he began to be seen frequently on TV, was in "Hazel Flagg" and "Shinbone Alley" on Broadway. A former regular of the "Mr. Lucky" TV series, Ross is a bachelor, in movies' "Great Race."





lost in space



BILLY MUMY, who plays Will, broke into show biz in 1958 by appearing on a local children's TV show in Los Angeles. His performance caught the eye of a casting director and he soon found himself with a full fledged career which includes pics like "Dear Brigitte" and "Palm Springs Weekend." Born Feb. 1, 1954 in San Gabriel, Calif., he spends his free time playing baseball, boating and riding his own horses, Maggie and Monty.

MARK GODDARD, who plays Don West, was born July 24, 1936 in Lowell, Mass., became interested in acting while attending Holy Cross College in Worcester, Mass. He first sought a career in New York, but finally decided he'd rather try Hollywood. He has had running parts in 3 previous TV series, "Johnny Ringo," "The Detectives," "Many Happy Returns," has been in movie. He lives in Beverly Hills.

JUNE LOCKHART, who plays Maureen Robinson, is the daughter of the late Gene Lockhart, made her professional debut when she was only 8 years old. Born June 25 in New York City, she grew up in Beverly Hills, has been seen in movies like "The Yearling" and in B'way shows like "For Love or Money." She had a 6-year stint as the mather on the "Lassie" series. June married to architect John Lindsey, has 2 girls.

ANGELA CARTWRIGHT is a little English miss who crossed over to Canada when she was a tot, and eventually made the long journey to Hollywood where she was launched on a movie and TV career. Born on Sept. 9, 1952, Angela was signed for *The Danny Thomas Show* after just one audition, then went on to do her first film, *Lad: A Dog*. In her spare time Angela studies dancing, hopes to make acting a permanent career.

EDDIE ALBERT, nee Eddie Albert Heimberger, was born April 22 in Rock Island, Ill. He broke into show biz as a singer, later became the co-star of a radio show called "The Honeymooners—Grace and Eddie." His B'way debut in "Brother Rat" set his career into full swing, led to movies like "Captain Newman" and "Seven Women," roles in practically every major TV show. Wed to actress Margo, Eddie has a son, Edward, an adopted daughter, Maria.



EVA GABOR, who's thrilled with the idea of starring in her first TV series, is the youngest (?) (!) of the three Budapest bombshells, and perhaps the most talented, having been a cafe singer and champion ice skater before deciding to take a movie job in *The Happy Time* and returned to the stage last season in *Tovarich*. Thrice married, and thrice divorced. Eva's now happily wed to a fourth, Dick Brown.

MARTA KRISTEN, who plays Judy, was born in Oslo, Norway, Feb. 26, 1945 and was orphaned at the age of two weeks. Four years later she was adopted by an American couple and brought to the states. Discovered while dining at a drive-in restaurant in H'wood, she has been seen on such TV shows as "Dr. Kildare," in movies like "Beach Blanket Bingo." Marta's married.

GUY WILLIAMS, who plays Prof. John Robinson, was formerly known to TV viewers as the swashbuckling hero of the "Zorro" series. A native of New York City, he was born on Jan. 14, got his first big acting break in a "Studio One" production. 6'3" tall, handsome Guy is married to a former model and is the father of two adorable children, Steve, 13 and Toni, 7.



BOB CRANE, who plays Col. Robert Hogan, began his career as a drummer, working with name dance bands as well as the Connecticut Symphony Orchestra. In 1950 he gave up the drum beating and turned to radio, was the star of his own show for nearly 10 years. Born July 13 in Waterbury, Conn., he's also appeared on numerous TV shows and has been in such films as "Return to Peyton Place." Bob's married and the father of 3 children.



IVAN DIXON appears as Sgt. Kinchloe in "Hogan's Heroes." This ambitious young man was born in New York on April 6 and done everything as an actor, from walk-ons, stand-in to stunts. He appeared on B'way in "Raisin in the Sun" and repeated the movie version. He has been much acclaimed for his performance in "Nothing But A Man." He lives in Altadena, Calif. with his wife of 11 years, Berlie, who was a college classmate.



JOHN BANNER, who plays Sgt. Hans Schultz, was born in Vienna, Austria on Jan. 28, 1910. He was a successful actor in his native country until Hitler came along; then he headed for America and a new start. After appearing in two New York shows, he went to Hollywood and had no trouble being cast in movies such as "Blue Angel" and "The Interns," many major TV shows. John and his wife Christine make their home in Sherman Oaks, Calif.



WERNER KLEMPERER is the son of Otto Klemperer, the famous conductor. Werner was born in Cologne, Germany, where his father was conductor of the Opera and his mother the lead soprano. The family emigrated to Los Angeles in 1935 and he studied acting at the Pasadena Playhouse, graduated, and set out for New York to try his luck. War interrupted his efforts, but after the service, he appeared in many B'way plays. He is married and has a son.

hogan's heroes*



RICHARD DAWSON is the Englishman who plays Peter Newkirk. He was born Nov. 20, 1934 and began acting in repertory when he was 18. He played for two years at a salary of \$8.40 per week when he decided that man cannot live by dramatic acting and decided to turn to humor. He pawned himself off as a well known Canadian comic and found work. He came to the U.S. in 1962. He is married to actress Diana Dors.

LEONID KINSKY has appeared in hundreds of movies but few people have associated his name with his familiar and amusing face. With this TV show—that will finally change. A writer and lyricist as well as an actor, Leonid was born in St. Petersburg, Russia on April 18, 1903, was on stage in Russia, Germany, Poland and South America before coming to this country to make his screen debut in 1932's *Trouble In Paradise*.

TOM AND DICK SMOTHERS are both natives of New York City, were born Feb. 2, 1937 and Nov. 20, 1939 respectively. Sons of an Army officer, they spent their early years in the Philippines, became interested in show biz while at San Jose State College near San Francisco. Their big break came when they landed a job at S.F.'s "Purple Onion" nightclub and their folk singing comedy act turned out to be a howling success. Both brothers are wed.

STEVE LAWRENCE headlined the first of the "Sneak Preview" specials last season and wound up with his own weekly music variety show on CBS. But Steve always had a way of succeeding in everything. Born in Brooklyn, New York in 1935, he learned singing from his father who was a cantor in a local synagogue. He went on to win the "Arthur Godfrey Talent Scouts" contest and was soon picked up to be a regular on the old "Steve Allen Show." Another regular was singer Eydie Gorme who shortly became Mrs. Lawrence and the mother of their two youngsters. Steve continued to hit it big as a guest star on many TV shows, in records and in night clubs and last year made a name for himself on Broadway as the prize-winning star of the musical "What Makes Sammy Run." With this TV show, he has only one new field to conquer—movies. That should come next.

DEAN MARTIN hosted NBC-TV's Thanksgiving Special last season and had such a ball he was finally persuaded to take on a weekly hour of his own. Dean, who was born in Steubenville, Ohio on June 17, 1917, was a fighter, mill-hand and gas-station attendant before he joined Jerry Lewis in an act at Atlantic City's 500 Club in 1946. They literally tore the house down and went on to sensational things together on radio, in night-clubs and in films. Then the two split up, and Dean concentrated on making a name for himself as a dramatic actor as well as a singer and did just great. Once divorced, he has four children from that first marriage, three with wife Jeanne Biegger.

■ Dean Martin leads off the new NBC line-up this season—but don't let that fool you. His is the only variety/musical show on the network. This year NBC is leaning heavily on shows with appeal to men; situation comedies for ladies.

Mr. Roberts, based on the play of the same name, is a comedy-drama about the adventures and misadventures of the captain and crew of the cargo ship USS Reluctant, who operate far behind the lines in the South Pacific during World War II. **The Wackiest Ship in the Army** is an hour-long comedy adventure series. The ship in the title, the USS Kiwi, is an old, leaky, 2-masted sailing schooner on secret espionage missions in the South Pacific during W.W. II. **Convoy** is a dramatic series about the men and women who crossed the submarine-infested North Atlantic during the critical years of W.W.II. **The Streets of Laredo** is the western and it's all about four Texas rangers based in Laredo during the brawling 1890's. **Run For Your Life** is the fugitive drama which concerns a man who has been informed that he has only 18 months to live. Deciding to enjoy life to the fullest, he journeys to exotic locales and becomes involved in various adventures along the way. **I Spy** is an

adventure-comedy dealing with the activities of a pair of American Intelligence agents who hide their identities and roam the world as two apparently happy-go-lucky freeloaders. The situation comedies include **Please Don't Eat the Daisies**, based on Jean Kerr's best seller about a suburban family; **Mona McClusky**, the story of a movie star who marries an Air Force sergeant and promises to live on his income; **Hank**, the story of a high school drop out who acquires a college education by attending classes disguised as various other people; **I Dream of Jeannie**, the adventures of a genie named Jeannie who has befriended an astronaut against his wishes; **Camp Runamuck**, a spoof of life in a boy's camp and a girl's camp; **My Mother, the Car**, about a small town lawyer whose dear, departed mother decides to "come back" to help him with her advice in the form of a 1928 auto; **The John Forsythe Show**, which has John in the role of a bachelor who becomes headmaster of an exclusive San Francisco school for girls; and **Get Smart**, which has a character called Secret Agent 86 spoofing current fictional cloak-and-dagger heroics. NEW ON NBC

ROGER SMITH back on TV and welcome, was discovered by James Cagney while in the Navy in Honolulu. What was Cagney doing there? The film version of "Mr. Roberts," that's what. Cagney gave Roger some references in Hollywood and Roger looked them up after his discharge from the service. An agent got him a contract, he made some films, then went into TV's 77 Sunset Strip. When he left that show he concentrated on cafe work, stock, until this job. Born Dec. 18, 1932. Roger's divorced from Victoria Shaw, has two children.

GEORGE IVES considers the role of Doc a gem, and George should know. He's a vet of numerous Broadway plays going way back to the original "Janie," and his TV credits are too numerous to mention. Name a show that originated from Hollywood or New York and George was on it. He, personally, originates from New York City. Decided to become an actor in his teens. Born Jan. 19, 1925.

RICHARD X. SLATTERY, who plays the nasty Captain Morton, was once a very nice New York policeman, and appropriately enough started his career as an actor in police training films. He appeared on Broadway and in films and was briefly in the TV series "The Gallant Men." Slattery hails from New York City.

STEVE HARMON, featured as Ensign Pulver, comes to this series from an acting-singing-dancing roll in the off-Broadway musical, "Cindy." Steve has been a partner in various Broadway and TV shows for Carol Haney, Carol Lawrence and Gwen Verdon and has appeared as a dancer on such major TV shows as the Perry Como series. Born in Brooklyn, N. Y., Dec. 13, 1940, Steve attended The High School of Performing Arts.

JACK WARDEN takes his TV series plunge in the role of Major Simon Butcher, a crusty regular army vet. Warden previously would get the nod when a slow-witted screen meanie was called for. But he is a versatile actor, as his many film and television credits prove. Born in Newark, N.J., he was headed for a career in sports when the acting bug hit. Stock, TV, B'way led to his first pic, "Bachelor Party" in 1956. He was very memorable in "Twelve Angry Men."



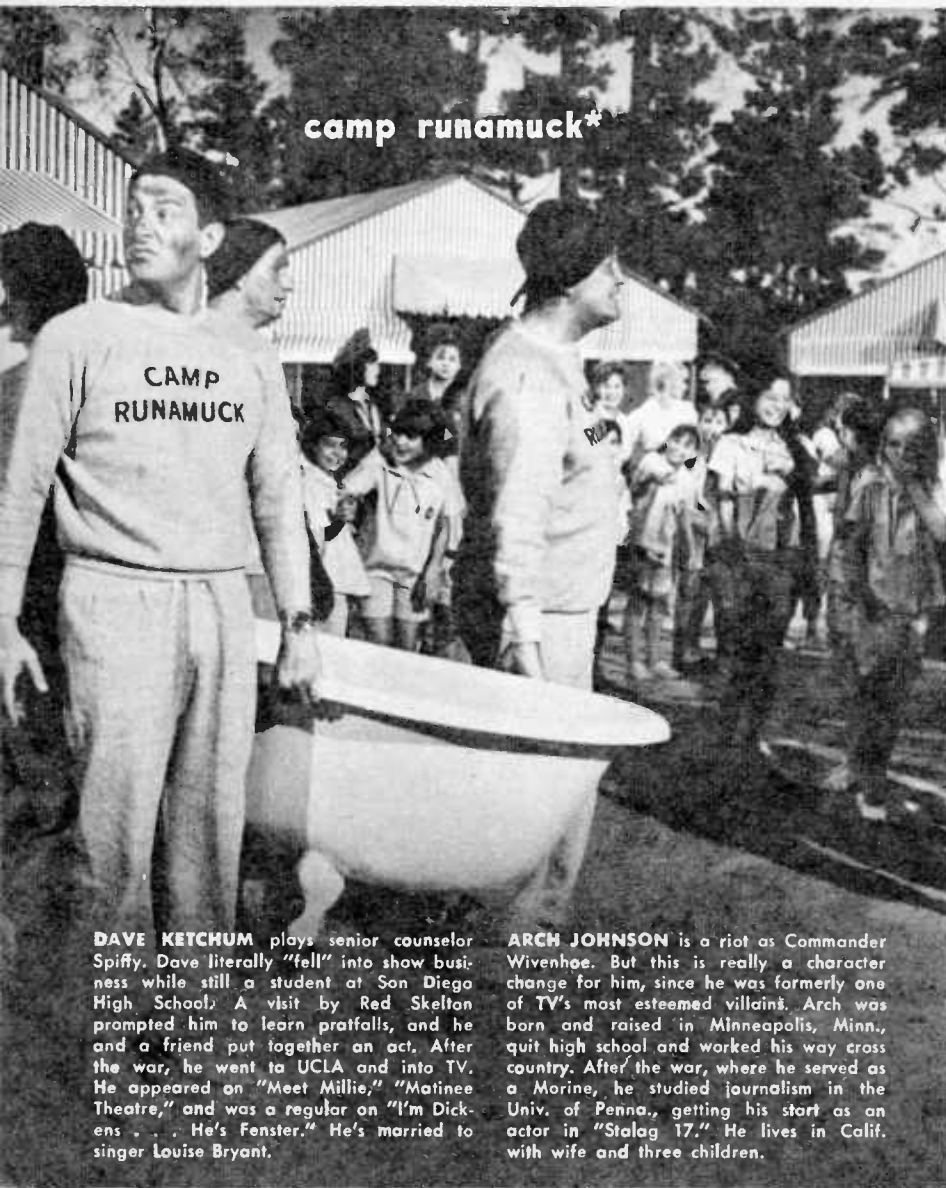

"Okay, Crackerby!" is the network's new situation comedy which stars Burl Ives as an Oklahoma widower with untold millions—and a special genius for doing all the wrong things, socially.

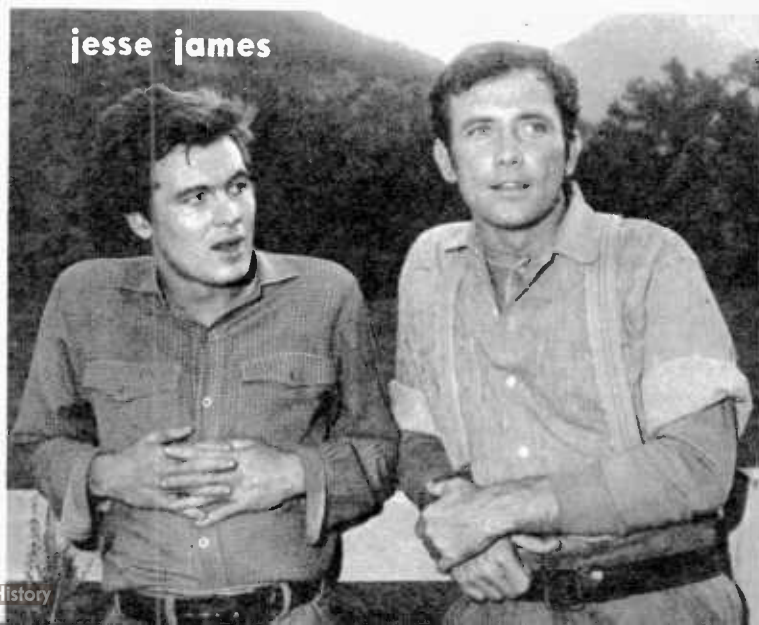

RICHARD EVANS who plays Paul Hanley, first planned to be an artist, gave up the palette when he discovered acting was more fun. The Plot to Knock "Peyton Place" off the Air

■ ■ "A worthy candidate for the TV trash barrel." That descriptive sentence pretty much sums up the way the critics felt after the debut of *Peyton Place* last fall. These noble men of authority labeled the show "dirty," "immoral," "unfit for decent people," and almost before the ink had dried on their critiques, a band of outraged citizens who shared their opinions gathered together to work out a plan—a plan to throw *Peyton Place* off the air.

Women's clubs, P.T.A.'s and other organizations organized a campaign to bring a swift end to the so-called "sex serial." Their first step was to bombard TV stations and publications with letters of protest, insisting there was no place in the television industry for a program that dealt so openly and blatantly with such shocking subjects as adultery and illegitimacy. It was contaminating the nation's young people, they said. True, the kiddie car set was likely to be in bed at viewing time, but impressionable teenagers were very much awake and were all likely to end up as juvenile delinquents as a result of exposure to the show. And in view of this, they angrily demanded that *Peyton Place* be removed from the airwaves for once and for all.

Naturally, network officials were disturbed by this turn of events. They had hoped TV's first nighttime serial would be a huge success; now they began to wonder whether they hadn't been too optimistic. Perhaps the public wasn't ready for the realism *Peyton Place* offered—perhaps it really would have to be taken off the air. But then someone remembered the Nielsen ratings. According to the polls, the show was one of the top ten on TV and was watched by some 60,000,000 people. And so, armed with this vote of confidence, the series triumphantly completed its first season.

The plotters refused to be discouraged, though, and they put all their energies into stopping plans for a *second season*. But by this time, the voice of the opposition was hardly heard. *Peyton Place* had tasted success for a whole year, and its residents had no intention of moving away. And, what's more, the critics now encouraged them to stay. "The show has held up extraordinarily well," said one scribe. "Any criticism of it being 'dirty' is unjustified." The result? *Peyton Place* was not only renewed—it'll be shown 3 times weekly this season. And if that isn't proof of acceptance—what is? ■ ■



TIM O'CONNOR who plays Elliot Carson, was born July 3 on Chicago's rough South Side, took up acting in 1948 after a friend suggested enrolling in a school for radio drama. RECORD STARS

LESLIE GORE decided she wanted to be a singer when she was 3 years old, reached her goal at 17 with her first record, *It's My Party*. Born May 2, 1946 in Tenafly, N.J., this petite teen now manages to combine a fast flying career with her studies at Sarah Lawrence college, sandwiching in TV and personal appearances between exams and proms. SHIRLEY ELLIS won an amateur night contest at New York's Apollo Theater five years ago and has been methodically working her way to stardom ever since. A native of New York, she got experience by performing at local clubs and dances and worked for a while with a jazz group, The Metro-nomes, singing everything from rock 'n' roll to Calypso. A few months ago she recorded a song called *The Nitty Gritty*, followed it up with *The Name Game* and *The Clapping Song* and rocketed to fame. Her exhausting schedule of recording, TV and personal appearance dates doesn't leave her much free time these days, designs her clothes when she has a moment to spare. Married.



JOAN BAEZ is of Mexican-Irish descent, began playing the guitar and singing folk songs while in her teens. Born 24 years ago in Boston, Mass., she began her career singing in local clubs, appeared at the Newport Folk Festival in 1959 and received rave reviews. She's made personal appearances at colleges and concert halls all over the country, has done TV shows like *Folk Sound, U.S.A.*, records for Vanguard Records. Recent top single: *Lonesome Road*.



DUSTY SPRINGFIELD's real last name is O'Brien. Born in London 23 years ago, she was educated at a convent, began her career singing with her brother's group. When the group broke up, she decided to solo, has been going strong ever since. A green-eyed blonde, Dusty's considered one of England's top three female singers, is making a hit in this country with records like *I Only Want to be With You* and *Stay Awhile*. So far, she's still single.

THE SUPREMES are known individually as Mary Wilson, Diana Ross and Florence Ballard. All natives of Detroit, Mich., the girls began singing together in high school, won a local talent contest in 1962 and landed a recording contract with Motown Records. Their first hit was *I Want a Guy* and they've managed to keep at the top of the charts with songs like *Stop! In the Name of Love* and *Back in My Arms Again*. Popular TV performers, the trio has appeared on both *Shindig* and *Hullabaloo* as well as a number of other top shows. The girls are all the same age—that age being a mere 21.



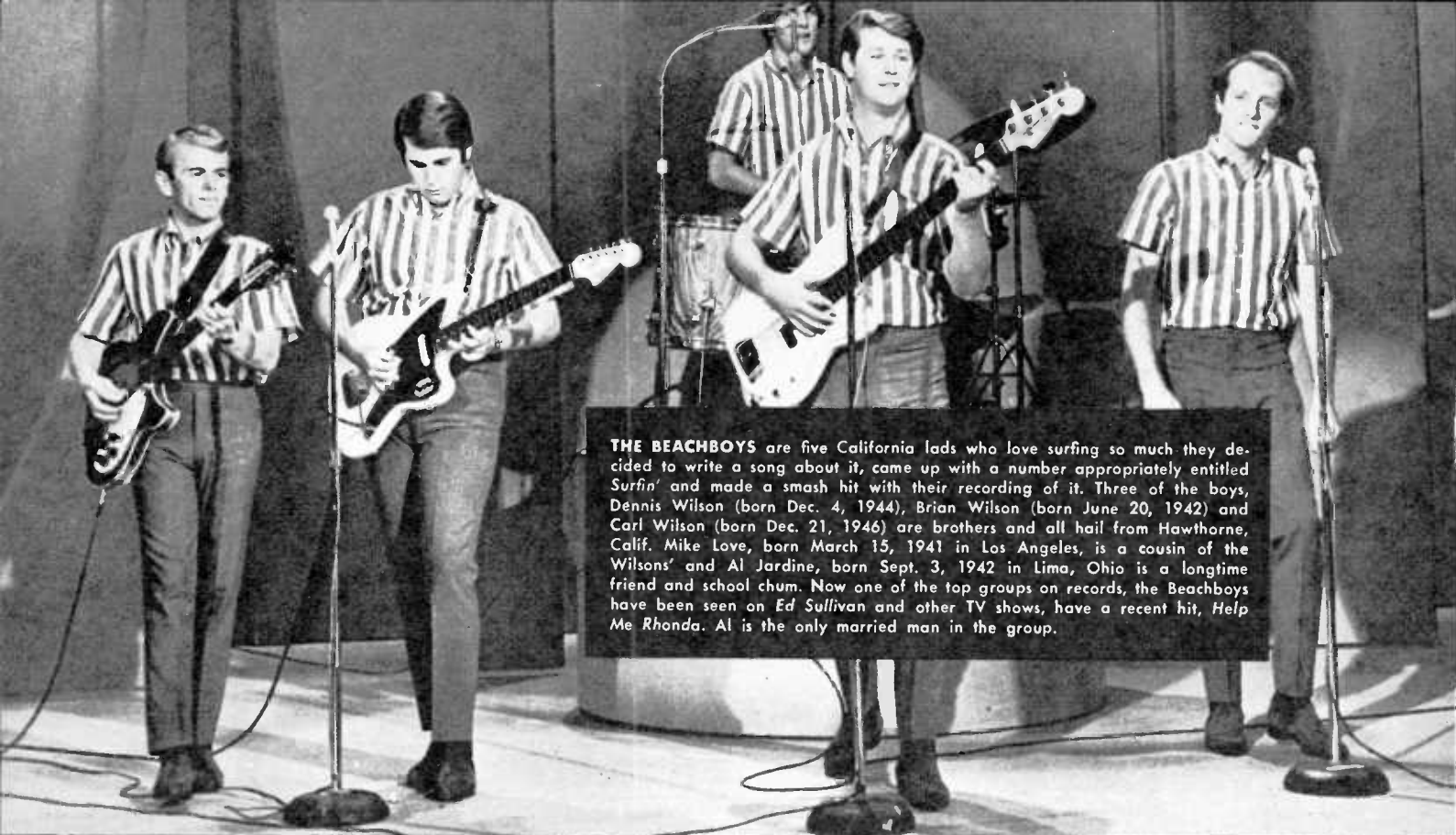

BOBBY VINTON is a 29-year-old dreamboat from Canonsburg, Pa. The son of a band leader, he began playing the clarinet at the age of 8, had organized his own band by the time he reached high school. After graduating from Duquesne University in 1958, he decided to try his luck as a singer, reached the top of the charts in 1962 with *Roses Are Red*. Now a star of nightclubs and television, he has appeared in a movie, *Surf Party*, was named "Most Promising Male Singer of the Year" by *Billboard* magazine. Married to Dolly Dobbin since Dec. 17, 1962, Bobby's the proud father of a little boy.



THE BEACHBOYS are five California lads who love surfing so much they decided to write a song about it, came up with a number appropriately entitled *Surfin'* and made a smash hit with their recording of it. Three of the boys, Dennis Wilson (born Dec. 4, 1944), Brian Wilson (born June 20, 1942) and Carl Wilson (born Dec. 21, 1946) are brothers and all hail from Hawthorne, Calif. Mike Love, born March 15, 1941 in Los Angeles, is a cousin of the Wilsons' and Al Jardine, born Sept. 3, 1942 in Lima, Ohio is a longtime friend and school chum. Now one of the top groups on records, the Beachboys have been seen on *Ed Sullivan* and other TV shows, have a recent hit, *Help Me Rhonda*. Al is the only married man in the group.



GERRY AND THE PACEMAKERS are four lads from Liverpool who have starred in a full length motion picture, *Ferry Cross the Mersey*, and have had lots of top records. Gerry's full name is Gerry Marsden and he was born in Liverpool on Sept. 24, 1942. He organized his first group when he was 17, but didn't find fame until this present team was formed in 1961. He plays lead guitar and sings solo vocals. Freddy Marsden, Gerry's brother, was born Frederick John Marsden, Oct. 23, 1940 and is the Pacemakers' drummer. Les Maguire, who plays the piano and does vocals, was born in Wallasey on Dec. 27, 1941. The group's only married man, Les' wife is a German beauty named Brigitte. Les Chadwick, plays bass guitar, was born on May 11, 1943.

RECORD STARS



JAY BLACK used to be a shoe salesman before becoming the leader of Jay and the Americans. Born Nov. 2, 1941, he organized the group in 1961, led them to fame and fortune with platters like *Think of the Good Times*. The other Yankee lads include Kenny Vance, born Dec. 9, 1943, Sandy Deane, born Jan. 30, 1943, Marty Sanders, guitarist, born Feb. 28, 1941 and Howie Kane, born June 6, 1942.



ANTHONY GOURDINE is known as "Little Anthony," but since joining up with the Imperials, he's found big, big success. Born Jan. 8 in Brooklyn, N.Y., he sang with the DuPonts while still in high school, became leader of the present team in 1958. His fellow harmonizers are Sam Strain, first tenor, born Dec. 9, Ernie Wright, second tenor, born August 24 and Clarence Collins, baritone-bass, born March 17.

FREDDIE AND THE DREAMERS are comedians as well as musicians. While they sing and play hits like *I'm Telling You Now* and *You Were Made For Me*, the boys clown around, make faces and dance their own original dance, "The Freddie." These lovable zanies, who used to perform in Manchester, England night clubs are led by a lively 22-year-old named Freddie Garrity and include Derek Quinn, 21, lead guitar and harmonica, Roy Crewdson, 22, rhythm guitar, piano and drums, Peter Birrell, 22, bass guitar and accordion and Bernie Dwyer, 22, drums and piano. They've appeared in a movie, *Seaside Swingers*, and created a sensation with their U.S. tour which included performances on *Hullabaloo* and *Shindig* as well as personal appearances and concert dates.



THE ANIMALS used to be known as the Alan Price Combo, received their present moniker from fans who thought they looked and sounded like animals. The English group got their start playing in clubs around Newcastle, hit it big with a record called *The House of the Rising Sun*. Their names and statistics are as follows: John Steel, drums, born Feb. 4, 1941 in Gateshead, Co. Durham; Eric Victor Burdon, vocal, born May 11, 1941 in Newcastle-on-Tyne; Bryan James Chandler, bass guitar, born Dec. 18, 1938 in Newcastle-on-Tyne; Alan Price, organ, piano, guitar, born April 19, 1942 in Fatfield, Co. Durham and Hilton Stuart Patterson Valentine, guitar, born May 22, 1943 in North Shields, Northumberland. All are single except Jahn, who is wed and a dad.



GARY LEWIS, who will turn 20 in October, is the son of Jerry Lewis, organized "The Playboys" about a year ago to play at parties and fraternity dances. Now that they've made such a hit with discs like *This Diamond Ring* and *Count Me In*, they're playing on *Ed Sullivan* and other top TV shows. The Playboys are Dave Walker, Jahn R. West, Al Ramsey and Dave Castell. They will be seen in a movie. *The Family Jewels*.



HERMAN's real name is Peter Noone and he was born in Manchester, England on Nov. 5, 1947. He originally wanted to be an actor, appeared on TV and in plays as a child. The Hermits include Karl Green, bass guitar, born July 31, 1947; Derek Leckenby, lead and rhythm guitar, born May 14, 1943; Barry Whitman, drums, born July 21, 1946 and Keith Hapwood, lead and guitar, born Oct. 26, 1946.

THE ROLLING STONES are perhaps the least well groomed of the current crop of young stars, but their fans think their music makes up for this small flaw. Having banded together in 1962, the boys are Brian Jones, leader, born Feb. 22, 1944, Keith Richard, lead guitar, born Dec. 18, 1943, Charlie Watts, drums, born June 2, 1941, Bill Wyman, guitar, born Oct. 24, 1941 (he's the only married Stone) and Mick Jagger, harmonica and lead singer, born July 26, 1944.

PETER YARROW taught a folk ballad course at Cornell U. before embarking on the performing end of the music business. An appearance on the CBS spectacular, *Folk Sound, U.S.A.*, in 1960 led to a cross country tour in which he did a solo act, singing and playing the guitar. A year later he joined the trio that is now world famous. Born in New York City in 1937, Peter is also an accomplished artist, having sold his first work at age of seven.



JACK JONES is considered by Frank Sinatra to be the "next major singing star of show business." The son of Allan Jones and Irene Hervey, Jack was born Jan. 14, 1938 in Los Angeles, got his start singing in his pop's nightclub act. Branching out on his own, he made a movie, *Juke Box Rhythm*, signed a contract with Kapp Records, made appearances on TV shows. A two time Grammy Award winner, he is divorced and the father of a little girl.



PAUL STOOKEY began his career as a stand-up comic, a far cry from the folk music world of which he is now a part. Born in 1937 in Birmingham, Mich., he played the electric guitar on local TV as a teenager, headed for New York after graduating from Michigan State U. As a comic, he became the highest paid entertainer in Greenwich Village but gave up the laughs after meeting with Peter and Mary. And, obviously, it was worth it.



LIZA MINNELLI has two famous and talented parents, so it's no wonder she became a star before she was out of her teens. The daughter of Judy Garland and movie director Vincente Minnelli, she was born in Los Angeles, Calif. on March 12, 1946. She began studying dancing at 7, made her stage debut at 17 in *Best Foot Forward*. Now the star of a B'way show, *Flora, the Red Menace*, Liza's a TV and record favorite. Engaged to Peter Allen.



MARY ALLIN TRAVERS was born in Louisville, Ky. in 1937, but did most of her growing up in New York City. As a teenager, she sang with teen folk groups, appeared at Carnegie Hall twice and cut 3 records. In 1957 she was in the chorus of B'way's *The Next President*, after which she took a brief hiatus from show biz to work at an ad agency. A meeting with Paul in 1961 convinced her she belonged on stage, and she's been there since.



WAYNE NEWTON first embarked upon show biz at the age of 13, when he and his brother, Jerry, sang and played instruments at Las Vegas' Fremant Hotel. He wrote a song called *Yesterday's Gone* and as soon as he and his friend recorded it, they were on their way to stardom. Chad's been wed to a model named Jill since June 1, 1964.



JEREMY CLYDE is the son of a successful British movie producer and the grandson of the Duke of Wellington. Born March 22, 1941 in Buckinghamshire, England, he attended Eton, among other exclusive schools. Still unmarried, he's an enthusiastic girl watcher, likes riding, tennis and swimming when he can tear himself away from the ladies. Jeremy's an actor as well as a musician, will be doing a play in London sometime next year.

PETULA CLARK was a big star in Europe long before her recording of *Downtown* made her famous in the U.S.A. Born Nov. 15 in Derby, England, she made her show business debut at the age of 9, singing and reciting poems on Britain's BBC. At 12, she had snagged a movie contract and by the time she was out of her teens she had traveled all over Europe and had turned out hit records in no less than six languages. JOHN DAVIDSON has signed a long term ABC contract which means you'll be seeing this popular recording and TV star on such shows as "Shindig," "Hollywood Palace" as well as on his own specials. Just 23, the 6' tall, blue-eyed black haired idol became a star after last season's ill-fated "The Entertainers," and Hallmark's TV version of "The Fantasticks." A bachelor, John was born in White Plains, N.Y. the son of a baptist minister. After college, he went into modeling, did TV commercials, scored on Broadway in "Foxy." His Colpix albums are best-sellers.



THE DAVE CLARK FIVE call their brand of madness the "Tottenham Sound," Tottenham being the London district where Dave was born on Dec. 15, 1942. The fellows met at a youth club, banded together in 1960 and have sung at Buckingham Palace as well as on *Ed Sullivan* and other TV shows. Sammy was born in New York City, Dec. 8, 1925. Wed to May Britt, they have 2 kids (one adopted). He's now wowing them on Broadway in *Golden Boy*, in films' *Three Penny Opera*, *Nightmare in the Sun*. New record: *No One Can Live Forever*.



BOBBY DARIN is another singing star who wants to be known as an actor and so far, it looks as though he can give his vocal cords a rest. Sandra Dee's husband, her leading man in *That Funny Feeling*, and the father of their son, Dodd, was born in New York on May 14, 1937, attended Hunter College, then went the singing route. ROBERT GOULEY was known as "Canada's only matinee idol" before he came to America for Camelot. His extreme good looks and singing voice made him a sensation in this country as well, and he continues to keep the ladies drooling. Wed to Carol Lawrence (mother of his new son), Bob has a daughter, Nicole, by a former marriage. "I'd Rather Be Rich" and "Honey-moon Hotel" were his films. 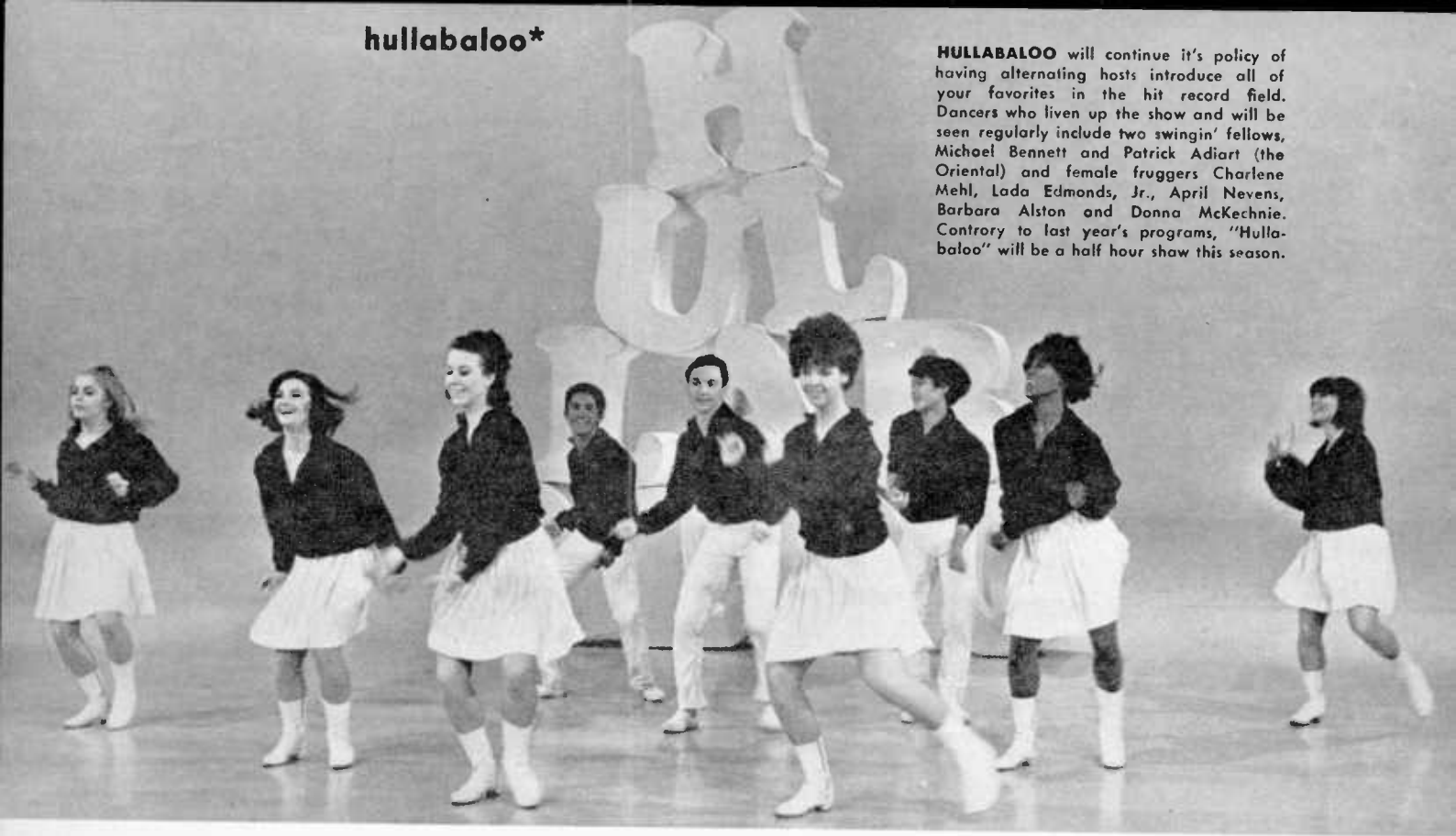

HULLABALOO will continue its policy of having alternating hosts introduce all of your favorites in the hit record field. Dancers who live up to the show and will be seen regularly include two swingin' fellows, Michael Bennett and Patrick Adiart (the Oriental) and female fruggers Charlene Mehl, Lada Edmonds, Jr., April Nevens, Barbara Alston and Donna McKechnie. Contrary to last year's programs, "Hullabaloo" will be a half hour show this season.

DICK CLARK is still on "American Bandstand" over ABC-TV, has so far survived his divorce from wife Barbara, and the payola scandals. Born Nov. 29, 1929 in Mount Vernon, N.Y., Dick began as an announcer and dee-jay on small stations after college, hit it big with "Dick Clark Show" telecast out of Philly. 

Flipper, the show's feminine star, is really named Suzy. She hails from Marineland, California.

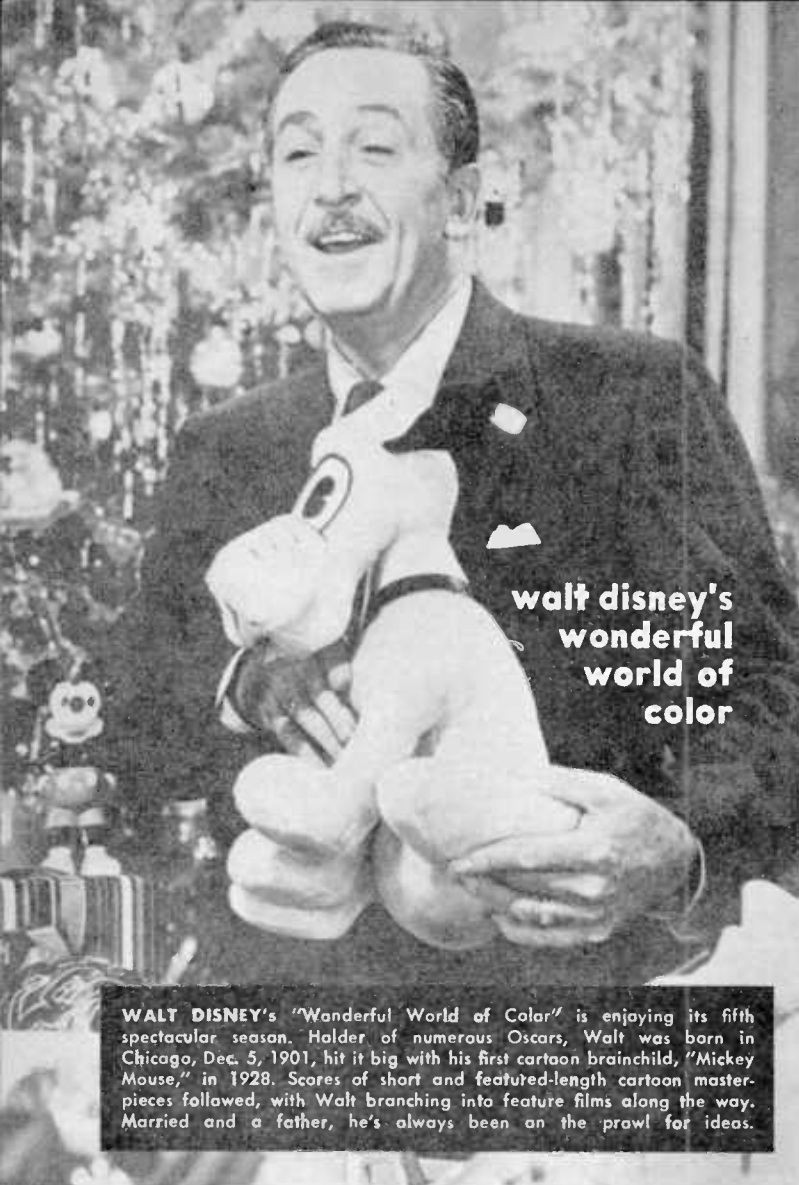

This cartoon series which is highlighted by the appearance of Cecil, the Seasick Sea Serpent, also includes Captain Huffenpuff and his nephew Beany. Adventures take place anywhere in, under and out of this world and they usually involve the problem of fending off the arch-villain, Dishonest John. The show, produced by Bob Clampett, has been an emmy winner 3 times since it began.

bugs bunny



"**THE BUGS BUNNY SHOW**" continues being seen over ABC-TV. This half-hour entertainment features the Academy Award-winning rabbit in the dual role of master of ceremonies and performer. Other "actors" include Speedy Gonzales, Daffy Duck, Yosemite Sam, Sylvester, Porky Pig and Elmer Fudd. The cartoons are produced at the Warner Brothers Studio. Mel Blanc is the voice not only of Bugs Bunny but of the other characters who appear regularly.

fireball XL5



"**FIREBALL XL5**," created by Gerry and Sylvia Anderson and shown on NBC, is a first of its kind: a science-fiction puppet series. The episodes revolve around the XL5, the world's largest rocket ship. It is commanded by Col. Steve Zodiac, who is assisted by Professor Mathew Matic and Venus, a beautiful woman doctor of space medicine. The puppets' mouths are activated by the actual sound waves of the pre-recorded voices. Result: near-perfect synchronization.

hector heathcote



"**THE HECTOR HEATHCOTE SHOW**" is an animated cartoon program featuring segments of "Hector Heathcote," "Sidney the Elephant" and "Hashimoto." The voices are all done by John Myhers and Dayton Allen. Hector is a little fellow who was present everywhere history was made: at Washington's crossing of the Delaware and Paul Revere's ride. Sidney is a lovable beast who knocks over forests unintentionally. Hashimoto is a mouse who knows judo.

mighty mouse



"**MIGHTY MOUSE**" was born 15 years ago at Terrytoons, a cartoon studio in New York. He started out in life as a tiny church mouse but has grown considerably through the years. The longest running network TV cartoon show, "Mighty Mouse" has been on CBS for the past eight years. His adventures usually involve outrunning and outsmarting a mouse's traditional enemy: the cat, and when everything else fails, "Mighty" zooms into the sky for reprisals.

"**THE BULLWINKLE SHOW**," an animated cartoon series in color is now in its second season on NBC-TV. Each show has opening and closing episodes relating the cliffhanger adventures of Bullwinkle, the only moose in the world who walks on two legs. Other regular segments include "Fractured Fairy Tales," with Edward Everett Horton narrating, and the zany adventures of Dudley Do-Right, a Northwest Mountie. The show is designed for adults and kids.

"**THE FLINTSTONES**" ABC's long running cartoon show is enjoyed by adults as much as by children. 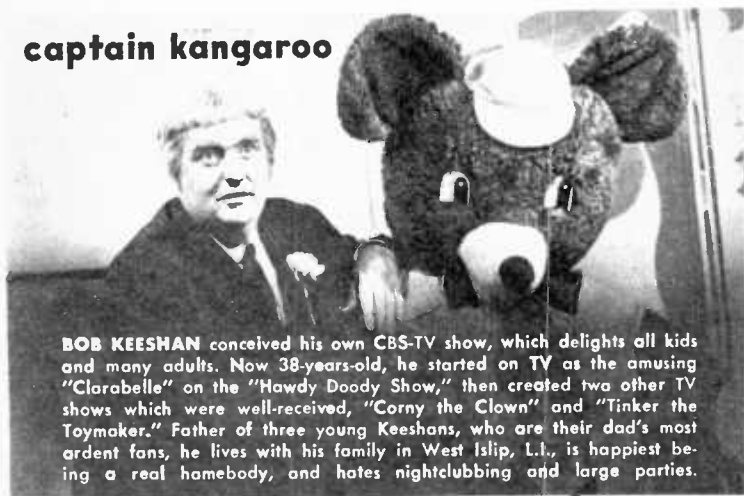
