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

YOUR ANNUAL REPORT

Dear Reader:

Record World has reached another birthday. This one, our fourth, finds us once again enjoying an unprecedented growth. Although we are a privately-held company, it is our feeling that a trade publication is so much a part of its industry that you are entitled to know what we are doing and where we are going.

THE PAST YEAR

One year ago we predicted "1967 promises to be our greatest year of achievement, both in readership and increased advertising." We are pleased to say that during the past twelve months advertising lineage increased 40% and our continued growth in readership solidified our position as one of the largest record trade publications in the world. But numbers alone represent only a part of the progress that we have made since our last Annual Directory and Award issue.

RESPECT

One of 1967's biggest hits was "Respect" and the title indicates our great success of this past year. We have the respect of our readers. Record World is read and it is believed. It has come to be looked to for support and guidance. Our sense of responsibility to our audience is indicated by our motto: "Dedicated to Serving the Needs of the Music and Record Industry." That sense of responsibility has been recognized by our readers, by the music and record industry, and is reflected in such nationally significant consumer publications as the New York TIMES, the WALL STREET JOURNAL, the New York POST, TIME and NEWSWEEK, who constantly quote us.

That's a long way to come in four years of publication. How did it happen? What did **Record World** do this year to keep its promise of service to the industry?

YOUTH

Record World is young—in age, conception, attitude, staff and personnel (the undersigned are as young as they feel). But it is youth tempered by experience. It has the energy, individualism and willingness to take on odds that is the spirit of youth. We have some remarkable young people on our team and their personalities reflect their talents and their contribution to Record World.

CREATIVITY

Record World, since its inception, has interpreted its credo, "Dedicated to Serving the Needs of the Music and Record Industry," to mean more than coverage of the news. While our staff has not only consistently reported the news faster and better, we believe, than our competition, we have also felt that an industry as creative as ours deserves creativity from its trade publications.

The prime examples of this editorial creativity are the unique concepts for our special issues. In addition to our regular Country & Western and R & B specials (and of course the issue you are reading) we felt there were obvious areas that have been ignored by the music trade press.

Record World was the first music trade publication to present a special issue devoted entirely to the men who have helped revitalize this industry by their creative direction—the independent producers. Record World's "Spotlight on Independent Producers" issue not only told you who they are but why they are—where they come from, where they are going and how. We also included a "producer-ography" in the United States and Overseas—a handy bluebook of the men who fuse poetry and punch into what is now known as "The New Rock."

Record World was the first music trade magazine to present the complete history of motion picture music, from the first note to the current mammoth film scores in our "Many Worlds of Movie Music" special issue—one of the most successful single issues in our four year history. Containing not only handy listings of gold film score LPs, major composers and songwriters and Academy Award winning songs, the special issue also delved into pop groups and rock musicals, music publishers on the film scene and an examination of the contributions of individual stars, producers and directors. In addition to the able research and sparkling writing done by our own staff, we also drew on the talents of film music specialists and experts like Leonard Maltin, Homer Dickens, John Springer, Alvin Marill, Jim Meyer and James Robert Parish to give the music and record industry the most complete, the most entertaining—and the first—study of movie music from the trade standpoint.

Record World has created the first written symposium by music and record industry experts detailing the contributions and techniques of their various fields in our "Minding The Store" series. Highlight topics of "Minding The Store" included the role of the music attorney, the arrival of data processing, efforts to rid the industry of the coun-

terfeiter, the college market for records, the agent's relationship to the record business, overseas leasing agreements and the role of the accountant. For this series **Record World** recruited acknowledged experts in their fields—Jack Grossman, Richard Leibner, Barry Goldberg and Fredric Gershon, Jackie Green, Henry Brief, Ira Herzog and Leonard Korobkin. Not only are these the most detailed explanations and essays in their various fields—they are the **first**.

"Underground radio," one of the most vital sources of programming for the new sounds of rock (or, for that matter almost any new product) has either been ignored or given occasional space by other music trade publications. **Record World**, alone of all the trade press, has created a special and autonomous department for this phenomenon, tagged it "Notes From Underground" and has become the recognized trade press authority on the subject, as we have with rhythm & blues, jazz, gospel, Latin American sounds and Country & Western.

Record World is the authority on Country & Western music for several good reasons. We report C & W activity not only from Nashville but from Hollywood and overseas. Our Top Ten Disk Jockey Reports and our weekly alphabetical listing of the top 75 C & W hits, with publishers and licensees, are unique features. And **Record World** maintains, in addition to its regular staff, four full-time correspondents for Country & Western music. That's why **Record World's** country coverage is the most extensive, and the best, to be found anywhere.

CHARTS

The core and essence of any music trade publication is its charts. The growing reliance on and the respect for the accuracy and integrity of the **Record World** charts, as reflected in reader attitude, is our greatest accomplishment—and provides the most critical service to the music and record industry. **Record World's** "Top 100 Pops," "Radio Exposure Chart" (an exclusive feature) and "Top 100 LP's" are used by a continually mounting number of radio stations, one-stops, record service merchandisers and retail outlets. The same care in compilation and the same reader respect and reliance is also shown for our "Top 50 R & B," "Top 20 Jazz LP's," "Latin American Single Hit Parade," "Juke Box Top 25," "Top C & W Singles" and "Top Country LP's" charts. More and more, the questions of "What's up? What's down? What's happening?" are answered for the industry by the **Record World** charts.

EDITORIAL PERFORMANCE

These special issues and special weekly features make **Record World** more valuable to the industry, but the hard-core weekly reportage is the performance on which we are judged.

Record World has established the reputation of being "first with the real news." It is a reputation we are proud of.

Record World was the first of any publication—trade or consumer—to announce the availability for sale of Chappell Music.

Record World was first to probe and profile the expanding record market in the Far East.

Record World was the first to spell out how the "Mini-Sized Pocket Disc" product could revolutionize the industry and affect the singles/album ratio.

These are only three examples of the "extras" in our weekly coverage.

EDITORIAL POLICY

Our editorial policy is expressed in our motto—but what about our editorials? It is our belief that, as an integral part of the music and record business, what affects the industry affects us.

Some of our editorials have caused controversy. But controversy leads to discussion and re-examination, and that is beneficial to all of us.

CONCLUSION

That is our progress report for this year, a record of achievement that would not have been possible if the music and record industry had not needed and wanted a new kind of music trade publication; if we had not assembled the talented staff that it takes to make such a publication; if we had not given that staff autonomy, support and direction—and if you, the reader, had not given us your support and attention.

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
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
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


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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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Many Faces of Tape

Tape—in its many and seemingly proliferating configura-tions—has been having a highly active, significant and seemingly successful year.

In recent months estimates on the earnings of tape as a slice of the pre-recorded music sales pie have reached the 10% mark.

The growth of the cassette business, in particular, has been the 1968 story. Over the past months company after company has announced its entry into the cassette business. The major companies seem to be cheeking the potentials more and more. Decca and Capitol are now manufacturing cassettes.

Along with the increase in cassette manufacturing has grown the controversy over the threat cassettes pose to the business. The major thrust against the cassette was made by RCA's VP-General Manager Norman Racusin at the NARM meeting last March when he suggested that the ease with which recordings can be made on cassettes could harm the singles business.

To ease this problem, a number of cassette manufacturers have introduced non-recording players.

Public Would Rather Buy

On the other hand, pro-cassette tradesters have held that the public wants instant music and would rather buy singles or pre-recorded cassettes than spend the time recording themselves.

This year EAC designed a pilferage prevention rack to cope with one of the more concrete problems cassettes have caused.

The growth of tape sales—up 74% in 1967 according to the RIAA—has prompted much industry response and re-thinking. NARM has scheduled a meeting Sept. 3-6 at the Continental Plaza Hotel, Chicago, to deal exclusively with tape. And factions within the organization feel that a separate organization might be an eventuality.

Dealers have been calling, for the past few months, for increased tape promotion.

MGM's 2-track playtapes have been successful, and the company is now designing players for 2-, 4- and 8-track tape.

RCA has found that its variety pak series has been a big hit. The reason seems to be that tape buyers, as an audience, have a strong penchant for variety programming.

Airplane Tapes Surprise Hit

The liberty stores in New York, for instance, have found that airplane tapes, featuring no less than 40 numbers over three hours, are a surprise hit. Retailing at \$23.95, which seems to be little deterent to sales, Liberty feels that commercial outlets like restaurants and offices are a natural market for these tapes.

Cars carrying 8-track equipment are in greater and greater abundance, which has kept the 8-track tape business going at high velocity. (In 1967 8-track sales were up 148%).

During the year there have been a number of injunctions brought against companies for unauthorized tape duplication. This seems to be a wrinkle yet to be successfully ironed out. Further legislation is no doubt forming.

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

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
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ASCAP Fetes Ginastera

NEW YORK — ASCAP was host last week at a press conference honoring composermember Alberto Ginastera, who has been called by The New York Times "South America's top composer." Conference was held in the Board Room of ASCAP's national headquarters at 575 Madison Avenue prior to his return to Buenos Aires.

Maestro Ginastera spent most of the conference discussing his theories on writing opera (his sensational "Bomarzo" was banned in his homeland, Argentina, because of its supposed libertinian leanings).

He feels that it is the composer's duty to create a cogent art for the time—an art, as he puts it, that "is intellectual, but also touches the heart, that goes beyond a

group of dilettantes directly to the masses even if they don't understand everything about it."

To accomplish this, he is writing what he terms "space music." By this, he explained, he wants to take the orchestra out of its essentially one plane in the orchestra pit and spread it all over the theater, or rearrange it spatially.

"I'm trying to write music to be more avant garde and also more personal."

Ginastera's next opera, commissioned as the opening work for Washington's Kennedy Cultural Center, will be based on the life of Renaissance mur-deress, Beatrice Cenci. "Her story has great drama and death at the end—the essential requirements for opera," Ginastera said.

"The opera will be two hours long," the maestro noted, "as short as possible. Two hours is long enough for our time."

Since arriving in the U.S. in February for an extended stay, Maestro Ginastera has been busy supervising performances and recordings of his works.

Ginastera had just completed two weeks as Composer-In-Residence at the Hopkins Center at Dartmouth College in Hanover, N.H., during which period a number of his scores were played. He returns to Buenos Aires to resume his duties as Director, Center for Advanced Musical Studies of the Instituto Torcuato Di Tella.

The Trend to BIGNESS

If, in the secret heart of each music business executive there is a tycoon waiting to break into the spotlight, the last 12 months were quite possibly the most fulfilling the industry has known.

For the drama, suspense and action unfolding constantly on the corporate and financial fronts during the past year, in their own way, have equalled the glamour, excitement and creativity of the talent side for which the industry is renowned. And the long-term significance of these events is certain to shape the fate and direction of the industry for years to come.

It was a year when "the trend to bigness" became a standard phrase. An unprecedented influx of heavy investors from outside the music industry hit the U.S. record scene with an impact as revolutionary as the invasion of British rock groups in the early sixties. At the same time, the swift succession of mergers, acquisitions and realignments among existing music corporations filled the Wall Street tickers with record industry names. As a result of these multi-million dollar maneuvers, the achievements of the record makers have been almost overshadowed by activity at the corporate level.

The stakes were higher than ever, involving not only the dollars of investors and the structures of corporations, but the whole shape of the industry. It was generally agreed that the "trend to bigness" was not going to reverse itself, and would almost certainly continue and expand as time went on.

Mergers No Surprise

The upsurge of activity on the merger and acquisition front came as no surprise to those with even a casual knowledge of the industry. As Al Bennett said about TransAmerica's takeover of the Liberty group of record companies, it was "the nature of the business."

For the curent overall volume of the record industry alone is \$800,000,000. And as the music-minded under-25 majority of the populace increases, with most consumers of all ages spending more and more time and money on leisure and entertainment, the market for records and music-related products is certain to grow.

Many financial analysts, how-

ever, see room for innovations and economies which would make the potential return on investments grow even faster than the industry itself. This has attracted huge investments from outside the industry, from such giants as Gulf & Western, Transcontinental Investing, Trans American and Commonwealth United. Others are bound to follow.

The "trend to bigness" predominated within the industry as well, as the big boys took steps to become still bigger. Heavyweights like MCA, Warner Bros., Capitol and MGM, and aggressive smaller firms like Pickwick, all sought to consolidate their positions and broaden their base through buying or otherwise acquiring related enterprises.

It should be emphasized again that none of this was startlingly new or even, in most cases, completely unexpected. Both intra-industry relationships and corporate ties extending outside the music industry are well-precedented. RCA was started by a phonograph manufacturing concern to provide customers with records to play on its machines. MGM, of course, grew out of the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer Motion picture enterprise. Capitol is tied to EMI of England; Mercury is owned, through the Conelco holding company, by Philips, the great Dutch international manufacturing and financial combine. Sometimes such relationships occur almost inadvertently, as when the Abbey record pressing firm was taken over in recent years by Bankers Life & Casualty Co., a Chicago insurance company, through a complicated foreclosure.

What Was Exciting

But what made these developments significant and exciting was not that they were new—but that there were so many, and that such a number of them were so big.

The biggest, and the first major financial story of the year, was also the slowest-moving. In the first week of July, 1967, the FCC finally gave its approval to a merger between ABC and International Telephone & Telegraph, after a two-year battle with the Department of Justice. In January, 1968, however, the \$2.5 billion deal fell apart. Since then, ABC has been investigating other mergers and acquisi-

tion arrangements. On July 1, 1968, Howard Hughes, through his Hughes Tool corporation, made a \$148.5 million tender offer for 43% of the outstanding shares of ABC. It came as a surprise to ABC, which launched a counterattack the next day, saying that the bid, at $74\frac{1}{2}$ a share, was "substantially below the intrinsic pershare asset value," and announcing it would seek relief in the courts. A day later, the FCC announced that it would hold hearings to determine the qualifications of Hughes Tool to control effectively what the FCC called "one of the most important mediums of mass communications in the nation. Since this would require public appearances by publicity-shy Hughes, it was uncertain, at this writing, which way events would lead. The outcome of the saga of ABC was put off until yet another fiscal year.

Against the slow-paced developments at ABC, the other financial events of the year came thick and fast. In mid-July, 1967, independent producer Bob Crewe assigned exclusive distribution rights for his DynoVoice label to Dot Records. The deal included a production agreement for five films by Crewe Company Films in association with Paramount. The parent company of Dot and Paramount, of course, is Gulf & Western.

In separate but simultaneous purchases, Time, Inc., and Edgar M. Bronfman bought 560,000 shares of MGM from Philip J. Levin, who had led two lively proxy fights in the previous 18 months for control of MGM. As a result, Bronfman became the largest single stockholder of MGM. Time paid \$17.7 million for its 300,000 shares.

Holiday Inns of America entered the music industry with records by their radio personality, Dolly Holiday, to be distributed through their special products division. Their plans also include the booking of artists into performing spots at Holiday Inns, with veteran record executive Sam Phillips actively involved in the talent operation.

ABC pursued its acquisition of distributors, begun last year when it bought New Deal in New York, and Consolidated, in Seattle, by buying Billinis in Salt Lake City, a rack jobber with 400 locations. It was

only a taste of the great rush to buy distributors and rack jobbers which was to come.

Atlantic Buy Significant

One of the most significant big buys of the year, as well as one of the most expensive, was the Warner Bros.-Seven Arts purchase of Atlantic Records at the end of October. The \$17 million deal brought perhaps the most respected, and currently the hottest, of the indie record companies under the wing of the huge Warner Bros. conglomerate.


A month later MCA purchased Kapp through its Uni record subsidiary.


Less than a month after the Warner Bros.-Atlantic acquisition, Capitol took over Audio Devices in an exchange of stock. This made EMI the corporate great-grandparent of ITCC, 20% of which was owned by Audio Devices through Stereo Devices subsidiary. The subsequent reorganization (which clarified the relationship among the participants) illustrates the process of streamlining and simplification which follows most major corporate consolidations. Audio Devices and Capitol Records each became a division of a new entity, Capitol Industries, Inc. The Capitol Record Club, formerly a function of Capitol Records, became a division in its own right, renamed Capitol Direct Marketing Corp. This was indicative of further plans for its marketing and merchandising operations.

Next came the purchase of the Ashley Famous Talent Agency by Kinney International. Ted Ashley continued as President.

Another major financial story was brewing, with rumors that Transcontinental Investing had its eye on record distributors and rack jobbers. It broke on Dec. 23, with the news that Tip Top Record Service had been bought by the investing firm. The \$5 million price not only included the 24 western branches and the new Chicago branch of the major rack jobber. It also meant that Monroe Goodman and Larry Nunes would become part of the management team built by Transcontinental's President, Robert Lifton, to guide the nationwide distribution network he sought

Siegelson brings a seasoned publishing background to his new post. For nine years he served as Professional Man-



The following | continental Investing, the new week, Boston-based Recordwagon was sold for \$10 million to Transcontinental, expanding its domain to include 20 eastern states. In January, George and Lee Hartstone's Recona distributing and rack jobbing firm. covering 24 states, joined the Transcontinental complex. In February, three more firms followed - Mershaw in Albany, N.Y., Somerset in Fall River, Mass., and Pioneer in Wichita.

TIC Largest Distrib Outfit?

At their June meeting, Lifton told Transcontinental stockholders that Trancontinental's subsidiary, Trancontinental Music, which operates its disk and tapes distribution and merchandising companies, was now the largest record distribution outfit in the world, serving more than 10,000 outlets in the nation. Transcontinental, with assets of over \$300 million, also includes among its franchise holdings the Arthur discothèques, the Hulaballoo clubs, and Mike Curb's Sidewalk Productions, producers of sound track albums and scores for teen-oriented movies, bought by Transcontinental in May.

Keenly aware of the importance of distribution to the industry, and inspired by Transcontinental's rapid invasion of the field, corporations within the record industry continued with their own campaigns to go after distributors and rackjobbers. In mid-March, Pickwick bought the Minneapolis-based Heilicher distributing company, which has an annual sales volume of \$18 million, and its rack jobbing wing, J. L. Marsh, and followed it up in May by agreeing to absorb a whole constellation of record sales enterprises based in St. Louis. These were Record Merchandisers, Rack Sales, The Original One-Stop, Commercial Music. and Mid-State.

And in May, Capitol put an end to months of conjecture about the future of Merco, the pre-eminent rack jobber, and bought 53% of Merco's stock.

Liberty Records, which itself had acquired Imperial, World Pacific and Blue Note in recent years, was the next independent record company to be taken over in the "trend to bigness." It was bought in early April by Trans-America, in exchange for 500,-000 shares of TransAmerica common stock. The purchasernot to be confused with Transgiant in rack jobbing-is the San Francisco-based insurance firm that had acquired United Artists Pictures, and owns the record label and publishing operations as well.

Pointing up the great and growing importance of publishing as an investment possibility. the vast Chappell holdings, with their rich treasury of show music, were bought by North American Philips in June, for \$42.5 million.

Though this was the year's big buy in the normally placid publishing area, it was only one of a great number. E. B. Marks acquired the George M. Cohan catalogue from the Cohan family, including the 30-odd songs used in the hit musical, "George M!" Pickwick, in the most active year in its history, moved into publishing with the same zeal it displayed in taking on distributors, buying Southtown Music in August, 1967, and Talmont Music within the next six months to add to its highly active Weiss & Barry, Mourbar and Barmour song catalogues.

Outside Investors Aware

Outside investors, too, were well aware of the promise of publishing. Gulf & Western signed Henry Hurt to represent their Famous, Paramount, and Ensign music publishing firms in Nashville, And Tranconti-Robert Lifton exnental's pressed, in an interview, an interest in acquiring publishing companies.

The publishing holdings of record companies and independent producers make such operations doubly attractive to investors and the mergerminded. Stax-Volt, bought by Paramount in May, brought its East music publishing company along in the sale. And when Commonwealth United made its debut buy in the music industry with its \$3 million purchase of Koppelman & Rubin, it also acquired the wealth of hit copyrights in the Chardon, Faithful Virtue and Troika music firms owned by publishing-producing complex.

In this atmosphere of urgent buying and selling, and the stock price fluctuations which accompanied it, no situation was more dramatic than Allen Klein's acquisition of Cameo/ Parkway. C/P stock soared from a low of \$2 per share to a high of \$76, in a matter of months. Trading of the stock was suspended from mid-Winter until the present.

Where the "trend to bigness" will eventually lead has concerned some prominent record experts. Mercury's Erwin H. Steinbeg estimated that the industry would double its volume conglomerates, but through wondered:

"Will it mean better service? Will it mean sufficient financing so that there is a step-up in the cycle of receivables flowing back to the manufacturer? Will conglomerates recognize the need for more profit oxygen at all levels of the business? Will it mean still more marketing sophistication such as a system for pre-ticketing merchandise at the manufacturers level? All these factors . . . lead to the prime idea, and that is sustaining the music and poetry that revitalizes our industry. Without that music and poetry all this sophistication is meaningless.'

Norman Racusin, Vice President and General Manager of RCA Victor, told the NARM convention in March, that:

"The news stories always say 'continuing artistic independence has been assured.' And maybe it will be. But if the new management should result in restricting creativity limiting artistic experiment of the former independents then this industry will be the poorer for it.

"Is acquiring rack merchandisers and distributors the answer to the problems of the record manufacturer? Will such subsidiaries move more of the company's own product to the detriment of others? Will the other manufacturers sit by and watch their distribution pass into the hands of their competitors? Can or will they devise other alternatives?

"What of the conglomerates? Can they succeed in welding diverse distributors and personalities into an efficient. smoothly functioning merchandising entity through the application of computer technology and 'scientific' management methods? Will the former independent be happy working on his new employment contract and submitting to the discipline of new management?

"More important, will he devote the same time and energy to the nuts and bolts of his business as he did before? Personal imagination, personal ingenuity and personal responsibility . . . are . . . essential."

Assets Human Resources

Investors know that in a creative field like music, the greatest assets of a company are not its dollars, holdings and equipment, but its human resources. Therefore, as a rule. the men who helped make the company a valuable investment are kept on, usually under employment contract, by the new ownership. Personnel and policy changes, particularly those that affect artistic and creative matters, are avoided, especially just following a take-over.

In some ways, the erstwhileindependent has new strengths in addition to the availability of working capital and a secure financial structure. Independent operations tend to embody the special genius, and the particular limitations, of the men at the top. When a number of such operations are brought together under one management, the resulting new conglomerate acquires a team of executives, each with his own flair and his own store of experience.

In building its national distribution complex, Trancontinental not only kept the original management of its acquisition -it brought them together to form the executive committee of Transcontinental Music, to pool their abilities in administering the national network.

According to one interpretation, as the music business becomes more and more dominated by bigness at the top, it will be more and more important to have a flourishing indie scene going to the bottom.

Al Bennett, formerly principal stockholder in the Liberty complex and now head of the joint Liberty-United Artists Record arm of TransAmerica, has emphasized that the creativity of the indie producer, and the activity of the indie distributor, are vital to the industry. Consolidations take place because of the economies involved, said Bennett, comparing the record business in the '60s with the movie business in the '40s and '50s. It is vital to the future of the industry, he stated to make available as much creative talent as possible, through encouraging independent producers. To accomplish this, record companies are financing independent producers in return for distribution



\$50,000 Push for Pearl's Project 3 LP, Says Light

Pearl Bailey's new Project 3 album, "The Real Pearl," is receiving one of the biggest exploitation pushes in the history of the recording business, according to Enoch Light, President of Project 3. He has authorized a budget of over \$50,000 for consumer promotion on this one album. This includes newspaper, magazine, trade and radio advertising, in addition to other promotion.

Special ads have been prepared by John DeVries, newly appointed Advertising Manager of Project 3. A series of six 50-line ads will appear in the New York Times the week of July 22. Project 3 had previously run a quarter page ad in the Sunday Times plus four 300-lines in the daily. Miss Bailey has taped five 15-second and two 30-second spots for use on radio stations all over the country.

Light's philosophy on the exploitation on "The Real Pearl" is to treat it like movie and

book publishers handle their products, "a new concept in record advertising," says Light.

"Instead of merely running a picture of the album cover with a line saying 'Buy Pearl Bailey's New Album,' the ads show originality and creativity. 'The Real Pearl' is one of the most expensive albums I've ever produced, and deserves the same special care in advertising as went into the actual record," says Light.

DeVries was formerly a writer-producer at J. Walter Thompson and Kenyon & Eckhardt. Before he started preparing the ads for "The Real Pearl," DeVries was involved with the planning recording, mastering, editing and packaging of the album.

DeVries came to Project 3 with a long list of credits in both advertising and music. A member of ASCAP, he has cowritten several popular songs with Joe Bushkin.

rights. Any limiting factor would inhibit the growth of the industry as a whole, Bennett felt, and cited any decline in independent distributors as a danger. Even with the support of possibly 100 minor labels, a wholesaler unaligned with a major record company might not be able to survive, since these labels might together account for only a small percentage of the market.

Reverberations Will Continue

During the past year, new trends have been established, old patterns overturned and reverberations will continue in the industry for years to come. It all adds up to the transition of the record business from a small, family-style, occasionally haphazard enclave to a major segment of the American economy.

And while old hands regret the passing of the old style of the business, just as they may sometimes shake their heads over one kind of music and yearn for another, they should be comforted knowing that the changes mean that the industry is maturing. It has always been responsive to the pulse of youth, and expressive of the needs and tastes of the times. In 1967-1968 the record industry has in addition captured the conservative imagination of Wall Street, and demonstrated its influence on the portfolios of investors as well as the pocketbooks of teenyboppers.

ABC Signs Dana Valery

Dana Valery, young international singing star, was signed last week to an exclusive recording contract by ABC Records, announces Larry Newton, President. Negotiations were handled between Newton and Jack Rael, Miss Valery's manager.

On July 29 Miss Valery will open at New York City's Plaza Hotel where she will appear for three weeks and on Aug. 19 she moves to the Surf in Revere, Mass. for one week. Forthcoming television appearances include the Jonathan Winter's show on Nov. 20; "Kraft Music Hall" in September; "The Hollywood Palace" in February and two "Operation Entertainment" appearances.

Miss Valery was born in Italy and moved to South Africa with her family where she embarked on a successful singing career resulting in a trip back to Italy where she won first prize at the Milan Song Festival. After numerous television appearances she returned to Johannesburg and began a recording career which brought her the South African Recording Industry Award in 1965.

The recent successful Broadway show "Wait a Minim" was created in South Africa where

Miss Valery joined the company as the starring singer. She traveled to London with the show where she appeared for two years during which she appeared on television frequently including two specials produced especially for her. In 1966 "Wait a Minim" arrived on Broadway. Since being in the United States she has anpeared on the Ed Sullivan show (following in the footsteps of her brother, Sergio Franchi), and has been a regular guest on the Merv Griffin show.

Johnny Rivers' version of "Everybody's Talkin'," due for release by Imperial, has been scratched.

Record World learned that Rivers did not want to put his record in competition with Nilsson's RCA version and possibly divide their sales because of his admiration for the Victor artist. Dubs of the deck had already been shipped by the label and some airplay had been attained.

The new Rivers release will be "Hey Joe" from his "Realization" album now climbing the charts. What happens when a hit maker like DAMES


NOTES FROM THE UNDERGROUND


Underground radio? What does that mean anymore?

It was a small reaction at first, to the commercialism turning a beautiful medium into just another Grande American Wasteland. And because it was a small reaction, by no more than a handful of radio stations, they called it "underground" radio, a label that sticks today even though the reaction has grown into a movement over the past year and now looms as real and significant competition for the money changers in the ratings temples.

The movement was based on rock in the beginning, because rock was vibrating, moving, wide-open, beautiful, and the dis-



The effect of creative radio, almost entirely FM and in most cases stereo, has been enormously interesting to watch. In some markets alternative stations have out-rated their Top 40 competition (for want of a better word) almost two-to-one during certain hours. 


Alternative radio can take a large share of the credit for the breakdown of parochialism in music, too. There's no doubt that the current popularity of Indian music, and a renewed interest in American Country and Western, and heightened enthusiasm for classical records, especially music by contemporary composers such as Ives, Mahler, Cage, Stockhausen and Boulez, can be attributed to the airplay of these sounds of FM rock radio.

This new radio form had its beginning several years ago with the introduction of subscription radio, which has never really been too successful, probably because it has to be so many things to so many people. KPFK-FM in Los Angeles and WBAI-FM in New York, the Pacifica twins, have had it financially rough for years despite grants, donations, inheritances and endless fundraising drives, but they are without question the best use of radio for information and entertainment this country has heard yet. Especially WBAI.

But it was a little over a year ago that the first rock underground station debuted. San Francisco's KMPX-FM was a hodge-podge outlet whose bookkeeper didn't even bother to buy black ink, when late night jock Larry Miller got permission from the station's management to air rock album cuts local Top 40s didn't have time for. It wasn't long before sales of FM receivers in the bay area soared, and KMPX found itself in the unfamiliar role of ratings topper during Miller's stint. Tom Donahue entered the picture about then, and with Miller, convinced the KMPX management that they certainly couldn't lose any more money by going full-time rock, and they even stood a good chance

Limelight Releases First 6 LPs in Move to Underground

CHICAGO — Six LPs representing the "total experience in sound" have been released by Limelight Records, which recently made the move from a primarily jazz orientation to a progressive, experimental bag.

The six albums, all released in deluxe four-color, double-fold packages with comprehensive notes on the artists and works, make up the initial release under Limelight's new Product Manager, Robin Mc-Bride.

Said McBride: "Everyone knows that electronic music, as well as other forms of experimental music, is on the horizon of pop acceptance and we feel that this approach, which is unique to the record industry, will definitely turn the corner."

Another LP, "Song of the Second Moon," features "sonic vibrations" of Tom Dissevelt and Kid Baltan.



to turn a profit.

Donahue became PD and proved the point. The station's new concept—offering listeners good hard rock no matter how long the cuts, along with obscure jazz, hip humor and nostalgia, and giving his jocks free reign on the air with a minimum of commercial interruption—worked so well that KMPX' sister station in Los Angeles, KPPC-FM, was converted before long to the same format.

Word of the two stations' success spread to other parts of the country and program directors who had considered the concept but had been hesitant to approach management with the idea, now had success stories to tell. A full-time hard rock station appeared in New York, then another in Detroit, another in St. Louis, another in Houston, still another in Boston. And many stations, both AM and FM, in all parts of the country began to devote large blocks of time to what they called underground music.

By and large stations that slipped into the underground soared out of the red. Some stations reported as much as a 200 per cent increase in billing with subsequent rate increass. Mail pull and phone response paralleled the billing. In some markets now there are several hard rock stations vying for listeners. San Francisco, where it all started, now has three full-time hard-rock outlets: the original, KMPX-FM; Metromedia's KSAN, programmed by Donahue, whose resignation from KMPX in March precipitated a nasty strike at that station as well as at KPPC in L.A., that is still not officially resolved; and automated KOIT, FM sister to Top 40 KYA.

Alternative radio today comes in many hues. WBAI, for instance, musically remains eccentrically folky, and radical; 18



months or so ago someone broke into its transmitting facility and tore the place up. And since the station's policy calls for the airing of extreme views from left and right, the culprits could have been Commies as easily as Minutemen. KMPX airs a potpourri of mostly rock, but experiments with Japanese Koto, Indian Raga, new electronic, jazz, Country and Western, you name it, and if there is a format, it's so loose and comfortable you'd never realize it.

New York's WNEW-FM on the other hand, programs a very tight personality concept that differs from Top 40 only in music and intensity;

since it is alternation from New York Top 40, however, it is magnificent. And then there are the stations that heard "underground is where it's at, baby," and so they're sending out expensive mailings and promoting with fancy psychedelic advertising campaigns few high-powered Top 40s could afford, not having exchanged one word with anyone who digs rock, playing all the wrong cuts from the rights albums or LPs with "wierdo" covers and titles they can't understand, and wondering all the time why they can't get the listeners in their market away from Top 40.

And so, a year later, the labels don't fit anymore. The term *Underground* fits only a few of the stations it is applied to. And soon *Alternative* won't work. *Hard Rock Radio? Freak Radio? Hip Radio?*

Good Radio?

Probably not. Labels, unfortunately, outlast their usefulness. Underground radio, no matter if it improves or declines, is what we're going to be stuck with for a long time to come.

46 Albums Comprise London's **Biggest LP Release Ever**

London Records kicked off its Fall Program, '68, plan with a special preview presentation of 46 new albums, comprising the largest single album re-Jease in the company's history, to its entire staff of home office album sales execs and district managers on Thursday (18) at the label's Manhattan headquarters.

The meeting served as a prelude to a full week of meetings between the London sales team and every London distributor in the country. The person-to-person conferences with individual distributors their own sales and promo personnel will begin on Monday (29) when the London staffers fan out across the country.

London's release features four already-rush-released special pop albums in addition to 46 others to be announced during the meetings. Promotional theme and accompanying literature for the program have been geared to the idea of the ballot and the voting machine in this presidential election year.

The opening page of a brochure has the headline: "46 Big Votes in London's '68 Fall Campaign." Beneath this, next to a series of voting machine levers, appear such legends as London Classics, Phase 4 stereo, Pops, Parrot, Deram, Hi and Stereo Treasury Series, together with the number of actual releases in each cate-

Complete mailings will go out to distribs and dealers on Thursday and Friday (25 and 26) to arrive just prior to the start of the London sales team's cross-country safari. Members of the company's home office staff taking part in the distributor presentations, in addition to Herb Goldfarb, National Sales and Distribution Manager and anchor man of the group, include Dick Bungay, Paul Livert, Lenny Meisel, Al Parker, and Jack Welfeld. Also London regional man-Bert Annear (West agers Coast), Cy House (South), Mel (Midwest) and Sam Kahn Trofe (East).

The album release spotlights a host of top priority items, including several major new entries in the classical area. "The Royal Family Of Opera," for example, is a special threedisk limited edition set featuring 37 of the world's most famous opera stars. The package carries a special price and contains a 46-page booklet.

Joan Sutherland in Donizetti's "Daughter of The Regiment" is included, as are separate specially priced sets of the complete works of both Tchaikovsky and Dyorak. There will also be 25 new releases in the \$2.49 Stereo Treasury classical series, which can be purchased in special prepack style or in bulk. This release incorporates special incentives.

In addition to five deluxe new phase 4 stereo releases, there will be nine new pop items, two of which are geared for all-out promotional and sales efforts. First of these. from the Moody Blues, is "Search for the Lost Chord." The set follows their successful current chart album "Days of Future Passed," which generated in turn a smash single for the group titled "Tuesday Afternoon."

The second major pop entry features John Mayall and the Breakers in Wires," which will be hitting the market immediately prior to the British group's second American tour in September.

Promotional and merchandising materials include a new catalog, and special browser cards for the Stereo Treasury series; a double-easel display for the "Royal Family of Opera" package; and a phase 4 sampler consisting of selected material.

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
RECORD WORLD'S PRIZE WINNING JAZZ SECTION



There is a strange dichotomy surrounding two of the most important music festivals to feature jazz. The incidents are isolated, but very much related and it clearly points out the unfortunate blindness and failure to understand jazz and its wonderfully peaceful effect on people.

The Central Park Music Festival that played to thousands of music lovers in New York last year was sponsored by

Rheingold Beer, the largest New York Brewery.





ies of programs which ranked qualitatively among the best of its kind. Very aware of the importance of jazz in New York, he scheduled more than one third of the programs with jazz performers. Nearing the end of the series last year Rheingold switched its account to a new agency and the usual revaluation of the former program was instigated. The conclusion was that sponsorship of such a series was not profitable to the company.

However, the behind-thescenes scuttlebutt revealed that the emphasis on the "long hot summer" was prevalent in the minds of the Rheingold people as well as the new agency. Therefore, discontinuance of the series was suggested as acting in the company's best interest. After all, should thousands of blacks decide to come to Central Park to tear up the grass and uproot trees, after being invited by Rheingold, this would not aid in increasing the number of beer drinkers who preferred Rheingold (this is what we call image).

Naturally, this was not published and no doubt would be denied by those who act in the position of policy makers.

The other incident, isolated as we said earlier but still in the same bag, was the Newport Festival. The emphasis was on old-timers and nostalgia due to the fathers of the town of Newport who revel in their consistency in giving the needle to George Wein in annually making things uncomfortable for him in his attempt to keep the Newport Festival intact.

The fear that a number of savage blacks and peace-loving whites would upset the tranquility of the town that has become famous not for the idle rich who have enjoyed the scenic wonders but as a setting for the most important music festival in America . . . jazz, folk and opera . . . prompted suggestions to do everything possible to keep this "long hot summer" away from its doors, and thus the emphasis on the old-timers.

What is so strange about both incidents is the consistent failure of the American people to understand jazz and what it's all about. In a country where news about Viet Nam can be kept from us and where the cry for jobs and opportunities for minorities falls on deaf years, it's perhaps understandable although shameful.

Fortunately, in the case of Central Park and with the insistance of Ron Delsener (God bless you), the sponsorship of the festival was picked up by Schaefer Beer. They felt that the need to share its profits with the community and afford thousands an opportunity to hear some of the best artists in America at \$1.00 per ticket was far more important than worrying about the fabricated "long hot summer." And to them we tip our hats and offer a loud thank-you.

To the wards of Newport we suggest they refer to American history and try to readjust their thinking to discover that jazz is very much an important foundation of our American culture.

To the critics of America, there is no better answer to

today's racial problems than to stand on stage as we did last year, and look out on a sea of thousands of beautiful black, white, brown, yellow and sunburned faces of people who travelled great distances across the nation to hear their musical apostles of peace and love speak to them.

The hundreds of hours spent in adjusting vacation schedules, saving money and making plans to spend four days in a town that refuses to admit the Newport Jazz Festival exists is indicative of the myriad face of America. And these people gather because they love jazz. They come because they are the beautiful people who really know where it is. And in Central Park for \$1.00 admission price, jazz fans and others gather to hear their favorite artists under the stars in a setting of one of the most valuable pieces of real estate in the greatest city in the world. Not only is the music beautiful, but the quiet exchange between the people upon leaving that has resulted in bringing them closer together makes the effort worthwhile. They leave with their minds freer and their hearts filled with more love.

The only objection I have is that America is more interested in who's coming to dinner and "when Peyton Place becomes integrated will real estate values go down," as opposed to the music created by and for Americans . . . jazz.

Tom Paxton: Folk at Its Best

NEW YORK -- It could be said that "Good folk singers never die, they just get better!" But in reference to Elektra's Tom Paxton these words seem grossly inadequate. Firstly, it's difficult for the very best folk singer to improve, and secondly, he's not just a performer, but the magnificent writer of most of his material.

Judging from the crowd reaction to his performance last Wednesday (18) at the Bitter End, where he is currently starring, folk music is not dead. The people there expressed a definite interest and liking in folk. And without realizing it, their interest served as a symbol of the songs of Tom Paxton collectively. Showing an interest in folk music is like showing an interest in people, because folk music is people music.

The symbolism becomes evident (to some) after hearing Paxton perform. His interest in people (folk) is expressed when he mirrors the sorrows of mankind, always adding that almost imperceptible, but very special touch of optimism. And he manages to add to this by singing songs that make us laugh at our joys and ourselves.

This is the way folk music should be, realistic but hopeful and compassionate, yet avoiding the quagmires of complete optimism or pessimism. And Tom Paxton is what folk music is all about.—Phil Lanks.

Cap Produces Non-Slip 45s

HOLLYWOOD-Capitol Records, as of Aug. 1, will manufacture its seven-inch 45-r.p.m. product with a unique non-slip feature.

The general appearance of the record is relatively unchanged, with the exception of a ring of small notches molded into both sides of the record concentric with the label. When the records are stacked, these serrations interlock, one record to another, to keep the records from slipping. The serrations, being slight protrusions around the label area of the record, tend to grip the smooth surface of an adjacent non-serrated record, thereby lessening the possibility of slippage with non-serrated records when they are intermixed.

Since they have been available in Europe for some years, it can be said that serrated records are not new. An optional standard for this type of record was set by the RIAA in 1961. Yet Capitol is most likely the first domestic record manufacturer to produce 45-r.p.m. product in conformance with this optional standard.

In addition to the Seattle outpost, Attarack is furthering plans for similar decentralized operations in the Midwest, East and the South, all located away from recording centers. Research is now being conducted to determine strategic spots in which to build the new studios to best serve embryo artists.

Quotes from Larry Newton, William Gallagher, Clive Davis, Neil Bogart (whose position as "Bubblegum King of America" was also covered in Time last week), Florence Greenberg, Don Schroeder and Henry Brief are included. Some of the quotes and sales figures are rather juicy.

Groups Jam H'wood Bowl

LOS ANGELES — Doors, "Steps" and Chambers made for a capacity house at the Hollywood Bowl KHJ summer concert recently.

Preceeding the Doors, Elektra's elite, were Dunhill's blues howlin' group Steppenwolf and Columbia's Chambers Brothers. Steppenwolf visually achieve what their chart-climbing single calls itself, "Born to Be Wild." Lead singer John Kay and cohorts keep act at a split-hair emotional pace.

As always, they particularly scored with Hoyt Axton's "Pusher" and their own composition, "The Wall's Too High."

Next on stage were sharply dressed Willy, Joe, Brian, Lester and George, known professionally as the Chambers Brothers. They got things underway with their R & B success of a few months ago, "I Can't Stand It." The Brothers appear as flashy as the biggest diamond with vocals equally clear as such a jewel. Reproducing "I Wish It Would Rain" and "In the Midnight Hour," they added just enough of their own style to make numbers letter perfect.

The Brothers do not limit themselves to R & B as they displayed with a 17-minute version of their hit, "Time," which is rock with a funky

underbeat. A new Columbia album will be released this summer for what can only be described as a "Timeless" act.

Finally, the Doors led worshipping patrons through an esoteric musical passage. Performing their current smash, "Hello I Think I Love You," "The Music's Over" and "The End," they put on an unusual, engrossing show.

Playing off of 52 amps, which is over 7,000 watts, the Doors delivered lyrics like "Once I had a little game I'd like to crawl inside my brain I think you know the game I mean The game is called going insane."

Lead exciter Jim Morrison does a convincing job of pretending to play that game in his group's act. Morrison uses a lot of dramatic voice inflection often leading to turbulent screams.

Sparklers left over from the fourth of July made a very good visual as an intro to "Light My Fire." "Fire" is one of those phenomenal tireless tunes: no matter how many times you've heard it (the radio's practically played it to its last ember), it still sounds great. A classic.

The Doors left everyone unhinged. Next KHJ summer concert will be Atlantic's Young Rascals.—Ron Baron

News from tall lean country singer Dave Travis that he has just started country music shows one night a week at London's famous troubador. Noted as a longtime haven for folk artists, this is quite an innovation! Dave has just had an LP issued by Polydor called "Picking on the Country Strings," with backing by the Strawbs, Brian Golbey and other well known names in British country music.
