Decca Unveils 22 LPs At Miami Sales Meet

MIAMI BEACH — A highlight of the Decca National Sales Convention being held at the Americana Hotel here (July 31-Aug. 3) was the audio visual presentation of album product for release in August plus a preview of what is to come in September. The presentation, prepared by the Decca Creative Services Department under the direction of Bill Levy, was made by Jack Wiedenmann, Executive Administrator of A and R.

The August release consists of 22 albums, covering a wide lineup of talent and consumer appeal.

In the pop area are albums by Bert Kaempfert ("Trace of Love"); Herbert Rehbein, ("... And So To Bed"); Mike Leander ("A Time for Young Love"); and Vinnie Bell ("Good Morning Starshine"),

Included in the release is the contemporary rock sound of Terence, ("An Eye for an

Ear"), and a new young singing star Karen Beth ("The Joys of Life"), as well as a demonstration by Christopher Scott on the Moog synthesizer ("Switched on Bachrach").

Of special interest will be "The Marx Brothers—The Original Voice Tracks from Their Greatest Movies."

Other Decca product, includes "Judy Garland's Greatest Hits," "Lionel Hampton" "Steppin' Out, Vol. 1" "The Birth of Soul" by various artists. Plus, four classical albums under the aegis of Israel Horowitz, Director of Classical A and R: "The Unique Art of Segovia"; Mendelssohn: 'Die Erste Walpurgesnacht, Op. 60.' and 'Son and Stranger-Overture, Op. 89'" by the Musica Aeterna Chorus and Orchestra under the direction of Frederic Waldman; "Music of the Spanish Theater in the Golden Age," by the New York Pro Musica (Continued on page 22)

LOS ANGELES — Columbia Records has just completed its largest and most eventful sales convention, when more than 700 members of Columbia's growing family met for the first time in Los Angeles at the Century Plaza Hotel from July 30-Aug. 3.

Clive J. Davis, President, CBS Records, opened the first day of business meetings on Thursday morning, July 31, with his Keynote Address, which set the theme for the

1969 Convention: "Columbia/ The Sound of the Seventies." Each arriving delegate and guest received a specially prepared booklet containing words of welcome from Davis; Goddard Lieberson, President, CBS/ Columbia Group; Bill Farr, Vice President, Marketing, CBS Records; and Don England, Vice President, Sales and Distribution, Columbia Records.

Kapp joined Capitol in January as Director of A&R Administration. Previously he served 11 years at Kapp Records, attaining the position of Executive Vice President. Iannucci said Kapp's promotion is linked to Capitol's plans for expanded A&R activity in Hollywood, New York and Nashville.

During his tenure at Kapp Records, Kapp produced six best-selling Jack Jones albums, the award-winning original-cast album of "Man of La Mancha" and the Louis Armstrong recording of "Hello, Dolly!" He also produced the Jose Jimenez albums.

Kapp has been in the recording industry since he was a youngster working summers for Decca, which was founded by his uncle, the late Jack Kapp. Later, in the Navy, he served $3\frac{1}{2}$ years as producer with the Armed Forces Radio Service in New York. Among the shows he produced for worldwide broadcast were "specials" on the Army-McCarthy hearings and complete coverage of the 1952 presidential election.

In 1966 Kapp left Kapp Records to set up Redstone Productions which handles recording projects of a specialized nature. The first of these is titled "To the Moon" and is the complete story of space flight. This deluxe set of six LP's includes a book of 192 pages of color photographs and is being released and distributed by Time-Life Records on August 18 by arrangement made previous to his joining Capitol. Kapp has also programmed the music for all space flights.

11 Col Engineer Awards Presented

The R and B-oriented company became a division of Paramount Pictures (a Gulf/Western Company) on June 1, 1968. At the time of the merger, Stax established a goal with the anticipation that they would be selling seven and a half million records a year by the third year of the merger. Martell Streamlines Decca **Promotion Structure**

not Decca's first national sales convention: this is Decca's first national 'promotion' and sales convention!"

With these words, Decca' Marketing VP Tony Martell keynoted the first session of Decca's international confab at the Americana Hotel in Miami

Martell unveiled a completely restructured promotion force for Decca. "Most executives in our industry talk about change, but too little is done to cope with the promotion problems that growth and expansion crehe said. "Decca is doing something about it-we are putting our efforts in the marketplace where the action is, rather than building a desk-bound philosophy by creating an executive promotion force at the home office level. Promotion executives who rise quickly in this fiercely competitive industry inevitably find themselves promoted upwards and anchored to a desk where their effectiveness diminishes as the phone calls increase.

"As good as most industry national promotion people are, they will readily admit that it is impossible for one person to be fully informed, day by day, on every level of national promotion activity.

"To cope with the continuing changes in our dynamic industry, Decca is pleased to announce a promotion realignment that is geared to 'now' and particularly designed to place emphasis on every level of Decca's product output. Under this new concept, we will have field-oriented executives concentrating on the total artist roster-C&W, R&B, middle of the road, as well as the allimportant contemporary music field.

"Decca, effective immediately, will vest its national promotion responsibilities in six key promotional executives who have emerged from the ranks of the Decca field organization."

Six Regional Promo Directors

The six regional promotion directors appointed by Martell, and their respective areas of operations are: Jim Randazzo (West Coast); Ed Spacek (Southwest); Larry Baunach (South); Pete Gidion (North Central); Doug Lee (Midwest) and Bernie Block (East Coast).

'These men." continued Martell, "will have total responsibility for Decca's promotional activities in their regions and

will report directly to my office in New York. Each man will supervise a field force of six to ten men which will give Decca greater promotional emphasis than ever before.

"At our New York headquarters, Decca will coordinate the activities of its national promotional executives via an 'editor's desk' which will be manned by Marty Torbert, a former member of a rock group and only recently discharged from the Army. Torbert, as promotion 'editor,' will assimilate and disseminate information as rapidly as it is received, so that Decca's field promotion emphasis will be directed on a daily basis by the best-informed promotional force in the industry."

Martell noted that in addition to Torbert, he had recently added Otis Pollard, an industry veteran in R&B records promotion, to the New York office's promotion staff, "Pollard," said Martell, "has joined the Decca organization to oversee the promotional efforts in our various divisions, with emphasis on R&B. However, he will work closely with Decca's merchandising executives in all areas of the catalog." Prior to joining Decca, Pollard was Director of Eastern Promotion for Stax/Volt Records, following several years as an independent promotion representative. A musician, Pollard was at one time a member of the Nat "King" Cole Trio.

London Merchandising Pitch Keyed to Changing Market

London Records' new merchandising approach, unveiled during the recent convention and sales meetings in Memphis, has been geared to keep pace with rapidly changing industry marketing patterns, according to Herb Goldfarb, National Sales and Distribution Manager.

The Memphis sessions, comprising three days of presentations and entertainment in connection with Hi Records 10th anniversary of its distributing association with London, featuring presentation of six new Hi LPs and a host of major new London releases in pop, classical and phase 4 stereo categories.

Goldfarb took note of the ever-increasing importance of radio, both FM and AM, as a disk advertising media. The firm is putting more of its promo dollars than ever before in FM underground station spots, he said, focussing particularly on such key artists as 10 Years After, Savoy Brown, the Moody Blues and the new singing star Martha Velez on the London-distributed Sire label.

While in former times FM spots would be largely geared to markets where a given act was to do a personal appearance, today London's rule is virtually across-the-board, major market spot advertising. Beyond this, it was noted, more and more AM top-40 oriented stations are also going the album cut route. Accordingly, AMers, too, are being serviced with more LPs for programming.

Colorful 20 x 30 inch posters of a host of major acts including the Moody Blues, 10 Years After, Savoy Brown, Martha Velez, Keef Hartley and John Mayall are also being shipped to distributors in bulk for use in all types of retail locations. Plans are also being discussed for possible later consumer distribution of the posters

Changing Promo Approach

Scarcity of available display space in many retail locations has also dictated a changing approach to promotion at the point of sale. Much effort will be centered on heavier-than-ever distribution of in-store demo records on the theory, as Goldfarb put it, "That we're selling sound, so why not let the customers hear the product as well as see it on the racks?"

In line with this, a new Hi

demo album, introduced at the convention, includes 16 cuts from the firm's six new albums. A new phase 4 demo disk includes sample tracks from four new phase 4 sets released this week in addition to sample cuts from recent phase 4 releases of the past three months. This is the 17th phase 4 demo record to be issued by the firm.

Empty LP jackets, a tradition in album merchandising, are being continued with a special 12-LP kit of covers being supplied to dealers based on the newest releases. On the other hand, space limitations have brought about the virtual demise of large floor display pieces with the exception of the current widely-used Tom Jones three by four foot unit.

Local newspaper co-op ads are also encouraged through distribution of small glossy "minis" of LP covers for use in making up local ads. In addition, Goldfarb noted that bulk promo copies of new artist LP's are being sent to distributors while all salesmen will also receive copies. Artists in this special promotional distribution include Martha Velez, J. J. Worthington and Johnny Almond.

LOS ANGELES — The "theme" of Clive Davis' keynote speech at the Columbia Epic Convention here at the Century Plaza was that "Columbia Records doesn't need the quick fast buck. We don't need the quirk single, the fad artist, the one-time sale. We are leaders, building and looking to the future." Davis, in the speech stressing his view of Columbia's supremacy in "the record's business," called on Columbia A&R men to continue to look for quality and long-term thinking, called on promotion men to so-ordinate sales reports and air lay aspecially on singles so that accurate buying patterns minimized returns; called on salesmen to be hard-working professionals, knowledgeable and involved.

Davis said that the biggest problem to be fought within his or any company is stagnation. "No one at this company will ever count gray hairs," he said. "That is not importantindeed years of service gives one perspective, wisdom and experience that would take another many hard encounters to eatch up with. But it is important that no one grow stale. That no one take his job for granted. That no one stop looking for a new super star of tomorrow."

As personifications of the spirit and uniqueness which Davis expressed was Columbia's, the president tributed long-term, high-ranking CBS executives Goddard Lieberson and John Hammond.

Epic's Hoffman in Rousing Pitch for Support at Meet

LOS ANGELES—Mort Hoffman, VP, Epic and Custom Labels, Sales and Distribution. spoke at the convention last week at the Century Plaza Hotel and gave a comprehensive history of his label, as well as a rousing pitch for support.

He noted: "On May 2 of this year Epic made a dramatic move to total Columbia distribution. This brought an already operating, established and profitable line of records into a distribution network structured to promote, merchandise and sell phonograph records; and it gave to a CBS Records label CBS Records personnel who are professionals in their field, all the way from recording concept to the ultimate sale.

"At the same time, further growth potential was added to the move by incorporating all custom labels with the Epic line, from a direction and merchandising standpoint. A separate field organization provides constant and concentrated emphasis on these product lines to provide the nucleus of a tremendous future expansion that will soon be highlighted with the addition of yet another label for distribution. Epic and custom-label distribution can be the fastest growth area of the company today, but it just won't happen without a push. It must be worked!

"The Epic change in distribution in May — unless you worked out of Dallas, New Orleans, Cleveland, or New York — marked a change in our daily routine and added a new dimension to your sales calls. More time is required on each call, but you have more product to sell—and sell is the key word. It may take more per-

get retail exposure on Poco, Kaleidoscope and Red Beans and Rice than it takes on Vinton, Donovan and Sly and the Family Stone, but that is precisely what you are there for: to sell. A one-stop may offer more resistance to your initial pitch on Bob Luman, Charlie Rich and Sue Richards than he would to David Houston, Tommy Cash and Tammy Wynette; but if you are effective, you-and your one-stop-will quickly find that good country records do sell."

Continued Hoffman: "Time is the most valuable commodity we have. There never seems to be enough of it. It's human nature and very easy to tend to highlight or 'cream' a line—sell the hot ones fast and move on to the next call. Don't do it! Get your heavy volume on current hits, but take the time to introduce, promote, work and sell new artists and (Continued on page 55)





Talent Associates Enters Disk Biz Via TA Records

Talent Associates, major independent television and film production firm, has announced the formation of TA Records and its subsidiary companies, TA Music, Inc., and Cents and Pence Musique, Inc.

First releases on the new label, a single by Denny Lambert, "I'm Comin' Back," and an album by singer-composers Seals & Crofts, will be released Aug. 4. TA's product will be distributed by Bell Records, a division of Columbia Pictures.

Announcement of the new company came from Daniel Melnick, partner in Talent Associates along with David Susskind and Leonard Stern. Melnick simultaneously announced the appointment of Steve Binder to the post of President of TA Records.

Binder, a successfuly independent television and record producer, recently joined Talent Associates to plan new entertainment projects, and is responsible for developing the new label for the company. He is also responsible for the development of several television series involving contemporary music and is presently producing pilots for NBC on two of the shows.

"Steve began working on TA Records eight months ago," said Melnick, in disclosing the company's plans. "We could have announced the label then, but it would have been meaningless. We decided that we would first find and sign the strongest talent possible, and record the best records possible with that talent before telling the industry and the public our intentions."

Five Artists Signed

Five artists have already been signed to the label. Three of them have completed albums which are scheduled for release over the coming weeks. The artists will not be announced until product is available.

With the announcement of the label, Binder named Dennis Lambert and Brian Potter directors of TA Records' A&R. Lambert has written and produced records for Freddie and the Dreamers, the Nashville Teens, Jerry Butler and the McCoys. Potter, who recently moved to Los Angeles from England, was formerly associated with Atlantic Records in London, and was instrumental in early recordings by the Small Faces.

Wayne Kimball, leading West

Coast album and packaging designer, has been appointed Art Director of TA Records.

TA has retained the firm of Gershman & Swaney for publicity, advertising and marketing consultation. In addition, a network of independent promotion men, headed by Herb Rosen in New York, has been established to work on TA product in conjunction with Bell's sales and promotion staff.

Binder described the concept of the new label as an "action forum for creative talent. We want to give our artists and producers an environment in which they can function effectively."

'Just Creative Guys'

"There are no quote executives unquote in the new company," he added, "there are just a group of creative guys who like each other. I told a lot of people when I was working my way up that one day we'd get together and work together on something we love. I don't want to overuse the word 'love,' but you can never be sure that a record will be a hit, but you can be sure if you love it. And if it isn't a hit, at least you got together and believed in something. If you produce something you don't like and it becomes a success, it's still hollow and the last thing I want to create is a hollow empire."

"We're looking for artists who have the potential to develop because I am very conscious of expanding into other media like television. I love television and I'm in a position now where I can use some muscle to create what I like. So we're not looking for the group who wants big advance money. We're going to take new artists and try to build them. Some of them will make it and some won't."

Binder is already formulating plans for two television series—one a variety-story show pegged on "Harper Valley P.T.A." and the other a dramatic-musical called "In His Own Time."

"We aren't interested in just getting the big single hit. I want to think bigger than that. If we put a record out and it doesn't make it, we have enough backing to keep behind that artist and that's what we plan to do."

Offices for TA Records and its publishing companies are located at CBS Studio Center, Studio City, Calif.

Jones Soundtrack



Five LPs from Tetra

BEVERLY HILLS — Tetragrammaton Records will release five albums during August, announces Arthur Mogull, President of the label. Groups and artists include the Johnstons, Sweet Thursday, Gene and Francesca, Steve Baron Quartet and Joshua Fox.

The Johnstons, Ireland's number one singing group, joined the Tetra label with the single, "Both Sides Now," also the title of their LP. The quartet recorded the album in England, where they are currently on tour under the management of NEMS Enterprises.

Sweet Thursday, which took its name from a John Steinbeck novel, is comprised of five British studio musicians: Jon Mark, songwriter and vocalist, now touring with the John Mayall band on the West Coast, as acoustic finger-style guitarist; Nicky Hopkins, pianist, best-known in the U.S. for his work with the Jeff Beck Group and the Stones' "Beggar's Banquet" album; Alun Davies, guitarist and vocalist, and with Jon, founder of the group; Brian Odgers, bass, who toured and recorded with the cream of European jazz, folk and pop; Harvey Burns, drums, whose background includes working on the road with Georgie Fame and J. J. Jackson.

Gene and Francesca (Mr. and Mrs. Raskin in private life) just released their first Tetra single, "Hello Love," penned by Gene. "Gene and Francesca," their initial Tetra LP, was produced by the Richmond Organization in New York, publisher, as well, of all Gene's songs.

Steve Baron Quartet has already made a name for itself on the college concert circuit, and with appearances in such clubs as New York's "Bitter End." Album title, "The Mother of Us All," was taken from the song, "Bertha Was The Mother of Us All," written by Baron, vocalist and writer for the group. This marks quartet's first LP.

Joshua Fox Quartet consists of Mike Botts on drums, Josef Camanno bass, Tom Menefee and Larry Hansen both on guitar. Group, which hails from Sacramento, recorded two previous Tetra singles, "Moontime Bore" and "It's Just Meant to Be," leading to the LP and the signing of a long-term contract with the label.

In addition to the five albums, Tetra will release two singles this month: "Golf/Football" monologues by Bill Cosby from his "8:15-12:15" LP currently on the charts; and Pat Boone's "Good Morning Dear" b/w "You Win Again." Boone's initial Tetra LP, "Departure," was part of label's 14-album June release.

Toward the end of July, Tetra released its second sound-track album for 20th Century-Fox, Jerry Goldsmith's score from "The Chairman," which stars Gregory Peck and Anne Heywood.



NOTES UNDERGROUND

At first, man worshipped the forces of nature. Then, a little more sophistication, and primitives began worshipping animals, food and other saintly humans.

After 100,000 recorded years of man's history, he is now ready to worship songwriters-specifically Bob Dylan.

The inventor of this new quasi-historical, quasi-religious form is A.J. (for Alan Jules) Weberman, an honor student dropout from Michigan State and C.C.N.Y. who became a Dylan freak after hearing the single of "Like a Rolling Stone" backed with "Gates of Eden."

"It was that one that started me on this kick. I had heard the



first few albums but they didn't knock me out. Plus, at that time, I was under the impression that Dylan had begun to slow down on his radical messages. Luckily, I really got into those two songs, and I began to see that he was just cloaking his radical thought in song form. From then on, I started to collect everything I could about him and began my book which is now finished."

The book is volume one of Weberman's projected critique and history of Dylan and covers Dylan from his beginnings through May, 1966.

His research has been surely that of a true believer. Who else would have located, read and digested more than 1,000 newspaper and magazine articles on one man? In addition to this relatively easy-to-obtain source material, Goberman collected every single and album released on Dylan plus the following esoterica:

• All the out-takes from "Highway 61 Revisited" which Dylan taped and sent as a gift to the Byrds.

• The famous unreleased "basement tape" of songs that Dylan wrote and recorded with the Band. Says Weberman of this, "If Dylan had ever sought solely commercial success this is the album that would have sold millions of copies. Maybe that's why he didn't release it."

• A recording of unreleased and uncopyrighted songs from the fall of 1962 including rare Dylanania like "Cuban Missile Crisis" and "Where You Gonna Be on That Judgment Day."

• A recorded duet with Phil Ochs of an unreleased song called "The Ballad of Donald White."

• Dylan's original demos for Witmark Music including "Paths of Victory," "Let Me Die in My Footsteps" and "Moonshine Blues."

• A tape of Dylan performing live at the Gaslight Cafe in 1962 featuring an unreleased tune called "Talking Bear Mountain Picnic Massacre Disaster Blues" and a duet with Dave Van Ronk on "Car Car."

• A non-put-on interview from May, 1963, with Chicago radio personality Studs Terkel.

• A tape of Dylan warbling "Quit Your Lowdown Ways," Elvis Presley's first single for Sun Records.

Also included are LP's on which Dylan plays under assumed names—Roosevelt Gook on a Tom Rush Elektra LP and Blind Boy Grunt on a Broadside topical song collection.

Having collected all this material, Weberman has proceeded to make a name for himself. He claims that Dylan's song "Dear Landlord" is addressed to him personally and that Dylan sent friends to tape Weberman's course in Dylanology at New York's Free University; however, there is no denying that the new John Lennon-Yoko Ono single, "Give Peace a Chance," contains a line that says, "Everybody's talkin' 'bout Weberman."

His recently completed manuscript is now making the rounds of publishers. It may be some time before it is published due to the depth of Weberman's criticism. For instance, he claims that the "Baby Rule" contained in "It's All Over Now, Baby Blue" refers to capitalism in general and specifically capitalism in Cuba. Weberman also maintains that "Restless Farewell" is a

Performing their best on "Back Door Man," "Break on Through" and, of course, "Light My Fire," they delivered a visually reserved but audibly exciting show.

The Doors (Ray Manzarek, Robbie Krieger, John Densmore and Jim Morrison) were entertaining for fans who ranged in age from sixties to four years old. A tot named Amy clapped as if Morrison's most ardent fan.—Ron Baron.



Frank Loesser Dead at 59

NEW YORK—Frank Loesser, composer of Broadway shows "Where's Charley?," "Guys and Dolls," "The Most Happy Felia" and the Pulitzer Prize-winning "How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying," died of lung cancer on July 28 at Mt. Sinai Hospital.

Born in New York City on June 29, 1910, Loesser was educated at the Speyer and Townsend Harris High Schools, and the College of the City of New York where he wrote songs for the college shows. After school he became a newspaper reporter, served as a pianist, singer and caricaturist, as well as an editor on a trade newspaper. In 1931 he first became active as a songwriter in Hollywood, and joined ASCAP in 1934.

During World War II Loesser wrote songs as a private in the U.S. Army for Army shows including several official songs for various branches of the service. These included "Rodger Young," "In My Arms" and "Praise the Lord and Pass the Ammunition."

Among his other songs are the 1949 Academy Award-winning "Baby, It's Cold Outside"; 'Small Fry"; "Two Sleepy People"; "Sand in My Shoes"; "I Don't Want to Walk Without You, Baby"; "Spring Will Be a Little Late This Year"; "Jingle Jangle Jingle"; "They're Either Too Young or Too Old"; "My Darling, My Darling"; "On a Slow Boat to China"; "Once in Love With Amy"; "If I Were a Bell"; "Luck Be a Lady"; "A Bushel and a Peck": "Standing on the Corner" and, from "How to Succeed," "Brotherhood of Man" and "I Believe in You."

Loesser's business interests were extensive. As President of Frank Music Corp. and Vice President of Frank Productions, he presided over a multimillion-dollar show business empire that published music, produced shows and invested in others.

He is survived by his second wife, the former Jo Sullivan, and their two children, Hanna, 6, and Emily, 4, in addition to two children from his first marriage, Mrs. Peter Stabek, 24, and John, 18.

Hasta hace pocos, meses atrás, nuestro público estaba completamente inclinado hacia la música netamente tropical; sin embargo, desde un tiempo a ésta parte, el panorama ha cambiado notablemente. Tanto es así, que nuestras orquestas y combos se han visto forzados a internacionalizar su repertorio, así como tambien nuestros cantantes Emisoras que, hasta hace poco, estaban absolutamente identificadas con la música tropical, ahora la alternan con los grandes éxitos que nos llegan de todas las latitudes, viéndose fuertemente afectada Radio Caracas, emisora tradicionalmente de las minorías por su especialización en la música Norteamericana e Italiana, v la nueva emisora Radio Capital que, dentro de un estilo internacional, ha sabido colocarse en los primeros lugares de sintonía, gracias a éste viraje del gusto popular.

London Lowdown

LONDON—News of the week is undoubtedly **Bob Dylan's** pending arrival in Britain. He has accepted a concert date to appear at the Second Isle of Wight Festival of Musicon Aug. 31. The cast already looks like a promoter's dream . . . British chief of the Warner Brothers-Seven Arts complex here, Ian Ralfini, will be attending Warners' conventions in Montreal in August . . . Single release for top starts: the Doors' "Tell All the People" Aug. 1 . . . Dylan manager Albert Grossman's new British signing, Louisa Jane White, has her version of David Ackles' "Blue Ribbon" on release through Philips. Top American producer Horace Ott will be supervising future sessions for Louisa Jane.

Keith Relf, ex-member of top group a while back, the Yardbirds, has set up together with fellow ex-member Jimmy McCarty and Keith's sister Jane the Keith Relf Renaissance, currently making the scene and wooing the crowds around the London clubs. Record companies have been buzzing about and Keith will finalize his recording plans soon . . . Publishing house Feldman has acquired and are now activating and promoting Elektra Reccords music copyrights in the Paradox Music Group; one of the first recorded numbers is "Light My Fire" by way-out girl with big following Julie Driscoll . . . The venue has now been changed for the 9th National Jazz, Blues and Pop Festival Aug. 8, 9 and 10. It will now be held at Plumpton Racecourse which is about 45 miles out of London. The organizers consider the extra effort and cost involved amending tickets, etc., well worth it for the facilities the course offers. The Festival consists of five concerts offering music just as the title suggests, pop, jazz and blues. A random look through artists taking part shows names of Pink Floyd, Juniors Eyes, Bonzo Dog, the Who, Chicken Shack, Fat Mattress . . . Tim Rose will make a concert tour of Britain in the autumn. His album, "Through Rose Coloured Glasses," comes out via CBS in August . . . The story goes that Marsha Hunt's (lady launched in "Hair") managers have been unsuccessful in their effort to insure her hair-a sort of Jimi Hendrix style but on a much grander scale. Dates in a busy summer for Marsha include the Isle of Wight Festival (London will probably be a musical desert that week-end!) . . . Christ Hutchins Enterpress organization is capturing a fair slice of the business in this town and has now got the Pye Records press relations account . . . Noel Redding's departure from the Jimi Hendrix Experience has proved a lucrative move. The launching onto disk of his new group Fat Mattress is reported to have brought him an advance payment of \$175,000 from Polydor Records . . . Have no idea what Pye's Pickety Witch sounds like, but it's very satisfying to say the name! . . . Cover version here of "Romeo and Juliet Love There" Manuel and the Music of the Mountains . . . The Supremes are now more than less certain to make a guest appearance in Engelbert Humperdinck's Anglo-American TV series. His new single is a Burt Bacharach/Hal David composition, "A Better Man" Managing Director of the Australian Festival Records Fred Marks got into London last week to finalize record and publishing representation in the U.K. British company is under the direction of Mike Sloman . . . Dick James currently planning new ideas and appointing new personnel for the Page One label. He now has 100 percent control of the label having acquired Larry Page's interest in the company.

Essex Music Action

Essex Music of Australia Pty. Ltd., under managing director, Barry Kimberley has just acquired publishing rights for one of the Commonwealth's hottest acts, Doug Parkinson In Focus, and has already initiated a strong international publishing drive on the group's material.

The new move is in line with Kimberley's long-term commitment to achieve broad international exposure for top Australian writing talent.

situation in perspective and feels that a nucleus of staff in the U.K. office can concentrate their efforts on the label's product and in particular be involved in the major promotion campaign for "Goodbye, Mr. Chips" to be launched this au-

Another problem hovering over MGM is the pending court case over distribution rights. Pye Records instigated the case against MGM which is distributed here by EMI. The case is due to be heard early in the new year but it is thought that a negotiated settlement could well be reached out of court before then.


Harmony Product All-Star

Weberman says, "After that Newsweek story, Dylan never gave a really straight interview again except to very close friends. He refined the art of the put-on to an unparalleled degree. There is also a lot of evidence that Dylan was never interviewd by Playboy Magazine but instead wrote the entire interview himself."

Weberman claims to be the world's leading authority on Dylan but does not pretend to fully comprehend his idol. "I have a copy of 'Tarantula,' his unpublished novel, and frankly I can't understand it at all. I've only read a small part of it. To read it, you would have to have a key like those provided with Joyce's 'Finnegan's Wake'. But I do think I understand more of Dylan than any

The Dylanologist claims that the hat-tipping photo of Dylan on the cover of "Nashville Skyline" is his way of bidding goodbye to pop success. "I think, from now on, Dylan intends to continue in his new bag of very simple lyrics cloaking radical thought and if the public doesn't dig it, that's too bad."

which were artistically reward-

ing.

"The philosophy behind the formation of the company was simple," said Schwartz. "We believed then, and still do, that quality music and packaging becomes commercial in that the medium is the message. The consumer expects and wants that degree of excellence. This has proven to be true. We have sold more albums with our artists than their previous labels had."

"Skye also provided us with the opportunity to develop new artists and writers," said Schwartz, "and that is how such talents as Grady Tate, Bob Freedman and Wendy & Bonnie came about. We are the first label to have started what we call a 'discovery series' . . . a set of albums by new artists that retail for less than the usual album price . . . albums that are exploited simply as a source for new talent.

"The key to the Filmways deal," said Schwartz, "lies in the fact that while we had been approached by several other major companies, Filmways was the most appealing because of its reputation for putting out quality product and because of its liberal approach to the creative end of the business. Top executive and managerial posts within the corporate structure are filled by creative people and their acquisition program seems to be geared toward the younger, more creative talents. Filmways will not inhibit our artists' need for creative control."

"While Filmways already has a fine technical operation in the music field, the addition of Skye Recording Company enables us to expand into the vast music business." St. Johns said. "Most importantly," he added, "Filmways will be able to properly merchandise and distribute the music from its own motion picture and television productions and from the live entertainment division."

Filmways, a diversified entertainment complex, engages in motion picture and television production and distribution, broadcasting, publishing, live entertainment and also has related studio and equipment manufacturing subsidiaries.

Music Thru Films, TV

Schwartz made another important point in explaining why the acquisition is so attractive. "Filmways has a great deal of music that comes to them through films and televi-

sion. As executive in charge of this operation I will be responsible for the continued development and expansion of their music publishing company...an area that for some time has been dormant. There is a great deal of good material here and it will be my job to exploit it to its fullest."

Filmways is well aware of the value of putting people together and for this reason the new acquisition will enable Skye to work more closely with Concert Associates, another Filmways subsidiary responsible for packaging concert attractions. This inter-relationship will afford Skye an opportunity to develop new recording groups and at the same time will provide outlets for the label's already established artists.

Skye's initial project under the Filmways acquisition was the recording of the rock score from an as of yet untitled film by producers Chuck Hirsch and Brian DiPalma, who produced "Greetings." The original soundtrack recording will be released simultaneously with the film sometime later this year.

As Director of Business Affairs for MGM Records he was instrumental in the area of contract negotiations and participated in the deals which brought such acts Herman's Hermits, the Mothers of Invention, Janis Ian, Richie Havens and Sam the Sham into the MGM fold. He was also responsible for the supervision of the MGM-owned Metro distributing branches located in the key markets of New York, Chicago and Los Angeles, as well as overseeing MGM's plant operation, and served as liaison between the various divisions of the MGM complex including the legal, accounting and record divisions.

White was represented in the negotiations involving his new position by the business and personal management firm of Neil C. Reshen, Inc.

Prior to his joining MGM White was senior accountant with the firm of Arthur Anderson & Co.

Columbia Records artist Johnny Cash, who has broken through the traditional boundaries which once separated C & W from pop to become one of the hottest personalities in the entertainment world, has achieved his fourth gold record for his "Johnny Cash's Greatest Hits" album.

Cash has also received gold records for his Columbia LPs "Ring of Fire," "I Walk the Line" and "At Folsom Prison."

Cash has been riding high on both the C & W and pop charts with his albums "At San Quentin," "At Folsom Prison" and "The Holy Land," and with his single "A Boy Named Sue," which was taken from the "At San Quentin" album. It seems evident that both "At San Quentin" and "A Boy Named Sue" are on their way toward turning gold.

Cash is also bringing the country sound to audiences throughout the nation via his successful Nashville-based Saturday-night network television program, "The Johnny Cash Show." The program, which has featured such guests as Bob Dylan, has become one of the summer's hits

In recent months, Cash has also been the subject of numerous articles in major American magazines, and he is the subject of a feature-length film documentary scheduled for release in the near future.

The Third Annual Country Music Association Awards Program will have Tennessee Ernie Ford as Master of Ceremonies for the second national network tele-production by NBC-TV in Nashville Oct. 15, it was announced.






Lawrence, who for the last three years has been associated with the production staff of WSM-TV, will be responsible for promotions and public relations for the entire complex of firms, Lee said.




