



Lennon, McCartney, Hartford Top BMI Award Winners

The 132 writers and 69 publishers of 94 songs licensed for public performance by Broadcast Music, Inc. have received Citations of Achievement for the most performed songs in the BMI repertoire for 1969. In addition, a special citation was presented to John Hartford, the writer, and Glaser Publications, Inc., the publisher, for "Gentle on My Mind," the most performed BMI song during 1969. The awards were presented at Los Angeles' Century

Plaza Hotel on May 19 by BMI President Edward M. Cramer, with the assistance of members of the firm's Writer and Publisher Administration division, of which Mrs. Theodora Zavin is Senior Vice President.

The top 1969 writer-award winners are John Lennon and Paul McCartney, each with five awards. The leading publishers are the Bill Lowery Group with seven awards, and Maclen Music, Inc. and Screen Gems-Co-(Continued on page 47)

Lasker ABC President

The appointment of Jay Lasker as President of ABC Records was announced last week by Samuel H. Clark, group Vice-President of the Non-Broadcast Operations of the American Broadcasting Companies, Inc. Appointment includes all the ABC labels.

Lasker, President of Dunhill Records, will assume his new assignment immediately. He succeeds Larry Newton who was recently promoted by Clark to the position of Vice-President in charge of worldwide sales for ABC Pictures Corp.

At the same time, Lasker also announced the appointment of Howard Stark to a new position as Executive Vice-President of ABC Records.

Both Lasker and Stark, who had been serving as Vice-President of ABC Records, will headquarter on the West Coast at the ABC Records offices at 8255 Beverley Blvd., Los Angeles. Stark will report directly to Lasker.

Lasker will also be in chage of all music publishing firms associated with ABC Records, including Trousdale, Wingate, Ampco, West Par and Porgie. ABC Record and Tape Sales Corp. will continue to operate under the direction of Lou Lavinthal, President.

Lasker joined the ABC Record division in 1966 when ABC purchased Dunhill Records. After the acquisition he remained as Vice-President of Dunhill and recently became President.

Harvey Elektra Gen. Mgr.

President of Elektra Records Jac Holzman has appointed Bill Harvey to the newly created position of General Manager of Elektra

Harvey joined Elektra in the spring of 1959 as Art Director and in the mid-60s became executive Vice President of the label. In his new capacity as General Manager of the company, Harvey will now have complete authority in a number of areas previously handled only by Holzman.

According to Harvey, the new arrangement will establish a much-needed "balance," "If Elektra is to expand and grow in the future as it has in the past," Harvey went on, "it will have to be thought of as a corporate team with the strength and power to act."

FORE's First Convention Held in Chi May 15-17

Issue Facing Black Record Man, Biz in General Panel Subjects

CHICAGO — FORE (Fraternity of Recording Executives) held its first mini-convention here on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, May 15, 16 and 17, at the Ascot Hotel. Attendance was over 125, although the general consensus was that not enough of the white record company reps invited were present. The black contingent was a cross-section of all levels of the music industry.

Highlights of the meet were two panel discussions held on Saturday morning, moderated by Record World Publisher Bob Austin and titled "The Total Involvement of the Black Man in the Record Industry"; and Saturday afternoon, moderated by Morton Nasatir of Billboard, and titled "The Changing Distribution and Sales Patterns of the '70s."

At the morning discussion, Larry Maxwell of Maxwell Records said that he felt the black man in the record business must give more than the next man in a comparable job, and must respect both his company and his product. Panelist Charlie Brown, WWRL-WOL dj, said that the black man should become more involved in community affairs, mentioning further that there aren't enough black men in sales.

Ahmet Ertegun, President of Atlantic Records, said this week that "In spite of the rumors, Crosby, Stills, Nash & Young are very much together and have no intention of breaking up. They are resuming their national concert tour as of Friday, May 29, in Boston, where they will play the Boston Gardens."

The best-selling Atlantic group was forced to postpone a number of dates after their initial concert in Denver last week due to Steve Stills' wrist and knee injuries, and Graham Nash's vocal difficulties. Drummer Dallas Taylor and bassist Greg Reeves left the group shortly before the tour started, last week.

After Boston the group is scheduled for concerts in Baltimore and New York. All of the postponed dates will be played as soon as possible.

Crosby, Stills, Nash & Young are preparing their third album for fall release on Atlantic. They will work on it after the current tour is completed. There will also be albums by individual members of the group. Another concert tour is being talked about for next January.



 ${\bf Montreal-Jesse\ Winchester}$ arrived in Montreal early in the summer of 1967. He moved because of the Draft Now Winchester has an album out (on Ampex), produced by the Band's Robbie Robertson. It is a firm, beautifully performed and composed record, one that will surely mark Winchester as one of the important singer-songwriters. The fact that Robertson plays lead guitar on the album and that Levon Helm chips in on drums and mandolin here and there is bound to be of interest. But it is Winchester's album through and through, conveying a unique personal sensibility.

Winchester's music is rich in its depth and heritage, as it is a consummation of everything he grew up with. His sound is clean, like the Band's, Southern, with measures of rock and roll, gospel, even jazz—whatever comes naturally.

He sings as he writes, in a gentle but strong voice. He's a relaxed, perfectly paced singer, possessing beautiful ballad phrasing and plenty of funk on uptempo numbers. Winchester, like the best singer-songwriters, does not separate words, music and performance — it's all one thing.

"It used to be that a song could get across all the feeling you wanted from very, very simple words. Now the word has become more important. But, to me, I still like a sound song. I don't like a lotta words. The fewer the better, the simpler the better . . . in everything."

Winchester simply sings away, with nothing forced or put-on. The back-ups are fluid and mellow, rocking and rolling and, at times, just being quiet about it. The album, recorded in Toronto, is also a fine production achievement for Robertson, simply because he has remained faithful to the singer.

'Woodstock': 3 Movies For Price of One

It purports to be a documentary of an event-last summer's declaration of independence by middle class white youth. And indeed it does seem to report a large part of the progress of the famous week-end in Bethel, N. Y., accurately. The film (director Michael Wadleigh's crew of cameramen and interviewers lurking around edges of the woods, marching into town, shuffling through teeming crowds, wading in the water, standing around phone booths and out houses-Port-o-Sans) records a certain spectrum of opinion from local citizens and visiting teen-agers that gives what I'll buy as a generally truthful account of the feelings and fancies of the weekend, the crowd interaction that became a form of easy, open love (not at all orgiastic), infatuation with a time and place and sense (for the kids certainly) of being part of something one's own.

But although the Wadleigh crew was everywhere, they and the editors (subsequently) did prove to be one-track-minded: they chose to overlook or turn discreetly away from certain of the less pleasant aspects of Woodstock that have been authenticated elsewhere; they chose to nod agreement with some of the naive contentions of the participants of the festical. And in doing this they

have let their documentary become propagandistic. Propaganda for the right things, perhaps. But propaganda nonetheless.

Throughout the film youngsters, primarily (but also hip entrepreneurs Artie Kornfeld, with his machine gun laugh punctuating his benisons, and Michael Lang, whose cryptic smile suggests he knows more than he's saying), claim that they've solved during a brief three-day period the problem of living together in large numbers, a problem their parents and ancestors had never overcome. Although there was considerable evidence to the contrary-Woodstock was declared a disaster area—the film rarely

The release included a new rock album by Weight entitled "One Man's Queen is Another Man's Sweat Hog," produced by Vinny Testa of Infinity Productions. (He previously was responsible for Avco Embassy's "Liquid Smoke" album and the group's chart single, "I Who Have Nothing.") Happy Feeling, a pop group out of Canada, was produced by Norman Petty. A new single, "Still Hill," will be released from their album.

A key album is by Glass Bottle, the pop group that has just finished an extensive inperson tour of some 10 markets on behalf of their new single, "Love for Living," from their new LP.

The most extensive promo campaign will zero in on the label's soundtrack from Avco Embassy Pictures. "Sunflower" stars Sophia Loren and Marcello Mastroianni. A Joseph E.

Levine presentation and a Carlo Ponti production, the film was made on location in Italy and the Soviet Union and was directed by Vittorio De Sica. It is a double-fold, single pocket deluxe package. "The Love Theme from Sunflower" will be recorded as a single by Henry Mancini for release on RCA.

Aimed at All Levels

The "Sunflower" soundtrack promotion will be aimed at every level. Saturation on radio to garner airplay, publicity and advertising in both print media and 30 and 60 second radio spots. The merchandising effort on behalf of the soundtrack will be made in conjunction with Ampex Stereo Tapes Avco's exclusive tape distributor. It will include posters. hanging pennants, counter cards, color stills from the film and a four-color center window display.

The display material will be used to initiate a massive national window display contest in which both Avco Embassy and Ampex will be offering valuable prizes. Details on the contest will be announced shortly Ayco Embaso will also institute special screenings in every key market to cover radio people, press, dealers and record and tape distributors. According to Katzel, the initial orders on "Sunflower" has been the heaviest the company has experienced since going into business.

Country Joe, Film Star?

HOLLYWOOD — The whole motion picture idiom may sometimes seem a little fishy to Vanguard recording artist Country Joe McDonald who has seen some movies, written tunes for some, acted in one and been up for roles in others.

In an exclusive Record World interview, Country Joe stopped by our offices last week with a Janus sort of temperament. Part of him was doleful, the other excited. The disappointed side to McDonald was triggered by his screen test for the role of Woody Guthrie. His wife, actress Robin Menkin, also tested for the role of Mary Guthrie.

Robin disclosed that in preparing for the test scene they both had been clued that the scene should be acted. However, during a runthrough before the movie personnel they were advised not to act but rather just to be natural. This they did; but upon seeing the rushes it was decided by the film brass conducting the test that the couple did not act enough. Anyway, this has convinced Country Joe and Robin that the movie medium is sometimes very confusing.

That was the low-keyed news.

As for the brighter side of things for Country Joe, he has completed acting in George Englund's ABC film, "Zachariah," along with the other members of Vanguard's Fish.

Englund auditioned many groups for the outlaw band in his film called the Crackers but he chose Joe and the Fish because, as Englund puts it, "The Fish generate the energy of rock and roll music on film and also maintain the subtle humor that characterizes the whole film both when acting and playing."

Another thing on the bright side for Country Joe is a new Vanguard solo LP. His first solo was the "Country Joe Mc-Donald Thinking of Woody Guthrie." The new LP is titled "She's a Lover, She's a Friend, She's a Wife."

As an actor there still is plenty of optimism. The "Zachariah" film should bring him additional notice. In the meantime he is testing for producer Jerry Ayres for an acting part and is being considered by producer Marvin Worth for the role of the late comedian Lenny Bruce.

Joe and the Fish have finished musical chores on a Scandanavian picture, "Clicy," and are working on Roger Corman's

new film, "Gas! Or It Became Necessary to Destroy the World to Save It."

Country Joe is a leading example of how film producers are beginning to look on rock people as integral parts to films and not just as icing.

In addition to the LP, which will be released on Douglas and distributed through Pickwick International Productions in June, there will be a full-length feature film in the fall. Tenta-

tively titled "Before Your Very Eyes," British filmmakers Malcolm Hart and Mike Margetts have so far spent some 1500 hours editing the footage included in the 44 films into a continuous 90-minute feature.

HOLLYWOOD—Russ Regan, Uni Records VP and General Manager, has returned to his home office following a series of planning conferences with the Dick James Organization of London relative to the initial release of Elton John product in the U.S.

Just off a European tour, which included capacity houses throughout France, Germany, Denmark, and Sweden, the London based composer-vocalist has achieved major status abroad in many situations; however, he is a comparative unknown here, excepting for "insiders" throughout the industry.

DJO, who releases John's product in Europe, is heralding the artist and his lyricist partner, Bernie Taupin, as "the Lennon & McCartney of the '70s." John has received wide recognition for two singles, "Lady Samantha" and "It's Me That You Need," both of which he also penned. Pointing up to the team's acceptance globally, Three Dog Night has recorded "Samantha" and "Your Song," with the latter tune also cut by England's Cilla Black, Additionally, Silver Metre (formerly Blue Cheer) included a quartet of John-Taupin songs on their first LP.

Congress Records, a subsidiary of Uni Records, under a heavy exploitation plan devised by Russ Regan, is intent on providing the performer with star credentials domestically. To bring this about, Regan for all intensive purposes, has designated Congress distributors as "Elton John Information Centers." To affect this, sales-promotion people will be provided with ample components including biographical materials, feature stories, selected photography and advertising aids.

"When airplay begins," said Regan, "I would like our entire staff to be cognizant of Elton's great potential. Without exception, I want everyone to be well versed on the artist's background." Further, a Uni artists relations staffer soon embarks on a tour in which he will conduct a series of Elton John "seminars" with label's field men, via a stereo slide presentation.

Regan noted that a substantial budget has been allocated which will provide for thorough saturation on John's newly released single, "Border Song," in addition to the deluxe album package, due in July.



'Little [Copyright] Progress' Says Senator Brudick

NEW YORK—Senator Quentin N. Brudick of North Dakota, member of the Senate Judiciary Committee and Subcommittee on Patents, Trademarks and Copyrights, addressed the Copyright Luncheon Circle last Friday on the subject of Copyright reform.

"Lots of activity; little progress" is the way he described the state of copyright reform in Congress. He said there was as good a chance as not that a reform bill would be adopted this year, but this depended on resolving questions related to cable TV. The Senator described himself as an opponent of performer copyrights explaining that this would neither create more opportunities for younger artists nor would the increasing royalty burden help the industry. He called for private contractual agreements to set standards in this aspect of the problem.

According to Mayhew, Certron plans a "Super Campaign" for Ronnie Dove which will include TV exposure and personal appearances. Dove, under exclusive contract with Certron, will soon be released on a single and an album under the Certron label.

The Miller and Vinton product will be issued on Certron's Vivid Sound budget tape line.

Producers with Diamond Records who will continue with Certron are Allen Reynolds and Dickie Lee.

In the Diamond transaction, Ruby Winters comes to Certron under exclusive contract.

Mayhew said that the Dove-Diamond deal was the first of Certron's major acquisitions planned for the future. "Many of Diamond's masters are unreleased and will soon be released under the Certron label. They will take their place next to our first release with the Pozo Seco which is already clicking on the charts and on

the play list of 53 major radio stations. Our country release with Bobby Helms, released simultaneously, is being played on 200 country stations."

Mayhew said that Certron has had 50 live recording sessions since January and has plans for at least that many for the remainder of the year. He will release 12 albums for the summer and 35 for the fall, including 25 new Vivid Sounds albums. This does not include Certron International, a major Latin company—they plan to release 15 of their own.

Certron's negotiations with Diamond have been in the works for two months, and were consummated with Aubrey Mayhew and Joe Kolsky of Diamond in New York. Joe Kolsky, founder of Diamond Records and responsible for its success, plans to continue in the record business and will announce his plans in the near future. Starday-King Records President Hal Neely graphically made his points by showing on a blackboard the meanings of the following letters: B-business, black is beautiful; Uyou, taking the opportunity to do things for yourself; Llearn, look after business; Lliaison, between yourself and people in the industry; Ssalesman, nothing happens until someone sells something; H-hit, hype, hard work, help yourself and others; I-involvement, income, individuals, identify; T-together, truth, total.

Proposed Presidents Council

Madelon Baker, President of Audio Arts, mentioned that total involvement meant everyone, not just black and white. Panelist Harold Komisar, Decca Director of Sales, said, "You can't do it by yourself. You must have an organization behind you. You need FORE." Komisar proposed a viable council of presidents of all trade organizations be set up—"If this proved meaningful, that would be total involvement," he said.

Atlantic's Ted Williams suggested those in the audience take a look at themselves, adding that they were getting older and couldn't be successful unless they were totally involved. "FORE will give you this opportunity," he said.

Capitol's Reggie LaVong, VP, Custom Labels, stated, "We deal in too much rhetoric and tokenism and not enough doing." He continued, "Black people don't want an edge. All they want is the opportunity to go as high as they can go. I am sure that any black man can be trained if he believes in working. Once he gets the position, he must work at it."

At Afternoon Meet

At the afternoon panel discussion, Jim Wilson discussed the changing distribution and sales patterns since 1949, feeling that "the manufacturer has to create product, help sell it and even collect money." Buddah's Jimmy Terrell spoke on marketing, breaking down the value of marketing research and the part it plays as to whether a record is regional or national and what to do about it. He advocated the institution of a consulting program service of market studies that can be supported by the in-

Logan Westbrook of Capitol said that the label is developing a program in which their black salesmen would become more identified with the small retail stores in black markets, setting up, too, a management counseling service for those who do not understand the financial operation of a store. "With the salesman knowing each store in his area," said Westbrook, "Capitol can know in advance how many records to press."

Billy Leaner of United Distributors, Chicago, said that the role of the distributor would be strengthened if the manufacturer would give more dated billing and a greater return privilege. He expressed fear of super racks and super manufacturers.

Willis: 200,000,000 Black Buyers

RCA's Buzz Willis noted that the Ma and Pa stores are increasing, and that college and campus book stores are growing in importance. "There are 200,000,000 potential black buyers," he informed.

Harold Komisar said, "There is too much talk about the '70s, and not enough about today. Conglomerates are taking over the business and controlling the marketplace. Many of them are vertical (distributors, racks, manufacturers, retailers). With their control of the market areas, if he doesn't like you, your product is out. The super conglomerate is dangerous. They have helped to make it a business of returns. Some manufacturers are doing something about it. Some have purchased chains of retail stores."

Maurice Holbert, WWIN-Baltimore dj, complained about regional areas helping to make hits, with records then transshipped in by other distributors.

A question and answer period wrapped up the session.

Vikki Charms Persian Rm. With 'Chili Soul'

Thrush Inking With Columbia

NEW YORK—Vikki Carr is back in Manhattan after too long an absence, and she gave an even more relaxed, facile performance at her Persian Room opening last week (20) than on her last visit.

Maybe waiting for "that call" while singing her hit of "It Must Be Him" 100,000 times has mellowed the girl.

Make that 100,001. At any rate, the cute, petite, Mexican-descended thrush, who can still belt 'em with the best. seems to be singing with more nuance (Chili soul?) these days. In her current engagement she is helped further by fresh-sounding, attractive arrangements for these times, heavy on strings and even daring to begin the beguine: and while we have heard most of the tunes quite enough for one pub-crawling lifetime, Vikki makes them all welcome again.

Well, almost all.

Attractively dressed in a simple white gown with a serape-like shawl which she discarded for the second half (the shawl, that is), she missed doing "Raindrops Keep Fallin" on My Head," but not "Spinning Wheel," "Games People Play," "For Once in My Life," "On a Clear Day," "Can't Take My Eyes Off of You," "Until It's Time for You to Go," etc.

Scored with Randy Marr

Perhaps the best response to her musical program (which should give her some ideas) came for the offbeat oldies portion that spotted guitaristsinger Randy Marr soloing on the unlikely "I Wonder Who's Kissing Her Now" (nicely) and duetting with Vikki on the equally unexpected "As Time Goes By" (even more nicely). Outstanding, too, was her question-and-answer period, a unique, even potentially dangerous nitery divertissement, especially when the performer is not exactly a household subject. Nevertheless, after the inevitable few hands were raised asking to attend to a different kind of business, Vikki proved herself a glib young lady with a sharp, show bizzy sense of humor in addition to strong pipes.

On opening night, though, her act ran a little long, which

could be alleviated by cutting some of those listlessly received encore singalongs.

Vikki, incidentally, late of Liberty Records, is at this moment probably signing a contract with Columbia Records. They are lucky to have her. The versatile young entertainer, after (by her count) 12 years of dues-paying, seems to be on the threshold of a major multi-media career.

NOTES FROM THE UNDERGROUND

The Los Angeles rock scene is usually a predictable, seasonal affair.

It blooms in summer, with a rash of new nightclubs and outdoor concerts exploding on the shimmering plastic scene. As fall approaches, attendance wanes, clubs go out of business and outdoor concerts are sharply curtailed. This latter period is inevitably banner-headlined across local periodicals as "The Death of the L. A. Music Scene." Things pick up in spring and by summer, the cycle regenerates itself.

Things are different this year. Events during the last month or so have brought an early death to the city's live rock scene. Perhaps a permanent one.



Last week, two major publications both had cover stories . . . cover obituaries . . . on the status of local live music. A prime catylist for both stories was a recent concert at the Olympic Auditorium, currently rented on weekends by Bill Graham. The show spotlighted a confrontation between a busload of undercover narcotics officers and a contingent of young spectators. More than 80 kids were arrested. In addition, the main stage collapsed in the midst of a set by Little Richard, injuring the singer and several spectators. The incident, which has been commonplace lately on a smaller scale, caused Graham to reconsider his L. A. con-

cert plans, perhaps leaving the scene for good.

In addition, the City Council recently passed legislation which effectively prohibits any rock-oriented gathering of more than 5,000 people at any one time. The Olympic, if even half-full (capacity 10,000), would have violated this law. Also, there's no conceivable way outdoor festivals can take place in the Los Angeles area. This action stems, in chain-reaction, from the mini-disaster at Devonshire Downs last summer.

What happens next in L. A. is open to speculation, though it's obvious that the apparent curtailing of Graham's operations will keep most well-thinking promoters out of the area.

The Los Angeles muddle isn't an isolated incident. The fears and trepidation that erupted out of Altamont are only beginning to gain the impetus that was forecast for them. Perhaps by the end of summer, rock will be restricted to one of its places of origin . . . the small club. Time, as always, will tell.

In respect to Los Angeles' small club scene, until now completely dominated by the stone-rock Whisky A GoGo and the gentle, folky Troubadour, a new club has entered the scene.

Entitled Gregar, it's a joint venture of managers George Greif and Sid Garris (Jose Feliciano, New Christy Minstrels). It's intimate (capacity 250), plush and located on the fringe of Beverly Hills, far from the over-crowded Sunset Strip (a factor which may or may not work against them).


So why open another club in the risky L. A. market?

According to Greif: "We got tired of trying to put new talent into established clubs to get them started. In the early days of Jose Feliciano's career, we offered him to one of the town's clubs for \$500 a week and they wouldn't even go for that. This we think we can give kids who deserve it a crack at a good audience.

"Gregar will feature practically everything available in the entertainment world today, not just music. We'll have movies, plays, acts, singers, comics. If the Budapest String Quartet were in town and available for a day we'd hire them. What I would really like to book is an argument, say Michael Wadleigh vs. Ted Ashley."

One of Greif's more unique ideas for the club is the establish-(Continued on page 37)

Wayne Newton 'Back Home'

NEW YORK—Wayne Newton is in town for a two-week stint at the Americana's Royal Box and found time to stop off at Record World to talk about his record, club, television and movie careers.

He's "back home" on Capitol and his next single is tentatively titled "Up Here in a Tree," which will be followed by an album of contemporary songs. Sometime after that Capitol will release an as yet untitled concept album written for Newton by Bobby Scott and Danny Meehan. Newton says the album "will tell the story of my life in 12 songs." Some of the titles include "Virginia Born," "Stage Child" and "I Just Want To Do My Thing." Newton's first movie has him in the starring role of "Eighty Steps to Jonah," the story of a young migratory worker who is "a bad luck kid" and becomes involved with blind children. Newton characterized the film which also stars Keenan Wynn, Sal Mineo, Mickey Rooney, Joe Van Fleet, Slim Pickens and Diane Ewing as a "family picture—a rarity in this day and age."

At his first job in radio, he wielded a mean broom. He was 13 and working as a jenitor with WBRW in Welsh, W. Va., a few miles from his home town of Williamson. After cleaning the studios he spent time tinkering with the equipment, learning the trade. It wasn't long before he was spinning records after school and on the week-ends. After graduating, he joined the Marines and worked with WTVJ-TV in Miami. He was the announcer for "Tonight's" Ed Mc-Mahon. From there he made his way up in radio from Cincinnati to Columbus and finally Cleveland. When he was with WCFL he and a couple of co-workers thought up the "Chickenman" series which was syndicated, appearing on over 500 radio stations. Time Magazine called Runyon the "pomegranate-voiced" narator of the series. The series is still running on Armed Forces Radio and in Australia.

Guess Who, Miles at Fillmore

NEW YORK—It took a while for RCA's the Guess Who to get it together at the Fillmore East last Saturday, (16). Part of the problem was that the Guess Who would like to be considered much heavier than their AM radio reputation would indicate.

The crowd, however, came to see the group that has had three consecutive monster singles and the current number one record in the country. After a slow start, with little known material, they performed "American Woman" which served as the ice-breaker and brought the crowd enthusiastically around. From there on it was all uphill, performing "These Eyes," their first hit. several lengthy album cuts, "Friends of Mine" and "The Key," and several others including "No Sugar Tonight" and "It Was Too Late" to a suddenly attentive audience. The group really is heavier than their reputation, but until they can establish a substantial underground following they will just have to satisfy themselves by being successful.

The first act on the bill, the Buddy Miles Express, was magnificent. Employing a scalding gospel style, Buddy performs with intense character and integrity. He successfully steals black music back from white musicians and brings along some of the best white innovations in the process. He performs everything from Neil Young to Allman Brothers material with equal verve and excitement and comes up smelling like a major influence. A little more exposure is all that is needed to make this Mercury act a star of major proportions and importance.

Also on the bill was Cold Blood, who were lukewarm and totally underwhelming.

Roulette's Hot Spell Only Warm - Up: Prexy Levy

While a lot of people in the industry think that Roulette has gotten hot, company President Morris Levy says that the label has just been warming up as a prelude to really getting hot in the immediate future with top product, exciting new artists and professionally competent personnel.

"The Best of Tommy James and the Shondells" album just passed the million mark, while the Roulette supergroup's current single, "Come To Me," is rising on charts. At the same time a new group called Alive and Kicking has entered the charts with "Tighter, Tighter" their first single release. They, incidentally, are produced by Tommy James.

Other potent singles breaking out are "What's Gonna Happen to Me" by Charlie Hodges on Calla and "Maybe" by the Three Degrees, a top nitery act and winners in the group category of the just concluded Schaeffer Talent Awards.

Further interest is being stirred by three recently released albums representative of the company's commitment to contemporary product. "Morganmasondowns, Don Crawford and Don Cooper," said Levy, "are right in step with what's happening musically and the response to their album releases justifies our faith in them as artists you'll be hearing a lot from. In particular, Don Cooper's 'Bless the Children' LP has been stepping out in numerous markets and response to his concert performances has been overwhelming."

Product Prime Factor

While acknowledging product as the prime factor, Roulette has moved toward totally aggressive marketing through a close alignment of sales and promotion. Promotion VP Red Schwartz and Sales Vice President Sonny Kirshen maintain a constant interchange of information, product review, market research and other factors affecting their respective areas of responsibilities.

In order to acquire maximum exposure and correlated sales efforts, the company has been reviewing its network of distributors throughout the country. Where necessary, changes in distribution have been effected to insure the best possible representation in an area for Roulette product. Levy said: "We're excited about our artists and committed to their product...it's only fair to expect those handling our line to be just as excited and equally committed."

A part of that commitment lies in the development of upand-coming artists and Roulette has taken steps toward working closely with personal managers. independent producers and booking agents to back up personal appearances and other artist engagements with promotional activity. As an independent, Levy noted that he and his staff are able to devote time in the studio, at distributors and on the road with artists and product - not in a board room with graphs and figures. He feels that the personal factor of total involvement is often lost in overly large corporate setups.

As part of the growth pattern at Roulette, along with the sign-

ing of carefully selected new acts, product via acquisition is continually under discussion. Several acquisition situations are currently under active consideration, but the company maintains that any growth cannot be achieved at the expense of the personal and independent nature of current operations which have accounted for past success and point the way to continued well being for the label and its artists.

Club Review

Newton Gives Patrons What They Want

NEW YORK - Capitol's Wayne Newton, at his Royal Box opening last week, was annoved at first by the amount of smoke in the room, and he was also initially dismayed that the audience wasn't clapping after numbers as they should; but during the course of his heated set, he relented and, by the show's end, when the standing ovation seemed assured, Fig, as he referred to himself, relented and decided we were unequivocally one of the most fantastic audiences he had ever performed for.

Newton knows one sure way to please an audience: he gives them what they want. He sings the saloon standards, a few ballads, a couple of his hits, a little something in Hebrew. There was, however, nothing in Urdu or Swahili. And he plays—the guitar, the banjo, the

violin, the steel guitar. (As Newton's scene-stealing brother Jerry remarked during the show, in one of his endless stream of corny and calculated asides, "I'd take off my coat, but I'm afraid you'd play it.")

My favorite parts were Newton's renditions of "Some-where," "Won't You Come Home, Bill Bailey," "If she Walked Into My Life," both of his renditions of "Raindrops Keep Fallin' on My Head" (a patron who came in late requested the reprise), and I also appreciated the unflagging verve of Newton's conductor, Tommy Amato, who, in addition to leading the six-violined orchestra smartly, moved furniture and handed Newton instrument after instrument with the unblinking efficiency of a nurse during major sur-—Dave Finkle.



Part II: Electrola's Jung On German Record Scene

(Continued from last week)

By PAUL SIEGEL

Siegel: What is your opinion of song festivals like the Grand Prix Eurovision, the San Remo Festival and the German Song Festival and their effects on the market buyers?

Jung: I do favor a lot of song festivals, provided they are well organized and have and adequately experienced management. No doubt, neither the Grand Prix Eurovision nor the Grand Prix Luxembourg or the German Schlager - Wettbewerb (song festival) are as firmly established yet as, for example, the annual San Remo Festival. But despite all this, I am fully convinced that these festivals are both useful and effective. I therefore do not quite understand why the Scandinavian countries, Austria and Portugal decided not to take part in the Grand Prix Eurovision. Nor do I understand why certain artists obviously are afraid to participate.

Siegel: Do you feel that German record artists can be successful recording in English for the USA and Britain?

Jung: Yes, I believe that German vocalists could be successful with recordings in the English language in the English-speaking countries, with the same basic rules for an American or British artist singing German. The artist must have a minimum command of the language, and know what he is singing about to give the listeners a sincere picture of the lyric. However, there are two issues which I also feel are just as essential: first of all. vocalists and their songs should be given a fair chance on the USA and British markets (airplay time and promotion and effort, so that the American and British public decides for themselves); and secondly the vocalists (German ones) should avoid trying to copy American or British major artists, as, unfortunately, the German artists have done in the past. On the other hand, this does not mean that German artists must appear in Bavarian leather trousers whenever they are in the states. However, it is not necessary for them to hide their own personality.

Siegel: What per cent of recordings actually earn back their cost of production?

Jung: Only an insignificant per cent of all recordings released actually earns its production cost later on. There is no solution to this problem. Our business must take this risk, and even if we drop some titles which obviously will be hard to sell, we shall have to go on releasing a great number of records in order to have more chances on the buying market.

Siegel: How do you feel about American, British and other foreign artists making personal guest shots in Germany and meeting the German dj and tradesters?

Jung: Recently I have been extremely happy that our American artists visited this country. Nancy Wilson, Glen Campbell, Wanda Jackson, Bobbie Gentry, Andy Kim, Al Martino, the Four Tops and many other foreign artists came to visit us in Germany, and they all had successful television appearances and press action, which helped their selling power here. I am convinced that American or British artists will no longer avoid coming to Germany when touring in Europe. Of course we would love to have a lot more artists visit us. However, we are forced to concentrate to a certain degree on these invitations for budget reasons. May I take this opportunity to express my sincere thanks to all artists who already were here and invite the others to come and see us in the near future.

Siegel: From which foreign market does Germany make the most money?

Jung: The major part of foreign pressing fee income is realized in the U.S. and Japanese markets. But I feel that only in Japan are the people really interested in German music, particularly classical recordings. In the USA, the sale of German record product is more or less due to a great percentage of the

Germany's million-selling voice, Freddy, has been going through producers like a hot knife through butter, and now Gerhard Mendelson, who has turned out hit after hit for Polydor, has taken over. I wonder if Mendelson remembers our first hit together in Vienna, 1948, with Horst Winter, called, "Die Zeit mit dir war schön" . . . Jackie Gleason may not know it, but he's a big, big favorite with his Capitol ork on nighttime shows

here in Germany . . . This June 29 is the D day for the Grand Prix Eurovision Festival as far as Germany is concerned Norman Greenbaum, who is known to us for his underground songs, is due to hit Germany in July . . . Klaus Quirini, head of the German DDO (Dj Organization), operates a fabulous show from his nightclub in Aachen. His 750 djs all over the country are in harmony with the record ideas of Klaus Q. Keep up the good work, fella . . . Sergio Mendes in town and did a hot show Mary Roos of CBS Records will stay with CBS . . . Kim Fowley of Hollywood due in Germany soon, and we await him with bells on, especially with his hot single, "Doomsday Afternoon" on Philips . . . That wonder girl stylist Conny Froboess, who's had top selling singles and LPs, now in confab with various labels, and we wish her a hot disk . . . After a silence of almost 10 years, it was very good to hear from my New York buddy, Buddy Basch, whose pen talent is a golden one. Keep in touch, Buddy Frank Zivanovic, prexy of Bellaphon Records in Frankfurt, just called and thanked us again and again for our feature on him . . Bert Kaempfert's music is as popular as ever here, but his Polydor buddy, James Last, is orchestrally and instrumentally fighting him neck and neck for first place sales honors at Deutsche Grammophon . . . I predict a rebirth of the Johann Strauss Vienna waltz stylings in Europe, and a carryover to stateside sounds . . Ariola-Eurodisc Records pushing on Igor Oistrach with his classical violin . . . Electrola's Wilfried Jung, before his trip to EMI in London, rushed us a tape of congrats for our 25th anniversary on dj radio. Thanx, Wilfried, and be careful crossing the London lanes. Traffic comes the other way!

American buying public who are of German origin. I do feel we could do a lot to alter things in the states in this regard. My thoughts on this question are a separate volume itself.

Siegel: What pertinent organizational projects are you planning for Electrola in the coming years?

Jung: It is quite clear that we at Electrola will have to adapt our organization to the existing market demands as well as to all expected sales increases. Success makes it, and we can only accept the inquiries of foreign companies to market their product in Germany when

we, for example, improve and specialize our distributional set-up. We are on the verge of cooperating with other record companies in Germany, and also of establishing a rack-jobbing organization. We have to be prepared for the development of the audio-video technique as well as TV cartridges. We also established a musicassette production for Europe in Cologne, in order to keep up to the development in this field. There are a number of other things which we at Electrola/EMI are planning to do in the years to come but we must report on them at a later date.

Germany's leading radio and TV magazine, Hoer Zu, will honor Siegel. VIPs such as Director Wilfried Jung of Electrola/EMI, Wolfgang Kretzchmar, A&R chief of Philips, Automatenmarkt Editor Uwe Lencher and Klaus Quirini, President of the German Dj Organization, will be among guests on the show. Record artists Gilbert Becaud, Hildegard Knef, Udo Jurgens, Frank Pourcel, Henry Mancini, Al Martino and Duke Ellington also will appear.

It was exactly 25 years ago that Siegel did his first broadcast over radio LINZ in Austria. Then came Siegel's worldwide broadcast on Radio Vienna, where the Chicago Philharmonic performed his "Symphonic Diary." NMPA Sets Annual Meet

Major importance is being attached to the annual membership meeting of the National Music Publishers Association. The organization's first general session of the new decade, scheduled for Tuesday (26) at New York's Drake Hotel, is being held in the wake of the biggest annual membership spurt in NMPA history.

According to Executive Vice President Leonard Feist, who returned last week from an observation tour of Europe, the meeting is expected to deal with a host of issues of key importance to publishers as they face the challenges of the '70s.

Principal among these are the problem of rampant tape and disk piracy; new aspects of the international scene affecting publishers; the impact of new technological developments, including EUR; the problems of printed infringements, such as the so-called fake books; the outlook on the long-in-the-mill revised copyright law and the question of special mail rates within the educational category.

Hear Chiantia Report

The meeting will hear NMPA President Sal Chiantia deliver his annual report, and will also receive a special report on the activities of the public relations committee by chairman Al Brackman. The firm of Ren Grevatt Associates was recently retained to handle public relations for the association.

A cocktail reception will be held immediately following the meeting in an adjoining suite of the hotel. The following day, it was also announced, the board of directors of NMPA will meet to elect officers for the coming year in the association's new and recently opened East 59th St. headquarters.

New Marks Catalog

Edward B. Marks Music Corp has issued its new Record Catalog listing recent recordings of its songs.

Of the 10 most listed songs, as many as seven are of foreign origin. "More" (Italian) with 61 recordings tops the list, bringing its total recordings close to 400. "If You Go Away" (French), Jacques Brel's bestknown work in this country, with Rod McKuen's equally celebrated lyrics and with 30 recordings as its score (59 to date), occupies the second position. "Malaguena" (Cuban), with 25 disks to its credit, takes the third place while the next three positions are shared by "Yellow Days" (Mexican), "God Bless' the Child" and "Song of the Islands" (Hawaiian), with 20 records each. "Give My Regards to Broadway," the George M. Cohan standard, "What a Diff'rence a Day Made' (Mexican) and "Yours" (Cuban) round up the top 10.

Songs from "George M!" and Oscar Brown, Jr's "Joy" dominate the theater section, while "Mah-Na Mah-Na," "Rossana's Theme" and "A Man, A Horse, and a Gun," besides "More," feature prominently in the film category.

Diversity From Kapp

LOS ANGELES—Diversification is offered in a compact release from newly revamped Kapp Records, shipping immediately.

Headed up by a new LP from Roger Williams, "Themes From Great Movies," the line-up is further highlighted by the elpee debut of El Chicano, whose "Viva Tirado" single is on national charts.

"Two Mules For Sister Sara," film toplining Shirley MacLaine and Clint Eastwood, offers a new Ennio Morricone score. Also due are two country entries, Cal Smith via "Country Hit Parade" and Mel Tillis' "She'll Be Hanging 'Round Somewhere."

Sales Innovations

To fully expose first album release since he assumed Kapp's general managership, Johnny Musso has instituted a number of sales-promotion innovations, coordinating closely with Carl Maduri, label's National Sales Manager. shows (although the kinks are discussed and announced over the loudspeakers) the results of circulation of bad acid, the mess of downpours, the frustration of entering and leaving Max Yasgur's farm, the hardship of too little food and water, the unsettling intransigence.

The endemic complications of city life (which were beginning to constrict the festival, and certainly would have killed it off—were the conclave to have lasted another day, another 12 hours) were glossed by the patrons and the movie-makers alike, made to seem minor flies in a civilization-curing ointment.

A Favorite Scene

One of my favorite scenes, because so moving, so indicative of the mood of the festival, occurred when the crowd of 400,000(?), feeling god-like in their magnitude, commanded, in ritualistic chant, as the first black storm clouds ferociously devoured a red sunset, "No rain. No rain." It rained.

If "Woodstock" is a documentary of an event, it is also a visual recording of rock per-

forming. Since "Woodstock" uses split screen throughout, what one sees of the performers in the movie house is unlike anything the Woodstock assemblage saw (among other ignored features of the festival, there was no shot of the stage from the back of the crowd, no reporting on what it was like to see the performers from half a mile away).

The performers as part of a festival is not stressed; but the performers as performers are enhanced by "Woodstock." Unstrained imaginative use of the split screen, slow motion and frozen frames amplified the presences of especially Joe Cocker, the Who, Sly and the Family Stone, Crosby, Stills and Nash, Alvin Lee and Ten Years After and Jimi Hendrix. The film is a fine example of how to present rock entertainers on celluloid.

(Cotillion, after protracted legal hassles, has issued a soundtrack they are billing as "Music from the Original Soundtrack and More." What this means is that much of the music in the movie is not in the album, and vice versa. But the performers, with the exception of Jefferson Airplane, are the same, and so are many of the

announcements, the most touching of which is one of the emcee's storming warnings. "God bless you," he says to the crowd.)

"Woodstock," for its flaws and its excellences, will stand as a record of a significant modern event. And it can be enjoyed without one's being stoned (the young audience I was with wasn't).

It can be appreciated also as a subtle reminder of the bond between the generations, not the gap.

In one scene, the camera, while interviewing youngsters calling home to anxious parents, watches a telephone company money collector empty coin caches. Only a few dimes, if any, fall out. In other words, the kids were calling collect and the parents were accepting the charges. —Dave Finkle.

NEW YORK-The latest installment of "What's Al Kooper Up to Now" rolled into the Bitter End last week and was the reason for a Columbia press party in Kooper's honor. The man who, as they incessantly tell us, played with Dylan, was in the original Blues Project, played with the Royal Teens, founded Blood, Sweat and Tears, played on scores of Super Session albums, stood "Alone" and didn't know who his friends were and scored the Norman Jewison production of "Landlord," now leads a competent trio.

The bass player and drummer from the Tiffany group Brethren give Kooper adequate backing as he plays two electric guitars (he uses a "Flying V" for blues numbers), one acoustic guitar and the piano. He's not a flashy guitarist and his keyboard excellence is legend. His singing, however, has its ups and a few downs. He performed quite a number of familiar tunes which have popped up in the context of several of his past groups including "I Can't Quit Her" and Nilsson's "Without Her." He gave us a duplicate of Taj Mahal's "Corrina Corrina" with the glaring difference that Kooper's voice just can't cut Taj.

One unique vocal trick which was effective is his singing harmony note for note with guitar and piano. The problem is he was on the note about 85% of the time and the remaining 15% was hard to take. Still and all, the man has charisma, is a respected figure in contemporary music and is a talented musician. We love you, Al.

Brethren Together

NEW YORK — Brethren, a group which records for the Scepter-distributed Tiffany label, made an impressive showing at a press party in their honor at the Bitter End last week.

The group is tasteful, subtle and plays it clean. No 20-minute drum solos, no screaming guitars, just good rock music, unfettered and delightful. The group has clearly been influenced by other groups, but only by the best other groups. Some of their songs are dead ringers for Traffic's at least in terms of tonal quality. There are traces of the Band, Taj Mahal, the Rascals and maybe a bit of Joe Cocker. No matter, because Brethren holds its own and an easy-going, tight jazz-tinged rock sound emerges which is all their own.

Doubtless Brethren will be getting around a lot in the coming months and one would do well by one's self to see them; they're a group difficult to type except that they're just plain good and good to hear.

Glen Packs Internat'l

LAS VEGAS—Capitol's Glen Campbell bowed at the International here last week in an evening of extravagant festivities.

The show was titled, grandly, "Portrait of Glen Campbell in Sound."

Doling out his homespun likeability in large dollops, Campbell entertained (and introduced) the likes of Ann-Margret, Roger Smith, Joe Namath (his co-star in "Norwood") Bobby Darin and Capitol Prexy Sal Iannucci.

Backed by the Goodtime Singers, whom he brought with him straight from inside the TV tube, Campbell breezed through pop, gospel and country tunes (many of them his smashes) like "MacArthur Park," "Make the World Go Away," "Wichita Lineman," "By the Time I Get to Phoenix," "Galveston," "Oh Happy Day," "Gentle on My Mind," "More," "Proud Mary," "Bridge Over Troubled Water."

Judging by the reaction of the crowds at the first show and the endless line of patrons waiting enthusiastically for the second show, one would safely guess that the Texas dimple will be playing to SRO houses throughout his stay.

Dean Martin, by the way, put in a surprise visit to welcome Campbell to the stage.





with WINN in Louisville; Larry Scott, WIL, St. Louis; Earle Faulk, WCMS, Norfolk; George Richey, Capitol Records; Scott Turner, Liberty/UA Records; and Jack Gardiner, Gardiner-Hudson Associates.

This panel was followed by a brief demonstration of recently-developed Shaeffer automation equipment conducted by Biff Collie, Liberty/Imperial Records.

The afternoon session opened with Charlie Lamb and Roger Scutt in a situation entitled "The Classic Hype." The serious business then continued with a panel moderated by Bill Williams of Billboard, on the subject "The Music Industry: A Unit or Separate Islands." The panel included Finley Duncan, Minaret Records and Duncan Amusement; Gene Ferguson, Columbia Records; Shelley Davis, WRCP, Philadelphia; and Troy Shondell, ASCAP.

The session ended with Tex Davis, Monument Records, and Dick Blake, Sponsored Events, discussing the subject "Package Shows are Supposed to Make Money." The panelists pointed out methods which could be used by small market stations to promote successful package shows.

The second day was devoted, in a large part, to management and personnel. The day began with a panel moderated by Early Williams, Tree International, and McEntee on the subject "Radio Management: Business or Hobby?" Panelists included Bill Wheatley, WWOK, Miami; Rocky Reich, WUNI, Mobile; Dan McKinnon, KSON, San Diego; and Bill Jenkins, WWOL, Buffalo. The panel covered station relationships with the audience, community involvement, promotion of call letters, and selling the station and its sound to advertisers.

The afternoon session began with a panel moderated by Mc-Entee on the subject "Management and Staff Relationships." Dick Schofield, KFOX, Long Beach; Bill Ward, KBBQ, Burbank; and Ken Speck, formerly with WSLR, Akron, discussed management / staff relationships, grooming programmers toward management and the role of the program director in a station's operation.

"Keeping Track of Your Tools" was the subject of a panel moderated by Ralph Paul, Jack Music; and including Bruce Nelson, WUBE, Cincinnati; Johnny "K", WENO,

Nashville; and John Sturdivant, Record World Magazine representing the Country Record Sales Council.

Following the afternoon session, those registrants who were interested were transported to Monument Studios where Mort Thomason conducted a lecture which involved the making of a record; recording, remixing, mastering, etc.

The entire two-day seminar was climaxed by a banquet and entertainment which was highlighted by an unannounced performance by Don Gibson. The show featured eight young recording artists including: Jack Barlow, Jamie Kaye, Karen Kelly, Wayne Kemp, Lynda K. Lance, LaWanda Lindsey, Dee Mullins, and Norro Wilson.

Scott and Seabolt Win CMS Awards


