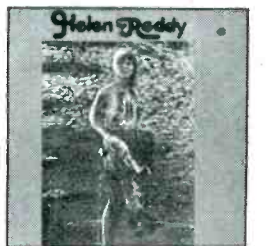

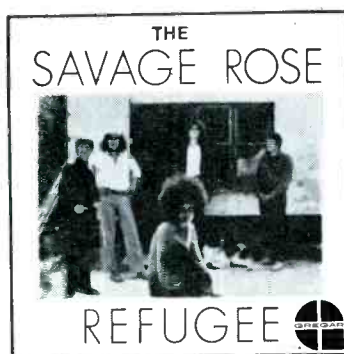

S. Bernstein Presents Pop at DeMille

■ NEW YORK — At a press conference last week (16) Sid Bernstein and Walter Reade, Jr., announced the finalization of an agreement for live presentations at the DeMille Theater at 7th Avenue and 47th St. The first shows at the hall will be solo performances by Melanie on Friday and Saturday nights (26, 27) of Thanksgiving weekend.

In an interview with *Record*

World prior to the announcement, Sid described the new venture: "The first shows with Melanie will be a shakedown cruise for the theater. After that weekend we are going to take about eight weeks to start booking the house for '72. Melanie will give one show a night, but most acts will play two shows every Friday and Saturday. We will be going after the most important acts in the world. Overtures are al-

ready being made to such artists as Blood, Sweat and Tears, Sonny and Cher, Joan Baez, John Denver, Mary Travers, Carole King, Paul Anka, John Sebastian, Neil Diamond and the Rolling Stones."

Some of the specific details of the operation are still to be worked out, but Bernstein and his partner, Billy Fields, outlined briefly many of the features of the hall. The DeMille seats only 1,500 people, thus

making it an intimate showcase for those who, in Sid's words, "want to reach out and touch every person in the audience, right up to the people in the last row." The theater already has speakers set up for stereo, which will make possible enhanced listening and live recordings by performers. (The sound will be handled by Weisberg Sound.) As for lighting, Billy Fields is working on

Composers/Lyricists Guild To Strike Film/TV Producers

■ LOS ANGELES—The Composers and Lyricists Guild of America, in a membership meeting Nov. 15 at the Continental Hyatt House, has voted unanimously to strike the Association of Motion Picture and Television Producers, Inc., at the expiration of their present contract, midnight, Nov. 30, 1971.

Last week the Composers and Lyricists Guild negotiated with the producers association for a new Collective Bargaining Agreement.

The Guild was represented by Elmer Bernstein, President; Ted Cain, Executive Director and a committee of composers which included Henry Mancini, Burt Bacharach, Alan Bergman, Arthur Hamilton, Jay Livingston, Lalo Schifrin, Sherman Brothers, Quincy Jones, Neal Hefti and David Raksin.

The Producers were represented by Charles Boren, Exec VP and chief negotiator; Alfred P. Chamie, VP; Eugene Arnstein, VP; Saul Weislow and delegates from all of the major studios and independents of note.

Theodore W. Kheel, labor lawyer, negotiator and mediator of New York City, as special counsel and Abraham Marcus of Beverly Hills, the Guild's regular counsel, represented the Guild at negotiations.

Reached Impasse

Negotiations with the AMPTP reached an impasse on Wednesday (10) on the issue of Copyright ownership. Under

the present agreement, the producer controls and owns not only the use of music in the film for which it was composed, but may re-use the music in other films, television, sell it to be used as commercial jingles and records. He may also use the music in any medium now known or which may be invented in the future, according to the language of the contract. The composer may not make any further use of his music, including public concert performances, without permission of the producer.

Under the terms of the present contract, it is stated that at the time of payment to the composer, the producer becomes, in a legal sense, the author of the composition.

CLGA is asking for copyright control by the creator of the music and offering the producers certain guarantees enabling them to exploit the music for the benefit of his product. In addition CLGA has asked to have its pension benefits brought up to standards of other guilds and unions; to institute reasonable limit on the amount of work the composer can be required to do in a given week (presently there is no limit on such exploitation); that the issue of video cassettes and such other futuristic media be left for a time as the use and application becomes clearer.

All of these requests were denied, leaving CLGA to recommend a work stoppage.

Execs, Producers on 'Flipside' TVer

■ "Flipside," a half-hour, nationally syndicated TV program built around record company presidents and independent producers, will bow in February, 1972.

The show, which will be featured in most markets on Saturday night, is expected to reach approximately 75% of U.S. TV homes, according to Matthew J. Culligan, President of Teletape Productions, the syndicator who will be handling sales and distribution. Gie Aucoin is Producer-Director and Betty Sperber is Associate

Producer and will be responsible for all talent that appears on the show.

Culligan, who is a former President of the Mutual Broadcasting System and of Curtis Publishing, stated that each program will feature an executive introducing recording artists he works with in a recording studio setting. The half-hour will be a mixture of live conversational dialogue, filmed and taped musical performances and record sessions in actual progress.

Farrell MGM Special Projects Promo Manager

■ Ben Scotti, VP and Director of National Promotion for MGM Records, has announced the appointment of Ernie Farrell as National Promotion Manager, Special Projects.

Farrell has held many executive positions in the industry and until recently was personal promotion man for Sammy Davis, Jr., and Frank Sinatra, Jr.

Levine PIP Promo Director

■ NEW YORK — Bugs Bower, of PIP Records, announces the appointment of Eddie Levine as Director of National Promotion.

Levine, who formerly headed national promotion and sales at Map City/Delite Records, was closely associated with the success of Kool & the Gang who racked up seven chart singles and two chart albums for Map City. Levine, who will report directly to VP of Sales Hal Charm, had previously been with United Artists Records for 3½ years.

Funky \$6 Million

■ "E Pluribus Funk," the first issue of the new Grand Funk Railroad label, the group's sixth album, was released Nov. 15 and before the first sale was made in any record store in the world, the advance orders already exceeded the \$6 million mark at the dealer level.

Copyright Seminar Dec. 8-9

■ NEW YORK — A two-day seminar on copyrights, co-sponsored by the National Music Publishers Association and the Recording Industry Association of America, will be held on Dec. 8 and 9 at the Plaza Hotel.

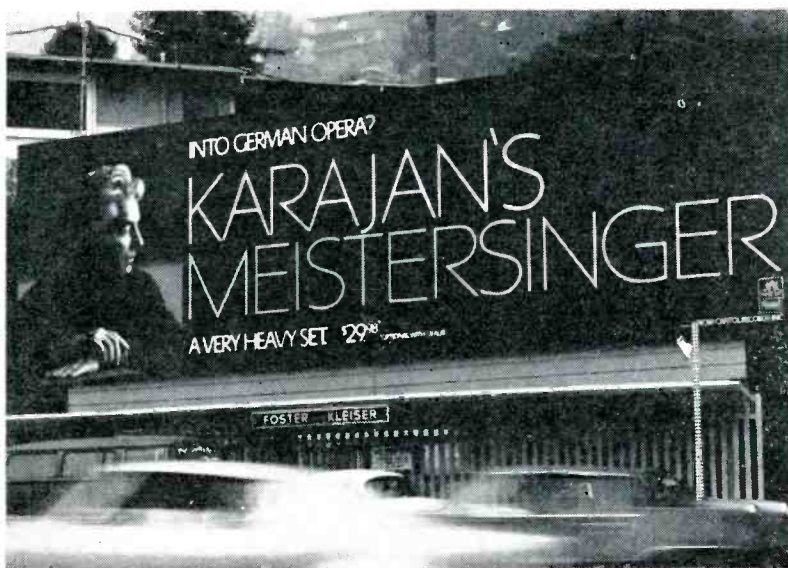
The seminar, to be conducted by officials of the U. S. Copyright Office, has a dual purpose: to acquaint members of the recording industry with the requirements for registering new recordings made after Feb. 15, 1972, the date on which new recordings become eligible for copyright; and to provide music publishers with a briefing on procedures and services offered by the Copyright Office. Included in the agenda will be such topics as renewals and assignments of copyrights, reference services provided by the Copyright Office and an examination of the new penalties recently enacted for the unauthorized recording of music.

A luncheon on the first day will feature a speaker on international copyright developments, including revisions to the Berne and UCC international copyright treaties, as well as the International Anti-Piracy Treaty recently signed by 23 nations in Geneva, Switzerland.

Members of the music publishing and recording industries may arrange to attend the seminar by writing to National Music Publishers Association, 110 East 59th St., New York, N. Y. 10022 or Recording Industry Association of America, One East 57th St., New York, N. Y. 10022.

Reservations should be accompanied by a check in the amount of \$15. for each registrant to cover expenses, including luncheon. Since the attendance will be limited to about 300 persons, registrations will be accepted on a first-come basis.

Angel 'Meistersinger' Promoted on Strip

■ LOS ANGELES—Angel Records has taken a 48x14 billboard on West Los Angeles' Sunset Strip to promote its new recording of Richard Wagner's "Die Meistersinger," conducted by Herbert von Karajan. The hand-painted board, featuring a color portrait of the Austrian maestro, stands in an area filled with pop promo boards, and has already stirred keen dealer response in the area, according to Brown Meggs, Capitol's VP for Marketing.

The hip language of the board's copy is directed on one level to the young consumer with no bias against straight, serious classics. "Meistersinger

er' is 'heavy' in several ways," explains Meggs. "It's an expensive item—five long-play discs—for the consumer to purchase, and a mammoth investment for Capitol and E.M.I., which produces most of our Angel recordings. It calls for novel means of promotion, just as we're constantly seeking novel repertoire like Satie and Varèse and promoting artists like Daniel Barenboim and André Previn, to whom young people can relate."

"Promoting 'Meistersinger' on the Strip is a gamble," Meggs admits, "but it's one we believe will pay sales dividends in the total L.A. market."

Tommy James in Under Budget in Nashville

■ NASHVILLE—It's standard procedure for the press to interview entertainers who travel to Music City to record. The first question put to visiting stars is usually: "Why did you come to Nashville to record?"

But in a luncheon interview with Roulette artist Tommy

James ("Hanky Panky," "Crimson & Clover," "Draggin' the Line"), the answers to this interviewer's questions were not at all stock.

"I'd flown over Nashville many times to record in New York or L.A.," James said, "and everytime I passed over Nashville, I considered stopping. So when we started putting our songs together for the new album, my partner Bob King and I decided to make that stop in Nashville.

"Aside from getting the freshest sound we've ever had, we're going to run at least a third under budget. It's fantastic how fast these musicians down here can pick up on a song. It's not at all like New York or L.A. Best of all, they're totally dedicated. If we need some extra help, they stay around to see that we get it."

Tommy's new album, "My Head, My Bed and My Red Guitar," was cut at Scotty Moore's Music City Recorders with Tommy, Bob King and Pete Drake co-producing.

'New' Jose Feliciano

■ NEW YORK — José Feliciano seems to be moving, subtly but distinctly, from album to album and appearance to appearance, toward a new kind of identification. In New York for a series of TV shots and several concerts, he spoke to Record World about the artistic changes he is going through.

José has primarily been identified as an expert acoustic guitarist and an interpreter of other people's songs, "Light My Fire" being perhaps the foremost example. As he tells it, though, this is changing: "On my latest album ("That the Spirit Needs" on RCA) I have written eight of the songs; the other three are two by Elton John and one by Cat Stevens. And I've gotten into the electric guitar a lot more. I feel that the result has much more solidity than previous LPs."

With the album and a new single ("Daytime Dreams") just released, things look bright for the present. But José was also anxious to discuss future plans: "I'd like to do an album which tells a story, an opera for kids but with a contemporary musical thing. Nobody cares about kids anymore."

After his current tour a rest is in store for José at his California home. But when he gets started again, he may be getting involved in movies, and a European tour is a possibility for next spring.

Stax Fights Piracy

■ NEW YORK—Stax Records has announced a plan to fight piracy, and in executing it Stax will use FBI tactics and ex-FBI operators.

The announcement was made at a press conference here last week.

The campaign will go into effect with the release of Isaac Hayes' "Black Moses."

The Move to Mobile Recording

■ (Editor's Note: Lyle Fain, founder of Fedco Audio Labs, is a Solid State Physicist with a Masters' Degree from Brown University. Since the inception of Fedco a little more than a year ago, this 16 track mobile recording studio has cut many successful live albums.)

I think the best way to get into a look at what's happening in the recording scene today, and more specifically in the mobile recording scene, is to draw a parallel between it and a similar scene: the film industry.

Virtually all the major Hollywood studios have divested themselves of the stages, land and staffs they spent years building, and have become, in effect, consortiums, clearing houses for independently produced feature films.

The major record companies have done much the same thing. United Artists Records and Columbia, for example, are dropping their staff producers and have left executive producers in charge of coordinating deals with independents. In addition, as independent producers and artists become successful, it is understood that when they come to the majors for distribution deals and money, they (the independents) retain artistic control, exactly the way successful independent filmmakers have been operating.

The reason for the change in filmmaking can be attributed to breakthroughs in the development of equipment and to the sophistication of audience tastes. Filmmakers can now shoot virtually anywhere and bring total realism in locations, sets, etc., to the screen and audiences have now come to expect this authenticity.

Realities for Same Reason

Mobile recording studios have become realities for the same reasons. The equipment was developed as a natural technological extension, and at the same time the tastes of the audience were changing. Taking a closer look at live recording, the question "What do we need it for?" may come to mind. One answer to that question is "Woodstock."

The "Woodstock" albums captured a truly historic moment in time. None of the performances, spirit or emotions experienced on that farm in Bethel, N.Y. could ever be duplicated in a recording studio. The albums are more than souvenirs; they're pieces of living memorabilia every time they're played.

But there are more reasons for the success of "live" albums than the preservation of history. Many people, both artists and audiences, feel that the truest artistic expression a musician can produce is during a live performance. A good audience can bring a feeling to the artist, can stimulate and encourage him, push him to unusual heights. Just as the performer gives to the audience, the audience gives to the performer. Mobile recording captures the exchange.

This is not to say that the end of the recording studio is at hand. Far from it. Just as films will continue to be produced on sound stages, records will continue to be cut in studios. There are many reasons for the use of permanent recording facilities. Certain scenes can't be filmed anywhere but on a closed movie

set and certain sounds can't be duplicated outside a studio. Then, too, there are times when a musician needs the isolation of a recording booth, the peace and uninterrupted atmosphere of a controlled studio situation.

Many successful artists like John Fogerty, Neil Young, Dylan and even Sergio Mendes broke away from the sterile and somewhat restrictive major studios and built their own eight or 16 track operations. This gave them total freedom, unlimited time and a completely comfortable and relaxed atmosphere. Studios offer time and equipment that give the artist a clear shot at achieving his concept of perfection (technically, at least). But albums like "Mad Dogs and Englishmen" and "The Doors Absolutely Live" will appear on the scene with much more frequency. People who buy records today expect honesty, reality and spontaneity, and the performers' artistic integrity demands the same.

An Extension of Artist

On occasion, a mobile studio can be used as an extension of the artist, almost as if it were an instrument. When Judy Collins contracted us to record her "Whales and Nightingales" album, she had specific places in mind for recording each cut. They were places having acoustic and aesthetic qualities especially suited to certain songs: Columbia University Chapel (St. Paul's, for example, where she cut "Amazing Grace." Churches don't come equipped with recording studios, but she was able to take us with her. Another example on the same album is "If I Had a Golden Thread" and "Gene's Song." Both were cut in the living room of a friend's house on Green St. in Greenwich Village.

George Martin, currently producing Seatrain and the Paul Winter Consort for Capitol, had us set up a temporary studio for him in a house in Marblehead, Mass. The house was fitted with a full complement of 16 track recording equipment as well as closed circuit TV, and offers technical security, artistically favorable working conditions and locations; and, when Martin is ready to leave, the studio can be broken down quickly and inexpensively and used somewhere else, proving that you don't have to go to Muscle Shoals—Muscle Shoals can come to you.

Cheaper to Cut Live

Of course, there are reasons other than artistic expression which point the way towards an increase in live album recording. One of the most obvious is cost. In most cases, it's cheaper to cut a live concert than to cut a studio session. With a studio at his disposal, and the feeling of time which studios encourage, an artist or producer can spend forever hunting for the right sound and feel for his music, a very costly forever. Tape and time costs build quickly as a song is cut over and over again. Measure the average cost of remote recording against studio and engineer overtime and you'll find a marked difference.

In a recent interview, Joe Smith of Warner Brothers pointed out that there are 78 million record players and stereo sets in homes in the U.S. alone. The market for music is greater than ever before. The studios will be busier and busier, and the mobile recording studios will log more and more miles—it's inevitable.

The opening featured a dance by Aretha, her back-up singers and choreographer Tony Wells. She then paid a beautiful tribute to her father, Rev. C. Franklin, in a song she had written for him. Following this was a solo spot by sister Carolyn, and then some funny story-telling by Gil-

liam.

Back on stage again, Aretha, "rockin' steady" all the way, brought the house down and the SRO audience to its feet with such "Aretha Greats" as "Respect," "Dr. Feelgood," "Say a Little Prayer," "Spanish Harlem" and some really fantastic vocal imitations of songstresses Della Reese, Sarah Vaughan, Diana Ross and Dionne Warwick.

Lady Soul is in a class all her own. Whether in concert, on a nightclub stage or doing a TV guest spot, Aretha Franklin generates an excitement and charisma that is rarely seen in any female performer today.

Hayes Scores at Philharmonic

NEW YORK — The latest phenomenon in the music world is the music from the motion picture "Shaft," which has crossed all musical borders and risen to No. 1 on every conceivable chart.

Isaac Hayes, the creator and principal performer of the music, gave a concert at Philharmonic Hall last Saturday (13) which was notable not only for its excellent musical content but also for the lack of the sort of excitement one would expect this sort of show to generate.

Hayes and his large group of backup musicians performed some of the score of "Shaft," some of Hayes' other recent hits ("Never Say Goodbye" stood out) and even offered a

preview of the forthcoming "Black Moses" album. All the performances were more than adequate, and Hayes' vocals and organ solos were outstanding; even his long spoken introductions to the songs were effective. The show would have to be rated a success, but somehow the pop phenomenon type of excitement was missing.

Opening the show was the United Artists group War, who are also enjoying much success of late with their "All Day Music" single and album. War's entire set consisted of one song, but it might better be referred to as one riff. There is much talent in this group, but they need more diversity in their live act. **Mike Sigman**

Spyder Turner Turns On Act I

NEW YORK—Spyder Turner, who hit with "Stand By Me" some years back, made a special appearance at New York's Act I last week, at which he revealed a new sound which augurs well for a revitalization of his recording career.

Backed by a rock band, Turner did a group of contemporary songs that have been done by other artists, highlighted by a great version of Sly Stone's "Higher." The most obvious thing about Spyder's act is that although he has changed his backup musicians and his style somewhat, his enthusiasm remains as strong ever.

He has been touring constantly over the past few years, but has not had a recording contract. This situation will be changed soon, and fans will again have the pleasure of listening to Spyder Turner on records as well as live.

Plans include close surveillance at fabricating plants, pressing operations and known bootlegging operations throughout the country.

In addition, shopping information on the album and the release date are known only to two Stax executives.

Distribution of the record will be of a quick, penetrating and saturative nature.

A Stax spokesman said at the conference, "We believe that our control plan will benefit the entire industry as a guideline in their efforts to fight the plague of record piracy. We also believe that our efforts, when publicized, will act as a deterrent to the pirates and counterfeiters throughout the country and that our organization and its publishers, producers, musicians and products—the Hayes records and those of other industry artists—will be protected for the consumer and the financial community."

CAMPUS RECORD REPORT

Around the Stations

By GARY K. COHEN

■ A number of stations have received initial, intermediate or final approval from the FCC to begin broadcasting on the FM band, or to increase their power. WSRN, Swarthmore College in Pennsylvania; WLVR, Lehigh University, Bethlehem Pa.; WLVC-FM, Loyola University in Chicago; a power increase for KCLC-FM, Lindenwood college in St. Charles, Mo., are among the stations involved. A station you should add to your mailing list is WTUL-AM & FM, Tulane University, Tulane University Center, New Orleans, La. 70118. Music Director is Alan Orkin.

From WSRN's (Swarthmore) newsletter:

"... Recently Dan Gibbon, our synergistic Music Director, was on the phone and received a tirade that would make an operator blush from a promotion man he had called to say hello. Between expletives, Dan was told that the records in question were sent and probably had been stolen or lost by us. I would like to say... for the umpteenth time... that this is impossible. Only Dan and myself are authorized to pick up the mail (they won't give it to anyone else), and we both keep a record of what arrives. Furthermore, I work in the post office, and so can keep track of what comes in. WSRN's policy is to keep all—repeat all—albums received on our shelves forever. We have enough floor space to allow us to do this. Every album is thoroughly listened to and copiously marked 'WSRN.' Singles are kept for six months to a year, and are then given away when we have no hope for them. We never throw out a record. Our service over the past year was so great that we had to add on two new sections of shelves, but that is all right. The point is that we can't misplace or steal albums received in the post office..." Perry Margolin. (Editor's Note: Are record companies still using the old cop-put about records being lost in the mail or stolen by college students? Anything to avoid servicing stations.)

Convention Analysis

Moderation appears to be the key in meetings between college and commercial broadcast-

ers around the country.

In earlier meetings some college broadcasters, mostly from non-commercial carrier current or educational FM stations, have taken the view that making a profit in radio was improper. At the same time, commercial radio owners, managers and programmers heard this, they tended to dismiss all comments and criticisms of campus broadcasters as not being realistic. The discussions at the Loyola University Conference and the FM and college sessions at the Bill Gavin Conference found college stations realizing that there is nothing wrong with a radio station making money, but also found radio managers admitting that their stations should be doing MOR in the community. This is the approach that both college and commercial broadcasters should take... a realistic approach to the purposes of commercial radio.

It is good to see, though, commercial radio people realizing that their sole purpose in broadcasting is not to make a buck.

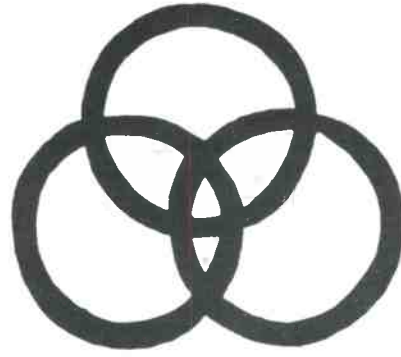
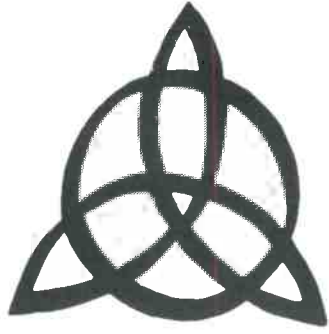

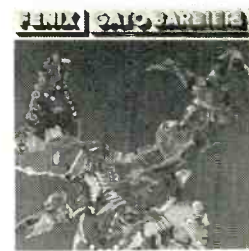
COMIN' ON HOME *RICHARD GROOVE HOLMES—Blue Note BST-84372*

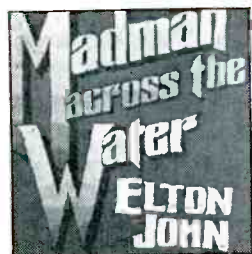

Helen O'Connell: Fountain Of Youth—And Talent

■ NEW YORK—My mother, a lady of rare stature, is a Helen O'Connell freak. Because of her devotion to Miss O'Connell, Bob Eberle, Jimmy Dorsey and the days of the Paramount Theater, "Green Eyes" and "Tangerine" became as much a part of my childhood as "Shake, Rattle and Roll." It was with that in mind, that I graciously accepted the assignment of reviewing Helen O'Connell's opening at the Rainbow Grill (15).

The Evolution recording artist easily exhibits more style and grace than most of her middle-aged peers, and thankfully, unlike those peers, Miss O'Connell leaves the hot pants in the closet in favor of a long, subtle evening gown. Certainly Miss O'Connell could get away with hot pants, because she seems to have found that elusive fountain of youth, a face that has never changed since she began singing professionally, and that was 36 years ago. Likewise, her voice has never changed. In an unobtrusive way, her voice jumps around the musical scale as if it was a sweet chocolate sauce being delicately poured over vanilla ice cream.

Her easy way of putting over a song has been, and still remains, completely original. Backed by the Morty Jay Trio, Miss O'Connell takes her audience on a nostalgic ride through

the past, singing the songs she's expected to sing.

Part of the act is devoted to more contemporary material, including such newer standards as "Love Story" and "My Way." The latter song, with its poignant lyrics, doesn't fit 90% of all performers singing it, but in Miss O'Connell's case, the song fits like a velvet glove.

Helen O'Connell will be performing at the Rainbow Grill for the next three weeks, and if you happen to share the same tastes as my mother, you definitely won't want to miss it.

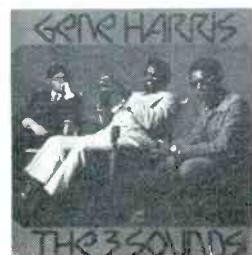
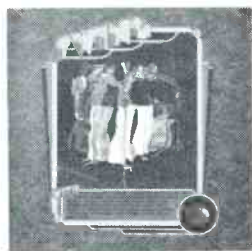

■ NEW YORK—Johnny Marks, via his St. Nicholas Music, Inc., this year is again working on his four Christmas standards: "Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer" — celebrating its 22nd birthday; "I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day," "Rockin' Around the Christmas Tree" and "A Holly Jolly Christmas."

The "Rudolph" color special with Burl Ives and score by Marks will have its eighth annual showing on Monday evening, Dec. 6, 8-9, on NBC. The soundtrack album will once more be promoted by Decca.

Since 1949 "Rudolph" has sold over 95 million records, 64 million in America, 31 million abroad and over five million copies of sheet music.

It was first recorded in 1949 by Gene Autry. His record sold over 7,500,000 and it is the all-time best-seller of Columbia Records. There have been more than 400 records of

the song and it has been published in 135 different arrangements, which have sold over eight million copies. As usual, there are many new records this year, including Tiny Tim's.

"I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day" was first recorded by Bing Crosby on Decca in 1956, followed by 30 other artists, including Harry Belafonte, Frank Sinatra, Ed Ames, Lawrence Welk and Eddy Arnold. Over 4,000,000 copies have been sold thus far.

"Rockin' Around the Christmas Tree" became a top hit in 1960 as recorded by Brenda Lee for Decca and is now a perennial international hit with many new records each year. This year outstanding records are by David Cassidy with the Partridge Family on Bell and Lynn Anderson on Columbia.

"A Holly Jolly Christmas" was a hit for Burl Ives on Decca in 1963 and has become another annual repeater. It's one of the songs in the score of the "Rudolph" special.

Marks' Christmas Community Lyric Book has now sold over 4,000,000 copies.

■ NEW YORK—The Donovan show came to the Garden Friday (12), and the Marvelous Minstrel of Rock moved the crowd with his beautiful music and engaging stage presence. The concert consisted of Donovan with vocals, guitar and harmonica; Paul Horn on various woodwinds; and Peter Mark on Viola.

The artist, recently signed to Warner Brothers after many successful years on Epic, offered a great variety of material and moods. The hits were "Mellow Yellow," "Hurdy Gurdy Man," "Atlantis," ad infinitum. One new song, "Ordinary Family," was just as strong and impressive as the others as he utilized his superbly controlled vibrato to its full potential.

The round "Happiness Runs" provided the most fun of the evening; and after it was all over, Donovan received a 10-minute standing, stomping ovation, proving once again that old artists never die, they just switch labels.

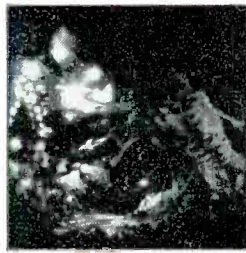

broadcast and record industry execs attended.

Major multiple winner was WWRL-New York, with four awards in rhythm and blues categories: R&B Station of the Year; Program Director, Jerry Boulding; Music Director, Norma Pinnella; and Disc Jockey, Jerry "B," whose real name is Jerry Boulding.

Other honored format Stations of the Year, in addition to WWRL, were FDI-Wichita, country; WCCO-Minneapolis, non-rock; WDAS-FM-Philadelphia, progressive or free-form FM; and WFIL-Philadelphia, top 40. WFIL was voted overall station of the Year from among this group.

Barry Gross, ABC/Dunhill Vice President, was singled out as National Promotion Man of the Year. Repeat winners were Wade Pepper, Capitol Records, C&W promotion man, and Cecil Holmes, Buddah Records, R&B promotion man. The only station other than WFIL and WWRL to win more than one award was KIKK-Houston. The country outlet's Program Director, Bill Bailey, and disc jockey Arch Yancey were honored.

The annual awards were voted by a panel of judges comprising 25 radio and record company executives. They were based on nominations from participating stations and record firms, and, in some categories, on nominations submitted by Gavin. Winners were revealed during an audio production created by Chuck Blore of Programming db and Chuck Blore Creative Services, Hollywood. It incorporated air segments featuring nominated sta-

tions and personalities, as well as special songs performed on tape by Three Dog Night, Andy Williams, Jerry Reed, Mark Lindsay, the Osmonds and other major entertainers.

The program opened with a 20-minute concert by the band from New Orleans' Preservation Hall.

Theme of the 1971 conference was "Radio: Relations, Implications and Responsibilities."

The opening session on Friday (Nov. 12) featured an address by former Federal Communications Commissioner Robert Wells, followed by a panel that explored the relationship between government and broadcasting.

Other key speakers included Ben Holman, director of the Community Relations Service, U.S. Department of Justice, and William J. Goode, president, American Sociological Association.

Conference sessions dealt with news broadcasting, the major radio formats, FM and college radio, and there was a special program directors roundtable devoted to non-musical aspects of broadcasting, such as program personnel and public service.

Committee chairmen included Ted Atkins, Program Director, KHJ, Los Angeles, program; Don Schmitzerle, General Manager, Warner Bros. Records, publicity; Ken Dowe, Program Supervisor, McLendon Stations, awards; John Rosica, Director, Western Operations, Bell Records, staging; and Ron Alexenburg, VP, Epic Records, who earned special kudos for his banquet arrangements.

United Artists Records announces the signing of the group Razmataz to an exclusive recording contract.

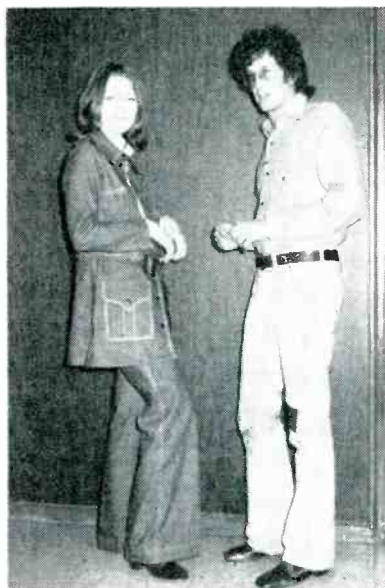

■ El "Quinto Festival de la Canción de Buenos Aires" me dejó con sabor a frustración en la boca y un vacío inmenso en el espíritu... Cualquiera radio de Buenos Aires está lanzando al aire cada hora, material suficiente original argentino como para darle formación a cualquier festival en el mundo. Lo que hizo o no hizo el Comité Seleccionador de Temas fué decididamente lamentable. No creo que no haya recibido canciones para haber algo hecho que valiera la pena. Triunfó a Dios Gracias como intérprete Polo Márquez, con el tema del periodista argentino Jorge Sturla y Eduardo Crámer. También interpretó este número Juan Ramón, que ocupó el Primer Lugar en el Festival. Después le siguieron "Que Vivan los Hombres" de Maximiliano, interpretada por el autor y Hugo Carregal, "Tu Pueblo es mi Pueblo" de Telechea y Salako, cantada por Danny Rivera y José Fuentes, "No Te Vayas Nunca, Compañera" de José Carbajal, interpretada por él mismo y Hernán Ríos, "Soy tu Obra" de Beto Fernán interpretada por Polo Márquez y Danny Rivera y en sexto lugar "Dame la Mano, Hermano" cantada por Antonio Prieto (que nunca debió cometer

en el festival) y J. C. Monterrey. La mayoría de las canciones eran del género protesta, ya en desuso y que no impresiona a nadie. La gran labor fué desplegada por los arreglistas que fabricaron canciones, casi donde no las había. Mi aplauso a ellos en general. Merece mención especial el número "Qué Vivan los Laureles" de e interpretado por Maximiliano, que sí refleja el verdadero sentir del pueblo argentino y que debe quedar para siempre como un "standard" en Argentina, pero que como tema para un festival carecía de proyección internacional.

"Vivir por la Aventura de Vivir" de Frederico, interpretada por su duo y por Iris Chacón de Puerto Rico es el único tema con fuerza suficiente para poder lograr algún impacto internacional. El italiano Gianfranco Pagliaro, ganador del año pasado en este festival y con su jurado, con el tema comunistoide "Las Cosas que me Alejan de Tí" y que debe haber ganado por el interés que lo llevó en su talento, el venezolano Hector Cabrera y no por el tema, que no lo ha comprado casi nadie, dió el escándalo internacional más grande que haya presenciado este columnista. Robando microfono a los organizadores, se avalanzó al jurado increpándoles de modo poco caballeroso. Fué displicente, canallesco, bajo, insultante y ruín.

Mi felicitación al jurado, que mantuvo una disciplina y capacidad inconcebible ante aquel reptil. 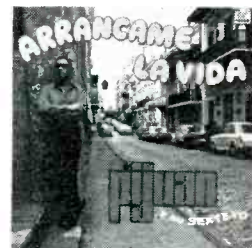

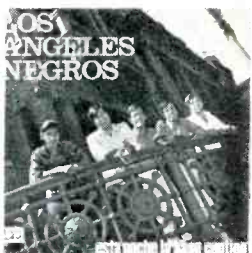

Lo firman **Palito Ortega, Juan y Juan, Donald, Tormenta, Los Iracundos, Hugo Marcel, Heleno y Quique Villanueva**. No sabían los comensales porqué se colmaron de lágrimas los ojos del redactor . . . Ha sido primera vez en que se me da las gracias de modo tan impresionante . . . y tal vez las gracias simplemente. Gracias a Uds. por haberme hecho feliz.

Revisé algunas de las obras antes de formar parte del jurado del Festival de Buenos Aires. Recibí el leve murmullo del comentario de un sello que expresaba que el estar Fundora en el jurado, significaba que ayudaría con todas sus fuerzas a los intérpretes puertorriqueños. Los puertorriqueños nunca han necesitado de mi defensa y lo han demostrado internacionalmente. La actuación de **Iris Chacón** y de **Danny Rivera** en aquel Festival lo confirmaron. Disciplinados, talentosos y sencillos. ¡Y me sentí feliz! . . . Porque haber formado parte de aquel jurado me hubiera provocado la situación más violenta en toda mi historia . . . Y no hubiera sido por defender a mis amigos de Puerto Rico . . . sino por defender la honra de los artistas y compositores de Argentina, que en aquella noche final, sí lo hubieran necesitado. Mi aplauso final a **Pedro Marengo**, presidente de la Sociedad de Locutores de Argentina, que ripostó valiente a **Pagliari**, en nombre de los 40 jurados del Festival, personajes de la mayor ejecutoria en Argentina. Dijo **Marengo**: "el señor Pagliario sole quería ganar festivales y no perderlos, pues este mismo jurado le nombró ganador en año pasado" . . . Y así las cosas, seguí a Brasil y Perú. The winner of the Festival as performer was **Polo Márquez** with "Carta Abierta a un Hijo" by **Jorge Sturla** and **Eduardo Crámer**, sung by **Polo Márquez** and **Juan Ramón**. Other winners can be read in my column in Spanish. "Vivir por la Aventura de Vivir" by **Frederico** and sung by **Iris Chacón**, left out of the festival on the second night, could become a strong hit all over Latin America. The jury was formed by top personalities in Argentina and their selections were the best that they could offer, taking into consideration the poor quality of the material proffered.

I deeply appreciated a scroll presented to **Record World** and this writer in the name of the Argentinean artists: "To **Tomás Fundora** in recognition for all he has done in our behalf in the Latin American market in the U.S.A." It was signed by **Palito Ortega, Juan y Juan, Donald, Tormenta, Los Iracundos, Hugo Marcel, Heleno** and **Quique Villanueva**.

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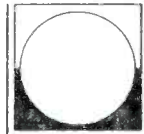

However, Polydor is also currently enjoying considerable success in both singles and album markets through Springwater, Aretha Franklin, the Who and the Jimi Hendrix at the Isle of Wight album. They can also anticipate high sales on the new LPs by Led Zeppelin and Yes, rush-released on Atlantic this week.

Young Blood Records chief Miki Dallon has agreed to a deal with Bell boss Larry Uttal on his recent visit here for all Mac and Katie Kissoon product to be issued on Bell in the USA. First release under the new deal will probably be "I've Found My Freedom" (our single pick this week), which is simultaneously being issued in eight other major territories. The contract is initially for one year (with options) and Bell is expected to issue Mac and Katie Kissoon's first album shortly . . . Sensational performance by the Who at the Rainbow Theatre opening last week. Their two-hour show set an incredibly high standard for London's first-ever rock concert hall. With the four impressing a capacity audience from the moment they hit the unmistakable opening chords of their six-year-old hit, "I Can't Explain," right through till the last strains of their closing number, "Behind Blue Eyes" . . . Emmitt Rhodes in town this week promoting his new Probe album, "Mirror." Rhodes' third album released here will do a great deal to establish his amazing talents, which the British public will also hear on John Peel's Radio One show and Dave Cash's tv shows, as well as in London venues Speakeasy and the Roundhouse before he returns to the USA on Nov. 25.

RCA has announced the signing of spiritual rock band Quintessence for their contemporary label, Neon. After three successful albums with Island, Quintessence ring the changes with single, "Sweet Jesus," out on Neon this week, while work on their next album continues. At the other end of the RCA scale, 12-year-old Kim Jones makes her vocal debut with "Follow Me, Follow Me," written by her producer Jackie Rae, together with Roger Cook and Roger Greenaway.

Jazz Week in Berlin

Another highlight of the

"the best lighting facilities and other equipment to make it a perfect showcase."

The flexible nature of the shows was also stressed at the press conference, in terms of price, number of shows per week and type of acts to be presented. Tickets for Melanie will be \$4.50, \$5.50 and \$6.50, and Bernstein emphasized that "tickets will be sold at popular prices, and not at Broadway rates of \$8 or \$10. He added: "The DeMille is a pop hall. We will try to give it an international flavor, and we will bring in as many new acts as possible, whether they are rock acts or not."

Non-Musicians, Too

Would this include non-musical performers, such as comedians like Woody Allen, David Steinberg or Dick Gregory? "Of course it would. I'm interested in any artist who has something to say or play that young America will listen to. I want this to be a theater that places no limits on the kind of artists we present. Because if we click, others will take heart and open theaters that may now be dark across the country for live presentations."

Another possibility for the DeMille will be to act as a flagship for closed-circuit televised concerts by major groups and artists. Again in Sid's words, "My thinking is heavily geared toward doing three major musical events on a closed-circuit format, using other Reade theaters as receiving points. 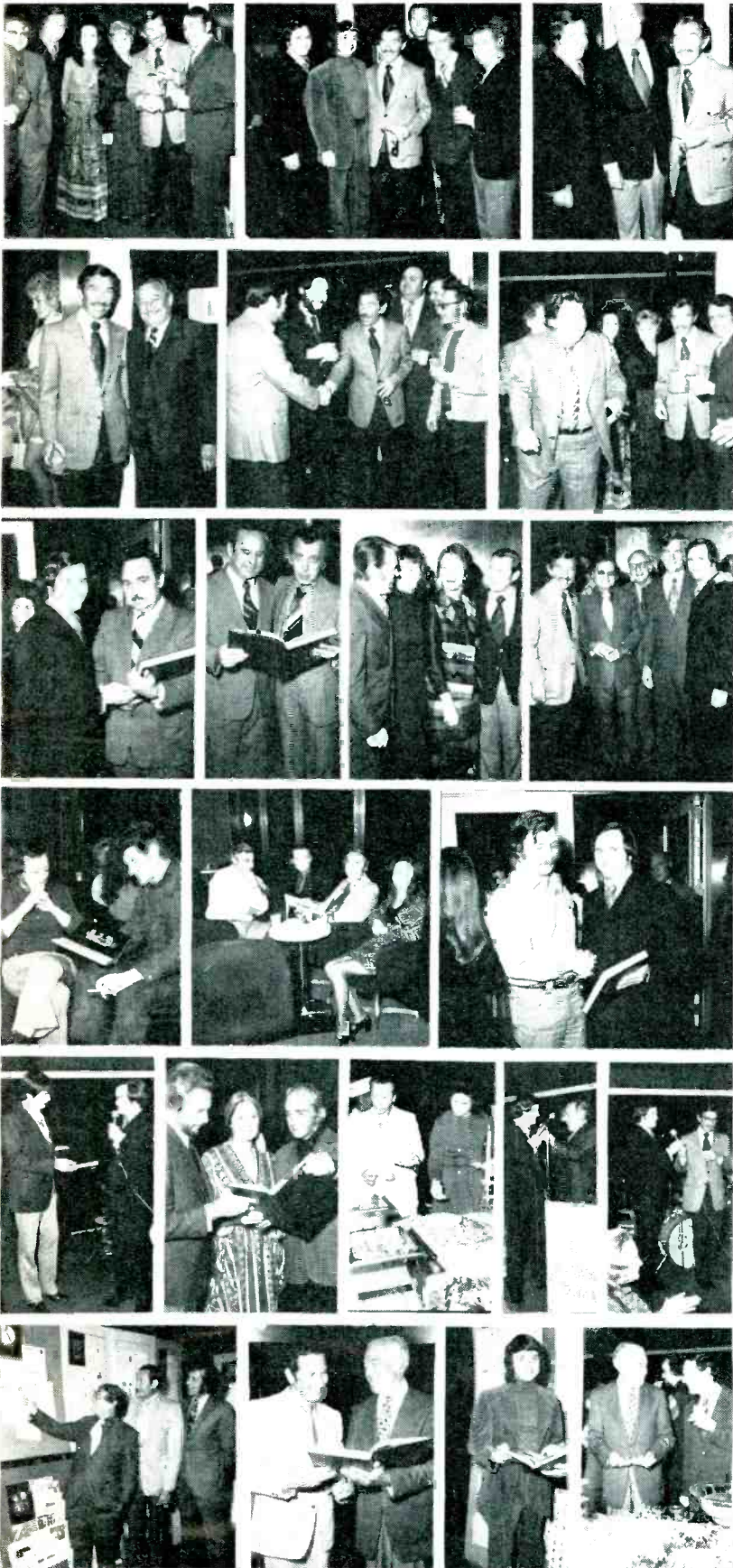
