The carrying power of the transmitter which Mr. Meyers and his boys built gives us an audible signal in almost every state of the Union, as well as in many of the Canadian provinces. Because of this tremendous technical advantage and the ability of the WGN staff which has been built over a period of years, I am sure all of us have one of radio's greatest opportunities in extending WGN's service.

Harry figures he's held the mike in front of 28,000 civ lians and servicemen in the four years he's been with VGN on the Service Center Canteen, Man on the Street and Chicago At Night shows. Born in Nevada, schooled in Texas, Michigan and Georgia, he's also seen a large portion of the world as a merchant seaman--a far cry from his education for the ministry. 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YOUR MUTUAL FRIEND - GIL McCLELLAND

Midwest Mutual's ever smaling sales promotion boss claims to be the first beby born in his home town hospital. The event occurred on May 28, 1903, and in the intervening 43 years Gilbert William Mc-Clelland has been a busy fellow indeed. Gil attended Wabash College in his home town of Crawfordsville, Indiana, graduating in 1926. During college he took a year off to become a reporter on the Miami (Florida) Herald, saved his dollars and upon graduating out his A.B. degree aside to tour Europe in the summer of '26. He says he didn't see Emily Kimbrough, but he did cover Par s and London fairly thoroughly. That fall he returned to the United States and turned insurance salesman with headquarters in Chicago. The United "ress hired Gil a short time later and by the time he left them, in 1928, he was manager of the Columbus, Ohio, bureau. For the next four years Gil did publicity for the Illinois Commission on Public Utilities Inform ation. the Gary Railroad and the South Shore Lone. In 1932, the Michigan City News had a new advertising salesman, Gilbert McClelland. The next year the Century of Progress opened in Chicago with this same McClelland in the promotion department. In 1934, Gil entered radio as a publicity writer for NBC. He stayed there for six years, becoming assistant sales promotion manager before he left in 1943 to become sales promotion manager for Mutual's midwest division.

During his Michigan City stay, Gil met Mary Alice Jackson, and for the next three years he commuted for his dates, until 1935 when they were married. The McClellands now have two children, James, 3, and Anne, 1, who share their 18 E. Chestnut apartment.

KNOV YOUR ENGINEERS

When WGN engineer Bob Baird indulges in his hobby, he takes a busman's holiday, because his favorite indoor sport is operating his own amateur radio station W9NN for which he's had a license ever since 1919. Bob, now Studio Supervisor of WGN's Engineering Department, started his radio career at the age of 13 as a "ham" radio enthusiast back in Dayton, Ohio, his hometown.

After graduation in Roosevelt High School, he went to work in the Dayton Power and Light Company - his job was to hop into an emergency truck every time there was a fire and dash to the scene to cut the electric service lines before the fire department arrived. In 1926 he joined the Crosley Radio Corporation in Cincinnati, coming to WGN in 1935 to become a member of the engineering staff. Bob has fond memories of those days when he did six strip shows a day, dashing from a tear-choked episode of "Peinted Dreams right into the troubles of "Bachelor's Children" and ending up the day hanging from cliff with "Little Orphan Annie."

Highlight of his engineering experience was the stormy night back in September of 1929 when Bob put Hitler on WGN as Der Fuhrer delivered his hysterical Poland invasion speech. It was 3:00 a.m., but WGN was on the air with one of history's most exciting and eventful moments.

Altho Bob's amateur station is temporarily off the air in his home at 411 N. Oak Park Avenue in Oak Park, he still has his operating license and plans to continue putting W9NN on the air in the future.
