STARS RECEIVE AWARDS

Three of NBC's top stars were awarded coveted certificates of merit by the National Safety Council this week for work in bringing messages of safety to radio listeners across the country.

For the second year NBC's Phil Harris and Alice Faye (WOW, 6:30 p.m., Sunday) received an Exceptional Service Award for a transcribed series of safety programs that were broadcast on over 1,100 radio stations. The two stars are the first entertainment personalities to ever receive the Exceptional Service Award for two successive years.

A similar award went to effervescent NBC comedienne Judy Canova (WOW, 9 p.m., Saturday) for her series of safe winter driving musical jingles which were broadcast on more than 775 radio stations.

Telephone Hour Leader Got an Early Start

Donald Voorhees, director of the Bell Symphonic Orchestra on "The Telephone Hour" (WOW, Mondays, 8 p.m.), got an early start in big time musical circles.



Thirty-five years ago he was the toast of baseball. Acclaimed as one of the greatest pitchers in the game, he was lionized by the sports world.

Today, weak, nearly penniless and not well, he was completely neglected and forgotten by the sport to which he had devoted his life.

When the Phillies, the team he played with longest, won the pen-nant and the right to meet the Yankees in the World Series, he waited expectantly to see fulfilled his one dream: to see his team once again in the big classic.

But he was neglected once more until Tommy Bartlett, genial emcee of NBC's "Welcome Travelers" (WOW, Mondays through Fridays, 9 a.m.) learned his story. Bartlett made arrangements to fly the veteran to New York.




