The 27-year-old native of Oklahoma is already on the job and you have undoubtedly heard him on WOW or seen him on WOW-TV.

However, this is the first chance the NEWS TOWER has had to bring you a little background information on the splendid qualifications which caused Jack to receive the nod over the other applicants for the position which has been temporarily handled by the capable Bill McBride. Bill took over when Tip Saggau resigned to become adjutant of Omaha Post No. 1 of the American Legion.

Jack is married, the father of two young daughters, and a 1949 graduate of Oklahoma University with a major in speech. His high school athletic career kept him plenty busy since he participated in football, basketball and baseball for three years. He entered Central State College and played yarsity football in 1940. About that time along with millions of others he turned his energies to more serious subjects and from 1942 to 1946 served in the Air Force.

After Jack was discharged from the Air Force he enrolled in the University of Oklahoma and shortly thereafter was named sports announcer for WNAD, Oklahoma University's radio station. In 1946 and '47 he broadcast all of O. U.'s home football, basketball and baseball games.

Jack then moved to Station KTOK in Oklahoma City and amassed more sports experience by broadcasting the 1948 play-by-play accounts of all Oklahoma A. & M. football games over the 13-station Oklahoma Network. While at KTOK he also handled the week's top basketball games of either Oklahoma University or Oklahoma A. & M.

In September of 1949 he became sports director at KNOR, Norman, and broadcast the University of Oklahoma's '49 and '50 basketball games and the '50 football games over a 21-station network. It is easy to understand from this why the name of Jack Payne is practically a by-word in the sports world of the southwest. In addition to his above seasonal sports duties Jack also wrote and presented two 15-minute sports programs daily.

This then, is the background of WOW's new sports director, Jack Payne. You'll be hearing and seeing a lot more of Jack in forthcoming






