One 'Edgar'

NBC programs featured regularly on WOW snagged the lion's share of awards for best productions in both radio and television during 1950.

WOW and WOW-TV programs and stars walked off with 15 "Michaels" at the annual dinner of the Academy of Radio Arts and Sciences.

WOW and WOW-TV copped four Peabody awards.

Two other WOW shows walked off with Safety Campaign awards, and one show won an "Edgar" from the Mystery Writers of America.

Fatima's "Dragnet" won a double-header—both a "Michael" as the best mystery program on the air, and an "Edgar" (from the Mystery Writers) so-named because it was presented at the annual Edgar Allen Poe Awards dinner.

Grass Roots... WOW Farm Service Reporter

Have you noticed the stories on farm land prices? The boom in land values following World War I now looks like "small potatoes' compared with our present sky-

rocketing prices. And all evidence points to continued advances. More and more money is coming from cities. Businessmen must have an appreciation of farming as a sound investment. Some of our friends in land real estate have some fabu-

lous stories about these investments.

Men who dropped out of the land market two years ago are now trying to buy. At that time farm sur-pluses and declining prices scared investors away. Now, everywhere you go, there is concern as to whether this country can produce enough food to meet our current living standards and still ship abroad.

Part of this threat has caused an interest in land. Strong food demands mean better prices. That is why some investors are willing to pay \$300 an acre. Around big cities, fear of atomic attack is given as another reason for the move toward the farm.

All of this information points to a solid financial outlook for this part of the United States. Especially that part served by WOW where so much of the land is showing a considerable increase in value.

But before we leave the subject we should also point out that there are headaches that come with such a trend. There is always the possibility of a land collapse. It might also mean that considerable land is held by absentee landloards which has its drawbacks. And these prices do make it tough on the young tenant farmer who dreams of own-ing his own farm. He doesn't know how to raise the necessary capital.





TV Service For All, FCC Plan

On March 21, the Federal Com-munications Commission proposed a nationwide master plan for the fair distribution of television channels in the future. The purpose of the proposed plan is to permit the television broadcasting industry to



grow up in an orderly manner with no section of the country, and no segment of the population slighted or ignored. The plan proposes to divide the limited number of frequencies (or channels) fairly so that private

ests could enter television broadcasting sometime in the future, if they choose to, and if they can satisfy the Commission that they could operate stations "in the public interest, convenience and necessity,' as the law provides.

The master plan is known as an "allocations plan"... because it allocates channels to various areas.

No Big Rush

All this does not mean that there will be hundreds of new television stations springing up . . . all at once . . . all over the country. The establishment of a TV station requires a tremendous capital outlay. No one will be stupid enough to start a station unless he sees a reasonable chance for a sound investment . . . a chance to make a profit.

The proposed allocations plan presumably would make room for as many as 1,731 stations on 83 channels sometime in the future. Another important reason for the master plan is to avoid conflicts between stations by placing stations which operate on the same channel, some distances apart.

400 Applications

Every knowing person in the industry agrees that a great national allocations plan is necessary and that such a plan should be adopted while television is still in its infancy.

At present, there are about 400 applications for station licenses. Many of these applicants will never get licenses . . . because many of the applicants are contesting for the same channels in the same city. For example, 11 applicants would like to start stations in Oklahoma City. Yet, only four channels are available . . . so, obviously, seven applicants will lose out. A similar situation is true in Denver, Des Moines and many other cities.

"UHF" Stations

In order to assure future service to the greatest possible number of areas, the FCC Plan proposes to open a portion of the spectrum called the "Ultra-High Frequency" band, or "UHF". Stations on Channels 2 to 13 would continue to operate, as at present, on the Very High

The talk deals with "allocations", "VHF", "UHF", and many other television terms which may be strange to many folks.

The highlights of Mr. Wiseman's talk are presented here in an attempt to answer many inquiries, and to clear up some confusion in the minds of TV set owners and prospective TV set owners.

-THE EDITOR

Frequency band, and would con-tinue to be known as "VHF" or standard stations.

Thus, if the master plan is adopted, there will be "VHF" stations (as at present) and "UHF" stations . . . just as we now have the so-called standard-wave radio stations and short-wave radio stations.

The FCC has set June 9, 1951 as the date for a hearing on the pro-posed master plan. On that date, the 400 or so present applicants for channels will have a right to oppose the entire plan or object to some of its details

Already the National Association of Radio and TV Broadcasters has publicly opposed some parts of the proposed plan . . . and many indi-viduals will fight it . . . or parts of it. All this means the hearings will string out for several weeks . . . or months . . . and even after that, lawsuits might delay final adoption of a master allocations plan. This master allocations plan is a tremendously important matter . . . involving the entire future of a great industry and millions in potential investments. It will not be passed over lightly . . . or decided quickly.

All 400 of the applicants now seeking a station license have asked for "VHF" Channels. Some may, without protest, accept a UHF channel, but it is more likely that every applicant will make every possible effort to get a VHF channel.

Local Situation

Now, as to the Omaha area situation:

As a part of the proposed nationwide plan, many new channels are allocated for the area served by the two Omaha stations (at present, about 60 miles in all directions from Omaha).

The proposed plan would provide, for Omaha, three VHF channels and three UHF channels. Two of the VHF channels, 3 and 6, are already assigned and occupied and presumably would not be disturbed. The third pro-posed Omaha VHF channel, No. 7, is reserved for an "educational station." This allocation presumes that some day some Omaha college or university might want to establish a TV station.

VHF Channel No. 7, however, is the channel for which two Omaha applicants have already applied. These two applications are the only two now on file for new Omaha stations.

The two Omaha applicants will reportedly attempt to have VHF Channel 7 reinstated as a commercial station channel. If Channel 7 is reinstated as a commercial-station channel . . . the two Omaha appli-cants will then be called into a hearing, sometime in the future, before the FCC to determine which applicant should have this VHF Channel No. 7.

If either of the two present Omaha applicants eventually is awarded VHF Channel No. 7, it will then be issued a "Construction Permit," and it may then proceed to build, equip and get ready to begin operations. This could be accamplished in a minimum of six months or a maximum of two years, depending on the availability of technical equipment, such as an antenna, transmitter, cameras, studios, etc.

If the Omaha applicants fail in their effort to reinstate Channel 7, and if No. 7 remains unavailable for either applicant, then they must decide whether or not to seek one of three UHF channels allocated to Omaha under the proposed master plan (Channels 16, 22 or 28).

Complicated engineering studies would be made, and new applications filed and either one (or both) of the present two applicants might eventually be awarded a UHF channel. If this happens, there will still be one UHF channel left for Omaha, for any other interest that might want to go into television in the future.

In the Lincoln area, one applicant has filed for a VHF channel, two are allocated. There are also two UHF channels proposed, but no applicants.

Sioux City Area

The same general situation is true in Sioux City. One VHF application has been filed . . . none for UHF. Two VHF channels are allocated, two UHF (one an educational station) in the master plan proposed.

The master plan also includes proposed VHF channels (one each in Nebraska), for Alliance, Grand Island, Hastings, Kearney, McCook, (Continued on page 9)



Scottsbluff, and two in North Platte, plus proposed UHF channels in 14 cities.

No VHF channels are proposed for Iowa points within the WOW-TV service area, but a UHF allocation is proposed for Atlantic, Cherokee, Creston, Red Oak, Shenandoah and Spencer.

With the possible exception of the proposed Lincoln VHF chan-nels, none of the stations in the WOW-TV area, which are pro-posed, could be heard in the Omaha-Council Bluffs area, according to best engineering knowledge.

Most engineers agree that the range of UHF stations will be considerably less than the range of VHF stations.

Most TV station operators be-lieve that it would be economi-cally impossible for any television station to succeed in markets with less than 50,000 families as a potential audience.

In view of what I have said, it appears to me, that there will be no additional TV stations... which can be heard in the Omaha area for at least two years . . . and more probably, for a much longer time.

The master allocations plan is work important . . . and it must be worked out slowly, and carefully. Then, when the plan is finally ap-proved . . . most applicants will have to revise their plans . . . and

Then, when this is all done, the FCC will try to settle the cases in the markets where there are conflicts.

Omaha, today, has fine TV pro-gram service from two good sta-tions . . . carrying the best that four great networks have to offer. I do not anticipate any change in the next several years.

I believe you can buy a set now . . . and start enjoying television now . . . and that you need have no fear or worries that your set will become antiquated . . . or need immediate adjustments or changes.
