

The Wiere Brothers, comical threesome who have been a hit in films, radio and night clubs; the Mellomen, male singing quartet; and Tom Holland, screen and radio actor, have been added to the cast of the third CBS-TV "Edgar Bergen-Charlie McCarthy Show," on which opera singer Dorothy Kirsten makes her video debut. Saturday, April 28 at 9:30 p.m. over **WHBF-TV**.

The program is set in a western ghost town, with Charlie McCarthy, Mortimer Snerd and Bergen's other little known dummy, Effie Klinker, providing much of the harum scarum antics.

Miss Kirsten, appearing as **Jenny Lind**, the Swedish Nightingale, sings a ballad titled "One Red Rose," written for her by the Bergen show maestro, **Ray Noble**.

Noble appears in a skit with the Wiere Brothers, who as fiddle players do Mozart's "Eine Kleine Nachtmusik" in a saloon scene. Tom Holland portrays **Jesse James**.

Supporting her will be comedian Ken Murray; Risco, noted juggler of saucers, simulating the flying saucer legend; Frankie Thomas, star of the TV show "Tom Corbett, Space Cadet"; and Billy Barty, pint-sized dancer and comedian.

Murray's little glamour "cowboy," Laurie Anders, will again sing "The Wide Open Spaces," which she introduced on the broadcast of April 14.

The other Glamourlovelies, Barbara Dobbins, Jean Marshall, Ruth Thomas and Rosemary Buas, will appear as humorous versifiers.

The cast also includes the Enchanters, harmony quintet, and the Murray dancers.

BULLETIN!



Silver pays income taxes, receives fan mail and is temperamental like his human counterparts—actors. "Is there anything he can't do?" quizzed Dekker. "Yes," replied Hall sadly.

"He'll never make a football player. He can't go to his left."

Heidt's Stand on Juvenile Delinquency Examined

THE ENTERTAINERS who appear on the Arthur Godfrey Talent Scout show or even the Original Amateur Hour win their spots after exacting auditions. Their performances then and later on television are judged on the basis of talent and showmanship. And Arthur Godfrey and Ted Mack, however kindhearted they may be, admit frankly that their goal is TV entertainment. Although they've given many a young performer a helping hand, they've never seemed to lose sight of the fact that, to succeed, they must keep the viewer hard by his TV set while they are on the air. And it takes talented entertainers to hold an audience.

The artists who take part in Horace Heidt's Youth Opportunity program, too, must be hired, in reality after meeting the same standards of talent. It's obvious after a study of the program (8 Monday nights on WHBF-TV) that the performers (like Lyle Lyon of Silvis and Rod Swanson of Moline, who took part in the April 16 show, filmed in Des Moines) are skilled and that their variety acts are tailored for television. Judged as a vaudeville show, the Heidt program is better-than-average entertainment—thanks to the ability of the participants.

But, Heidt implies, performers are hired for his show not because they display talent but "because it is better to build boys than to mend men." Heidt devotes a portion of each show to a discussion of his program's magnificent contribution to the fight against juvenile delinquency.

I don't question the sincerity of the stand Mr. Heidt takes against delinquency. I'm sure he's against sin too. (I know



he's for motherhood. He concludes each telecast with a goodnight message to his mother—a sweet-looking old lady whose picture used to be flashed on the screen too).

I do wonder a little in just what way he thinks he is combatting delinquency. Though most of his performers are teen-agers, some are old enough to be full-fledged criminals, rather than delinquents. And, in the second place, I suspect that young performers if they weren't hired by Horace would head for the Original Amateur Hour rather than a life of law-breaking.


Patriotism too seems to play a large part in the Youth Opportunity show. Heidt lets on that the entertainers on his program cannot help but succeed because they are Americans. But I wonder if the loyalty test can really supplant the audition. This country is teeming with loyal Americans who, patriotic as they may be, will never crash show business because they cannot sing, dance, play an instrument, act or do tricks.

Again I don't question the Americanism of Horace Heidt, the individual, but I don't think his patriotism applies to his TV show, except in passing. All TV stars should be loyal Americans, but Heidt leads one to believe he is unique. I'm pretty sure though that Mack and Godfrey are on our side too.

I resent, too, the blatant fakery that accompanies the Heidt program. His Davenport telecast (filmed February 15 and shown April 9), for example, was not quite the same on the TV screen as it had been in the auditorium. Richard Melari's "championship" performance—the championship was allegedly decided by audience applause—had been changed. The supposed interior of the Masonic auditorium looked unfamiliar.

I'll admit Heidt's traveling troupe gives many young entertainers their first break. But, balanced against his altruism, is the fact that his program would collapse without those young entertainers and the talent they bring to his show.

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
