

#### REMEMBER RADIO REMEMBER TELEVISION

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#### INTRODUCTION

At the 1939 New York World's Fair, visitors lined up for hours just to get a glimpse of a machine that seemed the ultimate scientific miracle. Big and boxy, it was something like their beloved radios at home—but with one huge difference. Right up there in front was a tiny screen—like a little movie screen—and every time a sound came from the machine a picture accompanied it! It was called television, which meant "seeing at a distance," and it was a fantastic little theater you could fit right in your home. Scientists had been working on the idea of television for almost fifty years, and as early as 1882 a French cartoonist had drawn his concept of what a television machine might look like. But now scientists were saying that this invention would soon be ready for general public consumption.

The wait turned out to be longer than expected. World War II intervened, and manufacturing of just about everything not essential to the war was halted.

The production of television for home use finally began in 1945. Only a hundred TV sets were manufactured in that first memorable year, and only people who'd been on the pre-war waiting lists got them. But more were promised, and a war-weary public was quick to vie for the sets as they came off the assembly lines of reconverted war factories.

If your family was lucky enough to be the first on the block to get a TV set, your house became the most envied in the neighborhood. Long-lost friends, relatives and neighbors suddenly began to appear on your doorstep, waiting for an invitation to see anything, and I mean anything, that happened to be on the TV. But if you were one of those poor unfortunates who were destined to become the last family on the block to get a TV set because you were determined to "wait until the prices go down" or were positive that TV was "just another passing fancy," you had to content yourself with putting on your best poor-little-waif act and, hat in hand, try to gain admittance to a neighbor's house which was more fortunately blessed with the wonders of TV.

TV-watching evenings were major social events in those days. There wasn't really much to view in those early days of TV, and telecasting was not a continuous all-day affair. Children's programs, cooking shows, amateurish variety offerings—people would sit for hours, viewing it all, even the TV test patterns, fascinated and totally spellbound.


Programs were mostly live then, and the shows, as well as the news events, all seemed vividly alive. Plays and politics, crime and comedy transformed our modest abodes into enchanted castles with little windows looking out over new and vast horizons. Little did we know then what these little windows would do to our lives. Never again would home provide us with sanctuary from the horrors and happenings of the outside world. Now we would be on hand at Senate subcommittee meetings and crime hearings, at public tragedies and coronations. Faces in the news would become as familiar to us as our favorite movie stars. Things were changing fast, and we would be able to sit and watch it all happen on our TV screens. Hot wars, like the one we had just lived through, would give way to cold wars, fought with words instead of on battlefields. New stars, television stars, began to take the spotlight away from movie and radio idols. Milton Berle, or Uncle Miltie as he was known to thousands of viewers, became television's King of Comedy. Howdy Doody, Sid Caesar and Imogene Coca, Kukla, Fran and Ollie and Captain Video became household names. Dramatic shows, telecast live, gave us more heroes to worship. The whole country became television-conscious. Soon old radio favorites like The Lux Theatre, My Friend Irma, Arthur Godfrey's Talent Scouts, The Goldbergs, Your Hit Parade and Superman made their moves from a sound world of radio to the sighted one of television with varying degrees of success, and early television broadcasting owed a large debt of gratitude to radio for some of its early offerings. But TV was more than old radio shows made visual. Programs were developed exclusively for television. Puppet shows like Howdy Doody, Kukla, Fran and Ollie and Lucky Pup and "magazines of the air" shows like Omnibus, See It Now and Garroway at Large were uniquely suited to the new medium of television.

The late 1940's and early 1950's became television's years of experimentation and discovery. It was during this time that TV developed a social conscience. It was television, for example, that was to expose the methods of Joseph McCarthy and thereby stem his rise. We saw dramatic art, civilized entertainment and intellectual exploration that haven't been duplicated for a decade. These were exciting years, perhaps the best that television has known and here is a chance to pause for a moment and look back over that older time

as recalled by those old TV programs.

We begin in 1947, when television was still attempting to find itself, and then move into the 1950's, TV's "golden years," ending with 1958, the year when TV taping and the virtual disappearance of most live telecasting, except for the news shows, began to change the medium. Though in reality such a short time ago, those early TV years take on a quality of genuine nostalgia now, perhaps because we have advanced so far and so fast in such a relatively short span of years. I've tried to cram into this book of memories most of the top TV shows, specials and newsworthy events, but if one of your favorite TV happenings is missing from these pages, I only hope another old friend will make up for that omission. Come along then to the late 1940's and 1950's, and remember television....


Howdy Doody, one of television's longest-running and best-remembered children's shows, began telecasting on December 27, 1947, and did not vacate its NBC habitat until thirteen years later in 1960.

The show's circus-puppet-theater setting was just the right atmosphere to capture kids' imaginations and keep them glued to the TV screen. Host Buffalo Bob Smith; Howdy, the cowboy-marionette; horn-honking speechless Clarabel the Clown; Indian princess Summer-Fall-Winter-Spring; puppet Mr. Bluster and his pal, Flubberdub, became weekday favorite visitors to millions of American households. The demand for tickets to attend a live telecast of the show was so overwhelming that NBC had an endless waiting list of youngsters whose fondest dream was to appear on camera with their Howdy Doody friends.



#### **KRAFT THEATRE**

The Kraft Theatre, an hour-long series of weekly live dramatic productions, began as a local show in New York in 1947 and graduated to the big time as a national nighttime program in 1948. During the series' eleven-year residency on NBC, such diversified plays and players as The Glove, starring TV's busiest leading lady of the late 1940's—early 1950's, Margaret Phillips; The Emperor Jones, with black actor Ossie Davis; and John F. Kennedy's Profiles in Courage were presented. Although the show concentrated mainly on proved stage successes and adaptations of classic novels and plays, original plays, expressly written for television, were occasionally offered as well.



One of Kraft Theatre's best-received productions was the dramatization of the popular novel A Night to Remember, which was about the sinking of the Titanic.

#### PAUL WINCHELL AND JERRY MAHONEY

Ventriloquist Paul Winchell with his dummy Jerry Mahoney was one of the first variety entertainers to have a regular show on television. As early as 1947 Winchell made his video debut in a show of his own, which was called Show Business. Inc. In 1948, he costarred with master mind reader Dunninger on NBC's The Bigelow Show. Winchell then went on to The Speidel Show, serving as MC from 1951 until 1953. In 1953 he picked up Jerry, Knucklehead Smith, and all the rest of his dummy friends and moved to a daytime spot, hosting a popular children's program which featured fun talk, games and a fair sprinkling of film cartoons to keep the small fry at home happy.

#### MEET THE PRESS

Television's most durable panel-news-discussion program, Meet the Press, presided over by Martha Rountree, made a successful transition from radio to television in 1947. Guest newspapermen questioned leaders of the political scene, with Miss Rountree and later Ned Brooks acting as moderator. This long-running show, still going strong, was produced by Lawrence E. Spivak.

#### THE ROLLER DERBY

The rough-and-ready Roller Derby was a favorite evening sports attraction for millions of viewers during television's early years. The collision of human bodies, knock-down-dragout fights—especially among the ladies—provided more entertainment than the incredibly swift skating. Tuffy Brasuhn, the toughest tomato on skates, became a household name and attracted a considerable following during her long career with the Derby. Blond bombshell Mary Gardner ran her a close second.

#### WRESTLING

One of the most popular attractions during television's childhood were the nightly telecasts of wrestling matches. Few viewers can forget the ringside manner of Dennis James, wrestling's most celebrated sportscaster, or the shenanigans of "Hatpin Mary," a wild old girl, who took special delight in sticking her unfavorite wrestlers with a deadly hatpin. Among the viewers' favorite wrestling performers were the Swedish Angel, The Zebra Kid, Gorgeous George, Mr. America, Ricki Starr and, of course, the biggest and best of them all, Antonino Rocca.

Also popular were the special lady wrestling events and midget wrestling. As the years rolled by, the wrestling matches became splashier and splashier-with contestants making grand entrances replete with entourages of slave girls, fan bearers and sedan chair carriers. No one seemed to take the seriously, however, matches everyone knew that all the howling and grunting were being staged strictly for the benefit of the viewing audience. And watch they did, until the mid-1950's, when the novelty of it all wore off.


#### THE GENE AUTRY SHOW

Gene's Melody Ranch, his friend Pat Buttram, and his horse, Champion, became as popular on TV as they had been on radio and in motion pictures.

#### THE FIRST WORLD SERIES TELECAST

Four cities were lucky enough to receive the first telecast of a World Series baseball game. It was played between the New York Yankees and the Brooklyn Dodgers, in 1947. The cities chosen for this special consideration were New York, Philadelphia, Washington and, of all places, Schenectady. The first game was played in old Ebbets Field in Brooklyn, the home of the Dodgers when they were still the Brooklyn "Bums." The winners? The Yankees . . . as usual.



Television's first major star unquestionably was comedian Milton Berle. His Texaco Star Theatre became the most frequently looked-at, talked-about show on the air in the late 1940's and early 1950's. Tuesday night became "Milton Berle Night," and viewers lucky enough to own a TV set wouldn't miss a single fun-filled hour of "Uncle Miltie." They loved his impressive array of guest stars and his devotion to his mother, Sandra, and never knew what sort of crazy getup he would be wearing when he made his weekly entrance. Whether dressed in ladies' clothes, done up as Howdy Doody, or all decked out as a monster pumpkin pie, Miltie never failed to convulse his audience with jokes reportedly "stolen" from the best comedians in the business.

NBC was fortunate enough to have Mr. Berle's talents on display for eight years, from June, 1948, until June, 1956.



# **TEXACO STAR THEATRE**



#### HOPALONG CASSIDY



In 1948, screen-serial cowboy Bill Boyd joined television's roster of new stars. His celebrated Hopalong Cassidy motion-picture character made the series an immediate success with youngsters across the nation and became TV's first big Western hit. After one year on the air, Mr. Boyd hocked all his belongings, lock, stock and barrel, to buy the Hopalong TV rights from its film-producer owners. When he finally sold out several years later, he reportedly received \$70,000,000! Reruns of *Hopalong Cassidy* are still being shown on many local networks.


#### ARTHUR GODFREY'S TALENT SCOUTS

Arthur Godfrey was the host of CBS' Talent Scouts program from 1948 into the 1950's. Each week famous show-business names would introduce Arthur to new acts they had discovered, thus giving unknowns the chance to display their talents before a fast-growing TV public. Weekly winners were chosen by an applause meter. Most of Godfrey's "friends," who costarred with him on his Arthur Godfrey and His Friends weekly hour-long variety show, were former Talent Scouts winners. The show had a long and healthy ten-year run on CBS.

#### THE TOAST OF THE TOWN

America's favorite variety show, The Ed Sullivan Show, was originally called The Toast of the Town when it first arrived on television. Dour-faced. unsmiling newspaper columnist Sullivan first told his home viewers that he had a "really big shew" for them on June 20, 1948. He has been a Sunday-night favorite ever since. Many well-known entertainers made their TV debuts on the Sullivan show. Ed's first Toast of the Town featured the little-known comedy team of Dean Martin and Jerry Lewis in their first TV showcasing. Since then, Ed has introduced such now-famous entertainers as Alan King, Jackie Mason, The Beatles, Victor Borge and Margaret Truman. The hip-shaking rockand-roll rage of the 1950's, Elvis Presley, was paid the highest price, a record \$50,000 for a single guest appearance on Ed's show. Iulia Meade assisted Ed as cohostess and chief product seller during and for a while after his Toast of the Town years. Ed has been on the air for more than twenty years.


#### STUDIO ONE

Television's longest-running, best-remembered dramatic anthology series, Studio One, was first telecast over the CBS network in 1948. Originating live from New York, the show presented such outstanding hour-long teleplays as Reginald Rose's Twelve Angry Men, The Kill with Grace Kelly, Mrs. 'Arris Goes to Paris with English comedienne Gracie Fields, Shakespeare's Macbeth with Charlton Heston and Judith Evelyn, Julius Caesar, also with Heston, Camille with French actress Michele Morgan, and TV's first modern-dress Shakespeare production, Coriolanus. Some of TV's most successful playwrights began their careers writing for Studio One. Until the show's final telecast, in 1957, it remained the public's favorite dramatic show.

#### THE LONE RANGER






"A fiery horse with the speed of light, a cloud of dust and a hearty hi-yo Silver. The Lone Ranger!"






#### PHILCO PLAYHOUSE

TV producer Fred Coe presented a weekly dramatic series in 1948 on NBC called the Philco Playhouse. The show, after two years on its own, began alternating on a biweekly basis with The Goodyear Playhouse, also produced by Mr. Coe, from 1951 to 1955. During Philco's long and distinguished television run, Mr. Coe drew heavily upon the writing talents of such notable TV playwrights as Paddy Chayefsky and Rod Serling, Among the productions and stars presented on the show were Judith Evelyn in Camille, Joanne Woodward and Kim Stanley in Young Lady of Property, Lillian Gish in The Late Christopher Bean, Alfred Drake in Quality Street, John Baragrey in Pride and Prejudice and José Ferrer in Cyrano de Bergerac. Mr. Ferrer's TV performance as Cyrano proved so successful that he repeated it in a motion picture that won him an Academy Award.

### LIFE WITH RILEY

Before he became the celebrated star of a variety series on television, rotund comedian Jackie Gleason appeared as Chester Riley in a 1949 situation comedy series called *The Life of Riley*. Costarring with Gleason as his wife, Peg, was Rosemary De Camp. The series lasted only one season on the NBC network, but three years later, in 1953, the show was returned to the airwaves, this time starring William Bendix as Riley and Marjorie Reynolds as Peg. Wesley Morgan appeared as their son, Junior, and Lugene Sanders their daughter, Babs. Gloria Blondell and Tom D'Andrea played their friends and neighbors Gillis and Honeybee. This time the show remained on the air for five years.

### MAMA

The weekly adventures of an immigrant Norwegian family living in San Francisco at the turn of the century, which was presented by CBS from 1949 to 1957, were a viewing must for millions. Mama starred Peggy Wood in the title role and featured Judson Laire as Papa, Dick Van Patten as their son, Nels, Rosemary Rice and Robin Morgan as their daughters, Katrin and Dagmar. Based on a novelette, Mama's Bank Account, by Kathryn Forbes and a subsequent play, I Remember Mama by John Van Druten, the Mama series was a long-standing favorite. In 1956, when CBS canceled the show, public clamor was such that it was brought back for another year.

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### MARTIN KANE, PRIVATE EYE

No fewer than four famous actors played the title role of Martin Kane, Private Eye during its five-year run on NBC-TV. Lloyd Nolan was the first Kane; Mark Stevens, the second; William Gargan, who had played the role on radio, the third; and stage star Lee Tracy, the fourth. The series lasted longer than most adventure-crime offerings, perhaps because each season a new star was brought in to keep up audience interest.

### **PANTOMIME QUIZ**

Mike Stokey's Pantomime Quiz was one of television's earliest game-panel show hits. First telecast on October 4. 1949, the show played the old parlor game of charades. It remained on CBS from 1949 to 1954, when it switched its home base to the ABC network. There it remained until 1958, when it went the local-station syndication route. Stokey remained the show's MC throughout the entire national run of the series, and some of the celebrities who performed on the show were Hans Conried, Jackie Coogan, Una Merkel, Adele Jergens, Morey Amsterdam, and Beverly Garland.

### MAN AGAINST CRIME

The well-known star of stage and motion pictures Ralph Bellamy added dignity to the *Man Against Crime* series, an early CBS crime show. Mr. Bellamy played the Mike Barnett role from 1949 to 1953. After a three-year absence from television, the series returned with former radio and movie actor Frank Lovejoy as Barnett. It remained on the air for another two years.

### THE MAGIC CLOWN



A clever actor with the unusual name of Zovella played the part of Bonomo, the Magic Clown who, until 1954, delighted youngsters with his tricks, puppet wizardry and "giveaway prizes."

### ROBERT MONTGOMERY PRESENTS

In the early years of commercial TV broadcasting, weekly live dramatic programs were popular attractions. One of the most successful anthology series of the time was Robert Montgomery's Lucky Strike Theatre. Each week, the movie actor and director would introduce and sometimes star in hour-long adaptations of wellknown plays, books and original teleplays. Among the plays presented on this series were The Hunchback of Notre Dame, Great Expectations, Onions in the Stew. Sunset Boulevard. The Lost Weekend and David Copperfield. Midway in its seven-year run the show's title was changed to Robert

### THE MAGIC COTTAGE

### ONE MAN'S FAMILY

Radio's longest-running noninterrupted series, One Man's Family, was brought to television on November 4, 1949. Although the TV version of the serial did not have the longevity of the radio series (some thirty-odd years), the show attracted enough support to remain on the screen to April, 1951.

The television series, like its radio counterpart, told the story of the Barbour family of San Francisco. Father Barbour was played by Bert Lytell and Mother Barbour by Marjorie Gateson. Their children were played by Martin Dean, Ann Wallace, and Eva Marie Saint, who went on to star on the stage and in motion pictures.

### THE HERB SHRINER SHOW

Television had its own Will Rogers in slow-talking country boy Herb "The Hoosier Hotshot" Shriner. Herb became one of television's earliest stars on his CBS show in 1949. By 1953 he'd become the host of a weekly quiz program, Two for the Money. In 1956 he returned to the variety-show format, but people didn't seem to be laughing as much as they had in 1949 at his particular brand of humor. The show was canceled before it completed one full season.

## YOUR SHOW OF SHOWS



Every Saturday night in the late 1940's and early 1950's the big television show to watch was NBC's Admiral Broadway Revue, Your Show of Shows, which starred comedians Sid Caesar and Imogene Coca. Producer Max Liebman lavished tender loving care on each 90-minute broadcast. In the show's fourth year on TV its title was cut to Your Show of Shows, the name by which it is remembered by most TV viewers.

Sid and Imogene made their first appearance on the show in 1949. Their spoofs of old and foreign movies, their pantomimes and musical sketches became TV classics, and few viewers can forget their hilarious spoof of *From Here to Eternity* or their "Italian" movie gibberish.

Miss Coca and Mr. Caesar were surrounded each week by a talented cast of regulars—opera singer Marguerite Piazza; comic Carl Reiner, who supported the stars in various sketches; the dancing Hamilton Trio; singer Bill Hayes; the Billy Williams Quartet; and dancers Bambi Linn and Rod Alexander.

In 1954 the stars decided to go their separate ways. Neither of them was ever to be as wildly popular separately as they had been together.

### PETER LIND HAYES AND MARY HEALY



The husband and wife team of Peter Lind Hayes and Mary Healy were early TV pioneers with their 1949 variety-talk show called *Inside U.S.A.* The following year they teamed up with nightclub owner Sherman Billingsley on *The Stork Club*, where they interviewed guest celebrities.



### **ED WYNN**

Vaudeville's "Perfect Fool," Ed Wynn, had talents which were tailor-made for TV, and CBS presented the indestructible funny man in his own comedy-variety show in 1949. After one year, Ed joined the Four Star Revue roster of weekly alternating stars. Still one year later, the show increased its roster of stars from four to more, Ed among them, and the show became known as The All Star Revue. In 1958 Ed surprised everyone by making his debut as a serious dramatic actor playing in such celebrated TV presentations as Rod Serling's Requiem for a Heavyweight and in the movie version of The Diary of Anne Frank. In the late 1950's Ed returned to television as the star of a half hour weekly situation comedy, but the show was not successful. Thereafter he confined his TV appearances to occasional guest spots on variety and dramatic offerings.









### THE GOLDBERGS

Lovable Jewish Mama Molly Goldberg, played by Gertrude Berg, brought her warmth and humor to TV in 1949. Following the same pattern used ever since the 1930's in the successful radio series, the show was an instant hit. Who can ever forget the familiar Bronx setting of the Goldbergs' apartment, Molly's gruff but practical husband, Jake, played by Phillip Loeb, her son, Sammy, and her daughter, Rosalie, played by Larry

Robinson and Arlene McQuade, and her Uncle David, played by Eli Mintz.

Soon after it first appeared on the home screens, people were quoting Molly's wonderfully mixed-up expressions like "In the pot put the chicken" and "So who's to know?" Each week they squealed with delight as Molly leaned out of her kitchen window and called across the alley to her neighbor, "Yoo-hoo, Mrs. Cohen."

### CAPTAIN VIDEO



When television was still in its youth and most of the shows were live, a local New York telecast on the Dumont station caught viewers' attention. The show, Captain Video, with its makeshift scenery and inexpensive-looking props, starred former radio actor Al Hodge as the gallant Captain Video. Long Island teen-ager Don Hastings played the young Video Ranger.

Even though the show looked as if it were being telecast from someone's basement with its painted, cardboard-box-like spaceships and kiddy car controls, no one who watched TV in those early years would miss this

science fiction unspectacular.



### **GARROWAY AT LARGE**

The Chicago-based Garroway at Large show, starring easy-mannered Dave Garroway, was an NBC favorite beginning in 1949. The show featured singers Connie Russell, Jack Haskell and comedian Cliff Norton and had a large TV following. Dave leisurely

walked from set to set introducing songs, skits and guests. Then he moved on to New York, where he became the host of NBC's *Today* show, an early-morning news and special-features program.

# ARTHUR GODFREY AND HIS FRIENDS

Popular Arthur Godfrey took his successful at-ease radio show before the CBS-TV cameras in 1949. He was already the host of CBS' Talent Scouts program and continued in this capacity. But his weekly hour-long varietymusical show soon became more popular than the Scouts, and his "friends"-singers Janette Davis, Bill Lawrence, Julius La Rosa, Marion Mariners, LuAnn Marlowe. The Simms, Carmel Quinn and the Maguire Sisters, along with The Chordettesbecame almost as famous as Godfrey himself.



Feuds between Godfrey and his "friends" were soon making newspaper headlines, however, as was the way he sometimes fired a member of the cast right on camera. Arthur's ukulele playing, his gently critical commercial messages and his tales of plane piloting

kept the show on the air until 1959, when he left for reasons of health.

# KUKLA, FRAN AND OLLIE

One puppet TV show, which was probably enjoyed by as many adults as children was NBC's Kukla, Fran and Ollie show. Actress Fran Allison's conversations with Burr Tillstrom's cloth and plaster characters had everyone believing the puppets were flesh and blood. First seen on local television in Chicago in 1947, it became a national network show in 1949.

Rabbitt, all controlled and spoken for by master puppeteer Mr. Tillstrom, won a permanent place for themselves in the hearts of millions of Americans. One of the show's most popular features was the performances of plays and operettas by the Kuklapolitan Players, which included all the puppets and Miss Allison. When Kukla, Fran and Ollie was dropped in 1954, public demand for its return was so strong NBC brought back the show for another five years. Since 1957 Mr. Tillstrom and his puppets have been seen as guests on various variety shows and specials and can be seen on NET-TV. This show remains in the memories of the public as one of the classics of TV's Golden Age.

### MR. I. MAGINATION



Each weekday young television fans paid a visit to Mr. I. Magination's "Imagination Town." From April, 1949, to June, 1952, youngsters could have "their every wish come true" in this magical town, created just for them by Mr. I. Magination himself, Paul Tripp. Stories, games, songs and crafts were the daily order of business in Imagination Town.

### SUPER CIRCUS

A very popular show for kids was Super Circus, which was presented by ABC from 1949 to 1956. The regular circus troupe that appeared on the show included ringmaster Claude Kirchner; clowns Cliffy, the tramp, Scampy, the boy clown, and Nick Francis, the fat clown; and the circus bandleader—blond, long-haired, miniskirted Mary Hartline. In addition to these regulars, each week guest jugglers, tumblers and animal acts were featured.





## WHAT'S MY LINE?

The granddaddy of all TV quiz panel shows, What's My Line?, made its television debut on February 2, 1950, with columnist Dorothy Kilgallen, actress Arlene Francis and humorist Hal Block and Louis Untermeyer constituting the panel that tried to guess the occupations of contestants. John Daly was the show's moderator and host. Sunday night on CBS was What's My Lines'? permanent address for almost twenty years. When Block and Untermeyer left the show, they were replaced by Bennett Cerf and Fred Allen, whose slot was filled by Steve Allen after his death. Cerf and the Misses Kilgallen and Francis were permanent panelists the majority of years the show was on network TV. The producing team of Goodson and Todman, who also produced most of television's other panel shows, syndicated their What's My Line? program after CBS canceled the long-running show.

## **JACK BENNY**

By 1950 the handwriting was on the wall as far as radio broadcasting was concerned, and many of that medium's stars were somewhat reluctantly making their moves to TV. Jack Benny, one of radio's brightest stars, made his TV debut in October, 1950, bringing with him most of his popular radio cast. Rochester (Eddie Anderson), announcer Don Wilson, vocalist Dennis Day and Jack's wife, Mary Livingston (who was less enthusiastic about TV than radio) all turned up. Benny's TV show was more variety than situation comedy, and Jack concentrated on introducing show-business celebrities from the movies and radio to TV audiences. Actress Marilyn Monroe and singer Johnny Ray were just two of the stars who made their TV debuts on The Jack Benny Show. In 1960 Jack decided to drop the weekly TV grind and has since concentrated on specials and occasional guest appearances.

### YOU BET YOUR LIFE

Groucho Marx deserted famed brothers Harpo and Chico when, in 1950, he became the star of his own weekly television series, You Bet Your Life. The show, a comedy-quiz program, had remarkable staying power on TV considering its simple format. With his announcer, George Fenneman, who was often the butt of Groucho's caustic remarks, cigar-puffing, bushy-mustached Groucho asked contestants impossible questions. Should they say the "secret word," a strange-looking duck would appear with a beakful of money. The show remained on the air well into the sixties.

### **GARRY MOORE SHOW**

A popular daytime variety show was MC'd by former Jimmy Durante sidekick Garry Moore and presented by CBS in 1950. Denise Lor, Ken Carson and Durward Kirby were regulars on the show, which remained on the air until 1958. That year, Moore became the star of a nighttime series-a weekly hour-long variety-music show which featured comediennes Marion Lorne and Carol Burnett, as well as old standby Durward Kirby. When the sensational Miss Burnett left the show in the mid-1960's, it lost much of its luster, and Garry retired from television for several years to rest and recuperate from the grueling weekly TV grind. He has since returned to television as MC of a syndicated quiz show and can also be seen as a guest star on

### THE KATE SMITH HOUR

Early-afternoon television was graced in 1950 by the presence of Miss Kate Smith. NBC brought the former leading light of radio before TV cameras in a combination chatter, interview and song show, directed to the ladies of the house. Kate's longtime manager and friend, Ted Collins, was on hand with Kate, and an impressive list of guest stars from the world of show business appeared on the program. Miss Smith's TV popularity was such that NBC rewarded her with an evening musical-variety show, which ran in conjunction with the daytime show. Since 1954, when Kate's shows left the air, she has been seen regularly as a guest star on most of television's leading comedy-variety programs.

### **BURNS AND ALLEN**

Radio stars George Burns and Gracie Allen, a celebrated husband and wife comedy team who had begun their careers as vaudeville performers in the 1920's, brought their famous routines to television in 1950, in a weekly situation comedy series on CBS. Cast regulars, Bea Benadaret as next door neighbor Blanche Norton, Larry Keaton as Blanche's husband, Harry, announcer Harry Von Zell and the Burnses' son, Ronny, were on hand to add to the comedy of the program. Gracie left the show because of ill health in 1958, and one year later the show retired from the air. Few viewers will forget the gruff, lovable George and his cigar-smoking monologues, which were mostly about Gracie, the muddleheaded queen with a strange kind of logic all her own.



### COLGATE COMEDY HOUR

The Colgate Comedy Hour, first seen in 1950, presented some of the biggest names in show business as hosts on an alternating basis. Some of the notables to serve in this capacity were Dean Martin and Jerry Lewis, Fred Allen, Eddie Cantor, Jimmy Durante, Abbott and Costello, Spike Jones and his City Slickers and Bob Hope. The list of guest stars who also appeared on this series included Martha Raye, Tennessee Ernie Ford, Jack Carter and Perry Como. Every now and then a special full-length musical comedy was presented. Musical comedy star Ethel Merman appeared in a special telecast of Anything Goes, and Bobby Clark was seen in The Would-be Gentleman. Other special attractions of the Comedy Hour included a presentation of Ice Capades of 1954 with Donna Atwood.

### THE ROY ROGERS SHOW

Cowboy star Roy Rogers, accompanied by his wife, Dale Evans, his horse, Trigger, and his dog, Bullet, also arrived on the television scene in 1950. His show, a combination songfest and adventure series proved popular with the small fry and enjoyed a long, successful TV stay.

#### ROOTIE KAZOOTIE

Hand puppet Rootie Kazootie, his baseball cap tipped to one side, and his pal, Todd Russell, entertained kids daily on NBC, beginning in October, 1950. The young viewers squealed with delight each time puppets El Squeeko Mouse, Gala Poochie and Polka Dottie put in their appearances on the show. Order was preserved in between movie cartoons by the Keystone Kops. The show lasted until November, 1952.

### **BROADWAY OPEN HOUSE**

During the early 1950's one of the most popular late-night comedy-talk shows was *Broadway Open House*. It starred comedian Jerry Lester and featured a tall, curvaceous blonde with the suitably Scandinavian name of Dagmar. The forerunner of NBC's current late-night offering, *The Tonight Show*, Lester's late-late opus with its Beanbag Club and hilarious takeoffs of fairy tales, which featured big Dagmar as such unlikely characters as Little Red Riding Hood and Little Miss Muffet, convulsed audiences. Other regulars on the show included David Street, Wayne Howell and musical director and accordionist Milton Delugg.

### THE FRANK SINATRA SHOW

Singing star Frank Sinatra made his TV debut in a weekly half hour musical program on CBS in 1950. It ran for two years. Since 1952 Frank has turned to special shows and guest spots, appearing on *The Colgate Comedy Hour*, with Bing Crosby, and *The Chevy Show* with Dinah Shore.

### ARTHUR MURRAY'S DANCE PARTY



A popular program which was publicly recalled each time one network or another canceled it was The Arthur Murray Dance Party, which first appeared in 1950. Originally designed to give on-the-air dance instructions to at-home viewers (à la the Arthur Murray Dance Studios), a musical-variety show format eventually evolved. Kathryn Murray, Arthur's energetic and vivacious wife, was the real star of the show, with Arthur doing his duty as a straight man or dance partner. The Murrays managed to squeeze a nine-year run out of the series before retiring to Hawaii.

### YOUR HIT PARADE

In 1950 NBC dusted off its old *Hit Parade* radio show, which had been such a hit in the 1940's, and moved it to television as a summer replacement. By October sufficient public interest had been aroused to keep the show on as a permanent attraction. Eileen Wilson, Snooky Lanson and Dorothy Collins were the singing stars, and Raymond Scott provided the musical background. In 1952 June Valli replaced Miss Wilson, and Russell Arms joined her, Miss Collins and Mr. Lanson. Gisele MacKenzie replaced Miss Valli the following season. But by 1958 it was clear that rock-and-roll music was going to dominate the song popularity charts for a long time to come. Highly stylized, the songs were almost inseparable from the artists who made them famous. Since the "Hit Paraders" were not familiar with that kind of music and since some of the hit tunes remained in the top ten for weeks on end, novel ways of staging the songs became more difficult. In 1959 the "Lucky Strike Gang" swayed back and forth singing "So long for a while". . . that's all the songs for a while" for the last time.

### **BEAT THE CLOCK**

Once a week Bud Collyer led studio contestants through some pretty exhausting paces as they tried to beat the clock by performing close to impossible stunts. Mr. Collyer's beautiful blond assistant, Roxanne, who introduced the contestants to Mr. Collyer and the home viewers, became a TV celebrity in her own right.

### **BIG TOP**

The Big Top, a popular CBS circus show, made its television debut in 1950, with ringmaster Jack Sterling presiding. Clowns, high-wire acts and animals, as well as interviews with kids in the studio audience, were featured weekly. Mr. Sterling was assisted by clown Ed McMahon, who later became better known as Johnny Carson's Tonight Show sidekick. The program had a healthy seven-year run on CBS before blowing its circus whistle for the last time in September, 1957.


### KEN MURRAY SHOW



The star of the legitimate theater's successful *Blackout* shows, Ken Murray had a CBS television show of his own from 1950 to 1952. A veteran showman and vaudevillian, Murray was one of the first performers to realize TV's potential for keeping vaudeville alive. His variety extravaganzas proved just the right thing to revive this dying form of entertainment. Ken's sidekick, a pretty, wideeyed cowgirl named Laurie Anders, added to the *Murray Show* merriment.


### **SUPERMAN**



"It's a bird...it's a plane...it's Superman! The Adventures of Superman enjoyed the same success on television it had in comic strips, on the radio and in motion pictures. George Reeves played the dual role of Clark Kent and Superman. Noel Neill was seen as Lois Lane, Jack Larson played teen-aged copyboy Jimmy, and John Hamilton Daily Planet newspaper editor in chief Perry White. The show first appeared on TV screens across the country as a syndicated series in 1950 and has been shown continuously ever since.


# AMAHL AND THE NIGHT VISITORS

The first opera commissioned expressly for television, Gian Carlo Menotti's Amahl and the Night Visitors, was premiered on Christmas Eve, 1951. In this story of a crippled boy who plays host to the Three Kings on their way to pay tribute to the Christ Child in Bethlehem, Chet Allen appeared as the boy, Amahl, and Rosemary Kuhlman sang the role of his mother. Response to the show was so great that NBC made the opera an annual Christmas tradition.

# THE ERNIE KOVACS SHOW

The bizarre, wildly original, zany comic talents of comedian Ernie Kovacs first began delighting TV audiences in 1951, when his show was televised from Philadelphia over the NBC national network. Ernie was the first comedian to realize the unique potentials TV held for comedians. His close-up direct conversations with the camera, his special camera effects, his Nairobi tribe of music-playing gorillas had audiences howling. And who could forget his Percy Dovetonsils, the nasal-sounding poet with eyeglasses as thick as a soda pop bottle? In 1955 Ernie's show included his wife. Edie Adams, who did brilliant takeoffs on actresses Marilyn Monroe and Zsa Zsa Gabor. Ernie's show was canceled in 1956, and thereafter he confined his television activities to occasional guest appearances and specials such as Ernie in Kovacsland. His career was cut tragically short when he was killed in an auto accident in 1962. His unique TV comic spirit has never been equaled.

# I LOVE LUCY

The most successful situation comedy series in the history of television. I Love Lucy, starring Lucille Ball and Desi Arnaz, first saw the glow of TV success in 1951. The show revolved around bandleader Ricky Ricardo (Arnaz), his zany, trouble-prone wife, Lucy (Miss Ball), and their funny neighbors and friends Fred and Ethel Mertz, played by William Frawley and Vivian Vance. Loosely based on Miss Ball's hit radio show My Favorite Husband and retaining many of her original writers, the Lucy show quickly became a national institution. In 1952, when Miss Ball became pregnant, zealous TV officials decided to make Lucy Ricardo pregnant as well.

national headlines. In real life Miss Ball had had a baby girl. Following his divorce from Miss Ball, Mr. Arnaz retired from the series. The following year Lucy returned alone with a new format and show titled The Lucille Ball Show. During I Love Lucy's heyday the Desilu Company initiated a one-hour dramatic series called The Desilu Playhouse, which also had a profitable run on TV.

# THE SENATE CRIME HEARINGS

Frank Costello, an underworld character being questioned by the committee, refused to have his face telecast. The TV cameras therefore concentrated on his hands.

In March, 1951, television came into its own with in-depth, on-the-spot coverage of important news events. CBS and NBC simultaneously presented the U.S. Senate hearings on crime in America. All day long, viewers would sit fascinated in front of their TV sets as Senators Estes Kefauver and Charles Tobey and



lawyer Rudolph Halley questioned such czars of the underworld as Frank Costello and ex-gangsters' moll Virginia Hill. Most of the witnesses pleaded the Fifth—"I refuse to answer on the grounds that it may tend to incriminate me"—a statement that became a household phrase in homes all over America. Because of the hearings, Americans were made frighteningly aware of how a national web of crime could touch their everyday lives.

#### AMOS 'N' ANDY

Amos, Andy, the Kingfish, Sapphire and all the funny folk of the popular Amos 'n' Andy radio show were transferred to television in 1951 with an all-black cast. The characters of Amos and Andy, originally played on radio by white actors Charles Correll and Freeman Gosden, were portrayed on TV by Spencer Williams (Andy) and Alvin Childress (Amos). The most popular character on the program remained the Kingfish, played by Tim Moore. The show was finally canceled from television in 1953, when the NAACP and other civil-rights groups protested the way the show pictured the American black man.

# **JACKIE GLEASON**

Jackie Gleason's first television show was called The Cavalcade of Stars and was broadcast over the New York local Dumont station. The program featured all of Jackie's famous TV characters-the Poor Soul, Reggie Van Gleason, Ralph Cramden and Joe the Bartender. Also appearing on the show were comedienne Pert Kelton and comic Larry Storch. In 1952 Gleason's national drawing power was put to the test. He gained instant fame across the country as star of a network variety-comedy series. One of the popular features of the Gleason show, the Honeymooners, proved so popular that a separate half hour situation comedy series was created from it.

The Goodyear Playhouse dramatic series, produced by Fred Coe, was responsible for bringing some of television's most successful and celebrated plays before the public. Paddy Chayefsky's award-winning Marty, starring Rod Steiger in the title role, later would win an Academy Award for Ernest Borgnine when it was made into a major motion picture. The Catered Affair, with Thelma Ritter, was also made into a motion picture starring Bette Davis, and The Bachelor Party became yet another successful film. The Goodyear Playhouse was also the first to present A Trip to Bountiful, with Lillian Gish, and Gore Vidal's A Visit to a Small Planet, both of which were later made into Broadway stage plays. In 1957 the series became a half hour show and closed its curtain for the final time a short time later.

#### PINKY LEE SHOW

Lisping burlesque comedian Pinky Lee first appeared in the weekly musical-variety series *The Two of Us* with Vivian Blaine in 1951. The show ran for two years on NBC. In 1953 Pinky brought his baggy suit and funny hat to daytime TV, with a show designed for the kiddies. During one of these shows Pinky, while still "on the air," collapsed and thereafter retired from TV.

## **RACKET SQUAD**

One weekly TV mystery-crime show which provided a public service, as well as entertainment, was CBS' Racket Squad. The series, which starred Reed Hadley as Detective Braddock of the Racket Squad, informed viewers of the workings of various confidence-game racketeers, alerting viewers to beware of charming strangers. Captain Braddock arrested his last con man in 1953, but the show can still be seen on local reruns.

# MACY'S THANKSGIVING DAY PARADE



Thanksgiving just wouldn't be the same without a telecast of Macy's Annual Thanksgiving Day Parade. The huge balloons of Mickey Mouse, Popeye the Sailor Man and other well known cartoon characters have been ushering in the Christmas shopping season for television viewers since 1951. Such notable TV personalities as Arlene Francis, Dave Garroway, Douglas Edwards, Bess Myerson and Marilyn Van Derbur have acted as TV hosts for the Parade over the years.

# **DINAH SHORE**

Singer Dinah Shore first faced a TV camera in 1939, when she appeared in a special TV broadcast seen at the New York World's Fair. She had to wait until 1951, however, before she became a TV star of her own weekly series. In 1951 Chevrolet sponsored the fifteen-minute, twice-a-day *Chevy Show* starring Miss Shore. In 1956 it became a one-hour weekly show until 1962 and she advised all to "see the U.S.A. in your Chev-ro-let." *The Chevy Show* was noted not only for Dinah's wonderful way with a song but for her fabulous clothes, which had female viewers panting with envy week after week. For a short while, Dinah's show, produced by Bob Banner Associates, alternated with Perry Como's show. Since 1962 Dinah has appeared on television on numerous specials and now has her own daytime chat series, *Dinah Shore*.

# JOE LOUIS-ROCKY MARCIANO FIGHT



A major heavyweight championship fight covered on television was the Joe Louis-Rocky Marciano fight, which was telecast by NBC in 1951. At New York City's Madison Square Garden, viewers saw the end of an era when Marciano defeated Louis.

Bing Crosby, although never the star of a regular show on television, has made many guest appearances on that medium. His first TV appearance was on a Red Cross special in 1951.

He has appeared as a guest on *The Ed Sullivan Show*, *Hollywood Palace* and on most of the major comedy-variety shows. In 1954 he starred in two *Bing Crosby Show* specials on CBS.

#### WILD BILL HICKOK

The most popular feature of the Strike It Rich quiz show, MC'd by Warren Hull and first seen on TV in 1951, was Heartline. Poor unfortunates made their financial needs known to the TV viewing public, hoping viewers would kindly respond by sending them cash to help ease their misfortunes. Typical plights: some had been left stranded by their husbands with swarms of kids to look after; some had lost all their belongings in natural disasters; some required money for much-needed operations. The person who could tell the saddest story, and cried the hardest, was chosen to receive the financial blessing of Mr. Hull and the home viewers.


## ALL STAR REVUE STARRING MARTHA RAYE

Martha Raye, funny lady of films, stage and radio, added television to her list of credits in 1951, when she alternated with Jimmy Durante as star of NBC's All Star Revue, a comedy-variety hour. When madcap Miss Raye left the show in 1952, Groucho Marx took over her All Star spotlight. She later had a variety program called The Martha Raye Show, with former boxing star Rocky Graziano as a featured player.





#### **SEE IT NOW**

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# TV MADE STARS

Television proved a perfect stepping-stone to stardom for many actors and actresses. Live original dramas were being produced by the hundreds during the late 1940's and early 1950's, and shows like Studio One, The Kraft Theatre and Playhouse 90 gave hitherto unknown actors national exposure for the first time in their careers. Many would graduate to superstardom in motion pictures and on Broadway.





# **GEORGE GOBEL**



Diminutive "Lonesome" George Gobel made his television debut on NBC's Who Said That? in 1952. The public took an instant liking to the funny little man, and he was given his own comedy-variety show in 1954. His pet expression, "Well, I'll be a dirty bird," became a national catchphrase, and his mild-mannered bouts with his TV wife, Alice, first played by actress Jeff Donnell and later by Phyllis Avery, provided sufficient laughs to keep his show at the top of the TV charts until the early 1960's. Some of the well-known guest stars to pay George weekly visits were Rosemary Clooney, opera star Helen Traubel, Hermione Gingold, Kirk Douglas, singer Anita Bryant and many others.

# **HOUSE PARTY**

Art Linkletter's warm way with the small fry in the "Kids say the darnedest things" portion of his *House Party* program, as well as his easy way with guests and studio audiences, made this program a daily favorite with housewives all across the country. *House Party* made its TV debut in 1952.

#### **OUR MISS BROOKS**

## **MASQUERADE PARTY**

Everybody likes a costume party, and so CBS, ABC and NBC, in turn, offered the public Masquerade Party. a panel-game show on which panelists tried to guess who the celebrities behind the various outlandish costumes and getups really were. The guests were famous entertainment figures, but their disguises were so good that unless their voices gave them away, panelists rarely guessed their identities. At various times the guessing panel consisted of such celebs as Bobby Sherwood, Betsy Palmer. Johnny Johnston, Ilka Chase, Sam Levenson, Audrey Meadows, Lee Bowman, Fay Emerson, Phil Silvers, Buff Cobb and Ogden Nash. The proceedings were moderated by a former

member of Fred Allen's radio show, Peter Donald. The show premiered in 1952 and left the air in 1958.

# THE JANE FROMAN SHOW

The Jane Froman Show, originally called The U.S. Canteen Show, was seen on CBS from October, 1952, to June, 1955. Jane, the brave singer

who had been crippled in an air crash during World War II, sang for servicemen in Army and Navy hospitals and interviewed the boys for home viewers.

## MR. AND MRS. NORTH



Another popular radio mystery program which was brought to television was the Mr. and Mrs. North series. The comic overtones of the show were featured more than the crime aspects, as each week from 1952 to 1954 Pam and Jerry North, played by Barbara Britton and Richard Denning, who later starred in the Hawaiian Eye series, found themselves humorously and unwittingly involved in one murder mystery after another.

# JUNGLE JIM

The movies' best-remembered Tarzan, swimming champion Johnny Weissmuller, put on some clothes and became TV's Jungle Jim in 1952. His pet chimpanzee was called Kimba instead of Cheetah, but the jungle setting remained the same. Jungle Jim, a syndicated series, was a mild success, but Mr. Weissmuller did not enjoy either the fame or longevity he had had as Tarzan, and the show left the air after several seasons.

# MR. PEEPERS



Lovable, gentle schoolteacher Mr. Peepers, starring Wally Cox, was first seen in 1952 as a summer replacement show. It caught on with the viewing public and became a regular feature on NBC for three years. Set in fictional Jefferson City Junior High School, Mr. Peepers and his fellow teachers at Jefferson-English teacher Mrs. Gurney, played by stuttering character actress Marion Lorne; Harvey Weskit, played by Tony Randall; and Mr. Peepers' girlfriend, the school nurse, played by Pat Benoit-continued to amuse TV watchers until June, 1955. The show got its highest ratings when Mr. Peepers married the school nurse.

#### **OMNIBUS**

A Sunday afternoon "must" which shuffled back and forth between the CBS, NBC and ABC networks was the original potpourri magazine-of-the-air series Omnibus. Hosted by suave Alistair Cooke, the show was a veritable gold mine of such varied TV fare as plays like The Trial of Anne Boleyn with Susan Strasberg and She Stoops to Conquer with Sir Michael Redgrave; jazz concerts conducted by Leonard Bernstein: interviews with such famed notables as architect Frank Lloyd Wright and choreographer Agnes DeMille, as well as readings by such performers as Peter Ustinov and Charles Laughton. The show had strong appeal for the literate and intellectual members of the TV viewing public but never really proved popular. All the same, the devotion of its small but fervent band of fans was enough to keep the now-classic TV program on the air until 1959.

#### **MEET MILLIE**

The very funny escapades of a young New York secretary living with her widowed mother, *Meet Millie* began delighting home viewers on CBS in 1952. It continued to keep audiences laughing until 1956. # THIS IS YOUR LIFE

On October 2, 1952, a show made its debut on the NBC television network which fascinated viewers. Called This Is Your Life, created and MC'd by Ralph Edwards of Truth or Consequences fame, the show surprised guest celebrities, as well as unknownbut-worthy folk, and set about to tell their colorful life stories. People who had known the guests during important moments of their lives were paraded before them often with tearful results. Among the more popular guests on the show was Lillian Roth, whose heartbreaking encounter with alcoholism was presented to the public. Roy Campanella, Jack Dempsey, Ted Lewis, Jeanette Mac-Donald, Dorothy Lamour, Billy Graham, Rock Hudson and many others had their lives bared for public consumption.

#### CANDID CAMERA

Radio's funny Candid Microphone program, which used hidden microphones to record the spontaneous reactions of unsuspecting people, was successfully transferred to television in 1952. Retitled Candid Camera, the show's creator and host Allen Funt employed a hidden camera to photograph the on-the-spot reactions to some pretty wild situations such as: walking into unmarked rest rooms, hands coming out of Automat shelves to filch food from plates, and trying to enter a door behind which nothing existed. #### **OZZIE AND HARRIET**

Perennial radio favorites Ozzie and Harriet Nelson brought their sons, Ricky and David, with them to television, and a delighted public watched as the youngsters grew from childhood to manhood during the ten years the show was telecast. During this time, the boys became full-fledged TV stars in their own right. Ricky would become one of the nation's top rock-and-roll recording stars, and David a motion-picture actor.



# I MARRIED JOAN

Movie and radio comedienne Joan Davis was the star of a TV situation comedy series, *I Married Joan*. Jim Backus costarred as her husband. The show centered on Joan, the wife of staid and settled Judge Bradley Stevens. The show left the air in 1955 when Joan became fatally ill.

#### MY LITTLE MARGIE

Forever-bubbling Gale Storm first displayed her cute eye crinkling before the TV cameras in My Little Margie. With former silent-screen matinee idol Charles Farrell as her father. Verne, and Hillary Brooke as her father's love life, Miss Storm worked her way in and out of four years' worth of Little Margie trouble. In 1956 the format of Gale's show changed and she became a social director on a large ocean liner. This time her show was called Oh Susannah! and featured Zasu Pitts as her friend and fellow worker. In 1958 the show changed its title to The Gale Storm Show.

# HALLMARK HALL OF FAME

Hallmark Greeting Cards presented a series of half hour plays on the NBC network in 1952. The following year the show, was expanded to a full hour, and in 1955 it was expanded even further to a ninety-minute format. The show concentrated on presenting original television plays, musical comedy adaptations and Broadway stage successes. Among many highlights were such notable performers as Maurice Evans and Judith Anderson in their much-heralded Macbeth, the Evans production of Hamlet, Twelfth Night, The Devil's Disciple, Man and Superman, Richard the Third and The Taming of the Shrew. Broadway's musical success Kiss Me Kate with original stars Alfred Drake and Patricia Morison, Green Pastures, Alice in Wonderland, Hans Brinker and His Silver Skates with Tab Hunter, The Skin of Our Teeth with Mary Martin and George Abbott, Cradle Song, Ah! Wilderness, The Little Foxes. The




#### VICTORY AT SEA

The award-winning NBC documentary series Victory at Sea premiered on October 26, 1952, and was an immediate hit. Presented in twenty-six half-hour segments and produced by Henry Solomon, the show became the first newshistory series to gain national acceptance. Noted for the magnificent background music composed by veteran Broadway composer Richard Rodgers, the theme song from the show climbed to the top of the Hit Parade. Put together mainly from old World War II newsreel films, which were brilliantly edited, this fine series earned many awards. Leonard Graves was the narrator.

# LIFE IS WORTH LIVING



Bishop Fulton J. Sheen, a Roman Catholic prelate, brought inspiration to thousands of viewers, no matter what their faith. Bishop Sheen made his TV debut on a local show called Life Is Worth Living in 1952. He became such a popular attraction that in 1955 the American Broadcasting Company offered him a national network program. The bishop covered a variety of subjects, interviewing numerous celebrities from the worlds of politics and show business. With countless awards lining his mantle, the bishop retired from regular television broadcasting in 1957.

#### THE WALTER WINCHELL SHOW

Fast-talking columnist gossip Walter Winchell brought his quick-asa-flash delivery from radio to television in 1952. The show ran on ABC to 1955. The following year NBC picked up Winchell's option, but this time Winchell served as a host for a varietymusical program which proved hardly his bag of tricks. In spite of support by such guests as Helen Haves, Perry Como, Jane Froman, Sammy Davis, Ir., and Martha Raye, the show was canceled after two months. Winchell quickly moved back to his old stamping grounds, ABC, and managed to stay on the air this time to 1957. when he retired from show business.

### THE GUIDING LIGHT

Most radio soap operas did not make the grade when transposed to television. One soaper which did make it on television was *The Guiding Light*, brought to television in 1952 and still running strong. Whitfield Connor, Ellen Demming and Zina Bethune, later the star of *The Nurses*, were regulars on the TV version of *The Guiding Light*.

# I'VE GOT A SECRET

One of producers Goodson and Todman's many TV panel shows to make the grade was *I've Got a Secret*. It boasted Garry Moore as moderator and featured Bill Cullen, Jayne Meadows, Henry Morgan and Faye Emerson, later replaced by actress Betsy Palmer, as regular panelists. It was the panelists' job to guess what "secret" guests on the show harbored. The secrets could be as simple as "I'm wearing red flannel underwear under my evening gown" to "I was the first man to make a solo airplane flight after Lindbergh's famous trip."

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#### DRAGNET

Versatile Jack Webb was the star, chief writer, producer and director of *Dragnet*. Duplicating on television its radio success, *Dragnet* was relatively low-keyed for a detective program. From 1952 until it temporarily left the airwaves in 1959, the show had everyone humming its theme song, "Dum de dum dum," and saying things like "All we want is the facts, ma'am," and "What's his MO?"

The cases presented on the show were taken from the files of the Los Angeles Police Department. Webb played Police Detective Sergeant Joe Friday and Ben Alexander his partner, Detective Frank Smith.

Ten years after it left the air, NBC brought back Dragnet under the name *Dragnet 1969*. The format and the star, Jack Webb, were still the same, but this time Henry Morgan was Friday's partner.

#### DING DONG SCHOOL

One of television's most popular kiddie shows for preschool toddlers, Ding Dong School, was presided over by a grandmotherly teacher called Miss Frances. First telecast in 1952, the show ran for four years on the NBC network, ringing its by then famous school bell for the last time on December 28, 1956.

Ding Dong School was in session each weekday morning, and mothers all over America gratefully busied themselves with their household chores as Miss Frances (Dr. Frances Horwich) kept their youngsters busy fingerpainting, singing songs, listening to stories and playing games.

# PRESIDENT TRUMAN'S WHITE HOUSE TOUR



The American public was given its first glimpse of what life was like in Washington's White House, the home of U.S. Presidents, when the three major networks, CBS, NBC and ABC, took them on a tour of that historic building in May, 1952. President Harry S. Truman and his wife, Bess, acted as guides. This tour was the first of many TV audiences were to enjoy in later years. Mrs. John F. Kennedy guided viewers some years later through the renovated White House, and even the British royal family opened to television their home at Buckingham Palace.

### **RED BUTTONS**

A fast-talking little ball of fire, Red Buttons, was the star of a half hour comedy-variety TV show on CBS. Red, a former burlesque comedian, had just the right comedic ability to make him a big favorite on TV, but his fights with his many writers made entertainment headlines and seemed to dampen his impact on the industry. Phyllis Kirk, who later became the costar of The Thin Man series, played Red's wife on the show. Pat Carroll, Jeanne Carson and Joe Silver appeared regularly with Red on the show. The show was finally canceled in 1954. Red went on to become a serious actor, winning an Academy Award for his portrayal of an Army sergeant stationed in Japan in the film Sayo-



### **TOPPER**



Writer Thorne Smith's amusing stories of a husband and wife ghost team living compatibly with a "live" tenant, Topper, was made into an equally amusing TV series which starred Anne Jeffreys and Robert Sterling as the ghosts and Leo G. Carroll as Topper. Lee Patrick played Topper's wife and was the show's protagonist. Weekly a ghost of a dog named Neil, who had supposedly been killed in an avalanche with the couple, stole the show from the stars. Topper was the first of a string of spirit shows like Bewitched and I Dream of Jeannie which later made their appearances on TV screens.

Real-life husband and wife Robert Sterling and Anne Jeffreys played the ghost couple of the Topper series.

# MAKE ROOM FOR DADDY

Nightclub comedian Danny Thomas made his assault on television playing, of all things, a nightclub comedian who seldom was seen in a nightclub. The CBS series, Make Room for Daddy, mostly centered on Danny's home life. His family consisted of Jean Hagen as his wife, Rusty Hamer as his son, Rusty, and Sherry Jackson and Angela Cartwright as his daughters. In 1956 Miss Hagen decided that she had had enough of the series and Danny became a "widower," at which time the show became known as The Danny Thomas Show. Danny didn't remain a widower long, however, and in 1957 he "married" Marjorie Lord, who remained on the series for many years.

# A LETTER TO LORETTA

Glamorous movie queen Loretta Young began her TV career in 1953 on a show called A Letter to Loretta. Each week Miss Young would open her mailbag and read a letter from a member of the viewing audience which served as an inspiration for the half hour drama to follow. In the 150 plays which followed over the next several years Loretta got a chance to

play every conceivable type of part from harassed housewife to Oriental princess. Loretta's television trademark became her sweeping entrances in fashionable creations at the opening of each show. During Loretta's third year on the series, she became seriously ill, and many well-known actresses filled in for her until she had recuperated.

# THE TONIGHT SHOW

In 1953 NBC offered competition to CBS' popular late-night movie show, The Late Show, when it presented an evening talk-variety show, The Tonight Show, which starred Steve Allen and featured regulars Louis Nye, Tom Poston, Don Knotts and singers Steve Lawrence and Evdie Gorme, Musical conductor Skitch Henderson also added to the merriment. In 1957, comedian Jack Paar replaced Steve as host and added his company of regulars, such as Hermione Gingold, Genevieve, Cliff Arquette, Peggy Cass, Jonathan Winters, Elsa Maxwell, Zsa Zsa Gabor, Alexander King, Pat Harrington, Jr., as Guido Panzini and many others as sometimes guests. Announcer Hugh Downs and musical director José Melis were also on hand. When Paar left the

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# MARY MARTIN-ETHEL MERMAN ON FORD'S 50TH ANNIVERSARY SHOW

TV history was made when musical comedy stars Mary Martin and Ethel Merman teamed up for the Ford Motor Company's 50th Anniversary Show. The show was telecast by both NBC and CBS simultaneously. Miss Martin's spoof of the changes in fashion over the years and her sensational duet with Miss Merman as they sat on high stools and exchanged musical comedy hit songs they had introduced were a television highlight.



# QUEEN ELIZABETH'S CORONATION

All the pomp and circumstance of Britain were brought into American homes when NBC, CBS and ABC, in cooperation with Britain's BBC, presented the coronation of Elizabeth II of the United Kingdom of Great Britain, Northern Ireland and Other Realms and Territories on June 2, 1953. This was one of the first major international news events to receive blow-by-blow television coverage, and millions of Americans, along with people all over the world, watched in fascination as Elizabeth in her golden coach was pulled by sturdy stallions through the streets of London from Buckingham Palace to Westminster Abbey for her crowning.

# RED SKELTON SHOW



Indestructible comedian Red Skelton came to television from the movies and nightclubs in 1953. The Red Skelton Show, which is still a favorite, featured all of Red's crazy characterizations including Freddie the Freeloader, Willy Lump Lump, The Drunk, George Appleby, The Henpecked Husband, Clem Kaddidlehoffer, Cookie the Sailor, Prizefighter Cauliflower McPugg, Deadeye the Cowboy and others. Red's pantomime

routines earned him the much deserved title of the Marcel Marceau of Television. During Red's years on television he has had such famous guests as Marilyn Maxwell, Lucille Ball and Desi Arnaz, Pat O'Brien, Barbara Nichols, Lon Chaney, Jr., Janis Paige, Marie Windsor and Edward Everett Horton. His hour-long comedy series has endured longer than any other similar show on television.

### LIFE WITH FATHER



The producer-director of radio's Studio One and The Ford Theatre, Fletcher Markle, added television to his list of credits when, in 1953, he produced and directed the Life with Father series. A situation comedy based on the long-running Broadway play of the same name, the series starred Leon Ames as Father and Lurene Tuttle as Mother shown left. The show also featured Ralph Reed, Freddie Leiston, Ronald Keith and Harvey Grant as their redheaded sons.

# JOE FRANKLIN'S MEMORY LANE

Television's longest-reigning King of Nostalgia, Joe Franklin, made his television debut one Sunday night in 1953 with Author Fannie Hurst, his first TV guest. One of the few personality interviewers to broadcast successfully on both radio and TV simultaneously, Joe's "remember when" format has been a favorite with the viewing public for more than fifteen years and with the listening public even longer than that. In 1954 Joe moved from nighttime TV telecasting to the daytime, where he has been ever since. In 1958 Joe conducted a 90-minute in-depth interview with his idol, Eddie Cantor, which was presented free from commercial interruptions as a tribute to Eddie.

Contestants were asked questions for big money prizes and Dr. Mason Gross passed on the accuracy of their answers. Sam Levenson, the ex-schoolteacher, was a frequent substitute for Herb.

On May 24, 1953, The Goodyear Playhouse presented an original play by Paddy Chayefsky called Marty. The play, about a nearly middle-aged butcher who decides to break away from his Italian mother's apron strings and find a girlfriend of his own, made

TV history. Directed by Delbert Mann and starring Rod Steiger, Nancy Marchand, Esther Minciotti, Betsy Palmer and Lee Phillips, the play was later made into an Academy Awardwinning film which starred Ernest Borgnine.

# WINKY DINK AND YOU

The real star of the Winky Dink children's show was a paper cutout character, although Jack Barry presided over the proceedings, announcing cartoons and encouraging the kids at home to join in the games, arts and crafts, and other projects being enjoyed by the kids in the studio audience. The show remained on CBS for four years.

# YOU ARE THERE

CBS' dean of newscasters Walter Cronkite hosted the You Are There series, which presented half hour recreations of historical events as if they were actually happening and being televised as on-the-spot news reports. ### MY FAVORITE HUSBAND





# PERSON TO PERSON

Veteran radio and TV newscaster Edward R. Murrow took viewers on visits to the homes of world celebrities on his weekly CBS Person to Person show. Using the TV monitor to talk to his guests, Murrow casually puffed on his cigarettes and asked probing questions of such notables as Marilyn Monroe, Louella Parsons, Mike Todd and his wife, Elizabeth Taylor, Marlon Brando, Jackie Robinson, the Duke and Duchess of Windsor, former President Harry S. Truman and Gypsy Rose Lee. When Murrow left the show in July, 1959, Charles Collingwood took over; but without Murrow the public soon lost interest, and the show left the air one year later.



# THE SECRET STORM



The Secret Storm, a daytime viewing favorite of housewives all over America, was first seen on television in 1954. The series recorded the problems and triumphs of the Ames family. Other soap opera favorites, such as As the World Turns, The Guiding Light and The Edge of Night, have also enjoyed immense popularity with daytime viewers.

# TENNESSEE ERNIE FORD SHOW

One year later, NBC officials rewarded him with a daytime show of his own which featured music, humor and pleasant chatter. His popularity increased, and in 1956 he starred in a prime-time evening variety hour. The show ran for four years on NBC.



The show lasted just one year. In the late 1960's NBC tried again but with even less success.

The first telecast of the annual Academy Award presentations ran overtime, and William Holden, Oscar winner for his work in Stalag 17 that year, was cut off in the middle of his acceptance speech. TV viewers had to turn to newspaper accounts the next morning to find that Audrey Hepburn had won an Oscar for her work in Roman Holiday and that the best movie of the year was judged to be From Here to Eternity.



# THE MC CARTHY UN-AMERICAN **ACTIVITIES INVESTIGATIONS**

The McCarthy Senatorial investigations into un-American activities became a daily and deadly household game for millions of viewers. Led by Senator Joseph McCarthy of Wisconsin, and supported by aides Private David Schine and lawyer Roy Cohn, the Senate subcommittee probed various branches of government-probably the most famous of which were the Army hearings at which distinguished lawyer Joseph Welch turned on McCarthy, saying: "Have you no sense of decency, sir? ### LUX VIDEO THEATRE

In 1954, when TV was still showing films made mainly in the 1930's and early 1940's, Lux Video Theatre presented hour-long adaptations of recent films such as To Each His Own. A Place in the Sun, Sunset Boulevard and Princess O'Rourke. By 1957, however, television had begun to acquire an increasing number of recent films, and the need for TV adaptations diminished. Five years had been squeezed out of the Lux Video Theatre by the time it went off the air in 1957.

# WALT DISNEY

In 1954 Walt Disney brought his special magic to television in a one-hour weekly series called *Disneyland*. Excerpts from some of Walt's popular films were presented, as well as adventure stories and nature films made especially for television. *Davy Crockett*, starring Fess Parker, was the show's most popular feature in the mid-1950's. In 1958 the show became *Walt Disney Presents*, and then in the 1960's its title was changed once again to Walt Disney's *Wonderful World of Color*.

# PRIVATE SECRETARY

Ann Sothern, the movies' popular Maisie, became Susie McNamara, a private secretary, on this 1954 situation comedy series. Don Porter played her boss, Peter Sands, and Ann Tyrell Vi, a dim-witted office switchboard operator. In 1958 Miss Sothern changed identities, becoming Katy O'Connor, the assistant manager of a large hotel. Once again, Don Porter was her boss, this time as hotel owner Mr. Devery.

### **DECEMBER BRIDE**

The old mother-in-law jokes were expanded into a half hour situation comedy series when CBS presented character actress Spring Byington as mother-in-law Lily Ruskin in a show called December Bride. This "joke" was different, however, in that Lily Ruskin wasn't a mean old nasty lady but a sweet and dear old thing, deeply loved by her family and friends. Miss Byington was given able support by Frances Rafferty and Dean Miller as her daughter and son-in-law, Ruth and Matt Henshaw, and Henry Morgan and Verna Felton as friends and neighbors, Pete and Hilda.


### MY FRIEND IRMA



Bilko as played by comedian Phil Silvers. Bilko, a fast-talking Army sergeant with a million get-rich-quick schemes, was the star of a favorite fun-filled half hour. With his sidekicks, Paul Ford as Colonel Hall and Allan Melvin and Harvey Lembeck as members of his platoon, Bilko talked his way in and out of hundreds of seemingly impossible situations before ending his mouth marathon in 1959.

# ALFRED HITCHCOCK PRESENTS

Movieland's master of mystery Alfred Hitchcock produced a TV series of cliff-hanging tales over the CBS network in 1955 which ran for more than eight years. The half hour series called Alfred Hitchcock Presents had Mr. Hitchcock on hand to introduce and close each telecast. Although it sometimes seemed as if criminals might go unpunished at the end of the show, Mr. Hitchcock would always assure his audience that some sort of justice would prevail in the end.

### **PETER PAN**

An oft-repeated TV special, Peter Pan, a musical adventure which starred musical comedy star Mary Martin as Peter and featured Cyril Ritchard as Captain Hook, was first telecast on March 7, 1955. Well-Broadway choreographer known Jerome Robbins staged this television musical adaptation of James M. Barrie's classic tale of a boy who never grew up. Such songs as "Never, Never Land," "I Gotta Crow," "I'm Flying," and "Never Smile at a Crocodile" became Tin Pan Alley favorites. The special was so popular NBC repeated it months after its first showing and several times thereafter.

### **KRAFT MUSIC HALL**

The former star of *The Chesterfield Supper Club*, Perry Como, switched from selling cigarettes to cheese when he became the star of *The Kraft Music Hall* show on NBC. Mitchell Ayres and his orchestra and the Ray Charles Singers provided the musical background for Perry's singing, and announcer Frank Gallop introduced the show.

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# LAWRENCE WELK SHOW

Bandleader Lawrence Welk and his champagne music arrived on TV as a summer replacement show in 1955. The public decided it liked what it saw, and Welk was given a regular show and has been fast stepping on television screens across America ever since. With Alice Lon, his first Champagne Lady, who left the show in the late 1950's, singers Dick Dale, the Lennon Sisters, Larry Hooper, Jerry Burke, Tiny Little, Jr., Joanne Castle and Joe Feeney, to mention a few, the old machine has been blowing bubbles across TV screens for more than fifteen years.

# THE ADVENTURES OF SIR LANCELOT

NBC imported the British television series *The Adventures of Sir Lancelot* in 1955 and aimed it at the young TV viewing audience. The series starred England's William Russell as Sir Lancelot and had a two-year stay on NBC. In 1957 it moved to the ABC network, where it remained for one more year.

Long before his success as the master of ceremonies on NBC's Tonight Show, Johnny Carson was the star of a weekly situation comedy series over the CBS network called The Johnny Carson Show. Prior to this less than successful series, Johnny had made a hit as a guest star on such variety shows as Ed Sullivan's Toast of the Town and The Colgate Comedy Hour.

### MIKE WALLACE INTERVIEWS



Because of Wallace's soul-searching questions, many a lawsuit was filed once subjects realized just how much of themselves Wallace had caused them to reveal on the show.

### **PATTERNS**

Writer Rod Serling's masterpiece, Patterns, a TV play about the shady dealings in the world of big business, was presented on The Kraft Theatre in 1955. The TV play starred Richard Kiley as a disillusioned young business executive, Ed Begley as an older executive about to be put to pasture and Everett Sloane as the cruel and ruthless head of the corporation. Four weeks after it was originally presented on Kraft, it was repeated by popular request. The play, directed by Fielder Cook, was later made into a motion picture with the entire TV cast intact.

### **BIL AND CORA BAIRD**

Marionettists Bil and Cora Baird had many shows on television, but their most popular was CBS' *The Morning Show* which starred Walter Cronkite. The Bairds' chief function on the AM offering was to occupy the kids who were too young to be in school while Mother temporarily left Mr. Cronkite to clean up the breakfast dishes.

#### THE U.S. STEEL HOUR

The Theatre Guild, with United States Steel as its sponsor, produced a series of hour-long television plays starting in 1955. The Meanest Man in the World was the first offering, and over the years the show presented such plays as Hidden River, Midsummer, Upbeat and the original production of No Time for Sergeants starring Andy Griffith, before it was made into a successful Broadway play and motion picture. Some of the stars to appear on the Steel Hour were Helen Hayes, Richard Kiley, Martyn Green, Patty Duke and William Shatner.

#### THE JUDY GARLAND SPECIAL

On September 24, 1955, Movieland's Judy Garland made her longawaited TV debut on a special on the CBS network singing all the songs that had made her famous. The show, called *The Ford Star Jubilee*, received the highest ratings recorded up to that time, and Judy was in demand as a TV performer thereafter. She preferred, however, to keep her TV appearances to a minimum, and not until several years later did viewers see Judy again on their TV's.

#### PEOPLE'S CHOICE




Former child movie star Jackie Cooper became a television star on NBC's People's Choice. The appealing Mr. Cooper had the show stolen away from him each week by basset hound Cleo. Cooper played a civil servant who lived in a trailer with his pet and worked his way in and out of trouble with the aid of his girlfriend, played by Patricia Breslin. The show ran for three years on NBC and then moved to ABC in 1959 for several more seasons before calling it quits in the early 1960's.

#### **GUNSMOKE**

CBS' durable Gunsmoke made its TV debut in 1955, and the weekly adventure is still running strong on that network. The stars of the show, James Arness as Marshal Matt Dillon, Amanda Blake as the saloonkeeping Kitty, Milburn Stone as Doc and Dennis Weaver as Chester became famous through their association with the show, record sales, personal appearances at country fairs, a weekly radio show and perpetual reruns. Even when the popular, limping Chester (Dennis Weaver) decided to leave the show in the late 1950's, its popularity did not diminish, and Kitty's "Be careful, Matt" and Chester's "Well, I dunno, Meester Dellon" have become household expressions.

The celebrated marshal of Tombstone, Wyatt Earp, was the hero of a popular TV Western series which starred handsome Hugh O'Brian in 1955. One of television's best-remembered Western hits, the show enjoyed a long run.

#### THE BOB CUMMINGS SHOW

In 1955 Bob Cummings, who had starred in the My Hero situation comedy series several seasons before, had a new show on the air, called The Bob Cummings Show. On the new series Bob played a bachelor photographer, Bob Collins. Rosemary De Camp, whose voice was familiar to listeners as Judy on the past popular Dr. Christian radio program, played Bob's sister, Rosemary, and Dwayne Hickman, who later became better known as TV's Dobie Gillis, played his nephew, Chuck. Much of the show's humor, however, was provided by Ann B. Davis as Bob's secretary, Schultzy, a man-hungry spinster who never gave up hope that Bob someday would be hers. When the show went off the air in 1957, Bob still wasn't hers or anybody else's, but still a gay and carefree bachelor.

#### **OUR TOWN**

The Producer's Showcase special Our Town, a musical adaptation of Thornton Wilder's classic stage play, starred three of Hollywood's most popular stars, Frank Sinatra as the stage manager-narrator, Paul Newman and Eva Marie Saint. The show provided TV with its first hit song, "Love and Marriage," which was sung on the show by Frank.

#### CAPTAIN KANGAROO

Children took special delight in the soft-spoken antics of a mustached, gray-headed "former sea captain," Captain Kangaroo, who in reality was a young actor named Bob Keeshan. The captain's gentle conversation, charming fantasy sense and fun-filled arts and crafts activities were directed at the preschool youngsters by Mr. Keeshan, who had played Clarabel the Clown on the popular Howdy Doody show for many years before becoming Captain Kangaroo. The show received many awards from PTA groups and educators all over the country.

#### THE MILLIONAIRE

"Michael, I have another check for you to deliver," TV's fictitious billionaire John Beresford Tipton told his executive secretary, Michael Anthony, each week on The Millionaire series. and millions of viewers wished they were the ones lucky enough to get that check. Anthony, played by actor Marvin Miller, presented the checks to different recipients, telling them: "I have here a certified cashier's check for one million dollars tax-exempt, made out in your name from a benefactor who wishes to remain anonymous. Should you reveal where you got this check to anyone but your wife, if you are married, you must return the unused portion." By the time this dramatic anthology series left the air, Mr. Tipton was poorer by about \$70,000,000.

## \$64,000 QUESTION

The late Hal March was brought to national attention as the star of one of TV's most successful quiz programs, The \$64,000 Question, television's flamboyant version of radio's modest \$64 Question. Viewers were awed by the sums involved, and the show was lavish in every respect. Experts on fields ranging from boxing to grand opera were asked questions which became increasingly more difficult. A contestant kept doubling his winnings each time he answered correctly, but he could quit at any point and keep his winnings. Home and studio audiences alike got frantic either urging contestants to keep trying-or stop at their present "plateau." Shoemaker

Gino Prato, the opera buff, Dr. Joyce Brothers, the psychologist whose forte was boxing, Robert Strom, the mathematics genius, and actor Vincent Price, the art expert, were just a few of the many big money winners. The program was so popular that a second show, a sequel called *The \$64,000 Challenge*, MC'd by Sonny Fox, was also offered. The TV quiz show scandal about "fixed" questions, which mainly concerned the *Twenty-One* program, made the public question the honesty of all the quiz programs, and soon after the scandal most of the big money giveaway programs, including *The \$64,000 Question* and *Challenge*, left the air.

Regular members of the Mousketeer Club-Bobby, Annette, Moochie, Linda, Cheryl, Karen, Doreen, Sharon and the restwith Jimmy Dodd as their clubmaster, sang, danced and flapped their mousketeer-capped ears, and the whole menagerie of Disney cartoon characters, Pluto, Goofy, Donald Duck, Minnie Mouse, Daisy et al, joined in the fun, which featured Disney cartoons, live action serials like the popular Spin and Marty adventures and stories and games.

#### LASSIE

Ever since Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer first presented its screen adaptations of the famous Albert Payson Terhune Lassie stories, the collie had been everybody's favorite. When Lassie finally became a TV series in 1955, she had the field to herself with the possible exception of German shepherd Rin Tin Tin.

On the series, farm dog Lassie was owned by a young lad named Jeff, played by Tommy Rettig. Jeff's mother, a widow, was played by Broadway musical comedy star Jan Clayton, and Grandpa by George Cleveland. When Master Rettig became too old for dogs, he was replaced as Lassie's owner by young Jon Provost. Miss Clayton was replaced also by June Lockhart and Hugh Riley as Jon's parents. Since then, Lassie has had several owners, among them forest ranger Corey Stuart, played by Robert Bray.

## **PLAYHOUSE 90**

Television's first ninety-minute dramatic series made its auspicious debut on CBS in 1956, when *Playhouse 90* presented Rod Serling's *Forbidden Games*, with Charlton Heston and Tab Hunter playing the lead roles. During the years the show was on the air it presented such magnificent plays as *Requiem for a Heavyweight* starring Jack Palance and Ed Wynn; *For Whom the Bell Tolls* with Maria Schell, Jason Robards, Jr., Maureen Stapleton and Eli Wallach; *The Plot to Kill Stalin* with Melvyn Douglas; *The Helen Morgan Story* with Polly Bergen; and Kay Thompson's *Eloise*.

### TRUTH OR CONSEQUENCES

When Mr. Edwards left the show to star on his This Is Your Life series, he was replaced by Bob Barker, who can still be seen leading Truth or Consequences guests through some pretty grueling paces each week.

#### THE PRICE IS RIGHT

Bill Cullen was the host of the popular daytime Price Is Right series, which had contestants trying to guess the prices of various items of merchandise. The contestant guessing the price closest to the manufacturer's retail price received the prize. In 1957, because of the show's appeal, it was given a nighttime slot, with Mr. Cullen continuing as MC.

#### TO TELL THE TRUTH

TV producers Goodson and Todman, the leading forces behind most of TV's successful panel-game shows, presented To Tell the Truth as a daytime show in 1956. Its popularity with viewers led to an evening version of the show which featured at one time or another, panelists Tom Poston, Kitty Carlisle, Orson Bean, Polly Bergen, Peggy Cass, Ralph Bellamy and Hy Gardner.

#### TWENTY-ONE

The most successful, notorious and generous of the big-money giveaway programs was Jack Barry's Twenty-One series. Contestants on the show could win as much as \$216,000 on the show, for there was no limit on the amount up for grabs. One of the show's biggest money winners was Charles Van Doren, who became a TV celebrity because of his appearances on the show. In 1958 the program left the air after the story broke that contestants had been given correct answers by the producers in order to make the show more interesting. This scandal was the beginning of the end for the TV big-money shows.


#### QUEEN FOR A DAY

Tall, silent frontier scout, Cheyenne Brody, played by Clint Walker, loped his way across TV screens for the first time in 1956, when he became, for that year, at least, TV's undisputed Western champion. After a few short years *Cheyenne* suddenly disappeared from the airwaves because, it was later discovered, Mr. Walker had insisted on a larger salary. Angry fans demanded he be given his money, and the show reinstated. It was.

#### **AMERICAN BANDSTAND**

Teen-agers had a favorite TV show of their own in Dick Clark's afternoon American Bandstand program. Teens could dance to the tunes of the latest rock-and-roll recording hits, as well as be entertained by guests like Fabian, Little Anthony, Frankie Avalon and Chubby Checkers, who made frequent appearances on the show. Beginning as a local show in Philadelphia in 1955. it graduated to network broadcasting the following year. In 1958 ABC presented an evening version, but it proved less popular than in its afternoon spot, to which, after a few months, Clark moved the show.


# REQUIEM FOR A HEAVYWEIGHT

The second play presented by CBS on its Playhouse 90 series was a blockbusting success. Playwright Rod Serling had already established himself as one of television's foremost writers, but with Requiem for a Heavyweight, which starred Jack Palance, Kim Stanley and Ed Wynn, he stepped way out in front as TV's leading writer. The play, which was about a prizefighter named Mountain McClintock, showed the seamier side of the boxing world and won for Playhouse 90 and its author several TV awards in 1956. The play was later made into a film with less success than it had enjoyed as a TV play.

#### **WAGON TRAIN**

Robert Horton played Flint Mc-Cullough and Ward Bond Major Seth Adams in the Wagon Train series, which premiered in 1957. In 1961, after Mr. Bond died, he was replaced by veteran character actor John McIntyre as the wagon train's wagon master. Shortly thereafter, Horton decided to leave the series and was replaced first by Scott Miller and then by Robert Fuller. The show survived all these changes in cast and remained on the air until the mid-1960's.

Gravel-voiced movie and radio comedian Andy Devine was the host of a daily children's show called Andy's Gang in 1957. Young fans eagerly looked forward to the daily cartoons, clubhouse meetings and regular visits by Gunga Ram, the Elephant Boy, who was played by actor Nino Marcel and looked remarkably like the movies' Sabu.

#### PERRY MASON

When Erle Stanley Gardner's famed lawyer Perry Mason came to television in 1957, fresh from a lengthy run as a radio daytime serial, he was played by veteran movie badman Raymond Burr in his first sympathetic role. Each week Perry, aided by his faithful secretary, Della Street, played by Barbara Hale, and his assistant, Paul Drake, played by William Hopper, set about to prove the innocence of his clients. Perry never lost a case in spite of the skillful maneuvers of his adversary, District Attorney Hamilton Burger, played by William Talman. The Perry Mason Show ran for nine vears on television before Mr. Burr decided that it was time to change his image once again and appeared as the hero of Ironsides.

Long before he began running from the law as TV's Fugitive, David Janssen played Richard Diamond, a private detective on the right side of the law, with a penchant for getting into trouble. The CBS series was seen from 1957 to 1959.

Former Arthur Godfrey Talent Scouts winner Pat Boone was given a show of his own in 1957. Pat's white buck shoes and his easygoing college boy charm earned him a faithful TV following. Some of the big names who made guest appearances on Pat's show were Andy Williams (later a star in his own right), the Crosby Brothers (Bing's sons) and Peggy Lee.

# THE SENATE RACKETS COMMITTEE INVESTIGATIONS

Counsel Robert Kennedy, a young New York lawyer, Senator John Mc-Clellan and Senator John F. Kennedy became TV stars in 1957 when television covered the U.S. Senate investigations into rackets in America. For weeks millions of viewers watched as Bobby Kennedy hammered away at underworld characters like "Johnny Dio" Dioguardo, "Tony Ducks" Corallo, Joey Glimco and "Caesar" Di Varco, as well as union leaders like the Teamsters' Jimmy Hoffa and Dave Beck, who constantly "took the Fifth." The Senate committee meetings, which sought possible connections between unions and organized crime, brought considerable fame to the Kennedy brothers.



#### HAVE GUN WILL TRAVEL

In 1957 a literate, debonair Western hero named Paladin made his first appearance on TV in a CBS series called *Have Gun Will Travel*. Richard Boone as Paladin became a star overnight. Few viewers will forget Paladin's calling card which read: "Have gun will travel. Wire Paladin. Hotel Carlton, San Francisco."

#### LEAVE IT TO BEAVER

The mischievous life of a typical American boy was realistically reproduced each week on CBS' Leave It to Beaver series. Jerry Matthews played Beaver, and Tony Dow appeared as his big brother, Wally. The show proved very popular with adults who could identify with the problems faced by Beaver's parents.

#### **MAVERICK**

A new kind of Western hero made his appearance on television when ABC presented Maverick, the weekly adventures of a cowardly gamblerrogue played by handsome James Garner. Bret Maverick didn't ride a horse, loathed the out-of-doors, was slow on the draw and preferred sitting around gambling in musty, smokefilled saloons. He was a very untypical Western hero indeed. Once the series had been established, a second unlikely hero made his appearance-Bret Maverick's brother, Bart, played by Jack Kelly.

Produced by David Susskind, the show presented such works as The Bridge of San Luis Rey with Judith Anderson, Hume Cronyn and Vivica Lindfors, Billy Budd, The Browning Version with Margaret Leighton and John Gielgud, A Tale of Two Cities with Eric Portman and Gracie Fields, Hamlet with John Neville, The Count of Monte Cristo with Hurd Hatfield, A Member of the Wedding with Claudia McNeil and Collin Wilcox and Wuthering Heights with Richard Burton.

The adventure series Zorro, starring Guy Williams as the black-caped and masked "Robin Hood" of Mexico, had a two-year residency on ABC-TV beginning in 1957. Zorro's blade felled many a villain before he retired in 1959.

#### **CINDERELLA**

The famous Broadway musical comedy team of Richard Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein II, the authors of such formidable hits as Oklahoma, Carousel, The King and I and The Sound of Music, wrote a musical adaptation of the children's classic fairy tale Cinderella especially for television. The show, first seen on March 31, 1957, and repeated with a new cast several seasons later, starred the My Fair Lady sensation Julie Andrews as Cinderella and featured Ilka Chase as her stepmother, Alice Ghostly and Kay Ballard as her stepsisters, Edie Adams as her fairy godmother and Jon Cypher as Prince Charming. The show was directed by Ralph Nelson.

#### THE REAL MC COYS

The unsophisticated "back home" folks, the McCoys-Grandpa, played by Walter Brennan; his son and daughter-in-law, played by Richard Crenna and Kathy Nolan; and his grandchildren, played by Lydia Reed and Michael Winkelman - were wellwatched TV favorites from 1957 well into the 1960's. Mr. Brennan, playing a character similar to those he had been playing for years in many motion pictures, was his usual cantankerous old self, and the show's warmhearted humor and simple homespun philosophies kept audiences tuned in faithfully week after week.

Undoubtedly Mr. Barry's Masterson characterization was the first Western marshal to be pictured as if he had just stepped out of a men's fashion magazine, circa 1880, and the public loved the whole idea.






