## CBC Northern Messenger

A Mirror of Humanity

PEOPLE from Mexico to Baffin Land have been impressed by the deep "human interest" attaching to the CBC Northern Messenger Service, which resumes its winter task on Friday, November 5. There is something real, vital, and moving in the effort of ordinary people to keep contact with friends and relatives in the remote north. Behind the cheery voices of the announcers, and their occasional bantering cross-talk, the note of seriousness recurs in the spoken messages; and it is impossible to forget that, though the messages themselves may be only simple greetings, they go out from the warmth of Eastern or Western homes to men snowbound in a great wilderness, or, as sometimes happens, bring news of sick men in southern institutions to homes in the north.

A letter from an Eskimo woman at Repulse Bay, 1,200 air miles northeast of Winnipeg, received last winter by Father Guy Mary-Rousseliere of Churchill, poignantly illustrates the depth of feeling which may lie behind some of these simple messages. Father Mary-Rousseliere had recorded a message from Therese Kushagak's husband Thomas, a patient in St. Boniface Sanitorium, and had it broadcast on the Northern Messenger over CBW, Manitoba. The halting words of Therese's letter tell her small story of care, anxiety, and grief:

"From Therese to Father Mary—

"Thank you for making me hear. I have been very happy because he is not suffering. I will rejoice greatly; my children also, who cry often because of

their father's illness. Where is he? Does he feel pain? I did not hear that. If you know his sickness, write to me. I wish he would return, because I do not wish to have any other man than he. Yesterday, February 20, because we listened, I write. I pray always for him to be healed quickly. I told Michel when I returned home that you told us to pray often that their father would get better, and I also told him what you said. Michel did not go to sleep until three in the morning. He would say: 'Pray always for my father that he will get better and return home, because I love him very much.'

"Pray for me, father, because I am pregnant. Before Easter I will have a new baby, just as last year. Now this winter we are alone; it is very lonesome. They say that my mother died at Southampton (Inlet). Now she is happy in heaven, for she had suffered on earth. I long to see Thomas, for he is the only one I love of

all the Eskimos. We pray always that he will return in good health.  
"It was so good to hear the message . . ."

The Messenger resumes at 12:15 a.m.-11:15 p.m. on Friday over Stations CBW, Manitoba, CBK, Saskatchewan, and CBX, Alberta, running half an hour or until completion of the messages. It is re-broadcast for the eastern Arctic a week later over the CBC Maritime transmitter, CBA, Sackville, N.B.

**STUDIO ONE.**

The Boy Who Changed the World, by Joseph Schrank; Felix Jackson, producer; Franklin Schaffner, director; from CBS, New York. Cast: Thomas A. Edison-Michael Allen; Edison's parents-John Beal, Ruth Hussey. Others-Edward Andrews, Peg Hillias, Frank Overton, Chris Barbery, Charles Edison, son of the inventor, and former Secretary of the United States Navy, will appear on behalf of the Edison Foundations.

The principal setting for Schrank's play is the small red brick house in Port Huron, Michigan, where Edison was born in 1847, and where many of his early experiments were made. In the home basement he set up his private

telegraph wire, planned the first electric light, began experiments with moving pictures. Michael Allen plays the role of the youthful inventor, is 12 years old. The story concludes at Edison's 16th year, when he left home to become a telegraph operator. The program salutes the diamond jubilee of the electric light.

**The Prairie Gardener**

Summary of Broadcast of October 24, 1954.

Winter Gardening Indoors (4th in a series):

**Some More Good House Plants**

1. *Hybrid Amaryllis*: Pot firmly in rich loam well supplied with sand and rotted manure. Leave upper third of bulb exposed. Place in warm room and water sparingly until growth is under way. Give the bulbs a rest period next fall, then bring into activity again about the end of the year.

2. *Large-leaved Calla Lily*: Requires a rich soil and plentiful moisture in good light, when in full growth the soil needs a good soaking daily. Ripen off in summer by decreasing moisture then re-pot in Aug.-Sept.

3. *Christmas Cactus*: Requires less water after summer growth. As buds form water cautiously but increase light. Too little light or too much water causes the buds to drop.

*Suitable Soil*: 2 garden loam, 1 peat or leaf mould, 1 sharp, coarse sand plus a little charcoal and some meal. Provide extra good drainage with coarse rubble in bottom of pot.

4. *Christmas plants*: Cyclamens and Poinsettias. Both of these suffer from chilling too much. Cyclamen require moist air in cool room at 50-60 degrees. Both are hard to handle in hot, dry, overheated rooms.

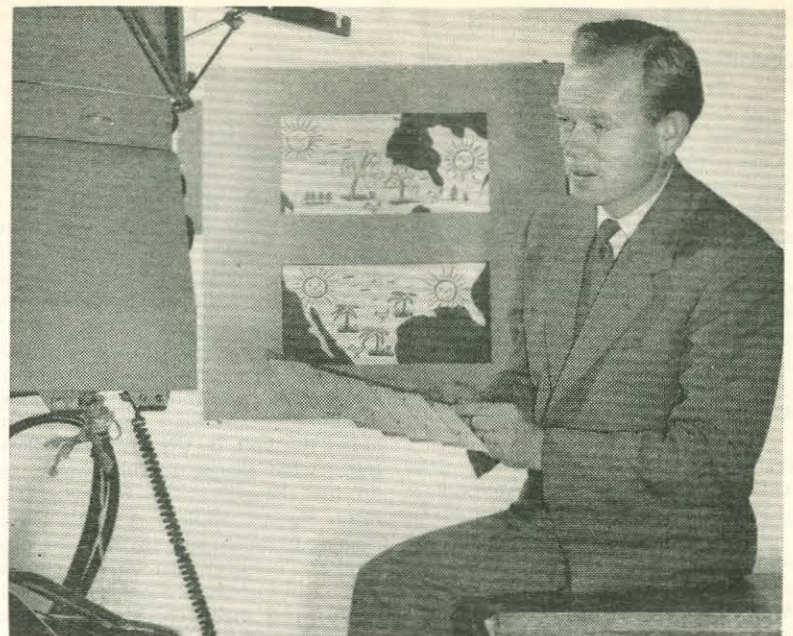

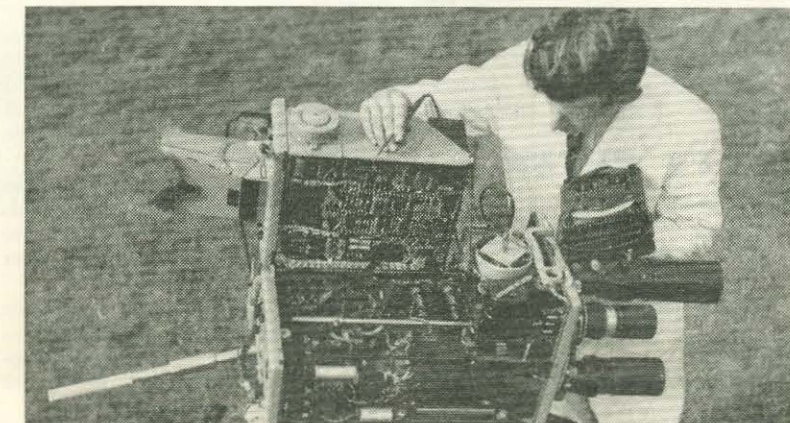

The composer intended it, he said, less as a religious service than as a lament to console mourners, with assurance of joys hereafter, warnings against the pomp and vanity of the world, and emphasis on the victory of the saints over death.

There are seven passages—two baritone solos with chorus, soprano solo and chorus, and four choruses. A funeral march follows the massed-voice open-

**Brahms**  
*Personal Recollections by*  
**Dame Ethel Smyth**

(From *London Calling, BBC Overseas Service*)

... I landed in Leipzig in 1877, in my heart a passionate admiration for every note I had so far heard of Brahms' music; hence my excitement may be imagined when I learned that he would be coming to Leipzig after Christmas to conduct his new Symphony in D major at the Gewandhaus.

It was at the rehearsal that for the first time I set eyes on the great man. When it was over, we were all hanging about, gazing our fill at the strong, sturdy figure, the bearded face, and the piercing, bright-blue eyes of the master, who had just got through what, in spite of ignorance and only a sketchy acquaintance with the language, I gathered was a far from satisfactory rehearsal.

... I had a feeling that Brahms was not a good conductor, and certainly he had an unfortunate knack of rubbing orchestras up the wrong way. Later on, when I came to know him well—though, of course, my admiration for Brahms, the artist, remained the same—I cannot say I really liked or felt happy with him. Although as a human being he was not devoid of admirable qualities, one cannot say that in everyday life his personality was attractive.

In society—and indeed, in private—if anything upset him, he was totally

lacking in what the Italians call *educazione*. His deficient breeding was painfully evident when people tried to thank him for the raptures his music gave them. This is always a difficult thing to do; but I am certain he would have missed it, had the attempt been given up as too hazardous. For hazardous it was! and many a time have I seen some shy, elderly but perhaps profoundly musical lady slink away almost in tears, because of his sarcastic reception of her remarks . . .

Another thing: though I never heard him say anything stupid (which perhaps is high praise) I never fathomed wherein lay his much-vaunted intellectual supremacy. I should have said

his was an average, sound intelligence, but not more . . .

. . . Perhaps the most lovable side of him came out in his intercourse with anyone connected with his great predecessors. Towards Frau Schumann his manner was that of a devoted son, and hers to him that of a mother who deeply admires, yet fearlessly criticizes, her offspring's work. At these moments his patience and good humour never failed him . . .

His piano playing was, to my mind, the most wonderful I have ever heard. Overwhelming in power, it was never noisy; not what today is called percussive. And when, presently, with what he called his "tenor thumb" he lifted some warm, tender passage out of a tangle of sound, the look on his face was a thing one never forgets.

Best of all I like to think of him playing Bach's mighty organ fugues; sometimes accompanying himself with a sort of muffled roar, as of Titans moved to sympathy in the bowels of the earth.

To conclude: in Brahms the man I saw, on the one hand, defective perception of subtleties, whether in people or things, lack of humour, and, of course, the legitimate selfishness of genius; on the other hand, high-mindedness, generosity to opponents, and real goodness of heart. And, after all, seeing what he has bequeathed to us musically, I think this quota of human virtues should suffice.
