THE VIOLENT WORLD OF SAM HUFF

EVER WONDER what football players say to each other in a huddle? Or what grumblings rage back and forth across the gridiron after a particularly bone-crunching play?

You need wonder no longer. This Sunday (Oct. 30) on *The Twentieth Century* CBC-TV viewers will hear what any opposing quarterback would give three first downs to hear: the terse words spoken by the linebacker in the defensive huddles and the staccato signals he barks to his teammates, deploying them into position before the ball is snapped.

For the program, *The Violent World of Sam Huff*, the New York Football Giants' star linebacker was "wired for sound" as cameras filmed him in action at the Giants' training base in Winooski Vt. and during a pre-season National Football League exhibition game between the Giants and the Chicago Bears in Toronto.

Huff, in effect, was transformed into a self-contained FM radio station which transmitted every sound of practice scrimmages and the exhibition game—the voices, the shouts, the thud of leather and the crash of bodies.

The problem, of course, was to get portable equipment that would not only give good sound but would

stand up under the terrific pounding and shocks of actual football scrimmage.

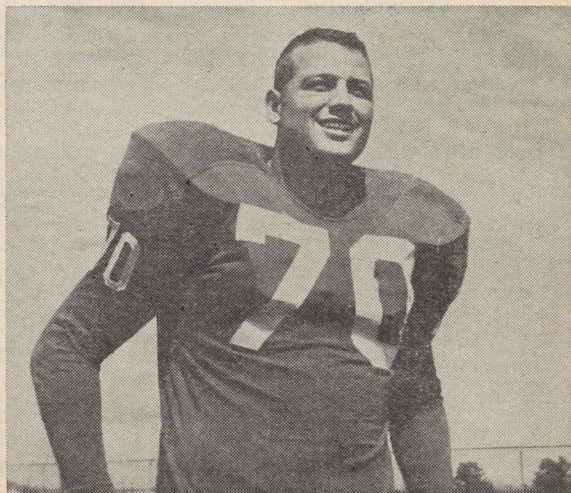
The solution to the problem was a 10-ounce box about the size of two packs of cigarettes, with four batteries and a mass of micro-miniature tubes and wires, combined with a small lavalier microphone. Together, they comprise a complete FM radio station which can broadcast over a half-mile range. The signal from station H-U-F-F was picked up by a receiver plugged into tape recorders synchronized with cameras.

The only remaining problem was where to place the equipment on the 230-pound Huff, who charges around on a football field like a

wounded water buffalo. Dr. Francis Sweeney, the Giants' physician, thought an adequately padded transmitter placed between Huff's shoulder pads in back would be safe and harmless—to Huff, that is. Dr. Sweeney (and who could blame him) was less concerned about whether the \$600 worth of equipment would smash into splinters.

So, the transmitter and microphone were packed in foam rubber and taped on the husky, smiling Huff—the transmitter in back, the mike in front.

Fortunately for all concerned, the equipment survived shock after shock and station H-U-F-F remained in operation.

CLOSE-UP ON DON MESSER

WHEN J. FRANK WILLIS and D'B Holly can't remember something about Canadian radio you can bet that it must have been some time ago! And although Frank produced and D'B announced those early radio shows in the Maritimes when Don Messer and his musicians first broadcast, they can't place the date.

"Someone has said that Don Messer began broadcasting 21 years ago," remarked Frank, "but I'm sure it's closer to 25 years."

"Well, I've been in Toronto for 19 years, and I was with Don's show for at least six years before that," said D'B, "so that gives you some idea."

An ancient press release in the CBC library files suggests that Don began his broadcasting in 1930 with CFBO, Saint John, N.B., and "attracted the attention of the old

Canadian Radio Broadcasting Commission who immediately networked his feature program under the title of *Don Messer and His Lumberjacks*."

Charlie Chamberlain joined up with Don somewhere in the mid-thirties—one story says 1934—when Charlie was a lumberjack. Marg Osburne is a newcomer to the Islanders: she joined up 13 years ago.

Don Messer and his musicians were known throughout the Maritimes during the thirties, and about 1938 the rest of Canada began tapping their feet to the Islanders' music when CBC gave the group a national spot.

In 1949 the Islanders made an astonishingly successful tour of Canada: in one small Quebec town 2,000 people packed into a converted barn and in Ottawa they drew 5,000 people to the Coliseum.

But it was not till 1959 that the faces of the Islanders really became familiar to Messer fans across the country. That was when their show transferred to CBC-TV national

network and something like 2½ million viewers began watching them each night.

Writing in the *Star Weekly*, Franklyn Russell said of Don Messer's Jubilee: "It is the only CBC show, probably the only one in the world, which is run by men who have been, or are, a lumberjack, a longshoreman, a lawyer, a bear wrestler, a hurdy-gurdy repairer, a comedian, a radio station technician, a silent picture theatre piano player, and a university science graduate."

SCHOOL TELECASTS BEGIN THIS WEEK

Two series of regional school telecasts begin this week on CBWT and affiliated stations in western Canada.

On Tuesdays a series called *Western Landscapes*, consisting of four lessons in physical geography for Grades 7-10, will be presented. These programs were prepared by the British Columbia Department of Education and were produced in the CBC's Vancouver studios.

A Thursday series, *Man's Need For Numbers*, comprises four programs on the history of mathematics. Prepared by the Saskatchewan Department of Education for Grades 6-8, these telecasts were produced in the CBC's Winnipeg studios by Len Weinstein.

For many years the Departments of Education in the four western provinces have co-operated in the planning of school radio broadcasts, but *Western Landscapes* and *Man's Need For Numbers* are the first television series which the four provinces have planned together.

Bert Mayes, school broadcasts organizer for the CBC's prairie region, points out that since the curricula of the four provinces differ, the programs are intended to be stimulating background information which will enrich the students' courses of study, rather than formal lessons based on textbook material.

Broadcast times of the programs will be found in the various stations' listings; details on the programs will be found in the Tuesday and Thursday television notes.

The Earth and Mankind

A six-part National Film Board series on the world's population-resources problems, to be presented on "Explorations"

IN THE LAST hundred years the population of the world doubled; it will double again in the next forty years.

Formerly this population was kept down to a "reasonable" size by disaster, war and disease. For instance, London in the year 1665 saw 97,306 deaths, of which bubonic plague caused 68,000.

In 1911 plague controls were possible. Houses were burned and so were bodies in an outbreak of the plague that year in Manchuria, but still 60,000 people died. Without the controls, the figure might have been 600,000.

Just ten years ago 50 million people suffered from yaws, "a foul, cancerous-like disease." Today, through penicillin, yaws has almost vanished from the earth.

Since 1945 DDT and other chemicals have freed some 100 million Asians, Africans and South Americans from that most destructive disease, malaria.

The world still faces major medical problems on a vast scale: Burma, for example, has one hospital bed for every 10,000 people (Canada has one for every 77 people).

The blessings of medicine are great. But they bring a vast problem, posed 150 years ago by Malthus: the healthier a people the higher the birth rate, the lower the death rate, and the greater the struggle for food. So progress above subsistence level, when resources are limited, is impossible.

The greatest human concentration is in such Asian cities as Hong Kong, Singapore, Calcutta and a dozen others.

The coastal areas of China, India and Indonesia are packed with more than 400 people to the square mile; in the most crowded areas of North America there are only 180 people to the square mile.

The rate of increase in India is actually lower than in Europe; but the total increase in India is enormous.

Traditionally, people have broken through the Malthus barrier by war and by emigration:

Between 1939 and 1945 33,000,000 people died through war.

In less than a century, 60 million Europeans emigrated to North America.

Today, even were white nations to allow migration from non-white countries, it would not even begin to solve the population explosion.

What resources are necessary to fight starvation, the basic problem?

Water is necessary, but only 1 per cent of the earth's water is fresh.

Scientists, however, are close to finding cheap methods of turning salt water into fresh water in bulk.

Land is necessary, but land covers only 28 per cent of the earth's surface. Of that, only half, 14 per cent, is usable. Of that, only a tenth, 1.4 per cent of the earth's surface, is actually under cultivation in food crops.

Wood is a vital resource. It is used for homes, furniture, ships, tools, paper. And the average Canadian uses 29 times as much wood as the average Asian.

The United States uses about 50 per cent of all the world's production of iron, copper, lead and tin.

The great industrial complex of North America has eaten up a large part of its own resources. It is now heavily dependent on those of other continents.

How long will the countries from which we import these materials be willing to sell them when the means of raising their own standard of living is industrialization? When

Martita Hunt on Festival '61

Stars in "The Old Ladies"

MARTITA HUNT hardly ever grants an interview. Through her 40 years in the theatre and films, reporters have been trying to find out what sort of person is hiding behind the distinctive, aloof face of one of Britain's most brilliant character actresses—without much success. She cherishes her privacy with a few tricks that usually work, the best of which is her Miss Havisham face. If you saw the film version of Dickens' *Great Expectations*, in which she scored a success as the austere old recluse living among the cobwebs of her memories, you will appreciate how intimidating Miss Havisham's cool "No" can be to pestering reporters. Or she can completely bewilder and scare them off with her crazy Countess Aurelia act from Jean Giraudoux's *The Madwoman of Chailot*.

Her performance as the Madwoman has been the high point in her career, both in her own and critics' estimation. She played it to wildly enthusiastic audiences on Broadway, on its North American tour and in London's West End. It won her two Donaldson Awards and the Antoinette Perry best actress award. And every time she looks over her press clippings she smiles wryly. Just before her success as the Madwoman, when she was making a film in Hollywood called *The Fan*, she tried to interest movie director Otto Preminger in filming *The Madwoman of Chailot*. Much as he admired her acting, he knew that American audiences did not go overboard for unfamiliar performers, as she was then in the States, and he turned

Since moving from southern Saskatchewan some 15 years ago, the Cojohn brothers have built up their holdings to a 3,000 acre ranch and over 500 head of cattle, plus additional holdings at Wood Mountain, Saskatchewan. When they arrived in southern Manitoba by covered wagon, they became the first large scale beef cattle ranchers in this area. In addition to being one of the largest outfits in Manitoba, the four brothers also maintain one of the most complete private museums of the old West in Canada. Among their collections of saddles, guns, longhorns and petrified wood, visitors to their spread may visualize the days of the wild west. Also included in their museum pieces is the original covered wagon used to transport their

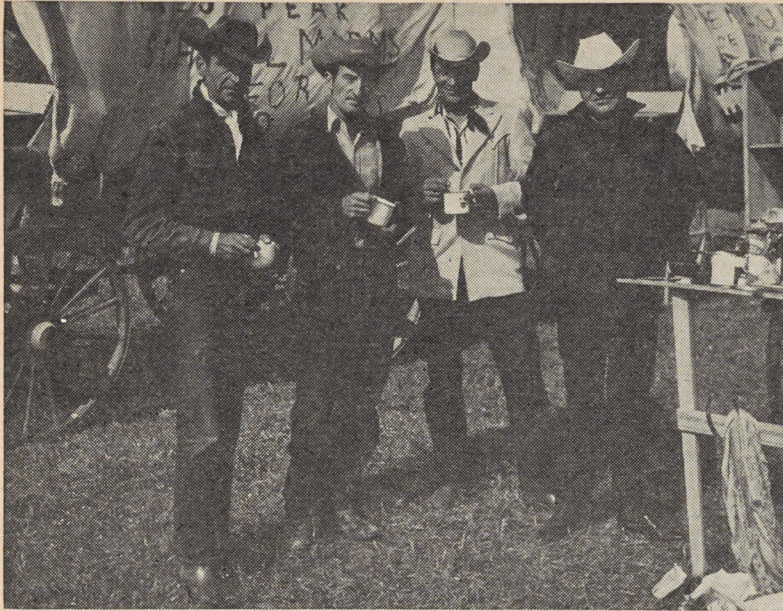

There is a favourite theory these days that Soviet composers write music which is officially acceptable while secretly pining to compose in the latest twelve-tone idiom. This seems far-fetched to me. History shows that Russian composers were never in the forefront of modernism: they resisted the towering influence of Richard Wagner, they ignored the temptations of French impressionism, and they equally refused to follow Schoenberg and the Viennese school. These are historic facts unadulterated by politics. The Russian approach to music is, and always has been, emotional, not abstract or cerebral.—*Boris Schwarz, on BBC.*

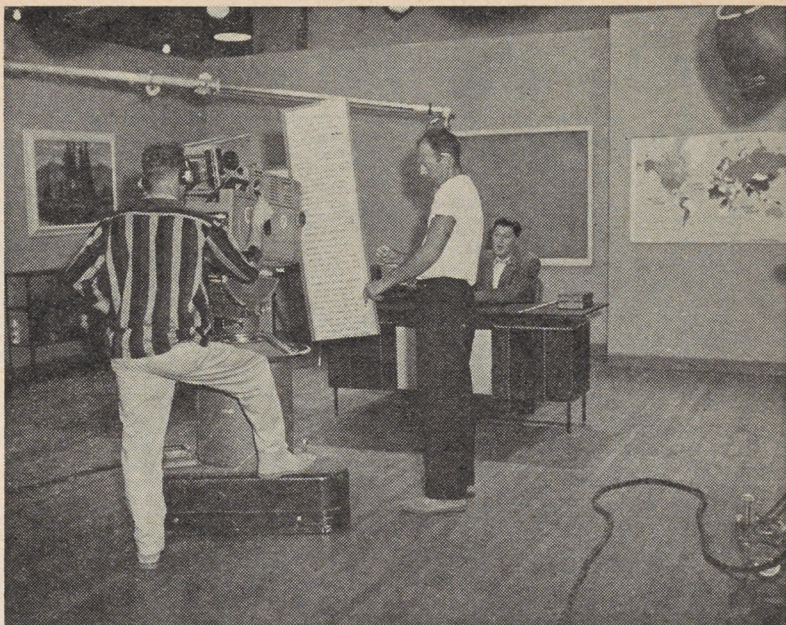

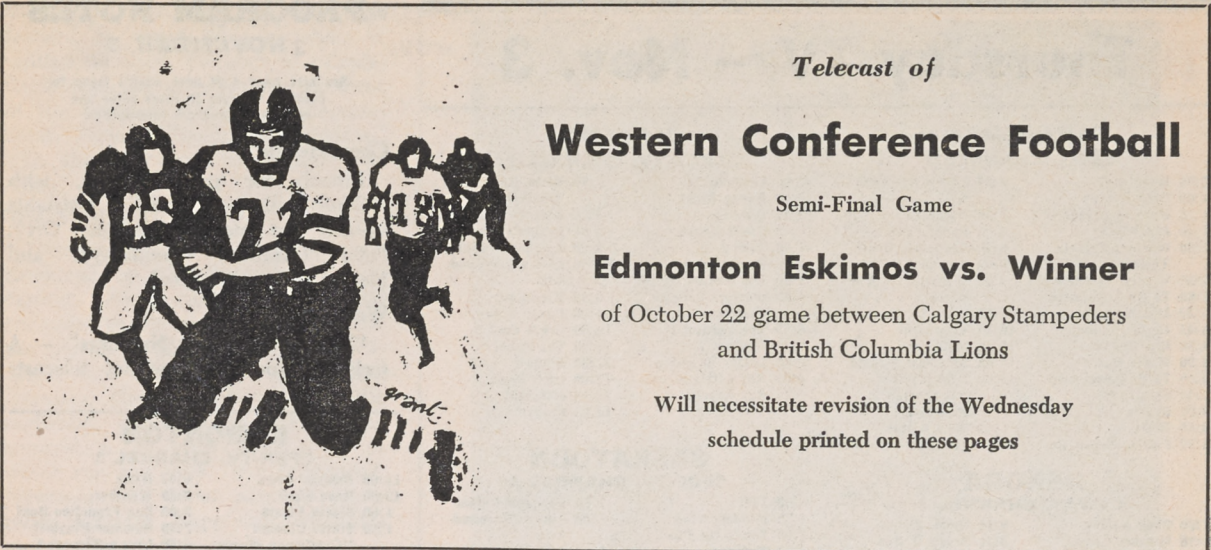

MUSIC ON RADIO

"IT WAS LIKE A sudden gusher when you're drilling for oil. I found that we're in the middle of one of those cycles when there is an unexpected upshot of really magnificent new singers and instrumentalists in Canada."

Back from talent-scouting trips coast to coast, Terence Gibbs, assistant to Dr. Geoffrey Waddington, CBC director of music, is full of enthusiasm about the quantity and quality of the artists who auditioned for the *CBC Talent Festival* series (Sunday, 9:00 p.m., CBC radio). He says so many passed the audition that there won't be room in the series for them all.

He was disappointed in the small number of string players who tried out — only 10 in a country that has produced some top string artists and has some of the best qualified string teachers on the continent. "It's a problem that is worrying conductors in the States as well as in Canada," he told us. "In 10 years' time where are the symphony orchestras going to look for string musicians to fill the gaps in their ranks? I've been checking conservatory and university statistics and they indicate a decline in string students compared with piano students. This is disturbing both ways. The enormous number of pianists coming on the 'market' seem to be concentrating solely on piano playing *per se*—don't realize that the chances today of hitting the solo spots are few. If they want a piano career they should at least equip themselves with the art of chamber music playing, accompanying, sight-reading and transposition, should try to broaden their whole music education."

Gibbs was amused by the number of young pianists who had pat-

terned themselves on the style and mannerisms of Glenn Gould and Van Cliburn. One had the Gould slouch and relaxed arms, had obviously worked hard at copying his idol, but also gave an extremely good performance of a work Gould had recorded.

Gibbs pointed out that the aim of *CBC Talent Festival* "is not just to encourage the enormous wealth of young talent in Canada but also to discover and give a chance to some of the professional artists who have emigrated here in the last three or four years, and have been so busy getting settled that they haven't had time or opportunity to get on with their artistic careers."

Prizes at the end of the season are worthwhile: the top singer and instrumentalist each receives \$1,000 in cash and an opportunity to appear with the CBC Symphony, and the runners-up gets \$250.

Auditions were held in Halifax, Quebec City, Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg, Regina, Calgary, Edmonton and Vancouver. At every place a CBC producer assisted Gibbs in marking candidates. They did it this way: Each of them had 100 marks to allot each student. They made their decisions independently, then, to get a balanced opinion, added their totals together, so that each student was finally marked out of 200. Gibbs said he wanted to make it clear that their job was "not adjudicating. We were there only to decide whether each artist had enough experience and was of high enough calibre to appear in the series. Adjudicating for the series is done by a board of five anonymous judges who are distinguished musicians outside the CBC and in different Canadian centres."

When we asked why the *Festival* has abandoned the personal interviews with artists which

were a feature of last season's programs, Gibbs said it was because all the performers are appearing on the network for the first time, many of them making their debut with an orchestra, and "we feel their whole concentration should go into their performance. Besides, doing away with the interviews gives them the advantage of more time to perform."

He added, "we're happy to have Sir Ernest MacMillan back again as conductor. Last year's performers were very grateful for his generous help and advice based on 50 years' experience in the music world." This year's broadcasts are taped a week in advance so competitors can hear their own performances."

The *CBC Talent Festival* offers young artists an invaluable yardstick for measuring how far they have gone on the road to their ultimate goal, and for comparing their progress with that of other young people. This, Gibbs feels, is more important than the money or honour involved in winning the competition.

down her suggestion, she says, on the grounds that "nobody knew me in Ohio."

In view of her subsequent success in the play up and down the continent, this remark stands out in her mental scrapbook as wildly hilarious in a bitter sort of way. In fact, she says that she would rather like her tombstone engraved with: "Here lies Martita Hunt. Nobody knew her in Ohio."

She has played quite a few strange women in her day — had just finished filming *Brides of Dracula* for Universal (in which she appears as the vampire's mother), when she visited Toronto

to play Agatha Payne (a decidedly odd creature) in *The Old Ladies*, a three-character drama by Rodney Ackland based on the novel by Hugh Walpole, and adapted for television by Bernard Slade. CBC-TV presents it on *Festival '61* this Monday night.

Starring with Miss Hunt are two of Canada's outstanding performers — Frances Hyland and Betty Leighton.

Producer Eric Till describes Martita Hunt as "a marvelously intelligent woman and actress." He says it was "a tremendous experience working with her." She is a very shrewd woman, with a variety and quality of stage experience equalled by few actresses of her age. Often she has had third or fourth billing in plays starring some of the greatest actors of our age, but she often walks away with the best press notices.

She was born in the Argentine, has her home in London, but lives all over the world—wherever her work or her mood take her. She dashed off to Capri after filming *The Old Ladies*. We learned that she has tremendous admiration for another famous character actor, Alec Guinness, who did the stage adaptation of *Great Expectations* in which she appeared. And she has two pet hates: nincompoops (Miss Havisham takes over when they appear, and they are usually dispatched quickly) and Christopher Fry's translations of French dramas, especially ones by Jean Giraudoux, which she can read in the original French, and regards highly.

We were surprised to learn that the sometimes grubby backstage atmosphere of the theatre and the smell of greasepaint have never held any magic for Martita Hunt. She told us that unlike most actresses she hates the smell of stage make-up, wigs and all the other paraphernalia of make-believe. It is the art of the theatre that she loves. She began learning it under the late Genevieve Ward and Lady Benson when she was a teenager, and made her first professional appearance with the Liverpool Repertory Company at

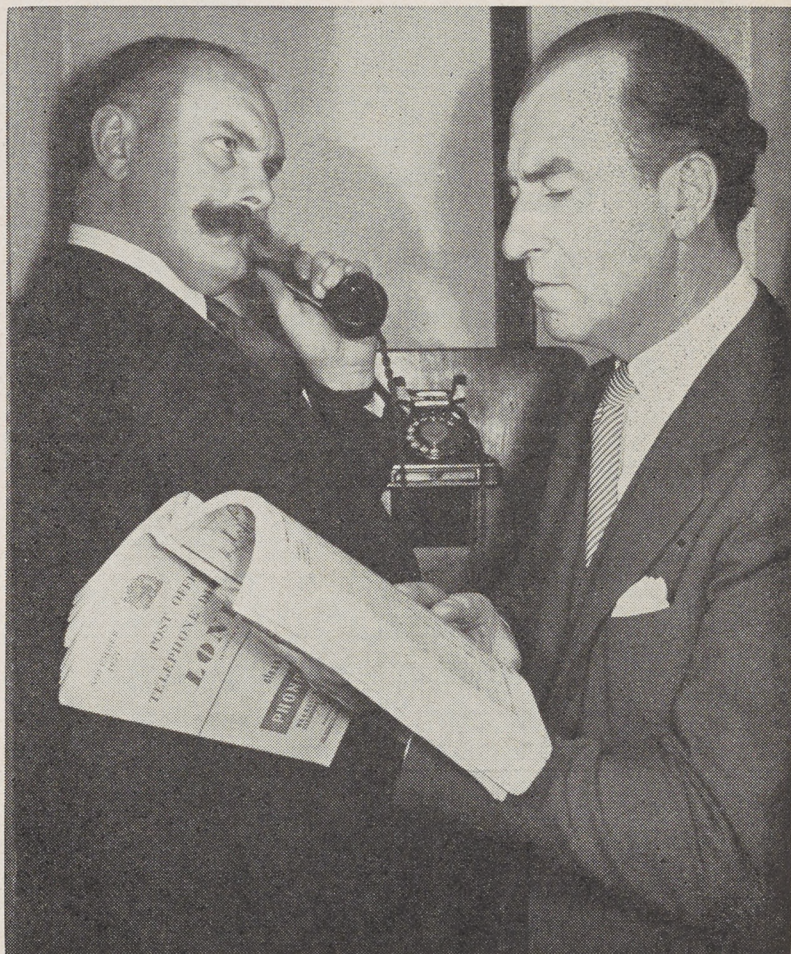
21. She played with numerous provincial companies, then broke into London's West End, and in 1933 began her film career with *I Was a Spy*. She has rarely been idle for long, and thrives on a busy schedule.

She recalls with amusement that she once had her cards read by a little shrunk Cockney astrologer who told her that when she was 21 she had entered a life where she did not belong (the theatre), but that it would teach her three things: humility, obedience and patience. Did it? we wanted to know. Not a bit of it! she says.

Understandably, Miss Hunt is an extremely able raconteur, and

often livened the set of *The Old Ladies* with her stories and jokes which, bizarre or funny, were made more so by the very personal stamp she put on them. She has many facets to both her personality and her acting, and their variety is a constant source of surprise and stimulation to the people she works with.

Although she is only 60, she thinks she should not be acting still, that she ought to have retired after her success as the Madwoman and, as she puts it, "been made a ward of the state." But film, stage and TV producers won't let her, and her acting commitments promise her fans many more fine, unusual performances.

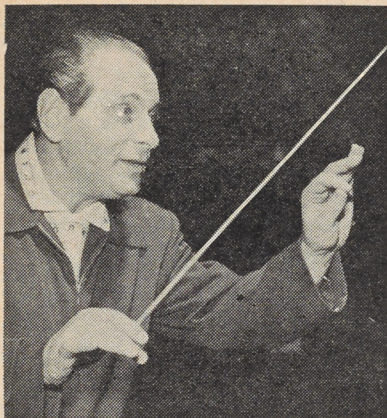

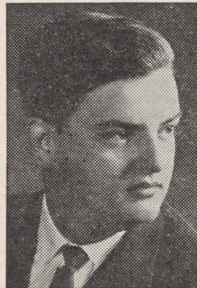

MORE ABOUT ANNE FRANK

A portrait in sound on CBC Wednesday Night

In *Anne Frank: The Memory and the Meaning* CBC Wednesday Night takes a new look at a brave and imaginative 14-year-old girl who poured her heart out to her diary as she blossomed into maturity under duress and confinement, and then died alone among thousands in Belsen concentration camp.

Bob Nelson, a radio personality on station WBZ, Boston, read *The Diary of Anne Frank* (published following its discovery in a drawer in Amsterdam after the Second World War), saw both the stage and film adaptations, and wanted to know more about this optimistic teenager who wrote, as she hid from the Gestapo for over two years in an attic: "As long as you can look fearlessly into the heavens, as long as you know that you are pure within, you will find happiness." But he found that very little was known about Anne, her family and her friends following their separation in concentration camps. This spiked his curiosity more, and he embarked 'on a large plan for producing an exclusive radio portrait in sound of Anne, which took him to Holland, England, Canada and many parts of the United States.

First he had to get the consent of Anne's father, Otto Frank, the only surviving member of the family, who is living in Basel, Switzerland. By Trans-Atlantic telephone Frank agreed to cooperate and take part in the broadcast. They met for discussions in Amsterdam, where the Franks had lived, and where Nelson was able to talk to people who had known Anne personally. He and Otto Frank visited the *achterhuis*, The House Behind, where the Franks and four others hid for so long to escape the Nazis. Frank describes his feelings on reading the diary when he returned to Amsterdam after being freed, and tells how his friends finally convinced him

it should be published. He gives a moving insight into the personality and character of his young daughter.

Nelson learned that Anne had intended to write an adventure story of her confinement, and that although the reports in her diary were true, she often used fictitious names for her characters, including Mr. and Mrs. Jan Geis, Dutch citizens whom she referred to as Miep and Henk. Henk was a social service worker for the City of Amsterdam, and Miep was Otto Frank's secretary for several years. They had continual contact with the families secreted above the office.

On the program they tell how the Gestapo arrived and took away the eight fugitives, along with Victor Kuglar, a business associate of Frank's, to an indoctrination centre. They give their impressions of Anne, and tell how Miep discovered the diary. Nelson found that Kuglar, referred to in the diary as Kraler, had escaped from a concentration camp in the Netherlands during an American air raid, and had emigrated to Toronto. Later Nelson flew to Toronto to record Kuglar's memories of the Frank family, his observations of Anne during her childhood, and his description of the conditions under which the eight persons went into hiding.

Nelson also visited the keeper of war documentaries in the Netherlands, who pieced together the tragic aftermath of the Frank and Van Daan stories, and who divulged interesting information on how many of the Jewish people in Holland escaped detection.

Next, Nelson flew to London, where he arranged to get state-

will the United States become a have-not country in terms of natural resources?

We turn valuable timber into paper cups to be used once and then destroyed.

We turn great quantities of tin into cans to be used once and then thrown away.

We turn gigantic quantities of iron ore into cars which become obsolete within 12 months because of the shape of the tail fins.

Bauxite from a Caribbean island can be sold as bauxite abroad or it can be used on the island in industry to create profits and wages for the island people. This is the declared objective of almost every one of the under-developed countries.

Japan has already proved that an Asian nation can equal the west at economic games.

And now China begins to replace Japan as the dynamic nation.

There are many more facts, backed up by striking film footage in *The Earth and Mankind*, a six-part National Film Board series to be seen Wednesday night on CBC-TV. Many of these facts are depressing. Many others are hopeful. But they are all challenging: "We give money and knowledge to the developing countries. Our efforts are helping to produce more food for all people. But—we give modestly. Canada, for instance, contributes about 17 cents for each Canadian to U.N. technical assistance. North America spends twenty times as much money on arms as the whole world spends on aid to developing countries.

"It could be said we can and should do more."

ments for the program from Konrad Adenauer, Chancellor of the Federal Republic of Germany, and former president Theodore Heuss. When he returned to the States he recorded comments by Frances Goodrich and Albert Hackett, the husband-and-wife team who adapted the diary for both stage and screen, and won a Pulitzer Prize for their work. George Stevens, who directed the film for 20th Century Fox, also appears to tell of his role in bringing Anne's story to life.

"The Listening Booth"

BEN HORCH describes his new radio "review" of recent and unusual recordings

Holiday Edition

• Could you please tell me the title of the theme music of the program *Holiday Edition*. I would also like to know if it is possible to buy a recording of it.—S. S., *Prince Albert, Sask.*

The theme on "Holiday Edition" (now replaced by "Junior Magazine") was "The Happy Whistler" by Chauncey Rittenhouse. It has been recorded on Columbia label CL1149.

THE ADVENT of the long-playing record and the almost foolproof polyethylene wrapper has, it would seem, just about put an end to the happy days of listening booth record reviewing.

Collecting records for one's own personal library was a serious business in the days when record shop dealers let you hear your particular cat in the bag before you were required to buy it. For you, Beethoven had to purr with just the right authority. The loving and uncritical judgment that often went into the building of that home library was enough to cement the most disjointed relationships in a family that "stayed together because they collected together."

Touching? Just ask any record shop dealer who used to trip the keys of the cash register to another kind of sound—that of cash customers in the close confines of the now near-forgotten stuffy "listening booth."

Today that's all past. The wrapper's done it. Now, if you want to be assured of a satisfactory recorded performance of some favourite symphony, you read what somebody else says about it in a record magazine. And while "High Futility" bles *yea* for this or that recording, another magazine is bound to cry *nay*. Ultimately you hold off and wait until you can buy stereo.

Just to prove that things are not as bleak as they seem, CBW's *Late Concert* is going to present its own *Listening Booth* on Wednesday nights, starting this week (Nov. 2). *Listening Booth* will feature new and unusual discs currently being seen in Winnipeg record shops.

We must confess that we were not always musically consistent in

the way we chose the records for the series. In one instance, for example, we became intrigued mainly by the "Cranes Are Flying" type of photography on the record jacket, only to discover that the jacket also contained some completely new music given a really exciting performance. In most instances we were, of course, attracted by new names just appearing on the musical horizon and promising some day to become "big."

The series will also contain some rarely-performed music, and some programs in which minor works by major composers will be juxtaposed with major works by minor composers.

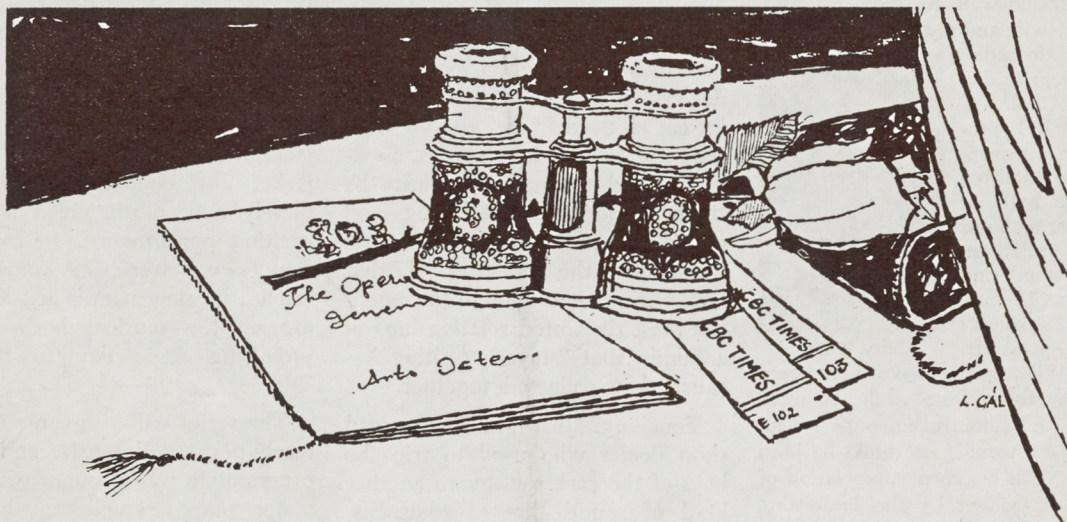
