IT'S WITCHCRAFT

The unusual trial of Helen Duncan on a charge of witchcraft, just a few years ago, is the subject of a play on CBC Wednesday Night, April 26

ONE OF THE strangest trials of modern times began at London's Old Bailey on March 23rd, 1944, and lasted for seven sensational days. Curiosity-seekers and devoted followers of the accused queued for hours in the hope of getting even a brief glimpse of the weird proceedings.

Mrs. Helen Duncan, a well-known spiritualist medium, was being tried under the Witchcraft Act of 1735. Much of the evidence and many incidents in court were extraordinary and even fantastic.

The majority of mediums are content with verbal communications, but some, like Helen Duncan, claim they can materialize the spirit in physical form, the form being a mysterious half-spiritual substance they call ectoplasm, which is said to exude from the medium's body. Mrs. Duncan's ectoplasm was reported to be so vital that on returning to her body it swept all sorts of objects from the floor along with it, like a vacuum cleaner.

She was born into a working-class family in Perthshire, Scotland, in 1898, married a working man, and had six children. She first made news at 33 when the Spiritualist Society of London investigated her work as a medium and turned in an unfavorable report. This only served to increase her professional popularity.

In 1933 an Edinburgh Court convicted her of obtaining money from sitters by false pretenses. It was claimed that her spirit-guide was not a piece of ectoplasm, but a thin white cloth which the audience had actually grabbed and torn during a seance. After this, Mrs. Duncan's professional practice zoomed ahead again; by 1944 she was demanding as much as £104 a week for her services.

Her seances at the Master Temple Psychic Centre, over a Portsmouth druggist's shop, were her last. In December, 1943, her

local sponsor, a Mrs. Homer, described her as a "wonderful materialization medium" to a young naval officer, Lieutenant Worth, and peaked his curiosity so that he bought a seat at a seance for 12 shillings and sixpence. When he told Mrs. Homer he had a friend, Surgeon-Lieutenant Fowler, who was pretty sceptical about spiritualism, she said: "Bring him along to see Helen Duncan. I'll give him a seat in the front row and scare him stiff."

On January 14th the two officers went to the Temple and sat among others in two rows of chairs facing a curtained corner, known as the "cabinet," where Mrs. Duncan went into her trances in a large armchair.

Mrs. Homer passed around the garments Mrs. Duncan would wear that night — a black dress, black bloomers, and black shoes. The sitters could see that nothing was concealed in them. Mrs. Homer asked three women sitters to go into the next room to watch Mrs. Duncan strip completely and put on the black clothes. Others searched the cabinet and found nothing suspicious.

Then Mrs. Duncan, who weighed all of 280 pounds, appeared and went into her trance in the cabinet, whereupon Mrs. Homer closed the curtains. All lights were put out except a weak red one covered with a red silk handkerchief. Mrs. Homer opened the seance with prayer, everyone present recited the Lord's Prayer, and then they all sang the popular song *South of the Border*. After various messages had been passed to the sitters, questions had been answered by spirits, and a cat, a parrot, and a rabbit had "materialized," Mrs. Duncan stumbled out of the cabinet waving her arms. The seance was over.

But Lieut. Worth was suspicious. He had noticed that every time a

spirit disappeared into the cabinet he could hear a rustling noise like the movement of cloth. With this and other evidence he went to the Portsmouth police and afterwards acted with their knowledge.

He attended a Helen Duncan seance the following Sunday, but there were no materializations. He returned on January 19 with a War Reserve policeman named Cross. After several spirit forms had appeared Cross leaped for the curtains, grabbed a spirit form, and Worth shone a flashlight on it.

Mrs. Duncan, who was supposed to be in a trance in the cabinet, was seen standing in front of the curtains in her bare feet, trying to hide a piece of something that looked like white cheese-cloth. While Cross grabbed for the cloth, it whipped off in the direction of the audience and vanished completely. The lights were turned on, Mrs. Duncan started screaming for the doctor, the police were sent for, and the place searched. The white cloth was not found.

In preferring charges the authorities felt that Mrs. Duncan's case was too serious to come under the Vagrancy Act of 1824, and fell back on the Witchcraft Act of 1735 which says that any person who may "pretend to exercise or use any kind of witchcraft, sorcery, echantment or conjuration" shall be liable on conviction to a year's imprisonment.

Helen Duncan pleaded not guilty. She attended the trial, but did not give evidence, claiming that she was in a trance at the time so did not know what had happened.

Red Skelton

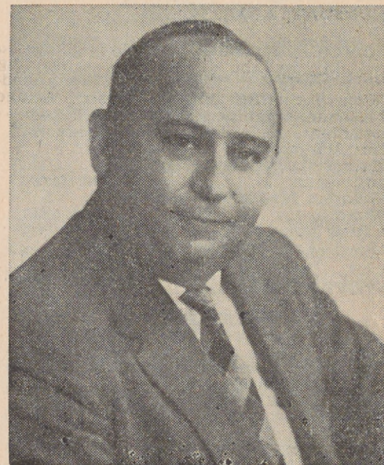

WILLIAM SHATNER, top CBC actor recently acclaimed in such productions as *Julius Caesar*, has written a script for the U.S.-produced series *Checkmate*, seen each Thursday on CBC-TV. For Shatner, it was a double sale—he will also play the lead in that episode.

CONGRATULATIONS are being received by the West's only French-language television station, CBWFT Winnipeg, which marks its first anniversary on April 24. Operated by the CBC for the 50,000 French-speaking people in the Winnipeg area, CBWFT provides video tapes, films and other material from the CBC's Montreal production facilities. Program director is Leo Remillard.

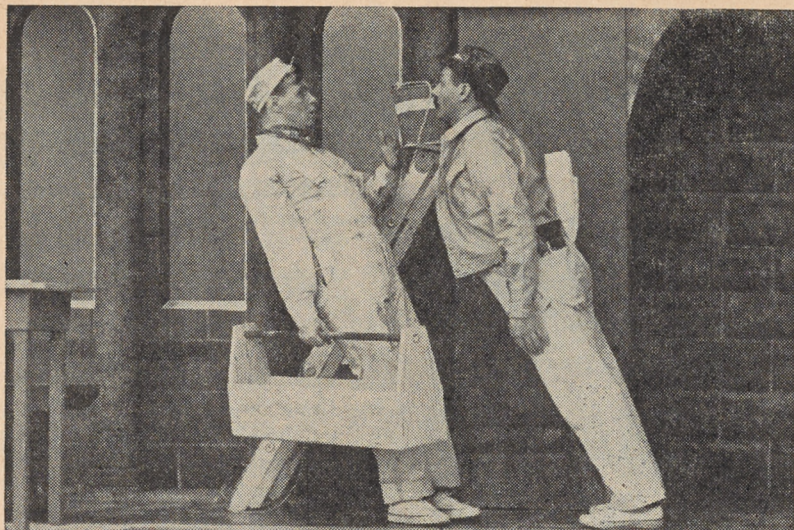

On Festival '61

Realistic Tale of the Supernatural

IN THE FOLK-LORE of Chassidism, a Jewish religious movement which developed in Eastern Europe in the 18th century, there is an old superstition that when a young person dies before his time, his vagrant soul, finding neither rest nor harbour, comes back to earth and possesses the body of a living person, in the form of a dybbuk, an "attachment." The haunting soul must be exorcised.

Monday night's *Festival '61* production on CBC-TV is based on this strange attachment. *The Dybbuk*, a Yiddish classic by S. Ansky, stars Luther Adler, Joseph Wiseman, Dino Narizzano, and Avra Petrides, with production by Harvey Hart. It was video-taped last summer.

Hart says "the charm and enchantment of this challenging drama lies in the fact that these people—the play is set in mid-19th-century Russia — accepted supernatural agents in their lives. But they were real people. The play is readily understood in realistic terms, and I think that the audience may be so gripped by it that they can accept the supernatural events as they can accept the fact that people in Arthur Miller's *The Crucible* believe in witches."

Hart compares *The Dybbuk* to a symphonic tone poem. "The first act," he says, "is like the opening movement in a symphony, stating the atmosphere, colour, and basic theme."

In a synagogue some prayermen and students chant the *Talmud* as they wait for the news that a wealthy merchant has found a suitable husband for his lovely daughter, Leah. When the announcement is made that a bridegroom has been selected, Channon, a brilliant young student who is in love with Leah, drops dead. On her wedding day Leah cries out in the synagogue that she refuses to marry the man her father has chosen. She speaks in a strange voice, the voice

of Channon. The holy men decide that a dybbuk has invaded her body, and they determine to exorcise it.

During the proceedings they discover that Leah and Channon were betrothed at birth, but her father, having become rich in the meantime and aspiring to someone better as a son-in-law, broke his pact with Channon's parents. Thus he is held responsible for Channon's death and must be punished. The exorcism continues, and Leah and Channon get their release in an unexpected way.

Ansky did not believe that a dybbuk could possess a body in actual fact, but he knew many pious Chassidic Jews who did. By drawing on their experiences he gave his play conviction. Chassidism was founded by Baal-Schem-Tov, a Jewish prophet in Poland, who believed that through inner impulses and through religious ecstasy, man could cross the barrier between the real and the "other" world and wing up through spaces crowded with departed spirits, to God himself. And on the other hand, the souls of the dead could return to the world by invading human bodies, through intense desire or exaltation.

Ansky, whose real name was S. J. Rappaport, was born in Russia in 1863. Described by some as a "socialist-revolutionist," he was a correspondent in Western Europe for Russian publications for some time, and also wrote stories about Jewish life.

He described *The Dybbuk* as "a piece of realism about mysticism." A few days after he died in Warsaw in 1920, the play made its debut as the first production of a new Yiddish theatrical company in Moscow, the Habimah, on the recommendation of Constantin Stanislavsky of the Moscow Art Theatre. Too poor to finance a complete production, the Habimah presented one act at a time as

funds became available. Many years later the Habimah performed *The Dybbuk* on British television. CBC producer Rupert Caplan introduced it in Canada in 1930 at His Majesty's Theatre in Montreal (now Her Majesty's). It has been translated into many languages and has been presented as an oratorio and as an opera.

Luther Adler, who has been described as "an actor with a warm personality and the tensions of a delicate watch mechanism," plays the role of Rabbi Azrael. Adler is one of nine children born to Jacob and Sara Adler, who were called "the Barrymores of the Yiddish theatre" in New York City. Jacob Adler later won acclaim on Broadway as Shylock in Shakespeare's *The Merchant of Venice*. In 1953 his son Luther played the same role in New York City Centre.

Joseph Wiseman, who plays a mysterious Messenger in *The Dybbuk*, is a Montrealer who has had a thriving Broadway and Hollywood career for 25 years, playing opposite such leading ladies as Helen Hayes, Tallulah Bankhead, Katharine Cornell, Julie Harris, Judith Anderson and Ruth Gordon. He has appeared in such stage plays as *The Lark*, *That Lady*, *The Three Sisters*, and *Antony and Cleopatra*. Recently he played a one-eyed religious fanatic in a Western movie, *The Unforgiven*, with Audrey Hepburn and Burt Lancaster.

He will be seen again next week in a *Festival '61* production of *The Police*, a satire by Polish playwright Slavomir Mrozek, which was video-taped earlier. Currently he is in Spain, making a film co-starring Rita Hayworth and Rex Harrison.

The role of Channon in *The Dybbuk* is portrayed by Dino Narizzano, a well-known Canadian actor who has played four other Jewish roles in the last year. They were in Marc Blitzstein's *No For*

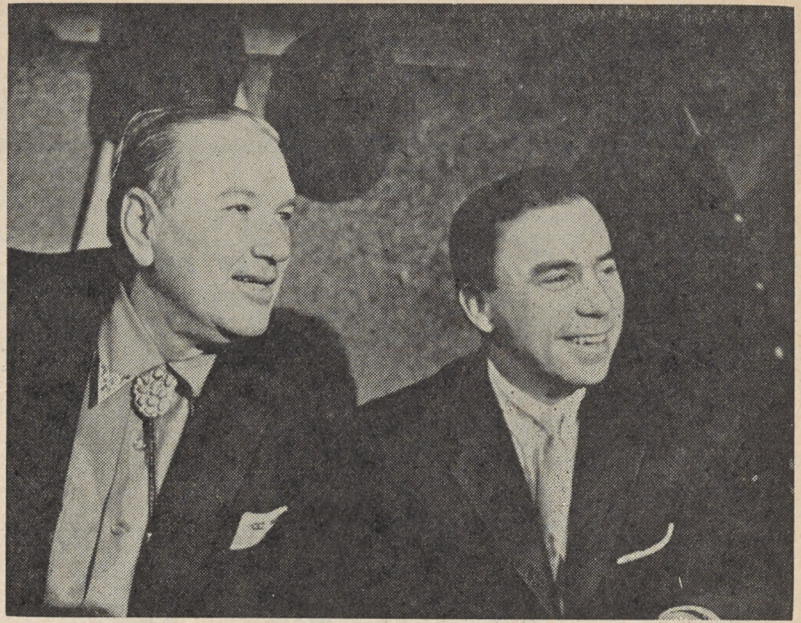

Open House

The Grandeur That Was Rome. In the third film of the series, *Roman Art and Architecture*, Sir Mortimer Wheeler discusses the contributions Rome made to the arts she inherited from the Greeks. Greek sculpture at its best had been a vehicle for idealization and abstract harmony of forms. Roman sculpture came down to earth and portrayed individual men and women in marble as if it were flesh and blood, with remarkable psychological penetration. This was a brand new conception of art: reaching down to the common man and raising him to the ranks of the immortals.

At the same time the Roman artist, having got his man, tried to rescue him from the artist's studio and set him in the landscape where he belonged. This sense of landscape recurs with growing force and conviction in Roman mosaics based on painting. And there was something else the Roman artists gave us, a sort of petrified ancestor of the movie newsreel or the strip cartoon. The Romans were the first to create continuous narrative in which the hero constantly reappears in successive scenes. Trajan's column in Rome is the best-known example of this epic art.

The Romans were also extraordinarily modern as great functional constructors, combining splendor with utility and hurling "aqueducts across countless landscapes to supply the countless cities with unlimited water for innumerable kitchens and extravagant baths." The Roman did love his bath, and it wasn't the quick in-and-out modern variety in a tiny bathroom. With him it was a leisurely occasion in

spacious surroundings, a soothing of the soul as well as the body.

From Greece, Rome had received the tradition of static architecture, seen to perfection in the Parthenon of Athens. To that, the Romans added new and courageous flights of fantasy and science, throwing vast domes and vaults across the wide spaces required by imperial buildings. The domes of St. Peter's in Rome and St. Paul's in London are basically the Romans' invention. So in its architecture the Roman world, stretching from Europe into Asia and Africa, gave us new idioms which are still very much alive today.

LET'S MAKE AN OPERA!

*Benjamin Britten's delightful children's play, which embodies the opera *The Little Sweep*, is to be presented in four programs by the National School Broadcast, starting Friday on CBC Radio*

BENJAMIN BRITTEN'S fifth original work for the operatic stage, *Let's Make an Opera!*, began as a playful little romp and became an international institution. Hundreds of schools all over North America and Europe, and also many professional companies, have presented this gay and novel work.

When Britten and his librettist, Eric Crozier, were putting the finishing touches to their opera *Albert Herring*, in 1946, they discussed the fact that in most English-speaking countries children seldom get a chance to sample opera until they are in their teens. One of the men remarked that it often

happens that a young person's introduction to opera is so stuffy that it spoils his appetite for more. Why shouldn't children have a chance to sample opera while they're still at school? they asked each other—say a simple, cheerful piece far removed from the high falutin' style associated with grand opera?

Before long Britten and Crozier had not only talked themselves into writing one, but were already poking through books in search of a story children could enjoy and perform with the minimum of grown-up help. A lovely poem by William Blake, *The Chimney Sweep*, suggested the action. Britten and Crozier set to work, and *Let's Make an Opera!* is the result.

It avoids falling into the rut of "just another children's opera" by providing two things—an explanation in the form of a play about how an opera is composed, rehearsed, and produced, and, within that framework, a short (40-minute) opera, *The Little Sweep*, written especially for children, but requiring both adults and children in the cast. It's a merry, exciting piece, and the audience has a chance to get in on the fun, too. Britten wrote four songs specifically for the audience to sing, and they steal the show at every performance.

During the rehearsal scenes the audience memorizes and learns to sing the songs, with the help of the conductor. Each of the choruses has some little trick in it, so practising it is never dull. In the first

song the catch is an odd twist in the harmony and in the metre: syncopated four-five time, which, after the first few minutes of singing it, seems the most natural thing in the world. The audience sings the second song while Sammy the Sweep is having some of the soot washed off him. For the third chorus, called *Night Song*, the audience divides into four sections, each of which is expected to make bird or animal noises in turn, including the cooing of turtle doves—which led one Broadway impresario to suggest that the attending critics be seated in the cooing section! The finale, *Coaching Song*, is a rousing chorus that ends the show at a gallop.

One of the interesting things about *Let's Make an Opera!* is its appeal for adults as well as for children. Eric Crozier's explanation is that "everyone loves singing—even though his voice may want soleing and heeling—and it has always been a grievance of mine that social pressure prevented me from joining in operas I listened to."

This opera seems to be able to make even the stiffest and shyest members of the audience unbend and join in the fun. A London (England) theatrical manager went to a performance vowing that nothing on earth would get him to sing. Afterwards he said: "If they had been easy little songs, I wouldn't have dreamt of singing them. But they were tricky. You had to count! So I thought: 'I'm not going to let this beat me!' And I sang my head off!"

Crozier tells us that his "favourite story about *Let's Make an Opera!* is of two children who

were travelling home by bus after a performance at the Lyric Theatre, Hammersmith. They were chattering enthusiastically between themselves about what they had seen. After a while a stranger, who had also been at the performance leaned over to them and said: 'Now, I suppose, you are going to write an opera yourselves?' The children looked at him in astonishment and asked: 'How *did* you guess?'

Crozier says "Benjamin Britten and I planned our 'entertainment for young people' with a special emphasis on 'entertainment.' True entertainment is active, not passive; you do not sit back and let it come to you—you strain forward to share the joy and the effort of creating it. This was how we wanted our audiences to feel about opera. How better could we do so than by inviting them to share the problems and the labour of creating a particular opera from first idea to final rehearsal, than by giving them their own part to play?"

"Many children—many grown-ups, too—cannot listen to music for long at a stretch. Their attention wanders; they fidget or daydream. Active listening demands greater concentration than they can manage. But put any child in the back row of an orchestra, give him a triangle and make him responsible for one single *clink!* on it, and he will listen as though he had composed the music himself!"

"It seems to me especially important nowadays, when more and more of us are entertained at less and less effort to ourselves, that performances for children should ask for every scrap of active and eager co-operation. The success of *Let's Make an Opera!* has largely been due to the challenge it gives to each individual member of the audience."

"When the CBC decided to present *Let's Make an Opera!* in the *National School Broadcast* on CBC radio," says program organizer Digby Peers, "we felt it should have some tailoring done to it to make it more appealing to Canadian children. Boosey and Hawkes, who hold the world copyright,

Distinguished Musicians Perform

SOME OF CANADA'S most distinguished musicians and singers will be featured in a new music series on the CBC Trans-Canada radio network. *Sunday Concert* will offer several premières as well as informal discussions on the works to be presented among the artists performing them.

The first concert, on April 30, was recorded before an invited audience at the Heliconian Club in Toronto. It presents the Rowland Pack Singers and Players in a program including works by Bach, Josquin des Prés, Flemish composer of note, Ernest John Moeran, contemporary English composer, and Grieg; and a group of folk-songs.

The Hugh McLean Consort will be heard from Vancouver on May 7. McLean, who is one of the country's most brilliant organists and harpsichordists, will introduce the program. It includes the first Canadian performance of Sonata for

flute, oboe, 'cello, and harpsichord (1952) by the American composer and critic, Elliott Carter.

On May 14 the Baroque Trio of Montreal and duo-pianists Kelsey and Rosabelle Jones will be featured in the world première of Jones' *Theme and Variations*. Other Canadian works to be heard are *Music for Dancing* (piano, four hands) by John Beckwith of Toronto, and *Trio* by Jacques Hetu of Montreal, dedicated to the Baroque Trio.

Winnipeg's Dirk Keetbaas Players, with Lea Foli, violinist, and Gerald Stanick, one of Canada's most noted violists, will be heard May 21. Chester Duncan will be the commentator. A highlight of the concert will be the national première of *Wind Quintet* by Winnipeg composer Leslie Mann.

The Canadian work on the May 28 program will be John Beckwith's

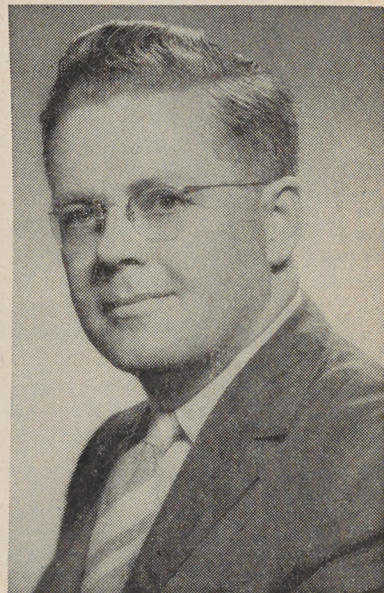

MATINEE HIGHLIGHTS

Children in Hospital. Matinee highlights today features two items on Children in Hospital. When a young child is in hospital, should there be restrictions on the mother's visiting hours? Should the mother even be allowed to stay with her child the entire time? June Sheppard of Edmonton talks about her feelings when her six year-old daughter was in hospital to have her tonsils removed.

In Britain, as in Canada, it is up to the individual hospital to decide how much time a mother may spend with her child. Children in hospital have been the concern of Dr. James Robertson for many years and he has written books and produced films on the subject. He is a founder-member of the Tavistock Child Development Research Unit in London which has worked for the setting up of mother-child units in hospitals. 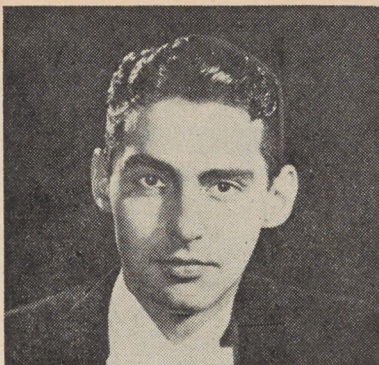

discoveries and the unknown marvels of this world.

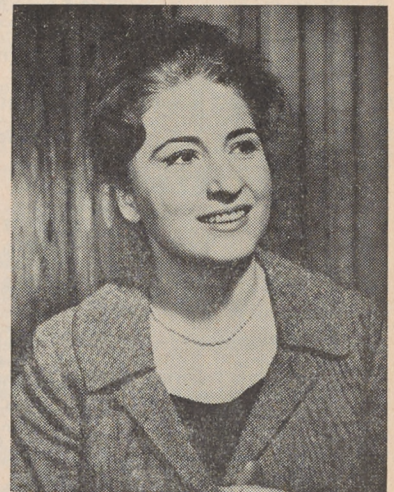
The first, titled Expeditions, is scheduled Tuesday evenings at 9:30. It deals with the great accomplishments that have marked the last century and have opened the way to a whole new world of wonders. The other, titled *Au-Dela des Apparences*, is presented on Wednesday evenings at 7:45. This series deals with life "beyond the surface" and in particular, with the infinitesimal living parts in human beings, animals and plants. For example, on Wednesday May 3rd, the program will study the formation of crystals, and the circulation of blood in the veins as compared with the circulation of sap in plants. Host will be Rev. Father Venance, Capuchin friar from Quebec, a renowned philosopher and biologist and one of the first Canadians to devote his time exclusively to the study of microscopic life.

Father Venance's studies began in 1939, at which time he obtained from his superiors the permission to begin his research.

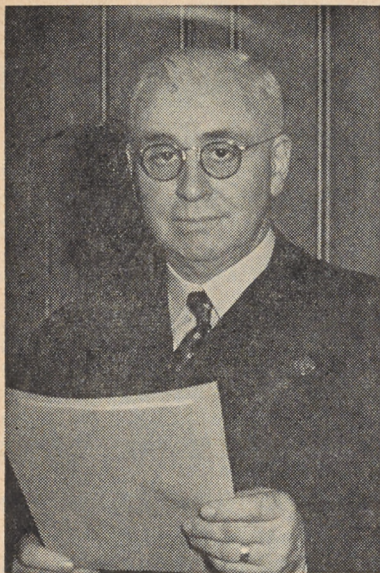

Visit to the United Nations. Today hostess Betty Tomlinson will take listeners on a tour of the United Nations. The program will originate from the U.N. itself and Betty Tomlinson will start by giving a brief account of her impressions, with New York's East River in the background, the low General Assembly and Conference buildings beside the towering blue-green glass slab of the Secretariat and the floors of the 99 member-nations. Judy Graham, a Torontonion who is a U.N. Guide Despatcher, will take Betty on a tour of the buildings and show her what the public sees—and some places the public doesn't see. She will also talk about the guides from many different countries who have to be able to adapt their tours to everything from 5th grade classes to groups of high-level diplomats.

Judy Graham, will introduce Betty to Ted Fagin, who will tell her about the simultaneous translation system and how the translators qualify for their jobs; for example, they all have to be fluent in at least three languages, although they translate only into their native tongue. Another stop on the tour will be the Meditation Room conceived by the Secretary-General, Dag Hammarskjold, and which is open to delegates of all religions.

Listeners will glimpse the gift shops, the post office, the bulletin boards for U.N. staff activities and delegates' dining room; then they will meet the United Nations Correspondents Association. Stanley Burke will talk about the press and broadcasting facilities and take Betty to meet Matinee's United Nations correspondent, Kathleen Teltsch of the New York Times.

Matinee listeners will hear Betty talking with Mrs. Adelaide Sinclair,

a Canadian who is Deputy Executive Director of UNICEF; Madame S. Grinberg-Vinaver, head of the Status of Women Commission; and Miss Julia Henderson, Director of the Bureau of Social Affairs.

The current session of the General Assembly is expected to adjourn on April 21, but a number of delegates will still be there working on the many Commissions that continue to function even when the General Assembly is in recess. Betty will meet some of these delegates and hear about their impressions of the U.N. and how they came to represent their countries.

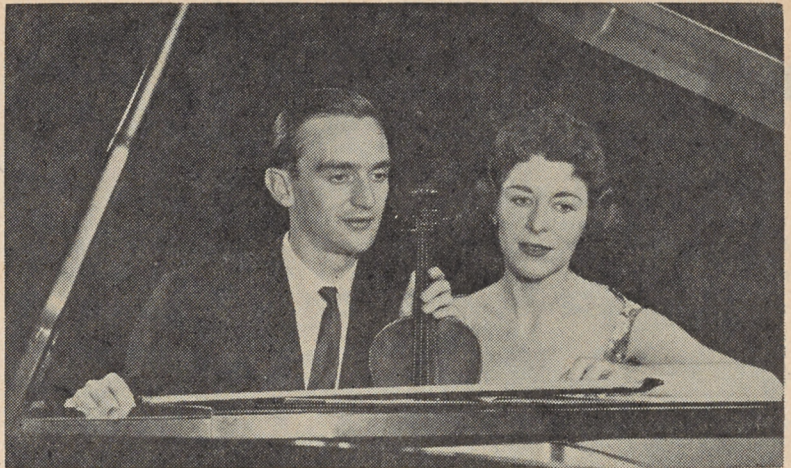

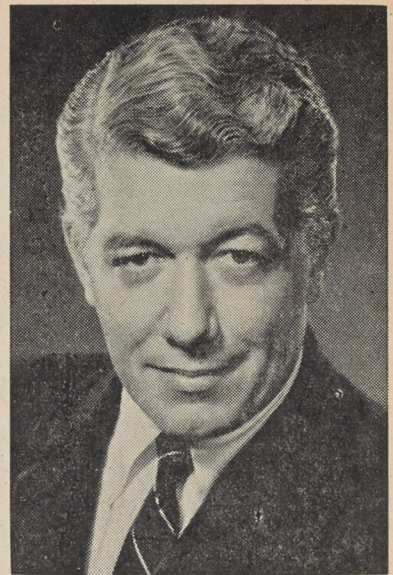

In Juliette's Opinion

Clothes Make the Woman

THIRTEEN YEARS AGO in Vancouver, a young girl singer went to the salon of a local couturier and asked him to design her wedding dress. He said he was too busy.

The girl singer was Juliette, who now has a regular Saturday night program on the CBC-TV network.

The couturier was Stuart Mackay, who now designs all of the gowns Juliette wears on her TV show.

"I'd never designed for Juliette until last year, when I worked on her TV special (An Hour With Juliette)," says Mackay. "And this year, I was assigned to her regular network show."

"She's hypersensitive to clothes," says the designer. "In her private and professional life, she insists on looking her best — she feels she owes it to her fans. When she's pleased with a dress, she performs at her best. When she's not, I can tell by looking at her."

Each Juliette gown is first an idea in Mackay's head and subsequently a sketch on his drawing board. Next comes the selection of materials, then the design takes shape on the cutting tables and sewing machines in the CBC costume department workrooms.

The singing star has two fittings before a gown is finished—one at the "basting" stage and one when the dress is all but complete.

"Juliette seems to have a preference for the sheath, at the moment," says Mackay. "She likes vibrant colours, and although she wears a lot of browns and beiges in private life, she doesn't like them for the show. Recently, I've talked her into white—to go with the wonderful tan she acquired in Florida on a brief winter holiday."

Both the singer and her designer get a lot of enquiries from viewers, who take more than a casual interest in her on-camera wardrobe. Dress goods manufacturers, too, keep a close watch on the Juliette

show to see what she's wearing, and frequently, they make new materials available to Mackay for his designs.

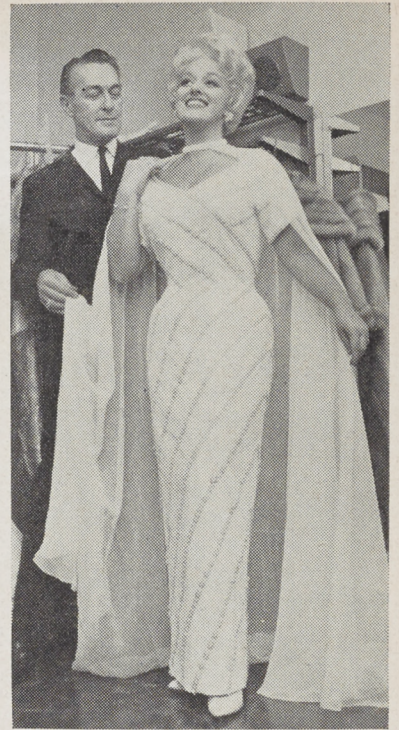
Early this year, Juliette wore a violet silk chiffon gown that caused a lot of favourable comment. "It had 28 yards of lynx around the hemline," says Mackay. "That lynx started out on some 'Eskimos' in a CBC variety show about five years ago; it has been used again and again.

"Juliette loves fur trim. When the hemline was enveloped in dry ice 'mist' during a show, she pulled the skirt up around her shoulders, like a cape, so viewers could see it."

When Juliette makes suggestions about a design Mackay listens, recognizing her innate clothes sense. He must also keep in mind the theme of a particular Juliette show. "When she has a folk-singer guest, I design something less sophisticated."

Juliette wears each of Mackay's designs twice—spaced several weeks apart—during the season. After the second wearing, the dress goes into the CBC costume stock.

Mackay has been designing for CBC-TV shows ever since 1952. Between television work, he free-

lances on stage productions such as the Canadian National Exhibition grandstand show.

"I started in show business as a dancer in Vancouver, but I was too lazy for that," says Mackay. "Thirty years ago, I turned to designing. In the early days, though, I was also a part-time lumber-jack, a taxi driver and a construction worker. Now I live entirely in the world of show-business design."

"Science Review" Returns

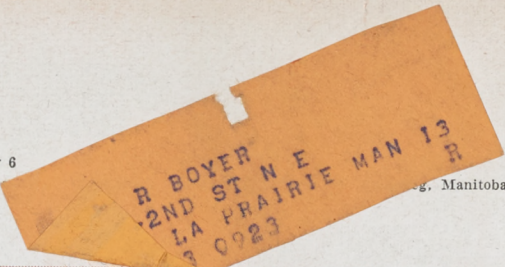
Science Review, a CBC radio series designed to acquaint Canadian listeners with scientific developments, has returned for its fifth season.

The series, produced by Delbert MacKenzie with David Walker as program organizer, will be heard each Thursday on the Trans-Canada radio network.

As in the previous seasons, editor and host will be Lister Sinclair, mathematician, broadcaster, and poet. Sinclair, who is also known as a public speaker, music and art

critic, actor, naturalist, philosopher, historian, and book reviewer, has contributed many scripts to Canadian radio and television. His knowledge of science and his ability to communicate it simply have been an important factor behind the success of *Science Review*.

The series, which earlier this year won its second straight special citation by the Thomas Alva Edison Foundation, is somewhat unique in that scientists themselves appear in the program to tell about experiment and research.

POTATO PANCAKES

- 4 large potatoes
- 1 tbsp. flour
- 1 egg
- 1 tsp. salt

Peel and grate potatoes on fine grater, drain off excess moisture in colander, then add other ingredients. Beat until well blended. Put 1 tbsp. cooking oil into iron skillet. Put on high heat until pan is quite hot, then decrease heat slightly (medium high). Add batter by spoonfuls spreading out to desired size. Bake about 1/2 to 3/4 minute on each side. Serve with plum jam and salad cream.
