A Tale of Three Cities



TO PIERRE BERTON Toronto is a changing city. To Morley Callaghan Montreal is full of memories. To Earle Birney Vancouver is an expanding metropolis. These three men will offer personal glimpses of "their" cities this Monday night on the CBC television network when *Camera Canada* presents an hour-long program, *A Tale of Three Cities*.

Berton, columnist, author and associate editor of the *Toronto Daily Star*, takes us on a highly personal tour of his Toronto. He points to the changing faces of Canada's second-largest city, a city that is changing in many ways, from the traditional to the cosmopolitan. It's a place where more Europeans have settled than anywhere else in Canada and have brought with them their ways of living.

"This is a city in ferment," says Berton "changing physically from month to month, almost impossible for anybody to keep up with; a city that has exploded from its ancient core along the lakeshore where the original city hall has long since become a farmers' market."

Callaghan's Montreal, like Berton's Toronto, is an extremely personal and reflective look at the country's largest city. The program shows the streets that the writer has walked, the places where he talked with people. Each place seen has a memory for Callaghan, sometimes amusing but always personal.

Shown is a place where writers gathered; the times of Mayor Houde are recaptured. A visit is made to a Negro night club that has been closed for 12 years but is just about to reopen. The main emphasis throughout the Montreal

DOG TEAMS plunging forward through the snow in a thrilling battle for the world championships—nimrods imitating the call of the wild goose—rugged men, hardened by the northern climate, "cutting loose" in jigging and fiddling contests. These are part of the action that makes up one of the north's most colourful events, the Northern Manitoba Trappers' Festival at The Pas, held this year from February 21-23.

In a program entitled *Northland Mardi Gras* this Tuesday, CBC Radio salutes that annual festival with a half-hour of sounds recorded in previous years of the event. Two prairie stations will carry the program: CBW at 7:30 p.m. (replacing *Jazz Workshop*) and CBK at 11:00 p.m. (replacing *Overture and Chorus*). Larry Glover is producer.

CIRCUMSTANCES that read like a Horatio Alger story surround the appearance Monday on *Song Album* (6:45 p.m.) of baritone Harry Dahlem of Saskatoon.

Dahlem arrived in Canada in 1952, an immigrant from Germany. With the industriousness that has typified many new Canadians, he spent his first few years here working in the summer as a bricklayer, and studying during the winter. While struggling to master the language, he completed his grade twelve and obtained senior matriculation. Then he entered the University of Saskatchewan, undertaking a rigorous Arts and Law course, while continuing to support himself.

In the midst of this busy life, the energetic young immigrant decided he had time to train his excellent baritone voice. He commenced taking lessons in 1955. Now a successful Saskatoon lawyer, he has been a winner of the Rose Bowl in the Saskatoon Music Festival, and appeared in 1960 on the *CBC Talent Festival*. He makes an important contribution to his city's musical life.

On *Song Album* Monday he sings German lieder by Schubert and Schumann. See "Music on Radio," page 23, for further details.

CBWT Winnipeg will sign on and sign off each day, commencing February 18, with religious devotions conducted under the auspices of the Winnipeg Religious Advisory Council.

All denominations in the city will be represented by their clergymen on the five-minute programs at some time during the schedule. The first week's telecasts will feature ministers of the United Church of Canada. Sign-off devotions will be by the Rev. Ernest Johnston of King Memorial and the Rev. K. A. Moyer of Regents Park, while sign-ons will be by the Rev. V. Sangwin of Riverview and the Rev. G. E. Stewart of Sparling.

In the following weeks, clergy of other denominations will be seen in this order: Roman Catholic, Anglican, Lutheran, Salvation Army and other smaller denominations (sharing one week), Baptist, Greek Orthodox, Jewish and Mennonite. Further details will be carried in the program notes relating to each day.

portion is placed on the writing era in Montreal.

A typical day in Vancouver, starting with a quiet reflective look at the harbour in the morning and continuing throughout the day in other parts of downtown Vancouver is the main theme of this part of the program. Narrator and writer Earle Birney takes us to the harbour and to Stanley Park, in Canada's third-largest city. We see the business section and the different facets of Vancouver as reflected in different types of people. How they cope with the weather, which offers wet, foggy and sometimes muggy days, is discussed. How Stanley Park is taken over in the afternoon by elderly people is shown. We visit the Queen Elizabeth Theatre to see a ballet and take a look at a luxury hotel with people in furs and jewellery. A Wilderness For Peter To Cry In

A passionate plea for more winding country lanes,

delivered first on CBC Radio's

"Speaking Personally"

At the risk of being labelled an old fogey . . . I'm not, I'm a middle-aged fogey. . . . I want to go on record as being violently opposed to what they're doing to our roads and highways. By "they" I mean all the parties responsible—governments, engineers, road construction outfits . . . and all the rest.

You ask what's my beef? Aren't roads and highways bigger and better than ever? There are more of them, they're smoother, wider and straighter. They're a great improvement over what they were a few years ago.

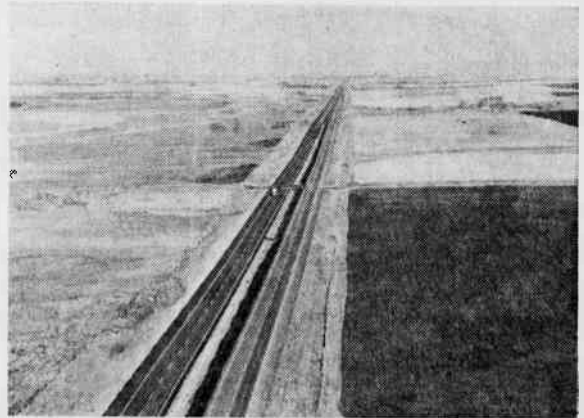
I'll go along with the smoother, wider and straighter but . . . for a number of reasons I won't go along with the better, and I have a feeling that there may be some people who will agree with me.

So what have I got against our highways and the people who build them? Plenty. My first complaint is that these new roads are too costly. Oh, not necessarily in dollars and cents, although for the cost of building a mile of some super-highways today you could have built a road across a province a few years ago. And, as you know, every time a new government gets itself elected in any province the first thing it does is to announce proudly that it's going to spend about ten times as much of your money and mine on roads as the previous government did. Always the government that went before, made a mess of road building. Always the government newly elected is going to build bigger and better and more costly roads and more of them, too often it does.

No, it's not the cost in dollars and cents that bothers me as much as the cost in other things. One of the first of these is beauty. I may be doing them wrong but it seems to me that every man who ever grew up to be a road designer or builder was visited at birth by an ugly old hag who put a curse on him.

And that curse was that wherever he happened to come across of natural beauty later in life he'd do his best to ruin. And our modern road builders have certainly been doing just that.

For example, we don't have to look any further than the nearest expressway or turnpike. I know that this situation is much worse south of the border than it is in Canada, but we're working hard to catch up, particularly, it seems to me, around Toronto and Montreal, although other cities aren't exempt. All



over the country we're scarring the countryside with these endless six-lane ribbons of concrete.

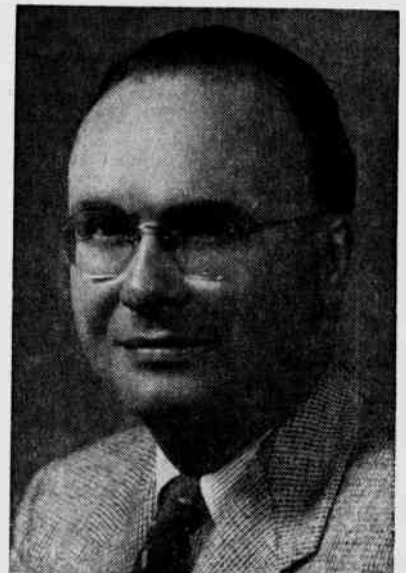
Although expressways are the worst offenders, they aren't the only ones. Ordinary trunk highways are getting to be just as bad. Let me give you an example from my home province of Manitoba. If I talk a lot about roads in this province it's only because I don't like driving on highways, and so I drive as little on them as I can. As a result, most of my driving is done pretty close to home and on back roads as much as possible.

Each summer we drive from Winnipeg up to the Riding Mountains. There was a time when our No. 10 highway north was a most pleasant road to travel. It had a good surface. It rolled along and around the hills and through the valleys and always there before the motorists lay all the beauty of that part of the country. But a few years ago the powers-that-be decided to "improve" No. 10. This consisted, as it does in the case of most highway "improvements," of building a completely new road.

Unlike the old road, the new one doesn't fit into the countryside. It cuts straight across it like a giant,

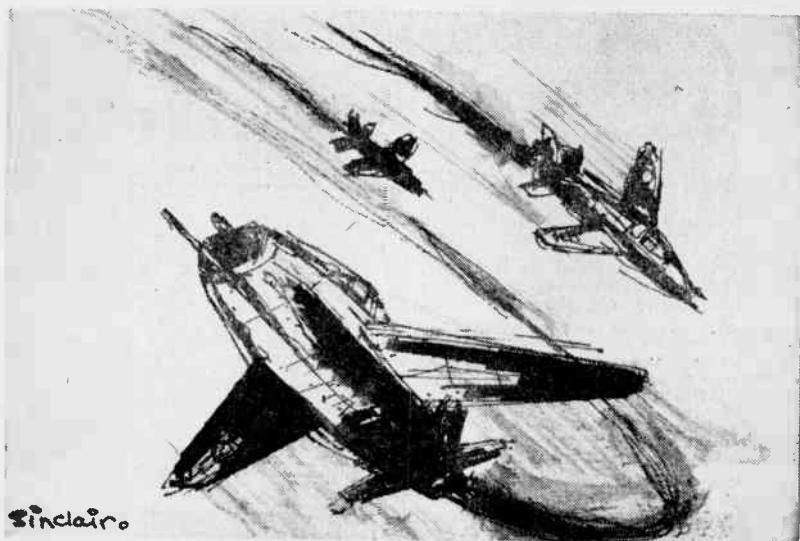

grey scar. Where the old road used to hug the hills this one goes through them or straight over them. Where the old road wound gently through the valleys, the new one whacks straight across them, often on fill-ins that give timid drivers like myself an acute case of dizziness as he peers down over the edge of the road to the fields far below.

Where the old road had shallow ditches filled with grass and flowers, the new road has deep, ugly gouges of raw brown earth on either side. And that's pretty representative of most of our new highways.

Well, that's bad enough, but I found a way to circumvent, temporarily at least, the worst of the new road's horrors. By driving a few miles farther I found I could take a quiet country road, gravelled, but smooth, that runs parallel to the highway. It took me through the hills and valleys much as the old highway did. That is, until this year.

This summer, when I hit the old gravel road, I was horrified to find the most pleasant part of it, the part that wanders down into the green valley of the Minnedosa, covered with road-building equipment. They had gouged out and straightened the gently winding hills. They had knocked down all the old trees on one side to widen the road. They had

carved huge chunks out of the hill on the other side and then dumped about eight inches of gravel all over everything. Why they did this I don't know. The road's used only by a few farmers so my guess is that in Manitoba, at any rate, they've run out of highways to do their worst to. And now, just to keep themselves busy, they're starting in on secondary roads.

Our new roads are costly in another way—in accidents and in lives. I can immediately hear every road engineer in the country screaming denials, but I noticed a newspaper story the other day which reported that, recently, experts in Manitoba's motor vehicles branch were confronted with a mystery. In the month of July, in this one province alone, 167 vehicles plunged off provincial highways for no apparent reason, and six people died. In the first seven months of this year in this one province accidents of this type took 22 lives. The experts say that they just don't understand it. Well, I think I understand it all right; and the roads are to blame.

They're to blame because they're built for one purpose only. To take people as fast as possible from one place to another—and never mind looking at anything on the way. And many people, people being what they are, try to get there just as fast as they can. The result is that speed laws are constantly broken. I'd hazard a guess that on a highway with

a speed limit of 60 miles an hour most cars travel between 70 and 80. With the result that when accidents happen they're bad ones. They're bad ones whether two cars collide or whether a car just rolls off the road because the driver has lost control. On the old roads, well, they may have been narrower and more winding but you had to be alert all the time, and an alert driver usually is an alive driver. If you did go off the road in those days the ditches were shallow, and if you didn't clip a telephone pole you probably got off lightly. But when you flip into one of today's ditches you've had it. I realize that traffic experts can trot out all kinds of statistics to prove that though more people are killed on the road every year, this isn't really a true reflection of the situation because there are more cars on the

roads every year. But it seems to me that this is a pretty feeble argument. I honestly believe that if our super highways weren't quite so super, it might slow traffic up a little, but it would save lives.

I was very happy to see in a magazine recently that there is now on tour on this continent an exhibit of 70 photographs showing our modern roads in all their ugliness. The co-director of the exhibit, an engineer and architect himself, is not thrilled by our roads. He says: "Americans"—and he could have included Canadians—"have a talent for demolishing their own continent. It's brutal to erect massive roads that look like monsters; soon there won't be anything else."

I realize that he, like myself, is a voice crying in the wilderness. What bothers me though is that at the rate we're building these monstrous highways pretty soon there won't be any wilderness left to cry in.—Peter McLintock.

Why Junior's Clothes Soon Will Fit



MONDAY AFTERNOON CBC-TV's *Open House* presents a special hour-long program about the new Canada Standard Size system, which will make it possible to buy children's clothes by body measurement instead of age as hitherto. Children's underwear in the new sizes is now on the market, and other clothing is expected to be on sale shortly. Canada is one of the first countries in the world to take steps towards adopting a system in which measurements of the body and not age, will determine the size of children's clothing.

The project was instigated by the Consumers

Association of Canada. The chairman of the CAC committee on sizing, Mrs. Helen Earle, also will take part in the program. Representatives of retailers and manufacturers will discuss the new system, and viewers will see demonstrations of how the measurements are used in sizing. The assistant Deputy Minister of the federal Department of Trade and Commerce, B. G. Barrow, will explain how his department is involved in the project. Scenes filmed in a factory will point up the advantages of the Canada Standard Size and the difficulties in establishing the system.

FOR GOLFING FANS all across the country, this Saturday features one of the finest matches to date on the *Wonderful World of Golf*. Today's match brings together Gary Player of South Africa and Peter Thomson of Australia, at the Royal Melbourne Golf Course. This course, with some of the toughest holes of any golf course in the world, is 6,487 yards in length. It has nine dogleg holes in addition to being well-trapped with some bunkers up to 75 yards wide. Player, last year's leading money winner on the pro golf trail and Thomson, one of the all-time greats, should provide a fine match, since both are very experienced and accustomed to a great deal of pressure. Thomson has won the rugged British Open four times and Player once. Player also has a victory in the U.S. Masters to his credit, something that has eluded Thomson, who won the British Open in 1954-55-56 and again in 1958, while Player won it in 1959.

Saturday evening, the Montreal Canadiens and Chicago Black Hawks will give hockey fans their usual thrills in a very important game from the Forum in Montreal. Both clubs are driving hard to consolidate their play-off positions for the coming Stanley Cup finals so tonight's game should be

another hard-checking, fast-skating affair. Of course, that has been the highlight of many Montreal-Chicago games over the past two or three seasons. The fact that the Hawks have so many ex-Montrealers on their roster always adds incentive to the game from a Chicago standpoint. The Black Hawks have Ab McDonald, Billy Hay, Murray Balfour, Bob Turner, Dollard St. Laurent and Reg Fleming, all at one time or another the property of the Canadiens.

Curling, now approaching its final stages leading to the Brier at Kitchener, Ont., will get its share of publicity on radio. However, now that provincial champions have been decided, most of the news will come from bonspiels taking place throughout the three prairie provinces. Big 'spiels are set for Edmonton, Winnipeg, Calgary, Regina and Saskatoon just to name a few.

More good action from the O'Connor bowl at Toronto is set for Saturday, February 17. This fine bowling show has been highly praised in just about all prairie centres and seems to have stepped up interest in the game.

METROPOLITAN OPERA

Salome. Music drama in one act by Richard Strauss. Text adapted from Oscar Wilde's play. Featuring Brenda Lewis as Salome, Walter Cassel as Jokanaan (John The Baptist), Roman Vinay as Herod, and Blanche Thebom as Herodias. Conducted by Joseph Rosenstock.

Place, terrace of the palace of Herod. Time, A.D. 30.

Soldiers are standing guard over the cistern where Jokanaan is imprisoned. He has upbraided Herod for marrying his brother's wife, Herodias. Salome, daughter of Herodias, overhears him prophesy that a great disaster will overwhelm the Roman rule of Palestine. She is enchanted by his voice, has him brought before her, and begins making advances to him. The prophet exhorts her to turn to a virtuous life but she replies that his voice is music to her and that she wants his love in return for hers. He tells her to seek forgiveness for her own and her mother's sins and returns to the prison.

Herod and Herodias enter from the banquet hall. He has an affection for Salome that cannot be called fatherly and bids her to drink from his cup. She refuses. From the cistern comes the voice of the prophet denouncing Herodias. She demands of her husband that he hand Jokanaan over to the Jews for punishment but he replies that the prophet is a holy man and must not be injured. The Nazarenes enter and announce that the Messiah has already come. The voice of the prophet declares that the Saviour will ascend the throne of the guilty tetrarch.

Seeking distraction and an escape from evil forebodings, Herod asks Salome to dance. She at first declines and he promises to grant her anything she may ask. Salome then performs the erotic dance of the seven veils and when she has discarded the veils, throws herself at Herod's feet. To his horror she demands the head of the prophet as her reward. She insists that he keep his promise and in disgust and fear, he finally orders the execution of the prophet.

Moments later the executioner enters with the head on a silver platter. Salome takes it and addresses words of love to it. She kisses the lips of the dead prophet's head and goes into an ecstasy of swooning passion as she fondles it. For Herodias it is a triumph, but Herod, shaking with dread, declares he will stay there no longer and orders the servants to extinguish the candles.

A cloud momentarily obscures the moon leaving the scene in complete darkness as Salome murmurs in a voice of sated sensuality: "I have kissed thy mouth Jokanaan; I have kissed thy mouth." The moon reappears and casts an eerie light on Salome as she stares fixedly at the platter. Unable to bear the sight, Herod shrieks, "Kill that woman!" The soldiers rush upon Salome and crush her under their shields.

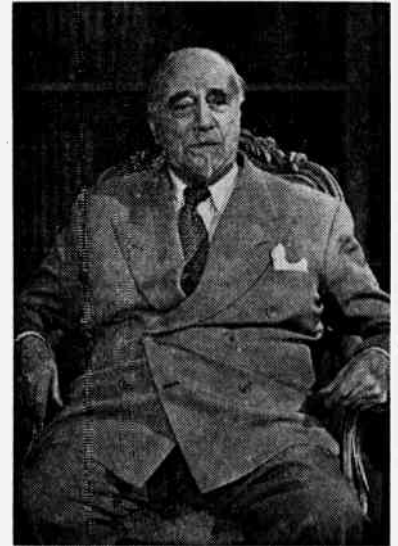

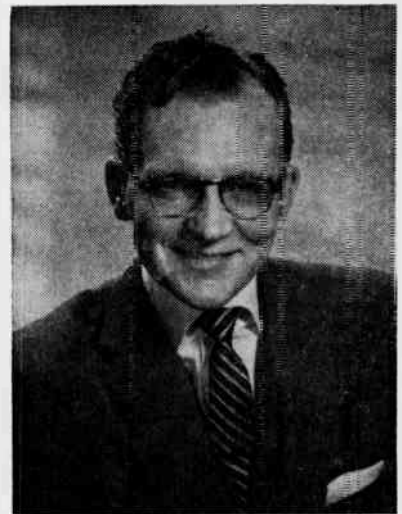

CABBAGE ROLLS

- 2 medium cabbages
- 1 lb. minced beef or pork
and beef
- 1 large minced onion
- 2 cups rice (washed)
- 1 cup cold water
- Salt and pepper to taste

Remove heart of cabbage with sharp knife. Put into kettle and pour enough boiling water over it to cover. Let stand about 15 minutes. Remove from water and take leaves off head. Trim the coarse vein down the centre of each leaf. Return to hot water until ready to fill.

Mix all other ingredients well. Fill each leaf with one heaping tablespoon of filling and fold over, envelope fashion. Put into pressure cooker filling to $\frac{3}{4}$ full, then add 2 cups of water or 1 tin tomatoes and 1 tablespoon salt. Cook 15 minutes. Serve with chili sauce.

Cabbage rolls may also be put into a small roaster or casserole and covered with water and salt. Cook in slow oven 275° for about 2 hours. When not using tomatoes, 2 tablespoons of vinegar may be added during cooking period.

Electronic Music:

Versatile but Controversial Form of Expression

ABOUT 12 YEARS ago a new type of composed sound electronically produced broke with centuries of musical tradition. The almost unlimited possibilities in its tonal spectrum indicate that it will become an important art form.

Electronic music has a weird, ghostlike sound with a strong element of parody, both intentional and unintentional, which often leaves its listeners uncertain whether they should laugh or cry.

An electronic composer can record a baby's cry, the sound of a waterfall, dishes breaking, a car horn, an insect's buzz, then feed the tapes into a complicated electronic music machine, and then, by means of a keyboard similar to a piano's, the tapes can be speeded up or slowed down to vary pitch, or even played backwards, and volume too can be varied.

The result, a composite of the sounds on many tapes, is then recorded on a single tape, and presto! an electronic composition. Of course it's not as simple in application as that. The composer must also be a bit of a mathematician, electrician, technician—even a solderer—to work with electronic music. But many feel the complications bearable because they enable the composer to reach his audience directly, the way a sculptor or a painter does. Electronic music requires neither conductor nor performer, although an operator, usually the composer, is needed. Because these visual distractions are eliminated, the listener can give the music his undivided attention.

Explorations of the almost unlimited possibilities of this new technique, which can make "music" from just about any sound, are going on in several countries—France, where it's called *musique concrete*; Germany and Italy, where even the original sound sources are usually artificial, too; and the United States.

Two years ago an electronic music studio was set up at the University of Toronto—the first in Canada, second in North America, fifth in the world. The staff is headed by its founder, Dr. Arnold Walter, director of the faculty of music at the university, assisted by musicologists Dr. Myron Schaeffer and Dr. Harry Olneck.

What electronic music is, how it is composed and presented, is pretty confusing to the average layman. In the next two weeks three CBC programs will be devoted to explaining and illustrating some of its whys and hows. Sunday, February 11 John Beckwith's radio series *The World of Music* (CBW and CBK) will offer a talk on electronic music by Dr. Schaeffer and a performance of Schaeffer's *Electronic pieces* and of *Music for the Ballet* by Gassmann.

Tuesday night, February 20, CBC-TV's *The Lively Arts* will consider some of the wonders of electronic music. Discussion by Drs. Walter, Olneck and Schaeffer, and Montreal musicologist Dr. Helmut Blume will centre around why a composer is interested in this type of music, how the complicated electronic machine is used, and what kind of electronic music is being written, with illustrations.

Then Thursday night, February 22, on CBC-TV's *The Nature of Things*, host Lister Sinclair and guests will explain the physics of electronic music, describing the sounds of music and how they are combined and produced by both traditional and electronic instruments.
