Stravinsky at 80 "Finest Ever"

• For sheer merit of achievement, it seems unlikely that the *Festival* production of *Stravinsky at 80* could ever be surpassed. An unprecedented moment in Canadian television, it is surely the finest production ever seen on CBC-TV. Thank you for giving to me and to other admirers of Stravinsky, the genuine thrill of "meeting" him.

I found myself completely won over by this remarkable man who, contrary

to my expectation, seemed all too human and not at all the standoffish *maestro* I had been anticipating. The splendid ovation given him by members of the orchestra following the performance of the *Symphony of Psalms* can only bring to mind the ovation given to another composer-conductor, following a performance of his *Ninth Symphony*.

The depreciators (and their tired labels) of Stravinsky's music can hardly be taken seriously in the light of Nadia Boulanger's commentary. They are indeed "too small" and it is they, rather than the music, who are derivative and sterile in their pronouncements.—J.R.P., Edmonton.

TWO OF CANADA'S most noted symphony orchestras, the Toronto Symphony and the CBC Symphony, are considering amalgamation. Bruce Raymond, program director of the CBC radio networks, and R. W. Finlayson, president of the Toronto Symphony Orchestra Association, have announced that a committee will study the possibility of the two orchestras combining into one group.

The committee is to decide if the proposed amalgamation could still serve the requirements of the TSO's subscription series and tours, the CBC Symphony's radio and television broadcasts, as well as the various other appearances both orchestras are called on to make.

THE FOUNDING of the Red River Settlement and the arrival of Christian missionaries in the valley will be recounted in a program currently being filmed for the *Heritage* religious series. The film will particularly tell the story of Old Kildonan Presbyterian Church in metropolitan Winnipeg, the oldest church west of Ontario. Recently a plaque commemorating the 150th anniversary of the founding of the Red River Settlement was unveiled at the church. The program is tentatively scheduled for showing next April.

Another Winnipeg-produced program will be seen in the *Heritage* series at Christmas. It deals with the Christmas customs of ethnic groups represented in Western Canada.

Alwyn Scott is producer of both programs.

RAINY DAYS should be less of a problem for youngsters on summer vacation—and their mothers—with the advent of daily matinee movies on CBWT Winnipeg and CBXT Edmonton, as well as on many of the CBC-affiliated stations throughout the Prairies.

CBWT and CBXT are showing repeats of features seen previously at night, as well as several movies not yet shown on their stations. Emphasis in selecting films is placed on good family viewing—shows with an interest for all age groups.

"EXCEPTIONAL CHILDREN" can mean those with physical, mental or psychological handicaps, as well as those of unusually high intelligence. Tuesday, July 17, Marjorie McEnaney reports on one of the many projects of the Stothers Exceptional Child Foundation, incorporated six years ago to promote the education and welfare of children requiring special attention.

Mrs. McEnaney visits with Donald Seaton, an itinerant remedial teacher in Ontario under the Stothers Foundation. Mr. Seaton travels with his mobile classroom from school to school, bringing advanced techniques as well as the latest equipment for the furtherance of the exceptional child's education.

WANTED—MORE WRITERS for television and radio.

Recognizing the need to develop creative writers for the broadcasting industry, the CBC and the Canadian Authors' Association have announced formation of a joint consultative committee to study how they might speed development of such writers.

The committee will explore new methods of teaching TV and radio techniques and will attempt to develop proposals for supplementing the CBC's existing programs for encouraging promising young writers and directing their activities into dramatic and documentary broadcasting forms. The committee also will review the question of copyright in published works and the broadcast use of Canadian poetry.

Bill Walker, host of *Parade* now seen Wednesdays on CBC-TV, is doing something this summer he always wanted to do. He is taking a lead role in Winnipeg's current Rainbow Stage production, *Music Man*, which is scheduled to run until July 14 in the open-air theatre at Kildonan Park.

Walker is well-known in Winnipeg not only as a TV emcee, but also as a radio announcer, having had an active career with a private radio station some years ago.

In *Music Man* he plays the irrepressible musical instruments salesman, and he is pictured on our cover against artwork representing some of the "76 trombones" that are the subject of a hit-tune from the musical.

Venture's twin bill

The Story of King Gordon and Canada's Boer War Veterans

IN OCTOBER, 1899, a group of young Canadians—raw, little-trained recruits—set sail from Quebec City for Capetown. They were bound for the South African War (1899-1902). Most of them were in their late 'teens or early twenties, and they wanted to see the world.

They were quickly disillusioned. What they actually faced was hardship, a starvation diet, lack of water, marches of hundreds of miles over some of the most difficult terrain in South Africa, disease and death.

At their 60th reunion, Canadian freelance writer and broadcaster James Bannerman spoke to some of the veterans of the Boer War and recorded their wartime memories. *Venture* presents them on CBC Radio Sunday afternoon in a program called *Soldiers of the Queen*, the first half of a twin bill which will also include the story of King Gordon, a Canadian who served with the United Nations for 11 years and has just retired to work on a book.

Bannerman discovered that most of the adventurous young men who left Canada for the war in

Africa had virtually no training before embarking.

"They were all such gallant old chaps and pretty much of an age—80 or more," Bannerman says, recalling his visit with them in a Toronto hotel where they gathered to reminisce, "but the difference in their apparent age was striking. They looked anywhere from 60 to 100.

"And another thing that struck me forcibly—none of these veterans hesitated to express his patriotic feeling, while veterans of the First and Second World Wars, who probably feel just as strongly patriotic, bend over backwards to disguise it. These fine old boys made me feel that our scale of values has changed."

The story of King Gordon covers his career from the time he joined the U.N. at Lake Success as a section chief in the Human Rights Division, and follows his travels around Korea after the war there had ended, through the Middle East, Cairo in particular, shortly after the Suez crisis, as director of the Information Centre of the U.N., with a territory almost as large as Canada; to New York; finally to the Congo in 1960 for a year during the worst of the troubles, and concludes with his recent retirement as Chief Public Information Officer for technical assistance.

Gordon was born in Winnipeg, grew up there, and was strongly influenced by his father, a Presbyterian clergyman who was also the well-known novelist Ralph Connor, and a firm believer in the League of Nations. Over the years King Gordon was a professor of social ethics at the United Theological College in Montreal, managing editor of the American weekly, *The Nation*, and a broadcaster for the CBC about the United Nations. At present he is doing research in the Congo for the book he is writing on his U.N. activities.

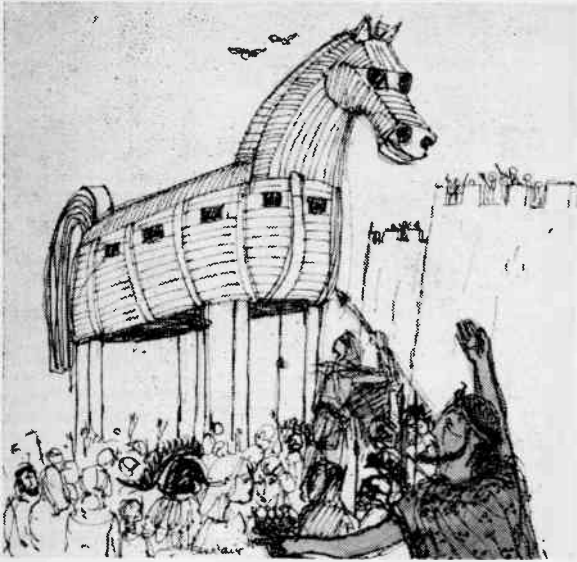

ONE OF THE highlights of the Coventry Cathedral Festival, held last month to mark the consecration of the restored cathedral at Coventry, England, was the world premiere of Michael Tippett's opera, *King Priam*. The performance was tape-recorded and, having been made available through the BBC's transcription service, will be broadcast this week (July 18) as the major item on CBC Wednesday Night.

The opera, produced and directed by Sam Wanamaker, is performed by the Covent Garden Opera Company, conducted by John Pritchard. Heading the cast, as Priam, is bass Forbes Robinson, and others appearing are Marie Collier as his wife, Hecuba; Canadian baritone Victor Godfrey as Hector, their eldest son; Josephine Veasey as Andromache, Hector's wife; John Dobson as Paris, Priam's second son; Margreta Elkins as Helen of Troy; Richard Lewis as Achilles, the Greek hero; and Joseph Ward as his friend Patroclus.

The libretto to *King Priam* was prepared by composer Tippett himself, with some assistance from Peter Brook and Gunther Rennert, and is based on episodes from the *Iliad*. The succession of dramatic events is simple enough: King Priam, warned by a seer that his newborn second son, Paris, will cause disaster if allowed to live, orders the child's execution. But a compassionate guard spares the infant's life. Paris grows up, steals Helen from her husband, and thus brings on the war between the Greeks and the Trojans in which Priam loses his kingdom, his eldest son, and finally his life.

That is the outer story of the opera, but the inner theme—the theme that infuses Tippett's music—concerns tragic destiny and choice. Man is obliged to choose, and although he cannot know the results of his choice, he cannot escape its consequences.

In selecting his material from the *Iliad*, Tippett has been careful to discard everything, however tempting from the dramatic or operatic viewpoint,

that strays from the destiny-choice theme. Neither is he anxious that listeners be too well acquainted with the original legend. Writing in the BBC's *Radio Times*, he explained this point, and discussed his conception of the opera's basic theme.

"It is important that no audience shall be expected to know more of the traditional epic than is clearly presented in *this* opera on the stage. You need know nothing more of the story of Troy than we all know (even when we are unaware of knowing it), just because the story has haunted the European imagination for over 2,000 years. The opera is not a description of the Trojan War, nor of the love between Paris and Helen. It is concerned with the mysterious nature of human choice—choice which we may make honourably, but which may lead us into immeasurable difficulties and into tragic consequences because we don't know enough. Perhaps, indeed, the nature of the world is that we *can't* know enough.

"In the first and crucial scene of the opera King Priam has to choose whether or not he should kill Paris. The whole tragedy, as I conceive it, comes from the fact that Priam makes the honourable choice (to have the child killed) which he, as a young king, had to make at the time. Other problems of choice contribute to the inevitable catastrophe, especially those which confront Paris; and already behind Paris's questioning as to what he will do lies the deeper question as to whether, in human destiny, there is a choice at all.

The turning point in the opera is the death of Priam's beloved son, Hector. It drives him to a final self-confrontation from which the only issue is death.

The moment Priam dies the opera ends with an edge as sharp as the sword that cuts his body. All that is left are a few curious sounds which might express *our* inward tears."

King Priam is Tippett's second opera, and in style it is completely unlike his first, *The Midsummer Marriage*, which was completed seven years ago. Tippett follows no particular "school" of composition. In the words of British critic Peter Heyworth "he is a totally isolated figure in contemporary music, quite unconcerned with all its tides and currents. There are no smart or up-to-date clichés in his music, and that is part of its strength, for when Tippett brings something off the result has a wonderful freshness and individuality."

Born in 1905 of Cornish stock, Tippett spent the first 15 years of his life in a small Suffolk village where his only musical education was a weekly piano lesson. At the age of 18, he entered the Royal College of Music where he studied composition under Charles Wood and R. O. Morris, and conducting under Sir Adrian Boult and Sir Malcolm Sargent.

After leaving the College he trained and conducted amateur choirs, taught French in a private school, and held down a number of other jobs to

their prime. Caruso, Nijinsky and Casals were electrifying audiences, and electric cars and Stanley Steamers were becoming increasingly popular. Some of their selections are:

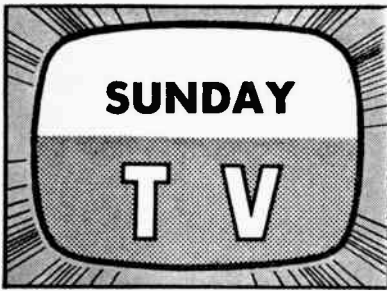

make ends meet. Then, after conducting (and shuddering through) a concert of his own music in 1930, he scrapped everything he had written, including a symphony and several sizeable choral pieces, and went back to the College, where he sweated away for another 18 months. He says that he didn't really find his feet as a composer until he was 30.

Aside from his first opera, Tippett's most widely-known major work to date has been a cantata, *A Child of Our Time*, which dealt with racial persecution in Central Europe. It reflected Tippett's personal involvement in events around him, and was the result of powerful convictions—convictions which caused him to take a stand against conscription in 1939 and spend three months in jail as a conscientious objector. Besides being a prolific composer, Tippett is a scholar and an authority on music of the Restoration period.

King Priam has been added to the repertoire of the Covent Garden Opera Company and, following its presentation at Coventry, it was performed a number of times last month at the company's home opera house in London.

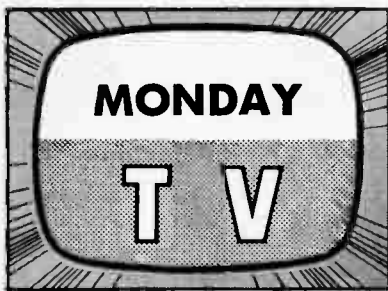
Nannie concerns an elderly nursemaid, bed-ridden in the home of her former charge, now a country vicar. The Rev. Phillip Mitchell (Donald Houston) has brought Nannie there after the death of his parents and his brother, David, in the Second World War. David was also brought up by Nannie. As she grows older, Nannie becomes something of a trial to Phillip's wife, Mary (played by Jill Balcon). The poor old dear constantly bemoans to Phillip that she has no living relative left, and is all alone in the world.

Unexpectedly one evening a letter arrives at the vicarage from a young man in South America, enquiring about Nannie, and claiming that she is

his great-aunt. A few hours later, the writer of the letter, Harry Dumont (played by Tom Criddle) arrives in person. Phillip warns him that Nannie is growing more difficult every day, and takes him upstairs to see her. It is a changed Nannie they find—she has combed her hair and straightened her bed. She smiles at Harry and gives the impression that she knew he was coming.

From then on Nannie seems different, but there is something strange about her. Mary notices it more than Phillip, and she is greatly disturbed when Harry, now almost constantly at Nannie's bedside, uses words and pet names that only an intimate member of the family could know. The mystery continues to deepen, and comes to a shocking climax calculated to leave the viewer breathless.

M. Charles Cohen originally wrote *The Big Deal* as a TV play. It was seen in January, 1961, on *General Motors Presents*. Herbie, a fast-talking office clerk and a little guy in the general scheme of things, has long cherished a dream of making a fortune through real estate, and has been waiting for a "big deal" to change his life and put him on easy street. When it arrives—when he is taken in as a partner by a tycoon—his best pals, Julie and Solly, desert him. He begins to sit back and think, and decides to go it alone.

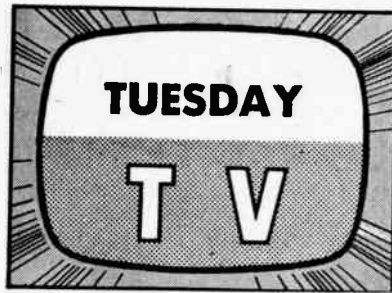

If you are called on to save the life of a drowning victim . . .

HERE'S HOW

A DROWNING PERSON will take a frenzied, desperate grip on anything, and if it happens to be you and you don't know the principles of release and rescue there could easily be two fatalities. How this can be avoided, or dealt with if it does occur, will be discussed Friday night on CBC radio's new series *Here's How*, a report on how Canadian high school students are spending the summer.

The program will include interviews with swimming instructors and lifeguards at waterfronts, summer camps, and civic tanks, who are mostly teenagers. They will tell how they are trained, how they take their responsibilities, and how they react in an emergency.

The Canadian Red Cross recommends two artificial respiration methods in particular: the direct mouth-to-mouth (or mouth-to-nose) which it adopted in 1960, and the Holger-Nielsen, a basic manual technique. These will be discussed on the show, but there will not be time for a thorough description of them, so details are included below.

Mouth-to-Mouth: The advantage of this method is that rescue breathing can be started while bringing the victim to shore, can be applied while the rescuer is standing or kneeling in the water, leaning over the edge of a boat or swimming pool, and can be continued while moving the victim to a suitable spot for further treatment.

First step is to place the victim on his back. If his chest fails to rise, sweep your fingers through his throat to clear the mouth of foreign objects and straighten the tongue. Lift his neck and tilt his head *fully* back—half way is not enough. Maintain this position with the heel of your hand on his forehead.

Open his mouth, pull his chin down, and pinch his nostrils shut. Then seal your own lips around his mouth and blow air into his mouth. Watch for his chest to rise.

If his jaw locks, hold his lips closed and blow into his nose. Remove your mouth and release his nostrils. Repeat blowing in and releasing nostrils continuously, 12 to 18 times per minute. Watch for chest to fall.

Listen for snoring, a sign of obstruction. Press his abdomen if air causes it to bulge. If fluid is present, drain it from the victim's mouth between rescue breaths, by placing his shoulder over your knee to raise his chest, and press over his abdomen.

For infants and children: cover entire mouth and nose with your mouth, and use small puffs up to 20

times per minute. The important things are to start immediately, and *not to give up*. Continue until normal breathing is restored.

Holger-Nielsen: Place the victim face down, stretched out. Bend his elbows and place his hands one on the other; turn his face to one side and rest his cheek on his hands.

Kneel on either your right or left knee at his head, facing him. Place your knee at the side of his head, close to the forearm. Place your opposite foot near his elbow.

If it is more comfortable, kneel on both knees, one on either side of his head. Place your hands on the flat of his back in such a way that the heels of your palms lie just below a line running between his armpits.

With the tips of your thumbs just touching, spread your fingers downward and outward. Rock forward until your arms are approximately vertical, and allow the weight of the upper part of your body to exert slow, steady, even pressure downward upon your

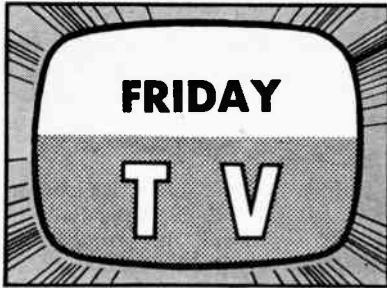
hands. This forces air out of the victim's lungs. Your elbows should be kept straight and the pressure exerted almost directly downward on the back.

Release the pressure, avoiding a final thrust, and begin to rock slowly backward. Place your hands on the victim's arms just above his elbows. Draw his arms upward and toward you. Apply just enough lift to feel resistance and tension at his shoulders. Do not bend your elbows, and as you rock backward the victim's arms will be drawn toward you. Then drop the arms to the ground. This completes the full cycle.

The arm lift expands the chest by pulling on the chest muscles, arching the back and relieving the weight on the chest.

The cycle should be repeated 12 times per minute at a steady, uniform rate. The compression and expansion phases should occupy about equal time, the release periods being of minimum duration.

A smooth rhythm in performing artificial respiration is desirable, but split-second timing is not essential. The victim should stay lying down until a doctor arrives or until recovery is absolutely assured.

THE WORLD'S GREATEST tennis players come from Australia. There doesn't seem to be any doubt about this. All semi-finalists in this year's Wimbledon, the premiere event in amateur tennis, were Australians.

Australian domination of tennis has continued despite constant raiding by Jack Kramer's professional troupe. Kramer, who is no longer active as a promoter, plucked many fine stars such as Lew Hoad, Ken Rosewall, Frank Sedgman, Rex Hartwig, Ashley Cooper, and Mal Anderson. Kramer's raids undoubtedly hurt amateur tennis.

Not only was he grabbing off the top Australian players to such an extent that his tours were banned from Australian Lawn Tennis Association courts, he also nipped in to professionalize United States' players Tony Trabert, Earl Bucholz and many others.

What Kramer did was deplete the amateur ranks of its top stars so that he could then pressure for open tournaments. Big shows, such as Wimbledon and Forest Hills, would be opened to professional and amateur alike.

He almost succeeded. Had he done so, I believe he would have continued to operate his professional tours. However, he couldn't swing some of the big tennis powers to his way of thinking.

There were a couple of exceptions. England was one.

This year's Wimbledon may be the last exclusively amateur. Next year the pros may be taking part.

Some of the outstanding matches from this year's Wimbledon, featuring Australian stars Rod Laver and Neale Fraser, will be telecast on

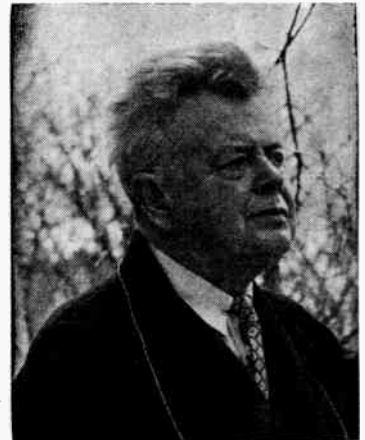

The Many Faces of JAZZ



"TOO MANY misinterpret jazz without giving it a chance. They pigeon-hole it as loud, raucous, strictly for the young or off-beat. It started with one face, a sad one. Now it has many, striking all kinds of moods, and some of it is pretty close to classical music. There's jazz to suit just about everybody, if they'll just listen with an attentive ear," says Ron Rully, a leading Canadian jazz drummer and composer. And he'll try to prove it on CBC radio's *Cue for a Combo* in a series of four programs called *The Many Faces of Jazz*.

The first of them will be heard Tuesday night, July 17, with production by Arlene Mead. Each show will feature a different group of musicians and will concentrate on a specific facet of jazz, which Rully and announcer Bruce Marsh will discuss in an informal conversation. Discussion will be illustrated by the group, with selections, some of them Rully's own compositions.

The first program explores the Afro-Cuban influence on jazz. The instrumental group includes Dick Smith on congo drums and bongos, Ed Bickert on guitar, Wray Downes on piano, Bill Britto on bass, and Ron Rully on drums.

Rully points out that Afro-Cuban jazz was introduced to North America by immigrants from Cuba, Puerto Rico and other West Indian places, whose ancestors had brought their complex rhythms from Africa. This new, exciting beat was first heard on this continent in New York, Los Angeles and other major U.S. cities in the early 1940's, and then jazz musicians such as Dizzie Gillespie and Stan Kenton took it over and spread its popularity across the country through radio, recordings and TV performances. The rhumba and the mambo are two of the most popular developments of the rhythm.

The influence of Afro-Cuban music on jazz has been considerable—a good influence, Rully feels, because it offers the jazz soloist more complex rhythms to highlight his own technique, and gives him a completely new dimension to work in.

As an example, he and the group will play Dizzie Gillespie's *Night in Tunisia*. In contrast they play *Solar*, to show that a tune written in the standard jazz medium can be given an Afro-Cuban treatment, but the result won't have quite the authentic feeling of music written originally in Afro-Cuban tempo.

The group will also play *Old Devil Moon*, with and without Afro-Cuban beat, so listeners not too familiar with this tantalizing rhythm can savour the different flavour it lends to a familiar piece of music.

The foundation of various styles of jazz is Dixieland, which Rully discusses in the second show, on August 7. He points out that Dixieland is close to brass band tradition, but it is rarely arranged. It gives the performer lots of scope because he can improvise freely, although each instrument has specific parts in the combined effect. The trumpet leads the melody. The clarinet weaves the second part around it, the trombone comes in with bass harmonies, and the rhythm section provides a steady pulse beneath the horns. Rully and the boys play an example.

Although Dixieland isn't written down, most of its melodies, Rully says, have a standardized outline which every musician recognizes as the framework on which he can build his sound. In spite of modern influences, especially in the rhythm section, and in the extra notes the trombone plays, it's still easy for even those who aren't jazz buffs to recognize Dixie-

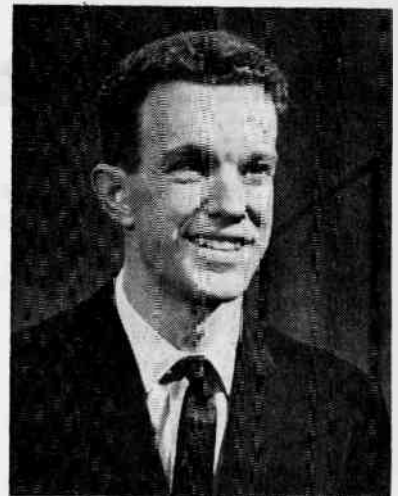

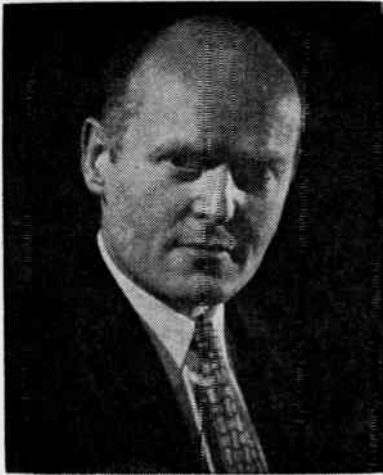

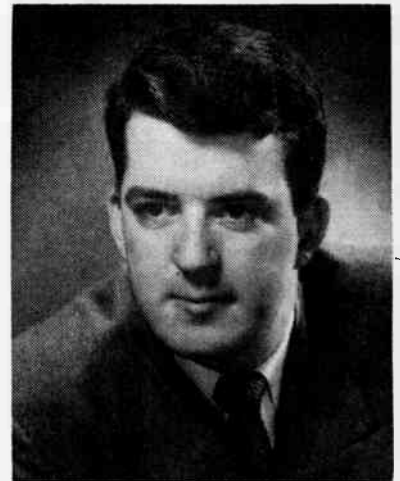

land. The groups illustrate this with a performance of *The Saints*.

The third show, on August 28, will investigate aspects of modern jazz; and the fourth, on September 18, will look at some of today's latest jazz innovations.

Rully is Toronto-born and educated. He's been playing drums since he was 14, everything from contemporary music with jazz and symphony orchestras to way-out jazz with small combos. Four years ago he began to study composition.

Phil Nimmons' and Ron Collier's groups have played his compositions and Moe Koffman has recorded some of his songs.

Rully isn't interested in sticking to jazz composition exclusively. He wants to branch out into other types of music.

"Right now," he says, "I'm composing material to store up as a back-log—it's very contemporary, not really far-out music, just beautiful, understandable music."

"I'm trying to compose in a more realistic style than the abstract fashion I've become known for—I'm aiming at wholesome music that's more for today than tomorrow. I think there's so much abstract stuff around these days that we need something more melodic, need to take a cue from the old schools of music and aim at simple and pure note combinations. I just hope I can reach it with my abstract mind."

Friday on Radio International, noted Russian composer Sviatoslav Richter is honoured in a special broadcast prepared by USSR Radio. Helmut Blume introduces the segment, which is the final feature of this week's program.

CHORAL MUSIC

The Choristers of Winnipeg are featured Thursday night on CBC Radio's "Choral Music," singing *Three Motets* by Bernard Naylor and *Rejoice in the Lamb* by Benjamin Britten. Producer Benjamin Harch comments on the performance.

BERNARD NAYLOR'S *Three Motets* had their first complete public performance at a recent University of Manitoba concert with the composer conducting. At that time, he addressed the audience briefly and suggested that the music needed no explanation. "I wrote the motets," said he, "because I thought the poetry to be extremely beautiful, and I trust that this will be reflected in the music."

Each one of the poems—by medieval poets—expresses some aspect of worship—adoration, praise, etc.—concerning events from the Easter story including the Crucifixion and the Ascension.

The motets are all for double chorus and demonstrates shifting weights of the choral mass from one to the other.

In the first one, one chorus vies antiphonally with solo voices and quartet from the other in adoration and praise of the "Crown of Thorns" (*De Corona Spinea*).

The second, *Sequentina Paschalis* (Easter Sequence) is an exhortation of praise to the Paschal Lamb for a redemption provided for "the lost ones, through Jesus the Advocate." Also for double chorus, the choral mass alternates between a male chorus and a ladies' chorus exploring an antiphonal response in contrast to the first.

The third, *In Ascensione Domini* (The Ascension) is an apocalyptic shout of hallelujahs to "Jesus, God gone up on high today . . ." This last motet integrates the double chorus into a solid choral mass achieved in strict eight-part writing with minimal attention to antiphonal effect.

Radio audiences will have to visualize the antiphonal dimension for the *Three Motets* which are only really "live" in public performance; hence the explanation concerning shifting choral masses. These are by no means as distinct in a radio performance.

Britten's predisposition for out-of-the-way poets and experimental poetic design may be responsible for the choice of Christopher Smart's *Rejoice in the Lamb*. The poem was written while Smart was an inmate of an asylum and it is replete with a cloudy, mystical religiosity, reminiscent of Blake's visionary poetry.

Britten's *Festival Cantata* for mixed chorus, soloists and organ is based on Smart's poem and consists of ten short sections, of which the quaintest is the fourth, dealing with the poet's cat Jeffrey. This section's feline nature is skilfully reflected in a sensuous motif in the right-hand stave of the organ part. In the ninth section the chorus endeavours to characterize the sonorous properties of instruments. In addition, there are several sections for four soloists and even a quasi recitative for the whole chorus—one of the most original passages in the Cantata, which abounds in delightful detail and excels in unusual rhythmic combinations, but on the whole, suffers somewhat from the text's lack of coherence.

SAUL ILSON:

Variety Show Writing's Not as Easy as it Looks

CREDIT LINES signing off CBC-TV's *Parade* and *A Summer Night* shows read: "Writer—Saul Ilson." Yet the shows may have only a dozen lines of dialogue.

The viewer cannot be blamed for saying, "I could do that! What do they need a writer for?"

This sort of comment produces a moan from Saul Ilson. It is the moan of a misunderstood man. In a drama, the title "writer" describes the man who writes the dialogue. But it would take about four lines on a TV screen to cover the activities of a variety writer. In the case of Saul Ilson, the credit line should read: composer, lyricist, gag man, dialogue writer, concertmaster, researcher, writer of visual effects and idea man for staging, sets, costumes and props.

A TV show starts as a mental film strip with Ilson, with different frames denoting different sequences

in the show. As the show develops he "edits" the picture in his mind, gradually changing it, adding and deleting, until the final version appears on the TV screen.

As plans develop in his mind, he writes them down in script form—everything from dialogue to suggested sets and camera angles. Sometimes he writes up to two pages on the visual effects alone.

Ideas are discussed with the producer, then passed on in production meetings to the set designer, costume designer, props men and technicians who develop them into their final form.

Ilson also selects music for each show. Here, his mind houses a veritable catalogue of tunes. His phenomenal memory for unusual and obscure songs is tapped when he wants what he calls a "material" song—one that can be adapted to a specific story.

When his memory lets him down, he either makes up new lyrics for a popular tune, or writes a whole new set of words and music to fit the situation.

Ilson got into showbusiness through producing, directing and writing a youth association revue in his native Montreal. His break came in 1957 when CBC producer Norman Campbell liked his idea for a musical, *Ring Around the Square*, and produced it with Shirley Harmer and Shane Rimmer as stars. Since then he has written *Showtime*, *Barris Beat* and several other CBC-TV shows.

The 29-year-old Ilson averages a 12-hour working day between office, home and studio. He sometimes writes two shows a week. Occasionally he finds time to go down to the United States to write a TV special. To date he has worked on a total of nine specials, including two each for Dinah Shore, Bing Crosby and Pat Boone, and one for Robert Goulet.

"In the States," says Ilson, "writing is slightly different. Each show has at least two or three writers who are given four weeks to prepare the show. The writers work closely together, tossing ideas back and forth for size, but each man has some specialty. One may write songs, another gags and another dialogue. I'm considered the song-writing specialist down there."

Though he enjoys working with other writers and appreciates the idea-tossing system, he finds writing for *Parade* more challenging.

"It is the most stimulating show ever for a writer," he says. "It is complete variety. Every program is so diversified, so different from the one before."
