Tour Hollywood With Arthur Godfrey

HOLLYWOOD TODAY may not be quite the glittering make-believe world it was in the 1920s, '30s and '40s, when it was the hub of the mass-entertainment media, but it's still an interesting place to visit, particularly if one can get behind the scenes at the studios. That opportunity presents itself this week on CBC television, when U.S. radio and TV personality Arthur Godfrey serves as the guide for a tour of the film capital on *Arthur Godfrey in Hollywood*. The hour-long program will be seen on Monday, November 5, pre-empting *The Garry Moore Show* on this occasion.

During the show, viewers will be introduced to many performers they may know by voice, if not by sight or name. They include Jerry Hausner, a veteran character actor whose special talent is his ability to imitate the crying of a baby; June Foray, who has supplied voices for many cartoon characters and whose *forte* is producing blood-curdling screams; and Loulie Jean Norman, a soprano who has been heard as the sound-track singing voice of numerous motion picture stars.

Comedian Pat Buttram, who was cowboy star Gene Autry's comic side-kick for many years, will make a guest appearance on the show, as will young recording artists Lori and Lee, who will accompany Godfrey on a stroll along Hollywood Boulevard's Walk of Fame, where the pavement is studded with plaques bearing the names of past and present film stars, and to the Hollywood Bowl, a magnificent outdoor concert amphitheatre.

The role of sight-seeing guide may be new to Godfrey, but likely it isn't, for in his 59 years he's had almost every job one can imagine, from office boy to business executive, with side trips into coal mining, selling, dog and horse breeding, lumbering, flying, and performing in vaudeville, to name a few of his occupations. The six-foot redhead left home at the age

CBC TELEVISION comes to the Peace River Region this week as two new rebroadcasting transmitters are declared officially on the air.

CBXAT Grande Prairie and CBXAT-1 Peace River are expected to be test-transmitting as this issue reaches the public. They will continue to transmit programs subject to technical adjustment, and it is hoped that regular program service will commence on an uninterrupted basis during the program week covered by this issue.

Both stations will carry video-tapes of programs transmitted earlier by the network, or by CBXT Edmonton.

CBXAT Grande Prairie goes on the air officially November 7, with a half-hour telecast to be seen at 7:00 p.m. CBC Director for the Prairie Provinces, J. R. Finlay, will introduce distinguished guest speakers, including the Hon. J. Percy Page, Lieutenant-Governor of Alberta, and Mr. J. Alphonse Ouimet, President of the CBC. Mr. Ouimet will introduce Alberta Premier Ernest Manning, who will declare the station officially open. Other greetings will be given by The Hon. G. E. Halpenny, Secretary of State, and His Worship George M. Repka, mayor of Grande Prairie. Mr. Finlay will then conclude the opening ceremonies, and the remaining 15 minutes will consist of a filmed panorama of familiar scenes and activities of the area.

CBXAT-1 Peace River receives its official opening November 8. A half-hour telecast on that station at 7.00 p.m. will be similar to that seen at the Grande Prairie opening, except that the messages will include an address by His Worship, Mayor Thor Forseth of Peace River.

As all programming will consist of tapes of earlier telecasts on the network or on CBXT, program notes carried in the CBC Times will not apply to the program schedules printed.

JULIUS "DUKE" NEILSEN, bass fiddle player with Don Messer and His Islanders, will be absent from *Don Messer's Jubilee* on CBC-TV for an indefinite period.

Neilsen, who has played with the Islanders for 28 years, was injured recently when the car in which he and his family were riding was involved in an accident.



Northrop Frye in six radio talks entitled
THE EDUCATED IMAGINATION*

THOSE WHO DON'T know anything about literature, and don't care that they don't, may be ignorant and not mind a bit. But those who explore literature have an extra world to live in which the others never know, a world that titillates all the senses, a world of make believe that can make the real world seem more real.

The aim of literature, says Northrop Frye, Principal of Victoria College, University of Toronto, who has spent 25 years putting his theories about the place of literature and imagination in education into practice, is to present us with "a universe

completely possessed and occupied by human life, a city of which the stars are suburbs. Nobody can believe in any such universe: literature is not religion, and it doesn't address itself to belief. But if we shut the vision of it completely out of our minds, or insist on its being limited in various ways, something goes dead inside us, perhaps the one thing that it's really important to keep alive.

"Literature, we're told, is one of the arts, along with painting and music, and, after you've looked up all the hard words and the classical allusions . . . what you use in understanding it, or so you've been told, is your imagination."

In a series of six radio talks, *The Massey Lectures* for 1962, Frye will explore the world of *The Educated Imagination*. He will consider the relation of

MOROCCO

HOPE in the Midst of POVERTY

HERBERT STEINHOUSE, who produced the two-hour study of Spain for *CBC Radio International* earlier this fall, has prepared two more documentaries: one on Morocco, the other on France. Each is 55 minutes in length and the first one, entitled *Morocco—Poverty and Hopes*, will be heard on this week's *CBC Wednesday Night* at 8.05 p.m.

Why a program on Morocco? First, a study of this nation, which has now experienced six years of independence, does provide some clues to the future of neighbouring Algeria, whose leaders have learnt much from Morocco's successes and mistakes. Indeed, hundreds of Algerians have been working in the Moroccan administration in the past few years, gaining valuable experience before returning to key positions in their own, now-independent country.

Second, of all the underdeveloped nations, Morocco is one of the most interesting because, paradoxically, it is one of the most developed. Although it is suffering from a population explosion and the effects of colonial exploitation, it is not young in the same sense that the majority of new African and Asian nations are young.

Morocco is an old and proud land. There is a misty legend that the earliest Berbers were sur-


Development continues at a slow but measurable pace in Morocco. The country is visited by *CBC Radio Wednesday*, in a documentary by Herbert Steinhouse.

vivors of the lost continent of Atlantis. The Phoenicians founded settlements such as present-day Mogador. The Romans settled in Rabat and created the rich city of Volubilis, once the southwestern outpost of their empire, now the centre of archeological excavations which may unearth glories rivalling those of Pompeii. Out of the Arab kingdoms that were founded in the eighth century came the conquerors of all North Africa and most of Spain. Marrakesh was the Baghdad of the west. The Karuein University at Fez was founded in 859 and is considered the world's oldest.

As early as the 15th century, Morocco became the target of European colonialists. The country gradually descended into chaos and disorder until, in 1912, it became a Protectorate of France and Spain. But it was still a proud land, and the foreign troops did not complete their conquest until 1934. However, in the early '30's, a nationalist movement had been born in Fez and, in 1956, Morocco finally achieved or, rather, regained full independence.

Today, Morocco has a population of about 12 millions and has inherited immense problems from its colonial past. The nation must run; there is no time to learn to walk. The population is expected to double in 35 years and triple in 50 years. Each year, an extra 200,000 mouths scream their hunger

CHRISTIAN FRONTIERS:

How Does Christianity Compare?

How Christianity relates to other religions is investigated in a series of programs this month

AN EXERCISE IN UNDERSTANDING is the title of a series of five broadcast lectures to be given during November by the Right Reverend Stephen Neill, as part of the *Christian Frontiers* series (Thursday nights at 10.30 on radio). Bishop Neill will explore how the Christian religion relates to other religions, using the "dialogue method" to elicit and criticize the concepts of religion held by Christians and others.

In the broadcast of November 1st, he introduces the idea of dialogue, which he defines as "an opening of yourself to the other person in a desperate concern for the truth." If one side is closed, the result can be only propaganda, but, on the other hand, dialogue does not mean compromise. Bishop Neill suggests that for our century the proper way for Christians to approach other religions is through dialogue, as "an adventure in understanding".

He sketches the two common responses of Christianity to the question, of non-Christian belief, the first typified by Clement of Alexandria (circa 150-215 A.D.) who gives a broad "yes" to other religions, affirming that what was good in them was a preparation for Jesus Christ, and the other stated by Tertullian (circa 160-220 A.D.) representing the firm "no" in his question "What has Jerusalem to do with Athens?"

In the first broadcast Bishop Neill also points out that the problem of living with other religions is no longer an academic exercise, but a practical matter, now that fairly large numbers of Canadians are visiting or living in countries in which religions other than Christianity are predominant, and natives of those countries are coming to Canada for education and training.

The broadcast of November 8th deals with Christianity and Islam. This lecture was listened to by some Arab Christians, who urgently asked to be permitted to broadcast it in the Middle East, because it was assessed by them to be the fairest and most fruitful exposition of what both faiths hold in common, where they differ, and in what way the dialogue method can most profitably be conducted.

Hinduism and Christianity will be discussed on November 15th. The historical setting is sketched and we are reminded that the Rig Veda—the oldest of Hindu scriptures—is contemporary with the age of Homer and the Song of Deborah in the Old Testament. Bishop Neill chooses three things common to the six different philosophical systems of Hinduism: the fact of caste; the idea of *karma*—the ethical concept that you act and you pay; the idea of the fundamental unity of all being.

Buddhism will be the subject on November 22. The history of its founder, who lived from 563 to 483 B.C.—at the same time as the first stirrings of Greek philosophy and the prophetic era of Old Testament times—shows that both Buddhism and Christianity look back to an historic founder. Bishop Neill considers Gautama (Buddha, meaning "enlightened one", was his title) to have been one of the most attractive founders of a religion who ever lived. Both religions are missionary religions, and both have been shut out from their original homes.

The last program, November 29, deals with religions of primitive peoples who form about 40 per cent of the world's population. These primitive religions have no written records, but Bishop Neill discusses the common idea of life seen as one totality of existence: a man is himself, his family, his clan, his animals and his spirit. Two other common concepts are the sense of community and the life force. Bishop Neill looks at the five forces striving for man's allegiance in Africa: the old African world; sheer materialism; Marxism; Islam, as the religion of the black man; Christianity.

Bishop Stephen Neill is a graduate of Cambridge University, where he won first class honors in classics and theology. He lived for 23 years in India, where he was elected Bishop of Tinnevely by an electoral body 97 per cent Indian. He has served on the staff of the World Council of Churches in Geneva, and is known to a generation of Canadian university students through his lectures and missions. At present he is on the staff of the University of Hamburg, Germany.

FESTIVAL:

W. O. Mitchell's *First* Drama

W. O. MITCHELL, well-known Canadian novelist and playwright, who received the 1962 Leacock Medal for Humour, and whose second full-length novel, *The Kite*, was published this fall, wrote the first of his many dramas back in 1948. Titled *The Devil's Instrument*, it was presented on CBC Radio's *Stage* series early in 1949, and was repeated five years later. Its highly favourable reception paved the way for the outstanding success of his *Jake and the Kid* scripts for radio and TV. Now Mitchell has adapted the play for CBC's TV *Festival*. Eric Till will produce it on Monday night, November 5.

In a way that has become his trademark, Mitchell treats his unusual plot in imaginative, poetic style, skilfully blending tenderness, tight-lipped tragedy and humour. The setting is a bleak Hutterite community in southern Alberta, but the story has a wider application to humanity in general, with its taboos and tyrannies artfully hidden under the cloak of morality.

The central theme of the play is "sin." The hero is Jacob, a youth of 16 who dares to challenge the rigorous puritanism of his elders by indulging in simple pleasures like listening to the radio, smoking, and playing a mouth organ given to him by a stranger whom the strict, bearded bosses of the community farm consider to have Satanic leanings. Jacob cannot resist this "instrument of the devil" any more than he can resist having secret meetings with Marta, the girl he loves and wants to marry. It's a tale of human conflict, of youth battling age and custom, and of the relentless creed in which the boy, on fire with the new excitement of music, is imprisoned.

Douglas Rain appears as Jacob, John Drainie as Peter, Ron Hartmann as Darius, Robert Christie as the Oats and Barley Boss, Ingi Bergman as Marta, Peter Mews as the Preacher, George Chow as Wong, Alice Hill as Marta's Mother, and Alexander Webster as Jake.

As an advertising salesman and later as a school teacher in Alberta, Mitchell had many opportunities to meet and observe Hutterites in several communities. In one of them he heard the story of a young man, said to have been one of the few Hutterites ever to have broken away from the authority of the patriarchs. Mitchell based his play on that story.

Reviewing its first performance in CBC Radio's *Critically Speaking* series, Robert L. McDougall describes it as "one of the best things that has been done on the *Stage* series for a long time. The workmanship was of excellent quality. The Hutterite setting was interesting and vividly realized, and consequently the play's statement came across with an authentic ring to it. Yet, at the same time, there were enough universal attributes of character threaded into the script to prompt the listener to extend the application from the Hutterite puritanism to puritanism of this sort wherever it is to be found. I liked the insight into character shown; I liked the easy flexibility and variety of dialogue; and I liked the impression I had of light touch, of the flair for pleasant subtlety, and of the sharp eye for revealing detail, alike in setting and in incident."

Mitchell is a native of Weyburn, Sask., who, after some years in Toronto, settled at High River, Alta., where he divides his time amongst writing, restoring period furniture, riding and dry fly fishing.

Western Canadian playwright W. O. (Bill) Mitchell made his start with a skilled drama, *The Devil's Instrument*, presented on CBC *Stage* in 1949. Now he has adapted it for presentation November 5 on *Festival*.

Fittingly, another Westerner, Douglas Rain, takes the lead role as a young Hutterite who cannot resist the "worldly" pleasure of playing a musical instrument.

U.S. Election Coverage

ON NOVEMBER 6, United States voters will go to the polls to elect a new House of Representatives, 39 senators, 35 state governors, and many other officials. CBC Radio and Television networks will provide extensive coverage of the election results on Tuesday night. (See schedules in this issue for details.)

Although he is not, of course, running in the forthcoming election, President Kennedy has been barnstorming energetically on behalf of his party, speaking at huge gatherings in large cities and to tiny groups in small villages. This has been an unprecedented move on the President's part, for in the past, presidents have usually not involved themselves deeply in the so-called "off-year elections." And the record shows that the voters' party preferences in the mid-term elections usually run diametrically opposite to their presidential choice of two years earlier. Only once in this century has a president's party improved its standing in Congress in the off-year elections; in fact, since 1930, the party in power at any one time has lost an average of

39 House seats and five Senate seats in each such election.

When Congress was adjourned in mid-October, the standings in its two branches were as follows: in the House of Representatives, Democrats 261, Republicans 174, with two seats vacant; in the Senate, Democrats 64, Republicans 36, no seats vacant. Under the traditional two-party system in the United States there are no independent members, nor any adherents of a third party. All the states but one have two-chamber legislatures which are, in effect, smaller copies of the Congress, with the state governors serving as chief executives. In the forthcoming elections, 35 governorships are at stake; the remaining 15 will not be contested since the terms of office of the present incumbents are not yet completed.

The number of seats in the House of Representatives is fixed by law at 435. (The discrepancy between this figure and that noted above is due to the fact that two extra seats were established temporarily when Alaska and Hawaii achieved statehood.) The number of representatives that each state may elect is allotted on the basis of comparative


Alan Tasker Organizes CBW School Broadcasts

population figures as determined in the census which is taken every 10 years, but each state is guaranteed a minimum of one representative, regardless of its population. Representatives serve a two-year term in the House.

The Senate is composed of two representatives from each state, regardless of state population, for a present total of 100 seats. Each Senator serves for a six-year term, but elections are held on a rotating basis, with roughly one third of the seats falling vacant every two years, thus ensuring that any one election can have only a limited effect on the membership of the Senate. In the forthcoming election, 39 seats are to be contested. Members of Congress elected in November take office when Congress convenes on the following January 3.

An American election campaign begins many months before election day, which is designated as the Tuesday after the first Wednesday in November. One of the first steps is to replenish the treasury of each party, in preparation for the enormously expensive business of running campaigns. Fund-

raising rallies often serve as opportunities for potential candidates to test their popularity, state their opinions, and perhaps win support for later nomination. Next come preliminary elections — called primaries — in the various states, in which voters directly nominate for office the candidates of their own party. Primaries, intended to give rank-and-file party supporters a voice in choosing the party's standard-bearer for the November general election, are a comparatively recent phenomenon, dating in most cases from the early years of the present century. The winner of a primary election contest for a Senate or House seat, or for a governorship or other state office, then becomes the official candidate of the party, with its full support and backing.

In some states that are traditionally "one-party" — that is, where there is an overwhelming majority of either Democrats or Republicans — victory in a primary election is a virtual assurance of final success in November. In fact, in a few states the primary is the only real contest that takes place. Following the primaries come the intensive vote-getting campaigns in which the selected candidates appeal for the support of the general public, culminating on the vital day in November.

English as the mother tongue to English as literature, the social value of the study of literature, and what an education in literature, based on its nature and development, should be like. He will discuss the play on the imagination that literature addresses itself to in the learning process, and describe the different ways we use language, distinguishing between art and science on one hand, and art and religion on the other. *The Educated Imagination* will be heard Sunday nights at 10.30, beginning November 4. Program organizer for the series is Robert McCormack.

"We have three levels of the mind, and a language for each of them, which, in English-speaking societies, means an English for each of them," Frye says. "There's the level of consciousness and awareness, where the most important thing is the difference between me and everything else. The English of this level is the English of ordinary conversation, which is mostly monologue, as you'll soon realize if you do a bit of eavesdropping, or listening to yourself. We can call it the language of self-expression. Then there's the level of social participation, the working or technological language of

teachers, preachers, politicians, advertisers, lawyers, journalists and scientists. We call this the language of practical sense. Then there's the level of imagination, which produces the literary language of poems and plays and novels. They're not really different languages, of course, but three different reasons for using words.

"Our emotional reaction to the world varies from 'I like this' to 'I don't like this'. The first is a state of identity, a feeling that everything around us is part of us, and the second is the ordinary state of consciousness, or separation, where art and science begin. Art begins as soon as 'I don't like this' turns into 'This is not the way I could imagine it'.

"At the level of ordinary consciousness the individual man is the centre of everything, surrounded on all sides by what he isn't. At the level of practical sense, or civilization, there's a human circumference, a little cultivated world with a human shape, fenced off from the jungle and inside the sea and the sky. But in the imagination anything goes that can be imagined, and the limit of the imagination is a totally human world. Here we recapture, in full consciousness, that original lost sense of identity with our surroundings, where there is nothing outside the mind of man, or something identical with the mind of man."

of 15, half-way through his second year at high school in New Jersey, and roamed the world doing a variety of jobs, including a four-year stint in the navy and a short period as a cemetery lot salesman. In 1929, while serving in the U.S. Coast Guard, he made his radio debut, singing and playing the banjo (as "Red Godfrey, the Warbling Banjoist") on an amateur show in Baltimore, Md. This led eventually to his being hired as a staff announcer at the station, and his radio career was launched. His popularity grew with the years, and during the 1950s he was one of the busiest performers in show-business, with a schedule of 12 regular radio and television programs a week. His heavy schedule was curtailed a couple of years ago, following a serious illness, but he still does five radio shows a week and stars in a number of TV specials every year.

and the numbers of children to be educated and adults to be employed rise proportionately.

Land reforms and agricultural improvements are needed quickly if the people are to be fed. Capital investment is desperately required to bring about greater industrialization and a consequent increase in the number of jobs available. Both these developments must go hand in hand with literacy campaigns, vast extensions of educational facilities for children and efficient schemes for the provision of administrative and vocational training.

Something must be done for the masses living in slum bidonvilles around the modern cities of Casablanca and Rabat, and for that third of the population whose tribal way of life has continued unchang-

ed despite the introduction into the country by France of modern roads and communications, some industry and much mechanized farming. Morocco has tasted some of the blessings of colonialism, but the unrest to which they give rise is just one more problem in this period of uncertainty as the nation waits impatiently for strong political leadership.

In his efforts to analyse the problems that beset Morocco, Herbert Steinhouse travelled extensively. He gathered material in the modern offices of Casablanca and Rabat and also, with a concealed tape-recorder, in market places in remote villages and in the *souks* of Marrakesh, Fez and Tangier. He spoke to government and opposition leaders, to bankers, trade unionists, artists, teachers and doctors, and to independent observers from the foreign press, the United Nations and the diplomatic corps. His findings provide a glimpse into the

future of this young-old nation and, at the same time, offer a guide to the probable future of Algeria.

Although both Morocco and Algeria were governed by France, there is no direct link between *Morocco—Poverty and Hopes* and *France Looks Ahead*, the other 55 minute documentary by Herbert Steinhouse, to be heard at 8:05 p.m. in the CBC Wednesday Night of November 14.

In his study of France, Steinhouse concentrates on economic and cultural trends rather than on basic political problems. He examines the effect on industry of anticipated participation in the European Common Market. He inquires into the future of French painting, literature and science. He studies

the changes being made in France's educational system.

For centuries, Paris has stood for France. Today, however, there is ample evidence of the increasing importance of the provinces. Industries are being developed in remote areas. Theatre and other cultural groups in provincial cities are becoming increasingly active. Provincial universities are doubling and, in some cases, trebling in size.

Together with decentralization are coming many advances. Industrial and merchandising techniques are being rapidly modernized. It is significant that this "nation of shopkeepers" has developed an internal marketing system more revolutionary than any supermarket or discount store. And, in the field of education, there is even a proposal to provide students with salaries.

'Listening Booth' Features Records from Germany

THIS WEEK *Late Concert's* "Listening Booth" series begins its fourth year of programs featuring the latest serious music record releases in complete performances. *Late Concert* is heard Wednesday nights on CBW and CBK, 11:00 to 12:00 midnight.

Unlike most record review programs heard on the CBC, all the recordings selected for this series are presented in their entirety. The "sampler" type of record review program generally gives pre-eminence to a qualified musical commentator, so allowing only snippets of musical excerpts to be heard for the sake of illustrating the talk. For the "Listening Booth" series however, this procedure is reversed with all commentary subordinated to the complete performance of a specific work.

Commentaries will be directed to point up interesting features regarding the music or its performance. New composers and artists will be presented

to the listeners through brief biographical sketches in addition to the discussion of the music performed.

Record quality may also serve as a point of discussion. In past years the series has served many of our listeners as a kind of glorified shoppers' guide for their own record purchases. This year listeners will be served even better by a new tonal quality approaching that of FM radio. The 5,000 cycle limit that existed on CBC radio prior to October 1 is now extended to 8,000 cycles.

For this season, the "Listening Booth" series represents something of a departure in the matter of label section. One label is to be featured at least once on each program, that of one of Europe's largest recording companies—the Deutsche Gramophon Gesellschaft.

For this year the output of new record releases constitutes a particularly fascinating list by DGG in addition to the famous historical "Archiv" label record research series which we hope to program for some future time. For the present, opera, chamber music, symphonic works of tradition as well as their 20th century counterparts, are generously represented in a long list of opus numbers. Music-making on the more intimate side will be

represented by world-renowned song and instrumental recitalists. The series will cover a period of 25 weeks with hour-long concerts for each program.

Program diversity for the series may be noted as in the following: The Hungarian conductor Ferenc Fricsay directs five symphonies on five separate occasions. In Europe he is recognized as a new kind of talent on the podium largely because he will not subscribe to the traditional role of the conductor in rehearsal. At a rehearsal he will never present the claims or demands of the music by a discussion of it in terms of rhythm, dynamics, *espressivo*, *markati* or even *pizzicatti* and the like. After a careful analysis of the music's emotional and sensory implications he expects his musicians to select, unerringly, the appropriate skill or technique required for its fullest communication in performance. These five concerts, are revealing performances. "They have a spiritual elegance" says Opernwelt, "that lifts them far above mere virtuosity." This is the quality that has become the Alpha and Omega for many of Fricsay's performances on records.

Seven hour-long solo-instrumental recitals are programmed for the series as well. Four of these are by the famous German baritone Dietrich Fischer-Dieskau, and one each by violinist Wolfgang Schneiderhan, pianist Wilhelm Kempff and soprano Rita Streich.

Two additional orchestral programs represent a revival of interest for a conductor who has become something of a legend since his death a few years ago. The legend reflects the genius of a conductor who could make the performance of a symphony

a thing of the moment. A Haydn and a Mozart symphony are offered for the critical assessment of the listener in which the late conductor Wilhelm Furtwangler performs the music as though it were just newly composed.

For many listeners the highlight of the series may well be the Hungarian String Quartet's performance of the six string quartets by Bela Bartok. The programs offer a unique study in derivatives and should serve as a meaningful introduction especially to those listeners hearing them for the first time.

Finally, a group of miscellaneous programs have been added to complete the series in other areas of musical interest.

Noted Bach interpreter Karl Richter makes his recording debut in the performance of two famous classical symphonies. Known particularly for his non-purist approach to the performance of the music of Bach, he is equally free with the so-called traditional approach to the classics.

The noted Hungarian pianist Geza Anda appears in the double role of performer *and* conductor in two concertos by Mozart.

The 150th anniversary of the birth of Franz Liszt is highlighted in a complete performance of the "Graner" Festival Mass and for lovers of pre-revolution Russian choral singing there will be a full hour of Russian songs and choruses with Serge Jaroff and the Don Cossack Choir.

IN VIEW: The Arts in Canada

THE THIRD IN A new series of programs designed to explore the literary culture of our society in all its forms will be seen this Monday, November 5, on CBC Television. Entitled *In View*, the series promises to be a lively and stimulating look at the arts. The half-hour programs are not shown on a regular weekly basis, but appear on those Mondays when *Festival* runs for only an hour rather than 90 minutes. Due to the irregular scheduling, each program will be complete in itself, and there will be no regular "departments" or features carried over through the series.

In View will examine the arts and North American attitudes towards them, calling for comment from guests who are closely associated with the field under discussion. The first program in the series, seen October 15, gave an indication of the form the telecasts will take. The subject then was television and its effect on the world, and the special guest was Sir Harry Pilkington, associated with a recent report on the state of television broadcasting in Britain. Among other topics to be discussed in forthcoming programs are the rise and fall of the magazine business, the "anatomy" of a best-selling book, the tremendous vogue of the paperback novel, status symbols as embodied in "Bunny Girls," key clubs, original art, swimming pools, and other manifestations, and current trends in movies, books, plays and television.

The format of the new series will vary from one program to another, and will be designed to fit the particular subject under examination. One week the program may take the form of a documentary, with much use of film footage; another program may consist almost entirely of interviews, while still another may be made up of panel discussions or combinations of various program techniques. Producer of all the programs in the series will be Don MacPherson, who will work closely in planning the shows with the program's host.

Holding down the latter position will be a man whose past experience and present interests eminently qualify him for the job—Nathan Cohen, entertainment editor and drama critic for the *Toronto Star*, and for 10 years referee and moderator of CBC's *Fighting Words* on radio and television.

Of Cohen, the word "controversial" has been used so often it has become a cliché. He's been variously described as "a back-paddling crab" (by a Nova Scotia minister of mines), an "imitation intellectual" (by a Toronto professor), and as "Canada's only real drama critic" (by Nathan Cohen). His forthright opinions about theatre and his biting criticism have earned him the cordial hatred of many, but combined with the hate is a healthy respect for his high standards and his influence.

Cohen, a large, bulky man who has taken to carrying a gold-headed cane in recent months—Canadian writer Morley Callaghan has described him as "a Dickensian figure"—is said to be an amiable, charming man in private life, and he has an air of slightly bewildered injury when he is attacked for his views or his critical shafts. "I'm not conscious of being controversial," he claims. "I don't set out just to be controversial. And the things which have caused the most controversy have usually come as a surprise to me. I simply try to say the truth as I see it. That's what a critic has to do."

Born in Sydney, N.S., in 1923, Cohen attended Mount Allison University, later came to Toronto to study law, until ill health sent him back to the Maritimes and into newspaper work. Returning to Toronto in 1945, he worked for various Jewish newspapers and in 1947, through mere chance, started reviewing dramas. The following year, he was hired as drama critic on CBC Radio and later was named editor of scripts for radio's *Ford Theatre*.
