

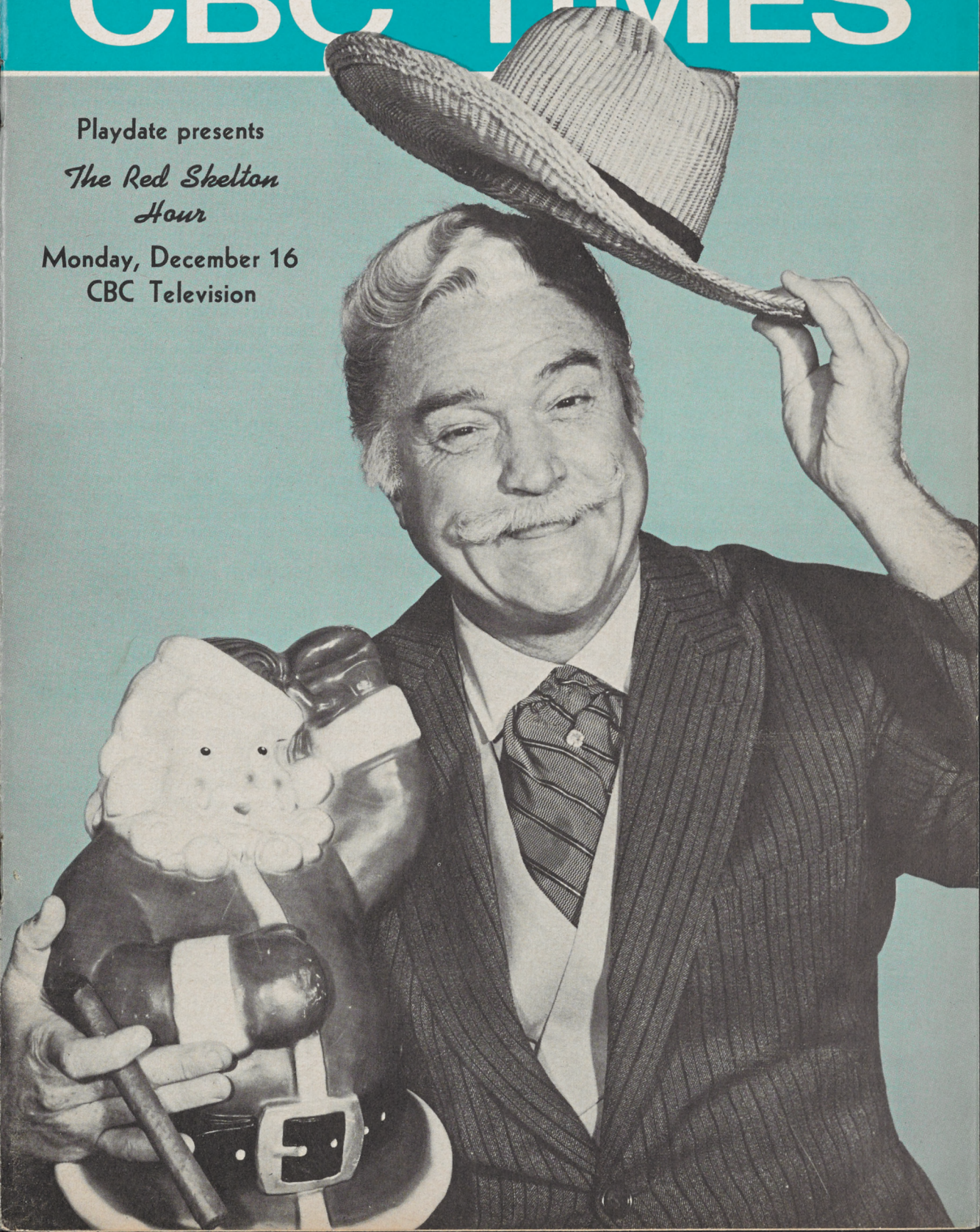

The Question Of Defence

MILITARY DEFENCE in today's world is a very expensive proposition, most would agree. What most don't agree on is the way the huge sums set aside for defence are used. The varieties of opinion on almost all aspects of defence policy are almost endless. What kind of war should the nation prepare for? Are we adequately prepared for that type of war? Is massive nuclear capacity the inevitable weapon of any future conflict, or should we prepare for limited, "brush-fire" wars?

There are no simple answers to these questions. But decisions must be made, a path must be threaded through the maze of fact and opinion. The nation's leaders can be certain of only one thing: No matter what decision is made, someone will disagree with it.

While it is impossible to determine the rightness of Canada's defence policies, it is possible to study the policies themselves, and to see how they are being put into practice. On Tuesday, December 17, in an hour long edition of *CBC Newsmagazine*, CBC television will attempt to provide viewers with some basic information about Canada's national defence. The program, entitled *The Defence Dilemma*, will be presented at 10:00 p.m.

The telecast will include filmed coverage of the activities of Canada's armed forces, at home and abroad, a brief history of Canada's "military character" in the past and at present, a report on the country's commitments through NATO, the UN and other organizations, and an interview with Canada's minister of defence, Paul Hellyer. Interviewer and reporter on the program will be Norman DePoe.

THE PERFORMANCE of all 64 of Mozart's solo piano works will be heard in a series of 11 recorded music broadcasts on *Afternoon Concert*, on CBW and CBK, commencing Monday, December 16 at 3:00 p.m.

Renowned pianist Walter Geiseking is the performer. Geiseking's art has a peculiar affinity for the music of Mozart. Stylistic purity is probed by the great pianist without reference to academic demands. Each performance becomes a rare experience of musical insight that has an ease of communication, the mark of an intuitive musical instinct.

The series is scheduled for the Christmas holidays, and should have a wide appeal among students of the piano as well as other music lovers. Each program has been extended to a full hour, and will be hosted by Walter Unger, who has prepared the scripts. Benjamin Horch has been the producer in charge.

Mozart wrote 64 works for solo piano, exclusive of his chamber works with piano and his piano concertos. Of them, 21 are sonatas, 15 are themes and variations, five fantasias and the remaining are miscellaneous—rondos, suites, capriccios, minuets, etc.

The works are presented in chronological order, starting with the earliest. During the next program week (December 14-20) there will be three programs in the series—on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday, each starting at 3:00 p.m.

CBC RADIO presents a three-hour broadcast of *The Messiah* by Handel on *CBC Sunday Night*, December 22. The broadcast is being given by the Toronto Mendelssohn Choir at Massey Hall in Toronto.

AN AGE OF KINGS will not be seen in the CBWT schedule during the Christmas season. The series of Shakespearean dramas will come to a temporary halt on Monday evening, December 16, and will return on Wednesday, January 15. This should permit students who have been following the series to carry out their usual exam-time and holiday activities without missing any of the programs.

IN A MUSICAL Christmas card to be presented on the *Winnipeg Pops Concert* on radio Wednesday night at 9:30 p.m., Tchaikovsky's charming and humorous Suite from *The Nutcracker* ballet, which contains some of the daintiest music ever written, will be combined with original blank verse by Winnipeg writer and TV hostess Mary Elizabeth Bayer, who spins variations on the original story of a little girl in the land of the Sugar Plum Fairy. Eric Wild will conduct the CBC Winnipeg Orchestra, and Miss Bayer will read her own verses about the magic surrounding a seemingly ordinary set of nutcrackers which were really "party pliers to pinch a dream, to

see if things are really what they seem, a candy-nuts-and-raisins gift, a nutcracker to open things and look inside, a secret gift because it mixes magic up with music and with mystery."

In 1891 Tchaikovsky was commissioned to write a ballet for the Imperial Opera at St. Petersburg, and it was performed that year. The score for *The Nutcracker* is a masterpiece of light music by a composer whose work is usually thought of as serious and often melancholy. It frolics and laughs and makes-believe in the most catching holiday spirit. Tchaikovsky based the story on *Nutcracker and Mouse King*, a fairy tale by E. T. Hoffmann, a distinguished

German romantic novelist of the 19th century.

The composer divided the ballet into two acts. The first is built around a Christmas party. Guests arrive in gay mood and excited children receive their presents, among them a little girl called Clara who is given a nutcracker in the form of a little wooden man—a simple, inexpensive gift, but one she cherishes. When the party is over and the children tucked into bed, Clara comes downstairs to play with the toys, in particular with the lowly nutcracker. Exhausted by the day, she falls asleep and dreams of a battle between an army of mice led by the Mouse King and an army of tin soldiers led by the nutcracker, who is later transformed into a handsome Prince Charming.

In the second act, which takes place in the Prince's Enchanted Castle, revels on a grand scale include several costume dances, which are now known as the *Nutcracker Suite*. Some are strange, such as the *Danse Chinoise*, some boisterous, as the *Danse Russe*, and some incredibly delicate, such as the *Dance of the Sugar Plum Fairy*.

Producer of the musical Christmas card will be Tom Taylor. The program was first presented last year at this time, and is repeated by popular request.

A descendant of Red River pioneers, Miss Bayer was born in Edmonton, but grew up in Manitoba, graduated from the university in Winnipeg, and then lectured there in English while doing post-

Frederick Philip Grove's realistic
novel comes to CBC STAGE Friday, December 20

Settlers of the Marsh

A POWERFUL STORY of a man's love for two women and the tragedy it wrought, Frederick Philip Grove's *Settlers of the Marsh* has been dramatized by Len Peterson for presentation on radio's *CBC Stage* on Friday night, December 20, at 10:30 p.m. local time. It is considered the first realistic Canadian novel, with few equals in this nation's writing. Set in the rural Manitoba of the first two decades in this century, it was written by a most unusual man, whose own life story reads like a penny dreadful.

Grove's paternal grandfather emigrated from England to Sweden and married a Swede. His son, Grove's father, was a wealthy spendthrift with large interests and estates in Sweden, who married a Scotswoman of considerable independent means. Their eighth child and first son, Frederick Philip Grove, was born in 1872 in a Russian manor house where his parents had halted on a foreign jaunt.

When his parents became estranged, he travelled extensively with his mother all over Europe, spending only his summers at home in Sweden. He finished his education in Germany, where he was influenced by Nietzsche, and spent a year travelling in Siberia with an uncle, then studied in Paris, where his friends included Mallarmé, Verlaine, Heredia, Henri de Regnier, Jules Rénard, and André Gide. Next he travelled in Africa, Australia and New Zealand, and had his own yacht on the Baltic—all while still in his teens. Of all the sights he saw, the ones that impressed him most were the lonely ones—the almost unpeopled steppes in Siberia, the vast, empty Sahara. "Only when I struck my roots into the west of Canada did I feel at home again," he used to say.

In 1892, when he was 20, he arrived in North America to begin a long series of leisurely travels. But suddenly, in Toronto, he received news that his father had died and left him penniless. Shaken but determined to maintain his independence at all costs, this cultivated young man eventually found work as a waiter in a cheap Yonge Street beanery, and then spent 20 years as a hobo and itinerant farm labourer on the prairies, saving enough in the summers to allow him to spend his winters writing, but not eating much. After many years of working and saving he graduated from the University of Manitoba and taught school in rural Manitoba with what he called "conspicuous success," and became principal at Rapid City.

After a few years, a back injury and increasing deafness necessitated his giving up teaching. But during his teaching years he had been writing steadily. He had accumulated some 1,000 rejection slips from book publishers in many countries for his novels and descriptive works in Swedish, German, French and English, before he struck success with his first published work in English, a book of essays titled *Over Prairie Trails*, followed by his first novel, *Settlers of the Marsh*. This last is a product of his early Manitoba period (1912-20), although it wasn't published until 1925, when he was 53. At the time of writing it, he was teaching near Gladstone, Manitoba, and (Please turn to page 9)

ularity of the German art song on concert stage, recordings, radio and television. But he tries to keep his two careers entirely separate—doesn't like mixing *lieder* and opera extracts on the same programs.

On *CBC Sunday Night* this week, December 15, at 11:30 p.m., Dietrich Fischer-Dieskau will be heard in an all-Schubert recital transcribed by the CBC International Service, with famed British accompanist Gerald Moore at the piano. Many critics consider that Fischer-Dieskau's vocal artistry and interpretive gifts and Moore's masterly, poetic accompaniment, make an ideal partnership.

Born in Berlin in 1925 to a professor of Greek and an English teacher, Fischer-Dieskau attended the Berlin High School of Music, and had had just one year of study there when he was drafted into the German Army in 1943, at the age of 18. But he put his POW years to good use, and now the burly, six-foot-two singer enjoys a busy round of concerts and opera appearances annually. The only tranquilizers he needs to keep up the pace, he says—and they are always in his hand luggage—are some volumes of poetry, detective stories, and a few classics such as *Crime and Punishment*.

Trying to describe Fischer-Dieskau's special ability to interpret a song, recently, one leading critic could only say that the baritone is "inhabited by the songs he sings. Before the music begins he seems just a man. But once it starts, he is transformed, slightly or boldly, in the line of his body and the expression on his face."

"There are showier, more opulent-looking baritones than Fischer-Dieskau," wrote *Time* magazine after the baritone made a U.S. appearance, "but there are no singers about nowadays who use their voices with more intelligence, accuracy or theatrical effect. Fischer-Dieskau never uses his texts as excuses for mere vocal gymnastics."



WHILE HE WAS a prisoner-of-war of the Americans in northern Italy, near the River Po, Dietrich Fischer-Dieskau, who is now regarded as the world's greatest male *lieder* singer, first began to study singing intensively. He learned most of his repertoire, and had his first semi-professional experience at camp concerts. His captors regarded this entertainment "prize" so highly that the young German baritone was one of the last prisoners-of-war released by the Americans.

On his return to Germany in 1947 at the age of 20, he continued his concert work and made such an impression that the next year the Berlin Opera hired him on the spot as principal lyric baritone after only the briefest audition. He still spends part of each year there, even though he is in great demand in other leading opera houses, and is booked more than two years in advance. He is one of those rare singers who performs equally well in opera or *lieder*, and he has, almost single-handedly, revived the popu-

Stanley Holloway:

Comedy was his Second Choice

STANLEY HOLLOWAY'S ambition, as a young man, was to become an opera singer. He might have made it, too, except that the First World War interrupted his studies. Looking back on it all now, Holloway is glad things took the turn they did. And millions of Holloway's fans around the world echo his sentiments heartily.

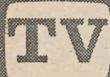
Had Holloway not been turned aside from his career in grand opera, we all would have been deprived of such hilarious and touching characterizations as those Holloway created in *The Lavender Hill Mob*, *This Happy Breed*, *Passport to Pimlico*, and a couple of dozen other bright British films; we would never have been introduced to Sam Small or Albert Ramsbottom; we would have had to do without his delicious portrayal of Alfred P. Doolittle in *My Fair Lady*; the English music halls would never have known the wit and pathos with which he could deliver tuneful and touching songs; North American television viewers would have missed his lightly humorous appearances on variety shows and in the series *Our Man Higgins*; and the world might never have had a chance to know this warm, unassuming entertainer who has won the hearts of all those who have come to know him.

It may be difficult to imagine Holloway as an operatic Scarpia or Rigoletto, but in his early 20s he was serious enough about that ambition to go to Milan for intensive study. It was natural that he was associated with some aspect of entertainment, for his family had long been connected with the theatrical world and his uncle, Charles Bernard, was a Shakespearean actor of some repute. Stanley started out as a boy soprano, renowned for his sweet treble voice, who first sang solos in church and later drifted into showbusiness, billed as "Master Stanley Holloway, the Boy Soprano." When his voice changed, he continued his stage career as a baritone, singing sentimental and serious songs in concert parties at seaside resorts. He went to Milan in 1914, but almost immediately had to return to England at the outbreak of war, and joined up as an infantryman. Demobilized in 1918 as a lieutenant, he returned to the stage and turned to comedy, appearing for six years with the celebrated revue company known as the Co-Optimists. From then on he was engaged in a series of appearances in revue, musical comedy, pantomime, radio and films.

His motion picture career dates from 1921, when he had a small part in a film entitled *The Rotters*, but it wasn't until 1936 that he began appearing regularly on the screen, and it was only in the mid-1940s that he became widely known as a film actor. Much earlier, his fame had spread as a monologist, through his recordings of stories about Sam Small, the soldier who stubbornly refused to pick up his musket, and Albert Ramsbottom, the little lad who had a penchant for jabbing lions with his walking stick.

Still going strong at 73, Holloway continues to delight audiences with his songs, his character portrayals and, most of all, his obvious warmth and good humour. Off-stage, his personality is just as winning, a fact that will be illustrated this week on CBC Radio's series, *Assignment*. A four-part interview with Stanley Holloway, prepared by Tony Thomas, will be presented on *Assignment* Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, December 16, 18, 19 and 20, at 8:00 o'clock each night.

driving each weekend to his wife's school in the thick woods 25 miles away. When the novel first appeared it was exposed to totally unfounded charges of obscenity. It is an earthy story, but it is a moving one, beautifully, sensitively, told.

It concerns a Swedish immigrant, Niels Lindstedt, who is successful as a pioneer farmer in Manitoba, but is unsuccessful in his personal life because of his chance meetings with two women. One of them, Ellen, a girl on a neighbouring farm, with whom he has shared his dreams, is neurotically repelled by the very thought of marriage because of her mother's unhappy experience. The other is a widow who flaunts her charms and who appeals only to his animal nature. Rejected by the one he really wants to marry, Niels weds the other, and then kills her in blind fury over her flagrant promiscuity.

But his story doesn't end there. It continues in happier vein, reflecting the resilience and optimism which Grove was usually reluctant to share with other Canadian pioneers. Most of the Canadians he lived among in his years of riding the rails and farming in Manitoba didn't think of themselves as hopeless victims of an unequal struggle against nature, but Grove had brought to this country the pessimism of intellectual Europe, and he spent many years trying to reconcile the two outlooks.

He was a tall, slight, and rather austere man with tremendous determination. How many authors would hammer at publishers' doors without results for 30 years and not try to come to terms with the situation and go on to other things? He refused to give up, even though success didn't come to him until middle age. The appearance of his first book marked the maturing of

Canadian literature and the start of a new era of artistic integrity in this country. He published eight novels, three volumes of essays, and an autobiography. His work, comments a leading critic, "marks dramatically the shift of Canadian fiction from entertainment to social criticism. Like Dreiser in the United States, Grove demonstrated new standards of realism, and his influence has been enormous."

Because Grove's honours were late, few and intangible, he considered himself a failure. A year before he died in 1948 he was an aged, ill, and quietly sad figure as he received the Governor-General's Creative Non-Fiction medal for *In Search of Myself*, which critics called the most dramatic personal life story by a Canadian author ever published, and a literary milestone. He was the only Canadian novelist to have a critical book about his novels published during his lifetime.

Grove was not only justifiably displeased with his lack of financial success, but he was hardly ever pleased with what he wrote — always felt he could do better, make the people and scenes he described more vividly real. "No matter where I looked, then as today," he said a couple of years before he died, "I failed to see that the task of recording that struggle of man with nature had ever been adequately done, not even by Hamsun (Norwegian Nobel Prize-winning and uncompromisingly realistic novelist). To record that struggle seemed to be my task. I seemed to see that I was bound to fail; but the attempt had to be made. . . . The kind of success I wanted would have acted as a tonic, whereas failure acted as a specific poison. My struggle has been such as to make defeat a foregone conclusion. . . . Suddenly it seemed to me that the only thing that really mattered was the explanation of that defeat." Hence — *In Search of Myself*, a moving, unforgettable epitaph for a great man who died a winner, thinking he had lost.

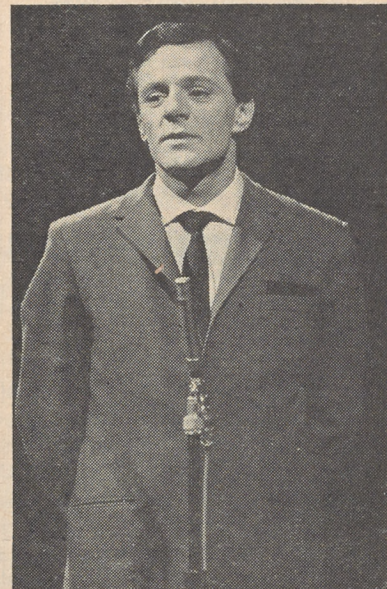

Will the Machines Conquer the World?

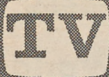

Indian Tribes Make Peace After Three Centuries

The Hurons and Iroquois are seen performing a strange peacemaking ceremony on CAMERA CANADA, Wednesday, December 18.

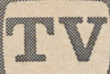
ONE OF THE most historically famous of all the great nations of Indians who inhabited the country when Jacques Cartier landed here was the Iroquois tribe. Comparatively small in number and confined in their distribution, they exhibited all the characteristics that distinguish the barbarian from the savage, and Cartier was quick to report their superior qualities and culture, their excellent farming meth-

ods, in what is one of our earliest and most reliable glimpses of them.

A century or more before he met them they had even attempted, and partly accomplished, a federation of tribes similar to the United Nations, for the purpose of maintaining and enforcing peace. The Onondagas, Mohawks, Oneidas, Cayugas and Senecas were united in the most powerful Indian organization which the white man had to contend with.

The Hurons, who were of Iroquois blood, were not included in the league for some reason, and consequently they became its bitterest foes. Unrelenting hostility between Iroquois and Hurons existed when Cartier landed, and although Hurons were continually being massacred in fierce raids by Iroquois, they were still a powerful people, and Cartier was much impressed by their chief, Hochelaga.

Suddenly the old animosity flared as never before, and by 1649 the Iroquois had virtually destroyed (Please turn to page 31)

WILL MACHINES CONQUER THE WORLD?

(Continued from page 15)

A short story of a few years ago, one of the type now regarded as old hat by the trade, concerned a magnificent computer—the acme of man's scientific efforts—which could perform almost unbelievable feats of calculating. One night, shut down and unattended, the great machine began to operate on its own, and from its mechanical maw it spewed forth a tape reading: "Who am I? Who am I?"

That is a question that might be asked by all in this age of standardization, when for the sake of convenient processing we have been reduced to digits rather than personalities. How far can this dehumanizing process go? And how can society protect itself from manipulation by those who sit at consoles and "program" the machines? Technology may be outstripping society's ability to absorb and control it, and man may stand in danger of being reduced to punch-card status. Reliance on machines could increasingly compress humans into uniform patterns of thought and action, until men become more robot-like than the robots themselves.

How real is this danger? To what extent have machines already taken over? Is there a point at which the computer stops being man's slave and becomes his master? Some answers to these questions will be sought this week on CBC Television's *Document* (Sunday, December 15, at 8:00 p.m.) in an edition entitled *Report on the Think Machines*.

Act I. Hall of the Gibichungs on the Rhine. Hagen, Guneser and Gutrune are present when Siegfried arrives. Hagen brews a potion to destroy memory, which is given to Siegfried. He now has no recollection of Brunnhilde and weds Gutrune. He drinks blood brotherhood with Gunther and joins him in the adventure to win Brunnhilde.

Change of scene. The rock of Brunnhilde. Wotan wishes to return the ring to the Rhine maidens but Brunnhilde retains it as Siegfried's love token. Siegfried appears in the form of Gunther by the magic of the helmet. After a struggle he takes the ring from her hand and forces her to do his bidding.

Act II. On the banks of the Rhine before the hall of the Gibichungs. Night. Alberich demands that Hagen keep the ring from the Rhine maidens. At the approach of day, Siegfried announces the arrival of Gunther and Brunnhilde. Hagen summons the Gibichungs to receive the bridal pair. Brunnhilde sees Siegfried united with Gutrune and accuses him of having betrayed her. Bitterly, she unites in a plot with Hagen and Gunther to kill Siegfried.

Act III. A forest and valley on the Rhine. The Rhine maidens vainly plead

with Siegfried for the ring. Hagen arrives with Gunther and his followers. Hagen gives Siegfried a drink that will restore his memory. Siegfried relates his deeds and tells of hearing the Forest Bird. Siegfried is stabbed in the back by Hagen's spear and his last moments are filled with thoughts of Brunnhilde. His companions lay him upon a shield and with solemn death music bring him to Gutrune.

Change of scene. Hall of the Gibichungs. With cries of anguish, Gutrune rushes to the body of Siegfried and hears from Gunther that Hagen has slain her husband. Hagen now demands the ring. Gunther refuses to give it to him and is killed by Hagen. When Hagen attempts to take the ring the hand of the corpse is raised threateningly. Sieg-

fried's body is lain upon the funeral pyre and Brunnhilde applies the torch after having taken the ring from his finger. As the flames rise she mounts her horse and ascends the burning pyre. The Rhine rises above the flames, the Rhine daughters grasp the ring, and when Hagen tries to obtain it they drag the son of Alberich down to the depths of the river. A great light appears in the distance—it is the burning of Walhalla and the end of the gods.

Who Ignored The Sinking Titanic?

WHEN THE MIGHTY Titanic slipped beneath the icy black waters of the Atlantic on a calm, clear night in April, 1912, taking some 1,500 persons with her, an age came to an end and a legend was born. The tragic saga of the Titanic disaster, compounded of incredible folly and compelling courage, has been told and re-told in a constant stream of books, newspaper articles, films and broadcasts. Many of these accounts have recorded, with bitter irony, that most, if not all of those lost in the sinking could have been saved. During the time it took the great ship to go down, those on board saw another ship steam to within a few miles of them, then veer off and sail away.

Both the United States' Congressional and the British Board of Trade inquiries into the disaster claimed that the mystery ship was the liner *Californian*, despite the protests of her captain, Stanley Lord, who maintained that his ship was trapped in ice, motionless, and lying at least 19 miles, and more likely 30 miles, from the scene. During the 50 years from the inquiry until his death in 1962, Lord had to endure the scorn of the world, branded as the man who could have saved hundreds of lives but did nothing.

Then, three months after Lord's death last year at the age of 84, evidence appeared which tended to vindicate him and confirm his version of events. A report was made public in which it was stated that the Norwegian sealing vessel *Samson* was close to the Titanic when she sank. The report came from Henrik Naess, who was first officer of the *Samson* in 1912. The ship, said Naess, was engaged in illegal seal-hunting at the time of the sinking, and, mistaking Titanic's distress rockets for those of U.S. Coast Guard ships, fled to escape detection.

On December 15 at 9:00 p.m., *CBC Sunday Night* will present an hour-long BBC-produced program entitled *The Other Ship*. First heard in Britain earlier this year, the program has been described as an inquiry into an inquiry. It is based entirely on the official transcript of the British hearings on the Titanic disaster, and it attempts to overturn the 50-year-old judgment and to clear Captain Lord and his *Californian*.

The Future Of the Commonwealth

FIVE NATIONS within the British Commonwealth will be linked together for a special 30-minute broadcast discussion on the aims, uses and possible future of the global association.

Organized in Canada by the CBC's International Service, the program will be heard around the world on December 15, 16 and 17. Contributing nations are Canada, Great Britain, India, Nigeria and New Zealand, and for the purposes of discussion, the newly inaugurated Pacific cable link in the Com-

monwealth communications chain will be utilized for the first time in a live broadcast.

Short wave radio, submarine cables, the Pacific link, and above ground land-lines will be used in the broadcast.

The program took place at 3:00 a.m. EST on December 4 and was recorded for broadcast by the CBC's International Service for dissemination via the General Overseas Service on December 15 and 16. It will be heard in Canada over the CBC radio network at 8:00 p.m. on December 17 in place of the regularly scheduled *Assignment* program. The recorded discussion will last 90 minutes, of which 30

minutes will be extracted for the Canadian broadcast.

Taking part in the global "forum" will be: *Canada*, John W. Holmes, director of the Canadian Institute of International Affairs, Toronto; *India*, Professor P. G. Mavalankar, professor of politics, Guyarat University, Ahmedabad; *New Zealand*, Professor R. M. Chapman, head of the department of political studies, Auckland University, Auckland; *Nigeria*, Dr. K. Omwuka Dike, principal and vice-chancellor, Ibadan University, Lagos; *Great Britain*, Richard Goold-Adams, chairman of the Institute for Strategic Studies, and member of the Royal Institute of International Affairs, London. Goold-Adams is chairman of the broadcast discussion.

Among the topics to be discussed by the panel will be: Will the Commonwealth's ties be loosened as new trading arrangements are made with non-Commonwealth countries? Can the Commonwealth withstand increasing nationalistic and racial tensions? Would the Commonwealth members outside the limits of treaty arrangements support each other in the event of threats or attacks? The pleasant arrangements presently linking Commonwealth nations are enough to keep us all together, or are they?

The program, titled *London Forum*, has been organized in London.

Dear Old Dad: Better or Worse?

TRADITIONALLY the father is a figure of authority. But has that concept changed—for better or for worse? Dad used to be head of the house, wear the pants, be catered to, and his word was law. He was a pipe-and-slippers bulwark between the family and the world. He worked long hours, walked long distances to work. Besides the usual monthly bills to pay, he often had to provide food and shelter for aging or insolvent relatives. He ate huge meals without a thought for calories or cholesterol, his ulcers were few, and he avoided a heart attack until his years and corporation were bountiful. Everyone loved and respected dear old Dad, stern and uncompromising as he might be.

Now, many believe, the picture has changed. Often Dad is not the only wage-earner in the family, so his clutch on purse-strings and authority are not as firm as they once were. Business and emotional pressures, health and economics have taken their toll of the dear old soul, and now, buffeted on all sides by this complicated, issue-ridden world, he has, in many instances, faded from the colourful stalwart he used to be to a ridiculous shadow of his former glory. In some families, the father's role is only as large as his bank roll. But in other cases he is still an oasis in an increasingly arid family life, a person of importance whom no one would dream of calling an

INDIAN TRIBES MAKE PEACE

(Continued from page 17)

the Hurons in a terrible war in which, for a time, the very existence of New France hung in the balance. Eventually the two tribes' fierce hatred simmered down, and the remnants of the Hurons found asylum in a settlement near Quebec City. But ill-feeling continued to rankle through the centuries.

Then, in August, 1961, a strange ceremony took place in the Huron Indian village of Ancienne Lorette, a few miles from Quebec City. There, at the instigation of white men, the Iroquois went to make peace with the Hurons after 300 years. The two tribes had not met officially since 1649, but the descendants of those bitter 17th-century warriors joined in ceremonial dances and smoked the peace pipe together. It was a colourful, moving scene as ancient hatchets were buried and blood enemies became blood brothers again.

But the ceremony revealed more than the making of peace between two famous Indian peoples, for others were involved. What was the role of the organizers of the ceremony, and its spectators? They were French and English-speaking Canadians, and curious and learned folklorists from Canada and abroad. Among them were members of the International Folk Music Society, meeting in Quebec City, whose delegates were invited to attend, as well as sociologists and ethnologists.

The ceremony was the culmination of a process which began in the 17th century and from the beginning involved four cultural groups: the Iroquois and their allies, the British, and the Hurons and their allies, the French. The arrival of the Europeans with their superior weapons and more complicated beliefs and customs had thrown the Indian way of life out of balance. Hurons and Iroquois reacted differently to the imbalance, and in trying to under-

stand what happened to them, it is possible to discover some things about ourselves.

Wednesday night, December 18, at 9:30 p.m., CBC-TV's *Camera Canada* presents *The False Faces*, prepared by Crawley Films of Ottawa, and based on the Iroquois-Huron ceremony in 1961. The false faces referred to in the title are the masks worn by the Iroquois in ceremonial dancing—but perhaps others wear them, too. An inquiry into the full significance of what happened at Lorette has resulted in a cinematic dialogue between the two men who were largely responsible for the making of the peace.

One is Dr. Marius Barbeau, former senior ethnologist at the National Museum, and an internationally renowned student of Canadian Indian traditions, who is deeply involved in the subject of the film. As well as being an ethnologist, he is a poet in the broad sense of the word. The other is Dr. Marcel Rioux, his son-in-law, a professor of social science at the University of Montreal.

As well as the colourful events in Ancienne Lorette and the perceptive personal observations of these two men, the film includes illustrations of the unfolding of history.

The False Faces was directed by Judy Crawley and René Bonnière, who came to Canada in 1955 after eight years of film and television work in France, and has worked for Crawley Films ever since. Presently he is putting finishing touches to a full-length colour feature film, *Ville Jolie*, which was shot simultaneously in French and English, using bilingual actors in a Montreal setting.

Bonnière's filmed series *St. Lawrence North*, and his prize-winning hour-long feature, *The Annanacks*, seen on CBC-TV, have given new perspective and made an important contribution to mutual understanding between Canadians of English, French, Indian and Eskimo origin.

Important Week For Music Lovers

AN IMPORTANT musical occasion this week is the appearance of pianist Leon Fleisher as guest soloist in the *Symphony Hall* series on CBC Radio Thursday, December 19 at 11:00 p.m. Though only 34 years old, Fleisher has been playing the piano for 30 years, and is described by conductor Pierre Monteux as "the artistic find of the century." Besides being an internationally popular recording artist and touring recitalist, Fleisher is one of the most respected pianists on the continent.

Born in San Francisco, he gave his first recital at seven, and three years later Artur Schnabel was so impressed by the boy's playing that he broke a long-standing rule never to accept a pupil under 16. Fleisher studied with Schnabel for 10 years, and made his orchestral debut with Pierré Monteux conducting. In 1952, at 24, Fleisher won the coveted first place in the Queen Elizabeth Competition of Belgium, and since then has played at festivals and with major orchestras all over the world.

He's a retiring man who isn't much interested in stage glamour, and actually enjoys the relative obscurity and mundanity of teaching at the Peabody Conservatory in Baltimore between the 60 concerts he allows himself each year.

Also on Thursday night a young pianist just beginning her career, Irene Weiss of Cardston, Alta., a winner of the *CBC Talent Festival* grand award last year, will be heard in the *Radio International* series at 8:30 p.m.

MAT'S WHITE FRUIT CAKE

- 1 cup butter
- 1¼ cups white sugar
- 4 large eggs
- 2½ cups all purpose flour
- ½ tsp. baking powder
- ½ tsp. salt
- ½ lb. bleached sultanas
- ½ lb. citron peel
- ¼ lb. red cherries
- ¼ lb. green cherries
- 1 green candied pineapple
- 1 red candied pineapple
- 1 cup shredded coconut
- Juice and rind of 1 lemon
- ½ tsp. almond extract

Cream butter, gradually add sugar. Beat in eggs one at a time. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together and add to butter, sugar and egg mixture. Save 1 cup for coating fruit so it won't drop to bottom of cake. Chop peel, leave cherries whole. Fold in fruit, coconut and flavouring.

Line bottom of angel cake pan with brown paper and then fill with completed mixture. Bake 2½ hours at 275°.

Wrap in cloth and put away until needed.

Six Shooters

or

Shakespeare?

Lorne Greene, of *BONANZA*, had this choice to make in directing his career

TWENTY-TWO years ago the resonant, confidence-inspiring voice of Ottawa-born Lorne Greene was heard nightly by millions of Canadians and Americans in his role as chief newscaster for the CBC.

Today, he is heard—and seen—by millions of people as Ben Cartwright, patriarchal owner of the vast Ponderosa ranch, near Virginia City, in the American west.

Cartwright's three sons, Little Joe, Adam, and Hoss, are played by Michael Landon, Pernell Roberts and Dan Blocker. *Bonanza* is seen on the CBC-TV network on Sundays at 9:00 p.m.

Until a few years ago, Greene had no emotional hook in America itself, let alone the American frontier. "I'd never even been on a horse until *Bonanza* came along," says the 45-year-old actor. "And, guns? They were for the police.

"As a youngster, I wanted to be a concert violinist. Failing that, I became a news commentator for the CBC. When I turned to the stage, it was Shakespeare. And, it paid me well."

Why did he accept a role in a western series? "Television was instant fame. Fame means better parts," says Greene.

In 1957 he was up for a role of the father in the stage version of *Look Homeward, Angel*. "At the last minute, the producer decided another actor was better known

and I lost out. The play won the Pulitzer Prize."

It was a year later that a friend of Greene wrote a movie script specifically for the actor, even describing Greene physically. "He was so intent on my getting the part," says Greene, "he made a personal appeal to the producer. But, once again, they settled on a box office name and I was out.

"Believe me, when I was offered the role of Ben Cartwright in *Bonanza* I ran to it with open arms.

"Now, thanks to the series and not William Shakespeare, people know me both in this country and abroad. I've been offered major movie roles in films like *Cleopatra*, *The Story of Ruth* and others, as well as stage leads and TV guest shots.

"People still ask me, however, what plays I'd like to do most. Shakespeare, I tell them."
