THE SASKATCHEWAN River, once waterway of the explorers and now lifeline of the Prairies, is subject of the first of the *Canada 99* series of television specials. A camera crew now is working its way through the vast territory visited by the river's waters as they start in two sources in the Rockies, rush through north and south forks across Alberta, join east of Prince Albert and finally drain into Lake Winnipeg. Daryl Duke is producing the program and background music is by folksingers Ian and Sylvia. Scheduling will be announced.

ANY GOOD shows in town? Beginning September 10th, CBW's *The Passing Show* (Fridays at 6:30 p.m.) will have an answer to this question in handy, quick-listening form at the opening of each program. All movies and plays currently running in Winnipeg theatres will be listed, with capsule critical summaries from the five regular reviewers.

Preparing these capsule criticisms as well as the more detailed reviews which the program will continue to present will be Chester Duncan, Marian Waldman, Alice Poyser, Joseph Gold and Mort Forer.

Music specialist Chester Duncan has been heard for years as a regular on *Critically Speaking*, the national network program on which he reviews radio and television. His *Duncan's Diary* and contributions to *Speaking Personally* and other shows have also helped to make his a familiar voice on CBC radio.

Another radio veteran is Marian Waldman, recognized as one of Winnipeg's finest actresses, and the writer of more than 100 plays broadcast on the CBC network. In private life she's the wife of fellow *Passing Show* critic Mort Forer, who is also a dramatist and speaker with wide experience in broadcast-

ing dating back into the mid-1950s.

Relative newcomers to broadcasting are Joseph Gold and Alice Poyser. Mr. Gold, who teaches English at University College, came to Winnipeg from his native England after holding teaching posts in the United States. Active as an actor and director, he is now in his third year of reviewing movies and plays for *The Passing Show*. Alice Poyser, a movie and ballet buff, started in broadcasting on CBWT's *Mary Liz Show* and *Ladies First*, and joined *The Passing Show* as a regular last summer.

Occasionally, all five reviewers are heard on one program, but usually they take turns, two reviewers each week. The two usually have attended the same event—often a just-opened movie—and their ad-lib discussion helps give listeners added insight into the entertainment covered.

Bill Guest continues as host, introducing appropriate music from the entertainment world and talking with visiting celebrities and local entertainers. Lorne Wallace is the producer.

CBWT WINNIPEG viewers can look for some outstanding movies on *Cinema Six* during the 1965-66 season. Film program officer Zella French has announced the purchase of the following features:

Auntie Mame, starring Rosalind Russell; based on the best-seller and Broadway hit. *The Bad Seed*, from a Maxwell Anderson play, with Patty McCormack giving an outstanding juvenile performance. *Don't Bother to Knock*, in which Marilyn Monroe was termed "find" of the year for her role as a mentally unbalanced baby-sitter.

Gift of Love, a remake of *Sentimental Journey*, with Lauren Bacall, Robert Stack and Lorne Green. *The Helen Morgan Story*,

with Ann Blyth as the tragic torch singer. *Man in the Grey Flannel Suit*, a study of a public relations man, starring Gregory Peck. *Old Man and the Sea*, Hemingway's novel about an old fisherman, starring Spencer Tracy. *Pajama Game*, with Doris Day and John Raitt, based on the Broadway hit about a pajama factory.

Sayonara, the poignant story of an American jet ace and the star of a Japanese theatrical troupe, starring Marlon Brando, Red Buttons and Miyoshi Umeki (won three Academy Awards). *Tunnel of Love*, with Doris Day, Richard Widmark, Gig Young and Gia Scalà; an adult comedy about a young couple who desperately want children, while the couple next door have them with dismaying regularity. *Saturday Night and Sunday Morning*—Albert Finney (of *Tom Jones* fame) stars as a factory worker in this winner of three British Academy Awards. *This Sporting Life*, nominated for several Academy Awards in 1964, with Rachel Roberts and Richard Harris.

IN ST. JOHN'S, Newfoundland, a beam of light pierces the dark as a night watchman keeps his vigil in the wee small hours. In Victoria, the sun still rides high in the sky, but in a few hours an astronomer will begin his nightly routine of scouring the sky in hopes of adding to human knowledge. These widely separated men in widely varying occupations are both seen on a future program of *Telescope*, which will look at night people across Canada. Also visited will be Halifax, where an all-night disc-jockey keeps insomniacs company; Toronto's subway, where a repairman works on the tracks; and a roadside diner on the Prairies, a favorite stop for long-haul truckers.

'Women are Just Like People'

TRANS-CANADA MATINEE, the program that recognizes women as intelligent human beings, returns to CBC radio weekdays beginning Tuesday.

"I HAVE always assumed," Bernard Shaw once remarked in defence of his clever, emancipated heroines, "that women are just like people." Heresy! Even fifty years ago the notion of equality between the sexes was widely deplored as a dreadful perversion, and radicals like Shaw and Ibsen were reviled for their dangerous ideas. But today? Well, the battle is won, though you'd hardly guess it from the deluge of movies, soap operas and newspapers where the Little Woman is still assumed

to be a kind of tender-hearted imbecile, vain and gullible, domesticated, genteel and forever pregnant.

To this myth *Trans-Canada Matinée* has never subscribed. Nor will it do so in this, its 14th year, beginning this week at 2:03 p.m. every afternoon (2:33 p.m. in Alberta). Around the *Matinée* offices this warning is etched on every forehead: "Use Your Head. The Intelligence You Insult May Be Your Own!" And: "Don't Condescend!" In other words, why shouldn't

women be as literate, politically conscious, curious, skeptical and ready to be amused and informed and stimulated as . . . people? No reason at all. Quite.

And so, with its purpose firmly in mind, *Matinée* sets about its task of bringing the world, and Canada, to listeners across the country. Every afternoon, as in the past, commentators at home and abroad will analyze political developments of importance: by cable links from Ottawa, (Please turn to page 33)

How Prairie Farmers Organized and Took Action

*Venture
recalls the
agrarian revolt*

THE AGRARIAN movement in Canada began, properly speaking, during the first decade of the 20th Century, centering in the precarious "one shot" economy of the wheat-growing areas. It was nourished by the experiences of immigrants from many countries and Eastern Canada—ranging from Ukrainian peasants to American Populists to English trade unionists.

Transportation, storage and marketing of grain were the crucial problems. The railway companies were pressed for adequate and equitable service and various farmer-owned enterprises such as grain elevators were set up. The high point of the agrarian revolt was reached between 1919 and 1921 when farmer political action won the governments of Ontario, Alberta and Manitoba and elected 65 Progressive MPs to Ottawa.

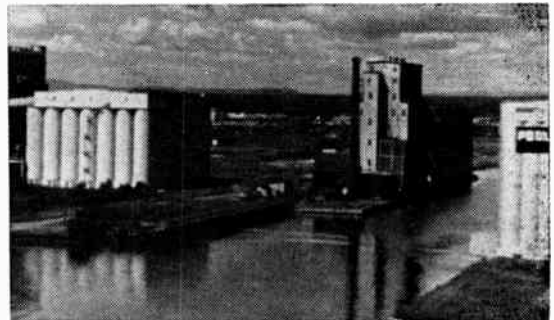
There were sharp internal divisions (in the federal group especially) made up, as they were, of "ex" Liberals, Conservatives, independents and socialist-minded individuals. Some, like early Progressive Party leaders Crerar and Fork, became Liberal Cabinet Ministers, some quit in disgust and others could not get re-elected once the first wave had passed. After 1926 the truly independent Progressive Party tradition was carried chiefly by the 13-member "Ginger Group" from Alberta. Most of them joined the CCF when it was formed in 1932-33 and all were wiped out by the Social Credit landslide in 1935.

Closely associated with the Progressive Party was the Independent Labor Party, "a new party in the House of Commons," William Irvine announced after the 1921 elections. "Mr. Woodsworth is the leader and I'm the party."

Although the Ginger Group was the link from the forward elements of the earlier agrarian revolt to the CCF and with the ILP providing its parliamentary foundation, the Progressive Party was not the direct forerunner of the CCF as the CCF has been of the New Democratic Party. The ILP and Saskatchewan's Farmer-Labor Party were more truly its ideological forebears although, since the bulk of founding CCF members were farmers, the Progressive Party tradition was strong.

What if Machines Make Work Old-Fashioned?

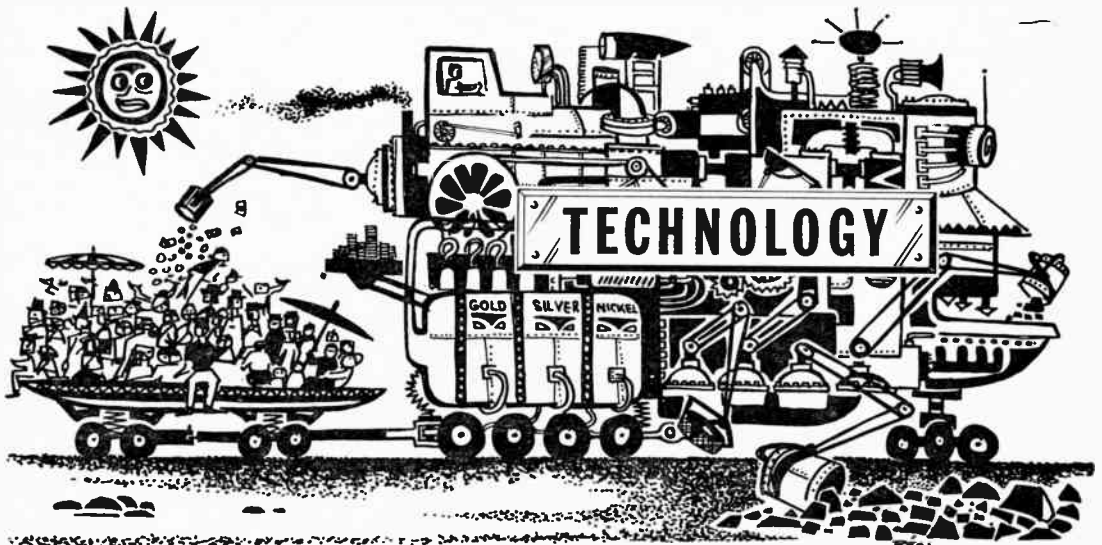
A special INTERTEL program Friday, September 10th at 10:00 p.m. examines the problems foreseen if technology makes work unnecessary for most people.

"I BELIEVE that within the lifetimes of all of my associates and myself most of the work of most of the people will be done by machines." That statement, made by W. H. Ferry, a social philosopher at the Centre for the Study of Democratic Institutions in Santa Barbara, California, expresses a view held by many experts in the United States. The time is not far off, they warn, when automation will be so widespread that work, as we know it now, will simply cease to exist for the masses. Already some of the needs of the nation are handled by only a skeleton force. In a country where only 16 men would be needed, for instance, to produce the 800 million light bulbs it used each year, people may one day be paid not to produce but just to consume.

As far-fetched as this may sound now, it is a possibility that edges closer to reality with every new development in U.S. technology, the most advanced in the world. The old Puritan notion of work as a virtue is seriously threatened by the potential of the computer. Michael Harrington, a U.S. authority on the problems automation brings, has this to say about the new "computerized" society: "We've got this enormous production. We will have an increasing production and theoretically we can simply apply that production to the needs of the people without reference to whether they work or not. The only difficulty there is psychological, political, social, religious, because to do that is to change the very basis of American society. We've believed for years, decades, since our beginning, that it is through hard work that a man establishes his worth in the eyes of his neighbor and even, in the Protestant ethic, his worth in the eyes of God. And when we talk about changing that we're talking about changing some of the most fundamental assumptions of American society."

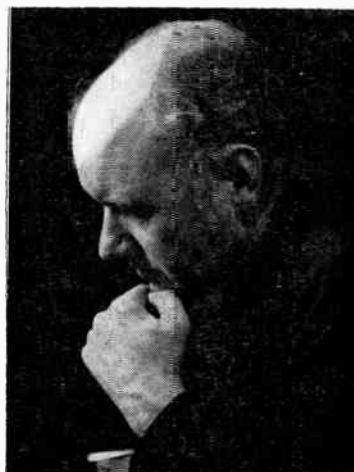
Will America's vast wealth and technological progress com-

HANDEL DIDN'T begin to explore the field of oratorio until he was 53—by 18th-century standards an old man—but he excelled in it, and wrote over two dozen oratorios. One of the finest is *Solomon*, reflecting the calm, glowing happiness in his life after many physical and economic set-backs. Composed in 1748, when he was 63, it is more a music drama than an oratorio, moving smoothly from magnificent heroism to delicate, poetic sensuality, from thanksgiving pageantry on a vast, voluptuous scale to charming pastoral passages in which “amorous turtles love beneath the pleasing gloom.” His score tells its story with splendor and drama interspersed with memorable moments of tender love music. He paints his

powerful figures with great splashes of arresting color, but he shows, too, that there were gentler colors among the Old Testament blood and thunder. The master of volcanic emotion was also a genius at depicting softly feminine and subdued rapture.

Handel's *Solomon* will be presented on *CBC Sunday Night*, September 5th, at 8:05 on radio. The performance will have been recorded at the Stratford (Ontario) Festival on August 29th. Soloists will be sopranos Lois Marshall and Elizabeth Benson-Guy; tenor Charles Bressler; and baritone Norman Farrow. Other performers include The Festival Singers of Toronto, members of the Toronto Mendelssohn Choir, and the National Festival Orchestra, conducted by Elmer Iseler.

The first act has a magnificent thanksgiving scene, with the High Priest and the King (an identification with King George II is suggested) lending an air of solidarity to the festivities. But the King is eager to leave the jollification and lead his amorous Queen into a more secluded place. The chorus, wishing them a happy time (illustrated with scenes from the love life of a nightingale) offers some delicately melodic music.

The famous scene where Solomon makes his decision in the controversy between the two harlots over the baby is profoundly moving. Handel shows that he understands human nature as few composers before him, as he pictures the conflict.

Diary of Grant McConachie

Bush Pilot to Airline Head

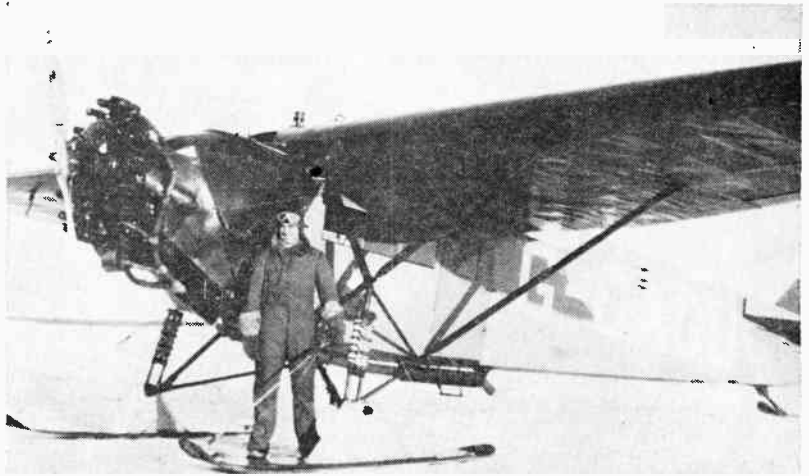
EARLY this year CBC tv's 20/20 series had planned to present a portrait of Canadian Pacific Airlines president Grant McConachie that, it was hoped, would capture on film the energy, drive, and charm that had made him such a respected figure in the airline industry, not only in Canada but throughout the world. McConachie's death in June occurred before filming had begun on this program; but, rather than abandon the project, altogether, 20/20 has prepared instead a tribute to McConachie, the bush pilot of the early '30s. *Diary of Grant McConachie*, to be telecast Sunday, September 5th at 5:30 p.m., is made up of the reminiscences of several of McConachie's friends and business associates, together with voice recordings of McConachie interviewed in 1964 by Bill Herbert, a filmed interview with McConachie made in 1963 by CBC Vancouver producer Tom Connochie, and some rare film showing bush flying in 1937-38. Among the friends and associates contributing to the program is Barney Phillips, now vice-president in charge of operations at CPA and a close companion of McConachie's for more than 30 years. Phillips is shown with one

of the last single-engined Fairchilds in existence, the type of aircraft which McConachie flew as a young man.

McConachie was the president of an airline (Independent Airways Ltd.) by his 22nd birthday in 1931. In those days, he operated two Fokker aircraft carrying fruit and vegetables and fish to northern points. In 1934 he made the first Edmonton - to - Whitehorse flight, which took five days, and a few years later got the highly prized

Edmonton - Whitehorse and the Vancouver - Whitehorse mail contracts.

In his youth, McConachie wanted more than anything else to be a locomotive engineer and was headed for that career with the CNR in Edmonton when he was fired from his job as a fireman after he left a locomotive standing over a hot cinder pit. By the time the union fought and won his case for reinstatement he had found the real love of his life—flying.

How Can We Talk With Other Planets?

WALTER SULLIVAN, science editor of the *New York Times* and one of the best-known journalists in the United States, will be seen this week on tv's *Compass* series discussing that perplexing scientific conundrum — is there life on other planets, and if so can we communicate across the universe?

Whether or not life is unique to Earth has long been a matter of contention, with scientists seeming to be evenly divided on the subject. Today, this question is receiving closer attention than ever before as man's knowledge of the universe increases through the development of more sophisticated instruments. Many eminent scientists who previously could not commit themselves through fear of ridicule to a belief in life on other planets are now able to admit cautiously through new data on the universe that the possibility cannot be ruled out.

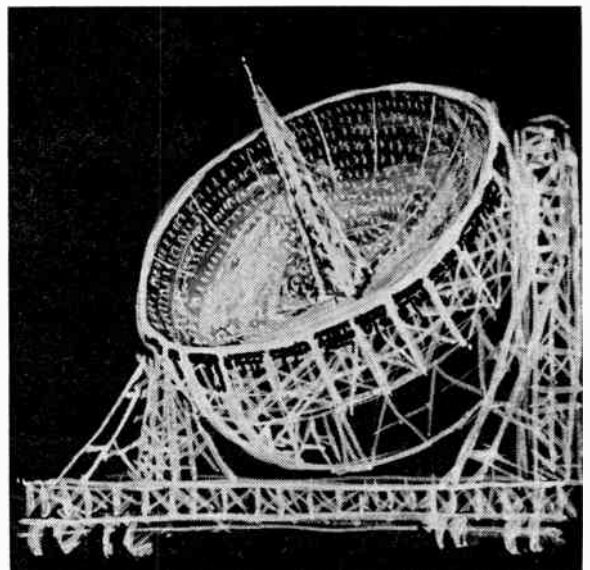
Sir Bernard Lovell, head of Britain's Jodrell Bank radio telescope station, was until recent years one of the skeptics. He has now modified his views. Asked by a Congressman from Connecticut in the House Committee on Science and Astronautics if there might not be signals from other planets aimed at Earth, and if the United States should not have a program underway for intercepting them, Sir Bernard replied: "I think now one has to be sympathetic about an idea which only a few years ago would have seemed rather far-fetched."

There are many scientists throughout the world who believe that we may indeed be the object of such signals, and astronomers and electronics experts are studying ways of interpreting these messages. The Soviet Academy of Sciences published

three years ago, a book written by Iosif S. Shklovsky, one of the most brilliant theoretical radio astronomers known on the universality of intelligent life.

Sullivan, who is the author of several science books, has explored the possibility of other civilizations in the universe and signals from outer space in his book *We Are Not Alone*. On *Compass* he talks to producer Jim Carney about his research into the subject and what projects are now underway in the United States to develop means of communication with other planetary systems.

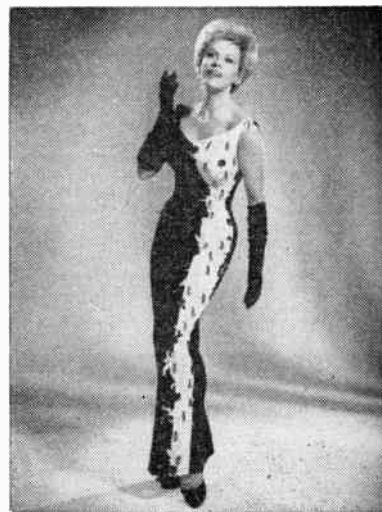

The Great War

At 11:00 a.m. on November 11th the Armistice comes into effect and a wave of incredulous relief spreads over the battle fronts. This is the final program in the series.

Intertel

America — The Edge of Abundance. Traces the short but galloping history of America as an affluent society and examines the complex questions which an automated society must now face. Her driving technological progress has produced ways of working which

already need fewer men, and those of greater education and training. Visits many parts of the United States to show that computers are rapidly taking over from unskilled and semi-skilled workers, and it poses the question: How can a people whose minds are trained to the idea of work

and its rewards face an age in which a minority of people can manage the nation's work?

Ferry, a social philosopher at the Centre for Democratic Studies; automation expert Michael Harrington; and Dr. Ralph Bellman, another leading U.S. computer expert. Gulf Islands: For Some, Paradise

THE CALL of the islands has always been strong within most people. City folk especially envision sunlit paradises far removed from the tensions of the nuclear age, where soft breezes caress bronzed bodies and gentle waves lap musically on white sandy beaches.

Not many locations in the world satisfy the conditions of remoteness, beauty, tranquility, and temperate climate. But such places do exist. Among the islands that lie off the coast of British Columbia, in Georgia Strait, there is a group known collectively as the Gulf Islands. Individually they are named Salt Spring, North and South Pender (linked by a bridge), Galiano, Mayne and Saturna. Salt Spring Island has the largest population (around 3,000) and most of the modern facilities found in such centres of population. The most remote of the group is Saturna Island.

Recently CBC producer George Robertson set out with a film photographer and crew to find out what it is about these Gulf Islands that makes them different, whether they are, in fact, for some people a paradise, or merely a more pleasant environment in which to worry about the same problems that afflict the rest of us. And knowing the Islands' reputation for independent, even eccentric people, Robertson was curious to see if they still abounded.

He reports that the eccentric Gulf Islander was always an exaggerated figure, and perhaps the

most colorful of them have passed away and have not been replaced in this age of faster travel and greater communication which makes even the remotest island not quite so remote. If there is a type which remains, it is the kind who has chosen to think for himself, and in the course of the film we meet a sample of the people who give the Gulf Islands their flavor and character: Jean Pattison, editor of the weekly newspaper, *The Gulf Islander*; Jimmy Neill, at 91 still singing and playing the banjo for the amusement of his cats and his friends; Mr. Whalen, the lighthouse keeper at Georgina Point on Active Pass, a former mayor of Prince Rupert; father and sons of the Akerman family on Salt Spring, moving sheep on land that Bob Akerman's grandfather settled on 100 years ago; Captain Maude of the Cy Peck, the not-yet-retired captain of the old ferry which once linked the islands and is still used, from time to time, when one of the newer ferries breaks down; Mr. and Mrs. Ralph of Saturna, talking of the early days of the island; Wynne Minty, a Gulf Islands real estate saleswoman who travels from one property to another by speedboat; and others.

These impressions of the islands have been brought together into a film entitled *The Islanders* which will be telecast Sunday, September 5th, on *Camera West*. Film photography, John Seale, film editor, Hajo F. Haderler; produced by George Robertson.

Camborne — Redruth. At one time Camborne and Redruth were the centre of Cornwall's traditional industry, tin mining. Today they are quiet provincial towns in which tourists stop on their way to the beauty spots of the Cornish coast. The slopes of Carn Bre, the whale-backed hill that links the two towns, are littered with old mine workings and derelict engine houses. With the rise in world prices of tin there has been talk of a revival of mining in Cornwall and Canadian firms are at present prospecting. Meanwhile, South Crofty Mine is in production and students from all over the world come to study mining at the famous school in Camborne. Local people talk with Bernard Palmer about industrial pioneers such as Murdoch and Trevithick, and about John Wesley, the founder of Methodism and a frequent visitor to Camborne in the 18th century, also about such typical Cornish delicacies as Cornish pasties and clotted cream.

Recitals Recorded at Piano Festival

SEVEN half-hour recitals by finalists in the first Canadian International Piano Festival competition, held in Montreal last spring under the auspices of the International Institute of Music of Canada, will be presented on radio Sunday afternoons at 4:30, beginning September 5th. They were recorded during the festival.

The competition drew over 400 applications from young pianists in 32 countries. Of these, 70 from 26 countries were chosen (through

Catherine Silie, Czila Szabo, Eugene Pridonoff, Michael Rogers, Francois-Joel Thiollier, and Michael Studer.

Performers in the September 5th broadcast will be Gaston Brisson, Constance Channon Douglass (a Calgary native who was winner of a recent *CBC Talent Festival*), Christiane Billaud, Eugene Pridonoff, and Francois-Joel Thiollier. Later programs will present Michael Studer and Catherine Silie on September 12th; Arthur Fennimore, Verda Erman and Jean-Claude Pennetier on September 19th; and Jeffrey Siegel and Albert Lotto on September 26th. Performers to be heard in October will be announced later.

Writing in French Canada

RECENTLY William French, book critic of the Toronto *Globe and Mail*, went to Montreal to look at the French half of Canada's literary image to see how distorted a reflection we get of it in English-speaking Canada. He talked to a cross-section of young poets and novelists, older publishers and critics, and learned some interesting and revealing things, not only about writing in French Canada, but also about what is happening generally in Quebec. His interviews and comments will be heard on *CBC Sunday Night*, September 5th, in a documentary produced by Gilles Couture.

French says: "The first thing that struck me was the amount of writing going on in Quebec. Poetry and novels are flourishing. I found a vitality and passion — and often torment and anguish — in these works that is absent in English Canada. There is a great diversity of opinion and attitudes on both literary and political matters. And most important, there is something that is generally lacking in English Canada — a vital, younger generation of writers, most of them in their mid-20s, full of talent, promise — and rebellion."

The major interviews are with Jacques Hébert and Pierre Tisseyre, publishers; Jacques God-

bout, poet, novelist and NFB film director; Claude Jasmin, playwright, novelist and art critic; Gerald Godin, poet, short story writer and an editor of the separatist magazine, *Parti Pris*; Diane Giguère, novelist; Jean Ethier-Blais, critic, professor of French literature at McGill University, and an all-around *belle-lettriste*; and Gilles Marcotte, literary critic and novelist.

Producer Gilles Couture says their opinions differed about whether there was a body of writing that

National Youth Orchestra's Edmonton Concert

AFTER FOUR weeks of intensive sectional and orchestral rehearsal at the University of Toronto during July, the 106 members of the National Youth Orchestra, aged 14 to 24, gave a concert in Toronto that

brought 3,000 hard-to-please music-lovers to their feet for a five-minute ovation. The zest, intelligence and cohesion of the young musicians' performance suggested that older, more experienced, but more world-weary orchestras might well look to their laurels. When the NYO toured Western Canada last month, it continued to stun concert-goers with what many of them described as the most brilliant performances they had ever heard.

While in Edmonton the orchestra recorded a program which will be presented in a special 90-minute radio concert on Monday night.

This year the orchestra is conducted by Franz-Paul Decker, chief conductor of the Rotterdam Philharmonic and a much-acclaimed European artist, who has conducted several leading Continental youth orchestras. He keeps his young musicians completely involved with the music they play. He is a strict disciplinarian, but he appreciates the leavening and inspiring quality of humor interjected at just the right moment.

The broadcast will include the *Benvenuto Cellini Overture* by Berlioz; *Symphonic Ode* by John Weinzweig (who says the NYO performance is the most exciting he has heard to date); *Variations on a Theme by Haydn*, Opus 56A, by Brahms; and *Symphony No. 4* by Tchaikovsky, which Toronto critic John Kraglund calls one of the freshest of the more than 100 interpretations of the work he has heard on two continents in the last 25 years. Reviewing the Toronto concert Kraglund enthused over the orchestra's "virtually flawless tone," and "ensemble precision."

The National Youth Orchestra was organized in 1960 for the purpose of developing competent orchestral musicians. It offers carefully selected young Canadians a chance to study with top teachers, rehearse in groups and as a full orchestra, and perform for a wide variety of audiences. Some 30 former members are now playing with major symphony orchestras, 27 of them in Canada.

What Stratford Thinks of Its Festival

WHEN A survey party of the Canada Company was pushing its way through the woods and dales between Guelph and Goderich 136 years ago, it came upon a stream

Distinguished Artists

Nova Scotia Organist

AMONG the talented organists born and trained abroad who have settled in Canada in the last few years is Eugen F. Gmeiner, instructor and organist at Acadia University, Wolfville, N.S. He will be the *Distinguished Artist* in recital on radio Monday night, September 6th, at 10:30.

Born in Bucharest, Roumania, of Austrian parents, he received his early musical training in Germany, Czechoslovakia, and Austria. When he was 16 he decided to concentrate on organ study, and enrolled at the School of Organ at the Austrian State Academy, graduating in 1949. He was heard in many recitals and radio broadcasts in Austria before moving to Canada in 1956 and taking over his present university post at Acadia. He became a naturalized Canadian citizen in 1962. That same year he won the National Organ Competition sponsored by the First Presbyterian Church in Fort Wayne, Indiana.

Gmeiner has given numerous recitals in the Atlantic provinces, including three last winter in Halifax — two in the Basilica series of programs and one in honor of the consecration of Bishop Hayes. He also appeared on CBC tv in the Easter Friday program titled *Behold the Lamb*.

For the new Manning Memorial Chapel at Acadia, Gmeiner was instrumental in securing an organ of the "classic" tradition manufactured in Canada by the Casavant Company. The organ has a mechanical action (as distinct from electrically operated action), and is of a type currently being much sought after by organ virtuosi, particularly in North America.

flowing through an area that "would be excellent for a mill but the place was infested with deer." One of the men, Dr. William "Tiger" Dunlop, rightly assumed that the stream was a branch of the Thames River, and named it Little Thames. The rich soil there attracted settlers, and the area became known as Little Thames. After a while someone decided to rename the stream the Avon.

Within four years the first settler, William Sargent, had built an inn, and the hamlet had acquired a post-office, so needed a formal name. Exactly how it got one is rather blurred by the mists of time, but the story goes that an official from the Canada Company presented Sargent with a portrait of Shakespeare to hang over the entrance to his inn, which Sargent promptly named the Shakespeare Inn, and it followed naturally that the community should become known as Stratford. As it grew it became necessary to divide it into wards, which were called Romeo, Hamlet, Falstaff, Avon and Shakespeare, and the schools and streets followed suit.

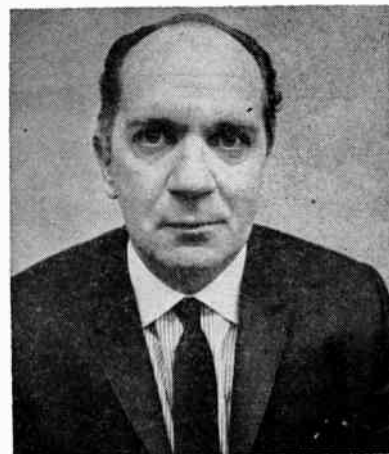
The town attracted some industries, and railway shops kept hundreds of its citizens employed, but it remained a sleepy Ontario backwater where life took its time about rolling on, where its solid, spacious houses set well back on shady streets were unchallenged by shopping plazas, and where a deep-rooted conservative attitude wrapped the town like a safe cocoon, while the rest of the world dashed along its frantic way.

Then, after decades of modest life, the quiet little town suddenly woke up. Almost overnight it became an internationally famous arts centre attracting hundreds of thousands of people from all over the world. Beards appeared under the willows along the Avon. Famous actors and actresses sped along its streets on bicycles. After decades

of insulation from many of the stresses and sophisticated ways of the outside world, Stratford found that the world was coming to it.

How has it reacted to this inundation of performers and audiences? Do townspeople like or dislike these visitors? Have the financial and cultural gains from the Festival overshadowed its attendant disruption of quiet town life? Radio's *Soundings* finds out on Monday night in a program prepared by Ralph Hicklin, drama critic for the Toronto *Globe and Mail*, and produced by John Wood.

Hicklin talks to townspeople who have lived there since before the start of the Festival, and to others who moved away and are now back again, taking a more objective view of the changes in the town in the last 13 years. He interviews actors who are performing or have performed at Stratford, taxi-drivers who take them about and help find their lost dogs and cats, and theatre-goers who invade the town once in their lives or perhaps annually. He discovers whether Stratford citizens partake of the Festival or involve themselves in it, and how they are dealing with the effects of having fame suddenly thrust upon their hometown.

could be called separatist literature, but all agreed that *Parti Pris* is one of the most exciting things to come along in French-Canadian literature in a long time. It's a little politico-literary magazine, aggressively separatist and Marxist, around which a whole group of unusually talented young writers has congregated. One of the new trends among younger Quebec writers is the use of *joual*, a sort of French-Canadian dialect, far removed from international French, in poems, novels and short stories as a political protest. Gerald Godin of *Parti Pris* compares it to Negro jive talk in the U.S. Young French Canadian writers, he says, consider this debased language the badge of the French Canadian's cultural sickness and feeling of political and economic inferiority. It is the product of a colonized sensibility. Its use in novels and short stories is part of the process of rehabilitation, a literary "sit-in." Only by forcing people to recognize their debased condition, Godin says, will they be inspired to change their lot. He claims that a writer who uses standard international French is, in a way, failing in his duty as a writer, and helping perpetuate the lie about the situation of French Canadians, thus becoming something of a *collaborateur*. This extreme view is certainly not held by the majority of even young writers in Quebec, but is an interesting reflection on much of the current unrest there.

provincial farmer governments were able to win much-needed social legislation (such as Old Age Pensions); but perhaps the Progressive Party's chief contribution was to drive a permanent wedge into the federal two-party system. The tradition of third parties has now endured for nearly half a century in Canada's federal politics as well as in most provinces; the Progressive Party's own image being more closely reflected in the CCF-NDP than in the conservative Social Credit.

Agrarian Revolt, prepared by Lawrence Nowry, will cover the political and organizational evolution of Western Canada during that basic third of a century of which the Progressive Party was at its high water mark along with the wheat pool movement and other joint economic action.

The depression years saw a new plane of struggle, in the political sphere expressed pre-eminently by the CCF. Next week on *Venture* (Sunday, September 12th), *Protest—The Preposterous Dream* traces the rise of the CCF and its defeat in the 1964 Saskatchewan elections.

Washington, London, Paris, and, if necessary, from Moscow (CBC's correspondent David Levy) and Peking (Charles Taylor of the *Globe and Mail*), experts will provide incisive interpretation of the news. As often as possible, too, interviews with political leaders—as well as their most ferocious opponents—will add liveliness to the international arena (as, for instance, the time last year when Archbishop Makarios and Vice-President Kutchuk confronted each other over the Cyprus crisis).

Is *Matinée* always solemn and serious, then? Far from it. Its far-flung correspondents — from Eric Nichol in Vancouver to Barbara Greene in London; from Harlow Unger and Del Mackenzie in New York to Joan Seager in the depths of rural Ontario—are likely to send in their outrageous reports from the frontiers of lunacy (or is it sanity?): an interview with a lady gorilla about the tv she prefers; an optimistic account of fatness and sex; answers from Zsa Zsa Gabor on matrimonial trends; a withering attack on Toronto's carelessness with typographical art—these are just a few of the topics aired last season.

Writers, ranging from gifted amateurs to established professionals, will continue to be prominently featured on *Matinée*, notably in the daily readings of novels, short stories and poetry; novels of such profound irony and power as *The Good Soldier Schweik* and *Candide*, the classic stories of Frank O'Connor and Isaak Bashevis Singer, as well as the work of known and unknown Canadian poets across the country. Contributing his own poetry and selecting works of others will be Earle Birney.

Returning to *Matinée* next winter, to the certain delight of many listeners, will be Dr. Jean Sutherland Boggs, Professor of Art at Washington University in St. Louis with a new series of *Listening to Pictures*.

And what about a recipe corner, as befits an early afternoon pro-

gram? Yes, so long as our valued listeners don't expect, as their counterparts in England expect and get, cosy little recipes for uneatably humble and tasteless puddings. Instead, they are likely to be diverted and instructed in gastronomy by *Matinée's* demon chef, John Belanger, whose language is as spicy as his recipes. Mouth watering! And to earn the money for Belanger's expensive menus, a new series, *Your Money and You*, by *Financial Post* writer Jack Schreiner, will (hopefully!) reveal the secrets of investing prudently and profitably on the stock market.

It would be presumptuous, not to say impossible, to try to please all men and women at all times. Anyway, this isn't *Matinée's* aim at all. Nevertheless the range of subjects will continue to be wide, and will include a new series of Science Newsletters, from a specialist who will translate the often bewildering complexity of scientific developments into basic English. But Lunar Orbits and Oceanography will not replace well-established series like *Matinée Quiz*, on which panels of experts will continue to advise listeners on the thousand and one problems that crop up in the house.

What else? Well, by far the greatest number of *Matinée stories*—long and short, sad and funny, serious and not so serious—can't be put in any obvious category, but it's these which make up the flesh and substance of the program: stories on medicine and welfare work, on music and architecture, controversial editorials and celebrity interviews, private preoccupations and public scandals. The parade of people and ideas is endless.

Presiding over them all like some omniscient and tremendously stylish ring-mistress is *Matinée's* hostess Pat Patterson. A rare lady! Literate. Amused and amusing. Unflappable in the most fearful of studio disasters. Day after day Pat gives background and perspective to the hundreds of pieces which *Matinée* broadcasts.

If you're an old friend, tune in again, won't you? And if you aren't, well, we hope they'll rectify the situation.—Raoul Engel

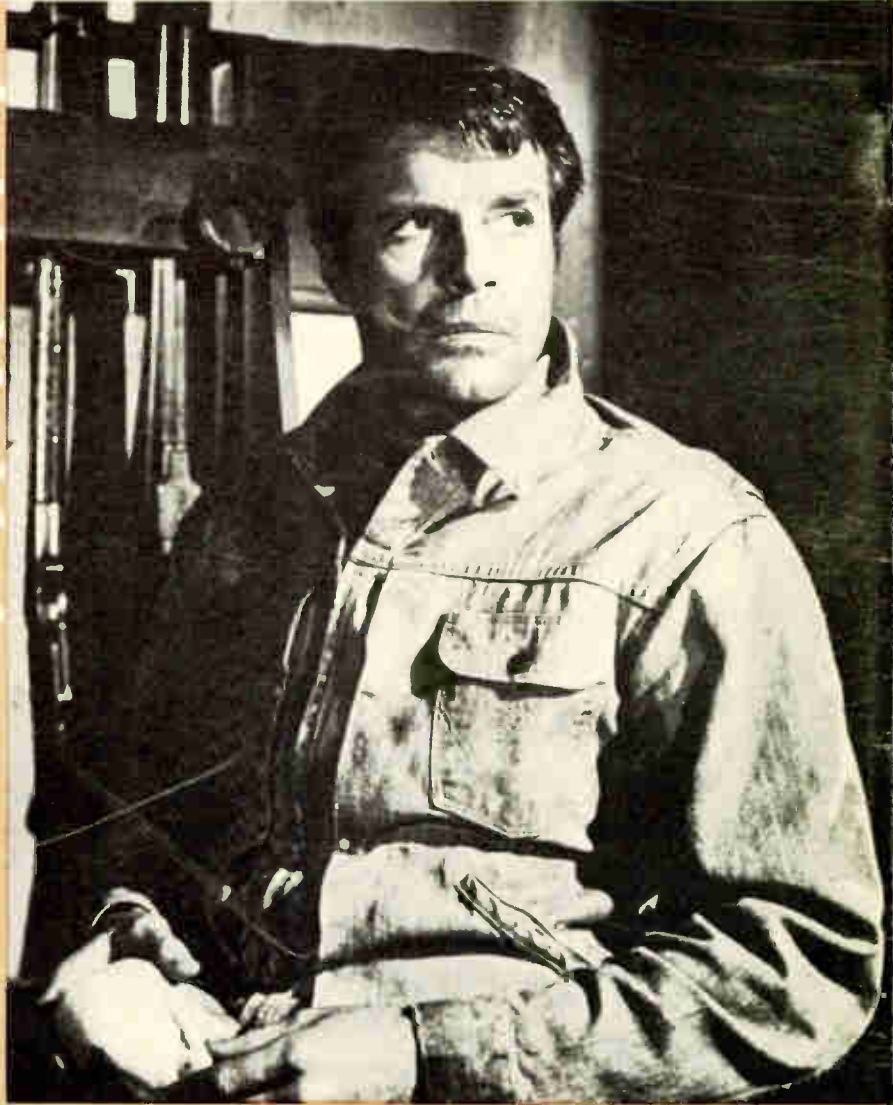
