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
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

A NATURAL QUESTION


WHAT is the good of broadcasting? This is a question which—sometimes indirectly tricked out in other guises-is still asked, or implied, too frequently in India. It is in fact a very natural question, especially in a country where broadcasting is comparatively limited and ill-equipped. But it is also a dangerous question, particularly in a country where broadcasting depends for its funds, and therefore its development, upon the opinions of legislative and executive bodies, and not, as yet, upon the natural growth of listeners. In nearly every country of the world, broadcasting has jumped ahead on the springboard of rapidly increasing revenues, and has quickly achieved a financial independence enabling it to forestall the needs of listeners and provide the supply almost before the demand was articulate.

But in India, expenditure has lagged further and further behind revenues, so that the listener has not got, is not getting, and will not for some years get, anything like full value for the license which he pays. That is indubitable. For Rs. 10 per year per license it should be commercially possible in

any country in which broadcasting is properly developed to ensure at least a choice of two alternative programmes for every listener. At present in India it cannot be said that more than a total area of about 40,000 square miles, out of a total of 1,560,000 miles, is adequately covered. That is to say, out of India's 352 million people, only about 20 million are at present within the



service area of at least one station. Yet this state of things is absurd; broadcasting revenue for 1935-1936 amounted to nearly 14 lakhs and this year will undoubtedly reach 20. Twenty lakhs—small as it is compared with India's vast distances—is an income not to be sneezed at; and the present position of broadcasting in India should be much better than it actually is.

"TAXPAYER'S MONEY"

THIS may seem a digression from the original question, but it isn't. The Assembly has to vote the funds for broadcasting, and therefore with the Assembly lies the responsibility for its present and future position. Critics of broadcasting in India are apt to talk wildly about the "taxpayer's money," and to suggest that villagers provided with wireless sets are *ipso facto* deprived of bread.

Such alarums are unfounded. The "taxpayer," as such, doesn't come into it. People who bought wireless sets and licenses in 1935 paid fourteen lakhs to the exchequer, and that money was paid and intended for the upkeep and development of a broadcasting service. In 1932, when the import duty on wireless sets was raised to its present level, the Statement of Objects and Reasons accompanying the Bill which proposed the increase stated "that the Government of India have decided to maintain the service in view of the public value of broadcasting and the weight of public opinion against its discontinuance. They consider, however, that the service should not be a charge upon the general taxpayer, and they accordingly propose that the import duties on wireless reception should be enhanced so as to ensure that the customs' receipts together with other revenue associated with broadcasting may suffice to cover the cost of the service. In that year, as it happened, the Viceroy had given an undertaking to the Legislative Assembly that the Finance Member would not bring forward any legislation to increase taxation, but in the case of broadcasting the special increase was admitted "provided that the proceeds of the surcharge shall be devoted to the development of broadcasting.'

Broadcasting revenues expanded at the rate of 60 per cent. in 1934 and 70 per cent. in 1935. Even assuming an annual increase of only 10 per cent. during the next ten years,—and there is little doubt that the increase will be very much larger,—broadcasting will in those ten years bring in revenues amounting to more than three crores of rupees. On this minimum estimate, therefore, broadcasting could, if it were a commercial concern, itself afford to pay an initial expenditure on transmitting stations of at least 50 lakhs (which should suffice for a dozen transmitters) and an annual expenditure averaging 2 lakhs per station, or some 25 lakhs per year, for its service.

WHAT USE IS BROADCASTING?

BUT here comes the danger point. Figures of these dimensions, small as they are compared with similar figures in Europe, loom large in the budgets of India. Faced with such figures, Government and Assembly may be inclined to ask "What is the use of broadcasting?" By this question they would, of course, imply another : "Can we not divert these funds to other channels? Why, in fact, assign the revenues of broadcasting to broadcasting at all?"

In a country so poor as India, it is obviously tempting to divert funds from "luxuries" to "necessities"; and broadcasting (because it is newer than education, medicine, printing, railways, or motor-cars) is still reckoned in the first category. But, divert ten or twenty or twentyfive lakhs from the yearly revenues of broadcasting, and what service will that sum perform? It certainly will not provide food for every villager in India. What, on the other hand, can broadcasting, left in possession of its own revenues, achieve?

In the first place Unity : and unity such as India has never known. Distance, poor communication, poverty—all have combined to

Broadcasting can and must break down those barriers, not only by the gradual unification of language but by providing a direct and daily channel for the interchange of ideas between all parts of India.

In the second place, Improved standards of living. People are still inclined to scoff at broadcasting, to treat it as a luxury or a toy. Yet broadcasting is the most subtle and powerful moulder of opinion that the modern world possesses. It is not on one programme item, or twenty, or a hundred, that broadcasting can be judged : it is the steady, daily infiltration of new ideas and new knowledge which can, particularly among an illiterate people, change the whole current of public opinion and outlook, and set up by gradual phases completely new standards of purpose and achievement. Preventive measures against disease, endemic and epidemic, can be hammered in by daily repetition until they become automatic ; scientific knowledge applied to agriculture can be disseminated through the villages not only by talks but by stories and dramas which drive home the lesson ; and,-least concrete, yet perhaps most important of all,-the sense of self-respect, of increased enjoyment of life through cleanliness, knowledge, foresight, and efficiency can be aroused and

encouraged in people whose present danger is to be helped rather than to help themselves. Thirdly, Education. Already in the villages the children form the keenest section of our audience: the possibilities of radio in supplementing the admittedly meagre education available to them are too obvious to call for comment. It is easy to say that bread is more important than broadcasting; but give us one village fed on charity for ten years, and another equipped for the same period with a daily and well-designed radio programme, and let us see which village in the end has learnt the lessons of independence and self-support.

THE LEISURE PROBLEM

A ND lastly, there is leisure. The villager is undoubtedly hard-worked, but during the course of the year he has his intervals of leisure, when he is waiting either to reap his ripening crop or to sow a fresh one. Even during the busy days he has his evenings when he relaxes either in the court-yard of his house or the village *chowpal*. To what use does he put his leisure hours? He smokes and he gossips,—two well-known activities of the idle poor and the idle rich alike,—but surely not even the most arcadian-minded amongst us believes that no better diversions ought to be provided for a class of people who are admittedly ignorant and un-progressive. Indigenous village

games, we are told, are dying institutions, and attempts to revive them in some Provinces have met with little success. Some sympathetic reformers have tried to introduce football and other inexpensive Western games, but as a general rule these have failed to rouse any enthusiasm. A wandering minstrel, an occasional juggler, a peripatetic story-teller, or, if the village has caught the social worker's benevolent eye, an occasional magic lantern show or an uplift play,—these small mercies sum up the meagre fare that the villager ever hopes to receive.

Put this case before any enlightened citizen of the twentieth century and he will, without so much as a moment's thought, tell you that the obvious (in fact, the only) remedy is the Radio. A broadcast programme will not merely fill up the vacant hours (during which, it is said, the devil takes possession of men's souls and drives them to perdition). Radio is the dynamic force. It can quicken, enliven, and lift the mind out of the dull torpor which seems to envelop Indian village life during work and leisure alike.

RELIGIOUS ITEMS

HOSE who listen-in to Delhi will have grown used by this time to the daily religious item with which the morning transmission invariably begins. It is either a bhajan, an arti, a recitation from Shri Bhagwat Gita, a recitation from the Quran-i-Sharif, or a na'at, Muslim and Hindu items being fairly evenly distributed over the days of the week. Although these items are of not more than ten to fifteen minutes' duration, they have proved popular amongst a large section of listeners. Hindu ladies, we are told, specially appreciate the artis and the bhajans. We have even heard of a pious old lady, the mother of a large family of radio enthusiasts, who monopolises the receiving set in the morning and in the solitude of her room sits in front of the radio listening in a devotional mood to the holy words of the Gita. Rumours have also floated in that on one occasion the Oawwali worked a few listeners up into a state of "wajd" (ecstatic trance), much to the detriment of the radio set around which they were gathered. Muslims, who have always been meticulous about the pronunciation of Quranic verses, listen to recitations from the Quran with great attention, as is evident from the fact that letters discussing variations of pronunciation and modes of recitation pour in after every such broadcast.

It has been noticed that whenever a religious time has to be arranged, artists (both amateur and professional) and speakers offer themselves with great readiness and put an unusual amount of enthusiasm into their performance. The chorus singing the arti in the morning become happily unconscious of the time limit and have to be asked in the interest of the rest of the programme to moderate their transport. Some artists and reciters (both Hindu and Muslim) even consider it sinful to accept any remuneration for broadcasting religious items, and, strange though it may seem, one has only to look at the programmes to find that bhajans have often been sung by Muslim and na'at by Hindu artists. The Krukshetra fair programme ended with the famous song "Krishnan ki Bansari", written it will be recalled by Hafeez, a Muslim poet.

A LEGITIMATE PLACE

I T has been suggested by some listeners that the radio should strictly avoid religion in any form whatsoever. Religion, they argue, is only a superstition and declare that as it has caused so much trouble in India children should be brought up in utter ignorance of it and adults allowed to forget it as soon as possible. This, it must be confessed, is the view of a very small minority. For the majority of listeners, religion is bound up indissolubly with their daily life, and as long as it continues to be a source of happiness, consolation or elevation to a large number of people it should find its legitimate place in broadcast programmes. The radio cannot ignore the genius of the land which it seeks to serve; and religion, for good or for ill, is a very important factor in the mental make-up of the people in India.

As opposed to the view given in the beginning of this paragraph, we reproduce below a note published in "Radio in India," dated June the 1st :---

"At present it is the custom in most countries to broadcast a religious service every Sunday evening, the unfortunate idea being that the people only need spiritual food once a week. These broadcast weekly services are listened to with great interest throughout India. As man needs each day some spiritual food to sustain him, the B.B.C. at Home and the State Broadcasting Service in India would do well each morning and each evening to devote no more than five minutes each to daily prayer. The prayers could be of such a nature that they would give offence to nobody but the very foolish, and their opinion can always be delibe-rately and safely ignored. If later a census were taken to ascertain the feeling of listeners on the subject, we are confident that a vast majority would be found to favour it. If this suggestion were adopted, the benefit to the people would be enormous, for bettering a people morally is better than economic or political betterment, since moral betterment is the highest a man can attain to. In India, with its brooding religious atmosphere and its people religiously inclined, the inclusion of morning and evening prayer in the daily broadcast would become a very welcome feature; and we hope the State Broadcasting Service in India will give this matter very careful consideration."

Of course, it cannot be denied that the inclusion of religious items in the programmes will make a certain number of people in this country rather nervous. Films, plays and books dealing with religious subjects have occasionally become subjects of agitation, and it is only natural that well-meaning people should wish to give religion a very wide berth in broadcasting. If, however, all the instances of agitation against films, books and plays on religious grounds be examined carefully, it will be found that in a large number of cases the agitation was started by some irresponsible or unscrupulous individual who had a personal grudge against the management. Intelligent people have always looked upon such agitation with distaste, and we have no doubt that intelligent critics of the radio will also take the same attitude. Of course, it goes without saying that the greatest care should be taken to avoid offence in any form whatsoever. This is essential, and All-India Radio would be lacking in its duty if it did not take all reasonable precautions against such unpleasantness.


On the other hand, it cannot be denied that communal jealousies can lead to absurd communal sensitiveness. There will be a small percentage of people who will always look upon religious items as attempts at proselytization! In a sense, any sympathetic mention of a

subject tends to induce listeners to agree with the speaker. A religious song well sung, the name of a deity pronounced in devotional accents, the incidents of the life of a sage related in tones of admiration, an important church service broadcast with understanding and efficiency,all such items help one to appreciate the other man's point of view. If this is proselytization, the more we have of it the better it will be for all concerned. To try and understand another man's religion, to realise the ideals that inspire him and to sympathise with his conception of the relation in which he stands to the rest of the Universe, these should be looked upon as the elements of a liberal education. To be impatient with the divergent beliefs of our next-door neighbour, to condemn a point of view simply because it is not our own, or to take offence at the mention of institutions to which

we do not ourselves belong, are as reprehensible as the desire on the part of one religion to offend the followers of another.

WILD CRITICS

No less reprehensible, however, are the aspersions which are all too frequently cast on the programme authorities by wild critics in the daily press. A striking example of this comes from a well-circulated paper in the north of India, which has long made a target of Delhi for reasons which are fast becoming obvious. In this particular case, a letter was published from a "listener" (who was not brave enough to sign his name to his communication) demanding that the Station authorities reserve a large portion of their time on August 10th to celebrating the birthday of Lord Krishna. The mere request for that "boon", as the

anonymous writer called it, would have been understandable; but he revealed his own bitter feeling when he added : "May the Hindus, who, I claim, form the majority of the listeners-in to Delhi, hope that the communal predilections of the authorities would not stand in the way of acceding to this request.'

Coming so soon after the very elaborate arrangements made by the Delhi station authorities for broadcasting the Hindu Solar eclipse fair at Krukshetra, this accusation of communalism is ridiculous, whilst the actual programme fixed for August 10th, which was contained in the "Indian Listener" posted from Bombay on the same day as the paper containing this silly letter reached us, shows how unwarranted was the criticism. All of the studios of All-India Radio arranged special programmes for Janam Ashtami, Delhi in particular going to a lot of trouble, including the organising of a special relay of the rejoicings from Muttra and the performing of a special drama depicting the main significance of the birthday of Lord Krishna. All of these programmes, we would add, were planned and settled long before the newspaper critic put his pen to paper, and few grumblers could have been more ashamed of their outbursts against us than this particular grouser must have been when he saw for himself from the "Indian Listener" what was being done "for the Hindus" on that day.

It is letters such as these which, in the guise of being helpful to broadcasting, actually do great harm to radio by setting afoot all manner of rumours based on utterly unfounded ideas. Had the authorities taken no notice whatever of Janam Ashtami, our critic would have been justified in complaining to the Controller or to the Station Director concerned; but to write such a venomous and unwarranted letter as that to which we have referred proves to us once again that there is unfortunately far more behind these attacks than a burning desire to be helpful, especially as this "listener" could very easily have written in good time to the Delhi station courteously requesting that a special programme be prepared for Lord Krishna's birthday.

LET THERE BE LIGHT

HE citizens of Delhi will not miss their time signal for long. This was, till recently, provided by the local Electric Supply Company

by means of dimming the lights at nine o'clock every evening. Lights are dimmed, as our intelligent readers know, by lowering the voltage of the current supply. However useful this may be to human beings, radio transmitters find this dipping detrimental to their constitution, and Station engineers have a distinct "sinking feeling" when the voltage is dropped. This was pointed out to our power suppliers who persuaded the Delhi Municipality " to reconsider the matter," with the result that the practice of dimming the lights has now been abandoned. By the time we are in print, the Delhi Radio Station will be broadcasting its own time signal at suitable hours, namely, 9-30 a.m., 1-30 p.m., 6-30 p.m. and 9-30 p.m. As it is, listeners even now set their watches by the timings of the various items as given in the published programmes !

Bombay and Calcutta will continue their regular time signals given frequently during each day's programme, but especially at the beginning of each transmission.

IS SHORT-WAVE PERFECT?

WE live and learn,—even from our juniors. A month or so ago a new radio journal was started in Calcutta which claims to be a champion of short-wave, and nothing but short-wave. All good luck to it | But, with the impetuosity of youth, we find that it loses no time in trying to pick its elders to pieces, for in a recent issue it plaintively asks, "Where does the Indian Listener get its information?" This, however, is not an acknowledgment of its own lack of authority or knowledge, but a rather amusing attack on this paper because we recently published a statement to the effect that during the past three or four months short-wave reception has not been an unqualified success in India. This newly-founded short-wave paper tries to prove that this form of reception in India knows nothing of either fading or breaking, and cites the experience of two or three listeners to show that "short-wave is not a failure even in the rains and hot weather." Well, we congratulate those listeners on their good fortune, but we cannot help warning this very young paper that as it grows older in wireless experience it will grow wiser too. Therefore we forgive this little example of juvenile infallibility.

Our argument is this: Short-wave at times can be wonderful. And at other times it can be damnable. India is such a big country, and its climatic and other conditions are so variable, that it is absolutely impossible either to generalise or to dogmatise on radio reception. Our information (and here we reply to the query of our young contemporary) is based on reports from thousands of listeners all over the country, and in the light of their experience we adhere to our assertion that at times short-wave reception in India is nothing less than agony. On many occasions, we admit, it is delightful, particularly from distant lands; but when we talk of short-wave reception, or any other form of reception, we refer to such reception over a period of, say, at least a month, and not one or two sporadic days on which reception conditions have been particularly good.

FADING-AND HOPING!

HE fascination of wireless is that it is anything but constant. For those who are still pondering over what a contemporary calls the "battle of the waves," here is an extract from a bulletin just issued by the German short-

wave station, and we commend it to those who claim that the Government of India should go ahead on either a short-wave or a medium-wave programme of transmitters : "Listeners overseas will have noticed that this year reception over short-wave is already appreciably better than it was in the previous year, and that the longer waves are being heard very badly. This will continue to be more and more the case up till the year 1938. From that time onward, the longer waves will begin to be received better and better. This is probably due to the muchdiscussed sun-spots, which every eleven years become more numerous.'

How's that for a puzzler? The next thing we shall hear is that yet a third school of wireless experts will arise in India demanding that the Controller use short-wave up to 1938 and long-wave thereafter, at least until another batch of sun-spots turns wireless reception inside out again! But apart from any such fantastic suggestions from voluntary advisers, this forecast from such a reliable source as the German technical research department reveals how essential it is that the broadcasting authorities in India take every scientific possibility into consideration before launching out into a scheme of new transmitters to cover further large portions of this country.

CALCUTTA'S SCOOP

RIENDLY rivalry between our Indian stations is all to the good. In some respects, of course, Delhi has an advantage over Bombay and Calcutta in that, as the headquarters of the Government of India, it has ready access to a large number of high officials who otherwise could not be put on the air. Delhi also lies on the direct air route across India. Bombay, on the other hand, is officially and geographically the Gateway of India, and therefore has first choice of all visitors, although it must be confessed that the majority of visitors are generally so anxious to get to their journey's end that it is exceedingly difficult to arrange for them to broadcast. Calcutta, as the Second City of the Empire, has previously bemoaned that it gets no

such chances as either Delhi or Bombay, even though it is the other gateway to India from the East. Weighing up the advantages, however, it would seem that all three stations are about equal in opportunities.

But Calcutta scored a scoop last month in getting Mr. Hugh Ruttledge to speak on "Un-conquered Everest." The talk was arranged at a day's notice, as it were, and was the result of the visit to the railway station by an enterprising member of the Station staff to meet the Everest party on their way down from Darjeeling. Then followed conversations between Mr. Ruttledge, Mr. Bowman, the Calcutta representative of the Daily Telegraph (which had exclusively signed up the "story" of the party) and the Director of Programmes. Thanks to the courtesy of the London paper, all details were soon completed ;-and thus the Calcutta Station scored heavily with the most " exclusive" wireless talk of the year, namely, the story of this year's glorious failure.

ANOTHER BIRTHDAY

LAST month Bombay station celebrated its ninth birthday,—and also the ninth anniversary of the beginning of broadcasting in India. Now comes Calcutta with its own special birthday celebrations, in the form of a Revue entitled "Radio Cavalcade," on August 26th. This will be a non-stop broadcast parade of artistes who have performed in the studios during the past year. And surely it is almost a record to have a programme of 27 individual performers, a male chorus, a band, and an orchestra all on one evening 1

SPORTS' BROADCASTS

THE broadcasting of sporting events has not so far been fully exploited in India, although both Calcutta and Bombay have laid an excellent foundation on which can be built up a very popular set of programmes. Calcutta, for example, this year has relayed running commentaries on the Inter-provincial Hockey Tournament, the Beighton Cup, the Calcutta Football League, the I. F. A. Shield, military and civil boxing tournaments, and even professional contests such as the two matches (which aroused great interest throughout the East) between Gunboat Jack and Tiger Freeman. Bombay also has served its up-country listeners well in sport, and this month is concentrating on the Rovers Cup, for which a record All-India entry has been received. At the time of going to press, it has not been possible to include all the matches in this programme, but they will be regularly announced from the microphone and through the press as soon as it becomes clear which contests will be worth relaying.

This feature of broadcasting has a great future in India, and we are glad to be able to reveal for the first time that the new Cricket Stadium in Bombay (the finest of its kind in the East) is to have a special radio cabin included in the construction to ensure that all matches played there can be broadcast under the best conditions.

NEW FEATURES

THE Station Director of Delhi informs us that the recent visit of the Controller to Simla has resulted in the introduction of several new features into the programme. Particularly should the programme of selections from Gilbert and Sullivan's operas, given by the Simla Music Club on the 19th, prove attractive, for there are few of us who enjoy European music who do not automatically start humming whenever we hear any of those catchy refrains which made light opera so famous a few decades ago.

The growing demand for recorded music has presented all our programme directors with a pretty problem, for nothing is more boring than to hear the same old introduction, "The next record is No. 123436789, produced by

So and So." Delhi has solved the problem by offering her recorded programmes under definite titles, a feature which has boundless possibilities.

Talking about records, perhaps a word of explanation will be useful here. We have received several letters complaining because certain singers include in their broadcast programmes songs which they have already recorded and which are, therefore, very familiar to listeners. There is, we maintain, no strength in this complaint, because it is obvious that singers are usually famous for the rendering of a few special songs, which are the ones selected by the gramophone companies for recording. These songs are, naturally, their best, and we believe that there would be a tremendous outburst from listeners if such songs were omitted by the artistes when they appeared in person before the microphone. Such an outburst, indeed, would be infinitely greater than that now made by a few listeners who want something "new."

As for talks, Delhi once again has a varied selection which should appeal to all, especially as the speakers include Lady Grigg (on ghosts), Sirdar Sir Jogendra Singh (on agriculture), M. L. Darling (on an upland village in Kashmir), Sir Gokal Chand Nairang (on industrial development), A. Latifi (on what the districts are saying), and J. B. Vesuga (on Simla in 1986).

There are also two very interesting Hindusthani debates by Indian speakers, the subjects being "Do Women Rule Better than Men?" and "Will Coming Generations Be Happier than Ours?"

SUGGESTIONS

W fact that all our programmes are month by month reflecting the suggestions of listeners. It is true that many of the suggestions made by listeners had actually been put into operation before such letters were received, but a number of other useful suggestions have been gratefully accepted and incorporated in the programmes as soon after receipt as possible. All our Station Directors try to look ahead in arranging their programmes,—sometimes as much as six months ahead,—to ensure that topical and appropriate items are included; but if any listeners have any really practical suggestions as to future programmes, letters giving details are always welcome.

BOMBAY'S OFFERINGS

W^E have not, of late, devoted very much space in these notes to commenting in detail on the various station programmes, but we feel that there are times when special items deserve particular mention. During the fortnight with which this issue deals, Bombay has some excellent features to present, notably in matters of music. For example, looking through the programmes we see a piano-violin-cello recital assisted by Linda Maye, a very celebrated soprano who has sung in the Royal Opera House in Rome; a violin recital by Gretel Sommer; a pianoforte recital of British Music by Gordon Bryan, the Examiner of the Associated Board of the Royal School of Music; a recital by Professor Franz and his trio; and a concert of light orchestral music and songs by Joseph Neumann and his Hungarian instrumentalists, with Albert Tarrant as baritone.

Amongst the talks, we have the veteran Sir T. Vijayaraghavachariya searching his memory for reminiscences of an old official, whilst the Bombay Amateur Dramatists give the final act of that mystery thriller, "Wolf! Wolf!"

The Indian programmes are equally as interesting. Particularly might attention be called to the "Air-Raiders,"—a band of amateur young ladies of good family who will entertain with songs and instrumental music. Of the six, at least three of these young ladies have never

before appeared before the microphone. Three dramas are included in this fortnight's programme and several skits, mainly owing to the popular demand for this form of broadcast entertainment. Finally, there is the continuation of the series of instructive talks being given by Mrs. Korshed T. Mulla on the "Foundations of Music," a series which, incidentally, has attracted the attention of not a few European listeners who welcome the opportunity to learn the basic principles of Indian music.

"CHECK-MATE"

"HE B. B. C. have certainly shown initiative (and courage) in arranging a running commentary on a chess tournament. Of all things in this world which at first sight would appear to be devoid of any form of excitement, it is a drawing-room battle between the black queen and the white bishop and castle, not to mention the opposing knights. But the B. B. C. evidently felt that there are many chess player throughout the Empire who would welcome " an opportunity of hearing some of the masters speak", so they seized the opportunity provided at the great chess congress which is being held this month at University College, Nottingham. During this congress there will be seen the biggest tournament held in England for many years, and such champions of the game as Dr. Euwe, the world's greatest player, Alekhine, Capablanca and Lasker are taking part. But how the B. B. C. expect to keep to a time-table in a chess match we know not, as we ourselves have seen matches in which each move has taken over an hour to think out ! However, listeners who are chess fans will probably be listening in, with their chessboards in front of them, on August 10th, 13th, and 14th, following with bated breath the intricacies of the King's Gambit and other complicated systems worked out by champions. At any rate, here is an idea for one of our Indian stations, because there are some excellent chess players in this country who could probably be easily persuaded to play a match in front of the microphone, with a suitable commentator describing each move. And after chess, we shall probably have tiddley-winks !

RADIO'S LOSS

T is with sincere regret that we record the death of one of Bombay's most popular broadcasters, A. G. A. Norman. For the past five years, he had been responsible for an almost weekly commentary on Indian sport, although he could always be called upon for other talks to fill in time when the scheduled speakers could not turn up. At the early age of 37 he died suddenly on July 30 following an operation for appendicitis, leaving the sporting world of the Bombay Presidency much poorer. Mr. Norman was a member of the staff of the "Illustrated Weekly," but as a very hard-working journalist he had also made a name for himself as the editor of the "W. I. A. A. Magazine" and of "Cricket." But it was as a regular broadcaster that he probably gained most of his popularity, for his talks were always lively, humorous, blunt, and interesting. We express our sympathies with his wife and children, who are now in England where Mr. Norman was expecting to join them within a few weeks. Incidentally, in order to make himself a good broadcaster, "A. G. A." actually made special plans during his last Home leave to visit the headquarters of the B. B. C. and see for himself how sporting commentaries and talks were arranged and delivered.

CAN you write a radio play? This is the question asked by one of India's most popular illustrated papers. HE boon of inexpensive entertainment to listeners is proportionately far greater in India than in other countries, for the average person is unable to indulge in such luxuries as gramophone records, cinemas, plays or musical evenings to any great extent. Radio has made all these things possible, and the advantage to women who cannot leave their homes because of children and house work is even greater. When you consider the lives of comparative drudgery that most Indian women lead, unrelieved by any form of entertainment but gossip or an occasional film, you will realise what inestimable benefits radio has brought to them.

But apart from those to whom radio has opened out a world hitherto remote and unattainable, the wealthier man and woman also derive much good from broadcasting. Radio transcends all petty national boundaries, and succeeds, where man has failed, in true internationalism.

Radio has, therefore, done things of enormous benefit to mankind, and I must conclude with a paradox, for not only has it made the world smaller by rapid communication and the annihilating of space, but it has at the same time made it infinitely larger by broadening our vision, our knowledge, and our understanding.

Taking stock of Indian broadcasting after nine years, the general impression is that "prospects are good". On the ninth anniversary celebrated in Bombay on July 23rd, several interesting talks on broadcassing's future were given, and on these pages we give striking extracts from three of them.



OT enough is known of the success attending the efforts at rural improvement being made all over the country, and this is where broadcast talks can help, for if we all tell people in one place of the actual results achieved in another, they will begin to think for themselves, and a desire will be created for an improvement of their own lot.

In a country such as India, practical methods are absolutely essential if progress is to be made, but progress will be much slower than it need be if steps are not taken to explain the purpose underlying the methods which are now being instituted throughout the length and breadth of the country. It is necessary in the first instance to introduce broadcasting in an interesting way in order to create the habit of listening. Once this habit takes root, educational talks will follow as a natural sequence until eventually a desire to hear more on the subject is created.

There must be thousands of young men, and also young women, whose help could be enlisted to do this, and broadcast talks properly organised and arranged should be very useful for this purpose. Immediately the younger generation start to take an interest in the subject, and develop a pride in the condition of their village and town, improvements will take place automatically.

HE value of broadcasting would seem to consist in knitting the world together by the dissemination of news, by the popularisation of philosophy and science and music, and by making it possible for large masses of people to participate in benefits which were once the privilege of those styled the higher classes.

In India especially, the task of broadcasting is both urgent and incalculably beneficent. The Indian villager is shrewd, and although by nature conservative, he has been proved to be keen on adapting himself to new conditions where they are inevitable or profitable. The work of rural reconstruction, of which the necessity is being increasingly felt, can be greatly facilitated by the diffusion of this agency.....And those who know India will also realise how easily the inhabitants not only of towns but of rural parts would respond to the influence of the popular educator and of the musician. It is only the superficial observer who has not been impressed by the fact how long before modern ideas were adopted, Indian culture spread from Kashmere to Cape Comorin, how Indian legend and Indian epic became parts of the common Indian heritage, and how identical traditions in folklore and music and even philosophy were created and maintained throughout the country. This is why I regard broadcasting as full of potential value in the unification of this country and the emergence of a new and united India.

Broadcasting can play a great part, if it is neither vulgarised nor used for tendentious or propagandist purposes, but, on the other hand, is employed as a means of well-designed popular education and uplift not dragooned into uniformity or too strictly controlled so as to impede artistic creation, but fulfilling its task not only of increasing the sum of human enjoyment but of directing human effort to high uses.

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
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We commend the above extract from an editorial in the "Madras Mail" of July 23rd to all our critics, as it reveals not only a sound point of view but also a realisation of the fact that the progress of broadcasting must be steady rather than spectacular.

'HE question of interference on the shortwave bands is one which is causing us serious anxiety, because more and more shortwave broadcasting stations are starting up, and it is difficult to say where room can be found for them without seriously affecting the services of stations already working. The 49-metre broadcasting band is already so full that it is almost impossible for any station in the band to give a satisfactory service. A great deal of the interference experienced by listeners is caused by stations using this band which are intended only for local service. Unfortunately, these stations, even the low power ones, are capable of causing world-wide interference. While receivers can be made more and more selective, it is useless to push selectivity beyond the point where quality of reproduction becomes impaired.

The modern all-wave receiver is usually of the superheterodyne type, since it is difficult to ensure good enough selectivity on the shortwave bands in a practical way by other means. However, although the superheterodyne principle gives the desired freedom from interference from stations working on neighbouring frequencies, it introduces another kind of difficulty known as second-channel interference. I am going to deal with this at some length, because our experience of complaints from listeners shows that a lot of the interference they suffer from is due to this.

SUPERHETERODYNE PRINCIPLE

HE superheterodyne principle depends on the fact that if two frequencies are applied to a valve working in a certain way, a third frequency, which is equal to the difference between the two, is produced. Other frequencies are produced as well, but we need not worry about those now. You will see then that, if you are receiving Daventry on, say, 11,750 kc/s and you generate a frequency in the receiver by means of an oscillating valve of 11,290 kc/s, a resultant frequency of 460 kc/s is obtained. However, if you generate in the receiver the frequency which differs from Daventry's frequency by 460 kc/s on the other side, that is, 12,210 kc/s, you get the same result. Thus, in the simplest form of superheterodyne receiver, you will find that any station can be tuned in at two different points on the dial.

Conversely, if you keep the frequency generated in the receiver constant, two distinct incoming signals, differing from it in frequency by 460 kc/s above and below, will produce the same resultant or "intermediate frequency," and may be received one on top of the other.

SECOND-CHANNEL SELECTIVITY

N OW, while it may not matter much that one station can be turned it station can be tuned in at two points on the dial, it is obviously undesirable that two stations should come in at one point on the dial and it is this unfortunate effect which is known as secondchannel interference.

The practical ways in which this is avoided are first, by arranging for the tuning knob to control simultaneously the frequency of the locally-generated signal and the tuning of those circuits of the receiver which deal with the incoming signal; and, secondly, by arranging that the only external signal which reaches the frequency-changing valve is that from the wanted station. In particular, these circuits must not pass any trace of a signal which is spaced from the wanted one by twice the amount of the intermediate frequency. If we translate this into simpler language, it means that, in the ordinary way, the receiver ought to have at least one stage of amplification at the incoming frequency, and that this should include at least two efficient tuned circuits.

I know that this question of second-channel selectivity is somewhat complicated, and for this reason it has been dealt with at much greater length in a new edition of the Empire Service pamphlet. If any one listening would like to know more about

it, we shall be pleased to send you the pamphlet if you will write to us and ask for one. These remarks are of course only intended to apply in a general way, and a receiver may employ some special means of avoiding the difficulty.

The practical results of insufficient secondchannel selectivity are illustrated by letters we receive from listeners complaining of inter-ference on the Empire wavelengths, caused by powerful Morse telegraph transmitters, for on examining these complaints we have often found that they have not been due to the interfering station working too close to one of the Daventry wavelengths, but that their allotted frequency happens to be separated from the Daventry channel by twice the value of the intermediate-frequency used in their particular receiver. Obviously in a case like this the Morse telegraph station cannot be held responsible !

I now come to another point arising from listeners' letters, which also has its origin in the use of superheterodyne receivers. The complaint often is that the Daventry trans-mitters are not stable in frequency and that the listener has to readjust the tuning of his receiver frequently to follow the so-called variations in the frequency of Daventry. Some times it is pointed out that this happens more frequently towards the beginning of a transmission. I can tell you, however, that the wavelengths or frequencies radiated by the Daventry transmitters are, in fact, stable, at any rate to the extent of one part in 25,000.

From my brief remarks about the superheterodyne principle, you will realise that the intermediate-frequency is determined by the difference between the incoming signal from

Daventry and the frequency generated in your receiver. If one or the other of these changes, the intermediate-frequency will change and you will then have to readjust the tuning of your receiver so that the locally-generated signal is brought back to a point where you get the correct intermediate frequency. Otherwise, if the intermediate-frequency generated does not correspond to that which has been chosen for the intermediate-frequency amplifier in your receiver, the receiver will become less sensitive, and the volume of sound coming from your loudspeaker will decrease. Further, there may be a change in quality and the programme will become gradually higher pitched. These complaints, are, in fact, due to a change in the

locally-generated frequency in your receiver. Almost all commercial superheterodyne receivers show this defect to some extent, particularly in the first quarter of an hour or so after switching on. Some are very much worse than others, and it is certainly a point to look for when you are testing out a new receiver.

ADJACENT-CHANNEL SELECTIVITY

This term is used to be This term is used to denote the capacity of a set to receive stations on a given frequency, or wavelength, free of interference from stations working on neighbouring wavelengths.

As I have already said, there is a maximum selectivity beyond which it is undesirable to go, and this is determined by the fidelity of reproduction which is required. If the adjacentchannel selectivity is too high, the frequencies which correspond to the higher musical sounds will be cut off or reduced in volume and we arrive at a quality of reproduction which is sometimes described as mellow or "plummy," but which is certainly not a true reproduction of what is taking place in the broadcasting studio. On the other hand, if the adjacentchannel selectivity is made too low, you will get the high notes all right, but interference from stations on adjacent frequencies also comes in. The problem of the receiver designer is to find a compromise between these two extremes.

If, however, the adjacent-channel selectivity can be varied, then the listener has the means of reducing the selectivity to the required value, to give the best quality of reproduction consistent with freedom from interference. In

other words, he can adjust the compromise himself to fit existing conditions. The simplest form of variable selectivity is the tone control, although this will not give the same freedom from certain types of interference as true variable selectivity. A variable selectivity device on a short-wave receiver is also an advantage because it allows the listener to choose the best compromise between unwanted background noise and quality of reproduction. As the channel width to which a receiver will respond is increased, so also will the noise be increased, and vice versa.


RECEIVING AERIALS

N concluding this article on receivers, I should like to say something about receiving aerials. Those of you who have heard my previous talks on the transmission and propagation of shortwaves will, I hope, realise that the choice of the characteristics of receiving aerials can play a large part in giving you good reception. Generally speaking, the direction from which the waves sent out from Daventry arrive at your receiving aerial is fairly well defined, more so in the horizontal plane than in the vertical plane, but nevertheless well enough defined for you to obtain an advantage if you can give preference to signals coming from that direction at the expense of unwanted signals coming from other directions.

The majority of listeners cannot, of course, erect a complicated receiving aerial which may require the use of high masts and take up a large amount of space. In general, therefore, I can only suggest that you put up the best possible type of ordinary receiving aerial such as would be used for ordinary broadcasting. Get it as high as possible and as clear as possible of trees, buildings, etc.

If you are living in densely populated areas and suffer from electrical interference caused by trams, motor cars, etc., I can only suggest that you use one or other of the so-called " noise-free " aerials and see that it is connected in the right way to your receiver by a suitably screened lead-in and transformer. Our own experience has been that many of these aerials can give very good results, provided they are properly connected to the receiver.

If you have plenty of space available and can erect a mast of 50 to 60 feet, then I would suggest trying the "inverted-V" aerial, particulars of which you will find in our Empire Service pamphlet. One advantage of the "inverted-V" aerial is that, although it is designed to have its optimum performance at a given wavelength, it does not fall off rapidly in its performance on either side of this; in fact, it is suitable for covering a band of waves from about threequarters of the optimum up to three times. If, therefore, you design the "inverted-V" to have its optimum performance on 19 metres, it will cover reasonably well the band from 14 to 50 metres. If you use any type of directional aerial, obviously you want to make certain that the direction from which it receives best coincides with the direction of arrival of the signals from Daventry. Here again, the Empire Service pamphlet will help you, since it contains both a map and a table giving the true and magnetic bearings of Daventry from representative places in the world.

India and a Radio Research Board

We have received the following interesting letter from Professor M. N. Saha, D.Sc., F.R.S., from London. We gladly give space to the learned professor's views, reserving to ourselves the right to make further comments at a later date should we think them necessary.

To

THE EDITOR, "INDIAN LISTENER,"

DEAR SIR,

In the editorial of the "Indian Listener" of 22nd May, there is a reference to the meeting of scientists and radio workers called at London on 5th May by Professor S. K. Mitra, in which the proposal for the formation of a Radio Research Board in India was discussed. As I happened to be present in the meeting, I would like to say a few words in this connection.

Bombay.

It is mentioned in the said editorial that the newly-formed research section of All India Radio " will be able to develop both its functions of practical development and academic research in co-operation with the various scientific and educational institutions, as well as the splendid band of enthusiastic individuals." The co-operation alluded to, and also the co-ordination of the researches carried on by the various scientific bodies, can only be brought about by the formation of the Radio Research Board under discussion. There are several reasons why the newlyfounded research section of All-India Radio cannot perform the functions of a body like the Radio Research Board of England or of Australia or Canada.

In the first place, the research section will be more concerned with immediate engineering problems of a commercial nature, and will not be able to undertake investigation of problems of a fundamental character, which is one of the main items in the programme of work of the Radio Research Boards. This is because the academic atmosphere which is necessary for the study of such problems is entirely lacking in the research section of a broadcasting organisation.


Secondly, it has been our sad experience in the past that when a Government department takes upon itself the task of carrying on fundamental research work, the duties of the officer engaged for the purpose very often begin and end in going through an interminable series of official files and the officer is hardly allowed any time for quiet thinking and sustained work; the desire of the Government to carry out such investigations ultimately reduces to a mere pious hope.

Thirdly, it has not been found possible for the research sections of other and much bigger broadcasting concerns to take upon themselves the performance of functions of Radio Research Boards, and it will no more be so for the newlyformed similar section of the A. I. R.

(It may not generally be known that the British Broadcasting Corporation has a research section of which Mr. Kirke is the head. It deals with problems arising out of the technical development of the engineering of broadcasting, and it has neither been within its scope, nor it has ever been its aim, nor indeed it is possible, for it to perform the functions of the Radio Research Board.)

The Radio Research Board of England (which may be said to be the model of such bodies) is under the control of the Department of Scientific and Industrial Research of which Sir Frank Smith is the Secretary. There are seats on it not only of representatives of the various Government departments like the Post Offices, the Meteorological Department, the Air Ministry, but also of independent Physicists and of bodies connected with the art of radio communication like the B.B.C. and the Marconi Company. Such a body, on account of its representative character, is eminently fitted to formulate and carry out programmes of researches having much wider scope than the necessarily restricted programmes of a broadcasting organisation. There is great need in India for a body like this, and its aims and objects cannot be fulfilled by the newlyformed research section of the A. I. R.

Problems Solved by the Technical Service Department

No. 1.—I wish to change my receiver, and seek your advice on the best set to buy, either American, British, or foreign.—M. M., MORADABAD.

We are afraid that this is one of the cases in which we can be of little practical service to our readers, for the official organ of All-India Radio is obviously not able to give preference to any particular set. A cheap set placed in a suitable position with a good aerial might easily give much better results than an expensive receiver which does not happen to be located in a suitable spot. But with so many good firms importing well-tested sets, it should not be difficult for any prospective purchaser to make arrangements for a good trial by obtaining several popular sets in turn on approval, then choosing the one that gives the best results under local conditions.

No. 2.—My Universal A/C and D/C operates on four values (detector oscillator, rectifier, I. F. amplifier, and output pentode), and as I wish to replace them one at a time as funds permit, I would like advice as to the order in which they should be given priority.—I. A. O. C., CAWNFORE.

Taking it for granted that all the valves are in an equal condition, there is no special order of replacement. Any order will do, but the enquirer's own order is probably best.

No. 3.—I have never been able on my D/C set to get results from the 19 metre wave-length, and now the 25 metre is very faint. But 31 is good in the early morning. What is the trouble?—L. V. C., CAWNPORE.

At this time of the year, this listener should be able to get fair reception during the evening hours on the 19 metre band, but during the monsoon one can never be too certain about reception from distant stations, as atmospheric conditions vary so much. But in this case it is possible that the 19 meter coil, or tuned circuit of the 19 meter band, as the case may be, is defective, especially as the set has been in use for 18 months.

No. 4.—I am using a naked copper wire for the assial of my D/C set, but have great difficulty in cutting out the noise of the power house, which is about 100 yards away in a straight line. What is the best method of tuning in ?—S. M. S., BAREILLY.

There can be no two opinions about this problem. A shielded wire lead-in must be used, and the aerial should be put diagonal to the power house. It will also be necessary to ascertain whether the interference is picked up by the aerial system or is conducted to the set by the mains. The only sure method of avoiding inteference from electric machinery is to nip it in the bud by avoiding sparking at the source, or by applying a filter at the source. If that is not possible, then try to insert a filter where the mains enter your building, provided you are sure that the interference comes through the mains. If, however, the trouble is being picked up by the aerial, then see that your shielded lead-in is fitted with an impedance adjusting device.

No. 5.—I purchased an 11-value set five months ago, which gave me good service until a fortnight ago, when all signals suddenly stopped. Values have been tested and are good; so what can be wrong?—H.U.B., JODHPUR.

If the set is absolutely dead, it seems likely that the mains unit is faulty and that you are not getting the necessary voltages at the valve sockets. If the set is alive but is receiving no signals, then it may be that the tuning circuit is out of alignment, or that there is a break in the aerial or tuning circuit.

No. 6.—For the past few months I have not been receiving any foreign station on the 16 and 19 metres in the evening and only Java on 29 and Germany on 31 at full strength. Yet in the early morning I get all foreign stations on 31 with good volume. What is the trouble with my set?—H.S.K., DAMAO.

This listener should turn to the answer to Problem No. 3 on this page. It might also be that his coil and condenser for the 16 and 19 bands are defective, or that the H. F. circuits on these bands have got out of alignment.

No.7.—We bave great trouble with unwelcome electrical "interference", mainly from fans and an electric pump. Should we buy any of the "eliminators" advertised ?—T.J.H., AMBA-SAMUDRAM. We would first refer this listener to Problem No. 4 on this page. There is no doubt that the best course in dealing with electrical interference is to suppress the interfering frequencies at the source. A filter consisting of condensers and chokes will remedy the trouble. In most cases two 2 mfd. or 4 mfd. condensers in series connected across the vibrating contacts with their junction point tapped to earth will suffice for the purpose. If it is not possible to take this step at the source, then there is nothing to do but to purchase one of the advertised filters, although it is doubtful whether these will completely cut out interference. A good one, however, will certainly help a great deal.

No. 8.—I should like to know why reception from Daventry is often much fainter than from other stations, and also whether it is likely that in the near future the B.B.C. will send out Transmission 3 for India on a wave-length above 20 metres. My set only receives from 20 to 50 metres on short-wave.—E.W., KALYAN.

Naturally All-India Radio cannot be dogmatic about the Daventry transmissions, although if our enquirer has read the series of six articles by Sir Noel Ashbridge, Chief Engineer of the B.B.C., on the various problems connected with the Empire transmission (the last article is being published in this issue of the "Listener"), she will understand some of the difficultics with which they have to contend. The wave-length used by the B.B.C. is selected according to the time of the year, the time of the day, and the weather conditions, and in the winter months the Empire programmes are frequently transmitted on 25 and 31 metres. But the 16 and 19 metres have been found generally best suited for evening hours for transmission 3 for India.


