a ground clamp and two connecting links. The transmission line, antenna junction box, antenna wire and strain insulators are factory assembled with all joints soldered, thus greatly reducing the time and labour necessary for installations.

The transmission line is specially impregnated to avoid losses in efficiency due to the deteriorating effects of the weather. The antenna box is hermetically sealed so that losses due to soot and dirt on crossover eliminators are avoided. At the point of connection to the receiver, an easily attached receiver coupling unit complete with screw terminals and connecting links make connection easy.

The ground clamp is of the screw type, with a point for making contact through the paint or corrosion on the pipe. In the event a lightning arrester is desired, two will be necessary connected to each transmission line. When selecting lightning arresters, those having low internal capacity should he used, as otherwise some of the signal voltage may be bypassed to the ground. **Rs. 28.**


RURAL BROADCASTING.

I T is safe to assume that under the new Viceroy rural broadcasting is likely to come to the fore, and it may be of interest to touch upon some of the problems which it presents.

Broadcasting is generally considered a sort of commercial undertaking and people expect it, if not to pay dividends, at least to be selfsupporting. But there is one aspect of its service the value of which cannot be assessed in rupees, annas and pies, and that is the service to the peasant in his village. This can never be a "paying proposition" in the usual sense of the word. Even though its educational and cultural value to the villagers may be immeasurable, he is at present too poor even to contribute towards the cost or maintenance of even a common receiver for the community. But it can well be said that a service which betters the health, the earning power, or the standards of living and culture of the villager-who is the backbone of the State-contributes in a substantial though indirect manner to the wealth of the State itself.

PROVINCIAL CONTRIBUTIONS.

HE North-West Frontier Province has led the way in the installation of village receivers, and although its funds have been limited. has provided a very useful object lesson in establishing and maintaining a village broadcasting The Punjab Government has contriservice. buted Rs. 43,000 for a two-year scheme, and this will provide for the establishment and maintenance of receivers in some 30 villages. Most of these sets have already been installed. In the United Provinces a great opportunity is offered by the Hydro-Electric scheme which provides over a thousand power points in villages, where sets may be installed and run without batteries and practically without maintenance costs. Fortunately the major portion of the grid area falls within the range of the Delhi transmitter. The small station at Dehra Dun is also contributing its share to the development of village broadcasting and receiving sets have been installed in 22 villages. The Government of Bengal contributed Rs. 80,000 for a two-year scheme, but unfortunately owing to the very low power of the Calcutta Station, it has not yet been found possible to use the whole fund. The Bengal Government had intended to erect a transmitter at Midnapore, but it had not been realised that an area of 80 miles radius, which was the objective of the scheme, would need a transmitter costing 4 lakhs. The Government of the Bombay Presidency has set aside Rs. 14,000 which will be used to purchase and maintain receivers within the range of the Bombay Station. The Central Provinces and Madras have unofficially explained their willingness to contribute towards the purchase of village receivers, and it is likely that purchases will also be made by States such as Hyderabad and Mysore. It is



easy to see that if such demands can be effectively centralized, manufacturers will quickly recognize the existence of a market which is well worth their while.

VILLAGE RECEIVERS.

HE design of receivers for use in villages is beset with many difficulties. At present it is not possible to install or maintain more than one receiver at a village. It is therefore necessary for the receiver to have a sufficient output to make it audible over the major portion of the village. It is not always possible for the peasants, especially in the monsoon season, to gather round the radio receiver, and in villages where purdah is strict, the women folk would have to be provided with a programme to which they can listen from inside their own homes. The general background of noise in a village is fortunately very low, and it has been found that except on very windy days a sound output of about six watts is able to provide a service audible inside the majority of homes, while in the case of compact villages, or where men and women will foregather in some public place, an output of about four watts may be considered satisfactory. This might not seem difficult, till one remembers that most of the villages within reach of a broadcasting station have no electric supply, so that the power for driving the receiver has to be obtained usually from bulky and unwieldy storage batteries, which have to be re-charged about once a fortnight.

Additional factors that have to be considered in the design are the necessity for a sturdy construction which will stand rough handling, and the need of choosing components such as resistance and condensers which will function reliably in spite of large fluctuations of temperature and humidity.

WORKING COSTS.

O^{BVIOUSLY} there can be no large demand at present for such specialised receivers and the cost of production is bound to be high in consequence. At present there is only one firm, the Marconiphone—H.M.V., which turns out such rural receivers and these cost about Rs. 450 each including customs duty. Regarding batteries for power supply, a specially heavy type has been chosen in order to obviate the necessity for frequent re-charging, and this increases the cost. At present, the capital expenditure on each rural receiver is about Rs. 900-1,000, including transport to the site and the erection of masts, aerials, etc. Maintenance will cost about Rs. 200 per set per year. Rural broadcasting is, therefore, rather costly at present, but this should be no more than a passing phase, for as the development of broadcasting grows and more sets are required, competition among manufacturers and the establishment of factories in India should both contribute towards a considerable reduction in price. In order to stimulate the local construction of receivers, it is hoped to publish shortly tentative specifications for two types of receivers, one for use in villages without electric supply, the other operating from A.C. supply mains. The main points of the design would be suggested by actual requirements as observed in practice.

BROADCASTING REVENUES.

THE customs receipts from the duty on the import of wireless sets during the first three months of 1936 totalled Rs. 3,93,000, an increase of nearly one lakh over the corresponding period in 1935. During the first three months of this year, about 5,000 new licenses were issued. These figures, although they fall lamentably short of corresponding figures in other countries, do nevertheless show a rapid increase of interest in broadcasting, especially when it is considered that the average price of a receiver in this country is still extremely high and that the reliable cheap set has not yet made its appearance in the Indian market. The total receipts from customs duties on wireless sets in 1935-36 was Rs. 10,80,000 and from license fees Rs. 2,72,100. Income from broadcasting was, therefore, Rs. 13,52,000, while the budget of the Indian State Broadcasting Service for 1936-37 amounted to Rs. 9,49,900.

The Service is thus paying its own way with a handsome margin, and it is nonsense to suggest, as has occasionally been done, that it is, or is likely to be, a "burden on the taxpayer." There seems to be no reason why the Indian State Broadcasting Service should not continue to pay its own way even when the comparatively large developments proposed in Mr. Kirke's report have been carried into effect.

MR. KIRKE'S REPORT.

THE report by Mr. H. L. Kirke to the Government of India on the development of broadcasting stations in India contains a technical appendix which will perhaps be Greek to the un-initiated. For the benefit of those who are not versed in the elementary principles of broadcasting it has, however, been attempted in the preamble to the Report to set down as simply as possible the characteristics and functions of short, medium, and 'ong waves. It is hoped that those who will take the trouble to read this preamble will be able to some extent to grasp the various problems which the estab-

lishment of any broadcasting station inevitably present, and to understand the reasons underlying Mr. Kirke's proposals for new stations in India. While Mr. Kirke has not hesitated to adapt to local circumstances the practice obtaining in Europe, there is one point on which he has uttered a very sharp warning. That is the question of independent bodies being permitted to run broadcasting services. He advances a number of sound reasons as to why such developments should be discouraged, and argues that if permission is granted to such enterprises, broadcast development would be hindered rather than helped. Countries like France, which originally encouraged private enterprise, are now putting their foot firmly down, and it is understood that Federal Control in the U.S.A. will be tightened up very much more in the next few years. Under the Government of India Act the control of broadcasting is vested in the Centre and Mr. Kirke advocates a judicious but firm use of it.

RADIO RESEARCH IN INDIA.

SPEAKING at a meeting of scientific and radio research workers in London, Professor Appleton stressed the fact that India's problems could not be solved by a rule of thumb application of principles evolved elsewhere. This, of course, has been recognized, and the establishment of a research section was mooted some time ago by the Controller of Broadcasting. When recently Mr. H. L. Kirke, head of the B. B. C.'s Technical Research Department, came out here, he recommended that such an organization should be established immediately, and he set about it so earnestly that he had the pleasure of seeing the department functioning before he returned to England. It might interest technically-minded readers to learn that some of the problems taken up for immediate attention are the choice of optimum wavelengths, the design of rural receivers, and the suitability of shortwaves for local broadcasting. It is interesting to note that Prof. S. K. Mitra, who was unaware of the developments here, spoke at the meeting of the need for co-ordinating research in India, using almost the exact words of Mr. Kirke in his recommendations to the Government of India.

With the assistance so kindly proffered by Sir Frank Smith of the British Radio Research Board, it may be expected that the new Research Department will be able to develop both its functions of practical development and academic research in co-operation with the various scientific and educational institutions as well as the splendid hand of enthusiastic individuals.

VERNACULAR COMMENTARIES.

BROADCASTING history is rapidly being made in India. During the recent ceremonies connected with the change of Viceroys, Delhi set an example by giving a bilingual running commentary of the departure of the Earl and Countess of Willingdon and the arrival of Their Excellencies the Marquess and Marchioness of Linlithgow. We now hear that Calcuta is being equally enterprising, for during this year's football season there will be running commentaries in Bengali on the most important matches in which well-known Indian teams are engaged. A special telephone line has been run to the famous Mohan Bagan Club ground, and by the time this issue of the detailed programmes is in print, the Bengali commentaries will have started.

The daily football matches on the various grounds situated on the Calcutta Maidan form the one great outlet for the exuberance and enthusiasm of both Indians and Europeans in Calcutta, attracting many thousands every evening; but now that descriptions of the matches are to be given in two languages, we fear Calcutta will become more football-mad than ever. The Calcutta broadcasting station has already made itself popular through its commentaries on both hockey and football matches in English from the Calcutta Football Club ground; but now that it has increased its usefulness by including Bengali commentaries, we can foresee no small increase in the sales of radio receivers in that Presidency, not forgetting, we hope, a simultaneous rise in the number of licenses.

OUR S.O.S'S.

W^E have always looked forward to the time when broadcasting in India could do more than merely entertain and instruct. Radio has long had its "great moments" in history, moments in which it has been of vital service either to humanity or to a section of the people. And on a small scale, broadcasting is now beginning to take its place in the general life of the Indian public. During the past month, for example, Delhi has sent out two interesting S.O.S. messages, one at the request of the police and one for a visiting family who had "lost" themselves and who sought the aid of radio to find the relatives they had come to India to visit.

S.O.S. messages, we know, are very common in western lands, as are occasional police announcements; but so far they have not been utilized in India. We appreciate, of course, that by encouraging this form of service to listeners, we may be asking for trouble; and so we would emphasise that whilst all our station directors are always ready to help in cases of real need, every request for assistance through broadcasting will be carefully examined on the double score of urgency and importance, before any S.O.S. is actually sent out. Lost dogs and cats, disappearing servants, and purloined motor-cars do not come within our scope.

HEROES AND VILLAINS.

SHOULD broadcast stories have villains? If so, to what community should they belong? "Villain" is perhaps a strong word to use, but you know what we mean. In most stories there is the fellow you sympathize with and there is the other fellow. It is this other fellow who has become quite a problem in this world of racial and communal jealousies. Of course you can, if you are full of the milk of human kindness, so look upon human beings and their failings, that your stories contain no villains at all. But when feelings run high, or listeners live in a state of perpetual defensiveness, even this is no way out of the difficulty. Do we not know of stories that offend each of two rival communities by turn? E. M. Forster's "A Passage to India" which deals with the situation arising out of the contact of two races has been at times condemned as anti-Indian and at other times as anti-British. William Archer's "The Green Goddess" when produced in England annoyed the Indians in England, and yet it is feared that if that play is ever produced in India it is likely to offened not the Indians but the Europeans in this country. A friend has suggested that for every villain in a story there should

be a counter-baiancing hero or heroine belonging to the same community, so that the demands of justice and fairmindedness are fulfilled. Apart from the fact that such meticulously-weighed consideration are irrelevant to the art of story writing, it is very doubtful whether they will ever achieve the end in view. Only a few years ago a film was condemned as derogatory to a certain community, although the so-called tyrant king in the story and the romantic girl who was the victim of his wrath both professed the same religion.

OUR FUTURE PLANS.

FEW readers of the "Indian Listener" have complained recently of the disappearance of, or lack of, articles on technical and other aspects of broadcasting. Such complaints are justified, and we owe our readers an apology. There need be no secret of the fact-which was explained to the Legislative Assembly by Sir Frank Noyce-that the long-term contracts made some eighteen months ago with printers and publishers were made on the basis of a small circulation. But the phenomenally rapid expan-sion of the "Indian Listener" has, paradoxically enough, placed the paper temporarily in the position of a losing concern. In the circumstances we have been reluctantly obliged to reduce the number of pages, thus sacrificing articles (and even programmes) which would otherwise have been included. We hasten to inform our readers, however, that this is only a passing phase. The whole situation has been thoroughly investigated, and plans put forward which will not only, we hope, remove the blot of financial loss, but also enable us to include articles on all aspects of broadcasting. In brief, we hope shortly to make changes which will ensure that, in respect of its contents, the "Indian Listener" will compare favourably with any radio publication in the world.

SUBSCRIPTIONS.

WHILST dealing with the "Indian Lis-tener," we would again remind subscribers that we have been compelled to raise the annual subscription from Rs. 3 to Rs. 4, although the cost per single copy will remain at three annas. Subscribers are probably not aware that one quarter of the money we have been receiving as annual subscription has gone in postage, which meant that it was impossible for us to grant any commission to agents who took the trouble to secure subscriptions for us from new purchasers of radio receivers. But with a small rise in the subscription rate, we shall now be able not only to improve the contents of the paper, but also to lay the foundations of an organisation which will in course of time enable the "Indian Listener" to be obtained locally through agents in all important towns in India. Meanwhile, we would remind all those who are due to renew their subscriptions that the rate is now Rs. 4 and that the paper, if not ordered through the local agent, should be ordered direct from the Editor, 'Indian Listener ", Irwin House, Ballard Estate, Bombay, by sending a remittance either by money order, postal order, or by a Bombay cheque.

LOSING A FRIEND.

I N Dr. M. A. Ansari broadcasting loses not only a valued contributor but a wise and faithful friend. Ever tolerant and kindly, quickly alive to the possibilities of a new medium of education and knowledge, he was among the first to interest himself in the Delhi broadcasting station and its programmes. He himself contributed in February and March a series of talks on Hygiene, and his wise counsel was on many occasions an invaluable help and guide both to the Controller and the station staff. We deeply mourn his loss.

EUROPEAN MUSIC.

"HE Delhi Studio has obtained the temporary services of Madame Thelma Bar-ron, A.R.M.C.M., to arrange the European programmes. Madame Barron, who received her training under Professor Max Mayer of the Royal Manchester College of Music, has not only given a number of recitals in Great Britain as well as India, but was chosen by Leo Cherniavsky, the celebrated violinist, as his accompaniste during his tour of India last year. She has broadcast many times from the Calcutta and Bombay studios, and in March assisted in one of the best concerts the Delhi studio has yet arranged. In addition to being a very gifted painist, Madame Barron has a fine mezzo-soprano voice, which enables her to give considerable variety to her broadcasts. During the next few weeks Madame Barron will be responsible for the programmes of European music from the Delhi and Simla studios, in some of which she will herself participate, and will also continue to look around for new talent to give a greater range to the choice of programmes. She has already discovered several artists who will shortly be heard "on the air" for the first time, and hopes before long to bring the standard of

A T the present time, we have at Daventry three transmitters each of a transmitter three transmitters, each of which can be used with any one of a number of transmitting aerials. Two of these transmitters are those which were installed at Daventry when the short-wave broadcasting station was opened in 1932. The third transmitter is an experimental one, and is the old G5SW transmitter which was brought from Chelmsford and re-erected at Daventry during the spring of last year, mainly with the object of carrying out tests on various types of aerial. These three transmitters are all capable of putting roughly the same power into the aerial. The power is actually between 10 and 15 kW, according to the wavelength in use, it being rather greater for the longer waves than for the shorter ones.

Experience during the past three years has shown that it is desirable to have higher power than this, since in general, when reception is bad, it appears more often to be due to the fact that the signal is weaker than usual and not that the background noise is higher than usual or that fading is so bad as to cause the programme to be unintelligible. When the two new higher-power transmitters are installed, we may combine the existing two to for m one transmitter of higher power, although this is not certain. It may be preferable to use them separately so as to transmit in more directions simultaneously. The new transmitters will require a new building, and the contract for this has recently been placed and work on it has just begun. our European music to the level which European listeners continually demand from us.

THE TALE OF A FROG.

FEW days ago there lived in Delhi a frog. Today that frog is dead. He died partly because he sought too intimate a knowledge of the inner workings of the Delhi Transmitting station, and partly because he adopted an unusual method of getting cool. And therein lies a modern Aesop's Fable. It happened like this: One evening the Delhi transmitter suddently showed an unexpected decline in power, revealed by such a weakening of the signals that the Station Director, in alarm, rushed to the telephone to enquire what had gone wrong. And even whilst he was on his way to his own phone, other phones in the studio began to ring with similar enquiries from listeners. Perplexity, however, had already been produced at the transmitter by the fact that the three main rectifying valves were suddenly over-heating to a dangerous degree. The engineers in charge at once began a thorough examination of the complicated conglomeration of electrical apparatus and gadgets which are so affrighting to the uninitiated, and soon found that the valve-cooling system (which works on the same principle as the radiator of a motor-car) was not functioning. Now each of those valves costs about Rs. 4,000 so it was decided to stop the transmitter for a few minutes to try and trace the defect. All that could be discovered, however, was that the water circulation was poor, owing to some obstruction somewhere in the piping system. To dismantle that system would have taken several hours, so the transmitter was run at low power for the rest of the evening, the Station

Engineer thinking that half of twenty kilowatts was better than no kilowatts at all.

Next morning the cooling system was overhauled,—and the remains of the frog of our little fable were discovered in one of the water pipes. That he had no right to manifest such curiosity was evident, even though we might feel inclined to pardon him for seeking such an attractive respite from the heat. He paid dearly for his adventure. The moral of this fable? Well, we leave it to our readers to come to their own conclusion, merely adding that had the little frog stuck to his outside pool instead of wandering into administrative matters which were not his business, he would have been alive today.

BOMBAY.

I T will be of great interest to our listeners to learn that Bombay will now broadcast after dinner Indian Programmes on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Sundays.

During the first fortnight, we have amongst some of our speakers, Mr. Jamnadas Mehta, Mayor of Bombay, who will broadcast on the 1st June on "A day in the life of a Mayor." On the 3rd June, Mr. Ormerod will give a talk on "How will Architects meet the problems caused by Motor Transport." Mr. P. P. Kapadia, President of the Architect Association will speak on "A Day in the life of an Architect" on the 15th, while "An Indian Traveller" is the subject chosen by Mr. G. G. Morajee for the 14th.

The Programme of Music is chosen to suit different tastes and will meet with the approval of all our listeners. News in Hindi and Commercial News will be read on Tuesdays and Thursdays and Sundays at 9-10 P.M. and on other days at 8-15 P.M.

DEVELOPMENT OF THE EMPIRE SERVICE

We are also going to build a number of new aerials at Daventry, and, when the scheme is complete, there will be 25 aerials which will require ten masts of various heights, in addition to the masts already existing. The erection of these is about to begin, so there will be great activity at Daventry during this year. The new aerials that are being put up have been designed on the basis of the results of the very large number of aerial experiments which have been carried out at Daventry during the past two years. Some listeners have complained from time to time of the interruption of programme during these tests. We, of course, realise that these interruptions are annoying, but I hope that the greater efficiency which we expect to get from the new aerials will result in your getting a stronger signal, and that this will be some compensation in the future for any inconvenience you have had in the past.

The Empire station was erected on the same site as the old 5XX long-wave National programme transmitter, a site which covers some 54 acres. The new aerials cannot all be accommodated in this space, and a further 80 acres of adjoining land have already been purchased to make room for the new masts.

The new transmitters, like the old ones, are being built so that each of them can work on any of the wave-lengths reserved for the Empire Station. These wavelengths are already known under the call-signs GSA to GSL. We have recently reserved three further wavelengths namely, GSN 11.82 Mc/s, GSO 15.18 Mc/s, and GSP 15.31 Mc/s. These wavelengths will be brought into use shortly.

In laying out the aerial system for a scheme of short-wave broadcasting, it is first necessary to determine the directions in which transmission is required. This, of course, assumes that it has already been decided to use directional transmission.

So far as convenience in operating the service is concerned, we should very much like to be able to use omni-directional aerials, since it would then be possible to have only one aerial for each wavelength we want to use. On the short waves, however, it is possible to design aerials which will give quite a considerable gain in signal strength if the radiation from them is confined to a certain direction. The gain becomes greater as the angle covered by the transmission decreases.

THE BEAM ANGLE.

A COMPROMISE then has to be found between decreasing the angle of radiation to get an increase in signal strength, particularly near the centre line of the chosen direction, as against a reduction of the area covered. For point-to-point services such as the Post Office Radio Telephone services, where communication is between two points, the angle can be narrowed down very much, and, in fact, the major part of the radiation is confined to an angle of approximately 5 to 10 degrees on either side of the centre line.

For a broadcast service, however-or perhaps since it is not omni-directional it is better to call it narrow-casting or beam-casting-it is not practicable to use so small an angle. To give one example, the Continent of Africa subtends at Daventry an angle of approximately 90 degrees and the number of transmitters (and wavelengths) necessary to serve this area with very narrow beams is greater than could be faced on economic grounds, to say nothing of wavelength difficulties. The compromise which we have decided to adopt for the new aerials will result in an angle of 20 degrees on either side of the centre line being covered. Obviously, the strength of the signal at 20 degrees will be less than that on the centre line-it will, in fact, be about half as strong. On the other hand, it must not, of course, be thought that there will be no radiation outside the angle of 20 degrees on either side of the centre line.

The experimental aerials at present used at Daventry, about which I shall say more in the second article cover a wider angle than this, approximately 34 degrees on either side of the centre line on the same basis as above—that is to say, half maximum strength taken as the limit of the beam. When we take into account the higher power of the new transmitters, you will see that under the new scheme you should get a considerably stronger signal than you do at present.

NUMBER OF WAVELENGTHS.

THE question of the extent of the angle of transmission has to be considered in conjunction with the number of directions on which it is feasible to transmit, and in the new scheme some thirteen directions will be used if we include both the long and short paths to Australia and New Zealand. Having decided on the number of directions, it is necessary to decide on the wavelengths which will be required to give transmissions in these directions at the time of day at which the transmissions should normally take place.

In addition to this regular service, provision has to be made for transmission to as wide a section of the Empire as possible on occasions such as, for example, the Christmas Day or Jubilee broadcasts. It therefore becomes necessary to provide rather more wavelengths per direction than are normally required for the regular daily transmission, and it is as a result of these considerations that we arrive at the total of twenty-five aerials which I mentioned.

In my next article I shall have something more to say about aerials, since up to the present I have only mentioned the question of directivity in the horizontal plane.
