





Like you, we here at the fan club haven't doubted for a moment that the Beatles' latest full-length feature film—now titled "HELP!" instead of the original "Eight Arms To Hold You"—would be an even bigger success than "A Hard Day's Night". We've been seeing photographs and snippets from it for weeks, so we were dying to see the finished product. As always, the boys were good as their word and at the first opportunity they arranged a private showing for us. It would be easy to fill this whole page with just one of the many hilarious scenes but unlike "A.H.D.N." this has a story which is fantasy rather than fact. It's a colourful comedy thriller with quite a plot that I'd hate to spoil for you before you've seen it for yourselves. It will be at your local cinema almost immediately after the premiere on 29th July at the London Pavilion, Piccadilly Circus. The title song "Help!" will be released as a single followed by the L.P. of the film sound track. Beatle People, this is definitely a Beatle-Person-type-film with appeal for all!





BEATLES TALK



Another in the special series in which FREDERICK JAMES lets his tape recorder listen in on informal conversations between John, Paul, George and Ringo.

F. J.: This month's BEATLES TALK session is going to be a bit different. As you know, I've been responsible for several features in past issues of our Monthly Book where we've taken a bunch of current Beatle rumours and knocked them for six. After all, if you can't find out the real facts in their own magazine where can you find 'em? Recently the biggest and most ridiculous rumour of the lot has been going the rounds. I'm talking about the one that goes "Are the Beatles slipping?" Now before we get going let me make it very, very clear that this isn't going to be a "Defend The Poor Old Beatles" affair. Let's face it, the most popular and most famous group in the world needs no defending. George looks as though he's ready to start the ball rolling so let's make a start with him.

GEORGE: I just wanted to say something general about Number One records. The papers are making a lot more news out of the charts nowadays and this has two results. First of all people who never buy any pop records know a bit more about the Top Twenty and this is a good thing. On the other hand when they read a story saying "Fred Nurke topples Elvis Bone" they think Fred Nurke is now the most highly-paid and highly-honoured entertainer in the world and this guy Bone has had it forever.

JOHN: We're quite safe at the moment. It's nothing to do with us. We haven't got a record anywhere near the Top Twenty this week!

GEORGE: And we can't possibly have until the next one is released—but what I'm getting at is this. You can't blame anyone who isn't a fan for reading through the Top Twenty in the papers and saying to themselves "There you are, The Beatles aren't in the Top Twenty any more. They're right out of things. They've had it! Or Elvis Bone or Fred Nurke has had it as the case may be!

F.J.: If I can come in here for a moment

JOHN: Well it's your own tape you're wasting.

F.J.: Do you think it really matters to a group as important as The Beatles whether or not you ever have a record at Number One again—let alone whether you happen to have a new one selling at the moment?

PAUL: You're joking! Of course it matters. The more success you've had in the charts the more you're going to worry when things aren't going quite so well.

JOHN: Yes, but what he means is that if we can make successful films and things they're more important than the Top Twenty anyway.

PAUL: Do you think they are?

JOHN: Me? No, I don't. I'm just telling you what he means.

RINGO: Alright—so if "Help!" doesn't go to Number One straight away we're going to sit around and cry!

GEORGE: I expect we would too! It's funny really—I mean funny peculiar—when you've got a new record out you can't wait to hear how it does after the first week. It doesn't matter how many Number Ones you've had, the next one is always the most important.

RINGO: When we tell people we had a great big shindig to celebrate getting to Number One they can't understand it.

PAUL: Yes—they say "Aren't you used to that yet?" I don't think we could ever get used to it. We hope for a Number One right away but it's still a surprise each time it really happens.

F.J.: Well, I'd say that with or without another Number One, there aren't any real signs of The Beatles slipping. You've only to look at your own fan club membership list. Or take the American tour in August, for example, where you'll have 55,000 Beatle People watching your first concert at Shea Stadium in New York. According to reports I've read from the States you could have sold out all over again with extra concerts right through the tour if there'd been time to add the extra dates.

PAUL: There must be a few less Beatle fans than there were, say, eighteen months ago. Whenever there's something new happening you'll find people sort of jumping on the bandwagon to have a go. Then some of them get fed up and jump off again. I don't think you can get away from that.

RINGO: In other words, what we've got now—readers of the Monthly and fan club members and so on—are the REAL fans. The ones who don't just buy each Number One record BECAUSE it is a Number One record.

F.J.: If you're reading the Monthly Book

JOHN: Well they must be mustn't they? F.J.: . . . you can stand up and take a bow. You're all officially long-term Beatle People as of this moment!

JOHN: Thank You, Beatle People. You can't actually see the four of us kneeling down because the microphone's pointing the wrong way. Thank you, thank you, thank you. That was me miming for the other three.

F.J.: You say you'd be worried if you didn't get a Number One . . .

RINGO: If we don't? WHEN we don't, you mean. You can't go getting Number Ones for ever.

F.J.: Alright, WHEN you don't get to the top first week off—but what about some of these press stories. The "Beatles slipping" ones. Do those worry you?

JOHN: It's difficult to answer that. If we say "Yes" that's not really true but if we say "No" it sounds all big-headed as though we can't take criticism.

PAUL: None of us minds criticism. We want that. We want to know what people think, whether they're fans or writers or whatever they are. It would be terrible if we just didn't want to know and tried to pretend we were little gods with a halo round each of our heads.

JOHN: It's angels that have a halo.

PAUL: It's just as bad to read stupidly good things about ourselves as it is to see stupidly wrong rumours.

GEORGE: It's bad when all the writers say wonderful things about something just because it's "in" and fashionable to do so. Constructive criticism is far more sensible than blind praise.


F.J.: Let's get on to one of the other current rumours. I've seen some of your fan mail from people who have got the idea you don't fancy tours any more.

RINGO: No. Untrue. I think doing live shows is one of the most important parts of working in the entertainment world. We all do.

PAUL: You see this is a case of somebody twisting something we've said to (continued on page 31.)







BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT by Billy Shepherd and Johnny Dean

une, 1963: All calm in the garden of Brian Epstein, Beatle boss. His permanent smile was understandable—with Gerry and the Pacemakers, Billy J. Kramer and the Dakotas and the Beatles, he had management rights to numbers one, two and three in the British charts. But lurking round the corner was controversy—the biggest-yet for the Beatles, as we hinted at last month.

It was the release of a Beatle record that the boys had forgotten all about. A record that hurtled into the charts on the strength of their name but which left all four with a particularly nasty taste. It was the Polydor release of "My Bonnie". Of course, the legitimacy of the release as a business move seemed fair enough to many people.

More Sheridan than Beatles

The Beatles had become amazingly big business. There was curiosity value about everything they had done before. But the boys raved furiously about this particular one. Point was that it had been made in Germany some three years before ... back in the days of Pete Best occupying the drum chair. It was basically a show-case for Tony Sheridan, a British guitarist-singer who had built up quite a reputation in the beat clubs of Hamburg. The boys actually were known as the Beatles in those days but for the German release they were billed as the Beat Boys.

And John Lennon summed it up explosively: "It's just us banging about in the background as an accompaniment to Tony. I wish they'd shut up about it. It's terrible. It could be anybody and we think it's unfair on the fans to put it out as a genuine release by

So out came the headlines: "Beatles Blast Own Hit Disc"—it had shown in the Top Fifty the very week of release. But if the boys were sounding off to journalists, they were having a much more furious "go" about the ethics of it all in the comparative quiet of their own dressing-rooms. We remember John putting on a very strange voice indeed as he read out a quote from one of the Polydor executives: "We should have the credit for giving the Beatles their first recording." Just for an hour or so, the atmosphere in the dressing-room turned a thundery black.

A brief re-cap: "From Me To You" was the hit single for the boys. "Please Please

Me" was top of the LP charts.

A rather longer re-cap: While the Beatles launched their attacks on the release of this old disc, several interesting points emerged. Most important was the fact that it was only because of inquiries from Liverpool fans about German Polydor recordings of the boys that Brian Epstein ever got to hear about the Beatles. He'd been in charge of the record department of the family business, had had queries about discs from teenagers who'd been digging Beatle music at the Cavern and other local clubs.

Really, it was because Brian didn't like being beaten over a customer's request that he searched the Polydor catalogue and found reference to these discs made with Tony Sheridan. Without those records, would he ever have bothered to stroll round to see the Beatles in the Cavern, their natural habitat? Would he ever have met them? Is there not a good chance that the most successful bit of artist-management in years would never have come off?

Anyway, this controversy soon died down


overboard for "My Bonnie".

In later days, the Beatles have often given their opinions of cover versions of their own compositions. Some they rather liked. Others they clearly detested. And John once summed it up with an outspoken: "No, we don't like that one. We always like our own version best." Sounds big-time... but he was just being honest. After all, the songs are written in the first place FOR the Beatles.

Paul's 21st

June 18th was Paul McCartney's 21st birthday. We met the boys in the EMI recording studios. Photographs were being taken all the time. Paul was taken out into the street and, to the amusement of a crowd of fans, given a good 'n' hearty "bumping" on the pavement by the others. They were deliberately not too gentle. Eventually Paul yelled: "It's all right for you photographers to keep on yelling 'smile, please' . . . but it's not your behind that's getting black and blue."

Presents were opened. Paul glowed with pleasure. And we travelled out to Margate with the boys—they were appearing in a week's production at the Winter Gardens. Oddly enough, there were vacant seats.

They still hadn't become a guaranteed housepacking act.

At their hotel, on the outskirts of Margate and right on the sea-front, the "new sensations" mixed happily with the older guests. We had the boys playing table-tennis, Paul left-handedly skying the ball all over the lounge. A journalist from another publication turned up unexpectedly. A large man . . . yet Paul managed to turn on his powers of mimicry to impersonate him.

George towelled himself off in the shower room, talked about those early days in Germany. Explained, stamping his bare feet on soaking wet concrete, how the Beatles were urged to "make stamp"... in the German clubs they played and how it became the basis on which they built up their enor-

mous sense of beat.

We took tea and sandwiches in the lounge. An elderly waiter approached and asked quietly if he could have autographs for some fans who had stayed outside the hotel grounds. He turned round... the fans were INSIDE. And the hotel porter obviously didn't want the peace of the hotel broken by photographs being taken of the Beatles in the grounds. He objected to the large striped umbrellas outside being moved to help the camera-man.

But only recently the manager of that same hotel has written to "The Beatles Book" asking for copies, if possible, of the shots taken on that memorable afternoon.


On to the theatre, us following the boys as they roared off in their Dormobile, Neil Aspinall driving, Neil, as a driver, was very heavy on Dormobiles. The lipstick daubs on the van showed up in the sunshine.

And in the Winter Gardens, a great deal of excitement. Not only from the fans... from the Beatles, too, They played over a demonstration disc of their "Twist 'n' Shout". This, on the EP side, was to set new standards.

More of that next month. And also the background stories of the rumours that badly upset not only the Beatles but also their families back home in Liverpool.




Four more songs are also needed for an e.p. scheduled for English release in the near future.

make a story turn out THEIR way. His way, her way, or whatever. If a journalist comes up to us and we're sitting backstage at some theatre and it's freezing cold and Mal hasn't come back with the food and...

GEORGE: And then the reporter says "Do you still love touring?"

RINGO: And we all yell out "No. We're never doing another one. So there!"

JOHN: And he believes us. He honestly does—or else he wants to think he does for the sake of his story.

RINGO: Anyway, we're spending a lot of this year doing "live" shows one way and another.

JOHN: Of course it's more comfortable to live at home and just go down to a film studio every morning. No travelling and packing and bribing waiters to give you a sandwich in the hotel after the show. Everybody finds SOMETHING to grumble about so that they can be happy —but none of that means we don't enjoy touring.

PAUL: We'd have done a Spring tour of Britain for sure if we hadn't been working on "Help!" No, we're not against tours and we'll certainly be doing plenty more concerts here and abroad.

F.J.: I know there's plenty of tape left but I can see this session running overtime or overspace as far as the Monthly Book is concerned if we don't stop here. May I just round off by saying that I'M sure "Help!" will be a Number One record AND a Number One film. Beatle People won't agree that John, Paul, George and Ringo have any chance of slipping while they go on writing, singing, playing and acting just the way they have been doing so far this year.
