ASSOCIATION THE Independent Radio Contractors (AIRC) has challenged the legality of ILR stations having to pay royalties for playing records with an action in the High Court.

It says that the fees, which can amount to 10 per cent of advertising revenue, are unlawful. They were fixed in 1981 by the Performing Rights Tribunal after a 77-day hearing, and they are being defended by Phonographic Performance Ltd and the Musicians Union.

Andrew Bateson, counsel for the AIRC, said that the radio stations wanted a system of fees based on the copyright value of each record as opposed to a general rate. He told Mr Justice Harman that the 1981 fees meant that ILR stations had to

pay a four per cent levy on the first £750,000 of their net advertising revenue, rising by stages to 10 per cent on revenues over £3m per year. He stated that the levels were too

high, given that for that amount of high, given that for that amount of money the stations were only entitled to play records for a maximum of nine hours a day under the needletime arrangement. The High Court hearing continues this

New IFPI policy on music video: every use paid for

MUSIC VIDEO, the BIEM contract, record piracy and home taping were the main topics of discussion at the annual meeting of the IFPI Council held in Helsinki recently.

The policy statement adopted on music video stressed the principle that producers should insist that every use should be paid for and added that, wherever possible, agreements with music video users should be made by

wherever possible, agreements with music video users should be made by collecting societies working on a national basis. The Council was told that negotiations between IFPI and BIEM (over mechanical royalities for authors) for a new standard contract were now close to completion. A further announcement was promised for mid-July. It was reported that progress had been made by the IFPI on the anti-pracy

It was reported that progress had been made by the inter that and prospective front in many parts of the world. In Nigeria, it was hoped that lead changes to increase penalties and streamline enforcement would soon be incorporated into a military decree, while important successes had been achieved in Greece and Saudi Arabia, where the authorities were preparing copyright legislation. 

BMI demands 10 per cent

From IRA MAYER NEW YORK: BMI is seeking an approximate 10 per cent increase in the blanket licence fee it is paid by US radio stations. A letter outlining a new payment schedule went out late in June following a breakdown in negotiations between the performing table resident and the All Industry Music Badio Licence rights society and the All-Industry Music Radio Licence Committee.

The latter group promptly informed their membership that the Ine latter group promptly informed their membership that the newly proposed fees are not the result of those negotiations. Stations that do not sign the agreement will risk copyright infringement suits from BMI; similarly, the All-Industry association says it is considering legal action against BMI. All-Industry is also negotiating a new licensing fee with ASCAP.

THE INTERNATIONAL Tape/Disc Association (ITA) reports US sales of blank audio cassettes to duplicators until reports US sales of blank audio cassettes to duplicators and for retail sale up 7.25 per cent to 239.96m units in 1983 compared with 223.73m in 1982. Value for the cassettes is estimated at \$273.976m, up 5.8 per cent over 1982's \$258.855m. Clearly price erosion continues to plaque the induced to plague the industry.

CBS SAYS it is shipping the largest advance order for any album in its history with the Jacksons' Victory LP. Two million pieces have been ordered up front.

CBS has also won another round in its efforts to put a stop to parallel imports; a Federal Appeals court has affirmed a lower court ruling against Scorpio Music Distributors. Scorpio had been importing material legally manufactured in and saleable in the Philippines.

ROLLING STONES bassist Bill Wyman hopes to host and syndicate a 40-part half-hour television series on Sixties and Seventies rock. Those Were The Years That Rocked will be built around 35 hours of performance footage recently acquired by Wyman. Target air date: Autumn 1985.

NARM HAS been forced to abandon the industry-wide Give the Gift of Music campaign it has been developing for two years. Labels baulked at contributing the needed penny per LP to fund the drive. Earlier test runs had been based on contributions of a half-cent per disc. NARM still hopes to run holiday-specific promotions around Christmas, Valentine's Day and other annual events

TREVOR HORN, recently the producer of Yes, will be featured speaker at the fifth annual New Music Seminar in New York August 6-8. Showcases at the Ritz. Danceteria and other venues will also feature acts from at least a dozen independent and major labels. Some 35 panel discussions are slated for the three day meet.

Rockamerica's Video/Music Seminar, following the New Music conclave on August 10 in New York, has representatives from Warner Records, RCA Video, MCA Home Video, MCA Records, Vestron Music Video and various independent producers, label personnel and directors scheduled for its panel discussions. Concurrent with the seminar, Rockamerica is publishing its first annual video/music industry directory.

CLARIFICATION: RE last week's report on the MTV stock offering, the formal prospectus indicates MTV and Nickelodeon (the latter a children's cable channel) earned a \$2.8m (£2.1m) profit in 1983. The company had indeed lost money up to that point



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

A NEW music venture for video distributor VTC is intended to create A NEW music venture for video distributor vite is interfaced to create exceptionally strong film sound track music for the album market. The company has now started to produce low budget films, in which an important feature will be the soundtrack music. David Mins of VTC emphasises: "We intend to get the best music by using the best writers and producers allowable within our budget."

Two pictures already scheduled are 2084, directed by Roger Christian, with music co-written by Peter Gabriel and Genesis; and King of the City, a film set to a great extent in a night club, with disco-orientated music by Frank Musker (ex Bugatti & Musker) and Michael Sembello.

VTC will package the project – controlling the making of the soundtrack, but then offering the music as a tape licence deal to the major record companies for LP release. All the films will be for general release in the UK, and video rights will also be fully exploited.

Gary Numan starts own label

GARY NUMAN has started his own independent label, Numa Records, and GARY NUMAN has started his own independent laber, Numa Reconst, and the first release will be a posthumous single by Paul Gardiner, a co-founder of Tubeway Army with Numan, who died earlier this year. The Gardiner single, a version of Lou Reed's Venus In Furs, is released next Friday (13) and is followed two weeks later by a single from New York guitarist Larry Loteber,

followed two weeks later by a single from New York guitarist Larry Edited, entitled Shivers Up My Spine. The new label will be distributed by PRT. A spokesman for Numan said: "He will be very much involved with the artistic side of the label, and there is a strong possibility that Gary will himself be recording for the label in the not-too-distant future." Numa will be based at Shepperton Studio Centre, Studios Road, Shepperton, Middlesex, 09328-66531.


US approves bill against record rental

WASHINGTON DC: The copyright sub-committee of the House of Representatives has unanimously passed a bill which will outlaw record rentals without the consent of the copyright owner.

Despite the bill's unanimous approval and its strong support from most of Congress, it is unlikely to become law this year. It has to take its turn before the busy judiciary committee, followed by consider-ation by the full House of Representatives, and with the imperatives of atives, and with the inpertures of an election year reducing the normal legislative sessions, most observers believe there is insufficient time for it to complete the legislative process in 1984

1984. Specifically, the bill will repeal the so-called First Sale Doctrine as it applies to records. The FSD is a provision of copyright law which allows retailers to dispose of legitimately purchased LPs and tapes as they see fit, including by repting renting.

The record industry has long supported repeal, claiming the doctrine unfairly excludes them from rental revenue and encourages home-taping.

Zomba buys studio complex for expansion

THE ZOMBA Group has purchased the freehold property and facilities of the newly built Stage Door complex in Willesden, north London, in a further stage of its UK expansion programme. It comprises a recording studio, two rehearsal studios, a dance studio, a restaurant, offices and a parking lot. Zomba, at present spread over four buildings near each other in Willesden,

Zomba, at present spread over four buildings near each other in Willesden, plans to change the present name of the newly acquired property, close the restaurant and dance studio, and renovate the existing recording studio during August by designing a large control room. It will also install a new Solid State 56-channel computerised desk with total recall as well as other state-of-the-art equipment.

"We'll be open for business by early September under the name of Battery No 3 Studio," said Zomba director Clive Calder.

MCPS opts for 'tollgate' licences for music video

PRESENTING THE music publishers' point of view at the recent Longman seminar on music videos, Bob Montgomery, Mechanical Copyright Protection Society (MCPS) managing director, said they are "increasingly concerned about being cut out of tomorrow's market". Montgomery said that if music

Montgomery said that if music rights for videos are granted at a low cost now for promotional use, publishers will be left out when the music video becomes a product in its own right in a few years' time. "Music publishers have decided on a course of action to license their material so that fees can be charged which accurately reflect the use to which music is being put," he said. The license will take two stages – a nominal fee for strictly promotional use, followed by further license when the video goes through a "toll gate" to a cable operator or video cassette producer.

gate to a cable operator or video cassette producer. Montgomery said the MCPS was now in a position to put together a package "bringing in all music publishers at a common rate".

Thorn EMI in $\pounds^{1/2}$ m promotion for cheaper Sony CD players

THORN EMI is investing £500,000 in a promotion campaign to support the launch of new, lower-priced Sony compact disc players in the UK from August.

from August. The CD players will be retailed at a price of £299 each under the Ferguson brand name. The agreement with Sony will also enable Thorn EMI to manufacture the players in this country under licence when demand dictates the need. "The market is tiny at present,"

"The market is tiny at present," said a Thorn EMI spokesperson, "and it will take time to take off. However, these third-generation machines are as near perfect in the state of the art as is possible, and they will be available in dealer showrooms in August."



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
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

Getting back on the right track

LL OF us in the music industry know we face a critical period in our contraction and fragmentation of traditional music markets, poor worldwide economic conditions, increased costs and competition for consumer spending by alternative forms of entertainment seem to pose serious threats.

Remedial steps have been taken by every major force in the music industry, distribution has been simplified, merchandising materials have been reduced and the resources and budgets for the development of new recording artists have been slashed.

But while I agree that there has been considerable waste in the music business, I am also concerned that the ways in which we have turned our ears to the requirements of sound business practices may have caused us to turn a deaf ear to the needs of the individual consumer.

In recent years we have witnessed a growing split between the passive music listener and the active record buyer. One of the reasons for this split in the US for example, is the basic demographic shift in the population to older age groups.

basic demographic shift in the population to older age groups. The spectre of home-taping is constantly on our minds. While these things are causes for concern, I do not believe that they are the root of our problems. Perhaps it is time to consider why what we offer does not seem to motivate the consumer to purchase as much as he once did. Market conditions limit our ability

REM: (Don't Go Back To) Rockville RS IRS (X) 107, CBS). A great track from this American band's latest LP Reckoning, it has a country feel with Michael Stripe's plaintive vocal accompanied by some accomplished, melodic piano. Also includes Wolves, from the import EP Chronic Town and 9-9 and Gardening At Night, recorded live.

A BIGGER SPLASH: I Don't Believe A Word (A&M AM(X) 196, CBS). An intriguing single for their debut on a new label, this has a Police-like sound, which isn't surprising considering that it was produced and arranged by Sting. Grows with every play and should get good exposure.

NICK CAVE FEATURING THE BAD SEEDS: In The Ghetto (MUTE 7 MUTE 032 Rough Trade/Cartel, Spartan). A sparse arrangement for a number which isn't included on this ex-Birthday Party vocalist's debut solo LP, From Her To Eternity. An interesting treatment of the old standard with simple piano and moody strings. Should appeal to more than his already considerable following.

THE EXPLORERS: Lorelei (Virgin VS 687 (12), EMI). A great catchy number from this new group featuring Phil Manzanera and Andy Mackay from Roxy Music. Lorelei boasts amazing production and fine vocals and deserves to do well.

WANG CHUNG: Wait (Geffen (T)A 4550, CBS). A pleasant melodic pop song with a pumping base line and good use of effects. Taken from their album Points On The Curve, it should produce another hit.

YIP YIP COYOTE: Pioneer Girl (IRS YIP(X) 2 CBS). More country 'n' Western antics from this LondonTo succeed in a recorded music market which is tough and getting tougher — on both sides of the Atlantic — requires more than just selling songs. to incur production, recording, and development costs on new artists as was once standard in the US industry A balance is necessary.

was once standard in the US industry. A balance is necessary. Is it really cost effective for a company to generate a full-scale point of sale merchandising campaign for a super-group's new album which would sell in volume without such aids, while a policy of minimal display material such as album covers alone is maintained by the same company for all new artists?

Simplifying packaging to its basics on new acts also switches the consumer's motivation from buying to taping a record. But if the industry just continues a

But if the industry just continues a push for airplay to expose hit singles, while ignoring the need to promote personalities, it must also bear some responsibility for the vast number of "turntable" hits, for reinforcing the trend towards singles rather than albums, and for the apoarent lack of consumer lovalty. In the boom years of the business, vast distribution systems were set up, but as market conditions changed they became expensive pipelines that needed feeding continuously.

ne result was the increased concentration on big-name, big-volume product in order to cover the overheads. This diluted the time spent on creatively promoting new artists. Another was the "blind marketing" of a number of new artists like so many darts thrown without aim at the target simultaneously in the hope that just one of them will hit the bullseye.

one of them will hit the bullseye. Although every record executive will confirm the great importance of new acts we know that much of our daily routine and marketing structures do not actively develop new artists.

Positive steps must be taken to transform sound philosophy into



reality. There are creative forms of effective marketing that will promote new artists without necessitating huge expenditures. There are distinct advantages to

There are distinct advantages to those of us on the international side of the music business.

of the music business. In 1975 when Stan Cornyn, senior vice president of WCI Record Group, made his famous speech in Los Angeles about "the day that radio died", and challenged the US industry on its dependence on one form of promotion, foreign record companies were already using alternative forms of promotion such as television and press in a more aggressive way than their US counterparts.

As the introduction of new foreign markets slows and existing markets reach saturation, increasing costs and competition abroad require us to continue exploration of alternative marketing tools that go beyond the simple act of selling songs. JENNIFER COHEN (left), is responsible for international marketing and the promotion of international artists in the US. She graduated from Harvard with degree in modern intellectual history in 1978. As a student she directed the Quincy House Music Society, produced many concerts and managed several Boston jazz artists — winning the David McCord Prize for outstanding contribution to the arts. Cohen joined WCI as a management trainee for WEA International, was appointed product manager in late 1979 and became director of product development in 1981.

I believe retrenching in the light of economic pressures and going back to the bare basics of selling records will only re-inforce the problems that face us. It will not encourage the personalities and the new growth in our business which these artists could bring.

A FLOCK OF SEAGULLS: The More You Live, The More You Love (Jive JIVE (P)(T) 62, CBS), Heavily guitar-orientated song on the Seagulls' first new number for quite a while. Based on a steady beat with great slabs of guitar, it rather lacks substance and they'll need to do better than this to get another hit.

APRIL SHOWERS: Abandon Ship (Big Star/Chrysalis CHS(12) 2787, PolyGram). A wonderful, fresh, acoustic-based sound for this debut with its classic pop melodies and soaring string section. Well produced by Anne Dudley who's known for her work with ABC and The Art Of Noise. Certainly a band to watch out for in the future.

SILENT RUNNING: Young Hearts (Parlophone (12)R 6073, EMI). A big, rousing rock sound with a powerful vocal that altogether sounds not too unlike Simple Minds. Taken from this young Irish band's debut LP, Shades Of Liberty.

MESSENGERS: Great Institutions (Musicfest/Chrysalis MUST(X) 1, PolyGram). A Kraftwerk-influenced synth backing is coupled to melodic vocal harmonies produced by Midge Ure to give a catchy pop song that should create interest in the band. ICEHOUSE: Don't Believe Anymore (Chrysalis COOL (X) 4, PolyGram). A slow, moody intro builds into a punchy, guitar based song with some lovely, bluesy sax and melodic keyboards. Taken from the forthcoming album Sidewalk, this competant single should do moderately well.

CHAMPION DOUG VEITCH & THE IGBIRA NATION: Not The Heart (!Drum! RUM 4, Cartel/Revolver). An interesting and innovative mixture of reggae rhythms with a bluebeat style horn section and country-tinged pedal steel guitar combined with a deep vocal and even a few yodels. Also features a dub version and it's produced by Mad Professor and Tony McDermott.

ANTHONY MORE: Industrial Drums (Parlophone (12) R 6072, EMI). An odd arrangement of stuttered drum rhythm and echoed guitar held together by the chanted vocals. The ex-Slapp Happy singer is not likely to attract many new fans with this.

CANDIDO: Jingo (Excaliber EXO (L) 102, PRT). This Latin American style dance track has been a club favourite for a long time and has now been re-released to meet the demand for this hot, summery single.

THE ESCAPE: Russian Lady (Mercury/Phonogram PH 3(12) PolyGram). A pleasant synth-based single with sparkling keyboards and a strong vocal melody. Uses some good effects and a fine production, but there is nothing that really makes it stand out.

STYX: Music Time (A&M AM(X) 197, CBS). Slick American rock taken from their live album Caught In The Act, and released to promote it. Standard rock that's for fans only.

Definitive Schumann by Pollini

A NEW recording by the Italian pianist Maurizio Pollini is an important event, not least because his solo piano records comparatively rare – he has made a new album since 1977. are he has not

made a new album since 1977. Clearly, Deutsche Grammophon has persuaded him to go back into the studio, and the result is Schumann's Symphonic Etudes, in the entire 1837 original published version (410.3161, LP/MC/CD). Pollini's main competitors for sales will be Sgouros on EMI and Pergorelich on DG hut the counting

Pogorelich on DG, but the coupling of the Arabesque and the maturity of Pollini's style will make this the first choice for specialist collectors

A Euro star sings solo

The return of Rodrigo

PREMIERE recording THE Rodrigo's second guitar concerto, written for Philips' virtuoso guitarist Pepe Romero, is to be released this month coupled with another "first", the Concierto de Malaga written by the guitarist's brother Celedonio, but orchestrated by the composer, Moreno Torroba.

The genesis of Rodrigo's Concierto Para Una Fiesta was as

Concierto Para Ona Piesa was as strange as it was unexpected. Rodrigo wrote his famous Concierto de Aranjuez 45 years ago and, despite its popularity, did not try to produce a work for the same combination to match it, despite numerous requests. Then, in 1982, he was approached

by Pepe Romero, who had himself been approached by a Texan millionaire called McKay, who wanted to make a special gift to his young daughters, who were coming of age, and was prepared to pay

handsomely for a new work. The 82 year-old blind Spanish composer was less than interested, until the figure of \$100,000 was mentioned, and that persuaded him to drop other projects and turn to the new concerto. In the composition of the work,



Rodrigo spared no thought for Romero and wrote a work of extreme difficulty, which nevertheless had much of the romantic touch that his admirers have come to expect of him.

"When I first saw the guitar part, I thought it was impossible," Romero explains. "It made me very depressed, because I thought there was no way I was going to be able to play it. But part of me said: 'nothing

is impossible' so I learnt it." The work was premiered last March in Texas, and recorded exactly a year ago in St John's, Smith Square, with the Academy of St Martin-in-the-Fields under Neville

Marriner Marriner. "A few days before the recording sessions, I saw Rodrigo in Brussels, and I played the Concerto to him," adds Romero. "After, I asked him why did he write such as difficult

art for me, he replied: 'I wanted to take you closer to your limits. So now, since you have mastered my concerto, let's add some new ornaments'.

These have been incorporated into the new recording.

Into the new recording. The work lasts about 25 minutes and is scored for a chamber orchestra with single wind and percussion – and guitar. It is shaped in a conventional threemovement form, with an atmospheric second movement.

Romero agrees that there are milarities between the new similarities between the new concerto and the famous Aranjuez, but he adds: "They are written by the same man, but there is a 45-year gap between them, and the difference is like the difference difference is like the difference between Verdi's Traviata and Otello. The new concerto is more melodic, the harmonic style has changed considerably, and overall it is a much more complex piece." As the Concierto de Malaga is also

by Spanish composers, it is not surprising to find that it, also, has many flamenco inflections. Philips is releasing the double concerto bill on three formats simultaneously. LP/MC/CD (411 133).

EMI captures the English appeal of Kiri Te Kanawa

DAME KIRI Te Kanawa is known principally for recordings on Decca and Philips, but she also records for

other companies, including EMI. And the British company has pulled off quite a coup with the New Zealand-born singer, recording her in a collection of English folk songs, called Come to the Fair. The record (EL 270040 LP/MC) comes in a gatefold

sleeve and is EMI's record of the month, with reduced dealer price, (£3.29 until July 31), trade ads, consumer ads and special displays. It includes Early One Morning, The Ash Grove,

Greensleeves The Salley Gardens and Danny Boy, and will appeal to a wide cross-section of record buyers – the kind of consumer profile that made her such a wellknown artist following the royal wedding. Te Kanawa is accompanied by members of the

National Philharmonic Orchestra, conducted by Douglas Gamley, who made the arrangements, as well as the Medici String Quartet.

EMI is currently preparing another LP featuring Dame Kiri, this time Ravel's Scheherezade coupled with songs by Duparc, conducted by Sir John Pritchard.

Recording rarities

THREE VERY different but rarely performed or recorded works are released on EMI this month – by Schumann, Albeniz and Messager.

Schumann's Requiem in D Flat is given with a good line of soloists led by Dietrich Fischer-Dieskau, Nicolai by Dietrich Fischer-Dieskau, Nicolai Gedda and Helen Donath, conducted by Bernhard Klee. The work is coupled with the much better known Requiem for Mignon (ASD 146756 LP/MC) and comes in

a gatefold sleeve. Aldo Ciccolini is a pianist best known for his EMI recordings of music by Satie, but this latest music by Satie, but this latest release sees him champion the Piano Concerto No 1 by Albeniz, in a popular coupling with Falla's Nights in the Gardens of Spain. He is accompanied by the RPO under Enrique Batiz (ASD 165388 LP/MC).

Finally, the first complete recording of Messager's ballet The Two Pigeons has been made by the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra conducted by John Lanchbery – in an adaptation and arrangements by Lanchbery himself.

Lanchbery himself. This recording follows the previous Lanchbery ballet music arrangements of La Bayadere and Paquita which has sold over 4,000 copies since its release in December. The Messager ballet release comes in a full-colour gatefold sleeve with illustrations from the recent Royal Ballet productions and will appeal priorially to a ballet

will appeal principally to a ballet audience (ASD 270038 LP/MC).

And, not surprisingly, her first project involves the music of Mozart: the famous F major Sonata K332 which ends with the Rondo Alla Turca; the A major Sonata K331 and the Fantasia in D minor, K397 (412 123 LP/MC/CD).

Uchida began recording for Philips last October and so far two volumes have been made - one to be issued this month and the other, containing K494, K533, K545 and the Rondo in A minor K511, due for release later in the year.

Piano 'prodigy' makes LP debut

THE 14 year-old Greek piano prodigy Dimitris Sgouros, who has taken London by storm with his recital and concerto performances, makes his concerto debut recording on EMI this month.

He plays Rachmaninov's Piano Concerto No 3 – just one of 35 concertos in his repertoire – accompanied by the orchestra of his choice: the Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra, no less (EL 270020 LP/MC).

Sgouros' first recording for EMI, a recital of works by Schumann and Brahms, has sold over 2,000 copies Branms, has sold over 2,000 copies since December, and the concerto disc, made with the Soviet conductor Yuri Simonov, should also do well, though it will receive its main boost when the pianist appears again in public.

This he is not due to do until 1985 though future recording plans with EMI include Liszt's Transcendental Studios and other virtuoso piano works.







Just one year later Impulse can say it has had a response so strong and so positive that it is celebrating its first anniversary by:


• Completing a move into bigger premises — to house an office which has expanded very rapidly to meet clients' needs;

"It has been set up for boosting sales of records which are not natural big charters, but have good potential in

feeling for the indies. We know what they need for promotion and for sales, and we will continue to be able to give the right service."

The way that labels can best start using Prime Time might be to place a record with the sales force the moment it enters the lower end of the Top 75 on any Tuesday. Prime Time can start putting it across to the right selected dealers very strongly, to ensure that supplies have been ordered and delivered into the shops before the demand builds up to usual peak week-end

levels. "Prime Time is intended to be quite separate from Impulse," Jenkins points out, "working in a different way and for a different purpose. We have been selecting way and for a different purpose. We have been selecting and sorting out different dealer categories for six months before putting the new company into operation. Using our experienced reps we have devised lists of stores to sell into according to the type of music - e.g., disco and dance or heavy metal and rock. "We have also lists which point out all the record

shops around any given commercial radio station. This means we can check all the play lists and sell any title strongly into the shops in just the areas where it is getting ILR exposure, so that they will get the best sales

chance out of the interest created by radio play." Jenkins and Todd are well aware that there is more to selling records than just selling the idea to the dealer.



The dealer must have the stock to sell to the customer as soon as the customer asks for it.

To do as much as possible in helping out with this, the distribution end of things, there will be constant liaison with the manufacturers and independent distributors. Barry Cohen, heading the Prime Time telesales operation, has good contacts with distributors, and has already been talking to them about the speed of delivery.


Prime Time will send details of all orders taken each day to both the distributor and the label. And these daily details will always be delivered by hand, to both client and distributor.

"We are," stresses Jenkins, "doing all we can do, to make sure the records we are selling in are available to go out to the dealers immediately." As directors of a promotion company which has successfully proved its usefulness to the industry, Jenkins and Todd found that directivities scone storted coming to them for suidance of distributors soon started coming to them for guidance on how many copies of discs to ensure were in stock when the Impulse reps started promoting a title. The industry has found that an Impulse promo means trade orders and Prime Time is an operation being run by the same directors along the same basic principles.

So with Prime Time the record labels are getting a new company which, in a way, already has a track record.

YOU WOULDN'T expect a company called Impulse to stand still — and it didn't. Having established itself as a powerful retail promo force, Impulse decided it could also offer a really effective regional radio and TV promo service.



TELEPHONE PROMOTION at Impulse — Susan Chapman (left) and Helen Tyler.





London uncovers deleted gem of guitarist Sivuca

LONDON RECORDS, not exactly wanting for hit singles over the last few months, could have another --

and a decidedly offbeat one - on the way shortly if its pedigree in the specialist market holds true.

The record in question is the version of Ain't No Sunshine by the Brazilian guitarist Sivuca, duo soon on 12-inch (LONX 51). The song is a familiar one from the early Seventies, which not only gave its writer Bill Withers his first major US hit, but was also an early solo success for one Michael Jackson in the UK during 1972. In fact, the Sivuca version is of

almost the same vintage, and was originally available on his Vanguard album Sivuca, long-deleted here on its Pye release. Its more recent re-discovery by a new generation of clubgoers apparently owes much to the ubiquitous Chris Hill and its introduction at the last Caister Soul Weekend, where floor reaction was

huge. The Sivuca arrangement sets the song to a fiery latin rhythm, with female vocals and extended piano and sax workouts, creating an ideal summer dancefloor groove - which is why it is worth following the buzz

on this one. For the B-side, London has Frewdly also licensed from Vanguard a later (and faster) *live* version of the song by Sivuca, which clocks in at 6⁴ 42" and was previously even harder to find than the original cut. Needless to say, this is the first 12-inch availability anywhere for either version.


