

Ray Jackson case could set the shape of recording contracts Neglected' artist wins court ba

By JEFF CLARK-MEADS RECORD INDUSTRY lawyers were this week examining word-by-word the judgement in the Ray Jackson/EMI High Court battle to establish whether a precedent had been set for future deals.

Jackson and Barry McKay In-ternational Music (UK) Ltd, the company that manages him, had sued EMI for loss of opportunity arising from the company's fai-lure to record three singles in 1976 — the first year of the sin-ger's deal with EMI — as stipu-lated in Jackson's contract.

Judge Mr Justice Michael Davies awarded Jackson and McKay damages of £12,500 and granted them interest on that sum of 12 per cent, payable since 1980, to bring the amount up to £24,000. He also awarded them costs, estimated to be between costs, estimated to be between £40,000 and £50,000.

Richard Jackson's solicitor, Hart-Jackson, believes that com-panies can no longer afford to be complacent with their artists. EMI's lawyers maintain that the case was too specific to set prece-dents although they, too, have been analysing a transcript of Fri-day's hour-long judgement to establish its ramifications

At the beginning of the judge-ment at the High Court in London Mr Justice Davies said: "Ray Jackson was a very impressive and fair witness with a burning conviction that he had been let down by a great company which he trusted."

In contrast, he later said that EMI witness, producer Glyn Johns, had given evidence which helped Jackson's case and which supported the argument that at the time of the singer's involvement with the company EMI's 'a shambles organisation was Mr Justice Davies said EMI had reached "a point of despair" when its barrister asked him to reject Johns' evidence.

reject Johns' evidence. In nine days of evidence, Jack-son and McKay claimed EMI lost interest in Jackson after his first, solo single flopped. They also maintained the company did very little to promote the single. EMI argued consistently that it betwed a screet deal of fuith and

showed a great deal of faith and support for Jackson, but that the right material for a hit single was not available. Mr Justice Davies said, though, that if Jackson was not writing suitable material then it should have been found from another source.

The judge concluded: "The plaintiffs (Jackson and McKay) are entitled to argue that Jackson did not have a fair crack of the whip by reason of only one and not three singles being made in the initial one-year period of his contract. I am satisfied that if the defendants had played fair there was a real possibility that Jackson would have succeeded. He would not have been a mega-star, but he would have achieved success he would have achieved success that would have brought in sub-stantial sums of money." Another CD plant planned for UK

BUILDING WORK on a compact disc pressing plant with a total capacity of 8m discs a year will begin on a site in Southern Eng-

land within the next two months. The project is the brainchild of Roy Matthews, owner of music industry engineering company Musitech and former boss of EMI's plant at Hayes, who has raised the financial backing from City of London investors. "I have been involved as a con

sultant overseas on projected CD plants and having had a look at the technical and commerical aspects, we at Musitech thought there was a space in the market and sufficient demand to justify a plant here," says Matthews. "We have the technical background and a knowledge of the markets and we can see that this will be

The only other plant producing CDs in the UK is that of Nimbus in Gwent which will have an annual capacity of 3m discs when two more presses come on line later this year.







African single 'fever'

From IRA MAYER NEW YORK: We Are The World, the US answer to Do They Know It's Christmas, shipped an initial one million units in 7-inch format, and another 200,000-300,000 copies as a 12-inch

single. The song debuts on the *Billboard* Hot 100 at 21 with a bullet this week.

Typical was New York's downtown Tower outlet, which sold out 500 copies within 24 hours. Smaller stores received partial shipments of their actual orders — often as few as 25 copies. Local one-stops and distributors handling the record were promising re-deliveries by the middle of the following week. Enthusiasm over the record is at fever pitch, with MTV airing the full seven-minute video, HBO preparing to air a one-hour "making of" documentary next month, and newspaper and network television coverage at very high profile. Artists in-volved are expected to be exceptionally supportive. For exam-ple Dionne Warwick added an emotionally charged rendition of the song, sung to piano accompaniment. to her performance at

the song, sung to piano accompaniment, to her performance at Radio City Music Hall, where she was sharing the bill for five nights with Johnny Mathis. The gospel flourishes and passion she brought to the number earned her a well-deserved ovation.

opened the concert together with Friends in Love (a duet they recorded in 1982), and proceeded with solo sets linked by additional duets. Using their respective rhythm sections, the two did share a 40-plus piece orchestra. In all, it was a very special event; \$30 top ticket price is typical for the venue and type of artist, but value for the money in this instance was exceptional. Such programming and co-operation among name artists could certainly do much to revive the live concert circuit. AN INDEPENDENT dealer in the North East is claiming that the Musicpoint scheme, (MW Mar 16), through which records are sold in newsagents and tobacconists, could cost him his business

John Saunders of Beat It Records in South Shields declares that a Musicpoint near his shop is costing him 25 per cent of his trade. But Peter Harris, managing director of wholesalers and distributors SP&S which runs the scheme, says Musicpoint does

not do enough business to affect a good shop. Saunders told MW: "We dare not buy new releases in quantities any more because if they get them in not only do we look stupid but we're left with a pile of LPs. If it gets much more widespread we'll have to class our doors." close our doors.

Harris said: "It was a policy decision not to open next-door to a record shop in an area that could be contentious. We don't want to upset the dealers, a lot of who are customers of SP&S. "None of our Musicpoint racks is so successful that it could have accounted for a drop in somebody's business of 25 per cent. We do not do enough turnover to be a threat to a good record shop."

The first five compilations all feature 12-inch versions of the hits, and artists include Michael Jackson, Paul Venne, Ponpie Tuder Sumiyor and Harbie Hancock Young, Bonnie Tyler, Survivor and Herbie Hancock. The cassettes are packaged in library cases, and the series will be

promoted via in-store displays, point-of-sale material and national press advertising.

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EWAS Chart place for Vivaldi after awards exposure

TWO-MINUTES exposure in the televised British Record Industry Awards is being credited for the dramatic success of the LP of Vivaldi's The Four Seasons, which entered the chart last week at 89.

The record has been available since August and the compact disc for nearly a year but sales jumped from 2,500 in 12 months to 250 a day after the

television appearance. Christopher Hogwood, director of the Academy of Ancient Music which recorded the pieces, said: "It

proves that there is a tremendous public appetite for music that is tuneful and attractive whatever label is attached to it and I am sure that Vivaldi would have Gallup chart manager Godfrey Rust commented

that the record's success was despite the fact that classical product is always discriminated against because it mainly sells through outlets not covered by the chart panel, for example specialist shops or by mail order. He added that classical records also find it harder to break into the chart because their sales are spread over long periods of time.

EMI had taken up an album op-tion. He said that the required written notification of this was never given.

After the judgement, Hart-Jackson commented that it was now impossible for a company to sign a band and then sit back and do nothing with them. He said there would be repercussions for a large number of acts. However, EMI business affairs executive Gareth Hopkins said: "This case does not create a general precedent in the industry and should be regarded as a deci-sion relating to this case and its particular circumstances." He went on: "We are dis-appointed and surprised at the

appointed and surprised at the judgement. The judge's remarks

over the capabilities of EMI per-sonnel relate to a past era and bear no relation to EMI Records and its business procedures in 1985. As the judge confirmed during the course of the hearing, this was a straightforward case of

interpretation of this particular recording contract dated 1976." McKay, though, had his delight at the decision tempered by a regret that it had been necessary to go to court at all. He com-mented: "During 1979 and 1980 we made continuous efforts to avoid court proceedings. Various proposals were put to EMI in the proposals were put to EMI in the hope that a suitable compromise could be reached to go towards compensating Ray Jackson for what was really a two-year watershed in his career.

"EMI's uncompromising atti-tude throughout left us with no alternative but to commence litigation which we did reluctant-ly at the end of 1980, but always hoped that good sense on their part would prevail and a reasonable settlement could be achieved before the action came to court. I can honestly say that the only settlement proposal re-ceived from EMI was a week or so before the trial when they offered £2,500 on the basis that we paid our own costs, which by then vastly exceeded that figure. Quite honestly, we felt humiliated by such an offer and determined to see things through to the bitter end.

EVVS FEATURE Sales stay firm as US makes chart comeback **By ALAN JONES**

ONSIDERING THE scarcity of significant releases since the be-ginning of the year, record sales have remained remarkably firm, according to data collected by Gallup in the first two months of 1985.

Singles sales in January were 10 per cent up on 1984, whilst albums advanced an impressive 23 per cent. Seven-inch singles improved seven per cent, 12-inch sing-les by 20 per cent, LPs by 16 per cent, and cassettes by 41 per cent.

By February, the effect of Band Aid on singles sales had sub-sided, and the market settled down to a more normal level. Seven-inch singles eased off two per cent, while 12-inch singles slipped by 10 per cent, compared with 1984 levels, for an overall decline of four per cent. The album sector continued to im-press. Cassettes led the way with press. Cassettes led the way with a 49 per cent increase, and LPs added 18 per cent, together mak-ing up a 27 per cent improvement in album sales. Albums have now made gains in each of the last 12 months, whilst for the last five months cassettes have held a

steady 35-36 per cent share of the market. The failure of the format to make further headway must be counted as a surprise in view of

Many of the records not fulfill-ing their potential are of US ori-gin. American music generally is enjoying a great resurgence here, and at the moment accounts for around 40 per cent of the total market for both singles and albums, its best showing for nearly a decade.

Finally, it's interesting to note that Dead Or Alive's You Spin Me Round (Like A Record) didn't reach number one until its fif-teenth week in the top 75. It's fairly commonplace for singles to reach number one in America so reach number one in America so far into their chart careers, but for Britain it's unique. 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
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

The Guitar in Spain, consisting of the sound track of the works used in the series. The programmes were the brainchild of the guitarist and lutenist Julian Bream, who spent years on its conception and development, and then played the central role in the filming, both on location in Seville, Tole-do, Aranjuez, Barcelona and the do, Aranjuez, Barcelona and the Pyrenees, and in the studio. In the series, Bream not only plays the modern classical guitar,

but many of its antecedents, in-cluding the early Renaissance guitar, the vihuela and the Baro-que guitar — instruments which

were especially built for him after period originals by the guitar maker Jose Romanillos.

The series, which includes a wealth of historical documenta-tion such as paintings, manu-scripts and biographical sketches of composers and instruments as well as the music, was delayed in its final moments of filming through the car accident which nearly ended Bream's career. Fortunately, he recovered from serious hand injuries to complete

To go from Cats, Evita and Starlight Express to a Requiem is asking for flak from snooty critics and classical music buffs, but it cannot be denied that however derivative this music is, it is powerful, entertaining, moving, and demands to be listened to. I put on the Requiem intending to sample it before a more concentrated listen later, and ended up being late for an appointment. It is easy to play the influence game, but if one acknowledges that one can recognise bits of Britten, Faure, Vaughan Williams, Ives, and Latin-America, one can just get down and enjoy what is a striking work. I do not feel the Requiem is a particularly profound work — the Pie Jesu is pure Hollywood Christmas — but it does make an immediate impact which is only occasionally trite. It receives its first Brittsh performance in April, and from the interest that will inevitably ensue, this record should April, and from the interest that will inevitably ensue, this record should sell extremely well — across a very wide consumer profile.

ECO principal conductor added to Tate's gallery

JEFFREY TATE, the principal conductor at the Royal Opera House, Covent Garden, has added another formal appointment to his roster - he is the new principal conductor of the English Chamber Orchestra.

This is the first time that the ECO - Britain's only full-time chamber orchestra - has made such an appointment: in its past 24 years it has studiously avoided formal conducting appointments, although it has maintained close working associations

with many musicians, including Barenboim, Leppard, Perahia, and, in its earlier days, Benjamin Britten. However, from the first engagement with the orchestra, Jeffrey Tate proved himself immensely popular with the players, and with its 25th anniversary season approaching, the ECO decided to formalise the relationship. relationship. Tate, who is 42, qualified as a doctor before concentrating on music

Tate, who is 42, qualified as a doctor before concentrating on thusic but his natural ability showed itself throughout his ensuing career — as a repetiteur at Covent Garden from 1971, as an assistant conductor to Pierre Boulez at Bayreuth, to Karajan in Salzburg, and to James Levine in the Metropolitan, New York. In the late Seventies and early Eighties, he made his conducting debut

at many major European opera houses, as well as at the Metropolitan, and, in 1982 at Covent Garden.

In the last couple of years, he has been very concerned to develop the orchestral side of his work, and the ECO appointment is a natural outcome of this.

Commitment

He comes to the ECO with a strong commitment from EMI for recording plans: next month, his third EMI album of Mozart Symphonies (Nos 32, 35 and 39) made with the ECO is released by the company

CEL 2702531 and on tape), and others will follow. The Swiss-born conductor Matthias Bamert has been appointed principal guest conductor of the Scottish National Orchestra from

principal guest conductor of the Scottish National Orchestra from August for three years. This follows a widely acclaimed debut with the ochestra two years ago, and a succession of well-received concerts in Scotland since – including appearances at Musica Nova. In addition, Bamert, 43, has been appointed director of the triennial International Festival Of Contemporary Music, Musica Nova, which next takes place in 1987.

Bamert has become increasingly known in the UK, with performances with many English provincial orchestras, as well as conducting on Channel 4.





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
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



Just back from China, where he negotiated for Wham! to play there next month, SIMON NAPIER-BELL gives an insight into what is potentially the world's biggest record market.



na's counter revolution

FIRST went to China in 1976 when, to a foreigner, was dull and sullen. Now, the atmosphere is unrecognisable. It's like a different country and even people who were there as recently as three years ago are stunned. There's no mistaking it ... there's been a new revolution.

In the record stores people bus-tle around the counter trying to get a glimpse of the latest batch of cassettes and records to come into stock. In Peking I asked a girl what she was looking for. "Disco music," she told me. "There isn't any in stock, but I've heard there'll be some soon.

In Canton there is already disco music available. The local city council encourages what it sees as youth-culture. It even runs its own record company which re-cently produced three disco albums which went on sale in stores around the city. The music may be unsophisticated to our ears, but it's unmistakably disco with electronic drums, synthesisers and a brass section.

ers and a brass section. The result? One store, the size of a small London sandwich counter, sold 12,000 cassettes in three days and the best of the three albums sold a total of 420,000 copies. Wages are yery low but many

Wages are very low, but many young people find the money to go to a dancehall once a week, but this is a luxury. It might cost as much as 10 Yuan (£3). Records

as much as 10 Yuan (£3). Řecords, are a luxury too, with cassettes selling at around 6 Yuan (£2). But for working people who are not yet married they are affordable. In China children leave school and start work at 18. People get married late, and the principal purchasers of records are be-tween 18 and 32. In this age group there are 200m people. Just half of them, buying one record a year, makes China a sub-stantial record market. I was there over the Chinese

stantial record market. I was there over the Chinese New Year when there were two New Year songs among the best-selling records, but the Top 12 in Canton still reflected the current craze for Western orientated music with seven dance/disco ti-tles, one electronic and synth-esiser version of hits, one com-pilation of hits and one of music from a popular opera.

from a popular opera. Canton is the most commer-cially progressive city in China. Its proximity to Hong Kong means it is heavily influenced by the capitalist approach to things and it imports commercial trends

as fast as they emerge. Peking, on the other hand, is becoming the home of intellectual freedom.

In Canton the best dancehall is a place for wearing the latest fashions and striking a pose; by contrast, Peking's disco, deco-rated with fairy lights and also playing the latest Western dance playing the latest Western dance records, provides a meeting place between Chinese and fore-igners and instead of posing there's earnest conversation. There's no mistaking the inten-tion of the Chinese. They've chosen to open up to the outside world and having made the deci-

world, and having made the deci-sion they're going flat out to implement it

I predict that by the end of the century, not only will China's ma-jor cities be the most commer-cially important in Asia, but its record market will be the largest in the world.

In record shops all over South East Asia one can see the huge demand for Western music and everywhere the popularity of loc-al artists is equalled by foreign ones. All top-selling albums in Indonesia alone sell well over the 1m mark. But, of course, most of these sales are bootleg or counterfeits.

However, in China there is no bootlegging or piracy.

There's no doubt that like every other South East Asian country, Western youth culture is going to flood in and take over. The flood in and take over. The Chinese have debated this possibility and accepted the risks. They realise they can't have the West's technology and expertise without

assimilating much of its culture. At the moment, there isn't one single overseas artist on the counter in any record shop in China. But there will be soon. The

demand for foreign artists is vast. It could be just a matter of months before Boy George, Wham!, Michael Jackson and all the West's other rock music stars start taking the same grip on young people in China as they have in the rest of the world.


Having made the decision to allow it to happen, the Chinese are eager to get started; but they will be cautious. They are still very wary of foreign influences on their young people. Finding ways into their market won't be Ways into their market won't be easy. Arriving in an executive jet with an armful of expensive pre-sents won't help at all. Better go armed with persistence, patience and a genuine interest in other people's ideas. The invitation for Wham! to play in Peking and Canton was

The invitation for Wham! to play in Peking and Canton was the result of nine months patient

negotiation. The invitation came from the All-China Youth Federation, an association of over 200m members between the ages of 18 and 34 — exactly those people in China who form the record-buying market.

Wham!'s gig in Peking on April will be the first occasion that the Chinese have ever allowed contemporary Western popular music into their country. It's likely to be followed by the release of Wham!'s records. But even more important, the event provides the first steps for the UK music industry into potentially the world's largest and most exciting market.

When Derek Chinnery retired as controller of Radio One he sent some parting shots over the bows of Phonographic Performance Ltd. This week, PPL general manager John Love replies **Needletime: the PPL**

DEREK CHINNERY has served DEREK CHINNERY has served broadcasting with great distinc-tion for 43 years. He deserves — and has — the respect of the music and recording industry, as well as that of the whole entertainment industry. That doesn't, mean that everything he

doesn't, mean that everything he says is right. First, his parting thought: "Let's have free airplay for new releases." He already has some-thing very close to this. For years, BBC Radios 1-4 have had a con-cession which allows free airplay up to nearly 1,000 hours a year for the purpose of genuine re-view; it's surely not unreason-able to imagine that most of this would be used precisely for the able to imagine that most of this would be used precisely for the purpose of introducing new re-leases. 1,000 hours a year, free over and above any of the BBC's paid needletime, could

paid needletime, could accommodate about 1,000 albums and 7,400 singles. Second, his statement as Head of the record-based Radio 1 that "the PRS payment is logical be-cause you're using the compos-ers' work and should pay for it. I'm not against the principle of PPL payments — just the amounts." I agree with him about PRS, but what's so different ab-out PPL? How long would Radio 1 survive if it broadcast other per-formances of those musical comformances of those musical com

positions instead of the distinct recorded performances which its listeners want to hear? Would listeners want to hear? Would Gladys Pringle bring Radio 1 the same audiences as Alison Moyet, just by singing the same songs? Indeed, although PRS and PPL both exercise legal rights to which they are properly entitled, it might even be argued that with-out, the finished product which out the finished product which PPL's members supply (sound re-cordings which are the final re-sult of technical and creative ex-pertise and a level of investment currently running at more than £300 million per annum) some PRS income wouldn't arise in the first place. Third, and leading on from the

Third, and leading on from the last point, the question of pay-ment. PPL's members have a proper legal right. That right, the right to broadcast records, deliv-ers the largest single source of programme output to Radios 1-4 — a source which consistently guarantees big audiences. It de-livers, also, a constantly expand-ing repertoire (currently about 2,500 labels from PPL's 500 mem-bers, covering hundreds of thousands of titles). What this means, to the BBC, is 9,000 hours a year of programme output on Radios 1-4, nearly 4,000 hours on regional radio, and nearly 35,000 hours on over 40 BBC local sta-

tions. We may (and, I expect, will) argue with the BBC about the actual amount which that right is worth. But if the right means something substantial rather than nominal, it is hardly un-essonable that the payment should similarly be substantial rather than nominal. Thally, the question of needle-time. Whether this was too low in 1967 or 1954 is now a matter of history. Nevertheless (and not may people know this) PPL has agreed every single request from the BBC for additional needletime in at least the last 20 years. In-deed, in the last 10 or 15 years, extra needletime has been granted in every set of negotia-tions, and the PPL-BBC rela-tionship has seen the dramatic expansion of BBC local radio sta-ticreases on Radio 1, 2 and 3.

COPS COPS IS a rarity: a custom press-ing company that offers speedy service, yet sends all its work abroad

abroad. Despite the distance between here and Paris, COPS still man-ages to rush out chart back-up pressings, ordered on Tuesday and shipped on Thursday. Quite

a record. COPS was formerly Continen tal Production Services, and was tal Production Services, and was started in the indies boom six years ago by Bobbie and Elie Dahdi. COPS now offers a com-plete manufacturing service to any size of record company — from the one-off, 1,000-run, seven-inch hopeful to a major's overflow business — for exam-ple, rushing out Foreigner sing-les for WEA to hold on to the No.1. spot. Roger Bateson joined the com-pany from The Cartel two years ago, and has also worked in re-tail as a sales rep. "COPS can offer an average of 120,000 12-inch pressings a week and 40,000 seven-inch per day," he says, "and we can handle the sleeve and label print." started in the indies boom six

The work goes over to three factories outside Paris — Disco France, and, true to the independent tradition, Areacem — the due-to-close major plant that the workers took over and run as a co-operative. Some work goes to PolyGram France. The capacity offered by the two independent offered by the two independents is equivalent to EMI and CBS

COPS has carefully solved any supply problems that may worry new customers. For example, if new customers. For example, if the work has to be spread round three factories, COPS absorbs the cost of the extra metal work. They can offer the cutting ser-vices in Spectrum Sounds in Fol-kestone, or let the customer supply lacquers. The sleeves and label can be printed by the Paris factories. "In some cases we are slower, in others faster than UK plants," says Bateson, "but on average, we offer a pretty good service, and that's what counts. We can always find the capac-ity."

ity." How COPS beats UK factories on turnaround time is by send-ing the parts ahead to Paris on standby, and waiting for the major to order on Tuesday, having seen the chart. Fog, strikes and storms notwithstanding (there are always planes for emergen-cies) the finished pressings ar-rive in Southampton on Thurs-day morning. Coloured vinyl or odd sizes present no problems

day morning. Coloured vinyl or odd sizes present no problems. An interesting development is CD — with Beggars Banquet pro-ducing 15 titles on CD of late, other indies are seriously con-sidering releases in the format. COPS deals with a German plant for these orders and if a custom-er wants picture diess then for these orders and if a custom-er wants picture discs, then COPS can find capacity in the UK. "We have also handled fle-xis and tape," Bateson con-tinues." Some of the MOR indies now release tape and record in parallel. For them we can also handle inlays and cases, even getting the repro film made from their artwork." Offering such an all-round ser-vice to indies often means finan-cial risk: during the Pinnacle period last November, COPS gave labels extended credit until things settled down. "That was a tricky time for us," Bateson admits.

admits

But therein lies a COPS moral — a COPS account customer, however small, benefits from the however small, benefits from the company's own credit record and doesn't have to suddenly find cash for orders. In addition, newcomers are dealing with one experienced company for all the production services required and at a competitive price (the franc and the pound both seem to be going up and down together at present). COPS can even give them distribution con-tacts. Though the bulk of work is from the UK, COPS has found picture disc work for a French company, and has just had an enquiry from Hong Kong for clear vinyl.





DAMONT WAS bought from WEA by Counterpoint about six years ago and was originally an independent. The partnership has led to some interesting variations on the custom pressings service. Frank Pearce, commercial director, has been with Damont since the

Frank Pearce, commercial director, has been with Damont since the WEA days and is therefore an experienced observer of the industry's movements. Damont presses 12 and seven-inch and audio cassettes, on an ad hoc basis. "We work for all the majors," Pearce says, "with some contract work for PRT. It's quite a good arrangement with the industry, and presumably we have a good track record and a reputation for good service, because the orders keep coming in." Demand was extremely heavy before and immediately after Christ-mas and opening during the Christmas break — one of the few that did — meant additional orders. Turnover is up on last year. "There's definitely a more buoyant atmosphere about the business," says Pearce.

definitely a more buoyant atmosphere about the business." says Pearce. Damont uses Lened 12 and seven-inch, some automatic, some semi-automatic, and even will do small orders — once a 300 run, though the preferred minimum is 1,000 — and more usually the 24-hour, 100,000-run jobs. "It's nice when we get the cassette run in parallel with the disc," says Pearce, who also points out that buoyant though things may be, it's still nothing like the boom years. "We have to work harder, be more on-the-ball. Volume is of course down and the indies — and we do quite a bit of work for them — tend to order hand-to-mouth these days. Trying to keep the business coming in and the volume going up means steady prices and improved services. Damont will handle print work for smaller com-panies, and many of the little runs are for discs going direct to retail outlets. The theory of this sort of piece work is that the labels will hopefully bring in the real business when they become successful. "The healthier status of the indies since the distribution problems have been more or less sorted out is good for all of us," says Pearce. "What has really helped is the 12-inch single now being sold by the multiples. It's broken through the smaller retailers' resistance. The increase since the beginning of December has been rapid, compared to a very quiet summer. "The record industry has responded by ordering 12-inch singles automatically not just as first-run promotional items. Also, the sleeves are better, and the whole design and approach to the 12-inch single has made it a product in its own right — better value for money to the buyers." "If we are simply too busy we try and help customers by passing on the work. It's much easier for them if we handle the whole job and they don't have to deal with several different pressing plants." The keen prices abroad mean little demand for export, except for cassettes; demand overall has gone up over the past two or three years (though it is quiet at present) but special items, such as the WEA Double always help. And here, the group can assist — Counterpoint has a factory in Ashford where the WEA library cases were made (which from the commercial point of view also comes under Pearce's department) and can produce coloured or translucent plastic cases. and data tapes. "There's a more disposable attitude to cassettes these daws"

department) and can produce coloured or translucent plastic cases. and data tapes. "There's a more disposable attitude to cassettes these days". Pearce points out. "They are so much cheaper, especially the budget and mid-price ones, that people buy them for their cars and then give them away or even throw them away. This is good from our point of view because obviously the manufacturing costs are the same re-gardless of the retail price." Damont has 32 audio cassette duplicators, a capacity of 75,000 a week, compared to a disc capacity of 400,000 a week. "This is a more professional and more efficient industry." sums up Pearce. "There's less wastage, and from our point of view, fewer gimmicks. We do make coloured discs — there's a blue one going through at the moment — but they come in fits and starts. The demand for picture discs has waned too — we used to do them but they turned out less cost effective than standard viny!." Perhaps the punters lost interest. But nevertheless, they are clearly still interested in black viny! "I'' m quite confident about the future and feel the economy is improving," concludes Pearce.

"Servicing is mainly to the in-dependent market, and our orders usually range\from the 1,000s to 10 to 20,000."

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

PHIL RACE's PR Records has been committed to the independent labels since its inception over five years ago.

The Merton, South London, factory offers capacity of 65,000 a week, and the company specialises in high-giality LPs which account for 60 per cent of turnover, the rest being 12-inch singles.

Such is the demand that the company is increasing capacity this summer, moving to a new factory a few miles away and installing two more Toolex Alpha automatic presses, providing six presses, 24 hours a day. By "indies", PR includes the small labels, private and specialist labels, individuals and clubs, music libraries and other short-run customers. PR also presses classics for PRT.

General manager Ray Young has been with PR since the start. "From our point of view the independent business has increased each year," he says. "Hence our 50 per cent expansion." The indie market is still buoyant, and we are currently having difficulty coping — and this demand has been steady since the end of last summer."

Employment is increasing too, and Young likes to point out that the PR staff of 30 has a combined industry experience of 319 years. "We promise top quality," adds Young. "We use first-grade PVC and inspect our records 100 per cent of the time."

Being in the independent market inevitably means rush jobs fol-lowed by long silences from the label concerned. "We have rushed through a military tattoo album for Germany every other year since the company started. We get lacquers on Sunday and ship the finished product on Tuesday moring," says Young. Exports, howev-er, only account for 3 per cent of turnover. "It's difficult to expand this in a pressing-to-order business."

Working on a "jobbing" basis has to mean competitive prices. Seventy five per cent of PR's supplies are imported, and pressing charges have been kept stable for 18 months, despite the vinyl price refusing to go down in line with oil price. It may even go up this year. "Vinyl went up twice during last year, but we absorbed the in-creases," says Young. "But we will have to have a review in April, like everyone else.

The 12-inch single market seems to be thriving, though there is no obvious boom now. PR spreads its services to cover coloured vinyl a fair amount of digital classical discs, and the occasional chart disc run — for example 100,000 of the Smiley Culture single.

PR has existing expansion plans for later in the year — though not, at this stage, to picture discs. Young is currently looking to the success of the DMM pressings — three in a row since Christmas, all DOD.

"We rely on word-of-mouth," he adds, "as we do very little marketing; some of our recommendations come through the cutting studios. So it's important for us to provide the best possible service and high quality pressings, at competitive prices."

WITH THE Go-Go sound of Washington DC now firmly estab-lished on British dancefloors, and several singles from the genre already scattered through both the disco and pop charts, the first

the disco and pop charts, the first Go-Go albums have arrived. First off the mark is EMI, with a rush-release of the original 1978 album by Chuck Brown & The Soul Searchers. Named after Brown's also reissued and now charted single Bustin' Loose, it features sound have donce tracks features seven long dance tracks firmly in the familiar DC groove — which did not sound a lot different seven years ago from the current crop of recordings.

There's an almost-eight minute version of Bustin' Loose itself,

plus an interesting workout on the old Jerry Butler hit Never Gonna Give You, Up. Catalogue number is Source EG 2605201, and EMI expects the album to retail at around £3.99.

Also due soon (March 29) is a double album compilation on London, entitled Go-Go — The Sound Of Washington DC. This is made up of live club recordings by Redds & The Boys (currently charting with Movin' And Groovin' on Fourth & Broadway), Petworth and Shady Grove, and also includes a *Go-Go Encyclo-paedia* compiled by Stuart Cos-grove. Price and catalogue number are still to be announced.

achieve the standards everyone believed it could, it was worth nurturing and building slowly. A first UK single should be selected from the album within two or three weeks, and the LP itself will follow. 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


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
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Marc catalogue to be reissued

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MARC ON WAX, the label with rights to the entire EMI Marc Bolan catalogue from 1972 onwards, has signed a new distribution deal with Spartan. The back catalogue of Marc On Wax (eight albums) will be available in re-designed sleeves, and there are also plans to release the LPs in compact disc format. 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
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
