A TWO-PRONGED attack of A TWO-PRONGED attack on the quality of some pre-recorded cas-settes was launched this week with the music industry being accused of losing sales because of sub-standard tapes.

cople are get means that more people are get-ting close to their favourite music and, argues Producers' Guild chairman Bob Hine, they are notic-ing that a proportion of tapes are not giving full value. He is backed by The International Audio And Music Association (Interamo), whose president, Michael Jones, contends: "We know that many of the recordings being released today could sound a whole lot better, and it is our opinion that a quality product will sell more copies than an inferior

one."
Hine is anxious to see an improvement which will benefit all sectors of the industry, but at present he maintains that half of all pre-recorded cosselles are of "recosonable" quality, with 16 per cent "excellent" and 34 per cent sub-standard. He says: "There are 9.24m personal stereos in the UK and you are so clave to the music 9.24m personal stereos in the UK and you are so close to the music that you can tell if there is any lowering of quality. 

Both albums and singles were down on 1985 but net value of shipments rose to £425.3m with

shipments rose to £425.3m with cassettes up by more than a quar-ter to £69.6m units and CDs finishing at 8.4m units. Average trade price of cassettes

dropped due to the increasing strength of the budget market but the total value of tapes went up from £128.4m to £152.1m. Of

from £128.4m to £152.1m. Of total CD soles, almost half came in the last three months of the year. Total singles volume was down 8.7 per cent at 67.4m and the decline of the single was reflected in the absence of any platinum awards for any releases in the UK. during the year. Average trade prices increased very little and total value of the market fell by 7.3 per cent to £76.1 m.

cent to £76.1m.
Vinyl album sales also fell and ended the year at 52.3m units, a fall of 1.3 per cent on 1985. Average trade prices dropped during the year to result in a 3.3 per cent fall in value to £140.6m.

Overall sales of long players during 1986 added up to 130.3m units which is 16.9 per cent more than was shinned in 1985.

WiTH OLD songs very much a feature of the charts of the mo-ment, it looks as though a battle may be about to develop between two versions of an oldie on the dance listings.

Rock Your Baby, which was the biggest dance hit of 1974, and has remained a permanent feature certainly with mobile disco DIs ever since, is already tickling the dance Top 75 and the pop Top 100 in the new Siegfried Ipach production by the original artist, George McCrae. 




