

Franchise applications for Dundee-Perth

THE DUNDEE/PERTH area is the latest ILR site for which the IBA is inviting franchise applications

Beacon's mega spend on outside events

BEACON RADIO has undertaken a mega-series of outside broadcasts which could cost up to £8,000 as part of a spring promotional campaign prior to the annual network JICRAR audience survey.

Although the Wolverhampton ILR usually promotes itself heavily at this time of year, its current campaign is the most ambitious ever staged and, the station believes, could be the largest series of outside broadcasts undertaken by any ILR station.

From Saturday (17) until the end of April the station will be broadcasting 14 programmes from nine locations: Wolverhampton; Telford; West Bromwich; Dudley (three); Stourbridge; Bridgnorth and Walsall. Other venues have yet to be arranged in Tipton; Stafford; Cannock; Bilston and Briefley Hill.

Press advertising, poster campaigns and window displays are being used to back up each broadcast. The station has a stand at the Birmingham Motor Show from April 6 to 17, will be present at the Halfpenny Green Airport Sunday Market on April 15 and is sponsoring a day at Hednesford Parents on April 16.

Features expansion at Radio Clyde

Managing director Jimmy Gordon considers features or featurettes (dropped into music programmes) the main growth area in the station's programming.



EDITORIAL

PROGRAMMING FOR MINORITY GROUPS IN his recent speech at Manchester University's broad-

casting symposium, John Whitney, Capital's managing director, referred to the "horrendous fact" that New York's number one station (in competition with a total of 92 others, and at times capturing 16 per cent of the total radio audience) is an FM station playing disco music 24 hours a day. Now although the prospect of round-the-clock disco

music may indeed be horrifying to many, one suspects John Whitney's real horror was aroused by the fact the such specialised programming could prove such a hag draw. It goes right against the grain of ILR's fundamental principles. But entertainment, as Whitney says in an earlier pa

graph, is ILR's most important task. No one could esuggest that a station which can attract one sixth of York's total radio audience is not entertaining. It ma not necessarily be informing or educating very much, entertaining, it certainly is. And it is entertaining by first commandment: Give the audience what it wants. Is that really so horrendous? It would not seem so.

but it does highlight the problem faced by the ILF stations- that they are obliged to be as many things to as many people as they possibly can-

It is a situation with which they are coping better a the time but the enormously broad programming bas they are obliged to operate from means that their

potential impact is always diluted This of course is a situation which will persist until any given set of listeners has choice of stations to tu to. And when that time comes will the new stations b required to adopt the same programming framework the existing stations?

Let us hope not. Horrendous as it may seem to Jo Whitney and many others there would still be a great number of people in Britain who would be in sevent heaven if they could listen to non-stop disco, or rock reggae, or jazz, or talk

ILR as it is now provides a proven service to its respective communities and in the future smaller star may provide an even more specific service to smaller communities. These communities are united by a common interest that is predominantly geographical

In New York, and hopefully in Britain one day, re can also cater for communities united by a common interest in an entertainment form. Entertainment aft all is what radio is all about.

LBC commuter service

LAST WEEK LBC launched a major new service for commuters. direct from London Transport's headquarters, giving detailed tube and bus information. It is the first time a municipal transport group has given total co-operation of this kind to a radio station.

Each morning from 06.35 to 08.55 broadcaster Michael Meach gives six live bulletins via land-line from a studio specially built and designed by LBC situated in London Transport's Broadway headquarters and linked by land

London Transport provides the information and the services of former BBC-man Meach while LBC contributed the cost of the land-line and studio.

Programme controller Keith Belcher, who was responsible for the long negotiations with London Transport and the Post Office. explains that it has always been LBC's ambition "to be able to provide a complete service for Londoners who, like myself, find the mere task of getting to work becoming more and more difficult.

"We already have full information on British Rail, we have our own reporter at Scotland Yard and our own studio with the AA for traffic. But getting details of bus and tube trouble was a mammoth task because of the wide number of routes and garages."

Belcher praised London Transport for working towards the position where they can collate details from all over the City and feed them live into the station's AM programme. There are around 200 bus garages and over 300 bus routes, not to mention the under-

ground tube network. The Computer File, or Get-You-To-Work service began on Monday (12) - the first day of the latest snowfalls in the city.



GARY'S GANG Keep On Dancing. CBS 7109. So popular on import that it made all t disco charts before even getting a UK release! Super rattling timbales and tinking xylophone plus a nicely easy vocal give it a vantage of a real tune. Should be a crossover monster and there's a 12-inch on the way to give it added impetus. 3min 30sec of pure

BLUES BROTHERS Soul Man. Atlantic K11244. Decade later cover version of the Sam and Dave discouspid classic and inte estingly enough. Steve Cropper and Donald 'Duck' Dunn, who both played on the original, are also featured as session men here. John Belushi and Don Aykroyd, formerly of the National Lampoon comedy team, are the Blues Brothers and Atlantic have put mucho ackers behind promoting them. The backing track of this new version barely departs from the original though and the guys' vocals certainly don't match Sam and Dave so I'll stick with the oldies are the goodies theory.

INDEPENDENT LABELS

Pathfinders for the record industry

The advent of the punk D.I.Y record mentality brought to light a thriving network of independent record labels. But the punks did not have the patent to the indie label; jazzers, folk musicians and refugees from corporation-sized record companies have been running indie labels for over a decade. From labels unfrom musicians' front rooms to indie labels growing as big as the establishment companies, John Gill looks at the various types of independent record company in England today.

ISLAND

ALTHOUGH MOST widely appreciated for its involvement in the progressive music scene of the late sixties and its champloning of regage in the early seventies, Island Records arrived on the British scene in 1962.

Chris Blackwell, a lifelong devotee of black music, had lived in Jamaica during the late fifties/early sixties. In 1962 he returned to England and formed his own label, run from his own flat and distributed by Blackwell in his van.

The first two releases were Independent Jamaica
(WI 001), by Lord Creator, and Darling Patricia (WI

precursor of ska. 1962 also saw the start of Blackwell's long-standing business partnership with David Betteridge, who came to Island having gleaned some information on the production side of the music industry from his father's job at Lugions distributors. Datil 1964, Haland dealt exclusively with black more considerable of the state of the

The company's big break came in March 1964, when Millie's My Boy Lollipop went to number two and stayed in the British charts for 18 weeks. The Millie single grew so big that Island handed it to

Fontana to press and distribute.

Fontana also took over the next big chart name to come from Island — the Spencer Davis Group.

Included in The Spencer Davis Group line-up were Muff and Steve Winwood, the latter of whom left to form Traffic in 1967. Traffic were duly signed and became the first British band to have a release on the Island label.

In 1969 Island did a deal with EG Management which brought King Crimson and, later in the early seventies, Roxy Music.

Also in 1969 saw the launch of Trojan Records, Trojan was launched in effect to take away the majority of the regae product signed to Island Records. The first Trojan hit was Jimmy Clif's Wonderful World, Beautiful People, released in October 69, which went to number six and stayed in

Trojan and losing most of its reggae product. Among the product which remained with Island is Jimmy Cliff's much-acclaimed The Harder They Come album.

Through the late sixties and early seventies, Island had gone on signing very individual talents such as Cat Stevens, John Martyn, Roxy and others, but the company's next business coup came in 1973 with its signing — only ten years after his one-off release on Island — Bob Marley and The Wailers.

Island toured Marley and The Wailers as though they were an ordinary white rock group, putting them through the club and college circuit around the country, and gave their debut album, Catch-a-Fire, and subsequent releases, the promotion and advertising only previously demanded by rock releases.

PRESSING FACTORY

During this period Island built its own pressing factory in West Drayton, and took on distribution for then-embryonic independent labels like Virgin, Chrysalis, Jet and Rocket. Island's Basing Street Studios had also been known as the most technologically-advanced studio in the country for a couple of

Although this diversification undoubtedly consolidated Island's position as the most powerful independent label, it also dissipated the company's energy and vision.

In 1976, Island lost the EG Management catalogue to Polydor when the Island EG contract expired, to Polydor when the Island EG contract expired, to distribution agreements with the blossoning Virgin. Chrystals, Jet and Rocket labels also went west. At the end of 1977, Island finally disbanded its distribution operations and sold the West Drayton pressing plant. Island returned to its original path of finding, producing a nutruring new artists.

The 73-4 period was something of a slump for Island. Since then, however, the company has risen to and beyond its former status.

The mid-Seventies saw Island break Marley and The Wailers worldwide — again, an unheard of feat in the world or reggae. Hi-Tension went from playing Upstairs At Ronnies and similar dives to headlining

the Hammersmith Odeon within eight months of arriving on the scene, thanks to Island, and Steel Pulse, undoubtedly the premier homegrown reggae band, went top ten within two weeks of the release of Handsworth Revolution.

A licencing deal with EMI-LRD arranged late last year, alongside a network of licencees across the globe, ensures the company a watertight distribution and promotion network around the world.

Yet, among the heavyweight acts like Marley and The Waiters, Island still believes that small can be beauful, as its continuing support of highterial properties of the properties of the Blackwell still reasons a close personal interest in the running of the company, as well, involving himself in ack to the extent of signing the likes of Inner Circle (said to be the next Third World) and producing albums for John Martyn, Inner Circle and others.

Obviously on a bigger scale, but not really different

INDEPENDENT LABELS

CHARISMA

The grey matter behind the formation of Charisma Records started its career as a sports journalist. By the age of 26, Tony Stratton-Smith was sports editor on the now-defunct Daily Sketch, and moved swiftly on to become sport columnist at the Daily Express. Disillusioned with life on the Street Of Shame, Stratton-Smith fled the country. Settline in Brazil, he wrote the lauded bine of Mother Maria. The Rebel Nun (!). which appeared in 14 languages, and penned a string of football books. While in Brazil, Stratton-Smith's embryonic career

as musical entrepreneur received a big push through his acquaintance with the Brazilian composer, Antonio Carlos-Johim, Returning to England in 1962. he met Brian Epstein and, according to Charisma md Brian Gibbon, "drifted into the music business". His first involvement with the music industry in '67 came through managing Nice (and later, through the Emerson connection, ELP). The Bonzo Doe Doo Dah Band and Van Der Graaf Generator

In 1969. Stratton-Smith Productions went into the record production business, trading under the name

By now, Stratton-Smith's Mother Management and Charisma Artists had been established - Mother' to act as manager for new signings and Charisma Artists as a booking agency for new signings. This arrange-

ment took the economic pressure of supporting young acts away from the label itself Although Gibbon says that the company has always done "things that are not commercial", its launch

releases hit the market with a bang. The Rare Bird single Sympathy charted high and sold over a million copies, and the first Nice album for Charisma, Five Bridges Suite, went gold, As with Island in its pioneering progressive rock scene. It's two main early signings, Genesis and Van

period, charisma soon became synonymous with the complex, 'intellectual' second wave of the progressive

Der Graaf Generator were the quintessential progressive groups, producing long and complex keyboardoriented pieces which employed the most convoluted time-signatures and bizarre counterpoints. Their lyrics compounded the uncommercial nature of the product, with Peter Gabriel's obsession with classicism/guignol/Eliot, and Peter Hammill's opposing interest in H.P. Lovecraft-style epic surrealism. Neither factor was to endear either band to the mass public or to the radio stations (beyond, that is, Sounds

Of The Seventies). Genesis, of course, went on to world renown as purveyors of hip easy listening, while Van Der Graaf Generator remained on the boobytrapped path of cult/minority status. Gibbon defines the philosophy of Charisma in terms of "putting something back into the business" The music typified by Charisma's 'house style' was

never sales viable, but Gibbon says, "we made it viable by our enthusiasm. Gibbon agrees that the company remained for quite a few years within very restricted stylistic parameters,

but adds that "It happened quite by accident. Nevertheless, "It was fortunate in the short term, in that the hands made it either in the first or second

Charisma was strongly guided by the personal musical interests of its staff from the beginning. It gained an early reputation as a progressive label and, in Gibbons words, found that, "artists in that field were attracted to us.

SLUMP PERIOD

Progressive rock was superceded by Glam Rock in the early seventies. The audiences and sales figures accrued during the heyday of naturally remained constant (Genesis, of course, were already making the transition into superstardom) but styles were changing at a hectic pace.

This period marked a slump for Charisma, and Gibbon freely admits that the company, "carried on a bit too long" with progressive music. The slump was signified by a certain lack of direction, a lack which the company had trouble fulfilling. "I think we were looking for a Genesis Mark two" Gibbon says, adding that for a while Van Der Graaf Generator were lined up for the treatment. "But you can't create a Mark 2



journalist, novelist, manager, record label owner, bon viveur and the only record biz personality to regularly feature in Private Eye's racing column, Colonel Mad. Genesis." he says' "And from that point on we started looking out."

In 1973, Charisma diversified its a&r policy, taking on acts like Clifford T. Ward and G. T. Moore and The Reggae Guitars. It also reviewed its policy on single releases Up until 75/6. Gibbon says the company looked

upon singles as 'a marketing device - the string of Genesis hit singles following on from I Know What I Like (In Your Wardrobe) being a good example.

Charisma had also had successes with the various Monty Python albums, Python and the other comedy acts (Stanshall, Everage et al) being the other focus of company's operations apart from the VDGG/Genesis axis.

Gibbon feels that, up until this period, there was no midway between these two poles. The company's change of view regarding singles and the diversification of its a&r policy filled this gap.

Singles became as valid an operation as the heavy album-bias of previous years, and the signing of the likes of Ward and the Reggae Guitars - among others lent itself to the singles market.

Disregarding the perennial, rarely-fluctuating mor singles market, the UK single came into its own with the advent of the singles-dominated punk movement. Charisma, however, shied clear of the new wave. In fact, there was a period during the first year or so of punk in which the company made no signings whatso-

Since that time, Charisma has been consolidating its position with regard to its pressing and distribution arrangement with Phonogram, its worldwide licencing deals and strengthening its roster of artistes in a qualitative, rather than quantitative, fashion. Gibbon says that Charisma, "Try to have no more

than five working acts at any one time." New signings on Charisma include Blue Max, Darling, Dazzlers and by a band "off the shelf") but of a quality indicative of Charisma's continuing support of original, uncommercial (in major terms) modern rock.

VIRGIN

VIRGIN RECORDS is England's most notable example of the American phenomenon - hip (young) capitalism. Formed as an offshoot from Virgin's mail order service — itself a spin-off from the Virgin shop in Oxford Street - it grew to be the definitive 'head' label in the mid-Seventies. A nationwide chain of shops supplied by its own

warehouse, two studios (The Manor and, more recently The Townhouse), two satellite companies (Caroline Exports and The Front Line), two mobile studios, The Venue, London's first nightclub rock venue, and recently a Virgin Island in the Carribean which to build another studio have been

established all within the space of six years. Virgin has led a charmed existence since its inception in May 1973. Its first batch of releases shot it to public and critical acclaim, including as it did Faust's The Faust Tapes (retailing at 59p), Gong's Radio Gnome Invisible, The Manor Live compendium and

Meanwhile, Virgin had also arranged a leasing agreement with Watt Records in New York, the company formed by jazz composer Carla Bley and her husband Mike Mantler. Watt was formed to produce Bley's epochal three-album "chronotransduction" Escalator Over The Hill, rightly acclaimed by every critic as the most important jazz work of the decade. and went on to produce further Bley albums, plus albums by Mantler and the Jazz Composers Orchestra. The various albums following Escalator' were not financially successful, and after eighteen months the company transferred its leasing arrangement to ECM records in Munich which is also distributed here by Virgin. The sometimes effete mood music of ECM and its spin-off, Japo, has made the company the jazz success story of the seventies, and FCM gill enjoys a successful, if low-key, relationship with Virgin

As for the present day; Virgin is now leased to 27 different territories across the globe, and opened a New York office a while back. Draper says the company has expanded enormously - a truism if roster of artists. The factor marking Virgin apart from similar rags-to-riches operations is that, looking back at the uncommercial acts such as Henry Cow, Phillip Glass and others, Simon Draper can still unreservedly say that the company is interested in such un-

STIFF

Stiff Records - Boy Wonder of the music industry began life inausniciously. The first stiff release was Heart Of The City (BUY I), by Nick Lowe, a hitherto boring old fart renowned purely because of his links with Brinsley Schwartz.

This was 1976 (August 14 to be precise) when Stiff was a struggling indic run by a staff of three; Andrew Jakeman (aka Jake Riviera), Dave Robinson and

Stiff began to rake in the press cuttings with its release of The Damned's New Rose in October 1976 ostensibly the first punk single from the first punk band. According to Paul Conroy, who joined 15 months ago as general manager at Stiff, the company 'was the first to dabble in that sort of music, sort of music being the burgeoning new wave.

"From the beginning onwards," says Conrov, the company was powerful in its own field - no one had yet formed a label putting energy and expertise behind the "new wave" as Stiff had. Nor had anyone come up with the offbeat marketing ploys utilised by Stiff.

Conroy says the only byword for Stiff's early marketing promotion was "Get out there and be very adventurous " yet a definite and rather anarchic style is noticeable in Stiff's operations. It ranged from the downright outrageous ("If it

isn't Stiff, it isn't worth a fuck") to the subtly jive and orously arrogant campaigns of recent Stiff's image in the record business is closely -

Damned, by - surprisingly - The Damned, D.D.D. sold just under 50,000 copies - no mean feat for the first release from an indic label - but the Stiff really hit the fan with Elvis Costello's debut elpee My Aim Is True, which to date has sold in excess of 100,000 copies. Elvis, naturellement, went hand-in-hand with Jake Riviera towards greater things and a more meanineful relationship with Radar Records, and has become rock's prizewinning prima donna across the globe. Stiff, constantly re-affirming its distrust of corporate music biz organisation, went on pioneering

The next big step for Stiff was the release of Ian Dury's New Boot's And Panties album, which to date has sold over 300,000 copies - outstripping every new wave album in the sales stakes From the start of its operations, Stiff has been

pressed and distributed by Island (via EMI), and Conroy says that this is "a nice situation to be in." He adds, however, a statement which questions the vers dubious definition of an independent label: "The whole indie thing is a very strange situation. There are no real independents in this country. We are all restricted by the factories and distribution we can

When told that Stiff exudes a rather 'stroppy image, Conroy retorts, "We're still stroppy. We've got to be that way. If we weren't, we'd not be in the position we're in today.

As with the majority of independent labels, Conroy says that Stiff exists apart from the major labels Certainly, Stiff has to work in the same market as the majors, but in no way does it see its role as emulating the business actions of the majors.

The next coun for Stiff was The Akron Sound fathered by habitues of the North American industrial wasteland like Devo and Pere Ubu, and greened by the likes of Rachel Sweet. Conroy agrees that a lot of people burnt their fingers over Akron - the Rubbe City Sound burnt itself out quicker than Power Pop

Devo were a good example of Stiff's marketing techniques. The ads accompanying the various Devo singles were as wacky and, at times, outrageous, as the bands image. Conroy says that the company received indignant letters from the advertising authorities about its Devo ads, which featured dismembered dolls (among other things). "But," Conroy says reveal-"sensationalism is the greatest way of causing a stir and getting attention.

And an artist can be sure of maximum exposure with Stiff. Conroy says that various majors have made ethically-dubious attempts to filch Stiff's more

successful acts while it wasn't looking. And on the positive side, Conroy says that the public and press, still look to us; our ads, our music, the people we're signing. And people will give a record a chance because it's on Stiff." And what major could claim so blind a faith from a basically suspicious record-buying public?

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NDEPENDENT LABELS



ARE WE not incomprehensible? First with Stiff and now with Virgin, "The Five Vegetables Of The Apocalypse" (as the NME dubbed them) play on as Western Civilisation crumbles.



Rezillos started with Bob Last's Edinburgh label, Fast Product - home of The Human League, currently a hot property - and went on to chart glory with Sire.

RAMPAGE

There are many and various types of independent record company. After Stiff the gates opened to a flood of DIY 'punk' and alternative music music

Some, like the jazz, folk and reggae labels, were formed because the majors were not interested in their product, while others (notably the myriad new wave labels) started because the advent of punk proved you didn't necessarily need the EMI's, CBS's or WEA's and could release your product from the comfort of your own front root

Punk made indie labels fashionable, qe rigeur even. but others had been operating quietly for years before hand. In jazz, the Ogun, Mosaic and Incus labels had all been running on a shoestring budget since the early Seventies. The formation of the network of jazz labels

ranging from trad/mor jazz on Black Lion, through contemporary jazz on Mosaic and Ogun to the avant-garde on Bead and Incus - was precipitated by the majors' diminishing commitment to all but the very worst of British jazz from the late Sixties onwards. In the, er, 'field' of folk, the most famous label

must surely be Transatlantic (now travelling under the nom de disque of Logo), which took the folk label out of the wilds of albion and into the Island/Chrysalis

Indie labels have flourished and foundered at an alarming rate in the mainstream of pop, too. A survivor of the mor indie imbroglio is Rampage Records, progeny of Larry Page's defunct Page One Records. Notching up phenomenal gold sales in the land of the rising Yen, Page's earlier company and the newborn Rempage have had only middling success

A plethora of one-off gimmick platters, such as the various football team anthems has given Page a lowly image in the English market. Rampage, however, has recently jettisoned its policy on taking one-off gimmick singles. It is now concentrating on rock, pop and disco product - both on the single and album front - and will be launching into America (its last major territory, after the UK) this year.

ILLEGAL

Enter the bin-liner hordes, presenting le wave nouveau as the end of the record business as we know

A great deal of sloganeering went into the punk revolution. Bands and labels held out against the iniquitous influence of big money and acquired an army of youngsters unerringly loyal to the new, street-level rock culture. When the smoke cleared the Clash were with CBS, TRB with FMI and Sham with Polydor

The residue of all the hype was a group of small, genuinely indie labels like Small Wonder, Fast, Step-Forward, The Label and Deptford Fun City. Deptford Fun City and Step Forward are party of Faulty Products, run and owned by Miles Copeland and his brother Stuart. Originally seen as a merchandising company by Copeland, the young bloods who gravitated towards Copeland disliked the idea and together they formulated Illegal Records.

Early product from the company included singles from Chealsea, The Cortinas and The Models. Mark P(erry), then still editing Sniffin' Glue, was offered almost carte blanche a&r-wise to form the Step Forward label. Among others, Sham 69 and the lauded Manchester band, The Fall, have had releases Deptford Fun City was formed around South

London band, Squeeze, the first punks to tour the US and who are now with A&M.

Copeland's connection with the Wartoke Concern in NY (via brother Stewart's work with the US Paragon agency) led to his bringing over Television unknown until a rave review from the NME's Nick Kent - supported by the equally-anonymous Talking Heads

Around the time Perry left 'Glue - the Summer of 77 - to go full time with Alternative TV, Faulty Products was a hive of activity. Danny Baker (now the NME's receptionist-cum-star-writer) arrived and broke Sham 69 with Miles Copeland, and the company was involved in various ways with Cherry Vanilla, the Heartbreakers, The Electric Chairs and other lesser beings.

The FP cornucopia has since become a fully-fledged indie, releasing albums and singles from an abundance of young and original bands. Some of the earlier groups (Sham/Squeeze frinstance) have left to go on to greater things, yet the company is still pioneering little-known or left-field artists, basically from a conviction that it is a vital and necessary part of the underdeveloped new music scene.

LIGHTNING

One of the more unusual births of the new wave period is Lightning Records, a spin-off from the North London one-stop warehouse. The label was formed in 1977; a result, says md Alan Davison, of visits from local black musicians offering the company tanes. The first releases included regeat singles from Trinity and Marcia Aitkens - both of whose sartorial releases inspired Althea & Donna's chartbusting manifesto, Uptown Top Ranking, which sold over 250,000 copies. Lightning had an 'in' to the pulse of the retail trade

via its warehouse, and was thus eminently positioned to enter into the indie race. Acquiring a pressing and distribution arrangement with WEA, various reggae and punk singles were released, including Culture's lauded Two 7's Clash.

Davison says that there is virtually no limit to the diversity of Lightning's a&r or licencing policies. It nullid off a considerable business coup recently with its Old Gold box set of hit singles leased from various artists and companies, and is about to launch another Old Gold of earlier, but nonetheless surefire, bits.

An undoubted sign of Lightning's wide policy is its release of a single and album from the German band,

Can, leased from EMI in Germany. A visionary band in the words of their previous English companies, UA and Virgin, as well as the press, yet historically a difficult band to sell in England. Not displeased with the 5,000-plus sales of Out Of Reach, the band's first Lightning album, Lightning is now planning an early summer release for the group's next album.

RECOMMENDED

Finally, a company that puts commitment to its music and artists before all else. Recommended Records is the brainchild of Chris

Cutler, drummer with the recently-disbanded Henry Cow. It was formed in November 1977 primarily as a mail-order record company, bringing albums into the country by experimental European and American groups, as well as selling records by the various spinoff groups from Henry Cow such as the Art Bears and Slapp Happy.

An organisation entitled Rock In Opposition was also formed at the same time, to provide contact and work for the various groups under the Recommended umbrella. RIO organised a tour of five European bands in the

beginning of 1978, which culminated in an all-day festival at the New London Theatre in February Since the RIO festival, Recommended has expanded

- partly due to sales on the albums and single from the cult American group, The Residents. The catalogue now includes dozen of Recommended records from American and European groups, as well as landmarks of the 'avant-garde' from the likes of Zappa and Beefheart. Three small labels have also sprouted in the shadow

of Recommended Rift Records which will be releas. ing Fred Frith's Guitar Solos Three (One and Two were on Virgin), Re Records, responsible for the first and upcoming second album from the Henry Cow spin-off, Art Bears, and Broadcast Records, which will be releasing the final album from Henry Cow, entitled Western Culture, and which hopes to acquire the rights to the previous four 'Cow' albums from Virgin. All three new releases are due in April. The labels, mail-order service and musician's co-op

involved separately with Recommended are part of an international network of similar organisations. As well as the usual Rough Trade et al distribution here, Recommended is distributed in America by Random Radar, in Italy by the L'Orchestra co-operative, in Sweden by the large Sam organisation, as well as by a small French label, and there are blossoming RIO groups across Europe

Recommended say that "There is no alternative circuit for ANY music, let alone our music." As with Faulty Product, Recommended and its various satellites has become disillusioned with the operation of the rock business mainstream, and has launched out into active opposition against the mainstream, providing a unique service for its own and other musicians. A service which, it should be added, is precluded in the mainstream by considerations profit, regardless of quality.
